- 1. **Enterprise Zone** DCEO staff will have Enterprise Zone Applications scored by June 30th and forwarded to the Enterprise Zone Board in advance of their public meetings that are scheduled for July 12th (Chicago), August 2nd (Springfield), September 6th (Springfield), and September 21st (Chicago).
- 2. **City-wide cleanup** We are still working out some bugs with the City-wide cleanup, but the event was a success by most accounts. In total, we collected more than 103,000 pounds of junk and debris, which will go a long way towards improving the appearance of the community and the ability of our residents to better utilize their property. The overlwhelming majority of participants were grateful for the opportunity to get rid of a few items. Scrap metal from the event generated \$895, which helps to defray the costs.
- 3. **RFPs** The City advertised for proposals for both a housing study and financial advisor services. The financial advisor services is on the agenda for this meeting. The recommendation regarding the housing study has been delayed so that the responses can be more thoroughly reviewed.
- 4. **Golf Cart Ordinance** In February, the City Council opted not to consider an amendment allowing for the use of Golf Carts on City streets. A petition has been drafted and signed by 145 people asking that the City of Kewanee allow the use of non-licensed four-wheel motorized vehicles (ATVs, UTVs, golf carts) for individuals with valid Illinois Drivers Licenses ages 16 and above with proof of insurance. Such vehicles would be required to follow the rules of the road, including the use of hand signals, would require a registration process at the municipal level and limit the travel of such vehicle to no more than 10 miles per hour. Staff would like your guidance on whether or not the City Council would like to consider the petition.
- 5. **Street Improvement Risers -** One of the items in the bills for this Council meeting was to American Highway Products, Ltd. Staff ordered the risers to install on the manholes and inlets affected by last year's street improvements. Risers have been installed on West First Street by the alley and Central Blvd. by St. John Paul II Catholic Church. Staff is working to install the remaining risers, which are planned for installation along West Central Blvd., West McClure St., and possibly Lake Street; as well as an inlet riser

City Manager Gary Bradley at 1116 West Prospect Street in front of the driveway, and will install additional risers in the future while the street improvements are being made.

- 6. **Lunch & Learn** The Chamber of Commerce has hosted two Lunch & Learn sessions for our businesses (a third was cancelled due to lack of participants signed up). They will host the final Lunch & Learn event on Tuesday, June 20 from 11:45 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. at the Flemish American Club. The topic of that session will be the City of Kewanee's incentive programs.
- 7. Demolitions Keith posted notices yesterday for five structures to go through the fast track demolition process. The five structures include 2 houses and 3 garages. The houses are 511 W Fifth Street and 522 E Seventh Street. The garages are located at 802 Rose Street (garage near the Shamrock), 315 Elliott Street, and 521 Cambridge Road (garage just off of 6th street on the way to Baker Park).
- 8. **Depot** I received complaints Thursday regarding inappropriate use of the facility and some maintenance issues that need to be addressed. Kevin Newton is working on the maintenance issues and was addressing them even before the concerns were raised to my attention. The police have had contact with the individuals who were using the facility inappropriately, and were called by a private business on South Tenney today to ask one of the individuals to leave their facility.
- 9. **Façade Program** We received an application from the owner of 116 W. 2nd Street for the façade improvement program. The building is adjacent to the one that just had the front replaced. It's a small application from a financial standpoint, but improvements to multiple buildings in the same block could serve as a catalyst for other improvements and investment in the area.
- 11. **Infrastructure** Staff installed 3 new main line valves on Cambridge Road for the Golden Avenue water project. The City has requested bids for emergency sewer lining on Burlington Avenue & Payson Street, and staff has worked to restore rights-of-way from sewer repairs. Staff also repaired a major hole on the south part of Red Adams Road. The City's camera truck has arrived and staff will begin training on the equipment next week.
- 12. **Street Maintenance** All of the paperwork for this year's approved street program has been sent to IDOT. We are awaiting their approval and scheduling for bid letting.
- 13. **Chlorides** Our final chloride report was completed and submitted to the IEPA last month. Dale and a representative from CMT met with the IEPA officials in Springfield and presented the report. We have not received any feedback from the report, at this time.
- 14. **Storm Drainage Improvements** The Oak/Park/Prospect Streets storm drainage project will be starting Monday.
- 15. **Well #4 Rehab** The Variable Frequency Drive (VFD, Speed Control) is here and ready for installation. The new pump is at Peerless Pump along with the column piping. The epoxy coating is being applied to the piping. At this time, the plan is to have these items

installed within the next three weeks. The IEPA is requiring a permit for the well work. CMT has been retained to prepare and submit the required paperwork, by the end of this week.

- 16. **Sanitary Sewer CIPP** Work continues on the replacement of sewer laterals via the CIPP process. It is not going as fast as anticipated, but it is steadily moving forward.
- 17. **Downtown Electrical Work** Staff has been working with Kenny Gutschlag, CMT and Ameren to develop a plan to provide for the future metering of electricity in the Downtown area for Hog Days and other Downtown Events. With the assistance of CMT, a schematic design has been created for a metered single load center next to Berrian Park, using existing poles to provide metered power along the streets that are used for events in the area. There are still details to be worked out about the timing of the improvements and developing the bid specifications for the actual work.

COUNCIL MEETING 17-10 MAY 22, 2017

The City Council met in Council Chambers at 6:33 PM with the Mayor calling the meeting to order and the following answering to roll call:

Council Member Koehler made a motion at 6:33 PM to adjourn to executive session pursuant to Section 2(c)(1) of the Open Meetings Act to discuss personnel and Section 2(c)(2) to discuss collective bargaining. Council Member Yaklich seconded the motion. Roll call showed 5 ayes, no nays. The motion passed.

The executive session was adjourned at 6:58 PM on a motion made by Council Member Yaklich and seconded by Council Member Schweitzer. Roll call showed 5 ayes, no nays. The motion passed. The Council Meeting resumed at 7:01 PM with Mayor Looney announcing that Council was reconvening following a closed session pursuant to Section 2(c)(1) of the Open Meetings Act to discuss personnel and Section 2(c)(2) to discuss collective bargaining.

Mayor Looney asked for a moment of silence for our troops still fighting overseas.

Mayor Looney explained that the next items were placed on the consent agenda and were considered to be routine in nature to be passed as a whole with one vote of the Council. Mayor Looney requested that any member of the Council or the audience wishing to have an item removed from the consent agenda for individual consideration to make the request and the item would be removed and considered following the approval of the remaining consent items. The consent agenda included minutes from the May 8, 2017 Council Meeting and payroll for the pay period ending May 13, 2017 and police Clothing allowances in the amount of \$258,086.03. The consent agenda was approved on a motion made by Council Member Yaklich and seconded by Council Member Koehler. Roll call showed 4 ayes, no nays. The motion passed.

Bills submitted for approval totaling \$438,192.60 were approved on a motion made by Council Member Yaklich and seconded by Council Member Koehler. Roll call showed 5 ayes, no nays. The motion passed.

PUBLIC HEARING

Mayor Looney opened a public hearing on the Appropriations Ordinance for the municipal fiscal year from May 1, 2017 through April 30, 2018 at 7:04 PM. City Manager Bradley explained the appropriation ordinance was a statutory requirement. The City would continue to use the previously passed budget and the procurement policy to guide spending. Mayor Looney asked if anyone from the Council or audience had any comments. There being no other comments, the public hearing was closed at 7:05 PM.

CITIZEN PARTICIPATION

Mayor Looney asked if anyone wished to speak. There being no such requests Mayor Looney moved on to new business.

NEW BUSINESS

Kathy Albert from the Kewanee Economic Development Corporation presented her semi-annual update regarding their activities and meetings.

The minutes from the Zoning Board of Appeals from its meeting held on May 17 were accepted on a motion made by Council Member Schweitzer and seconded by Council Member Faber. Roll call showed 5 ayes, no nays. The motion passed.

Ordinance #3882 granting a variance to Brian and Amanda Forrest for property located at 613 East Street South was approved on a motion made by Council Member Yaklich and seconded by Council Member Schweitzer. Brian Forrest was present and explained the project to the Council. Roll call showed 5 ayes, no nays. The motion passed.

Resolution #5050 to authorize the use of the public alley and parking area in the 200 block of West Second Street by Hype, Inc. d/b/a Cerno's Bar & Grill for a beer garden in conjunction with events known as Concerts in the Alley, Summer Series was approved on a motion made by Council Member Koehler and seconded by Council Member Schweitzer. Police Chief Dison confirmed that there had been no issues with security with prior events. Roll call showed 5 ayes, no nays. The motion passed.

Resolution #5051 to authorize the use of the public alley and parking area in the 200 block of West Second Street by Hype, Inc. d/b/a Cerno's Bar & Grill for a beer garden in conjunction with Hog Days, September 1, 2, & 3 was approved on a motion made by Council Member Koehler and seconded by Council Member Faber. Roll call showed 5 ayes, no nays. The motion passed.

Ordinance #3883 amending Chapter 155 in regards to trailer definitions was approved on a motion made by Council Member Yaklich and seconded by Council Member Schweitzer. Roll call showed 5 ayes, no nays. The motion passed.

Ordinance #3884 amending Section 111.19 Issuance of License when certain requirements are met on Chapter 111 Alcoholic Liquor to include required BASSET program certification was approved on a motion made by Council Member Schweitzer and seconded by Council Member Faber. Roll call showed 5 ayes, no nays. The motion passed.

Ordinance #3881 amending Chapter 150.017(k) of the City Code which establishes climatic and geographic design criteria was approved on a motion made by Council Member Schweitzer and seconded by Council Member Yaklich. Community Development Director Edwards explained that the ordinance was a making a change to the ice barrier needed for roofing jobs. Roll call showed 5 ayes, no nays. The motion passed.

Ordinance #3882 appropriating funds for the municipal fiscal year from May 1, 2017 through April 30, 2018 was approved on a motion made by Council Member Yaklich and seconded by Council Member Faber. Roll call showed 5 ayes, no nays. The motion passed.

Resolution #5052 authorizing the City Manager to execute a five year collective bargaining agreement with AFSCME Council 31, Local 764 was approved on a motion made by Council Member Faber and seconded by Council Member Schweitzer. Council Member Yaklich questioned the length of the agreement. City Manager Bradley explained that the term was mutually agreed upon, and would assist the city to align all of the agreements to be negotiated at one time. Roll call showed 5 ayes, no nays. The motion passed.

Resolution #5053 for maintenance o streets and highways by the City of Kewanee for Fiscal Year 2017-2018, under the Illinois Highway Code was approved on a motion made by Council Member Schweitzer and seconded by Council Member Koehler. Council Member Schweitzer questioned if we were behind in the street department. City Manager Bradley replied that the city was very behind in street maintenance. City Engineer Nobel stated that there is \$8-10 million of work that needs to be done, while the city has around \$500,000 to spend. City Manager Bradley also noted that the street crew also performs all of the sewer and storm sewer projects done by the City. City Engineer Nobel also noted that this work would be contracted. Public Works Operations Manager Johnson stated that the city is out filling potholes whenever they have the opportunity to do so. Roll call showed 5 ayes, no nays. The motion passed.

Ordinance #3883 amending Sections 50.09 and 50.10 of Chapter 50 Public Works and Sections 92.06 Rates and Charges and 92.08 Placement of Headstones Permit Required of Chapter 92 Cemetery in regards to corresponding fees was tabled with the request for additional information from the comparables on a motion made by Council Member Yaklich and seconded by Council Member Schweitzer. Council Member Faber had made a motion to approve the Ordinance with a second from Council Member Yaklich, those motions were withdrawn after some discussion. The request to see the information from the comparables was to ensure the increase in fees would be enough to avoid another increase in the near future. Roll call showed 5 ayes, no nays. The motion passed.

Resolution #5054 authorizing an agreement to provide janitorial services for Kewanee City Hall and the Amtrak Depot was approved on a motion made by Council Member Yaklich and seconded by Council Member Schweitzer. Council Member Yaklich noted that the same vendor would continue to do the work, and that they had done an okay job in the past. Roll call showed 5 ayes, no nays. The motion passed.

Resolution #5055 declaring certain Police Department items as excess due to pending officer retirements was approved on a motion made by Council Member Schweitzer and seconded by Council Member Faber. Council Members all thanked the chief and retiring officers for their service. Roll call showed 5 ayes, no nays. The motion passed.

City Clerk Edwards read a proclamation declaring May 21-27 as Emergency Medical Services Week.

OTHER BUSINESS

Council Member Koehler thanked Mike Berry for his coverage of the Council Meetings. He noted the pending retirement of Henry County Sheriff Jim Padilla. He also note the upcoming Memorial Day Services at the American Legion.

Council Member Yaklich noted the rescheduling of the City wide cleanup, due to the eminent threat of lightning. The new date would be June 3 from 8-2 and volunteers were still needed. He also noted that volunteers could park at the Medical Arts Center on Elliott Street.

Council Member Faber noted the cleanup happening around town, including a recent demolition on N Main Street.

Council Member Koehler questioned adding additional burn days. Fire Chief Shook noted that the burn days were amended the previous year to include June.

Council Member Schweitzer thanked and congratulated Chief Dison, Sergeant Clapper and Officer Underwood. She also thanked Sheriff Padilla, congratulated area graduates, and noted the upcoming Memorial Day service.

Mayor Looney thanked and wished good luck to the upcoming retiring officers. He also congratulated Mike Berry on his retirement and welcomed Margie Washburn.

ANNOUNCEMENTS

City Clerk Edwards read the announcements thanking everyone for their understanding during recent construction and repair projects, most notably on 9th Street and Burlington Ave. Public Works would begin their summer hours on Monday, June 5. Summer hours were from 6 am to 2:30 pm, so all trash or other items for collection should be at the curb prior to 6 am.

There being no further business, Council Member Yaklich moved to adjourn the meeting and Council Member Schweitzer seconded the motion. Roll call showed 5 ayes, no nays. The meeting adjourned at 8:03 PM.




The color powder substance will be purchased from the same company as last year. The substance is a cornstarch based product that is made in the USA, safe for participants and the environment.

How did certain areas of the City become a Tax Increment Financing Area ("TIF")?

These areas met the definition of a "Blighted area", "Conservation area", or "Industrial park conservation area" as such terms are defined by the Tax Increment Allocation Redevelopment Act, and the City adopted ordinances making such finding and creating each individual TIF Area.

What is the benefit of the TIF for the City's economic (re)development effort?

Every year, each TIF Area captures its "TIF Increment" ¹ which can be used to pay for a wide variety of "redevelopment project costs".

Where is the TIF Increment deposited?

The TIF Increment from each TIF Area is deposited into its own, separate, TIF account.

What can the City pay for with this TIF Increment?

Each TIF Area has a Plan which has identified public and private projects, activities and uses that the City will spend the TIF Increment on; by law, the TIF Increment can be used to pay for the following "redevelopment project costs":

- 1. Costs of studies, surveys, plans and other professional service costs, as well as the implementation and administration of the TIF;
- 2. Marketing sites within the TIF to prospective businesses, developers, and investors
- 3. Property assembly costs, including acquisition of land and other property, and site preparation (including the demolition of buildings);
- 4. Costs of the rehabilitation, reconstruction, repair or remodeling of existing public or private buildings;
- 5. Construction of public works and improvements, including, in some specific instances, the cost of the construction of new municipal buildings;
- 6. Job training and retraining, including payments to other taxing districts to provide such training and retraining;

¹ Annually, all real property taxes generated by: the growth in the equalized assessed value of the properties within the TIF above the equalized assessed value of these properties the time of the establishment of the TIF.

- 7. Financing costs, such as those associated with underwriting, as well as capitalized interest;
- 8. All or a portion of a taxing district's capital costs resulting from (re)development within the TIF;
- 9. A certain percentage of increased costs incurred by school districts and library districts resulting from "TIF-assisted" residential development;
- 10. Relocation costs;
- 11. Payments in lieu of taxes;
- 12. Developer's interest costs.

(the TIF Act specifically states that the TIF Increment may not be used to pay for the of construction of new privately-owned buildings ², and that none of the "redevelopment project costs" enumerated above can be paid for from the TIF Increment if the TIF Increment is used to "provide direct financial support to a retail entity initiating operations in the redevelopment project area while terminating operations at another Illinois location within 10 miles of the redevelopment project area municipality".

How does the TIF Increment pay for "redevelopment project costs"?

The TIF Increment can be used to:

- Amortize bonds or other obligations that are issued to pay for "redevelopment project costs" (public or private) incurred in the (re)development of the TIF ³;
- 2. Directly pay for the City's "redevelopment project costs";
- 3. Directly pay, or reimburse, a private developer for "redevelopment project costs".

² With one notable exception; TIF revenues may be used to help pay for the construction new housing units to be occupied by "low-income households" and "very low-income households", as such terms are defined in Section 3 of the Illinois Affordable Housing Act

³ There is no requirement that TIF bonds or other obligations be General Obligations of the City.

Can the TIF Areas be expanded?

Yes, if the "expansion area" meets the definition of, and is found to be, a "Blighted area", "Conservation area", "Industrial Park Conservation Area", (as such terms are defined in the TIF Act), or combination of any of such areas.

Can the TIF Increment be shared between the TIF Areas?

Yes, if the sharing occurs between TIF Areas that are:

- 1. Contiguous to one another, or;
- 2. Separated only by a public right of way from on another, or;
- 3. Separated only by forest preserve property, and their boundaries are less than one mile apart.

How long will the TIFs last?

Each TIF Area can collect up to 23 years of Tax Increment, and remain in place until terminated by the City.

What are the statutory requirements to establish a Business District ("BD")?

A BD that can provide the City with a direct means to assist in economic development and redevelopment can be established in an area of the City that meets the statutory definition of a "Blighted area" ¹ as found in the Business District Development and Redevelopment Law (65 ILCS 5/11-74.3 et seq.). There is neither a minimum nor maximum size for a BD, but it must be a "contiguous area which includes only parcels of real property directly and substantially benefited by the proposed business district plan".

What is the process for establishing a BD?

- 1. Research to determine that a portion the City meets the "Blighted area" definition
- 2. Develop the business district plan (Plan) for this portion of the City
- 3. Publish notices regarding a public hearing pertaining to the establishment of the BD
- 4. Hold the public hearing
- 5. Pass ordinance to establish the BD, adopt the Plan and levy the BD Tax
- 6. Provide documentation to the Illinois Department of Revenue regarding the establishment of the BD, adoption of the business district taxes and the addresses in the BD
- 7. BD Tax is levied July 1st or January 1st

What is the benefit of the BD for the City's economic (re)development effort?

Within a BD, the City levies an additional retailers' occupation tax, service occupation tax and hotel operators' occupation tax (collectively, the "BD Tax" ²) of

¹ An area which, by reason of the predominance of defective, non-existent, or inadequate street layout, unsanitary or unsafe conditions, deterioration of site improvements, improper subdivision or obsolete platting, or the existence of conditions which endanger life or property by fire or other causes, or any combination of those factors, retards the provision of housing accommodations or constitutes an economic or social liability, an economic underutilization of the area, or a menace to the public health, safety, morals, or welfare.

² The BD Tax is NOT imposed on food for human consumption that is to be consumed off the premises where it is sold (other than alcoholic beverages, soft drinks, and food that has been prepared for immediate consumption), prescription and nonprescription medicines, drugs, medical appliances and certain medical equipment; nor is it imposed on tangible personal property titled or registered with an agency of the state government.

up to 1.0% to generate revenues which can then be used to pay for a wide variety of "business district project costs".

Where is the BD Tax deposited?

Each BD has a separate account into which its respective BD Tax is deposited.

What can the City pay for with the BD Tax?

The BD Tax can be used to pay for the following "business district project costs":

- 1. Costs of studies, surveys, plans and other professional service costs, as well as the implementation, administration and marketing of the business district;
- 2. Property assembly costs, including acquisition of land and other property, and including payments to developers as reimbursement for property assembly costs;
- 3. Site preparation costs, including clearance, demolition or removal of any existing buildings, structures, fixtures, utilities, and improvements and clearing and grading of land;
- 4. Costs of installation, repair, construction, reconstruction, extension, or relocation of public streets, public utilities, and other public site improvements within or without the business district which are essential to the preparation of the business district, including payments to developers as reimbursement for site preparation costs;
- 5. Costs of renovation, rehabilitation, reconstruction, relocation, repair, or remodeling of existing public or private buildings, and including payments to developers as reimbursement for such costs;
- 6. Costs of installation or construction within the business district of buildings, streets, improvements, equipment, utilities, or fixtures, and including payments to developers as reimbursements for such costs;
- 7. Financing costs, such as those associated with underwriting, as well as capitalized interest;
- 8. Relocation costs.

(the Business District statute specifically states that BD Taxes may be used to reimburse private developers for the construction of privately owned buildings, and other public and private improvements, within the District)

How does the BD Tax pay for "business district project costs"?

The BD Tax can be used to:

- Amortize bonds or other obligations that are issued to pay for "business district project costs" (public or private) incurred in the (re)development of the BD ³;
- 2. Directly pay for the City's "business district project costs";
- 3. Reimburse a private developer for, "business district project costs".

What is a Business District Plan ("BD Plan")?

Besides certain statutory requirements (maps, legal description, street addresses and the like) the BD Plan identifies the activities and projects that the City proposes for the BD, states the rate of tax to be levied, identifies the "Business district project costs" on which the BD Tax is to be spent, and provides a description of any developer, user, or tenant of any property to be located or improved within the BD.

Can a BD be expanded?

Yes, if the "expansion area" meets the definition of, and is found to be, a "Blighted area".

How long will the City's BD last?

The BD can remain in place for up to 23 years from the date of the adoption of the ordinance imposing the BD Tax.

ORDINANCE NO. 3887

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF KEWANEE, HENRY COUNTY, ILLINOIS, ESTABLISHING THE PREVAILING RATE OF WAGES FOR LABORERS, WORKMEN AND MECHANICS EMPLOYED ON PUBLIC WORKS OF SAID CITY

WHEREAS, the State of Illinois has enacted "An Act regulating wages of laborers, mechanics and other workers employed in any public works by the State, county, city or any public body or any political subdivision or by any one under contract for public works," approved June 26, 1941, as amended, (820 ILCS 130/I et seq.); and

WHEREAS, the aforesaid Act requires that the City of Kewanee investigate and ascertain the prevailing rate of wages as defined in said Act for laborers, mechanics and other workers in the locality of said City of Kewanee employed in performing construction of public works for said City of Kewanee;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KEWANEE, HENRY COUNTY, ILLINOIS, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. To the extent and as required by "An Act regulating wages of laborers, mechanics and other workers employed in any public works by the State, county, city or any public body or any political subdivision or by any one under contract for public works," approved June 26, 1941, as amended, the general prevailing rate of wages in this locality for laborers, mechanics and other workers engaged in construction of public works coming under the jurisdiction of the City of Kewanee is hereby ascertained to be the same as the prevailing rate of wages for construction work in the Henry County area as determined by the Department of Labor of the State of Illinois as of June 5, 2017, a copy of that determination being attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference. Copies of said determination are obtainable from the City Clerk of the City of Kewanee, Illinois. As required by said Act, any and all revisions of the prevailing rate of wages by the Department of Labor of time State of Illinois shall supersede the Department's June determination and apply to any and all public works construction undertaken by the City of Kewanee. The definition of any terms appearing in this Ordinance which are also used in the aforesaid Act shall be the same as in said Act.

SECTION 2. Nothing herein contained shall be construed to apply said general prevailing rate of wages as herein ascertained to any work or employment except public works construction of the City of Kewanee to the extent required by the aforesaid Act.

SECTION 3. The City Clerk shall publicly post or keep available for inspection by an interested party in the main office of this City, this determination or any revisions of such prevailing rate of wage. A copy of this determination or of the current revised determination of prevailing rate of wages then in effect shall be attached to all contract specifications.

SECTION 4. The City Clerk shall mail a copy of this determination to any employer, and to any association of employers and to any person or association of employees who have filed their names and addresses, requesting copies of any determination stating the particular rates and the particular class of workers whose wages will be affected by such rates.

SECTION 5. The City Clerk shall promptly file a certified copy of this Ordinance with both the Secretary of State Index Division and the Department of Labor of the State of Illinois.

SECTION 6. The City Clerk shall cause to be published in a newspaper of general circulation within the area a copy of this Ordinance an abbreviated copy of the ordinance to announce that the same has been passed and is on file, and such publication shall constitute notice that the determination is effective and that this is the determination of this public body, with the complete ordinance to be published and made available for public inspection in pamphlet form.

SECTION 7. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict.

SECTION 8. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval, and publication as required by law.

HENRY COUNTY

COMMUNICATIONS TECHNICIAN (SE) - Townships of Annawan, Cambridge,

Burns, Kewanee, Weller, Galva, and Wethersfield.

ELECTRICIANS AND ELECTRONIC SYSTEMS TECHNICIAN (NW) - That portion

North and West of Annawan, Burns, Cambridge, and Weller Townships.

MILLWRIGHT (NORTH) - North of interstate 80.

OPERATING ENGINEERS (EAST) - The eastern half of the county divided by highway 82 excluding Geneseo.

The following list is considered as those days for which holiday rates of wages for work performed apply: New Years Day, Memorial Day, Fourth of July, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Day and Veterans Day in some classifications/counties. Generally, any of these holidays which fall on a Sunday is celebrated on the following Monday. This then makes work performed on that Monday payable at the appropriate overtime rate for holiday pay. Common practice in a given local may alter certain days of celebration. If in doubt, please check with IDOL.

Oil and chip resealing (O&C) means the application of road oils and liquid asphalt to coat an existing road surface, followed by application of aggregate chips or gravel to coated surface, and subsequent rolling of material to seal the surface.

EXPLANATION OF CLASSES

ASBESTOS - GENERAL - removal of asbestos material/mold and hazardous materials from any place in a building, including mechanical systems where those mechanical systems are to be removed. This includes the removal of asbestos materials/mold and hazardous materials from ductwork or pipes in a building when the building is to be demolished at the time or at some close future date.

ASBESTOS - MECHANICAL - removal of asbestos material from mechanical systems, such as pipes, ducts, and boilers, where the mechanical systems are to remain.

CERAMIC TILE FINISHER, MARBLE FINISHER, TERRAZO FINISHER

Assisting, helping or supporting the tile, marble and terrazzo mechanic by performing their historic and traditional work assignments required to complete the proper installation of the work covered by said crafts. The term "Ceramic" is used for naming the classification only and is in no way a limitation of the product handled. Ceramic takes into consideration most hard tiles.

COMMUNICATIONS TECHNICIAN - Southeast

Installation, operation, inspection, maintenance, repair and service of radio, television, recording, voice, sound and vision production and reproduction, telephone and telephone interconnect, facsimile, equipment and appliances used for domestic, commercial, educational and entertainment purposes, pulling of wire through conduit but not the installation of conduit.

ELECTRONIC SYSTEMS TECHNICIAN - Northwest

Installing, assembling and maintaining sound and intercom, protection alarm (security), master antenna television, closed circuit television, computer hardware and software programming and installation to the network's outlet and input (EXCLUDING all cabling, power and cable termination work historically performed by wiremen), door monitoring and control, nurse and emergency call programming and installation to the system's outlet and input (EXCLUDING all cabling, power and cable termination work historically performed by wiremen), clock and timing; and the installation and maintenance of transmit and receive antennas, transmitters, receivers, and associated apparatus which operates in conjunction with the above systems. All work associated with these system installations will be included EXCEPT (1) installation of protective metallic conduit, excluding less than ten-foot runs strictly for protection of cable, and (2) 120 volt AC (or higher) power wiring and associated hardware.

LABORER, SKILLED - BUILDING

The skilled laborer building (BLD) classification shall encompass the following types of work, irrespective of the site of the work: tending of carpenters in unloading, handling, stockpiling and distribution operations, also other building crafts, mixing, handling, and conveying of all materials used by masons, plasterers and other building construction crafts, whether done by hand or by any process. The drying of plastering when done by salamander heat, and the cleaning and clearing of all debris. All work pertaining to and in preparation of asbestos abatement and removal. The building of scaffolding and staging for masons and plasterers. The excavations for buildings and all other construction, digging, of trenches, piers, foundations and holes, digging, lagging, sheeting, cribbing, bracing and propping of foundations, holes, caissons, cofferdams, and dikes, the setting of all guidelines for machine or hand excavation and subgrading. The mixing, handling, conveying, pouring, vibrating, gunniting and otherwise applying of concrete, whether by hand or other method of concrete for any walls, foundations, floors, or for other construction concrete sealant men. The wrecking, stripping, dismantling, and handling of concrete forms and false work, and the

building of centers for fireproofing purposes. Boring machine, gas, electric or air in preparation for shoving pipe, telephone cable, and so forth, under highways, roads, streets and alleys. All hand and power operating cross cut saws when used for clearing. All work in compressed air construction. All work on acetylene burners in salvaging. The blocking and tamping of concrete. The laying of sewer tile and conduit, and pre-cast materials. The assembling and dismantling of all jacks and sectional scaffolding, including elevator construction and running of slip form jacks. The work of drill running and blasting, including wagon drills. The wrecking, stripping, dismantling, cleaning, moving and oiling of forms. The cutting off of concrete piles. The loading, unloading, handling and carrying to place of installation of all rods, (and materials for use in reinforcing) concrete and the hoisting of same and all signaling where hoist is used in this type of construction coming under the jurisdiction of the Laborers' Union. And, all other labor work not awarded to any other craft. Mortar mixers, kettlemen and carrier of hot stuff, tool crib men, watchmen (Laborer), firemen or salamander tenders, flagmen, deck hands, installation and maintenance of temporary gas-fired heating units, gravel box men, dumpmen and spotters, fencing Laborers, cleaning lumber, pit men, material

checkers, dispatchers, unloading explosives, asphalt plant laborers, writer of scale tickets, fireproofing laborers, janitors, asbestos abatement and removal laborers, handling of materials treated with oil, creosote, chloride, asphalt, and/or foreign material harmful to skin or clothing, Laborers with de-watering systems, gunnite nozzle men, laborers tending masons with hot material or where foreign materials are used, Laborers handling masterplate or similar materials, laser beam operator, concrete burning machine operator, material selector men working with firebrick or combustible material, dynamite men, track laborers, cement handlers, chloride handlers, the unloading and laborers with steel workers and re-bars, concrete workers (wet), luteman, asphalt raker, curb asphalt machine operator, ready mix scalemen, permanent, portable or temporary plant drilling machine operator, plaster tenders, underpinning and shoring of buildings, fire watch, signaling of all power equipment, to include trucks excavating equipment, etc., tree topper or trimmer when in connection to construction, tunnel helpers in free air, batch dumpers, kettle and tar men, tank cleaners, plastic installers, scaffold workers, motorized buggies or motorized unit used for wet concrete or handling of building materials, sewer workers, rod and chain men, vibrator operators, mortar mixer operator, cement silica, clay, fly

ash, lime and plasters, handlers (bulk or bag), cofferdam workers, on concrete paving, placing, cutting and tying of reinforcing, deck hand, dredge hand and shore laborers, bankmen on floating plant, asphalt workers with machine & layers, grade checker, power tools, caisson workers, lead man on sewer work, welders, cutters, burners and torch men, chain saw operators, paving breaker, jackhammer and drill operator, layout man and/or drainage tile layer, steel form setters --street and highway, air tamping hammerman, signal man on crane, concrete saw operator, screen man on asphalt pavers, front end man on chip spreader, multiple concrete duct -- lead man.

LABORER, SKILLED - HIGHWAY

The skilled laborer heavy and highway (HWY) classification shall encompass the following types of work, irrespective of the site of the work: handling of materials treated with oil, creosote, asphalt and/or any foreign materials harmful to skin or clothing, track laborers, chloride handlers, the unloading and loading with steel workers and re-bars, concrete workers (wet), tunnel helpers in free air, batch dumpers, mason tenders, kettle and tar men, plastic installers, scaffold workers, motorized buggies or motorized unit used

for wet concrete or handling of building materials, laborers with de-watering systems, sewer workers plus depth, rod and chainmen, vibrator operators, mortar mixer operators, cement silica, clay, fly ash, lime and plasters, handlers (bulk or bag), cofferdam workers plus depth, on concrete paving, placing, cutting and tying or reinforcing, deck hand, dredge hand shore laborers, bankmen on floating plant, asphalt workers with machine, and layers, grade checker, power tools, stripping of all concrete forms excluding paving forms, dumpmen and spotters, when necessary, caisson workers plus depth, gunnite nozzle men, welders, cutters, burners and torchmen, chain saw operators, paving breaker, jackhammer and drill operators, layout man and/or drainage tile layer, steel form setters - street and highway, air tamping hammerman, signal man on crane, concrete saw operator, screedman on asphalt pavers, front end man on chip spreader, multiple concrete duct, luteman, asphalt raker, curb asphalt machine operator, ready mix scalemen (portable or temporary plant), laser beam operator, concrete burning machine operator, and coring machine operator.

CAT Earthwork Compactors and Similar Types; Blaw Knox Spreader and Similar Types; Trench Machines; Pump Crete - Belt Crete - Squeeze Crete - Screw Type Pumps and Gypsum (operator will clean); Creter Crane; Operation of Concrete Pump Truck; Formless Finishing Machines; Flaherty Spreader or Similar Types; Screed Man on Laydown Machine; Vermeer Concrete Saw; Operation of Laser Screed; Span Saw; Dredge Leverman; Dredge Engineer; Lull or Similar Type; Hydro-Boom Truck; Operation of Guard Rail Machine; and Starting Engineer on Pipeline or Construction (11 or more pieces) including: Air Compressor (Trailer Mounted), All Forced Air Heaters (regardless of Size), Water Pumps (Greater than 4-1/2" or Total Discharge Over 4-1/2"), Light Plants, Generators (Trailer Mounted - Excluding Decontamination Trailer), Welding Machines (Any Size or Mode of Power), Conveyor, Mixer (any size), Stud Welder, Power Pac, etc, and Ground Heater (Trailer Mounted).

CLASS 2. Bulker & Pump; Power Launches; Boring Machine & Pipe Jacking Machine; Dinkeys; Operation of Carts, Powered Haul Unit for a Boring Machine; P & H One Pass Soil Cement Machines and Similar Types; Wheel Tractors (Industry or Farm Type - Other); Back Fillers; Euclid Loader; Fork Lifts; Jeep w/Ditching Machine or Other Attachments; Tunneluger;

Automatic Cement & Gravel Batching Plants; Mobile Drills - Soil Testing and Similar Types; Pugmill with Pump; All (1) and (2) Drum Hoists; Dewatering System; Straw Blower; Hydro-Seeder; Bump Grinders (self-propelled); Assistant Heavy Equipment Greaser; Apsco Spreader; Tractors (Track-Type) without Power Units Pulling Rollers; Rollers on Asphalt - Brick or Macadam; Concrete Breakers; Concrete Spreaders; Cement Strippers; Cement Finishing Machines & CMI Texture & Reel Curing Machines; Vibro-Tampers (All Similar Types Self-Propelled); Mechanical Bull Floats; Self-Propelled Concrete Saws; Truck Mounted Power Saws; Operation of Curb Cutters; Mixers - Over Three (3) Bags; Winch and Boom Trucks; Tractor Pulling Power Blade or Elevating Grader; Porter Rex Rail; Clary Screed; Mule Pulling Rollers; Pugmill without Pump; Barber Greene or Similar Loaders; Track Type Tractor w/Power Unit attached (minimum); Fireman; Spray Machine on Paving; Curb Machines; Paved Ditch Machine; Power Broom; Self-Propelled Sweepers; Self-Propelled Conveyors; Power Subgrader; Oil Distributor; Straight Tractor; Truck Crane Oiler; Truck Type Oilers; Directional Boring Machine; Horizontal Directional Drill; Articulating End Dump Vehicles: Starting Engineer on Pipeline or Construction (6 -10 pieces) including: Air Compressor (Trailer Mounted), All Forced Air Heaters (regardless of Size), Water Pumps (Greater than 4-1/2" or

Total Discharge Over 4-1/2"), Light Plants, Generators (Trailer Mounted - Excluding Decontamination Trailer), Welding Machines (Any Size or Mode of Power), Conveyor, Mixer (any size), Stud Welder, Power Pac, etc., and Ground Heater (Trailer Mounted).

CLASS 3. Straight Framed Truck Mounted Vac Unit (separately powered); Trac Air Machine (without attachments); Rollers - Five Ton and Under on Earth and Gravel; Form Graders; Bulk Cement Plant; Oilers; and Starting Engineer on Pipeline or Construction (3 - 5 pieces) including: Air Compressor (Trailer Mounted), All Forced Air Heaters (regardless of Size), Water Pumps (Greater than 4-1/2" or Total Discharge Over 4-1/2"), Light Plants, Generators (Trailer Mounted -Excluding Decontamination Trailer), Welding Machines (Any Size or Mode of Power), Conveyor, Mixer (any size), Stud Welder, Power Pac, etc., and Ground Heater (Trailer Mounted).

SURVEY WORKER - Operated survey equipment including data collectors, G.P.S. and robotic instruments, as well as conventional levels and transits.

TRUCK DRIVER - BUILDING, HEAVY AND HIGHWAY CONSTRUCTION

Class 1. Drivers on 2 axle trucks hauling less than 9 ton. Air compressor and welding machines and brooms, including those pulled by separate units, truck driver helpers, warehouse employees, mechanic helpers, greasers and tiremen, pickup trucks when hauling materials, tools, or workers to and from and on-the-job site, and fork lifts up to 6,000 lb. capacity.

Class 2. Two or three axle trucks hauling more than 9 ton but hauling less than 16 ton. A-frame winch trucks, hydrolift trucks, vactor trucks or similar equipment when used for transportation purposes. Fork lifts over 6,000 lb. capacity, winch trucks, four axle combination units, and ticket writers.

Class 3. Two, three or four axle trucks hauling 16 ton or more. Drivers on water pulls, articulated dump trucks, mechanics and working forepersons, and dispatchers. Five axle or more combination units.

Class 4. Low Boy and Oil Distributors.

Class 5. Drivers who require special protective clothing while employed on hazardous waste work.

TRUCK DRIVER - OIL AND CHIP RESEALING ONLY.

This shall encompass laborers, workers and mechanics who drive contractor or subcontractor owned, leased, or hired pickup, dump, service, or oil distributor trucks. The work includes transporting materials and equipment (including but not limited to, oils, aggregate supplies, parts, machinery and tools) to or from the job site; distributing oil or liquid asphalt and aggregate; stock piling material when in connection with the actual oil and chip contract. The Truck Driver (Oil & Chip Resealing) wage classification does not include supplier delivered materials.

Other Classifications of Work:

For definitions of classifications not otherwise set out, the Department generally has on file such definitions which are available. If a task to be performed is not subject to one of the classifications of pay set out, the Department will upon being contacted state which neighboring county has such a classification and provide such rate, such rate being deemed to exist by reference in this document. If no neighboring county rate applies to the task, the Department shall undertake a special determination, such special determination being then deemed to have existed under this determination. If a project requires these, or any classification not listed, please contact IDOL at 217-782-1710 for wage rates or clarifications.

LANDSCAPING

Landscaping work falls under the existing classifications for laborer, operating engineer and truck driver. The work performed by landscape plantsman and landscape laborer is covered by the existing classification of laborer. The work performed by landscape operators (regardless of equipment used or its size) is covered by the classifications of operating engineer. The work performed by landscape truck drivers (regardless of size of truck driven) is covered by the classifications of truck driver.

RESOLUTION NO. 5057

A RESOLUTION TO AUTHORIZE THE TEMPORARY CLOSURE OF SECOND & MAIN STREETS, US RTE. 34 AND STATE HWY. 78, FOR THE ANNUAL HOG DAYS PARADE AND DECLARING THAT THIS RESOLUTION SHALL BE IN FULL FORCE AND EFFECT UPON PASSAGE, AND IN ACCORDANCE WITH LAW.

- WHEREAS, the Ambassador Club of the Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring a Hog Days Parade in the City of Kewanee, and such event constitutes a public purpose; and
- WHEREAS, this Hog Days Parade will require the temporary closure of portions of Second Street (from East Street to Main Street) and/or US Rte. 34, and Main Street (from Second Street to Central Blvd.), as well as US Rte. 34 and State Hwy. in the City of Kewanee; and
- WHEREAS, Section 4-408 of the Illinois Highway Code authorizes the Department of Transportation (IDOT) to issue permits to local authorities to temporarily close portions of State Highways for such public purposes.

BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of Kewanee:

- Section 1: Permission to close off US Rte. 34 along Second Street from East Street to Main Street, and US Rte. 34 and State Route 78 along Main Street from Second Street to Central Blvd., as designated above, be requested of the IDOT.
- Section 2: This closure shall occur during the approximate time period between 2:00 P. M. and 4:00 P.M. on Saturday, September 2, 2017, for the specified purpose of holding the Hog Days Parade.
- Section 3: Traffic from that closed portion of highway shall be detoured over routes with an all-weather surface that can accept the anticipated traffic, which will be maintained to the satisfaction of the Department and which is conspicuously marked for the benefit of traffic diverted from the State Highway. Where appropriate the parking of vehicles shall be prohibited on the detour routes to allow an uninterrupted flow of two-way traffic. The detour route shall be as follows

Driving North on Rte.'s US34 & IL78: Turn West on to West Prospect Street; thence North on Grove Street; thence Northeast on to Commercial Street; thence North on Park Street; thence East on to 5th Street; thence North on to Main Street (Hwy. 78). Route 34 only turns east on to 9th Street, thence South on Kent Street to Railroad Avenue on South side of railway line; thence East on to Rte. 34. The detour route is the reciprocal for traffic in the opposite direction.

Section 4: The City of Kewanee assumes full responsibility for the direction, protection, and regulation of the traffic during the time the detour is in effect; and that police officers or authorized flaggers shall, at the expense of the City of Kewanee be positioned at each end of the closed section and at other points (such as intersections) as may be necessary to assist in directing traffic through the detour; and that police officers, flaggers, and officials shall permit emergency vehicles in emergency situations to pass through the closed area as swiftly as is safe for all concerned.

Section 5:	All debris shall be removed by the City prior to reopening the State Highway; and that such signs, flags, barricades, etc., shall be used as may be approved by the Illinois Department of Transportation. These items shall be provided by the City; and the closure and detour shall be marked according to the Illinois Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices.
Section 6:	An occasional break shall be made in the procession so that traffic may pass through. In any event, adequate provisions will be made for traffic on intersecting highways pursuant to conditions noted above.
Section 7:	The City of Kewanee hereby agrees to assume all liabilities and pay all claims for any damage which shall be occasioned by the closing described above: and that the City shall provide a comprehensive general liability insurance policy or an additional insured endorsement in the amount of \$ 1,000,000 per person and \$2,000,000 aggregate which has the Illinois Department of Transportation and its officials, employees, and agents as insured and which protects them from all claims arising from the requested road closing.
Section 8:	The City Clerk shall forward a copy of this Resolution to IDOT to serve as a formal request for the permission sought in this Resolution and to operate as part of the conditions of said permission.
Section 9	This Resolution shall be in full force and effect immediately upon its passage and approval as provided by law.


