"Beach Friendly Fourth"

The Washington State Parks and Recreation Commission and community partners on Washington's ocean beaches encouraged safe and responsible beach celebrations over the Fourth of July holiday.

In 2016, community partners on the Long Beach Peninsula created a "Beach-Friendly Fourth" campaign to help ensure the safety of people and wildlife and the cleanliness of beach areas and wildlife habitat over the holiday. This year, the campaign has expanded to the beaches north and south of Grays Harbor.




Beach-Friendly Fourth partners in **Long Beach** included the "Not a Ban—a Better Plan" community group, the City of Long Beach, Pacific County Sheriff's Department, Grass Roots Garbage Gang, Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife, Pacific County, the Long Beach Peninsula Visitors Bureau, the Ocean Park Area Chamber of Commerce and Washington State Parks.

South beaches partners included the City of Westport, Grays Harbor County, Surfrider, CoastSavers, Westport/ Grayland Chamber of Commerce and South Beach Regional Fire Authority.

North beaches partners included the City of Ocean Shores, Ocean Shores Fire and Rescue, Grays Harbor County Sheriff's Office, Ocean Shores Police Department, Grays Harbor Fire Districts Seven and Eight and CoastSavers.

State Parks manages 60 miles of ocean beach in the Seashore Conservation Area, partly through ranger staff assigned to state parks along Washington's ocean beaches.



State Parks rangers from across the state patrolled the beaches focusing on public safety concerns and preventing illegal camping, fires, sanitation and garbage. Local public safety and fire departments assisted with this effort to ensure a safe fourth. Thank you to everyone who participated and assisted with the planning process, without your collaboration this event would not have been successful.

Motor homes, campers, and recreational vehicles are used for living and traveling. Each year, fires in them cause deaths, injuries, and millions of dollars in damages. Fires can start in the kitchen. They can start in the engine area. Sometimes the fires are electrical. With a few simple safety tips you can help prevent these fires from happening.

SAFETY TIPS

- Install smoke alarms. Make sure they work.
- Stay in the kitchen while you cook. Keep anything that can catch fire away from the stovetop.
- Only use one heat-producing appliance plugged into a receptacle outlet at a time. Major appliances should be plugged directly into a wall receptacle outlet.
- Refrigerators, furnaces, ovens and stovetops use propane. Check them for leaks. Keep an updated gas leak detector on board.
- Have your propane system inspected to make sure it still works properly.
- Know two ways out. Make sure windows open easily.
- Have everyone practice the home fire escape plan.
- Do not keep camping heaters and lanterns on while sleeping.
- Before setting up a campfire, make sure it is allowed.
- If campfires are allowed, they need to be at least 25 feet away from anything that can burn.
- Have your vehicle serviced by a qualified mechanic.
- Keep a portable fire extinguisher on board. Only adults who know how to operate it should use it.
 Only use it if the fire is small and can be contained.
 Make sure everyone else is leaving. Make sure someone is calling the fire department.



Carhon Monoxide Awareness

Carbon monoxide (CO) is a gas. You cannot see it. You cannot taste it. You cannot smell it. CO poisoning can result from leaks in the exhaust. It can happen because of improper use of appliances. Sometimes CO comes from another vehicle. Make sure you have a working CO alarm.

FACT

When the vehicle is used as a structure, the most common area for these fires to start is the kitchen or cooking area. This is followed by the engine area, running gear, or wheel area. Check for safety inside and outside of the vehicle.
