CLOSED MEETING AT 6:00 P.M. REGULAR MEETING AT 7:00 P.M.

- 1. **Enterprise Zone** —The first Enterprise Zone Board Meeting will be in Springfield on August 29, at 9 am. We should find out where we are in the rankings. I'll be at the meeting. The City Administrator from Geneseo will determine early next week if she is able to attend, and my understanding is that a staff member from Bi-State also plans to attend.
- 2. **Police Training** Lieutenant Rivord will be putting on an eight hour long Active Threat Class in one of the local schools for all patrol officers during the Christmas Break. The class is a result of the 'train the trainer' course he attended during the summer.

A rifle class for all patrol officers is tentatively scheduled for September, which will be a first step in getting all of the officers trained to Tactical Patrol Officer status, which would be of great value in the unfortunate event of an active shooter incident.

Earlier this month, Chief Ainley attended the Midwest Security & Police Conference August 14th-15th, where he received training in officer self-awareness and the frontline leaders role, trauma informed approach to sex crimes and other violent crimes, Next Gen 911, Civil liability/risk management, and strengthening law enforcements response to subjects with mental illness.

- 3. **Fire Academy Training**—Blair and Horn graduated from the Peoria Fire Academy. Their accomplishment was noted in the Star Courier, as well as the upcoming Residential Newsletter.
- 4. **Star Courier** Chief Ainley worked with the newspaper to prepare a series of crime prevention articles that ran this week in the newspaper. With permission from the Star Courier, copies of the first four articles are included in the packet for your review.
- 5. **Residential Newsletter** The next residential newsletter is complete in draft form and will go to the printer next week.
- 6. **Tenney Street Sewer** Unless something unplanned occurs, the work involved with digging in the roadway is complete and the rest of the project should involve only a minimal amount of disruption.

- 7. **Kewanee Life Skills Reentry Center** Residents of the facility worked with Keith Edwards to spruce up the appearance of portions of the Hog Days Parade route earlier in the week. Work today was put on hold due to the weather. They are expected to provide assistance again next week.
- 8. **Street Maintenance Program** Weather delays have prevented Advanced Asphalt from completing this year's improvements. Weather permitting, they will wrap up on Monday.
- 9. **Civil Service Commission**—The Civil Service Commission will be meeting next Wednesday to begin the process for developing a hiring list for clerical positions and will certify the hiring list for Telecommunicators.
- 10. **County-wide Economic Development Position** The County has re-advertised the position and hopes to repeat the process that was complete a couple of months ago. One new wrench thrown into the mix is the recent resignation of the County Administrator, because it will provide candidates with uncertainty regarding their future boss and that person's level of support to the addition of the newly created position.
- 11. **City-wide Cleanup** The next city-wide clean-up will be on October 27th at the former site of the hospital. As always, volunteer efforts would be greatly appreciated.
- 12. **Finance Charge** The \$1.23 finance charge added by Moore Tire was the result of an invoice not being turned in it time for the check to be cut to pay the bill before its due date. Moore Tire has waived the fee and issued the City a credit for \$1.23.
- 13. **Audit** The audit is nearly complete and is currently being reviewed within the firm. It will be presented for your consideration in October.

COUNCIL MEETING 18-15 AUGUST 13, 2018

The City Council met in Council Chambers at 6:00 PM with the Mayor calling the meeting to order and the following answering to roll call:

Council Member Colomer made a motion to adjourn to executive session pursuant to Section 2 (c) (1) of the Open Meetings Act to discuss personnel and Section 2 (c)(2) to discuss collective bargaining. Council Member Faber seconded the motion. Roll call showed 5 ayes, no nays. The motion passed.

The executive session was adjourned at 6:46 PM on a motion made by Council Member Faber and seconded by Council Member Colomer. Roll call showed 5 ayes, no nays. The motion passed.

Mayor Looney called the regular Council Meeting to order at 7 PM, stating that the Council was reconvening following a closed session pursuant to Section 2(c)(1) of the Open Meetings Act to discuss personnel and Section 2(c)(2) to discuss collective bargaining.

The Pledge of Allegiance was said.

Mayor Looney asked for a moment of silence for our troops still fighting overseas.

Mayor Looney explained that the next items were placed on the consent agenda and were considered to be routine in nature to be passed as a whole with one vote of the Council. Mayor Looney requested that any member of the Council or the audience wishing to have an item removed from the consent agenda for individual consideration to make the request and the item would be removed and considered following the approval of the remaining consent items. The consent agenda included minutes from the July 23, 2018 Council Meeting, payroll for the pay period ending August 4, 2018 in the amount of \$206,50036, reports from Bock, Inc. and the Police Department, a request from Step Ladder Tutoring to conduct Tag Days on Friday, August 31, 2018 and Saturday, September 1, 2018 from 10 am to 2 pm, a request from the Kewanee High School Class of 1988 for the closure of Cottage Street from Commercial to First Street for parking cars during their class reunion, and a request from Relay for Life to hold tag days on Saturday, August 25 from 9 am to 12 pm. The consent agenda items were approved on a motion made by Council Member Yaklich and seconded by Council Member Colomer. Roll call showed 5 ayes, no nays. The motion passed.

Bills submitted for approval totaling \$815,017.57 were approved on a motion made by Council Member Faber and seconded by Council Member Colomer. Council Member Koehler questioned the purchase from Galva Iron & Metal. Grounds Maintenance Manager Newton noted that the material was purchased to make brackets for the trailer that would be used to transport the mini-excavator recently purchased. Council Member Koehler also questioned the payout for sick time for retiring firefighter Gillespie. City Manager Bradley reported that the sick payout was in exchange for a contractual obligation regarding insurance that was approved in the last contract. Council Member Yaklich inquired about the PEHP payment. City Manager Bradley explained that PEHP was an acronym for Post-Employment Health Plan that was approved in the most recent contract with the fire department. Council Member Yaklich noted a finance charge from Moore Tires. City Manager Bradley stated that he would research the reason for the late fee. Roll call showed 5 ayes, no nays. The motion passed.

CITIZEN PARTICIPATION

Mayor Looney then asked if anyone wished to speak regarding a non-agenda item. There being no such requests Mayor Looney moved on to new business.

NEW BUSINESS

The minutes from the Zoning Board of Appeals from its meeting on July 25, 2018 were accepted on a motion made by Council Member Colomer and seconded by Council Member Yaklich. Roll call showed 5 ayes, no nays. The motion passed.

Ordinance #3938 granting James Wiggin, 311 Fifth Avenue, a variance of seven feet for the maximum allowable height of an accessory structure was approved on a motion made by Council Member Faber and seconded by Council Member Koehler. Council Member Yaklich noted that there were no objectors at the Board of Appeals Meeting. Roll call showed 4 ayes, no nays, with Council Member Faber abstaining as he was a neighbor to the requestor. The motion passed.

The minutes from the Plan Commission from its meeting on July 26, 2018 were accepted on a motion made by Council Member Colomer and seconded by Council Member Yaklich. Roll call showed 5 ayes, no nays. The motion passed.

Ordinance #3939 granting a special use permit to Chelsea O'Connor for a spray tan salon at 233 West Division Street was approved on a motion made by Council Member Faber and seconded by Council Member Colomer. Council Member Yaklich noted his attendance at the Plan Commission meeting and further stated that the Plan Commission was very thorough. Roll call showed 5 ayes, no nays. The motion passed.

Resolution #5122 authorizing the use of the public alley and parking area in the 200 block of West Second Street by Hype, Inc. d/b/a Cerno's Bar & Grill in conjunction with Hog Days was approved on a motion made by Council Member Colomer and seconded by Council Member Faber. It was noted that this was the recurring location. Roll call showed 5 ayes, no nays. The motion passed.

Ordinance #3940 awarding the demolition of 1022 North East Street to Dana construction was approved on a motion made by Council Member Yaklich and seconded by Council Member Colomer. Council Member Yaklich agreed that the demolitions were needed, but also noted that we should commend people for fixing up properties. City Manager Bradley agreed that both programs were needed. Council Member Yaklich noted the grant programs available for both programs, as well. Roll call showed 5 ayes, no nays. The motion passed.

Resolution #5123 appointing members to the Plan Commission was approved on a motion made by Council Member Faber and seconded by Council Member Colomer. Council Member Yaklich stated his concerns with one of the candidates and an ongoing zoning issue. City Manager Bradley suggested that when individuals become a member of a commission they tend to gain a better understanding of requirements; further suggesting that the Council consider if the individual has the ability to serve on the Commission. Council Member Koehler noted that it was great to have a young person step forward to serve the community. He was confident that the zoning issue would be temporary. The remaining Council Members and the Mayor agreed that it was good to have a person that volunteered. Roll call showed 4 ayes, 1 nay, with Council Member Yaklich casting the dissenting vote. The motion passed.

OTHER BUSINESS

Council Member Faber requested the information regarding the cost of opening the Transfer Station a couple of Saturdays each month. He reported that he has seen a significant number of people get out to the Transfer Station and turn around while he has been volunteering at the Animal Control Facility. Operations Manager Johnson noted that two years prior the service was being underutilized so they shortened the time frame of offering Saturdays. City Manager Bradley agreed that we could open it up two Saturdays a month through September to see if it would be better utilized.

Council Member Colomer noted excessively tall weeds along the railroad near the Kent Street crossing. City Manager Bradley reported that staff had been in contact with Burlington Northern without much success. Council Member Colomer then noted that the kids would be returning to school, so to be more cautious when traveling.

Council Member Faber asked if there were any programs being planned for anti-bullying. Police Chief Ainley reported that the Police Department was working with the Henry County Mental Health Alliance to institute an anti-bullying program, but the program was in its very early stages.

Council Member Koehler noted that the parking lot near the high school would have a north exit and may be ready prior to the first football game. He commended the City Engineer for his work with the school on the project.

Council Member Yaklich noted that the newly paved streets would be painted soon, suggesting that it would be an opportune time to establish a bike lane if possible on some of the roads. City Manager Bradley reported on his review of the situation with City Engineer Nobel, noting

concerns about narrowing streets and lack of connectivity to other areas that would be suitable for bike lanes.

Mayor Looney also encouraged extra vigilance while traveling due to the schools reconvening.

ANNOUNCEMENTS

City Clerk Edwards announced that there would be no bulk brush collection between August 23 and September 6, 2018 while City crews would be busy preparing for Hog Days. Bulk Brush was collected on Tuesdays and Thursdays. Residents were urged to plan accordingly to avoid brush piles during Hog Days. She also announced that City Hall offices would be closed on Monday, September 3, in observance of Labor Day. There would be no landscape waste collection that week, with no other planned changes to the trash collection schedule.

There being no further business, Council Member Faber moved to adjourn the meeting and Council Member Colomer seconded the motion. Roll call showed 5 ayes, no nays. The meeting adjourned at 7:48 PM.

July 2018 Public Works Department Report

The Sanitation Division picked up 537960 lbs of curbside garbage, 67500 lbs of curbside recycling and 48300 lbs of curbside landscape waste in the month of July 2018. The Sanitation Division welcomed their new full time employee Tony Ruzas on July 3rd.

The Water Division replaced 3 curbstops and repaired 9 leaking water service lines. The Water Division repaired 2 water main breaks. They delivered 120 red tag notices that resulted in 23 water services being shut-off at the curbstop. Of those delinquent accounts 20 have been paid and service re-instated. Water staff terminated 3 water services that made the list of properties that are up for demolition. The water staff terminated a water service on Fischer Ave that was abandoned for East 4th Street. The water staff replaced 76 mxu/meters and 91 had customer water service or account transfers. The water crew preformed 9 leak checks for water account customers. The water division had 9 after hour's customer assist service calls.

The Street Division picked up 136 cubic yards of bulk brush. The Street/Sewer handled 6 after hour's customer assist service calls. Both the Street and Sanitation Divisions have been reestablishing the right of ways and replacing sidewalks after sewer repairs and tree removals. The Street Division has been replacing damaged signs as needed. The street and sanitation staff have been trimming low hanging limbs that are within the right of way. The crew provided traffic control and assisted SNS Tree Service with cutting all of the tree obstructions along RT 34 from May Street to McClure Street. The Street crew repaired 3 storm inlets and replaced a storm line at Edwards and Church streets. The Street and Sewer crews assisted Ratliff Bros. with 3 emergency sewer repairs at Division and Gilbert, East and McKinley, Lyle and Main, Central Blvd and Vine. The crew also replaced the pavement on East Prospect from a previous sewer repairs.

The Sewer camera crew has been cleaning and televising trouble areas throughout the system.

Public works located 220 utility Julie locates for the Julie 1 call system. The Public Works also assisted the Prairie Chicken festival with traffic control and temporary water service.

The Plan Commission convened at 7:00 p.m. on August 23, 2018 Kewanee City Hall, Council Chambers. Commission members Minella, Mirocha and Sayers were absent. For business, there was the continuation hearing to revoke the Special Use Permit for You're Approved Auto Sales.

The minutes from August 23, 2018 and report are at the bottom of this memorandum.

Case Number 1:

525 N Main St., which is located at the Southwest corner of N. main St and W. 6th St. Special Use Permit Petition to allow Automobile, Truck, Trailer, Tractor or Bus Storage yard, Operable Vehicles Only.

Jon Willie petitioned the Plan Commission for a Special Use Permit at the May 24, 2018 meeting. The Property owner, Kenneth Ryan, signed the application as the Landowner, which served as affidavit for Willie to apply for the permit.

Legal Description: S95 OF N115 LOT 1, EX HWY, WILLARD & MORSES NORTH SUB CITY OF

KEWANEE [EZ], Henry County, Illinois.

Facts of the case:



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Prior to the May 24, 2018 Plan Commission meeting I researched the street file and history of this parcel, and found no Special Use Permit or Plan Commission activity for used car sales or vehicle storage. I met with Willie and also spoke with Ryan on the phone and advised them that the current use (storage of vehicles) requires a Special Use Permit.

It was also noted that Willie stated that the State of Illinois, since the parcel is located along a state right of way, will not allow for the sale of vehicles upon the parcel involved because there is no building on the parcel. Willie stated that the State will allow the vehicles to be parked there as long as there are no "For Sale" signs or prices on the vehicles. Willie performs no transactions on this parcel and if a customer is interested in a vehicle, Willie has one of his employees bring the vehicle across the street for the customer to look at the vehicle, test drive it or any other inspections or transactions related to the vehicle.

After hearing the case, The Plan Commission made a recommendation to the City Council to grant the Special Use permit with the following stipulations.

- With exception to registrations, all vehicles must be 100% operable in every aspect.
 No flat tires, no broken windows, no wrecked or junk vehicles, no missing parts of any sort.
- No part of any vehicle shall overhang or block the city sidewalk.
- Storage of light trucks and passenger vehicles only.
- Vehicles must be parked neatly and be able to be driven off the property without having to move another vehicle out of the way thus allowing for passage throughout the property.
- Access to all vehicles must be available to Fire Department personnel.
- All of the above must be complied with no later than June 30, 2018. If compliance is not met to the satisfaction of the City, a hearing to revoke the Special Use Permit will be held.

The City Council accepted the Plan Commissions recommendation and granted the Special Use permit at the May 29, 2018 City Council Meeting.

On July 2, 2018, I inspected the subject property and found the property in violation of the stipulations set forth in the Special Use permit. There were several vehicles with flat tires, partially wrecked and stored in violation of the fourth and fifth stipulations noted above.

With the results of the inspection on July 2, 2018 being considered, the Plan Commission shall hold a hearing on July 26, 2018 to discuss the revocation of the Special Use permit and order the removal of the vehicles from the subject property.

The Public Hearing:





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At 7:09 p.m. on July 26, 2018, the hearing to revoke the proposed Special use Permit to allow an Automobile, Truck, Trailer, Tractor or Bus Storage yard, Operable Vehicles Only was held. **Jon Willie** dba You're Approved Auto Sales of Kewanee, Illinois, was present to represent the application.

- Commission Chair Morrison advised Willie that this meeting is a hearing to
 potentially revoke the special use permit. Morrison stated that Willie failed to meet
 the stipulations placed on the special use permit and reminded Willie of all of the
 stipulations (noted above).
- Willie apologized that this ever became an issue. Willie claimed that there is a truck
 and trailer on the lot that he uses to block repossessed vehicles in so the owner
 cannot drive the vehicles away. Willie said he was "careless" when he agreed to the
 stipulations and that the actual purpose of this lot is not able to follow the
 stipulations. Willie stated that he did not think the stipulations would be so literal.
- Willie claimed by state law that a repossessed vehicle cannot be stored on the same lot where vehicles are for sale and he must keep the vehicle for 21 days before disposing of the vehicle. Edwards asked if Willie had that statute number? Willie did not. Edwards stated he would ask for verification of this law from the City Attorney.
- Willie stated that the stipulation requiring vehicle passage through the lot is something he would never agree too.
- Willie recalled from the first meeting requesting the special use permit that he
 originally requested 60 days to comply with the stipulations but the Plan
 Commission only gave him 30 days. Commission member Mirocha stated that Willie
 basically got 60 days because the deadline for compliance was June 30th.
- Willie claimed that he removed and/or disposed of 46 broken cars from the lot from the time of the May 24th meeting.
- The Commission members reviewed the photos that were taken earlier in the day by Edwards. It was noted that several vehicles had flat tires or were wrecked or missing parts.
- Willie stated he would like modifications to the stipulations to make the lot usable for his business.
- Morrison asked Willie what changes he was proposing. Willie wants the stipulations
 requiring the vehicles to be operable and passage throughout the lot/removal of
 vehicles without having to move other vehicles to be lifted.
- Minella asked if Willie needs more time to comply. Willie responded that he felt he
 was in compliance at the time of the meeting. Morrison pointed out several vehicles
 in the photos taken this same day with wrecked or missing parts and flat tires.
- Morrison stated that the property "just doesn't look good."
- Morrison asked Edwards to comment on the case. Edwards stated that the City
 wants to be business friendly and does not wish to run any business out of town. On
 the same note, this property is one of the first things seen by our residents and





- visitors and that Hog Days is coming up very soon and the City would like to set our best foot forward. The City would like to work with Willie as much as possible.
- Morrison reminded Willie of the stipulations that Willie agreed to and that the Plan Commission placed these stipulations because the City wants the property to look nice.
- Edelman stated that he felt it looks better but it is still not in compliance.
- Costenson asked if there was a way to make the stipulations such that Willie could be in compliance yet make it so the property is not such an eyesore. Edwards replied that the Commission could make whatever recommendation to the City Council the Commission sees acceptable.
- Willie stated that he was not aware of the stipulations until he arrived at the May 24th meeting. Edwards reminded Willie that the stipulations and meeting agenda where mailed to Willie and the Plan Commission prior to the May 24th meeting.
- Morrison stated that if Willie wishes to change the stipulations on the special use permit that Willie would need to re-apply for the special use permit with the stipulations changes to be held at a future hearing.
- City Manager, Gary Bradley, who was present, offered some thoughts on the case. Bradley stated that Willie's business serves a valuable role in the community in that they offer vehicles to people who may not be able to afford a newer/nicer vehicle but need reliable transportation to and from work, it also generates sales tax revenue and employs people. Bradley stated that the use is not out of character as it is adjacent to a body shop and a tire sales and service shop. However, it is not an attractive use the way it is currently setup. Bradley stated that the stipulations regarding access and passage may have been too strict and that we need to treat business fairly that these stipulations are not placed on other car lots. Bradley went on to say that maybe there is another property in town in an appropriately zoned district that would work for Willie's business.
- Morrison requested that Edwards meets with Willie and write down a list of things that need to be done to be in compliance and to revisit the case at the next Plan Commission meeting.
- Edwards reminded the Commission that the ordinance for a storage yard states
 "operable vehicles only." Willie said that we need to discuss what "is operable".

 Edwards advised Willie that an operable vehicle is a vehicle that can be legally driven
 on a city street without receiving a ticket from an officer (with exception to
 registration in this case). Therefore, if a vehicle is missing a turn signal indicator or
 bumper etc.... the vehicle is not operable.
- Willie asked for additional time to comply and that he would type up some suggestions of stipulations that would allow him to continue to operate.
- Councilman Mike Yaklich was present. Yaklich stated that the stipulations on the special use that the council voted on and passed is what is in question at this meeting. If the owner cannot comply with the stipulations then he is in violation.





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Yaklich stated if tabled, the commission will be giving him another 30 days to comply, which Willie said he could not do or find a lot somewhere else in an M1 district to store the vehicles. Yaklich stated that if it came to the council with a different set of recommendations or a request on another B3 zoned lot, Yaklich stated that he cannot speak for the other council people but he can speak for himself and he would not approve it. Yaklich stated that what was originally approved was a good set of recommendations.

No others were present to speak in support of the petition.

No others were present to speak in opposition to the petition.

Recommendation:

After discussing the facts and testimony presented, the Plan Commission voted to continue the hearing and requested that Edwards and possibly Bradley meet with Willie on site to see if there is any way for Willie to comply with the original stipulations. If not, then Willie will need to re-apply for a special use with a different set of stipulations to see if it would pass the Plan Commission and City Council. The motion passed by a vote of six in favor of, none opposed, one absent, that the hearing to revoke the Special Use Permit to allow an Automobile, Truck, Trailer, Tractor or Bus Storage yard, Operable Vehicles Only be continued for the next Plan Commission Meeting.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned at 8:16 p.m.

On July 31, 2018 City Manager Gary Bradley and Director of Community Development Keith Edwards met with Willie at 525 N. Main St. to discuss the stipulations and lot usage. Bradley discussed some ideas of other parcels in M zoning nearby and gave Willie the contact information. One of the suggestions was to contact the owner of the land where Great Dane stores trailers just South of the railroad tracks on N. Main St as this property holds an existing use to store vehicles/trailers.

Edwards did advise Willie during this visit that even in M1 & M2 zoning that a Special Use would still be required except in a case such as the property where Great Dane is storing trailers. Edwards advised Willie that he was mistaken of this fact during the July 26th meeting. During the visit on July 31, 2018 we found that four vehicles on the lot did not comply with the stipulations.

After a fair amount of discussion Willie stated that he intends to comply with the stipulations.

On August 22, 2018 Director of Community Development Keith Edwards met with Jon Willie at 525 N Main St to inspect the property and take photos for the August 23, 2018 Plan commission Meeting.



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It was immediately apparent that Willie has done a lot of work on the property. It appears that Willie has complied with the original set of stipulations with exception to the following.

 Vehicles must be parked neatly and be able to be driven off the property without having to move another vehicle out of the way thus allowing for passage throughout the property.

All vehicles are parked neatly. There are two vehicles in the far Southwest corner of the lot that are blocked in; however, by moving only one vehicle, the other two can be driven off of the lot. Noting that there are other car dealerships that also have this same challenge, the City feels that this stipulation may have been too strenuous and that Willie has done a good job in complying with stipulations.

The Public Hearing:

At 7:00 p.m. on August 23, 2018, the continuation of the hearing to revoke the proposed Special use Permit to allow an Automobile, Truck, Trailer, Tractor or Bus Storage yard, Operable Vehicles Only was held.

Kenneth Ryan who owns the property located at 525 N Main St. was present to speak in favor of the Special Use Permit for You're Approved Auto Sales.

- Ryan stated that Willie has been making efforts to become compliant and that it looks a lot better than before and thinks he will be able to remain compliant.
- Costenson asked if Ryan thinks Willie will be able to stay in compliance. Ryan stated that he thinks Willie should be able to keep it cleaned up.
- Question about the stipulations was brought up. City Manager Gary Bradley, who
 was present at the meeting in place of Edwards, stated that if Willie wishes to have
 the original stipulations modified, he could at any time pay the application fee and
 re-apply for the Special Use Permit.
- Morrison, Bradley and Hodge discussed the stipulation concerning vehicles being able to be driven off the property without having to move another vehicle. It was stated that there are other dealerships in town that have vehicles that are blocked in.
- Hodge stated that, "as a business owner," he understands that things like this can
 take time and if this lot in question is not being used as it is now it could end up just
 being an empty lot.
- Morrison made comparison between the photos from the hearing in July and the photos taken on August 22, 2018 and noted improvements.

ORDINANCE TO REVOKE A SPECIAL USE PERMIT HELD BY JOHN WILLIE, D/B/A YOU'RE APPROVED AUTO SALES OF KEWANEE, ILLINOIS, FOR PROPERTY LOCATED AT 525 NORTH MAIN STREET IN THE CITY OF KEWANEE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KEWANEE, ILLINOIS IN COUNCIL ASSEMBLED, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION ONE: The City Council finds that a special use permit has previously been granted to John Willie D/B/A You're Approved Auto Sales of Kewanee, Illinois as recommended by the Plan Commission and granted by the City Council to allow an Automobile, Truck, Trailer, Tractor or Bus Storage yard, Operable Vehicles Only.be granted, on the following described real estate, to-wit:

S95 OF N115 LOT 1, EX HWY, WILLARD & MORSES NORTH SUB CITY OF KEWANEE [EZ], Henry County, Illinois.

Commonly known as 525 North Main Street.

SECTION TWO: The following Six (6) stipulations and restrictions were placed upon the proposed use on the premises described in Section One hereof:

- 1. With exception to registrations, all vehicles must be 100% operable in every aspect. No flat tires, no broken windows, no wrecked or junk vehicles, no missing parts of any sort.
- 2. No part of any vehicle shall overhang or block the city sidewalk.
- 3. Storage of light trucks and passenger vehicles only.
- 4. Vehicles must be parked neatly and be able to be driven off the property without having to move another vehicle out of the way thus allowing for passage throughout the property.
- 5. Access to all vehicles must be available to Fire Department personnel.
- 6. All of the above must be complied with no later than June 30, 2018. If compliance is not met to the satisfaction of the City, a hearing to revoke the Special Use Permit will be held.

SECTION THREE: The City inspected the premises described in Section One hereof on July 2, 2018 and found evidence that the premises was not in sufficient compliance with the stipulations noted in Section Two hereof resulting in a hearing to revoke the Special Use Permit on July 26, 2018. The Plan Commission voted to continue the hearing after hearing testimony from Jon Willie and the City. The Plan Commission requested that the City meet with Jon Willie at the property in effort to bring the property into compliance with the stipulations noted in Section Two hereof.

- **SECTION FOUR:** The City met with Jon Willie on July 31, 2018 upon the premises described in Section one hereof. City staff advised Willie of the necessary action to be done in order to avoid the revocation of the Special Use Permit.
- **SECTION FIVE:** The City inspected the premises described in Section One hereof on August 22, 2018 and found evidence that the premises was in sufficient compliance with the stipulations noted in Section Two hereof and made report of said inspection to the Plan Commission.
- **SECTION SIX:** The continuation of the hearing to revoke the Special Use Permit was held on August 23, 2018. After hearing testimony from the property owner and the City, the Plan Commission voted to make recommendation to the City Council to allow the Special use Permit to allow an Automobile, Truck, Trailer, Tractor or Bus Storage yard, Operable Vehicles Only on the premises described in Section One hereof to continue by a vote of six in favor, none opposed and three absent.
- **SECTION SEVEN:** The recommendation of the Plan Commission shall not be, and the same is not, hereby accepted and approved.

WHEREAS, The proprietors of Boiler Room have contracted with a band for an event

on September 2nd; and,

WHEREAS, Boiler Room has requested the use of the public sidewalk and a portion of

the City street immediately adjacent to their place of business to allow for

a large gathering of participants; and,

WHEREAS, In order to allow the event to be lawfully conducted on public property, an

authorizing resolution adopted by the City Council is required.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KEWANEE, ILLINOIS, IN COUNCIL ASSEMBLED, AS FOLLOWS.

SECTION ONE: A Segura LLC d/b/a Boiler Room is authorized to use the public sidewalk

and a portion of the City street in the 200 block of North Chestnut Street and the 200 block of West Second Street, from 7:30 am to 9 am the following morning, for their entertainment event scheduled for September 2nd, 2018, provided there remains 18 feet of street available for emergency

vehicles at all times.

SECTION TWO: The authorization for use will be contingent upon compliance to the following provisions:

- (1) A Segura LLC d/b/a Boiler Room must submit proof satisfactory to the City of Kewanee of dram shop liability insurance to the maximum limits and general liability insurance covering the City of Kewanee as an additional insured.
- (2) Alcohol consumed in designated area shall be either sold inside Boiler Room or inside the designated area.
- (3) No private individuals shall bring their own alcohol to consume in said

area

- (4) Boiler Room shall provide access control to the area with temporary fencing and have personnel at each point of entry to, or exit from the area. Said personnel shall ensure good order is maintained and no one under the age of 21 years is in the licensed area.
- **(5)** Persons over 21 years of age will be provided with a wristband to be worn and displayed at all times the person is within the permitted area.
- **(6)** Trash receptacles shall be provided by Boiler Room.

- (7) Boiler Room will empty the trash receptacles and cleanup the permitted area when the event concludes.
- **(8)** Only plastic containers for alcohol will be allowed in the permitted area.
- (9) The Chief of Police or his designee shall have the authority to immediately close the permitted area, clear the area of users and suspend the privileges granted by this resolution in the event of any disturbance, breach of the peace of other activities which threaten the safety of the users of the area or the public as a whole.
- (10) Any violations of the terms of this resolution, or any violations of the laws of the State or provisions of the City Code pertaining to the sale of alcoholic liquor during an event covered by this license shall attach to the primary liquor license of A Segura LLC d/b/a Boiler Room for the purpose of possible violation, suspension or revocation hearings before the Liquor Commissioner.

SECTION THREE: This Resolution shall be in full force and effect immediately upon its passage and approval as provided by law.



City officials, police, security and staff are the only persons allowed unlimited re-entry. All city ordinances will be followed. Editor's note: This is the first in a five-part series of crime prevention information provided by the Kewanee Police Department.

The Kewanee Police Department often receives reports concerning financial scams. In an attempt to keep our residents informed, the Kewanee Police Department is alerting residents to the following information and tips to help them avoid being a victim:

IRS Telephone Scam

Potential victims are told they are entitled to big refunds, or that they owe money that must be paid immediately to the IRS. When unsuccessful the first time, phone scammers often call back trying a new strategy. Immigrants are frequently targeted in this scam and are threatened with deportation, arrest, utility shut-off or having their driver's licenses revoked. Callers may insult victims in an effort to scare them.

Chief Ainley advised that many residents of the City have received calls from subjects claiming they are from the IRS and the resident owes money and needs to act quickly to avoid arrest. They will often request the resident immediately send funds to them to avoid arrest.

Tip: The IRS will always send taxpayers a written notification of any tax due via the U.S. mail. The IRS never asks for credit card, debit card or prepaid card information over the telephone. For more information or to report a scam, visit www.irs.gov and type "scam" in the search box.

Arrest Scam

In this scam, the caller informs you that your loved one has been arrested and requests bond money for their release from jail. A similar scam involves a caller claiming to be a relative or friend, who asks you to send payment to get them out of jail.

Tip: If someone calls informing you that a loved one needs to be bonded out of jail, find out which jurisdiction the individual is in and call that agency directly to confirm that the person has, in fact, been arrested. Ask questions.

Tech Support Scam


Typically operating out of another country, scammers call victims and allege that they're with a high-profile tech company. Victims are told their computers are either already infected or about to become infected with malware that can cause significant damage, such as operating system corruption or identity thert. The "technicians" then urge users to allow them to have remote access to troubleshoot and fix these issues. All of these actions permit scammers access to computers so they can cause errors, infect systems with malware or perform other damage and then charge for unnecessary repair services. It may also allow them access to personal and financial information.

Tip: Never give anyone remote access to your computer. Instead,

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hire a trusted local computer repair service whenever necessary.

Grandparent Scam

In the Grandparent Scam, scammers call an older adult and say something similar to: "Hi Grandma, it's me!" The grandparent then usually responds with the name of their grandchild, unwittingly giving the scammer identity information. The scammer then continues the conversation using the name the grandparent provided. They will usually ask for money to solve some unexpected financial problem such as a car accident, arrest or stolen wallet. Often times they may disclose that they are out of the country and thus need the money to be paid via Western Union or MoneyGram. The scammer will also ask the grandparent to keep this situation between them, as Mom/Dad would be mad if they knew they called. This prevents the grandparent from verifying the story given by the scammer.

Sometimes the call may come not from the supposed grandchild, but from the scammer pretending

to be a police officer giving the scam the illusion of credibility. And sometimes it's not a phone call at all, but rather an email.

Tip: Resist the temptation to act quickly. Contact your grandchild or other family members to verify the information given in the call/email. Don't wire money based solely on the information given over the phone or email.

Member

Fraudulent/Fake Check Scam With this scam, victims are tricked into accepting fraudulent or fake checks. This is very common when the victim is selling something through the internet or an ad in the newspaper. Victims will receive a check for a much higher amount than agreed upon. The scammer may give a variety of reasons as to why this has occurred. They eventually convince the victim to send back the overpayment via non-returnable methods, such as wire transfers. Eventually, the scammer's check bounces and the victim realizes that they have been conned.

Tip: Never accept checks with amounts over the agreed upon price and never send money back. If you are selling an item on the internet or elsewhere, make sure that the check has cleared the bank before releasing the merchandise to the buyer.

Phishing

Scammers pretend to be legitimate organizations/companies and send an official looking email or contact victims via phone, to get them to reveal sensitive data. If you get an email or pop-up asking for personal or financial information, don't reply. Do not click on any pop-ups. Do not give out personal information over the phone unless you have initiated the phone call and know to whom you are speaking.

Tip: Legitimate companies will not ask for sensitive information

over the phone or via email. Never give anyone you don't know information concerning bank accounts, passwords, and social security numbers, etc. Contact the organization/company using a phone number you know as genuine. Also, keep your computer's anti-virus and anti-spyware software up-to-date.

Foreign Lotteries or **Sweepstakes**

The victim is informed via email, phone or postal letter that they have won a lottery but that in order to claim their prize money, the victim will have to send a check for fees, taxes or insurance. The scammers may send a check for the lottery winnings, and although the check shows up in the victim's bank account, soon after the "fees" are collected from the victim, it is discovered that the check is fraudulent. In a variation of this scam, a check comes in the mail to cover "taxes, fees or insurance" and the recipient is asked to cash the check and wire back funds to claim the prize. However, the original check is no good.

Chief Ainley advised that a resident should never send money to any subject indicating they will release the funds once the resident sends a specific amount. Often times if the resident sends the funds the suspect will request additional funds be sent to cover fees or something related to the

transaction.

Tip: It is illegal for U.S. citizens to enter foreign sweepstakes or lotteries. Also, if you have to send money, even if they send you a

check, it is a red flag. **Collection Agency Scam** In this scam the perpetrators tell victims that they are representatives from a collection agency. They make cold calls to victims and threaten lawsuits or embarrassing on-the-job confrontations unless the victims start making payments. Fee payment is to be made by non-returnable methods, such as MoneyGram, Western Union or wire transfer. Scammers may even have actual information about a real outstanding loan. Harassment may go on for

months. Tip: Do your homework and make sure that if you have a bad See Fraud, scams, page B6

from becoming a victim of a residental
burglary. In 2017,
there were 41 residental burglaries
reported to the
department. The goal
is to reduce the number of burglaries in
the City of Kewanee
in the coming years.

1. Keep all doors and windows closed and securely fastened. An open window or door is an open invitation for burglars. Thieves are also quick to spot weak locks that may be easily forced open. Doors'should have deadbolt locks with a one inch throw and reinforced strike plate with three inch screws. All windows should have window locks.

2. Secure sliding glass doors by placing a metal rod or a wooden dowel rod in the track and install vertical bolts. This will help prevent burglars from forcing the door open or lifting it off the track.

3. Open garages and sheds are easy targets for burglars. Please lock and secure both.

4. Create the illusion that you are home by using timers on lights, radios and TV's. Make your residence appear occupied, even when no one is home, to help deter criminals.

5. Keep the perimeter of your home well lit. Installing low voltage outdoor lighting or motion lights are a

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cost-effective way to discourage criminals.

6. Never leave clues that you are away on a trip. Have a trusted neighbor collect mail and newspapers while you are away so delivered items do not accumulate. You can also ask a neighbor to park in your driveway or parking place to make it appear that you are present.

7. Keep some shades and blinds up and curtains open to maintain a normal, everyday appearance in your residence.

8. Never leave a message on your telephone answering machine telling people that you are away from home. A message that you will return at a certain time leaves your home vulnerable in the interim.

9. Keep shrubbery

trimmed away from entrances and walkways. Large and ornate hedges may be beautiful but they also provide a hiding place for burglars who need only a minute to break in through a window or door.

10. Use safes to store valuables and ALWAYS keep a record of your serial numbers.

Having the serial number information will assist officers in locating the items if a suspect is found with them or attempts to pawn them.

unexpected utility workers, deliverymen, etc. into your home. Ask them for their ID and a phone number to their office. Call the Police Department if you are not sure of their

identity.

12. Consider purchasing an alarm system.

13. Call the Police Department at 309-853-1911 to report suspicious activity.

Chief Ainley said that one of the main reasons a family moves away from a neighborhood or a community is that they have been a victim of a recent burglary. A victim often struggles with the feeling that they aren't safe in their own home after a burglary has occurred. The Kewanee Police Department encourages residents to be proactive in taking steps to protect their residence.

Each year the Kewanee Police Department takes calls reference possible home repair fraud. The following are some tips to help keep a resident from becoming a victim.

1. Get recommendations and references. Talk to friends, family, and others who have used the contractor for similar work.

2. Get more than one estimate and get them in writing.

3. Insist on a written contract that states exactly what work will be done, the quality of the materials that will be used, warranties, timetables, and the names of any subcontractors, the total cost of the job, and the schedule of payments.



4. Verify any licenses or regulations are met prior to hiring the contractor.

5. Don't make the final payment until you are satisfied that all subcontractors have been paid.

The following are red flags of possible home repair fraud.

1. The contractor comes door to door seeking you out or has out-of-state license plates.

2. The contractor happens to

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have material left over from a recent job.

3. The contractor asks for a check payable to a third party.

4. The contractor requests full payment before the job is completed.

5. The contractor refuses to provide proof of insurance or ref-

erences.

6. The contractor offers to drive the homeowner to their bank to withdraw funds to pay for the work.

Chief Ainley advised the resident should always do their homework when it comes to home repairs. It can be very costly to have repairs done only to learn later the work was sub-

standard and a second contractor will be needed to correct the issues.

Burglaries to motor vehicles are a constant problem for the Kewanee Police Department. It results in many calls for service each year. They are very frequent during the

summer months when with the warmer weather residents leave vehicle windows down. The following are basic tips that can help residents avoid being a victim.

1. Always close your windows and lock your doors even if you only plan on being gone for a brief time. An open window or unlocked door is an open invitation to a criminal.

2. Park in areas that have good lighting and are close to the



building.

3. Remove valuables from your vehicle. This includes, purses, wallets, cell phones, laptops, and briefcases. A car burglar may break the window of a vehicle to gain access to the items.

4. If you have a garage use it and lock the walk-in door when you exit

the garage.

5. Call the Police Department at 309-853-1911 to report suspicious activity.

Chief Ainley advised that with the new vehicle key fobs it makes locking a vehicle quick and easy. That simple act can greatly reduce the number of thefts from the unlocked vehicles. It also can help keep your identity from being accessed by a criminal that takes a purse or wallet.
