CLOSED MEETING AT 6:15 P.M. REGULAR MEETING AT 7:00 P.M.

- 1. **Police Department Hiring** The Fire and Police Commission conducted interviews earlier this week for police officers. Based on those interviews, test scores from earlier steps in the process, and preference points for education and military experience, they will develop a hiring list for approval at their meeting in June.
- 2. **Fire Department Hiring** Austin Koontz has completed the hiring process and will begin his employment with the City on June 1st. Captain Moon retired last week, so the department will be short one fireman for just over two weeks. The new hiring list being developed by the Fire and Police Commission was narrowed 12 to 10 during the physical testing phase that was completed last week and down to five after the written test. Interviews will be scheduled with the remaining candidates later in the month, at which time the list will be finalized based on earned points and preference points for education and military service.
- 3. **Facilities** Mr. Newton selected Melissa Maxon to serve the City as a part-time employee to provide janitorial services. She provides similar services for the Kewanee School District and appears to be a conscientious worker.
- 4. **Hydrant Testing** The department plans to begin hydrant test next Tuesday in the southwest quadrant of town. We will publicize the areas in which we are working through radio, print, and social media, but invariably some people will still be surprised when they see rust tinted water coming from the tap. Testing hydrants invariably stirs up sediment that exists within the line. Because most of the lines in the system are cast iron and are filled with water, that sediment contains a large amount of rust particulates. You may receive calls from individuals concerned about the safety of the water for cooking or consumption or its impact on laundry. This is an aesthetic water quality concern that can be addressed by running cold water through the bathtub faucet to clear the lines in a home. The alternative is having hydrants that don't work when they are needed for fire suppression and higher insurance costs due to worse ISO ratings.
- 5. **Grievance** The Fire Department informed the City that their requests were sufficiently addressed in the response to the grievance during the most recent phase of the process and indicated that they would not be advancing the matter to the next step in the process.

- 6. Finance Operations— The budget ordinance appears in the packet, with the appropriations ordinance to follow at the next meeting to allow for the required public notices as has been done in the past. As previously noted, this appropriations ordinance will differ significantly than previous versions in that it will no longer authorize the expenditure of funds we do not have. Ms. Haley continues to make slow but steady progress on straightening out the journal entries that are required but has found herself often occupied with getting to the bottom of mistakes that were made before her arrival in order to be able to move forward with important tasks such as tax reporting and the filing of mandated reports. It does appear that she was able to locate the reconciliation for various bank accounts, though she finds herself needing to verify the accuracy of the work rather than blindly accepting it as accurate. She's anxiously awaiting the adoption of the budget so that she can make arrangements for additional assistance to help get things caught up as they related to financial accounting and with the recent closing of our fiscal year. It will only be a matter of time before auditors start asking for information that was or wasn't properly prepared before her arrival that may or may not be in a file cabinet, box, or stack of documents or alternatively may be stored electronically somewhere in the midst of a decade's worth of data.
- 7. **Phone Install** The new phone system was installed earlier this week on a trial basis, on May 20th on a small scale, with staff training scheduled for next week, followed by the completion of the installation after staff has been trained in how the system works. The new system should lower operating costs and improve the reliability and functionality of the system.
- 8. **Labor/Management Relations** Staff had a Labor/Management Relations meeting with AFSCME last week. The meeting confirmed progress that has been made in the bargaining unit and their departments/divisions and improvements in morale that have been steady since late last year.
- 9. **Consumer Confidence Report** Staff will be sending out notice of the upcoming version of the mandated report on the next two cycles of bills. As is typically the case, the report will not yet be the case when the first batch of bills is sent but will nevertheless provide the date after which the report will be available for review on the City's website.
- 10. Westrum Leak Detection— The Company was in town this week to provide high-tech leak detection services that help to minimize our water losses. Reduction of water losses is one key component to solving our chlorides issue without incurring significant capital improvement costs but can only be achieved if we're able to pinpoint more significant losses than are currently being identified. Staff met with representatives of the company to identify a more strategic or effective approach to the challenge, in hopes that enhanced leak detection and elimination will assist in our efforts to put the chlorides issue behind us.
- 11. **Citywide Cleanup** The Citywide Cleanup is scheduled for June 12th at the old hospital site at Division and Elliott Streets with a rainout date of June 19th. Please help promote the program and our need for volunteers to help work at the event.

- 12. **North Water Tower** Staff has a preconstruction meeting scheduled with the engineering firm and contractor set for next week to finalize details of the painting of the North Water Tower, which is planned to begin work during the first or second week of June, weather permitting.
- 13. **Street Maintenance Program** Uncooperative weather has caused a delay in the completion of paving improvements where milling and the overlay of hot mix asphalt comprised the planned improvements. This is particularly noticeable in the downtown area where the streets in question carry a high amount of daily traffic. As a result, the work will be completed slightly later than anticipated, but well in advance of late fall. completion dates that were typical in previous years. A few areas that were of particular concern have been added to the program for patching, including in front of 916 N. Main, which will require full depth joint repair since the state has no plans to provide any maintenance within the next five years. When the weather has been cooperative, Public Works staff have made significant improvements to high traffic areas and have improved the quality of work for how the potholes are repaired.
- 14. **Tenney Street Sewer Issues** Staff has once again been working on removing an accumulation of grease from sewer lines that serve a number of businesses on the southern end of Tenney Street. Whichever businesses are not properly or sufficiently ensuring the removal of grease are causing the City to incur costs that significantly outweigh their payments for sewer service and should be held accountable financially once such a determination is made.
- 15. **Park Street Shed** At the April 12, 2021, meeting the City Council granted a variance to the owner of 340 S. Park Street for the continued construction of a shed that did not meet setback and was not constructed within existing building codes, particularly as they related to the foundation of the building, requiring the owner to rectify the foundation issues within two months. The homeowner has taken the necessary steps to ensure that the foundation is stable and served by proper footings.
- 16. **Second & Main** Staff has received plans for improvements to ensure the safety of the lot on the southwest corner of Second Street and Main Street. The improvements will ensure the stability of adjacent basements and improve the appearance of a highly visible lot in the downtown area.
- 17. **Fire Truck Pump Testing** Starting Monday the fire trucks will be rotated to Alexis for annual pump testing and certification (and maintenance if required). Using the facility that is nearby saves the cost, effort, and time out of service that would come from having the services performed in Milwaukee.
- 18. **Geneseo Communications** Staff will be meeting with personnel from Geneseo Communications next week regarding the potential addition of redundant fiber to City Hall and potential options for jumpstarting the expansion of broadband fiber into the City's neighborhoods.

- 19. **Requests for Proposals and Qualifications** Staff is developing requests for proposals and qualifications for banking services, auditing services, legal services, and heavy equipment leases. The requests will be issued and responses reviewed over the course of the next few months, with recommendations made to the City Council for the execution of applicable agreements. Such practices are standard in the field of municipal management and should not be taken as a reflection of the services provided by current providers.
- 20. Occupational Employment and Wage Statistics Report— Staff received a request this week from the U.S. Department of Labor's Bureau of Labor Statistics and the Illinois Department of Employment Security for our annual completion of the Occupational Employment and Wage Statistics Report. We have fourteen days to complete the report and expect to have it done by early next week.
- 21. **Minimum Fund Balance Policies** Staff is in the midst of drafting updates to the minimum fund balance policies to bring them more in line with recommended best practices. We expect to have the draft updates completed in advance of the first meeting in June.

Hello. Thank you for the opportunity to include a KEDC update in your City Council packet. Many of you were at the KEDC meeting in April, so you will have already heard much of what is included in this report. I do want to thank you too for hosting KEDC meetings at City Hall in April and May, while building restrictions are still in place at the CEC.

As you know, the Kewanee Solar Project is the largest project KEDC has been working on. We now have three years of time and energy invested in moving this project forward and are almost to the point of construction at this time. Since the report I submitted in December, which included the fact that the City approved a special permit for the solar project, national permitting has now been completed with the Army Corps of Engineers, and Illinois Department of Natural Resources has given an ok for the project as well.

A desktop survey with the State Historical Preservation Office was completed, and a formal application for approval has been submitted. The purpose of this application is to ensure that the project will not disturb Native American burial grounds. I have been told that this application is more of a formality, as the desktop survey did not indicate any issue.

Steve Kim is watching the legislation regarding solar projects and has indicated that things are starting to move forward after the legislature has gone almost a year with no meetings or action taking place at the state level.

While progress on the Greenville project has been substantially slower than on the Kewanee project, Sam Dione told me that they are marketing the Kewanee project both independently and in conjunction with the Greenville project. Their reasoning for this is because some companies are looking to create a Power Purchasing Agreement (PPA) for a single project, while other larger companies are looking at creating a PPA for multiple project sites.

Dione also indicated to me that Sunpin is waiting and watching for legislation to move forward in Illinois before scheduling a construction kick off meeting. It is at this point that Sunpin will approach the City for building permits and to put the decommissioning agreement in place.

In other news, Moore Tires is moving forward with its expansion project. Jeff Moore allowed the museum to continue to use part of the museum property into 2021, since they were not able to complete their move in 2020 with continued shutdowns. Moore has been pricing buildings and is amazed at the skyrocketing contractor and construction costs this year.

While many businesses have suffered during the pandemic, Boss Holdings is doing very well. I mentioned that they were thriving in he December report I submitted, and they continue to do so. They have moved about 75% of the inventory from the Pet Edge acquisition back from Nevada, and pet accessories are now being shipped from the Kewanee facility. Boss did add a second shift to the Burlington Road distribution center and added 12 employees (most who were previously unemployed). Two employees were hired at the call center last fall, and another 12 or so employees were to be hired the first part of 2021. These positions were

outsourced before. In addition, Boss was able to retain six Kewanee employees on the Boss Glove/PIP Products side of its business.

Excelled Sheepskin continues to do well with its military jacket contracts. The only setback expressed to me in regards to the new Naval jackets being produced was due to shipping delays.

Rhino Tools continues to grow. They are now using their old shop space also, and Jim Martin is in the process of purchasing two more companies, one of which he plans to bring back to Kewanee. The skid steer mounted prototype he created for solar installation is also now complete. I have put Martin in touch with Sunpin representatives, in hopes that he may be able to debut the prototype on the Kewanee project.

The City, the Chamber and KEDC have met with the new owners/representatives of the Burlington Road building the Goods sold the end of last year. The new owners are interested in leasing the space, and they are willing to subdivide the space to different lessees.

The Station Restaurant has expanded its business to include a food truck this spring. The Specks debuted their new food truck in Fulton County a couple of weeks ago. One struggle they continue to face, as do many other businesses in all different industries, is being able to hire dependable, competent employees. There continues to be a significant number of ablebodied people who choose not to work because of continued access to benefits for not working. This is a very large obstacle we face, not only to existing business in Kewanee, but also in attracting new business to the area.

Heartfelt Gifts continues to evolve. Sue Sagmoen incorporated an incubator concept in the store the end of last year, and she has been working with a young lady to bring different clothing lines and a different clientele into her store. Sue is very pleased with the growth she is experiencing.

Rumbold and Kuhn is expanding its Kewanee facility and is planning to put up a pole building on its property in August. Mike Rumbold has complimented Keith Edwards in working through this process with the City.

So far in 2021, I am seeing more Requests for Information cross my desk, and I am receiving more inquiries from other organizations as well. KEDC continues to work to promote Kewanee in the most positive light possible, and KEDC appreciates the continued partnership with the City of Kewanee.

Kewanee. Councilmember Faber moved to approve. Councilmember Baker seconded the motion. No Discussion Motion passed 4-0

- e) Consideration of an Ordinance #4054 amending section 155.069 (a)(6), (4), (5), (7) and (10) b-4 business district, established in the City of Kewanee.
 Councilmember Komnick moved to approve. Councilmember Faber seconded the motion. No Discussion Motion passed 4-0
- f) Consideration of a Resolution # 5278 Neponset Fire Protection District Ambulance Agreement. Councilmember Faber moved to approve. Councilmember Komnick seconded the motion. Faber stated there really is not much to discuss other than the changes that were requested. Chief Shook did point out that there is a clause in there for the unforeseen expenses and their inflation. Chief Shook also stated that this is a 3-year term. Mayor Moore stated that from the beginning he has been a supporter of this Ordinance and stated that we have been a positive effect on Neponset and no negative affect on the City of Kewanee. Mayor stated that getting the best people is better than restricting the pool. Komnick said this is standard anymore with most businesses. Motion passed 4-0
- h) Consideration a Resolution #5279 to authorize the City Manager to execute a side letter of agreement to the existing collective bargaining agreement with International Association of Fire Fighters Local 513. Councilmember Komnick moved to approve. Councilmember Faber seconded the motion. Komnick clarified that this is just making it more consistent. The Mayor stated this will benefit the fireman and the staff in getting just the one-time payment. Motion passed 4-0
- i) Consideration of a Resolution #5280 accepting the lowest responsive and responsible bid from Laverdiere Construction, Inc. for project #21-03, 2021 sidewalk replacement program, in the amount of \$130,146.50. Councilmember Faber moved to approve. Councilmember Baker seconded the motion. Faber asked if this was the handicap corners. The City manager Bradley stated that is correct. The ADA compliant corners. Mayor Moore was concerned about keeping the business local and maybe not just the lowest bids. He was curious on the other council opinion. Mayor stated it is our job to retain the businesses we have but also be good stewards of the taxpayer monies. Baker agreed and Komnick spoke up regarding the additional 7k that local would cost. Bradley stated that Laverdiere would be starting the next morning. At this time Mayor stated that we really need to go with low bid to not holdup the progress. Motion passed 4-0
- j) Consideration an Ordinance #4056 to amend section 51.097 wastewater service rates and charges of chapter 51 sewers of title v public works of the Kewanee City Code. Councilmember Baker moved to approve.
 Councilmember Faber seconded the motion. Faber stated that we have to start somewhere, and we have discussion this at past meeting. Komnick stated that this pretty minimal in the grans scheme of things. The proposed change would be \$3.00 the first year and \$1.50 every year following. With a total change of \$6.00 Motion passed 4-0

BACKGROUND	A request for proposal was issued for the maintenance and operation of the animal control facility. The City received responses from the Henry County Humane Society and the Friends of the Animals. The Henry County Humane Society submitted the lowest bid of \$30,000 (Year 1), \$30,000 (Year 2) and \$30,900 (Year 3). The bid from the Friends of the Animals was \$33,000 (Year 1), \$33,000 (Year 2), and \$33,300 (Year 3).

The City Manager, City Clerk, and Chief of Police ANALYSIS opened and reviewed the two submitted bids. After review, it was a consensus that the Henry County Humane Society presented the bid best suited for the City's request. The decision to recommend the proposal from the Henry County Humane Society is based on overall cost, experience of their board and employees, additional facilities, and their professional operation. The Henry County Humane Society will staff the facility 7 days a week for two shifts per day. The proposal amount included amounts for salaries for employees of the Henry County Humane Society, as well as payment of all veterinary bills, insurance and supplies for running the facility including food. The Henry County Humane Society also has the benefit of having the Kewanee Animal Shelter on the same property as the City animal control facility to easily transport animals between the two facilities. They are a registered 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization and are managed by a board comprised of highly qualified and experienced board members. They hold regularly scheduled board meetings that are open to the public. This board of Henry County Humane Society has shown to keep detailed records for the animals and excellent accounting records for their operations. Recommendation for the Animal Control Facility RFP

After reviewing the two submitted proposals for the RFP sent out by the City of Kewanee to solicit bids to operate the Animal Control Facility, it is a unanimous recommendation that the City choose the bid submitted by the Henry County Humane Society. Upon the initial opening and review of the bids, the City Manager, the City Clerk, and the Chief of Police reviewed the submitted bids. These individuals all agreed that upon the preliminary examination, the Henry County Humane Society presented the best bid.

A detailed scoring of the two submitted proposals was also conducted by a group comprised of the three highest ranking officers in the Kewanee Police Department that consisted of the Chief of Police, the Lieutenant, and the Investigations Sergeant. All three individuals are familiar with RFP's and how to score proposals based upon the requirements set forth in the RFP. They also have extensive experience working with both groups that submitted proposals. The fourth individual that participated in the scoring of the proposals was Keith Edwards, Director of Community Development for the City of Kewanee. Keith has intimate knowledge towards the working of the Animal Control Facility as he supervised the animal control and community service division for many years. He is also very familiar with the process of RFP's and scoring submitted proposals. The results of the scoring of the proposals were that all four individuals scored the proposal from the Henry County Humane Society as the top proposal. The total composite score was 376 out of a possible 400 points for the Henry County Humane Society compared to 290 out of a possible 400 points for the Friends of the Animals proposal.

Some of the main factors in the scoring included the details of the scope of the work, qualifications and experience, completeness of the proposal and the overall cost. The proposal from the Friends of the Animals lacked some of the required documents and information. Their proposal did not contain an actual Letter of Transmittal that was signed. It did not provide the requested information as to the understanding of the project or provide any specific details of their capabilities and how they will address the listed scope of work provided in the RFP. Their proposal also did not provide an insurance certificate, but instead provided only an insurance invoice that payment was due from 6/19/20. The overall cost to the City for the Friends of the Animals proposal for the first three years was \$99,000.00.

The proposal from the Henry County Humane Society provided every requirement that was listed in the original RFP in their proposal. Their proposal included a thorough Letter of Transmittal that was detailed to their experience, their professionalism, and abilities as an organization. The Henry County Humane Society also provided a thorough detailing of how they address each individual item listed in the scope of work in the RFP. Their complete proposal left no doubt as to how their organization will operate the facility and provide an efficient service for the City of Kewanee. The overall cost to the City for the Henry County Humane Society proposal for the first three years was \$90,900.00.

Other concerns with selecting the Friends of the Animal proposal is related to issues that City staff have had with the current staff of the Animal Control Facility. Currently, we have had animals in our Facility for more than the number of days we are required to hold them. Administration has also had to speak with current staff about having "office pets" at the Animal Control Facility. There have also been several instances of the current staff at the Animal Control Facility refusing to take feral cats from citizens within city limits. KPD officials have reminded staff that all cats and dogs captured in city limits, both domesticated and feral, will be taken in by the City. We do not refuse to take in feral cats if captured. Another concerning incident includes current staff releasing a pit bull that was placed on quarantine in the pound after biting a person in the face because they said the animal was mean. This was in direct violation of our city ordinance concerning face bite victims as we are mandated to quarantine the animal for ten days in our facility. Additionally, the current staff has been sending bills from the veterinary clinic for animals that were treated or euthanized while in control of the Animal Control Facility. These bills were being sent directly to the City Clerk to be paid. The last RFP, which is the same as the current RFP, clearly identifies that the operator of the Animal Control Facility is responsible for all medical bills related to animals from the Animal Control Facility. In the last fiscal year, the current staff had an additional \$852.14 in medical bills sent to the City Clerk to be paid by the City of Kewanee. Lastly, members of the City administration have had to speak with current staff numerous times about using the City of Kewanee social media account to post inappropriate comments, unfounded claims, and falsehoods.

Additional factors as to why the Henry County Humane Society would be the best fit for the City is they are comprised of a board that is completely made up of volunteers. Their proposal is viewed as a local organization providing a service with no personal financial gain. They also occupy the facility directly next door to the City Animal Control Facility which provides a nice incentive to easily transport animals between the two facilities. It will also provide an efficient process to allow their organization to foster and adopt any unclaimed animals from the City Animal Control Facility. The City does not wish to house animals in our Animal Control Facility longer than necessary by law. We are not a shelter and do not adopt out animals or foster animals.

As stated in Attachment A of the RFP, "Proposals should be as thorough and detailed as possible so that the City may properly evaluate the Proposer's capabilities to provide the required services." Close examination of both proposals show that based upon the requirements set forth in the RFP, the proposal from the Henry County Humane Society was superior in every aspect. Review of both organizations, their submitted proposals, and current practices would lead any reasonable person to believe that the contract should be awarded to the Henry County Humane Society. We can in no way claim to be good stewards of taxpayer funds and their best interest if we do not choose the submitted proposal from the Henry County Humane Society.

1 Detailed scope of work for the Animal Control (AC) Facility

Below, each section of the 'Detailed Scope of Work' is addressed, along with specific details of how we intend to meet the matter and the proposed method of compensation, as set out in the RFP:

A <u>Animal services</u>:

We will provide the City a highly competent service in all aspects of operating the Animal Control (AC) Facility. We guarantee that the structure, grounds, spaces and equipment will be well cared for. We will ensure that the premises comply with all laws and requirements, just as we currently do for the Kewanee Animal Shelter.

We have successfully rehabilitated and re-homed hundreds of animals over the past 3 years, and are well-versed in the challenges involved and the best ways to do this. We assure the City that all liaison with the public - be it in person, by telephone, or via social media platforms - will be performed to professional standards, in order to maintain and enhance the City's public image and reputation.

At intake, all animals will be evaluated for their medical, nutritional and emotional needs, and then provided with the care that their individual needs dictate - we do not subscribe to a 'one-size-fits-all' approach.

The RFP mentions 'animal body storage and removal'. All euthanizations will take place at the vet clinic, which will properly dispose of animal remains. Should an animal die at the AC Facility, its remains will be disposed of according to the applicable state and federal laws.

B <u>Standards of care</u>:

The HCHS-Kewanee Animal Shelter is operated at standards that well exceed the minimum requirements of the State of Illinois and the Department of Agriculture. These same high standards of operation will be applied to the City's AC Facility. Over the past 3 years, we have received excellent evaluation reports from the Department of Agriculture.

C Minimum hours of operation:

It is our intention to tailor the AC Facility's public hours to best serve the public. We believe the AC Facility should have a range of public hours to make it easy for people to claim their animals. We anticipate that the public hours will coincide with those of the Kewanee Animal Shelter, which are usually from 8am - 11am and 5pm-7pm, 365 days a year, as well as by appointment.

D Condition of AC Facility:

We have strict protocols in place at HCHS-Kewanee Animal Shelter to ensure the effective sanitization of all living and play areas, soft furnishings, toys, feeding dishes and equipment. The special disinfectants we use are of professional grade and are highly effective in preventing the spread of disease between animals. Furthermore, universal precautions are incorporated in our daily cleaning routines and our staff are trained thoroughly.

We are experienced in providing proper and adequate nutrition to the animals in our care. Our aim is to get animals healthy and to keep them healthy and happy. Effective sanitization, medical care, nutrition, exercise and humane stewardship all contribute to the health of the animals in our care.

Capacity:

In our view, the overcrowding of animals will always result in negative consequences, and is, therefore, to be avoided. By using the principles of managed intake, we will ensure that the capacity of the AC Facility is never exceeded. For example, owner surrenders will not be accepted at the AC Facility, but will be referred directly to the Kewanee Animal Shelter. Also, unclaimed animals at the AC Facility will be transferred to the Kewanee Animal Shelter or, if we are at full capacity, be transferred to other shelters.

E Exercise of animals:

By following the same protocols as those of the Kewanee Animal Shelter, we will ensure that dogs get sufficient attention and playtime outside and that cats are handled and socialized daily. Animals are also provided with various forms of enrichment of their environment.

F <u>Euthanasia of animals</u>:

The City wishes to achieve a 'low-kill' facility, which is in line with the general, national trend. It is also perfectly in line with the 'no-kill' mission of the HCHS-Kewanee Chapter. We have never euthanized an animal as a result of not being able to rehome it and do not view euthanization as an alternative to rehoming.

Euthanization is viewed as a last resort, and is reserved for animals who are in severe pain, or suffer from an unrecoverable disease, or are a danger to humans or other animals, or have no hope of a decent quality of life.

Decisions to euthanize are always made in conjunction with our veterinarian, and only on the advice of our veterinarian.

G <u>Un-adopted / unclaimed animals</u>:

HCHS-Kewanee Chapter agrees with the City's intent to pass ownership of all unclaimed, impounded animals to the HCHS-Kewanee Chapter after the City's 5-day hold period. It is our intent to rehome such animals, but we reserve the right to transfer certain animals to another shelter or rescue, if we believe it is in that animal's best interests to do so.

H Veterinary services:

\$

The HCHS-Kewanee Chapter undertakes to provide humane treatment of all animals while in the care of the City AC Facility. This will include basic first aid services and licensed veterinary care for sick and injured animals.

Return to owner:

The HCHS-Kewanee Chapter undertakes to make every attempt to promptly identify and notify the owners of impounded animals. We have much experience in this regard. Our Facebook page is our primary method of contact with the public. Our courtesy listings of lost animals have met with great success in the past.

The proximity between the AC Facility and the Kewanee Animal Shelter is another important benefit that we can offer. We believe this will make matters more convenient for all and less confusing for the community.

J <u>Scanning for microchips</u>:

We would utilize the microchip scanner that is currently at the AC Facility to aid in identifying and tracing the owners of impounded animals.

K Adoption program:

Animals that are unclaimed at the AC Facility will be transferred to the Kewanee Animal Shelter to be prepared for, and made available for adoption. All outstanding medical services will be provided at that time, for example sterilization, rabies vaccinations, microchipping.

L Disposal of animals:

- As required by the City, all animals will be held for a minimum of 5 days.
- Impounded animals that are on rabies hold will be held for the required rabies quarantine (usually, for 10 days) and then either returned to their owner or transferred to the Kewanee Animal Shelter.
- Animals on hold for biting will be evaluated for their fitness to be adopted.
- HCHS-Kewanee Chapter agrees that the disposal of animals as well as the disposal of animal remains will always comply with the applicable state and federal laws. Any decision to euthanize will be made by our veterinarian.
- The HCHS-Kewanee Chapter will use all available avenues attempt to reunite animals with their owners, failing which, the ownership of unclaimed animals will be transferred to Kewanee Animal Shelter, where they will be rehomed, fostered or transferred to another rescue or animal shelter.
- The protocols of the HCHS-Kewanee Chapter will be followed for all adoptions. These protocols include accurate record-keeping and compliance with state and federal laws concerning required medical treatments and services.

M Audit, records & reports:

- The HCHS-Kewanee Chapter agrees to keep accurate records of all animals entering the AC Facility, and to safeguard such records for a minimum of two years.
- The HCHS-Kewanee Chapter agrees to submit to the City, a monthly report containing all information as required and enumerated by the City in its RFP.
- The RFP mentions the Contractor will be required to maintain records and accounting of any fees collected by it. However, in the questions submitted to the RFP committee regarding this matter, the reply was that the KPD, and not the Contractor, will be handling fees.

N Animal Control Facility operating costs:

It is agreed that unless otherwise stated, the operating costs for the AC Facility will be the responsibility of the HCHS-Kewanee Chapter.

Alternative Option for the Operation of the Animal Control Facility

I was asked to present an alternative option for the operation of the Animal Control Facility that would include hiring personnel to run the facility as employees under the City of Kewanee. The current amount paid for the 2020-2021 fiscal year of the contract for the City of Kewanee is \$32,000.00. This alternative option would take that budgeted amount paid to the contractor and utilize it to pay a new employee.

My proposal would be to hire a full time sworn police officer to help to operate the Animal Control Facility. Because we would have to provide insurance and benefits to employees we hire, I do not feel it would be cost effective or beneficial to hire an employee that is not a certified police officer to fill the position. Multiple part-time employees, or one full-time employee that is not a police officer, limits how much value they can add to the Kewanee Police Department and the City. The current budgeted amount, including benefits, would more than likely not be enough to pay for these employees. If we are going to spend additional funds to manage the Animal Control Facility ourselves, I believe it is in our best interest to try and maximize the amount of service we can get from it. By hiring an additional full-time police officer, we would now have the manpower to have a person assigned to run and oversee the operation of the Animal Control Facility, maintain current levels for our patrol division, and restaff the Street Crimes Unit to combat the growing methamphetamine problem in our community.

Statistically speaking, the City of Kewanee is in the top 5% of the communities in Illinois for the highest crime rate per capita. Over the past several years, the distribution and use of methamphetamine in our city has increased. Last year over half of our drug arrests consisted of methamphetamine related offenses. Since the beginning of the year, the Kewanee Police Department has already surpassed over 75% of all of methamphetamine related arrests and investigations for 2020 in just 5 months. The meth trade shows no signs of slowing down and other theft and property crimes historically accompany an increase in drug activity and use. In addition to the challenge of increased drug use and distribution, statistics shows that the City of Kewanee is understaffed for our population to call volume ratio based upon crime statistics from the State of Illinois in their resource allocation tables. Also, the Kewanee Police Department is understaffed in comparison to our area police departments that are considered comparable based upon their call volume and population.

The addition of another officer would allow the Street Crimes Unit to have a detective assigned to combating the street level drug trade in addition to helping operate the day-to-day operations of the Animal Control Facility in conjunction with the two TAO officers currently assigned to the Patrol Division. The Street Crimes Unit officers would have the flexibility in his hours and duty requirements to help maintain any animals that would be placed in our pound. With assistance from the TAO

officers, they would be able to provide coverage 7 days a week to provide food, water, medical care, and exercise for the animals. The SCU officer would also help oversee the return of animals to their owners, maintaining the proper paperwork, and working with animal groups to place unclaimed animals.

The total cost of a new officer salary would be \$56,863.26. The rest of the compensation package would be an additional \$8,244.44 for single insurance or \$21,323.76 for family insurance. This would make the total cost for a new officer with single insurance being at least \$65,107.70 and the total cost for a new officer with family insurance no less than \$78,187.02. When you subtract the current amount being budgeted for payment to a contractor, that reduces the total additional cost to approximately \$35,000 for a new officer with single insurance or approximately \$48,000 for a new officer with family insurance.

By opting to hire a new officer, I believe we could address two problems with this one solution for the City of Kewanee. We could add another officer to maintain our current patrol staffing levels, restaff the Street Crimes Unit to directly address street crimes and street level drug use, and efficiently operate our Animal Control Facility with our own officers. I do agree that there is an added cost to the City for this alternative option, but a look at the overall financial impact shows that we would be able to add a desperately need additional police officer at a reduced cost. I would be making this proposal to add another officer whether there was a need to provide our own staffing for the Animal Control Facility or not. This option could allow us to provide an improved service for the citizens of Kewanee at a discounted price.

- **WHEREAS,** Staff recommends that the City enter into an agreement with the Henry County Humane Society of Kewanee, Illinois, as an independent contractor to perform the needed maintenance of the animal control facility and care of the animals held within the facility.

RESOLUTION NO. 5282

A RESOLUTION FIXING THE BUDGET FOR THE FISCAL YEAR BEGINNING MAY 1, 2021 AND ENDING APRIL 30, 2022, AND DECLARING THAT THIS RESOLUTION SHALL BE IN FORCE IMMEDIATELY.

- WHEREAS, it is necessary for the proper management of the City of Kewanee to establish a budget to include amounts of funds and categories of receipts and expenditures; and
- WHEREAS, appointed staff and elected officials have worked together under the guidance provided by the Finance Director to develop a budget in keeping with best practices in the field of municipal finance; and
- WHEREAS, appointed staff and elected officials have developed a budget that prioritizes service delivery to the residents, businesses, and visitors of the City of Kewanee while maintaining fiscal responsibility and the stewardship of public funds; and
- **WHEREAS,** the City of Kewanee values transparency in its financial operations and the manner in which financial documents are presented to elected officials and the public.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KEWANEE THAT:

- **Section 1** From the sum appropriated for corporate purposes by the City of Kewanee, Henry County, Illinois for the fiscal year beginning May 1, 2021 and terminating April 30, 2022 there be allocated to the payment of the operating and other expenses of the general government, the sums set out in the following budget of costs and operating expenses.
- **Section 2** Except as allowed for by statute or ordinance in the case of an emergency, no labor be employed, or purchase made, or contracts entered into, or commitments for equipment made, unless sufficient funds have been budgeted by the Council and are available for the payment of such labor, supplies, equipment, or contracts.
- **Section 3** The Director of Finance, with the approval of the City Manager, may transfer funds from the contingent funds and funds in which there may be surplus, to other funds as needed, provided the total costs and expenditures of any fund shall not exceed the total amount allocated to that fund for the fiscal year.
- **Section 4** The budgeted revenues and expenditures attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference thereto as Exhibit A.

Statistics and examples from other similar jurisdictions show that an ordinance of this nature can be safely implemented here in Kewanee.

During research on the topic, I learned that several communities that are comparable in size to Kewanee have golf cart and UTV ordinances already in place. I compiled a list of 14 communities in Illinois that have a population ranging from 7,000 people to 40,000 people that also have a golf cart or UTV ordinance. After examining their ordinances, I made contact with the administrative staff for 4 communities that are good comparable cities for Kewanee to obtain further information.

Channahon, Illinois initially enacted a golf cart ordinance 2013. Several years later, they amended the ordinance to include UTV's. They do not have many golf carts registered with their city, but anticipate an increase in UTV permits. Administrative officials for Channahon did not indicate they have experienced many accidents with golf carts in their community.

Canton, Illinois enacted their ordinance in 2016. Their administration indicated that officials have only issued approximately 6 citations for violations of the ordinance in 5 years. Canton only has approximately 12 golf carts registered with the city, but approximately 250 UTV's registered. Canton officials also relayed that they have not had any major accidents or injuries and their ordinance seems to work well.

Pontiac, Illinois has over 130 carts that are registered within their community. Administrative staff informed me that they have yet to have any accidents or write any citations for ordinance violations in over ten years since enacting their ordinance.

Chillicothe, Illinois indicated that they typically register 100-200 golf carts each year. They have not had any enforcement issues concerning golf carts and have experienced very few minor accidents in nine years. Their administrative officials believe the ordinance they have in place works well for their community.

While the comparison cities mentioned above show that this type of ordinance can work in a community of our size, further information was needed to ensure that we could do it safely and legally. The Illinois Vehicle Code provides legal definitions and requirements for vehicles that are categorized as non-highway vehicles. The language of the statute states that such non-highway vehicles must have brakes, a steering apparatus, tires, a rearview mirror, red reflectorized warning devices in the front and rear, a slow-moving emblem on the rear of the non-highway vehicle, a headlight that emits a white light visible from a distance of 500 feet to the front, a tail lamp that emits a red light visible from at least 100 feet from the rear, brake lights, and turn signals. It further states that any person who operates a non-highway vehicle on a street, highway, or roadway must possess a valid driver's license and shall be subject to the mandatory insurance requirements under Article VI of Chapter 7 of said Code. Additionally, a person who drives or is in actual physical control of a non-highway vehicle on a roadway while under the influence is subject to Sections 11-500 through 11-502 of this Code.

With these specific requirements mandated by state law, it will help to alleviate concerns that these nonhighway vehicles would not be properly regulated. Many jurisdictions require additional safety and equipment requirements via their own ordinances to try and enhance safety and regulation. Some of these items I would recommend would be:

- Requiring a windshield
- Only allowing these non-highway vehicles to operate from sunrise to sunset
- Prohibit them from driving on sidewalks
- Showing proof of insurance at the time of registration
- Driver must be 18 years of age or older
- Only allowing the driving of said vehicles on roadways with a posted speed limit of 30 mph or below
- Setting the maximum speed limit for these vehicles at 20 mph
- Inspection of the vehicle by the Chief of Police or his designee at time of registration
- Waiver of liability signed by the vehicle owner

After thoroughly studying the concept of a golf cart or UTV ordinance, I can now confidently say that the Kewanee Police Department would not have any issues with the enactment of such an ordinance if the council chooses to go in that direction. I would recommend an ordinance for golf carts as long as the ordinance contains some of the additional requirements mentioned above for reasons of safety and regulation.
