WORKSHOP AT 5:45 P.M. CLOSED MEETING AT 6:15 P.M. REGULAR MEETING AT 7:00 P.M.

- 1. **Walnut and 9th** Staff has not completed the analysis of traffic data and accident reports. Based on the information, the intersection of Walnut and 9th is not recommended for a fourway stop because it does not meet the warrants under the Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices.
- 2. **Police Department Hiring** The City process has whittled the list from 29 down to 8 that are still in the running to become police officers for the City. Interviews will be conducted by the Fire and Police Commission on May 18th, after which the hiring list will be finalized.
- 3. **Fire Department Hiring** The department is awaiting the results of the psych eval for the top candidate on the current list, who at this point is expected to begin employment during the final week of May. The application period for the development of the new hiring list ended April 16th. 15 applications were received, of which 12 have advanced to the testing phase, which will be conducted on May 15th by the Fire and Police Commission, followed by interviews later this month, after which the list will be formalized.
- 4. **Performance Appraisals** Appraisals for Department Heads will be completed by the end of this week and I am prepared to discuss the methodology behind their pay raises in the upcoming closed session meeting. The performance appraisals provide feedback regarding areas of improvement and recognize accomplishments of the completion of mission essential tasks and identified goals that support the City's operational efforts.
- 5. **Facilities** The City is once again hiring for a part-time employee to provide janitorial services. Mr. Newton expects to have the position filled by the end of next week.
- 6. **Amtrak Meeting** Staff attended an Amtrak meeting virtually last week. Ridership remains low due to a combination of self-imposed limits on train capacity and rider perceptions about the safety of travel in enclosed cars over long periods of time. To mark the 50th anniversary of Amtrak and help get ridership back on track, the service if offering a number of large discounts on fares, including \$50 one-way trips from Chicago to California.

- 7. **Liquor License Renewals** Liquor license renewals have been pouring in. To date, 40 of the 42 licenses have been renewed. This is a strong sign that in this sector, the effects of the pandemic are not as staggering as before.
- 8. **Action Item** It has been determined that the work needed is beyond the scope of the City's routine maintenance. Staff is meeting with the Engineers and IDOT at the site on North Main on Monday morning.
- 9. **Finance Operations** The Finance Director has worked diligently to verify and document the City's compliance with the Grant Accountability and Transparency Act (GATA), which is a requirement to be eligible to receive grant funding. We received notice from the State that we are fully compliant and with the timely completion of this year's audit, we will remain that way. She's in the midst of closing out everything for last year, reconstructing the reconciliation of accounts that either wasn't done or can't be located amongst various flash drives or an external hard drive. Her efforts to fix things are hampered by the fact that finance previously operated in a silo and didn't share information, so the other employees who were shielded from financial information are unable to provide much assistance in where to locate important information. She's increasingly concerned that we will miss something of importance in the budgeting process that will only be discovered after everything is passed. All that said, I see progress and believe we're close to being able to move forward with a workshop and adopting ordinances, knowing that if we find a mistake, we can correct it.
- 10. **Potholes** The new approach to fixing potholes seems to be going smoothly compared to bouncing from one area of town to another in response to complaints from residents. The bad stretch on North Main has been addressed with South Street being another high traffic area that will soon be addressed. You may notice that staff has improved both where their efforts are targeted and how the work is being completed.
- 11. **Phone Install** The new phone system is supposed to be installed on May 20th on a small scale, with staff training scheduled for the following week, followed by the completion of the installation after staff has been trained in how the system works. The new system should lower operating costs and improve the reliability of the system.
- 12. **Labor/Management Relations** Staff has a Labor/Management Relations meeting scheduled with AFSCME for next week. The meetings have been helpful in allowing us to work through certain issues on an informal basis before they became major concerns. Generally, there are no concerns that I'm aware of from the administrative staff that are members of AFSCME, and the Public Works Divisions are making a good transition from their former operations manager to a better working relationship with his replacement.
- 13. **Grievance** The Fire Department filed a grievance with the City regarding a recently announced promotion. The grievance advance to the second stage, which is the City Manager. If the department is unsatisfied with my response, they may choose to take it to the next level, which involves the Mayor and City Council. My response will be provided to them today or Monday, depending on what else I'm able to get completed.

14. **Hydrant Testing**— The Fire Department will begin testing hydrants in the SW quadrant of town within the next two weeks. We will publicize the areas in which we are working through radio, print, and social media, but invariably some people will still be surprised when they see rust tinted water coming from the tap. Testing hydrants invariably stirs up sediment that exists within the line. Because most of the lines in the system are cast iron and are filled with water, that sediment contains a large amount of rust particulates. You may receive calls from individuals concerned about the safety of the water for cooking or consumption or its impact on laundry. This is an aesthetic water quality concern that can be addressed by running cold water through the bathtub faucet to clear the lines in a home. The alternative is having hydrants that don't work when they are needed for fire suppression and higher insurance costs due to worse ISO ratings.

The April 26th Meeting was started with the swearing in of Councilmember Tyrone Baker and Councilmember Steve Faber.

The April 26th, 2021 Council Meeting was called to order at 7:06 PM. All members of the City Council were present in Chambers.

Bills were presented in the amount of \$1,174,689.77.

Councilmember Komnick moved to approve payment of the bills. Councilmember Faber seconded the motion. Discussion: Councilmember Colomer had a question about the clothing allowance on the State Bank of Toulon CC. City Clerk Jones stated those were department heads that had access to City CC and that way they can get the discount on taxes. The motion was approved 5-0.

Public Comments: No Public Comments New Business:

- a) Discussion Only Petition for Annexation and Rezoning: City Manager Gary Bradley started with explanation of the petition and the benefits and the downside. Bradley stated that this is new to him and Raver and they have not done one of these the entire time he has been with the City. The location of this property should not have any adverse effects on the City, Fire District and or Police.
- b) Consideration of an Ordinance #4050 granting a conditional rezoning request to Tom Greiner, for land located at 1109 n Main St. in the City of Kewanee.

 Councilmember Colomer moved to approve. Councilmember Komnick seconded the motion. Discussion: No Discussion Motion passed 5-0
- c) Discussion Only Neponset Agreement: Mayor Moore stated that in years past there has been considerable conversation. After looking at this contract mayor more states he sees no downside. Komnick stated he would like to see it as a 3-year agreement. Currently it is a 1-year contract with extensions. Dave the mayor from Neponset was in attendance and stated a 3-year contract is an option. Chief Shook also stated this was a positive agreement and is open to the 3-year also.
- **d) Discussion Only Noise Ordinance:** Justin Raver stated this ordinance will make his life easier with more defined rule and not opinion in trying these cases and being successful.
- e) Discussion Only TAO Traffic, Animal, Ordinance Officer: Chief Welgat stepped up to explain the position and the need of this officer and who he had in mind for this position. Chief also stated there is a cost savings ion combining

- these 2positioins and already have training certified police officers to do this additional task.
- f) Public Meeting Announcement- Proposed First Amendment to the Kewanee Downtown TIF District. City manager Bradley read the announcement for the public hearing.
- Council Communications:
- Councilmember Komnick started with Francis Park and that they are opened for the season. Encourages residents to take advantage of the park. Historical Society is open this Saturday. The community has plenty of Vaccines please get your vaccine so that we can get back to normalcy.
- Councilmember Faber asked about loose dogs in the park. Chief Welgat stated he has had a conversation with the Park District, and they are coming up with a plan. Faber also asked about the potholes in town and if we have a plan of attack. Newton stepped up top read a statement and a plan that they have put in motion.
- **Councilmember Colomer** started with welcoming Mr. Baker. Once again please heed that there are kids out and walking to school…to the parks. Please pay attention.
- Councilmember Baker thanked all the Council for their warm welcome. Baker stated that he feels there are going to be some great things happening in the City. Baker believes that the team that is assembled they will be able to do great things.
- Mayor's Communications: The State of Illinois is losing one seat in the House of Representatives. Thank you to Gary Bradley on the new Council packet and it is very helpful. Regarding the tanks and holding off till the price comes down in material, Bradley stated that we are in good shape to wait. Bradley stated that the broadband fiber could be reimbursed if we were to move forward with it in town. Mayor Moore asked about the action plan from the 04/12/2021 meeting. Bradley stated that we have handed that over to IMEG to see what can be down and who is responsible. Faber asked how long the time frame would be. Bradley stated that is should not take that long. Congratulations on both Football teams in town. They had outstanding seasons.

The Plan Commission did not vote to revoke the Special Use Permit at that time and requested that staff write a new noise control ordinance to better suit the needs of the City. **SPECIAL NOTES** The proposed ordinance defines an "entertainment area" and acceptable sound levels within that area. Outside of that area, the ordinance better defines parameters for when a complaint may be signed. **ANALYSIS** The ordinance was placed on the agenda for the April 22, 2021 Plan Commission Meeting.

ORDINANCE #4051

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTION 132.040 DISTURBING THE PEACE AND NOISE CONTROL ESTABLISHED IN THE CITY OF KEWANEE CODE OF ORDINANCES, AND DECLARING THAT THIS ORDINANCE IS IN FULL FORCE AS PROVIDED BY LAW.

- **WHEREAS**, The City of Kewanee has previously established section 132.04 Disturbing the Peace; and
- **WHEREAS**, The City Council has found that the current ordinance fails to meet the needs of the City of Kewanee; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KEWANEE, ILLINOIS, IN COUNCIL ASSEMBLED, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1 The City Council hereby amends Chapter 132.04 of the City Code by inserting text shown as **underlined** and omitting text shown as **strikethrough** as follows:

§ 132.04 DISTURBING THE PEACE AND NOISE CONTROL

- It shall be unlawful for any person to disturb the peace by quarreling or scolding, or making an unusual noise or disturbance, or to engage in violent, tumultuous, offensive or disorderly conduct or use profane, vulgar or unseemly language to the annoyance, vexation, or disturbance of another. Any person violating the provisions hereof shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor.
 - (A) Short title. This section may be known and cited as the "City of Kewanee Disturbing The Peace And Noise Control Ordinance."
 - (B) Findings and purpose.
 - (1) The Kewanee City Council finds that unreasonably excessive noise degrades the environment of the City to a degree that such noise:
 - (a) Is harmful to the health, safety, and welfare of City residents and visitors;
 - (b) Interferes with the comfortable enjoyment of life and property;
 - (c) Interferes with the well-being, tranquility, and privacy of one's home; and
 - (d) Can cause and aggravate health problems.
 - (2) The effective control of unreasonably excessive noise is essential to the health, safety, and welfare of City residents and visitors, and fosters the comfortable enjoyment of life, including, but not limited to, recreation, work, communication, and rest.
 - (3) This section is enacted to protect, preserve, and promote the health, safety, welfare, peace, and quiet of residents and visitors of the City of Kewanee through the control, reduction, and prevention of unreasonably excessive noises that unreasonably disturb, injure, or endanger the comfort, repose, health, peace, or safety of reasonable persons of ordinary sensitivities.

- (4) Nothing contained in this section is intended to infringe upon the constitutionally protected rights guaranteed by the Illinois Constitution and the First Amendment of the United States Constitution. This section enacts narrowly drawn, content-neutral regulations that are to be interpreted so as to not unduly restrict constitutionally protected rights.
- (C) Definitions. For the purpose of this section, the following definitions shall apply unless the context clearly indicates or requires a different meaning:
- <u>AMPLIFIED</u> sound means sound whose volume is increased by any electric, electronic, mechanical, or motor-powered means.
- <u>A-WEIGHTED SOUND LEVEL</u> means the sound pressure level in decibels as measured with a sound level meter using the A-weighting network as described in ANSI S1.4-1983 issued by the American National Standards Institute. The unit of measurement is the dBA.
- <u>C-WEIGHTED SOUND LEVEL</u> means the sound pressure level in decibels as measured with a sound level meter using the C-weighting network as described in ANSI S1.4-1983 issued by the American National Standards Institute. The unit of measurement is the dBC.
- **DECIBEL** (dB) means a unit for measuring the amplitude of sound, equal to 20 times the logarithm to the base 10 of the ratio of the pressure of the sound measured to the reference pressure, which is 20 micropascals (20 micronewtons per square meter).
- <u>EMERGENCY</u> means any occurrence, or set of circumstances, involving actual, threatened, or imminent physical trauma or injury, natural resource damage, or property damage which demands immediate action.
- <u>Leq(EQUIVALENT SOUND PRESSURE LEVEL)</u> means the constant sound level that, in a given situation and time period, conveys the same sound energy as the actual time-varying sound.
- <u>OFFICER</u> means any designated employee or agent of the City of Kewanee whose duty it is to enforce codes and ordinances enacted by the city and may include, but shall not be limited to, law enforcement officers and code enforcement officers.
- **PERSON(S)** means, but is not limited to, any individual, natural person, firm, partnership, joint venture, syndicate or other group, association, corporation, estate, trust, business trust, trustee, executor, administrator, receiver, or other fiduciary, or any other entity whatsoever, or any combination of such, jointly and severally.
- PERSON(S) RESPONSIBLE means, but is not limited to, any person who has any manner of control over a property, premises, dwelling, structure, location, business, vehicle, device, stereo, or source of sound and may include, but is not limited to, any property owner, tenant, subtenant, business owner, resident, operator or person having operational control, person(s) creating or controlling the volume of sound, manager of a commercial property, or person(s) in charge or otherwise authorized to make decisions regarding the use of sound equipment, or any combination of such, jointly and severally.
- **PLAINLY AUDIBLE** means any sound that can be clearly heard by a reasonable person using such person's ordinary auditory senses, so long as the person's hearing is not enhanced by any device, such as a hearing aid. The person need not determine the particular words or phrases being produced or the name of any song or artist producing the sound for the sound to be

considered plainly audible. The detection of a rhythmic bass reverberating type sound is sufficient to constitute a plainly audible sound.

PROPERTY means any private property, public property, or public right-of-way and includes the air space above.

PROPERTY LINE means either (i) an imaginary line along the ground surface, and its vertical plane extension, which separates the real property owned, rented, or leased by a person(s) or entity from that real property owned, rented or leased by another person(s) or entity, or (ii) the vertical and horizontal boundaries of a residential dwelling unit that is contained in a building containing two or more residential units or any combination of separately leased or owned spaces.

RECEIVING PROPERTY means at or within the property line which is receiving sound from another property, but does not include public rights-of-way.

SOUND LEVEL means a sound pressure level obtained using a signal to which standard weighting has been applied.

- (D) Prohibition of unreasonably excessive noise from a property—Entertainment area. It shall be unlawful for any person(s), including the property owner(s), to permit, cause, allow, create, emit, or sustain unreasonably excessive noise from a property, including air space thereof, located in the City of Kewanee and within the below described Entertainment area.
 - (1) For purposes of this Subsection (D), the following additional definitions apply: **ENTERTAINMENT AREA** mean any property located in:
 - (a) The area bounded on the north by the southern boundary to the BNSF railroad right of way, on the east by the east side of Burr Boulevard, on the west by Park Street, and on the south by the north side of Central Boulevard.

<u>UNREASONABLY EXCESSIVE NOISE FROM A PROPERTY</u> means sound from any property within the Entertainment area, which meets or exceeds the following maximum sound levels:

- (a) Seventy-five (90) dBA or seventy-seven (92) dBC between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 11:00 p.m., Sundays through Thursdays, or 7:00 a.m. and 12 midnight, Fridays and Saturdays.
- (b) Sixty-five (75) dBA or Sixty-seven (77) dBC between the hours of 11:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m., at all other times and days except as expressly provided for in Subsection (D)(1)(a)
- (2) Determining dBA or dBC under this Subsection (d). In determining the dBA or dBC sound level under this subsection, a measurement shall be taken from the property line of the property generating the sound, or from the individual lease boundary of the property generating the sound in the case of property which has been subdivided by the execution of individual leases. The equivalent (L_{eq}) decibel measurement taken at thirty (30) seconds shall not exceed the maximum sound levels set above.
- (3) Sound level measurement standards. All sound level meters used to enforce the provisions of this Subsection (D) shall be calibrated and serviced in accordance with the

- manufacturer's instructions. All sound level meters used to enforce the provisions of this Subsection (D) shall be operated in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions.
- (E) Prohibition of unreasonably excessive noise from a property—All other areas. It shall be unlawful for any person(s), including the property owner(s), to permit, cause, allow, create, emit, or sustain unreasonably excessive noise from a property, including air space thereof, located in the City of Kewanee and not within the Entertainment area described in Subsection (D) above.
 - (1) For purposes of this Subsection (E), the following additional definitions apply:
 - <u>UNREASONABLY EXCESSIVE NOISE FROM A PROPERTY</u> means sound from any property not located within the Entertainment area described in Subsection (D) above, which is unreasonably loud and raucous as defined below.
 - <u>UNREASONABLY LOUD AND RAUCOUS</u> means any sound that, because of its volume level or duration, jars, injures, or endangers the health, safety, welfare, or wellbeing of a reasonable individual of ordinary sensibilities.
 - (2) Violation at any time. An officer may issue a civil citation or notice of violation for unreasonably excessive noise from a property if the officer has probable cause to believe the noise is unreasonably loud and raucous after considering the following:
 - (a) Whether the sound is plainly audible within a fully enclosed structure or residence located on the property of a person making a complaint;
 - (b) Whether the sound is causing vibration, rattles, thumping, or pulsating within a fully enclosed structure or residence located on the property of a person making a complaint;
 - (c) Whether the duration of the sound jars, injures, or endangers the health, safety, welfare, or wellbeing of a reasonable individual of ordinary sensibilities; and
 - (d) Whether the sound is recurrent, intermittent, or continuous in a manner that jars, injures, or endangers the health, safety, welfare, or wellbeing of a reasonable individual of ordinary sensibilities.
 - (3) Violation based upon sworn complaint. An officer may issue a civil citation or notice of violation upon receiving a sworn complaint from a person for unreasonably excessive noise from a property, if the officer has probable cause to believe the noise is unreasonably loud and raucous based on the sworn complaint and after considering any of the following:
 - (a) The time of day a complaint about unreasonably excessive noise occurs;
 - (b) The duration of the sound;
 - (c) The number and history of relevant complaints from the same residence or structure;
 - (d) The distance from the source of the sound;
 - (e) The number of person(s) affected by the sound;
 - (f) The proximity of the sound to residential sleeping facilities;

- (g) The ability of a witness to hear the sound and testify about the complaint;
- (h) The corroboration by sworn statement(s) of witness(es) to the sound other than, and in addition to, the primary affiant;
- (i) The availability of audio/video recording of the sound;
- (j) The totality of circumstances, including the factors delineated in Subsection (E)(2)(a)-(d); and
- (k) Whether the sound is a listed exemption pursuant to Subsection (G) below.
- (4) Prima facie evidence. For the purposes of this Subsection (E), the following shall constitute prima facie evidence that a sound (whether recurrent, intermittent, or continuous) is unreasonably loud and raucous if:
 - (a) Between the hours of 11:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m., the sound is plainly audible a minimum of one hundred (100) feet from the property line of the source of the sound at or within a fully enclosed structure or residence on any receiving property; or
 - (b) The sound meets or exceeds seventy-three (73) dBA or seventy-five (75) dBC between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 11:00 p.m., or sixty-five (65) dBA or sixty-seven (67) dBC between the hours of 11:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m. Sound level measurements shall be obtained in accordance with the provisions of Subsections (D)(2) and (D)(3).
- (G) Exemptions. The provisions of this section shall not apply to:
 - (1) The operation of warning or emergency signal devices such as sirens, horns, alarms, and bells, including those generated from railroad crossings and trains as required by law, when utilized for their intended purpose or in cases of emergency.
- (2) Sounds resulting from equipment or operations incidental to the installation, maintenance, or repair of facilities or restoration of services, such as public utilities work or other emergency work in the public interest.
- (3) The operation of equipment or conduction of activities common to residential or agricultural communities, including, but not limited to, lawn care; soil cultivation; lawn mowers; maintenance of trees, shrubs, hedges, and gardens; tree trimming; limb chipping; domestic power tools; saws and tractors; street sweepers; mosquito fogging; and other community operations, between the hours of 7:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m.
- (4) The operation of equipment or conduction of activities for city approved refuse and recyclable waste collection, between the hours of 6:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m.
- (5) Construction activities between 7:00 a.m. and 9:00 p.m., for which building permits have been issued, or for construction activities not requiring permits due to the scope of work or ownership of the project by a governmental agency; provided all equipment is operated in accordance with the manufacturer's specifications and with all standard equipment, manufacturer's mufflers, and noise-reducing equipment in use and in good operating condition.
- (6) Sounds emanating from bona fide farm operations on land classified as agricultural land, which is exempt from local regulation.
- (7) Residential air conditioners and residential swimming pool equipment.

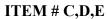
- (8) Sounds made by dogs, birds, and other animals, which are regulated by Chapter 91 of the Kewanee City Code.
- (9) Activities in the fields, grounds, or facilities of any schools, sporting arena, stadium, or sports complex to which the public or community has access.
- (10) Sounds generated from any event, when a permit has been obtained from the City of Kewanee prior to such event, and such sounds are in compliance with any conditions imposed by that permit. This provision shall include, but not be limited to, any parade, road festival, fireworks displays, or special event.
- (11) Sounds generated from Manufacturing Districts as shall be enforced pursuant to §155.070(E) & §155.071(E)
- (H) Waivers. The City Council may vote to temporarily suspend or modify any and all of the prohibitions contained in this Section §132.040 when it finds that emergency circumstances, including, but not limited to those resulting from natural disaster(s), exist or when a permit has been granted for a special event pursuant to Subsection (G)(11) herein.
- (I) Enforcement and penalties. The authority to enforce the provisions of this section shall be vested in the Kewanee Police Department. Nothing in this section shall prohibit the Police Department from charging persons responsible for acts, which affect the peace and quiet of other persons, for breach of the peace or disorderly conduct under §132.01, as may be amended from time to time. This section shall be enforced by an officer as follows:
 - (1) Any person(s) responsible for a violation of Subsections (D) or (E) herein may be given a citation of unreasonably excessive noise.
 - (2) Any person(s), including the property owner(s), who violates any of the provisions of this section shall be subject to a penalty in the amount of \$150.00 for a first violation, and \$500.00 for any subsequent violation occurring within one (1) year after a finding of violation of the previous offense or a plea of no contest or guilty. Each violation of this section shall constitute a separate and distinct offense for which a civil citation or notice of violation may be issued.
 - (3) Joint and several responsibility. Any person(s) responsible for unreasonably excessive noise from a property or from a vehicle, as defined herein, may be liable for the violation under this section. More than one person may be found to be responsible for the violation.
 - (4) Unreasonably excessive noise is declared a public nuisance. The prosecution of an offense under this section does not limit the City's right to abate the public nuisance, or from seeking injunctive relief, by any means provided by law. The City Attorney or designee(s) may bring suit on behalf of the City against the person(s) responsible for causing, maintaining, permitting, or allowing a public nuisance under this section. This section shall not prohibit or otherwise restrict any person(s) from bringing suit against a public nuisance for unreasonably excessive noise.

Harkness said he would do whatever is required (and has) but he pointed out that every other municipality he has done business with does not have the special use permit requirement as long as the property has proper zoning established. **SPECIAL NOTES** N/A





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ANALYSIS	Based off of the conversation with Harkness, I sent an email out to poll on comparable municipalities. I received 4 responses back from my email (Peru, Sterling, Canton & Lincoln). None of the 4 that responded require a Special Use Permit as long as the property location exists within a zoning district that allows a bar or establishment that would normally serve or sell liquor.
	With consideration to make things simpler and more business friendly, staff would like to recommend that this requirement is removed.

ANALYSIS	Operations within the Fire Department have not been affected in a detrimental manor by extending ambulance coverage to NFPD. The contract for service has brought in \$55,000 combined over the previous two years in direct revenues. Patient billing is also conducted as it is done within the City for additional revenues. Revenues for patient billing are added collectively into the total revenues for ambulance billing (budget line, General Fund Revenues – Fire 01-22-372.1) and are not separated out by district. FY2021 revenues have been \$592,793.00 which is an increase of \$94,000 over FY2020. Some, but not all of this increase in revenue can be attributed to the COVID-19 pandemic and increased call volumes. Patient billing collection rates within the NFPD appear to be comparable to collection rates within the Kewanee District. Average call volume to the NFPD district has been 36 calls annually. As written in the original contract, if approved, this years' service would be for \$29,500 which has already been accounted for in FY 2022 budget revenues. The rate contained on the original contract for FY2023 would be \$31,000. During a meeting between the City Manager Bradley, Chief Shook, and representatives of NFPD held on May 5 th , 2021 at City Hall pricing for the third year of the contract was one of the topics discussed. If the contract is approved by council the rate for FY2024 was agreed upon to at \$33,000. Following research into the costs of providing the service these amounts cover the current City's costs and estimated future increased costs over the life of the three-year contract.

PARAMEDIC AMBULANCE SERVICE AGREEMENT

THIS PARAMEDIC AMBULANCE SERVICE AGREEMENT ("Agreement") is made as of _______, 2019 (the "Effective Date") between **NEPONSET FIRE DEPARTMENT** an Illinois political subdivision, located at 103 West Commercial Street, Neponset, Illinois 41345 ("Neponset") and **CITY OF KEWANEE**, an Illinois Municipal Corporation, having its principal place of business at 401 E Third Street, Kewanee IL 61443 ("EMS Provider") ("Kewanee EMS") and each may be referred to as a "Party" or collectively as the "Parties".

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the City is a municipal corporation engaged in the business of municipal operations, including providing ambulance and paramedic level emergency medical services licensed by the Illinois Department of Public Health ("IDPH") and is authorized to provide service in the service area through a state-designated Medical Control Authority.

WHEREAS, the Parties agree that the availability of ambulance and paramedic level emergency medical services is a continuing necessity for the residents of the Village of Neponset and surrounding areas.

WHEREAS, the Parties agree that Neponset has difficulty providing such services as are contemplated within this agreement to the Village of Neponset and surrounding areas; and

WHEREAS, Neponset Fire Department may, pursuant to state statutes, enter into contracts for the provision of such ambulance and paramedic services to its residents and the City of Kewanee may, pursuant to the same statutes, contract to provide such services; and

WHEREAS, Neponset wishes to utilize Kewanee EMS to provide these services to Neponset and its service area and wishes to contract with EMS Provider under the terms and conditions of this Agreement.

AGREEMENT

In consideration of these facts and the mutual covenants of the parties under this Agreement, the Parties agree as follows:

- 1. <u>TERM</u>. The initial term of this Agreement (the "Initial Term") shall be for a period of one (1) year, commencing on the Effective Date. Following the Initial Term, this Agreement may be renewed for three (3) successive one (1) year terms upon the mutual agreement of both parties ("Renewal Terms") (collectively, the Initial Term and any Renewal Terms shall be referred to as the "Term"). Either Party may terminate this Agreement during the Term consistent with the terms of Section 21 of this Agreement.
- **EXEMANEE EMS SERVICES AND RESPONSIBILITIES.** Kewanee EMS shall be a designated provider of ambulance and paramedic level emergency medical response services, which are licensed by the state of Illinois, within the boundaries of the Neponset Fire Department service area. In the interest of protecting the public health and welfare of its residents and to

provide for orderly and uniform emergency medical services to its residents, Neponset will require that any EMS Provider must be licensed to provide the services contemplated in this agreement. The Services in the Service Area shall include and be in compliance with the following:

- A. Kewanee EMS agrees to adhere to and be compliant with its adopted and approved System Protocols, Policies and Procedures as approved by the appropriate Medical Control Facility.
- B. Kewanee EMS will meet all federal, state and local licensing requirements necessary to operate as an Emergency Medical Service Provider.
- C. The Services shall be performed by licensed, qualified crews. Each crew at a minimum shall consist of one (1) paramedic and one (1) emergency medical technician ("EMT") per ambulance. Kewanee EMS shall utilize mutual aid for and from adjoining areas when it deems appropriate. Kewanee EMS may adjust staffing levels to reflect any increase or decrease in patient transport volume.
- D. Kewanee EMS shall be responsible to maintain its equipment and vehicles in a condition sufficient to perform the Services and in keeping with generally accepted practices and standards for the maintenance of such emergency vehicles.
- E. Kewanee EMS will maintain a comprehensive communications system that is fully integrated with Bureau/Stark 911 Public Safety Answering Points (the "PSAPs"). To the extent possible, Kewanee EMS will ensure its units have the capability to communicate with the PSAP as well as police, fire, and rescue units operating within Bureau/Stark County. In addition to communication equipment in the ambulance vehicles, Kewanee EMS shall also equip the paramedic/ambulance crews with portable radios for use when they are not in the vehicle.
- M. Kewanee EMS will maintain adequate and appropriate liability insurance of the types and limits as it deems appropriate.
- **3. RECOGNITION OF KEWANEE EMS AUTHORITY**. Subject to the terms of this Agreement, Neponset agrees that Kewanee EMS has the discretion to define the manner in which it performs the Services, including without limitation, each of the following:
 - A. Determining the identity of its personnel who will perform the Services. In particular, Neponset recognizes that Kewanee EMS is under no obligation of any kind to interview or employ any Neponset Fire Department personnel to become Kewanee EMS employees.
 - B. Setting the terms and conditions of employment for all Kewanee EMS personnel who perform the Services.
 - C. Applying Kewanee EMS service policies or procedures with respect to the manner in which Kewanee EMS will provide the Services.

- D. Exercising discretion with respect to the manner in which Kewanee EMS conducts its business operations in the Service Area.
- **4. KEWANEE EMS REPORTING REQUIREMENTS**. Kewanee EMS will submit reports to Neponset quarterly, or at other intervals as mutually agreed to, which shall include, at a minimum, the following data and information:
 - A. Number of calls.
 - B. Response priority.
 - C. Transport priority.
 - D. Response Times.

5. NEPONSET RESPONSIBILITIES.

Neponset shall be responsible for the following:

- A. To the extent permissible by law, Neponset shall direct its PSAP to notify Kewanee EMS in a mutually agreed upon manner for all medical calls that the applicable PSAP receives at its 911 Dispatch Center requesting the Services within Neponset's service area.
- B. To the extent possible, Neponset will utilize available resources to provide Kewanee EMS with detailed maps for all Kewanee EMS personnel performing services under this Agreement.
- C. Assist Kewanee EMS as directed in the preparation of patients for transports from fire scenes, vehicular accidents, or other incidents to which Neponset personnel have responded in accordance with their duties as volunteer firemen.
- 6. <u>COMPENSATION AND FEES</u>. The Parties mutually agree that the rates and charges for the Services and the collections of the amount due from the recipients of the Services shall be the sole responsibility of Kewanee EMS. Within thirty (30) days of the Effective Date, Kewanee EMS agrees to provide Neponset with any updated list of rates assessed by Kewanee EMS. (Rates as of the Effective Date of this agreement are listed on the attached <u>Addendum B.</u>) Kewanee EMS may bill additionally for specific events or larger scale responses that are beyond the scope of normal day to day activities and services. In light of the costs to Kewanee EMS to perform the Services against the anticipated revenues to Kewanee EMS from collections, Neponset agrees to pay Kewanee EMS the Annual Service Retention Payment consistent with Addendum A.
- 7. **BILLING**. Kewanee EMS shall bill individuals for the Services consistent with:
 - A. All applicable legal standards;

- B. Health plans under which individuals are provided covered benefits which include ambulance and paramedic services; and
- C. The rate schedule set forth in <u>Addendum B</u> and as amended in the future and routinely kept on file at Kewanee EMS.

8. RECORD KEEPING AND ACCESS TO RECORDS.

- A. Kewanee EMS shall keep complete accurate books and records regarding its business operations in the Service Area including, without limitation, the Services rendered and charges made and collected, in accordance with generally accepted accounting practices.
- B. All books and records covered by this Section shall be maintained for a period of not less than six (6) years from the date in which they were originally completed.
- C. Kewanee EMS shall also maintain all records as required by (1) any state laws, rules or regulations applicable to ambulance service providers, (2) sources of funding of the Services under this Agreement or (3) health plans or insurers that Kewanee EMS may bill for the Services.
- **9.** <u>MEETINGS</u>. The Parties shall maintain ongoing communications and meetings as mutually agreed upon to ensure open communication as it relates to this Agreement. Kewanee EMS and Neponset shall have the right to mutually agree from time to time to either increase or decrease the amount and content of information to be reviewed at meetings.

Kewanee EMS shall use safety devices which are approved by the Illinois Occupational Safety and Health Administration of the Illinois Department of Licensing and Regulatory Affairs. Kewanee EMS shall comply with all of the current laws, rules and regulations of the Illinois Occupational Health and Safety Act.

11. COMPLIANCE WITH LAWS, RULES, REGULATIONS, LICENSING AND

<u>CERTIFICATION REQUIREMENTS</u>. Kewanee EMS shall render the Services in material compliance with all applicable federal, state and local laws, ordinances, codes, rules and regulations and it, its employees, and its subcontractors shall meet all federal, state and local license, certification and authorization requirements for the Services.

- **12.** <u>NONDISCRIMINATION</u>. Kewanee EMS shall adhere to all applicable federal, state and local laws, ordinances, rules and regulations prohibiting discrimination including, but not limited to, the following:
 - A. The Elliott-Larsen Civil Rights Act, 1976 PA 453, as amended.
 - B. The Persons with Disabilities Civil Rights Act, 1976 PA 220, as amended.

- C. Section 504 of the Federal Rehabilitation Act of 1973, P.L. 93-112, 87 Stat 355, as amended, and regulations promulgated there under.
- D. The Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990, P.L. 101-336, 104 Stat 327 (42 USCA §12101 et seq.), as amended, and regulations promulgated there under.

Breach of this Section shall be regarded as a material breach of this Agreement.

- **13. <u>INDEMNIFICATION AND HOLD HARMLESS</u>**. Each Party shall, at its own expense, protect, defend, indemnify and hold harmless the other Party, and its elected and appointed officers, employees and agents from all claims, damages, costs, lawsuits and expenses, including, but not limited to, all costs from administrative proceedings, court costs and attorney fees that they may incur as a result of any criminal acts, intentional torts, acts or omissions which by statute create strict liability, negligent acts or omissions of Kewanee EMS or any of its officers, employees or agents which may arise out of this Agreement and in connection with the Services.
- **14.** <u>INSURANCE</u>. Kewanee EMS shall not be required to purchase or maintain additional insurance beyond what it currently carries.

15. WAIVERS.

- A. No failure or delay on the part of either of the Parties to this Agreement in exercising any right, power or privilege hereunder shall operate as a waiver thereof, nor shall a single or partial exercise of any right, power or privilege preclude any other or further exercise of any other right, power or privilege.
- B. In no event shall the making by Neponset of any payment due to Kewanee EMS constitute or be construed as a waiver by Neponset of any breach of a provision of this Agreement, or any default which may then exist, and the making of any such payment by Neponset while any such breach or default shall exist, shall in no way impair or prejudice any right or remedy available to Kewanee EMS in respect to such breach or default.
- C. In no event shall the continuation of the Services by Kewanee EMS constitute or be construed as a waiver by Kewanee EMS of any breach of provision of this Agreement, or any default which may then exist, on the part of Neponset Fire Department.
- **16.** <u>AMENDMENT OR MODIFICATION</u>. All modifications, amendments or waivers of any provisions of this Agreement or the Services, shall be made only by the written mutual consent of the Parties.
- 17. <u>ASSIGNMENT OR SUBCONTRACTING</u>. Kewanee EMS shall not assign, subcontract or otherwise transfer its duties and/or obligations under this Agreement, without the prior written consent of Neponset.

- **18.** <u>APPLICABLE LAW AND VENUE</u>. This Agreement shall be construed according to the laws of the State of Illinois. In the event any actions arising under this Agreement are brought by or against Neponset Fire Department, the Department and Kewanee EMS acknowledge and agree that the venue for such actions shall be established in accordance with the statutes of the State of Illinois.
- 19. <u>DISREGARDING TITLES</u>. The titles of the Sections set forth in this Agreement are inserted for the convenience of reference only and shall be disregarded when construing or interpreting any of the provisions of this Agreement.
- **20.** <u>COMPLETE AGREEMENT</u>. This Agreement and the attached Addendums to which it refers contain all the terms and conditions agreed upon by the Parties, and no other agreements, oral or otherwise, regarding the subject matter of this Agreement or any part thereof shall have any validity or bind any of the Parties.
- **21. TERMINATION**. Notwithstanding any other provision in this Agreement to the contrary, this Agreement and the Services may be terminated prior to the end of the Term by any of the following means:
 - A. By mutual consent of the Parties through an amendment to this Agreement signed by the authorized representatives of both parties.
 - B. By either Party on ninety (90) days prior written notice to the other Party.
 - C. By either Party in the event of a default, as defined in Section 22 and elsewhere in this Agreement, if the defaulting Party fails to cure the default within thirty (30) days after receiving notice of default from the other Party.
- **22.** <u>**DEFAULT**</u>. In addition to other grounds for breach or default explicitly referenced elsewhere in this Agreement, default can also occur as a result of failure to obtain and or maintain licensing as required in this Agreement.
- 23. <u>SEVERABILITY</u>. If any clause or provision of this Agreement is rendered invalid or unenforceable because of any State or Federal statute or regulation or ruling by any tribunal of competent jurisdiction, that clause or provision shall be null and void, and any such invalidity or unenforceability shall not affect the validity or enforceability of the remainder of this Agreement. Where the deletion of the invalid or unenforceable provision would result in the illegality and/or unenforceability of this Agreement, this Agreement shall be considered to have terminated as of the date in which the provision was rendered invalid or unenforceable.
- 24. NOTICE. All notices and other communications provided for in this Agreement shall be in writing and shall be deemed to have been given (i) when delivered in person to the recipient, (ii) 48 hours after deposit in the United States Mail, by certified mail, postage prepaid, addressed to the party at its address set forth above or at another address as the party shall designate by providing notice under this Section; (iii) when Federal Express or comparable express delivery services delivers the notice to the recipient; (iv) when the recipient receives

the notice by electronic mail to the correct electronic mail address of the recipient, as confirmed in electronic notice to the sender. Notices will be directed to the Chief of each party.

- **25.** <u>RELATIONSHIP OF PARTIES</u>. Nothing in this Agreement shall constitute, be construed to be, or create a partnership, joint venture, or lease between Kewanee EMS and Neponset. Kewanee EMS and Neponset Fire Department are independent parties under this Agreement.
- **26.** THIRD PARTIES. This Agreement is for the benefit of the parties, their successors and assigns, and is not for the benefit of any third party.
- **27.** <u>AMBIGUITIES</u>. Any term of this Agreement which is found to be ambiguous shall not be construed against either party on the basis of authorship or otherwise.
- **28.** <u>IMPACT BARGAINING</u>. Both parties agree to engage in impact bargaining if market conditions for supplies or commodities significantly affect the City of Kewanee's cost in providing services under this agreement. Such bargaining may result in an increase of fees or the implementation of a short-term surcharge.
- **29.** <u>CERTIFICATION OF AUTHORITY TO SIGN AGREEMENT</u>. The persons signing on behalf of the Parties to this Agreement certify by their signatures that they are duly authorized to sign this Agreement on behalf of said Parties and that this Agreement has been authorized by said Parties.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the authorized representatives of the Parties have fully signed and entered into this Agreement on the day and year first above written.

This represents a total cost to the City of \$9,618.84 to perform the service based on 36 calls.

Cost comparison by call for coverage to Kewanee.

It has been stated in previous council meetings by a former councilperson that the fire department budget is 50% for EMS service. FY2022 total budget is currently set at \$2,222,832. If 50% of this is our expense to provide ALS ambulance service to our customers, then our EMS budget is roughly \$1,111,416.

Subtracting the calls to NFPD the City would average approximately 2000 EMS calls annually.

\$1,111,416 / 2000calls = \$555.71 per call. The price per call figured out for Neponset sits at \$819.44 per call as shown above.

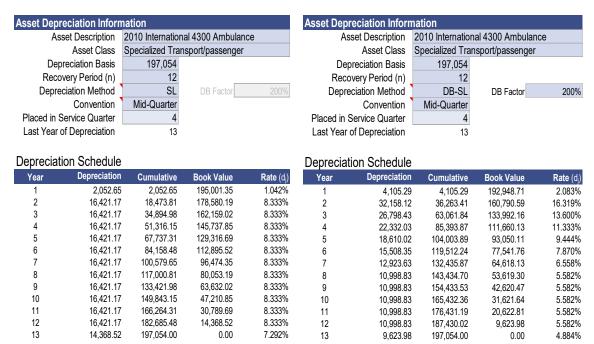

Cost per ambulance call analysis to calls in NFPD:

Kewanee has an average of 2035 ambulance calls averaged over the last four years of data. This number includes responses to NFPD.

Vehicle depreciation-IRS publication 946 "How to Depreciate Property" was researched on determining annual depreciation amounts. There are a few different ways to determine depreciation rates on vehicles using the MARCS (Modified Accelerated Cost Recovery System). The method I have used to figure a more stabilized rate of depreciation is the Straight Line Method (shown in the left frame below). One other way is the Declining Balance transitioning to Straight Line method as shown in the right frame. This is likely a more accurate way to show the financial worth of a vehicle but it is impossible to get a standardized figure of depreciation to configure a contract cost because it is weighted front heavy on the depreciation cycle. The price Byron Fd originally purchased the vehicles for was \$197,054 each in 2010 (price furnished by Foster Coach who the units were purchased through). Our purchase price in 2016 was \$65,000 total for two ambulances. 65,000/2= 32,500 each. A 12-year service life was used in figuring the depreciation model. This could be extended out to a 15 year life span if we figured 5 years in the first out slot and then 5 years in each of the second and third slots where they would have less use. National average for ambulances is 10 years depending on hourly utilization models.



Taking an annual depreciation of \$16,421.17 divided by the number of calls for a 4-year average of 2035 = **\$8.07** depreciation per call. Replacement of the current vehicles with new ambulances would run \$198,000 each based on the last spec data received.

Fuel Costs – Our ambulances average 9 miles to the gallon. This varies greatly depending on the time of year and amount of idling each unit does. This year the bid for diesel came in with a cost per gallon of \$1.85 based off the midpoint of summer and winter blends. Average mileage for Neponset FPD calls

was based off travel from Kewanee Station 1 to Neponset grade school (7.8 Miles) and then to St Luke's Emergency room in Kewanee (11.5 Miles) and back to station 1 (3.2 Miles) for an average of 22.5 miles per call. 22.5 / 9 miles per gallon = 2.5 gallons of diesel per call. $2.5 \times 1.85 = 4.63$ fuel cost per call. This figure is down by \$0.97 per call over the original contract year.

Tire replacement costs – According to Vic, our city mechanic, we can expect tires on the front of the ambulances to need changing every 18 months, with the back tires lasting 24 months on average. Each tire costs \$262.50. 2035 Avg. annual calls / 12 = 169.58 calls per month x 18 months = 3052 calls. 2 tires x \$262.50 = \$525 / 3052 = \$0.26per call. 169.58 calls per month x 24 months = 4069.92 calls. 4 tires x \$262.50 = \$1050 / 4069.92 calls = \$0.26 per call. 0.26+0.26= **\$0.52** total cost per call for tires. This is up \$0.10 per call

Ambulance safety inspections – state safety inspections are required twice a year at a cost of \$45.90 each. $45.9 \times 2 = 91.80$ 91.8/2035 = \$0.05 per call. This is up \$0.02 per call from original contract.

Annual Cot maintenance – cot maintenance for FY2021 was \$753.72 per year. 753.72/2035 = **\$0.37.02 per** call. This is up \$0.07 per call from original contract.

Medical supplies- cost of supplies is based off FY2022 budget line of \$34,000 34000/2035 = **\$16.70 per call.**

Employee Costs – The contract with the bargaining unit states that firefighter's wages are based from 2825 hours on shift per year. All numbers included have been calculated using FY2022 contract rates and are listed as an hourly rate average of the 18 firefighters with some earning more than others, based on certifications, longevity, and rank.

Employee hourly rate = \$21.30 up \$0.89 Employee overtime rate = 31.95 up \$1.33

Additional costs to the employer:

Pension cost = \$2.02 Medicare = \$0.31

Medicare for OT = \$0.46 was not included in previous figures

Medical = \$5.99 Excess Medical = \$0.94 Life/disability = \$0.02 Clothing allowance = \$0.21 Workman's Comp = \$1.34

Average cost to Employer/hour Regular rate \$32.13 up \$2.63 Overtime \$43.24 up \$3.53 The collective bargaining agreement states that any call in, of off shift personnel, will be paid at the overtime rate and be for a minimum of 2 hours. $$43.24 \times 2$ hours \times 2$ EMTs = $172.96/call$. Up \$14.12.

The first year of the contract was for \$27,000. With a call volume of 35. 27,000/35= \$771.42 per call.

Year two was for \$28,000. With estimated 37 calls. 28,000/37= \$756.76 per call.

The price previously agreed upon for year three of the contract (FY2022) is for \$29,500. Averaging the two years of data (35 and 37) I will base this price per call on 36 calls. \$29,500/36= \$819.44 per call.

Conclusion:

With a contract increase per call charge of (\$48.02 over year one, and \$62.68 over year two) and an expense estimated increase of \$35.20 since year one per call it appears the contract increases are keeping up with our expense increases.

*Note: With such a small call volume the numbers can easily be skewed by a change of just a couple of calls as seen in year 2.

This addendum shall be in full force during the length of this agreement and shall be inserted, without negotiation and in its entirety, into the next successive CBA between the two parties. B. In addition each employee shall receive a clothing maintenance allowance as specified in Appendix B. The amount specified in Appendix B will be allotted by quartermaster system. The Fire Chief shall be the quartermaster. The Fire Chief shall have accounts at mutually agreed uniform stores and print shops. Prior to purchasing uniforms the employees shall notify the Fire Chief and obtain a purchase order. An employee must submit a receipt to the Fire Chief upon purchase of the uniform item for record keeping purposes.

The City shall also replace all clothing and personal items, e.g., eye glasses, that are ruined on duty at no cost to the employee upon presentation of damaged clothing and personal items and the receipt for new. An employee is expected to inform the Captain or Chief as soon as practical upon discovery of such damage in order to confirm the same.

In addition each employee shall receive a clothing maintenance allowance as specified in Appendix B. The amount specified in appendix B will be paid in May of each year of this agreement.

D The City shall also replace all clothing and personal items, e.g., eyeglasses that are ruined on duty, at no cost to the employee upon presentation of damaged clothing and personal items and the receipt for new. An employee is expected to inform the Captain or Chief as soon as practical upon discovery of such damage in order to confirm the same.

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 51.097 WASTEWATER SERVICE RATES AND CHARGES OF CHAPTER 51 SEWERS, OF TITLE V PUBLIC WORKS OF THE KEWANEE CITY CODE, AND DECLARING THAT THIS ORDINANCE SHALL BE IN FULL FORCE IMMEDIATELY.

- **WHEREAS,** Changes to Sanitary sewer rates were last approved in 2014, with the last increase occurring five years ago in 2016, and;
- WHEREAS, A rate study was conducted by Raftellis, a firm specializing in the field of rate modelling and based on the capital needs of the utility system as recommended by Crawford, Murphy and Tilly, a civil engineering firm contracted by the City to perform such an analysis, and;
- **WHEREAS,** The City has adequate operating reserves but has not 'set aside extra money to fund capital improvements whenever we need them,' and;
- WHEREAS, It is considered a "best practice" in the field of governmental accounting for enterprise funds to charges rates and fees sufficient to cover operating costs and capital costs or debt service incurred to cover the cost of capital improvements, and;
- WHEREAS, The Council finds the best practice is to institute incremental rate increases over a period of time to address the incremental increase in expenses to operate the sanitary sewer collection and treatment facilities.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED, BY THE KEWANEE CITY COUNCIL, IN COUNCIL ASSEMBLED, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1 Section §51.097 of the Kewanee City Code is hereby amended by striking the words shown as stricken through (sample) and inserting the words shown as underlined (sample) at their respective locations.

§ 51.097 WASTEWATER SERVICE RATES AND CHARGES.

There shall be and there are hereby established rates and charges for the use of and service supplied by the sewerage system of the city as follows:

(A) Basic user charge. A basic user charge per bimonthly period to each single user of the wastewater facilities of the city is hereby established, as shown in the table below. Two dollars of the bimonthly fee shall provide funds for city maintenance, repair or replacement of failed private sanitary sewer laterals situated within the public right-of-way as established herein or by city policy.

1 Detailed scope of work for the Animal Control (AC) Facility

Below, each section of the 'Detailed Scope of Work' is addressed, along with specific details of how we intend to meet the matter and the proposed method of compensation, as set out in the RFP:

A Animal services:

We will provide the City a highly competent service in all aspects of operating the Animal Control (AC) Facility. We guarantee that the structure, grounds, spaces and equipment will be well cared for. We will ensure that the premises comply with all laws and requirements, just as we currently do for the Kewanee Animal Shelter.

We have successfully rehabilitated and re-homed hundreds of animals over the past 3 years, and are well-versed in the challenges involved and the best ways to do this. We assure the City that all liaison with the public - be it in person, by telephone, or via social media platforms - will be performed to professional standards, in order to maintain and enhance the City's public image and reputation.

At intake, all animals will be evaluated for their medical, nutritional and emotional needs, and then provided with the care that their individual needs dictate - we do not subscribe to a 'one-size-fits-all' approach.

The RFP mentions 'animal body storage and removal'. All euthanizations will take place at the vet clinic, which will properly dispose of animal remains. Should an animal die at the AC Facility, its remains will be disposed of according to the applicable state and federal laws.

B Standards of care:

The HCHS-Kewanee Animal Shelter is operated at standards that well exceed the minimum requirements of the State of Illinois and the Department of Agriculture. These same high standards of operation will be applied to the City's AC Facility. Over the past 3 years, we have received excellent evaluation reports from the Department of Agriculture.

C Minimum hours of operation:

It is our intention to tailor the AC Facility's public hours to best serve the public. We believe the AC Facility should have a range of public hours to make it easy for people to claim their animals. We anticipate that the public hours will coincide with those of the Kewanee Animal Shelter, which are usually from 8am - 11am and 5pm-7pm, 365 days a year, as well as by appointment.

D Condition of AC Facility:

We have strict protocols in place at HCHS-Kewanee Animal Shelter to ensure the effective sanitization of all living and play areas, soft furnishings, toys, feeding dishes and equipment. The special disinfectants we use are of professional grade and are highly effective in preventing the spread of disease between animals. Furthermore, universal precautions are incorporated in our daily cleaning routines and our staff are trained thoroughly.

We are experienced in providing proper and adequate nutrition to the animals in our care. Our aim is to get animals healthy and to keep them healthy and happy. Effective sanitization, medical care, nutrition, exercise and humane stewardship all contribute to the health of the animals in our care.

Capacity:

In our view, the overcrowding of animals will always result in negative consequences, and is, therefore, to be avoided. By using the principles of managed intake, we will ensure that the capacity of the AC Facility is never exceeded. For example, owner surrenders will not be accepted at the AC Facility, but will be referred directly to the Kewanee Animal Shelter. Also, unclaimed animals at the AC Facility will be transferred to the Kewanee Animal Shelter or, if we are at full capacity, be transferred to other shelters.

E Exercise of animals:

By following the same protocols as those of the Kewanee Animal Shelter, we will ensure that dogs get sufficient attention and playtime outside and that cats are handled and socialized daily. Animals are also provided with various forms of enrichment of their environment.

F Euthanasia of animals:

The City wishes to achieve a 'low-kill' facility, which is in line with the general, national trend. It is also perfectly in line with the 'no-kill' mission of the HCHS-Kewanee Chapter. We have never euthanized an animal as a result of not being able to rehome it and do not view euthanization as an alternative to rehoming.

Euthanization is viewed as a last resort, and is reserved for animals who are in severe pain, or suffer from an unrecoverable disease, or are a danger to humans or other animals, or have no hope of a decent quality of life.

Decisions to euthanize are always made in conjunction with our veterinarian, and only on the advice of our veterinarian.

G <u>Un-adopted / unclaimed animals:</u>

HCHS-Kewanee Chapter agrees with the City's intent to pass ownership of all unclaimed, impounded animals to the HCHS-Kewanee Chapter after the City's 5-day hold period. It is our intent to rehome such animals, but we reserve the right to transfer certain animals to another shelter or rescue, if we believe it is in that animal's best interests to do so.

H <u>Veterinary services</u>:

The HCHS-Kewanee Chapter undertakes to provide humane treatment of all animals while in the care of the City AC Facility. This will include basic first aid services and licensed veterinary care for sick and injured animals.

I Return to owner:

The HCHS-Kewanee Chapter undertakes to make every attempt to promptly identify and notify the owners of impounded animals. We have much experience in this regard. Our Facebook page is our primary method of contact with the public. Our courtesy listings of lost animals have met with great success in the past.

The proximity between the AC Facility and the Kewanee Animal Shelter is another important benefit that we can offer. We believe this will make matters more convenient for all and less confusing for the community.

J Scanning for microchips:

We would utilize the microchip scanner that is currently at the AC Facility to aid in identifying and tracing the owners of impounded animals.

K Adoption program:

Animals that are unclaimed at the AC Facility will be transferred to the Kewanee Animal Shelter to be prepared for, and made available for adoption. All outstanding medical services will be provided at that time, for example sterilization, rabies vaccinations, microchipping.

L Disposal of animals:

- As required by the City, all animals will be held for a minimum of 5 days.
- Impounded animals that are on rabies hold will be held for the required rabies quarantine (usually, for 10 days) and then either returned to their owner or transferred to the Kewanee Animal Shelter.
- Animals on hold for biting will be evaluated for their fitness to be adopted.
- HCHS-Kewanee Chapter agrees that the disposal of animals as well as the disposal of animal
 remains will always comply with the applicable state and federal laws. Any decision to euthanize
 will be made by our veterinarian.
- The HCHS-Kewanee Chapter will use all available avenues attempt to reunite animals with their owners, failing which, the ownership of unclaimed animals will be transferred to Kewanee Animal Shelter, where they will be rehomed, fostered or transferred to another rescue or animal shelter.
- The protocols of the HCHS-Kewanee Chapter will be followed for all adoptions. These protocols
 include accurate record-keeping and compliance with state and federal laws concerning
 required medical treatments and services.

M Audit, records & reports:

- The HCHS-Kewanee Chapter agrees to keep accurate records of all animals entering the AC Facility, and to safeguard such records for a minimum of two years.
- The HCHS-Kewanee Chapter agrees to submit to the City, a monthly report containing all information as required and enumerated by the City in its RFP.
- The RFP mentions the Contractor will be required to maintain records and accounting of any
 fees collected by it. However, in the questions submitted to the RFP committee regarding this
 matter, the reply was that the KPD, and not the Contractor, will be handling fees.

N Animal Control Facility operating costs:

It is agreed that unless otherwise stated, the operating costs for the AC Facility will be the responsibility of the HCHS-Kewanee Chapter.

WHEREAS, The City Manager and staff has recommended that the City enter into an agreement with the Henry County Humane Society of Kewanee, Illinois, as an independent contractor to perform the needed maintenance of the animal control facility and care of the animals held within the facility.
