More recent GIS services include mobile field map applications to assist District staff and contractors with site and well locations; web map development to host the District's GIS data either publicly or to a limited audience; and routine requests from District staff for GIS data updates, maps, software installation, and other GIS data assistance.

Item 13. Scope of Professional Services and Cost Proposal for the Design, Engineering, Permitting and Construction Administration for Intracoastal Waterway Emergency Dredging in the vicinity of Crossroads, Martin County, FL.

Taylor Engineering has prepared a scope of work and fee quote for the design, engineering, permitting and construction administration of emergency dredging at the area referred to as Crossroads, the convergence of the St. Lucie Inlet, the Intracoastal Waterway (IWW), and the Okeechobee Waterway (OWW) in Martin County.

This area receives a sizeable influx of sediment from various sources (particularly the inlet) and is one of the District's most frequent dredging areas. A potential delay in the availability of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) to conduct maintenance dredging at this location is likely to lead to limited navigability if not addressed in the near future.

A separate and optional quote is included for similar services on the IWW near Jupiter Inlet. Should these services not be necessary, or the projects could not be successfully combined for timing and cost savings, this portion of the scope would not be implemented.

The History of Baynanza

Baynanza was created in 1982 in an effort by Miami-Dade County to raise awareness of the vital environmental and economic importance of Biscayne Bay, the county's sub-tropical shallow estuary, national marine sanctuary and national park. At the time, Biscayne Bay was threatened from the direct impacts of pollution by sewage runoff, marine debris, and other contaminants, and Baynanza was conceived as a way to highlight these environmental issues and engage the community in recovery efforts. Miami-Dade County joined forces with local community leaders and public and private partners to highlight the environmental importance of the bay and raise awareness of the challenges facing this unique marine resource.

To date, Baynanza remains as one of the largest coastal cleanup in South Florida, and forty-two years later the Baynanza Biscayne Bay Cleanup Day has become a staple in the local efforts to clean our coastal areas and raise community environmental awareness. During the annual Cleanup Day, thousands of volunteers spread out across twenty-five plus locations in Miami-Dade County to remove several tons of trash from our shorelines and bay islands. And Baynanza is more than just a 1-day event, as this internationally known program engages our community through the incorporation of more than 45 educational and inspirational environmental events organized by community partners during the Baynanza months of March and April each year.

ITEM 1. Call to Order.

Commissioner Davenport called the meeting to order at 8:45 a.m.

ITEM 2. Roll Call.

Assistant Executive Director Janet Zimmerman called the roll and Commissioners Gernert, Davenport, and Blow were present. Commissioners Boehning, Sansom, and O'Steen were absent. Ms. Zimmerman stated that a quorum was present. Also in attendance were Executive Director Mark Crosley and Finance Director Glenn Scambler.

ITEM 3. Additions or Deletions.

There were no additions or deletions to the agenda. Commissioner Blow motioned to approve the agenda as presented. Vice Chair Gernert seconded the motion. All were in favor and the motion passed unanimously.

ITEM 4. Public Comments.

There were no public comments.

ITEM 5. Financial Statements for May 2023.

Mr. Crosley stated that the TD Bank CD was renewed for one year with new terms and a rate of 5.35% and will net about \$75k. The money market account is at 4%, and the City National CD is at 4.34% for 24 months.

Vice Chair Gernert motioned to approve the Financial Statements for May 2023. Commissioner Blow seconded the motion. All were in favor and the motion passed unanimously.

ITEM 6. May 2023 Budget Summary and Project Status Expenditure Reports.

Mr. Crosley presented the Budget Summary and Project Status Expenditure Reports for May 2023. There were no questions.

ITEM 7. Delegation of Authority Report.

Mr. Crosley presented the Executive Director's Delegation of Authority Report. He noted that Cavache has done some work at the temporary office as seen on page 24.

ITEM 8. Tentative Budget for FY 2023-2024.

Mr. Crosley presented the budget specifically to set the millage rate and advertise the first tax hearing. He noted that this is the first draft, and there will be two more meetings to discuss in depth. He stated that today's meeting is to make a recommendation to the full Board on the millage rate for FY2023-2024. He noted that the rate cannot be raised once advertised. Staff is recommending a rollback rate at this point.

Vice Chair Gernert motioned to approve the rollback rate. Commissioner Blow seconded the motion. All were in favor and the motion passed unanimously.

ITEM 9. Additional Agenda Items or Staff Comments.

There were no additional items or staff comments.

Commissioner Blow asked if there should be a line item for the office renovation in the budget. Mr. Glenn Scambler noted that it is on page 22 of the proposed budget and has a budget of \$282k.

Mr. Scambler also noted that the Committee needs to select a date and time for the next tax hearing. Mr. Crosley noted that it will be held directly before the Outreach in Martin County on September 7, 2023, at 5:05 p.m. at the Francis Langford Dockside Pavilion, 707 NE Indian River Dr., Jensen Beach, FL 34957.

ITEM 1. Call to Order.

Chair Crowley called the meeting to order at 9:08 a.m.

ITEM 2. Pledge of Allegiance.

Commissioner Davenport led the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America.

ITEM 3. Roll Call.

Commissioner Davenport called the roll and Chair Crowley, Vice Chair Gernert, and Commissioners Boehning, Blow, Cuozzo, Isiminger, Stapleford, and Williams were present. Commissioners O'Steen and Sansom were absent. Ms. Zimmerman stated that a quorum was present. Also in attendance were Executive Director Mark Crosley, Operations Director Ian Eyeington, Mr. Eduardo Marin, USACE, Mr. Jerry Scarborough and Mr. Jim Marino of Taylor Engineering, and Attorney Peter Breton.

ITEM 4. Consent Agenda.

Commissioner Blow stated support for the Pelican Island grant application, Item A on the Consent Agenda, and suggested to add signage to the island that identifies the island as being man-made to create a navigation channel. Ms. Zimmerman stated she will work with the applicant to see how that will fit in to the project.

Commissioner Blow motioned to approve the consent agenda. Commissioner Davenport seconded the motion. All were in favor and the motion passed unanimously.

ITEM 5. Additions or Deletions.

Mr. Crosley noted that additional information was handed out for Items 11, 15, and 17.

Commissioner Davenport motioned to approve the agenda as presented. Commissioner Blow seconded the motion. All were in favor and the motion passed unanimously.

ITEM 6. Public Comments.

Mr. Tom Carry of Volusia County thanked the Board and stated he has worked with the District for decades on waterway cleanups.

Commissioner Davenport thanked Mr. Carry for representing Volusia County, and Commissioner Stapleford thanked him for his work as well. Chair Crowley stated that the support of local partners is so important and appreciated.

Mr. Crosley noted he would like to recognize Chair Crowley, who just won the Biscayne Bay Rodeo cleaning out old ghost traps under water.

Dr. Steven Lester of New Smyrna Beach asked the Board for advice regarding his canal silting in at an intersection of the canal and the ICW, and stated that the silting is creeping toward the channel. He asked who he could speak with to get partial dredging grants or some sort of help to make the canal navigable again. Commissioner Davenport noted that the shoal is 100-150 ft from the ICW and he is worried about an emergency dredging situation. He recommended the City inquire about a grant to see if it is eligible and to begin to raise money on their side. Chair Crowley noted that FIND does provide grants to waterways with public access facilities on the other end to foster access. In this case of a coalition of residents and the local government, there is a higher probability of FIND participating. He suggested reaching out to Commissioner Davenport for guidance.

Commissioner Davenport suggested the possibility of piggybacking on the dredging of Ponce Inlet.

ITEM 7. Board Meeting Minutes.

Commissioner Blow motioned to approve the May 19, 2023, Nomination Committee Minutes, Personnel Committee Minutes, Finance and Budget Committee Minutes, and Board Meeting Minutes. Commissioner Davenport seconded the motion. All were in favor and the motion passed unanimously.

ITEM 8. Staff Report on Volusia County Area Projects.

Mr. Crosley reviewed the status of area projects beginning on page 48 of the agenda. Of note, the economic update for Volusia County's total number has doubled to almost \$1B.

Commissioner Blow asked whether DMMA V-21 should be cleared. Mr. Crosley stated that when sites remain natural, there is not a lot of expenditure, and once cleared, expenses arise. He noted it may be worth discussing at a future meeting.

Chair Crowley asked staff to put an agenda item together to create a list of unimproved sites and a recommendation of ones to take a look at.

ITEM 9. Comments and Project Status from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers.

Mr. Eduardo Marin, the IWW Project Manager with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE), stated that at DMMA O-23, work on the dike lifts is at approximately 90% complete, drainage blanket is at 85%, and the perimeter ditch is at 85%. Pre-final inspection occurred for Martin County Business Park on June 28. The contractor will complete the punch list items before a final inspection is scheduled. The weir and gangway structures are complete. The contractor's latest calculated construction completion date is Sept. 25, 2023, and then USACE will turn back the site to the landowner (FIND).

Commissioner Cuozzo stated that this project has to be finished as soon as possible.

At IWW Palm Valley South, Southwind completed dredging on May 11, 2023, and is currently demobilizing from the site. They've seeded all disturbed areas within SJ-14 and repaired sidewalks that were damaged outside of the corridor. Once the seed is established and sidewalk accepted, then Southwind can completely demobilize, and USACE can proceed on contract close out. Mr. Marin received an email accepting all work from the contract.

Mr. Marin noted that at IWW Volusia, USACE received the beach survey they needed, which was a critical item to design. The team is working to draft a permit with placement of the design and real estate to get the project on track for a 2024 award.

AIWW Sawpit Reach recently received the latest survey, including the new advancement area, which was needed to respond to a request from DEP. This project looks to be on track.

Mr. Marin noted that Commissioner Williams had a shoaling concern in Nassau County north of Sawpit. The USACE is still collecting the survey and putting together a package for a FY 2024 workplan and a project schedule and award for FY 25.

Commissioner Williams stated that two channel markers are now above water level at max low tide.

Mr. Marin stated that IWW Matanzas was advertised on time. USACE missed the opportunity to put in the solicitation a critical shoal where Summer Haven River connects to the IWW. They are going to modify the contract to get that included.

For IWW Crossroads, the survey was sent to FIND staff. The USACE vessel had USCG personnel on board who witnessed the shoaling on the OWW where it connects to the IWW, and

they will consider an emergency dredging situation, or potential channel closure. USACE is collecting surveys.

Mr. Crosley noted that the shoaling at Crossroads is critical enough that if USACE cannot dredge it, staff may recommend action by FIND in the near future.

Mr. Marin stated that the draft Project Partnership Agreement is currently under review. The Congressional notification package was submitted on May 26, 2023, to South Atlantic Division and they are waiting on their official comments.

ITEM 10. Volusia County Beach Erosion Control District Update.

At the March 17, 2023, meeting, the Board approved a Material Removal Agreement with the County for removal of over 600,000 cu/yds of material from MSA 434-S. Concurrently, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) has postponed a scheduled and necessary maintenance dredging project for the Intracoastal Waterway in this vicinity. Although the USACE utilized a hopper dredge as a temporary means to maintain navigation on the IWW, it is imperative that the full project move forward in the near future.

Ms. Jessica Fentress, Volusia County Coast Director, thanked staff and Commissioner Davenport for the outreach and partnership, and thanked all the other entities who have helped in the County's hurricane recovery efforts.

Ms. Fentress noted that DMMA V-26 in Edgewater provided material for the 6.5 miles of trap bags that were installed on 198 properties to provide protection.

Ms. Fentress stated that the County will dredge 550k cy out of MSA 434/Rattlesnake Island in August 2024.

She thanked Commissioner Davenport for his support and asked how to address derelict vessels in the County, and whether they may be FIND eligible.

Chair Crowly suggested looking into the FWC V-TIP program that was started this year.

Commissioner Isiminger thanked Ms. Fentress and asked if the County and USACE are on the same page as far as scheduling? Ms. Fentress stated yes, they are working together.

Commissioner Davenport thanked the Board for support in his community.

Mr. Crosley noted that he had received an inquiry from a local citizen regarding shoreline erosion along the IWW and asked Ms. Fentress to whom they should speak. She stated that she would point them in the right direction, and that the County did receive a resiliency grant to focus on sea level rise and erosion, and they will include significant community feedback.

Commissioner Sansom joined the meeting via Zoom.

ITEM 11. Approval of the Qualifying Low Bid for Shoreline Stabilization at Dredged Material Management Area SJ-1 (St Johns County), FL.

On Thursday, July 13, 2023, staff received and opened bids for the remaining shoreline stabilization project at Dredged Material Management Area (DMMA) SJ-1 in St. Johns County. This site is adjacent to the Intracoastal Waterway and is experiencing significant shoreline erosion.

The project was advertised for bid on June 5, 2023, and a pre-bid meeting was held on June 21, 2023. Cavache, Inc. was the lowest bid by \$1k.

Commissioner Blow motioned to approve the bid. Commissioner Stapleford seconded the motion. All were in favor and the motion passed unanimously.

ITEM 12. Adjacent Partial Property Exchange at Material Storage Area 617-C, Palm Beach County, FL.

In late 2021, a neighbor (Mr. Lee Heaton) adjacent to the District's permanent, long-range Material Storage Area (MSA) 617-C in northern Palm Beach County, contacted the District staff to inquire about development plans for this site. Following further discussions, Mr. Heaton requested the Board consider an equitable property swap for a corner portion of the District's property that adjoins his currently flag-shaped property boundary. At the November 2022 meeting, the Board tentatively approved an exchange of the southwestern corner of MSA 617-C, approximately 5,604 square feet (currently being maintained by Mr. Heaton), for 3,535 square feet (including approximately 72 feet of waterfrontage) of property between the Intracoastal Waterway and the District's existing property line. The Board approval included all necessary due diligence be completed before the exchange was finalized. Surveys and appraisals have been finalized and are favorable to the District.

Commissioner Isiminger declared a Conflict of Interest for this item and submitted the appropriate form.

Chair Crowley stated that this deal consolidates the property in a way that is beneficial to both parties.

Commissioner Blow motioned to approve the exchange. Commissioner Davenport seconded the motion. All were in favor and the motion passed unanimously, with Commissioner Isiminger abstaining from the vote.

ITEM 13. Scope of Additional Professional Engineering and Construction Services for Dredged Material Management Area SJ-14 Discharge Pipeline Repairs, St. Johns County, FL.

Taylor Engineering has prepared an additional scope of work and fee quote for the extended time required to manage the recent replacement of a defective discharge pipeline at Dredged Material Management Area (DMMA) SJ-14. This project ran into significant unexpected difficulties, and Taylor Engineering was timely and diligent with supervision and management to decrease probable negative outcomes during this project.

Commissioner Stapleford motioned to approve the scope. Commissioner Davenport seconded the motion. All were in favor and the motion passed unanimously.

ITEM 14. Assistance Projects Extension Requests.

Several Assistance Program Project Sponsors have requested extensions of their FY 2021-22 project agreements. In accordance with Chapter 374.96 F.S. and Rule 66B-2.009(1) or Rule 66B-1.009(1), these agreements can be extended with Board approval for one (1) additional year. (Revised project expiration date for each project will be September 30, 2024).

Commissioner Blow motioned to approve the project agreement extensions. Commissioner Davenport seconded the motion. All were in favor and the motion passed unanimously.

ITEM 15. FY 2023-2024 Assistance Program Application Ratings and Evaluations.

Staff has compiled the Commissioner's Rating and Evaluation Scores for the submitted and reviewed FY 2023-2024 Cooperative Assistance Program (CAP) application and Waterways Assistance Program (WAP) applications. Each application that received an average score of 35 or higher may move forward for further funding consideration, pursuant to the program rules. One project, Waterway Markers Safety Buoys for North Jetty from the Hillsboro Inlet District, did not receive a high enough score to move forward. Board approval of the Final Assistance Program Application Rankings continues all eligible projects for funding consideration to the final Truth in Millage Act (TRIM) budget hearing in September.

Commissioner Blow asked to correct the amount requested for St. Johns County from \$1M to \$1.55M on the list.

Chair Crowley thanked the Commissioners for their community projects.

Commissioner Davenport motioned to approve the draft list. Commissioner Blow seconded the motion. All were in favor and the motion passed unanimously.

Commissioner Sansom noted that no project is final until the final tax hearing in September.

ITEM 16. Assistance Program Rule Revision Discussion.

Each year upon completion of the assistance program application cycle, staff reviews the grant program process, and notes Commissioner comments and proposed changes to the assistance program rules that would improve the process for the District and the applicants. Based on the comments at the June 2023 meeting, staff have compiled the sections of the rule the Board may wish to discuss further. At the September meeting, staff will present the District's Regulatory Plan for FY 2023-2024 for Board approval.

Ms. Zimmerman reviewed the items to discuss beginning on page 118 of the agenda.

Commissioner Blow asked how long a local government is obligated to honor a public easement that FIND helped fund construction. Ms. Zimmerman stated it had been raised to 35 years.

Discussions ensued regarding an appropriate length of time to maintain these easements, lifespans of the projects, and discussed different scenarios where a prorated repayment may be appropriate.

The Board discussed the funding of Law Enforcement vessels and whether the current cap of \$100k is enough. They agreed to raise the cap to \$125k.

The Board discussed commercial access and the possibility of adding language to the grant application that stresses the importance of, or requirement of, commercial access.

The Board suggested doubling the derelict vessel cap of \$75k per county to \$150k per county, per year.

Commissioner Gernert rejoined the meeting at 11:35 a.m.

The Commissioners discussed small-scale spoil islands and discussed increasing the funding amount of \$7,500 per project; increasing the labor hourly rate to the IRS rate; trash removal and management; and sign installation.

Item 17. St. Lucie Railroad Bridge Federal Funding Opportunity Support.

FIND has been requested by the City of Stuart (City), Brightline and the Florida East Coast Railway (FECR) to support efforts to obtain federal grant funding to replace the existing railway bridge over the St. Lucie River/Okeechobee Waterway (OWW) near downtown Stuart. St. Lucie River Railroad Bridge replacement is critical for the long-term capacity of freight rail operations,

regional marine industry movements and intercity passenger rail operations. This current bridge is approaching 100 years old and is the only remaining single-track segment on the entire FECR Miami to Jacksonville freight rail corridor. FIND has been requested to partner with the City of Stuart, Brightline, and FECR to apply for a U. S. Department of Transportation (USDOT) grant program to support the development and implementation of the St. Lucie River Railroad Bridge Replacement Project.

Chair Crowley stated he was very supportive of this opportunity.

Commissioner Davenport motioned to approve the resolution. Commissioner Cuozzo seconded the motion.

Commissioner Isiminger stated there needs to be coordination with the existing road bridge for openings if the railroad bridge is moved.

Commissioner Cuozzo stated this project is vitally important for the community and highly recommended it to move forward.

All were in favor of the motion and the motion passed unanimously.

ITEM 18. Finance and Budget Committee Report.

Commissioner Davenport motioned to approve to the full Board the Financial Statements for May. Commissioner Blow seconded the motion. All were in favor and the motion passed unanimously.

Commissioner Davenport recommended the adoption of the tentative budget with the millage advertised at the roll back rate, and the time and location of the first tax hearing. The current millage rate is 0.32 and the roll back rate is 0.288.

Chair Crowley asked how the new rate was calculated. Mr. Crosley stated that the rate is calculated based on whether the tax base that the District collects is the same amount or less as last year.

Commissioner Blow noted that staff stated they feel the roll back rate will adequately cover expenses for the next fiscal year.

Commissioner Williams suggested keeping the current rate pending discussion.

Commissioner Gernert noted that it was considered, but if the District does not adhere to the roll back rate, it will have to post the intention and declare that this is a tax increase.

Commissioner Isimnger seconded the motion to adopt the tentative budget with the millage advertised at the roll back rate.

Commissioner Blow noted that while these financial statements show a significant amount of money in the bank, all funds are committed to grant projects in the communities.

Commissioner Williams opposed the motion. All others were in favor and the motion passed.

ITEM 19. Washington D.C. Report.

Mr. Crosley reviewed the Washington D.C. report on page 141 of the agenda.

Chair Crowley stated that it is a priority to get the Board back to Washington D.C. next year to meet the newly elected officials and have the new Commissioners make the trip as well.

Commissioner Stapleford stated that it is just as valuable to visit local offices and District Directors within each Commissioner's county.

ITEM 20. Additional Staff Comments and Additional Agenda Items.

There were no additional staff comments or agenda items.

ITEM 21. Additional Commissioner Comments.

Commissioner Sansom stated that he appreciated the Board's accommodation and will see them next month.

Commissioner Williams stated that he was sorry to miss the meeting in person, and that he would like the Operations Director to present a report on the condition and status of five DMMAs regularly, as well as modern dredging technology. He also suggested that the Deputy Director monitor projects that have been finished or being maintained, and streamline the application and process for WAP grants.

Chair Crowley stated that the Board did have a discussion about prioritizing a list of work on DMMAs.

Ms. Zimmerman noted that staff and county Commissioners do monitor their local projects and handle issues with local grant sponsors individually.

Commissioner Cuozzo thanked the Board for their continued support.

Commissioner Stapleford thanked Commissioner Davenport for the outreach and stated there will be an Aug. 18 ribbon cutting for a waterfront park in Palm Coast.

Commissioner Isiminger thanked Commissioner Davenport for the meeting and boat ride.

Commissioner Davenport stated that he was pleased to see the city manager and state representative at the outreach. He stated that he is working with the community on upcoming projects. He also had hats made for the Board and staff.

Commissioner Blow stated that it was a great boat ride and outreach. He discussed the hurdles of developing land for gopher tortoise sites, that FIND is not equipped to develop its own relocation sites, and that there are other government agencies that do have the ability to take over.

Mr. Eyeington suggested bringing in a consultant from Terracon who is well versed in the gopher tortoise process and has permitted sites for other groups. He stated he may have a few creative ideas on how FIND can approach it.

Chair Crowley stated that it was a great outreach.

ITEM 22. Adjournment.

The meeting was adjourned at 12:35 p.m.

Dredged Material Management Plan

Phase I of the Dredged Material Management Plan (DMMP) for the Intracoastal Waterway in Duval County was completed in 1986. Phase II of the DMMP was completed in 1993. The plan was updated in May of 2018. Land acquisition was completed in 1995. (*Please see the attached maps*).

The 50-year dredging projection for the 21 miles of channel in Duval County is now estimated at 1.8 million cu/yds and the storage projection is roughly 3.9 million cu/yds. This ranks as the fifth highest dredging projection of the District's 12 counties.

Dredged Material Management Area Development

Six upland Dredged Material Management Areas (DMMA) will manage dredged materials from the waterway. All sites have been purchased, 4 sites (DMMAs DU-2, DU-6A, DU-8 and DU-9) are fully constructed, and the rest have had Phase 1 development (clearing, fencing & maintenance).

Following the use of DMMA DU-8 in 2012 by a private contractor for area dredging, the issue of pipeline access was again brought forth by the site's adjacent residents. The District elected to design and construct a permanent underground pipeline sleeve along the site's dedicated pipeline access easement. The project was well-coordinated with the adjacent property owners and was completed in 2014. The site continues to experience unauthorized access and unwanted vegetation growth, both of which the District is continually addressing.

In the summer of 2013, approximately 74,000 cu/yds of material was offloaded from DMMA DU-2 for the construction of DMMA NA-1 in Nassau County. DMMA DU-2 was then utilized for placement of non-beach quality material (approximately 13,000 cu/yds) that was dredged during the Reach 2 (Sawpit) dredging project by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) in 2013. The use of this site for non-beach compatible material reoccurred with the 2018 USACE maintenance dredging project and is expected to receive a similar quantity and quality of material in the forthcoming Sawpit maintenance dredging.

In 2015, a Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) sub-contractor removed approximately 300,000 cu/yds of material from DMMA DU-2 for roadway projects, at no cost to the District. The weir at DU-2 was replaced in 2017 and the site is fully operational. In 2018, a private contractor offloaded approximately 120,000 cu/yds of material from DMMA DU-2 for fill at a City of Jacksonville Electric Authority (JEA) decommissioned utility site. This left DMMA DU-2 with adequate capacity and in good condition for several events of anticipated dredging at Sawpit. This has or minimized or negated the need to construct DMMA 3&4 in the foreseeable future.

In 2020, the same contractor for the JEA project offloaded approximately 350,000 cu/yds of excess material from DMMA 3&4, reducing the District's future needs to haul material from this site. The site has been reconditioned and could be utilized for the storage of material, staging, etc.

In September of 2014, the Board approved moving forward with the additional design and permitting necessary to complete the construction of the remaining portion of DMMA DU-9. The site is actually located in north St. Johns County, but serves Duval Dredging Reach VII, which is south Duval and north St. Johns counties. In 2015, the Board approved an "environmental matters agreement" with the previous property owner to resolve the site's former contamination issues. The permitting and engineering of this project was completed in 2016 and the project was bid in early 2017. Construction was completed by 2018. The site was utilized for a 2022 USACE maintenance dredging project of Palm Valley.

Waterways Dredging

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) completed dredging of Dredging Reach II (Sawpit) near Nassau Sound in 2013. This project was funded by FIND. This Reach was again maintenance dredged by the USACE in late 2018 with the removal of 576,868 cu/yds of material from the channel. Approximately 13,000 cu/yds of non-beach compatible material was placed in DMMA DU-2, with the remainder of the material placed on the southern Amelia Island area beaches, as is typical with this project occurring every 5-6 years. The Sawpit area is again scheduled for a USACE maintenance dredging project within the next year.

With the completion of the DMMA DU-9 expansion project, the USACE utilized the site for part of the Palm Valley maintenance dredging project in 2021.

Waterways Economic Study

The Duval County Waterways Economic Study was first completed in 2005, updated in late 2011, again in June 2019, and most recently in late 2022. The latest study reports the Intracoastal Waterway (IWW) in Duval County supports over 6,100 jobs and results in \$67 million in annual revenue from boater-related spending. Over \$553 million is generated annually by IWW-related activities and the waterway results in over \$56 million in additional federal tax revenue and \$35 million in additional State and local tax revenue. The study demonstrated that an annualized investment by the District of approximately \$1.5 million results in and annual positive economic return of over \$719 million. There are over 19,600 registered vessels utilizing the IWW. (*Please see the attached economic summary*).

Waterways Assistance Program

Since 1986, the District has provided \$29.3 million in Waterways Assistance Program funding to 188 projects in the county having a total constructed value of \$60 million. The county, two cities, and the Port of Jacksonville have all participated in the program. Notably, 18 saltwater boat ramps and 9 canoe launches have been constructed or rehabilitated within Duval County. (*Please see the attached project listing and map*).

Cooperative Assistance Program





Search and Rescue and; the Inland Waterways Safety Program. The District's funding assistance for the Duval County portion of these projects was approximately \$528,000.
Interlocal Agreement Program The District's Interlocal Agreement Program has developed the following projects with elements in Duval County: Clean Marina Program and Clean Vessel Act Program for which \$75,000 has been provided in District assistance. The City of Jacksonville is currently completing on a Maritime Master Plan for Duval County waterways.
Waterway Clean Up Program The District has successfully partnered with the City of Jacksonville for many years to assist with their annual waterway cleanup project.
Small-Scale Derelict Vessel Removal Program Two Small-Scale Derelict Vessel Removal Projects have been conducted with Duval County in the amount of \$65,000.00.
Small-Scale Spoil Island Enhancement and Restoration Program The Navigation District has not received a Small-Scale Spoil Island Enhancement and Restoration Program request in Duval County.



Economic Benefits of the District Waterways, 2022



he Florida Inland Navigation District (District) is the state sponsor for Federal navigation projects along the Intracoastal Waterway (IWW) in Duval County. Over \$21.7 million has been invested in the past 10 years for navigation and other access projects. These investments and the Waterways itself generate significant economic impact throughout Duval County and wider region.

Economic modeling techniques were used to estimate the value created by District Waterways. To find the share of property value that is attributable solely to the proximity to the IWW, hedonic price modeling was used. Hedonic modeling shows that proximity to the Intracoastal Waterway adds value to homes within 1500m of District Waterways in Duval County. In total, the proximity to District Waterways makes up about \$1.61 Billion, or 1.2%, of the \$133 Billion in property values across Duval County. The IWW and its connecting navigable tributaries and canals makes up about \$96 million in annualized economic property impacts in Duval County.

NAME OF CONTRACTOR: TBD

STATUS: P&S kicked is scheduled to kicked off in November of 2023. Recent surveys indicate shoaling in cuts M-1 through M-7. The active DEP permit only covers M-4 through M-7. Scope now included collecting additional geotechnical borings and permit modification to dredge cuts M-1 through M-7.

ACTION: Information only. No Action is required from the Board.





6. MISCELLANEOUS:

A. Establish FIND as the local sponsor for Martin and Palm Beach Counties along the OWW.

USACE OC has met with SFWMD OC regarding the path forward to make FIND the local sponsor for Martin and Palm Beach Counties along the OWW.

Background: In 2005 Florida legislature amended Section 374.984, Florida Statutes to assign responsibility and authority to FIND for the portion of the OWW located in Martin and Palm Beach Counties (link to the full statute:)

http://www.leg.state.fl.us/statutes/index.cfm?App_mode=Display_Statute&Search_String=&URL=0300-0399/0374/Sections/0374.984.html.

Section 374.984 falls under Part II of Chapter 374, where Part II is "Florida Inland Navigation District Law". Paragraph 6.h. of Section 374.984 states, "(h) The district is designated the local interest sponsor for the sole purpose of maintaining navigability of that portion of the Okeechobee Waterway located in Martin and Palm Beach Counties."

Next step:

- 1. SFWMD will submit a letter to SAJ recognizing the Florida law that designates FIND as responsible for maintaining navigability of that portion of the OWW and requesting the termination of its responsibilities as non-federal sponsor (NFS) of the portion, with a copy furnished to FIND. DONE
- 2. In parallel with SFWMD's letter, FIND will submit a letter to SAJ requesting to be the NFS for the portion of the OWW within Martin and Palm Beach Counties, with a copy furnished to the SFWMD. DONE
- 3. SAJ will draft an agreement for FIND to assume O&M responsibilities for the portion of the OWW within Martin and Palm Beach Counties. Draft Project Partnership Agreement is complete pending some items required for package submission per regulations.
- -SAJ can prioritize executing a Contributed Funds Agreement (CFA) while drafting the Project Partnership Agreement (PPA). FIND as requested to prioritize the CFA. –SAD's comments are addressed and a resubmission to SAD is being prepared.
- 4. After execution of the PPA, SAJ will send a letter to SFWMD acknowledging the termination of its role as a NFS for the specified portion of the OWW and clarifying the SFWMD's continued role as NFS for the remaining portion of the OWW, with a copy furnished to FIND.





5. The next item needed is a contributed funds agreement for the OWW. The contributed funds agreement unfortunately will not be of the magnitude of the IWW/AIWW one in that the new model only allows for a smaller duration and funding limit. For example, effort should be made for the maximum agreement duration, likely a 7-10 year contributed funds agreement with specific areas outlined (as compared to the existing IWW/AIWW agreement that is a 50-year agreement with no maximum contribution or specific reaches listed).



FLORIDA INLAND NAVIGATION DISTRICT INTRACOASTAL WATERWAY WORK ORDER No. 58-2023-02



In accordance with the Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) between the Department of the Army and the Florida Inland Navigation District (FIND) for acceptance of contributed funds for the Atlantic Intracoastal Waterway, entered into on September 3, 1997, as amended on October 22, 2001, by amendment number 1, work order number 58-2023-02 is described per the following requirements:

- 1. Project Name: Revised pre-paid work order. Re-direction of surplus funding from the 2022 IWW Palm Valley South project to be used for environmental coordination, permits, data collection, and designing services to produce procurement level plans and specifications for the upcoming AIWW Reach 1 dredging project.
- 2. Detailed Scope of Work: Upon completion of the 2022 IWW Palm Valley South project, there was \$2,703,002.87 in surplus remaining from previously approved Work Order #56-2022-02. Project Manager (PM) was holding these funds in the event they were needed for future efforts.

USACE has submitted capability in the FY 24 workplan to address shoaling in AIWW Reach 1 Nassau County. While waiting for Federal funds, USACE can start working on leading items such as environmental coordination, permits, data collection, and designing services to produce procurement level plans and specifications.

















Waterway Visitors (Northern Counties)











Agreement for Use of Property Tax Collections to Fund Tangible Personal Property Verification Services

THIS AGREEMENT ("Agreement") is made and entered into as of this _____ day of _____, 2023, by and between the NASSAU COUNTY PROPERTY APPRAISER ("PROPERTY APPRAISER"), NASSAU COUNTY TAX COLLECTOR ("TAX COLLECTOR"), and the undersigned Local Governing Boards of the TAXING AUTHORITIES of NASSAU COUNTY, hereinafter referred to collectively as the "TAXING AUTHORITIES."

WHEREAS, the PROPERTY APPRAISER is responsible under Florida law for the administration of ad valorem property tax verification and for back taxes related to business property tax listings; and

WHEREAS, the TAX COLLECTOR is responsible under Florida law for the collection and distribution of ad valorem property taxes, including back taxes, and associated penalties, fees, and interest; and

WHEREAS, the TAXING AUTHORITIES receive local property tax revenue to fund essential public services; and

WHEREAS, the PROPERTY APPRAISER and TAX COLLECTOR intend to contract with TAX MANAGEMENT ASSOCIATES, INC. ("TMA") for audit verification services to conduct business personal property tax verifications for the purpose of collecting taxes due on those properties, which funds would otherwise be unavailable to the TAXING AUTHORITIES (hereinafter the "TMA Verification Agreement"); and

WHEREAS, TMA shall provide said verification services in exchange for the fee established in the TMA Verification Agreement, which consists of an amount equal to thirty-five percent (35%) of any tax, penalties, and interest collected from back taxes assessed by the PROPERTY APPRAISER on parcels identified through a TMA verification (hereinafter, the "Fee"); and

WHEREAS, the Fee shall be paid exclusively from the taxes, penalties, and interest collected in relation to the business personal property tax verifications resulting from the tax verifications performed by TMA, and shall not constitute a pledge or general obligation of tax funds or create an obligation on the TAXING AUTHORITIES to appropriate or make monies available for the purpose of this Agreement beyond the fiscal year in which the Agreement is executed; and

NOW, THEREFORE, the PROPERTY APPRAISER, TAX COLLECTOR, and undersigned TAXING AUTHORITIES, for and in consideration of the mutual promises, covenants, and conditions herein contained and other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and adequacy of which are hereby acknowledged, agree as follows:

TERMS

- 1. <u>Incorporation of Recitals</u>. The recitals set forth above are hereby incorporated into and deemed a part of this Agreement.
- 2. <u>Authorization of Reduced Collections for Fee Payment:</u> The undersigned TAXING AUTHORITIES authorize the TAX COLLECTOR to deduct two percent (2%) in addition to TMA's Fee, as established in the TMA Verification Agreement, from the total property tax, penalties and interest collected as the result of the business personal property tax verifications pursuant to TMA verifications. The TAX COLLECTOR shall distribute the remaining tax revenue to the undersigned TAXING AUTHORITIES according to governing Florida law.

This Agreement does not constitute a pledge or general obligation of ad valorem taxation or create any obligation on any TAXING AUTHORITY to appropriate or make monies available for any tax year and does not create the right in any party to compel the exercise of the ad valorem taxing power of any TAXING AUTHORITY.

The TAX COLLECTOR shall annually make available to each TAXING AUTHORITY an accounting of all tax proceeds collected pursuant to the TMA Verification Agreement, the Fees paid to TMA, and the total funds distributed to each TAXING AUTHORITY.

3. <u>Term & Termination</u>: This Agreement shall be effective as of the date of execution for an initial term of forty-eight (48) months. Thereafter, the Agreement shall renew automatically on an annual basis until such time as the TMA Verification Agreement is terminated or otherwise expires. Upon termination or expiration of the TMA Verification Agreement, this Agreement automatically expires except for such provisions as survive termination as further agreed herein.

Any TAXING AUTHORITY may opt out of this Agreement provided it notifies the PROPERTY APPRAISER and TAX COLLECTOR in writing at least ninety (90) days before the end of a fiscal year. The option shall be effective upon the first day of the following fiscal year.

Upon termination of this Agreement, Fees for all verifications completed by TMA in affected tax districts up to the date of the notification of termination shall be payable in accordance with the terms provided by the TMA Verification Agreement. Because taxes may not be paid within the term of this Agreement, the authorization of reduced collections for Fee payment shall survive the termination of the Agreement and shall terminate upon the later of the collection and payment of all taxes related to TMA verifications, or the expiration of such taxes as a matter of Florida law.

4. <u>Severability</u>: Should any provision, portion, or application of this Agreement be determined by a court of competent jurisdiction to be illegal, unenforceable, or in conflict with any applicable law or constitutional provision, or should future changes to Florida law conflict with any portion of this Agreement, the parties shall negotiate an equitable adjustment in the affected provisions of this Agreement with a view toward effecting the purpose of this Agreement, and the validity and enforceability of the remaining provisions, portions, or

- applications thereof, shall not be impaired. If a future change to Florida law conflicts with or preempts the entirety of this agreement, the agreement will be immediately terminated, subject to the termination provisions herein.
- 5. <u>Public Records</u>: The parties are public agencies subject to Florida's public records laws, including records retention, production, and confidentiality provisions. The PROPERTY APPRAISER and TAX COLLECTOR agree to retain all records maintained by their agencies and associated with the performance of this Agreement in compliance with applicable Florida records retention schedules, and to make all non-confidential or exempt records available for inspection or copying upon request and in compliance with Florida's public records laws.
- 6. <u>Notice</u>: Any notice required to be given under this Agreement shall be made in writing and sent by first class mail, postage paid, or by hand delivery to, the contact and address for the party as it appears on the signatory page of this Agreement.
- 7. <u>Applicable Law</u>: The terms and conditions of this Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of Florida.
- 8. <u>Sole Benefit</u>: This Agreement is for the sole benefit of the parties hereto, and in no event shall this Agreement be construed to be for the benefit of any third party, nor shall any party be liable for any loss, liability, damages, or expenses to any person not a party to this Agreement.
- 9. <u>Headings</u>: Headings herein are for convenience of reference only and shall not be considered in any interpretation of this Agreement.

SCOPE OF PROFESSIONAL ENGINEERING SERVICES FINAL DESIGN AND BID ADMINISTRATION FOR CROSSROADS EMERGENCY MAINTENANCE DREDGING MARTIN COUNTY, FLORIDA AND

IWW DREDGING IN THE VICINITY OF JUPITER INLET (OPTIONAL) PALM BEACH COUNTY, FLORIDA

INTRODUCTION

This scope of professional engineering services describes Taylor Engineering's effort to support an emergency maintenance dredging project at the Crossroads in Martin County, Florida (Figure 1). Dredged material placement will occur within the St. Lucie Inlet Sediment Impoundment Basin.

This proposal covers permit coordination, final design, bid administration, and construction observation services in support of maintenance dredging of the previously permitted cuts of the OWW and Intracoastal Waterway (IWW) at Martin County Crossroads (Figure 1).

In addition, optional Task 5 covers similar services for the IWW in the vicinity of Jupiter Inlet should FIND determine conditions warrant a project this spring. Traditionally, this work is coordinated with the Jupiter Inlet District's annual sand trap dredging project.

ASSUMPTIONS

Taylor Engineering has developed this scope of services based on the following assumptions:

- Survey data received from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers is sufficient for design level drawings of IWW and OWW in the project area.
- Costs associated with optional Task 5 IWW in the vicinity of Jupiter Inlet assume the project will be performed jointly with the Jupiter Inlet District's Sand Trap Dredging project scheduled for spring 2024.

If any of these assumptions prove incorrect, Taylor Engineering will work with the FIND to develop an appropriate additional scope of services and cost. Finally, this proposal excludes permit fees.

TASK 1 CROSSROADS PERMIT COORDINATION

1.1 Florida Department of Environmental Protection Permit

FIND currently holds FDEP JCP permit 0296970-001-JC for periodic maintenance dredging of the Crossroads channel. Modification No. 0296970-004-JN added the St. Lucie Sediment Impoundment Basin as an optional placement area. Modification No. 0296970-007-JN extended the permit expiration date until January 30, 2027. Taylor Engineering will coordinate with FDEP staff regarding the upcoming project.

1.2 Department of Army Permit

The USACE continues to develop a proposed Regional General Permit (RGP) that would cover multiple FIND IWW dredging projects including Crossroads. Regrettably, progress has been extremely slow. USACE staff have indicated that the RGP will not be issued in time for this project. As such, an alternative permitting approach must be developed.

We will coordinate with USACE to determine the best path forward. This may include pursuing a new DOA permit, identifying and applying an appropriate Nationwide permit, or possibly modifying an existing DOA permit held by others. Due to the uncertainty associated with the best path forward, we have allocated \$20,000 of labor for this pursuit. We will keep FIND staff updated on our expenditure of these funds and coordinate a modification to this task if additional effort is required to acquire a DOA authorization.

TASK 2 CROSSROADS FINAL DESIGN AND BID DOCUMENTS

2.1 Final Design and Construction Drawings

We will prepare final design documents and construction drawings for the various project elements. Construction drawings will provide plan, cross-section, and detail views of the IWW and OWW dredging areas and pertinent details (e.g., pipeline corridor, contractor staging area, etc.) associated with the St. Lucie Inlet Impoundment Basin (SLIIB). We will provide a record set of construction drawings in appropriate hardcopy format and in digital (AutoCAD and PDF) format, as well as record drawings signed and sealed by a Florida Registered Professional Engineer.

2.2 Contract Documents and Technical Specifications

We will update the Division 00 and 01 Contract Documents and prepare all other Technical Specifications for the project. We will follow the Engineers Joint Contract Documents Committee (EJCDC) and Construction Specification Institute (CSI) standards and guidelines to prepare the specifications.

2.3 Bid Package Submittal

We will prepare a bid package (including contract documents, technical specifications, and bid schedule) with estimated quantities for all bid items. To give interested bidders immediate access to the bid package, we will provide an electronic copy of the final drawings and specifications for the FIND to upload onto its FTP site.

2.4 Opinion of Probable Cost

We will prepare and submit an opinion of probable cost for the project.

TASK 3 CROSSROADS BID ASSISTANCE

Taylor Engineering will help the FIND administer the bidding process and select the contractor. We will remain available at our Jacksonville office to clarify and interpret project documents and prepare addenda, if required. We will coordinate and host a pre-bid conference with prospective bidders to answer questions concerning elements of the project for which Taylor Engineering is responsible.

We will review the bids received and provide the FIND with our recommendations for contractor selection. This work includes reviewing the submitted bid documents, checking technical references of the responsive bidders, and preparing and transmitting a written recommendation for contractor selection. Taylor Engineering will limit its review and recommendations to engineering and technical issues. The FIND will take responsibility for legal review and evaluation of contractors' financial condition, business licenses or authorizations, bonding, contractual requirements, and any other non-engineering or non-technical information.

TASK 4 CROSSROADS CONSTRUCTION ADMINISTRATION

We assume the construction period will last 40 calendar days (including mobilization and demobilization) and occur between February and June 2024. We assume the contractor will have responsibility for all required material testing, all construction layout surveys and preparation of as-built drawings of the completed work. Additionally, we assume the construction contractor will have responsibility for water quality monitoring; monitoring of endangered, threatened, and other species of special concern; and all other activities required for compliance with permit conditions. Therefore, our scope of services and respective fees exclude any of these services. We propose to provide the following services:

Task 4a. Pre-Construction Services

This subtask includes the following work:

- Preparing for and conducting a pre-construction meeting;
- Reviewing and approving contractor pre-construction submittals;
- Making recommendation to FIND for issuance of notice to proceed;
- Preparing for and conducting an onsite coordination meeting; and
- Preparing and submitting two agency work commencement notices.

Taylor Engineering staff will attend and conduct the preconstruction conference with the contractor, FIND, and agency representatives. The preconstruction conference will focus on describing the project's permitting requirements and answering the contractor's questions concerning the technical aspects of the work. In addition, we will discuss the "ground rules" and other issues including lines of engineer and contractor authority, contract general and specific conditions, contract administration, progress payment, correspondence procedures, project schedule, submittal register, labor requirements, and general site safety. We will take detailed minutes of the preconstruction conference discussions. We assume that the preconstruction conference will occur at a location specified by FIND. This meeting will occur before the contractor commences with physical construction.

We will also attend and conduct a coordination meeting after the preconstruction conference and before starting physical construction. We will review any updated contractor submittals required before the contractor commences with construction. Updated submittals may include schedule of values, list of subcontractors, signature authority, construction schedule, submittal register, environmental protection plan, quality control plan, and accident prevention plan. The purposes of the meeting include achieving a mutual understanding with the contractor of required quality control; jointly reviewing submitted draft plans and resolving issues of concern; discussing project plans and specifications, schedule and documentation; and establishing a good working relationship between the contractor quality control staff and quality assurance representatives.

Finally, we will prepare and submit two written commencement notices — to the FDEP (as per JCP No. 0296970-001-JC) and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) — that indicate expected construction start and end dates.

Task 4b. Observation during Construction

This task includes the following subtasks:

- Performing up to 12 field visits;
- Submitting weekly summary turbidity monitoring reports to the FDEP;
- Reviewing and approving revised contractor submittals; and

• Reviewing and approving pay applications as necessary.

We will assist FIND with administration of the construction contract from our office in Jacksonville and from the project site. In-office duties will include reviewing the contractor's shop drawings and submittals, reviewing contractor's daily dredge reports, reviewing pay applications, providing oversight of the progress of the work, and assisting with the preparation of change orders, if required. Additionally, we will review the releases of lien, contractor affidavits, and contractor certifications.

We will remain available throughout construction to provide advice and consultation to FIND through site visits and teleconferences. In that role, we will address questions pertaining to engineering, design, permitting issues, and any proposed changes to the project design.

Taylor Engineering's project engineers will also make up to 12 visits to the project site to ascertain whether work is proceeding in general conformance with permit conditions and plans and specifications. Our visits will include detailed observation of the work and monitoring of the contractor's means, methods, and sequences. As a part of the observations, Taylor Engineering will review the contractor's daily construction report, which will become part of the project record. The report indicates the observer, weather conditions, date, personnel/visitors on site, the contractor's manpower (e.g., superintendent, field engineer, and laborers) and equipment (e.g., backhoe, bulldozer, and dredge), daily summary of events, and contractor representative and observer signature. These reports provide a log of construction progress.

During our field visits, we will discuss with the contractor the project progress and address questions pertaining to engineering, design, permitting issues, any proposed changes to the project design, and any conflicts. In addition, we will review changes to the construction schedule, site safety, problem prevention, maintaining contract quality for materials and workmanship, pending modifications, changes and substitutions, and other business, as appropriate. Finally, we will review the contractor's daily dredge reports to ensure reporting/monitoring of dredge's cutterhead or bucket vertical and horizontal positioning.

We will notify FIND should any permit violations, work stoppages, or conflicts occur and provide recommendations to FIND as to how to proceed with the project. However, we will not direct the contractor's means and methods of construction. Taylor Engineering assumes no responsibility for jobsite safety.

Note that we may require additional fees if the project requires additional onsite visits to solve unanticipated problems or if construction goes longer than the assumed 40-day construction period.

Task 4c. Project Close-Out and Certification

This task includes the following subtasks:

- Developing preliminary and final punch lists;
- Certifying the project substantially complete;
- Attending final inspection and closeout meetings;
- Conducting final review/acceptance of field data;
- Certifying final completion of the project; and
- Preparing and submitting FDEP engineer's report

Once FIND receives from the contractor a request to certify the project substantially complete, we will make an observation of the project to determine if the project is, in fact, substantially complete. If it is not, we will develop preliminary and final punch list items for the contractor to complete or correct. With concurrence from FIND, we will transmit this list to the contractor for completion. Upon completion of outlined items, we will certify the project substantially complete.

We will collect and review the following information from the contractor before project closeout.

- Final pay application
- Final contractor certification
- Final as-built survey

We will coordinate and prepare permit-related submittals to the FDEP and USACE after completion of the project. These submittals include

- As-Built Certification by Professional Engineer form and as-built drawings;
- As-built written statement of project completion to the FDEP and as-built drawings if substantial deviations from permitted plans; and
- Engineering report to FDEP (one electronic copy of report and one electronic copy of survey data)
 - o Narrative description of maintenance dredging
 - o Construction period
 - o Plan view map showing actual excavation and placement sites
 - o Pre-dredging bathymetric contours
 - o Post-dredging bathymetric contours
 - o Pre-dredging to post-dredging bathymetric change contours
 - o Pre-dredging to post-dredging volume changes
 - o Discussion of errors associated with surveys
 - o Daily record of dredge cutterhead or bucket vertical and horizontal positions

TASK 5 OPTIONAL – IWW IN THE VICINITY OF JUPITER INLET

If FIND elects to pursue an IWW dredging project in the vicinity of Jupiter Inlet, Taylor Engineering will provide support for the effort. Typically, the Jupiter IWW project is conducted in conjunction with the Jupiter Inlet District's (JID) Sand Trap dredging project. The following assumes FIND and JID will adopt an agreement to advertise for and contract with a dredging contractor jointly.

Task 5a. Jupiter Permit Coordination

Currently, FIND does not hold either a state or federal permit for the Jupiter IWW project. Similar to the successful approach last spring, we assume JID and FIND will agree to pursue modifications to JID's state and federal sand trap permits for a one-time event to clear the IWW channel.

Task 5b. Jupiter Final Design & Bid Documents

Similar to Task 2 above, Taylor Engineering will prepare complete bid documents for the Jupiter IWW dredging project. The package will include specifications and engineering drawings describing the project.

Task 5c. Jupiter Bidding Assistance

Similar to Task 3 above, Taylor Engineering will respond to questions during the bidding phase of the project. We will participate in the bid opening and evaluate all bids received. We will prepare a recommendation for award to the lowest cost responsible and responsive bidder.

Task 5d. Jupiter Construction Administration

Similar to Task 4 above, Taylor Engineering will provide construction administration services including pre-construction, observation during construction, and project closeout phases. We will submit all permit-required documentation to the FDEP and USACE.

ESTIMATED SCHEDULE

We anticipate completing this scope of work within four months from notice to proceed, as shown in the table below.



Monthly Report for the Florida Inland Navigation District

In a last-minute, unexpected turn on government funding, Congress avoided an October shutdown after weeks of intraparty fighting and skepticism. House lawmakers overwhelmingly passed [335-91] a 45-day continuing resolution (CR) that includes \$16 billion in supplemental disaster relief, but omits additional military and economic assistance for Ukraine. The eleventh hour deal ultimately came together after Speaker Kevin McCarthy (R-CA) and his leadership team pulled the plug on its efforts to pass a GOP-only stopgap that would have included a host of conservative policies and spending priorities. Instead, House Republican leadership opted for a bipartisan escape hatch to avoid what was shaping up to be a multi-day or even multi-week shutdown.

Speaker McCarthy's move emboldened Representative Matt Gaetz (R-FL) to today introduce a motion to remove the Speaker from his post. Under House rules, this "privileged resolution" is required to be called up for a vote within two legislative days. However, House leadership can offer up a series of additional procedural votes — including a motion to "table," which will occur during today's session. Additional votes would then be required to elect a new speaker. So, by the time this memo is read, it is quite possible that there will be a new Speaker of the House.

In the meantime, the House is debating the rule to bring the Fiscal Year Energy and Water Appropriations Bill to the floor, which includes the administration's budget request of \$4,054,000 for the Intracoastal Waterway. It also provides funding for Navigation maintenance - \$20 million; Inland Waterways - \$40 million; and Small, Remote, or Subsistence Navigation - \$65 million. These numbers might get considerably smaller during conference negotiations so the House and Senate Appropriations Committees can make room for each chamber's congressionally directed spending priorities. Once final numbers in these categories are set, we can pursue additional maintenance dredging funding in the Corps Work Plan later this year.

Congress has bought itself some time to finish up FY 24 appropriations bills given the CR expires on November 17th, but conference negotiations will not be easy given the bills written by the House and the Senate are so drastically different in funding amounts, with the House pushing for deep spending cuts.

We will continue to keep you up to speed on the appropriations process and the votes pertaining to the Speaker of the House.
