Mr. Pennock has also handled numerous bellwether trials and Daubert hearings on expert-witness testimony in both state and federal courts.

He was also named national co-lead counsel of the federal power morcellator MDL, where he organized the first majority women Plaintiff Steering Committee in the 47 year history of multidistrict litigation.

#### MAC Legislative Update 1-19-18

#### Legislature takes votes on income tax changes

Prompted by recent changes to federal tax law, both the House and Senate this week voted to enlarge the personal exemption that Michigan residents can use on their state income forms. Depending on which version of the expansion wins out, the state could find itself with reduced General Fund (GF) revenues, thereby imperiling programs tied to the GF, such as county revenue sharing.

Michigan allows individuals to claim a personal exemption, which can then be multiplied by the number of personal and dependent exemptions allowed on a federal income tax return. With the new federal law removing these exemptions for tax returns filed in 2019 and beyond, Michigan filers would be looking at larger tax bills to the state, if no action is taken.

Legislators in both Houses voted for plans that would null out those tax increases via larger personal exemptions. However, the plans would expand the exemption to such amounts that the state would end up losing revenue.

The governor has proposed simply amending the law and current deduction amount to keep the fiscal status quo. The Senate and House have disagreed, so far.

According to estimates, the Senate plan would reduce tax revenue by just over \$200 million by 2021, while the House version would reduce revenue by \$157 million in the same year. Additionally, the House version also would provide an additional \$100 credit to each senior age 62 or older. This would reduce revenue by an additional \$200 million.

While consensus exists on mitigating the federal tax change, debate on state exemptions beyond that figure remains in flux. The results could have far-reaching impacts on the state budget; MAC will continue to closely monitor the debate and advise.

#### MAC conveys concerns on TIF bills to House committee

Legislation to alter state law on tax-increment financing authorities has value, but more is needed to reform these "tax capture" districts' effects on special millages, MAC told a House committee this week.

During testimony before the House Local Government Committee on Senate Bill 393 by Sen. Ken Horn (R-Saginaw) and House Bill 5070 by Rep. Ben Frederick (R-Shiawassee), MAC's Chris Jones said, "Our opinion has always been that those special millages were voted for a specific purpose by the populace to serve that particular purpose, and we believe that that should be what those dollars are used for.

The current legislation would combine all current authority TIF statutes into one act, provide additional transparency and repeal two unneeded TIF statutes that are not currently used. While MAC does value these changes, and agrees that more transparency and reporting is required for these authority activities, the bill does not address some of the more pressing issues with tax capture districts.

MAC, therefore, remains neutral on the legislation.

#### Child Care Fund reforms advance to House floor

Bills to codify Child Care Fund (CCF) handbook policies and streamline the CCF process by eliminating billing status changes and require payment of undisputed charges passed the House Families, Children and Seniors Committee unanimously this week.

Senate Bills 529 (<a href="http://legislature.mi.gov/doc.aspx?2017-SB-0529">http://legislature.mi.gov/doc.aspx?2017-SB-0529</a>) and 530 (<a href="http://legislature.mi.gov/doc.aspx?2017-SB-0530">http://legislature.mi.gov/doc.aspx?2017-SB-0530</a>), sponsored by Sen. Peter MacGregor (R- Kent), are backed by MAC. We anticipate quick floor action on this legislation and final approval by the governor in coming weeks.

The House committee did amend the legislation to include software costs related to risk and needs assessment tools for an in-home care program as a direct cost. While some case management systems that track youth progress and collect data would not be included under this definition, there is a 10 percent administrative payment that will be automatically distributed to the county on a month basis.

MAC appreciates the work and focus by Sen. MacGregor on this topic.

#### House task force releases mental health reforms report

The Michigan House C.A.R.E.S. Taskforce (<a href="http://house.mi.gov/cares/">http://house.mi.gov/PDFs/HouseCARESTaskForceReport.pdf</a>) and recommendations to reform our mental health system. House Speaker Tom Leonard (R-Clinton) made it a priority to review and enhance services to the most vulnerable in our local communities. The task force, co-chaired by Rep. Klint Kesto (R-Oakland) and Rep. Hank Vaupel (R-Livingston) met several times around the state in 2017 to discuss ideas and hear from stakeholders, including courts, sheriffs and community mental health and veteran agencies.

The report recommends increased access to crisis intervention training for local sheriffs to aid in diverting people with mental illness from the criminal justice system. It also suggests additional financial support for our problem-solving courts and encouraging expansion of these programs. A standardized mental health screening at jails and pursuit of a federal waiver to allow Medicaid coverage during incarceration were also advised.

Over the next several weeks, bills will be introduced and reviewed to implement the report's ideas. MAC will report on these developments as work proceeds at the State Capitol.

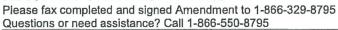

We are pleased to confirm our understanding of the services we are to provide Montcalm County, Michigan (the "County") for the year ended September 30, 2017. We will audit the financial statements of the governmental activities, the business-type activities, the aggregate discretely presented component units, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information, including the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the basic financial statements, of the County as of and for the year ended September 30, 2017. Accounting standards generally accepted in the United States of America provide for certain required supplementary information (RSI), such as management's discussion and analysis (MD&A), to supplement the County's basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. As part of our engagement, we will apply certain limited procedures to the County's RSI in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. These limited procedures will consist of inquiries of management regarding the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We will not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance. The following RSI is required by U.S. generally accepted accounting principles and will be subjected to certain limited procedures, but will not be audited:

- 1) Management's Discussion and Analysis.
- 2) Budgetary Comparison Schedules.
- 3) Schedule of Changes in Net Pension Liability and Related Ratios.
- 4) Schedule of Contributions.

We have also been engaged to report on supplementary information other than RSI that accompanies the County's financial statements. We will subject the following supplementary information to the auditing procedures applied in our audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, and we will provide an opinion on it in relation to the financial statements as a whole, in a separate written report accompanying our auditor's report on the financial statements:

- 1) Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards.
- 2) Combining and Individual Fund Financial Statements and Schedules

#### **Audit Objectives**

The objective of our audit is the expression of opinions as to whether your financial statements are fairly presented, in all material respects, in conformity with U.S. generally accepted accounting principles and to report on the fairness of the supplementary information referred to in the second paragraph when considered in relation to the financial statements as a whole. The objective also includes reporting on—

- Internal control over financial reporting and compliance with provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and award agreements, noncompliance with which could have a material effect on the financial statements in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*.
- Internal control over compliance related to major programs and an opinion (or disclaimer of opinion) on compliance with federal statutes, regulations, and the terms and conditions of federal awards that could have a direct and material effect on each major program in accordance with the Single Audit Act Amendments of 1996 and Title 2 U.S. Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) Part 200, Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards (Uniform Guidance).

We will issue written reports upon completion of our Single Audit. Our reports will be addressed to the Board of Commissioners of the County. We will make reference to Susan D. Sanford, CPA PLLC's audit of the Montcalm County Road Commission; Anderson, Tackman & Company, P.L.C.'s audit of the Montcalm County Housing Commission; Roslund, Prestage & Company, P.C's audit of the Montcalm Care Network, and Vredeveld Haefner LLC's audit of the Montcalm County Central Dispatch Authority in our report on your financial statements. We cannot provide assurance that unmodified opinions will be expressed. Circumstances may arise in which it is necessary for us to modify our opinions or add emphasis-of-matter or other-matter paragraphs. If our opinions are other than unmodified, we will discuss the reasons with you in advance. If, for any reason, we are unable to complete the audit or are unable to form or have not formed opinions, we may decline to express opinions or issue reports, or we may withdraw from this engagement.

#### Audit Procedures-General

An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements; therefore, our audit will involve judgment about the number of transactions to be examined and the areas to be tested. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as

evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements. We will plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement, whether from (1) errors, (2) fraudulent financial reporting, (3) misappropriation of assets, or (4) violations of laws or governmental regulations that are attributable to the government or to acts by management or employees acting on behalf of the government. Because the determination of abuse is subjective, Government Auditing Standards do not expect auditors to provide reasonable assurance of detecting abuse.

Because of the inherent limitations of an audit, combined with the inherent limitations of internal control, and because we will not perform a detailed examination of all transactions, there is a risk that material misstatements or noncompliance may exist and not be detected by us, even though the audit is properly planned and performed in accordance with U.S. generally accepted auditing standards and *Government Auditing Standards*. In addition, an audit is not designed to detect immaterial misstatements or violations of laws or governmental regulations that do not have a direct and material effect on the financial statements or on major programs. However, we will inform the appropriate level of management of any material errors, any fraudulent financial reporting, or misappropriation of assets that come to our attention. We will also inform the appropriate level of management of any violations of laws or governmental regulations that come to our attention, unless clearly inconsequential, and of any material abuse that comes to our attention. We will include such matters in the reports required for a Single Audit. Our responsibility as auditors is limited to the period covered by our audit and does not extend to any later periods for which we are not engaged as auditors.

Our procedures will include tests of documentary evidence supporting the transactions recorded in the accounts, and may include tests of the physical existence of inventories, and direct confirmation of receivables and certain other assets and liabilities by correspondence with selected individuals, funding sources, creditors, and financial institutions. We will request written representations from your attorneys as part of the engagement, and they may bill you for responding to this inquiry. At the conclusion of our audit, we will require certain written representations from you about your responsibilities for the financial statements; schedule of expenditures of federal awards; federal award programs; compliance with laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements; and other responsibilities required by generally accepted auditing standards.

Your responsibilities include acknowledging to us in the written representation letter that (1) you are responsible for presentation of the schedule of expenditures of federal awards in accordance with the Uniform Guidance; (2) you believe the schedule of expenditures of federal awards, including its form and content, is stated fairly in accordance with the Uniform Guidance; (3) the methods of measurement or presentation have not changed from those used in the prior period (or, if they have changed, the reasons for such changes); and (4) you have disclosed to us any significant assumptions or interpretations underlying the measurement or presentation of the schedule of expenditures of federal awards.

#### GRANT

This is Grant No. BCC 18-59 between the Department of Licensing and Regulatory Affairs (Grantor), and Montcalm County (Grantee), is entered into pursuant to the State Survey and Remonumentation Act, 1990 PA 345 (SSRA) and is subject to the terms and conditions of this Agreement (Agreement).

#### 1.0 Statement of Purpose

This Grant is offered annually to the Grantee in accordance with the requirements of the SSRA. The SSRA establishes the State Survey and Remonumentation Fund which supports a program for the monumentation and remonumentation and perpetual monument maintenance of original public land survey corners, protracted public land survey corners and property controlling corners throughout the State.

This Grant is offered to the Grantee to carry out its annual work program as set forth and approved by the Grantor in the Grantee's Survey and Remonumentation Grant Application, made part of this Agreement as "Attachment A."

In accordance with the terms and conditions of this Grant, the Grantor will reimburse the eligible expenses incurred by the Grantee to carry out the annual work program as set forth and approved by the Grantor in "Attachment A."

#### 1.1 Statement of Work

The Grantee agrees to undertake, perform, and complete the project described in the Grantee's Proposal, Attachment A, file a Land Corner Recordation Certificate (LCRC) pursuant to the Corner Recordation Act, 1970 PA 74 (CRA) with the addition of a geodetic coordinate value, the peer group date, and county representative's signature on said LCRC for each corner identified in Attachment A under the requirements of the SSRA.

The Grantee must submit a Completion Report as specified in this Agreement, may submit a Work Progress Report as specified in this Agreement and provide any other reports or forms requested by the Grantor.

#### 1.2 Detailed Budget

- A. This Agreement does not commit the State of Michigan (State) or the Department of Licensing and Regulatory Affairs (LARA) to approve requests for additional funds at any time.
- B. If applicable, travel expenses will not be reimbursed at rates greater than the State Travel Rates, Attachment B, without the prior written consent of the Grant Administrator.

- C. Attachment A includes the Budget. The Grantee agrees that all funds shown in Attachment A are to be spent as detailed in Attachment A.
- D. Changes in the Budget of less than 5 percent of the total line item amount do not require prior written approval, but Grantee must provide notice to the Grant Administrator.
- E. Changes in the Budget equal to or greater than 5 percent of the total line item amount will be allowed only upon prior review and written approval by the State Grant Administrator. A formal grant amendment must be signed by both the Grantor and Grantee.

#### 1.3 Payment Schedule

- A. The maximum amount of grant assistance offered is \$69,582.00. An initial advance of \$27,832.80 (40 percent of the State Grant Amount) shall be made to the Grantee upon submittal of the 2017 Completion Report and all required documentation to the State Grant Administrator.
- B. Progress payments up to a total of 85 percent of the Total Authorized Budget may be made upon submission of a Grantee request indicating the grant funds received, project expenditures incurred, and objectives completed to date, as well as backup documentation for all expenditures. Backup documentation must include a printout of the 245 grant account, invoice copies, and a payroll printout for any county costs supported with the grant, and be maintained for audit purposes in order to comply with this Agreement.
- C. Payment of the final 15 percent of the grant amount shall be made after completion of the project and after the State Grant Administrator has received and approved the Completion Report and supporting documentation as specified in this Agreement.

1984 PA 279 states that the State shall take all steps necessary to assure that payment for goods or services is mailed within 45 days after receipt of the goods or services, a complete invoice for goods or services, or a complete contract for goods or services, whichever is later.

#### 1.4 Program Performance - Monitoring, Reporting and Documentation

- A. Monitoring. The Grantee shall monitor performance to assure that time schedules are being met and projected work by time period is being accomplished and provide a status report to the State Grant Administrator upon request.
- B. Reporting (see 1.4.C. for documentation requirements):
  - 1. The Grantee may submit to the State Grant Administrator a Progress Report as soon as July 1 of the grant year but no later than September 30 of

- the grant year with backup documentation for work completed and expenditures incurred during the reporting period
- 2. The Grantee must submit to the State Grant Administrator a Completion Report no later than February 1 following the close of the grant year accompanied by all documentation for work completed and expenditures incurred during the reporting period.
- D. Documentation. Backup documentation must include the following, as applicable:
  - 1. A written narrative of the total work accomplished during the grant year, including an explanation for any additional work completed that was not specified in the approved "Attachment A," any work not completed that was specified in the approved "Attachment A," and any changes in an approved line item of the budget approved in "Attachment A" (submit for Completion Report only).
  - 2. A narrative of any coordinated efforts with other organizations to complete the project (submit for Completion Report only).
  - 3. Invoices:
    - a. An invoice from all Peer Review Group members, each surveyor or any other service provider for all services provided to the Grantee under this Agreement, and other supplies and purchases, as outlined in the approved "Attachment A" (submit for Progress Report and Completion Report).
    - b. A detailed breakdown and backup documentation for any county costs charged to the program as outlined in the approved "Attachment A" (submit for Progress Report and Completion Report).
  - 4. General Ledger: The County Treasurer's print-out of the State Survey and Remonumentation grant account or equivalent ledger providing a detailed history of each transaction occurring within the account, including all payroll, indirect and/or overhead expenses. If not itemized in the ledger, a salary and fringe benefits breakdown must also be submitted for all administrative staff (submit for Progress Report and Completion Report).
  - 5. An exact, full-size copy of the recorded LCRC prepared in compliance with the CRA and SSRA (submit for Completion Report only).
    - (1) The LCRC must include geodetic coordinate values for each corner recorded, signed by the county representative and reflect the date of

the peer review group meeting at which the corner was reviewed.

- (2) A copy must be submitted for each corner code reported on an LCRC. If the LCRC identifies more than one corner code, the Grantee must provide a separate copy of the LCRC for each corner code.
- 6. An LCRC Spreadsheet listing all corner codes recorded for filing in the State's Corner Recordation Collection System (submit with Completion Report only).

#### PART II - GENERAL PROVISIONS

#### 2.1 Project Changes

Grantee must obtain prior written approval for project changes from the Grant Administrator. See Section 1.2. Detailed Budget.

#### 2.2 Delegation

Grantee may not delegate any of its obligations under the Grant without the prior written approval of the State. Grantee must notify the State at least 90 calendar days before the proposed delegation, and provide the State any information it requests to determine whether the delegation is in its best interest. If approved, Grantee must: (a) be the sole point of contact regarding all project matters, including payment and charges for all Grant Activities; (b) make all payments to the subgrantee; and (c) incorporate the terms and conditions contained in this Grant in any subgrant with a subgrantee. Grantee remains responsible for the completion of the Grant Activities, compliance with the terms of this Grant, and the acts and omissions of the subgrantee. The State, in its sole discretion, may require the replacement of any subgrantee.

#### 2.3 Project Income

To the extent that it can be determined that interest was earned on advances of funds, such interest shall be remitted to the Grantor. All other program income shall either be added to the project budget and used to further eligible program objectives or deducted from the total program budget for the purpose of determining the amount of reimbursable costs. The final determination shall be made by the Grant Administrator.

#### 2.4 Share-in-sayings

The Grantor expects to share in any cost savings realized by the Grantee. Therefore, final Grantee reimbursement will be based on actual expenditures. Exceptions to this requirement must be approved in writing by the Grant Administrator.

#### 2.5 Order of Spending

Unless otherwise required, Grantee shall expend funds in the following order: (1) private or local funds, (2) federal funds, and (3) state funds. Grantee is responsible for securing any required matching funds from sources other than the State.

#### 2.6 Purchase of Equipment

The purchase of equipment not specifically listed in the Budget, "Attachment A," must have prior written approval of the Grant Administrator. Equipment is defined as non-expendable personal property having a useful life of more than one year. Such equipment shall be retained by the Grantee unless otherwise specified at the time of approval.

#### 2.7 Accounting

The Grantee shall adhere to the Generally Accepted Accounting Principles and shall maintain records which will allow, at a minimum, for the comparison of actual outlays with budgeted amounts. The Grantee's overall financial management system must ensure effective control over and accountability for all funds received. Accounting records must be supported by source documentation including, but not limited to, balance sheets, general ledgers, time sheets and invoices. The expenditure of state funds shall be reported by line item and compared to the Budget.

#### 2.8 Records Maintenance, Inspection, Examination, and Audit

The State or its designee may audit Grantee to verify compliance with this Grant. Grantee must retain, and provide to the State or its designee upon request, all financial and accounting records related to the Grant through the term of the Grant and for 7 years after the latter of termination, expiration, or final payment under this Grant or any extension ("Audit Period"). If an audit, litigation, or other action involving the records is initiated before the end of the Audit Period, Grantee must retain the records until all issues are resolved.

Within 10 calendar days of providing notice, the State and its authorized representatives or designees have the right to enter and inspect Grantee's premises or any other places where Grant Activities are being performed, and examine, copy, and audit all records related to this Grant. Grantee must cooperate and provide reasonable assistance. If any financial errors are revealed, the amount in error must be reflected as a credit or debit on subsequent invoices until the amount is paid or refunded. Any remaining balance at the end of the Grant must be paid or refunded within 45 calendar days.

This Section applies to Grantee, any parent, affiliate, or subsidiary organization of Grantee, and any subgrantee that performs Grant Activities in connection with this Grant.

If the Grantee is a governmental or non-profit organization and expends the minimum level specified in OMB Uniform Guidance (\$750,000 as of December 26, 2013) or more in total federal funds in its fiscal year, then Grantee is required to submit an Audit Report to the Federal Audit Clearinghouse (FAC) as required in 200.36.

#### 2.9 Competitive Bidding

The Grantee agrees that all procurement transactions involving the use of state funds shall be conducted in a manner that provides maximum open and free competition. When competitive selection is not feasible or practical, the Grantee agrees to obtain the written approval of the Grant Administrator before making a sole source selection. Sole source contracts should be negotiated to the extent that such negotiation is possible.

#### 3.0 Liability

The State is not liable for any costs incurred by the Grantee before the start date or after the end date of this Agreement. Liability of the State is limited to the terms and conditions of this Agreement and the grant amount.

#### 3.1 Reserved

#### 3.2 Safety

The Grantee, and all subgrantees are responsible for insuring that all precautions are exercised at all times for the protection of persons and property. Safety provisions of all Applicable Laws and building and construction codes shall be observed. The Grantee, and every subgrantee are responsible for compliance with all federal, state and local laws and regulations in any manner affecting the work or performance of this Agreement and shall at all times carefully observe and comply with all rules, ordinances, and regulations. The Grantee, and all subgrantees shall secure all necessary certificates and permits from municipal or other public authorities as may be required in connection with the performance of this Agreement.

#### 3.3 General Indemnification

Inasmuch as each party to this grant is a governmental entity of the State of Michigan, each party to this grant must seek its own legal representation and bear its own costs, including judgments, in any litigation which may arise from the performance of this grant. It is specifically understood and agreed that neither party will indemnify the other party in such litigation.

#### 3.4 Termination

#### A. Termination for Cause

The State may terminate this Grant for cause, in whole or in part, if Grantee, as determined by the State: (a) endangers the value, integrity, or security of any

location, data, or personnel; (b) becomes insolvent, petitions for bankruptcy court proceedings, or has an involuntary bankruptcy proceeding filed against it by any creditor; (c) engages in any conduct that may expose the State to liability; (d) breaches any of its material duties or obligations; or (e) fails to cure a breach within the time stated in a notice of breach. Any reference to specific breaches being material breaches within this Grant will not be construed to mean that other breaches are not material.

If the State terminates this Grant under this Section, the State will issue a termination notice specifying whether Grantee must: (a) cease performance immediately, or (b) continue to perform for a specified period. If it is later determined that Grantee was not in breach of the Grant, the termination will be deemed to have been a Termination for Convenience, effective as of the same date, and the rights and obligations of the parties will be limited to those provided in Subsection B, Termination for Convenience.

The State will only pay for amounts due to Grantee for Grant Activities accepted by the State on or before the date of termination, subject to the State's right to set off any amounts owed by the Grantee for the State's reasonable costs in terminating this Grant. The Grantee must pay all reasonable costs incurred by the State in terminating this Grant for cause, including administrative costs, attorneys' fees, court costs, transition costs, and any costs the State incurs to procure the Grant Activities from other sources.

#### B. Termination for Convenience

The State may immediately terminate this Grant in whole or in part without penalty and for any reason, including but not limited to, appropriation or budget shortfalls. If the State terminates this Grant for convenience, the State will pay all reasonable costs, as determined by the State, for State approved Grant Responsibilities.

#### 3.5 Conflicts and Ethics

Grantee will uphold high ethical standards and is prohibited from: (a) holding or acquiring an interest that would conflict with this Grant; (b) doing anything that creates an appearance of impropriety with respect to the award or performance of the Grant; (c) attempting to influence or appearing to influence any State employee by the direct or indirect offer of anything of value; or (d) paying or agreeing to pay any person, other than employees and consultants working for Grantee, any consideration contingent upon the award of the Grant. Grantee must immediately notify the State of any violation or potential violation of these standards. This Section applies to Grantee, any parent, affiliate, or subsidiary organization of Grantee, and any subgrantee that performs Grant Activities in connection with this Grant.

#### 3.6 Non-Discrimination

Under the Elliott-Larsen Civil Rights Act, 1976 PA 453, MCL 37.2101, et seq., and the Persons with Disabilities Civil Rights Act, 1976 PA 220, MCL 37.1101, et seq., Grantee and its subgrantees agree not to discriminate against an employee or applicant for employment with respect to hire, tenure, terms, conditions, or privileges of employment, or a matter directly or indirectly related to employment, because of race, color, religion, national origin, age, sex, height, weight, marital status, or mental or physical disability. Breach of this covenant is a material breach of this Grant.

#### 3.7 Unfair Labor Practices

Under MCL 423.324, the State may void any Grant with a Grantee or subgrantee who appears on the Unfair Labor Practice register compiled under MCL 423.322.

#### 3.8 Force Majeure

Neither party will be in breach of this Grant because of any failure arising from any disaster or acts of god that are beyond their control and without their fault or negligence. Each party will use commercially reasonable efforts to resume performance. Grantee will not be relieved of a breach or delay caused by its subgrantees. If immediate performance is necessary to ensure public health and safety, the State may immediately Grant with a third party.

#### 3.9 Media Releases

News releases (including promotional literature and commercial advertisements) pertaining to the Grant or project to which it relates must not be made without prior written State approval, and then only in accordance with the explicit written instructions of the State.

#### 4.0 Website Incorporation

The State is not bound by any content on Grantee's website unless expressly incorporated directly into this Grant.

#### 4.1 Certification Regarding Debarment

The Grantee certifies, by signature to this Agreement, that neither it nor its principals are presently debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, declared ineligible, or voluntarily excluded from participation in this Agreement by any federal or State department or agency. If the Grantee is unable to certify to any portion of this statement, the Grantee shall attach an explanation to this Agreement.

#### 4.2 Illegal Influence

The Grantee certifies, to the best of his or her knowledge and belief that:

- A. No federal appropriated funds have been paid nor will be paid, by or on behalf of the Grantee, to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a member of Congress in connection with the awarding of any federal contract, the making of any federal grant, the making of any federal loan, the entering into of any cooperative agreement, and the extension, continuation, renewal, amendment, or modification of any federal contract, grant, loan or cooperative agreement.
- B. If any funds other than federal appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a member of Congress in connection with this grant, the Grantee shall complete and submit Standard Form-LLL, "Disclosure Form to Report Lobbying," in accordance with its instructions.
- C. The Grantee shall require that the language of this certification be included in the award documents for all grants or subcontracts and that all subrecipients shall certify and disclose accordingly.

The State has relied upon this certification as a material representation. Submission of this certification is a prerequisite for entering into this Agreement imposed by 31 USC § 1352. Any

person who fails to file the required certification shall be subject to a civil penalty of not less than \$10,000 and not more than \$100,000 for each such failure.

The Grantee certifies, to the best of his or her knowledge and belief that no state funds have been paid nor will be paid, by or on behalf of the Grantee, to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any State agency, a member of the Legislature, or an employee of a member of the Legislature in connection with the awarding of any state contract, the making of any state grant, the making of any state loan, the entering into of any cooperative agreement, and the extension, continuation, renewal, amendment, or modification of any state contract, grant, loan or cooperative agreement.

#### 4.3 Governing Law

This Grant is governed, construed, and enforced in accordance with Michigan law, excluding choice-of-law principles, and all claims relating to or arising out of this Grant are governed by Michigan law, excluding choice-of-law principles. Any dispute arising from this Grant must be resolved in Michigan Court of Claims. Grantee consents to venue in Ingham County, and waives any objections, such as lack of personal jurisdiction or forum non conveniens. Grantee must appoint agents in Michigan to receive service of process.

#### 4.4 Compliance with Laws

Grantee must comply with all federal, state and local laws, rules and regulations.

Grantee is required to possess in order to perform under this Grant.

#### 4.5 Disclosure of Litigation, or Other Proceeding

Grantee must notify the State within 14 calendar days of receiving notice of any litigation, investigation, arbitration, or other proceeding (collectively, "Proceeding") involving Grantee, a subgrantee, or an officer or director of Grantee or subgrantee, that arises during the term of the Grant, including: (a) a criminal Proceeding; (b) a parole or probation Proceeding; (c) a Proceeding under the Sarbanes-Oxley Act; (d) a civil Proceeding involving: (1) a claim that might reasonably be expected to adversely affect Grantee's viability or financial stability; or (2) a governmental or public entity's claim or written allegation of fraud; or (e) a Proceeding involving any license that Grantee is required to possess in order to perform under this Grant.

#### 4.6 Assignment

Grantee may not assign this Grant to any other party without the prior approval of the State. Upon notice to Grantee, the State, in its sole discretion, may assign in whole or in part, its rights or responsibilities under this Grant to any other party. If the State determines that a novation of the Grant to a third party is necessary, Grantee will agree to the novation, provide all necessary documentation and signatures, and continue to perform, with the third party, its obligations under the Grant.

#### 4.7 Entire Grant and Modification

This Grant is the entire agreement and replaces all previous agreements between the parties for the Grant Activities. This Grant may not be amended except by signed agreement between the parties.

#### 4.8 Grantee Relationship

Grantee assumes all rights, obligations and liabilities set forth in this Grant. Grantee, its employees, and agents will not be considered employees of the State. No partnership or joint venture relationship is created by virtue of this Grant. Grantee, and not the State, is responsible for the payment of wages, benefits and taxes of Grantee's employees and any subgrantees. Prior performance does not modify Grantee's status as an independent Grantee.

#### 4.9 Dispute Resolution

The parties will endeavor to resolve any Grant dispute in accordance with this provision. The dispute will be referred to the parties' respective Grant Administrators or Program Managers. Such referral must include a description of the issues and all supporting documentation. The parties must submit the dispute to a senior executive if unable to resolve the dispute within 15 business days. The parties will continue performing while a dispute is being resolved, unless the dispute precludes performance. A dispute involving payment does not preclude performance.

Litigation to resolve the dispute will not be instituted until after the dispute has been elevated to the parties' senior executive and either concludes that resolution is unlikely, or fails to respond within 15 business days. The parties are not prohibited from instituting formal proceedings: (a) to avoid the expiration of statute of limitations period; (b) to preserve a superior position with respect to creditors; or (c) where a party makes a determination that a temporary restraining order or other injunctive relief is the only adequate remedy. This Section does not limit the State's right to terminate the Grant.

#### 5.0 Severability

If any part of this Grant is held invalid or unenforceable, by any court of competent jurisdiction, that part will be deemed deleted from this Grant and the severed part will be replaced by agreed upon language that achieves the same or similar objectives. The remaining Grant will continue in full force and effect.

#### 5.1 Waiver

Failure to enforce any provision of this Grant will not constitute a waiver.

#### 5.2 Signatories

The signatories warrant that they are empowered to enter into this Agreement and agree to be bound by it.

#### CONSULTING SERVICES AGREEMENT

By and Between
Montcalm County, Michigan
and
MGT of America Consulting, LLC

In consideration of the mutual covenants set forth in this Agreement, the parties agree as follows:

#### 1. Description of Services.

. . . .

MGT shall, as an independent contractor, provide the services specified in section 1.1 below ("the Services"), on the schedule specified in section 1.2 below.

#### 1.1 Scope of Services

MGT shall provide to Client the following services:

A Countywide 2 CFR Part 200 central services cost allocation plan based on actual costs for fiscal years 2017, 2018 and 2019.

Negotiation of the cost allocation plan with representatives of the federal cognizant agency and/or the State, as required.

Explain calculation methods and assumptions used in the indirect cost allocation plan. This explanation may be written or verbal as requested by the Client.

Provide recommendations on methods to enhance indirect cost revenues.

Assistance with the preparation of initial claims to recover costs due from the State and monitor the claims progress to ensure recoveries occur.

#### 1.2 Timetable for Services.

The Services shall be performed and the product(s) of the services shall be delivered on the following schedule:

The proposed services will be completed within eight months after the fiscal year ends, depending on the availability of data from the County.

#### 2. Compensation.

For its work under this Agreement, MGT shall be paid a fixed fee of:

\$ 9,700 for the FY 2017 Cost Plan (completed in 2018)

\$ 9,700 for the FY 2018 Cost Plan (completed in 2019)

\$ 9,700 for the FY 2019 Cost Plan (completed in 2020)

The fees shall be paid as follows:

MGT will render to Client one invoice for each Service after delivery of each of the final Cost Allocation Plans to the Client. Payment will be due thirty (30) days after each invoice is submitted.



#### 3. Term, Renewal Options, and Termination.

This agreement shall become effective upon its execution and delivery by the parties and shall remain in effect until completion of, and full payment for, the Services. At Client's option and approved by MGT, the contract may be renewed for two (2) additional one (1) year periods. This contract may be terminated prior to completion of the Services at the option of either party, upon delivery of written notice by the terminating party to the other party. In the event of early termination by Client, MGT shall be paid, upon invoicing in accordance with this Agreement, the agreed compensation. If, due to termination, there is no agreed value for the services performed to date, MGT's standard hourly rates plus expenses incurred shall apply for Services performed prior to termination.

#### 4. Independent Contractor Status

The relationship of MGT to Client is that of an independent contractor, and nothing in this Agreement shall be construed as creating any other relationship. As an independent contractor, MGT shall comply with all laws relating to federal and state income taxes, associated payroll and business taxes, licenses and fees, workers compensation insurance, and all other applicable state and federal laws and regulations. Neither MGT nor anyone employed or subcontracted by MGT shall be, represent, act, purport to act, or be deemed to be an agent, representative, employee or servant to Client.

#### 5. Project Managers

James Olson shall serve as Project Manager and point of contact for MGT under this Agreement.

**Bob Clingenpeel** shall serve as Project Manager and point of contact for Client under this Agreement. By written notice to the other party, either party may change the identity of its project manager during the term of this Agreement.

#### 6. Miscellaneous

#### 6.1 No Continuing Waiver

The failure or forbearance by either party in exercising any remedy available to it upon a breach of any provision of this Agreement shall not operate or be construed as a waiver of any subsequent or continuing breach by either party.

#### 6.2 Entire Agreement.

This written Agreement represents the entire agreement of the parties, and neither party is relying upon any negotiation, representation, warranty, promise, or covenant not set forth in this Agreement. This Agreement may not be modified or amended except by a written instrument for that purpose duly executed by both parties.

#### 6.3 Subcontracting and Assignment.

MGT may utilize subcontractors in performing the Services, but MGT shall remain responsible to Client for performance under this Agreement. This contract shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of both Client and MGT and their respective successors and assigns, if any, and legal representatives.



#### 6.4 Interpretation, Venue, and Severability.

This agreement shall be construed, interpreted, and enforced in accordance with Michigan law without regard to conflicts of laws principles. Should any provision of this Agreement be held invalid or unenforceable by final judgment of a court of competent jurisdiction, it is the parties' intention that the remainder of this Agreement shall nevertheless be given effect as written. Any action arising out of or relating to this Agreement may be brought only in the Michigan state court having jurisdiction. If more than one party executes this Agreement as Client, then each such party shall be jointly and severally responsible for Client's performance and payment under this Agreement.

#### 6.5 Prior Performance.

Services performed by MGT pursuant to Client's authorization, but before execution of this Agreement, shall be considered as having been performed pursuant to the terms and conditions of this Agreement.

#### 6.6 Notices.

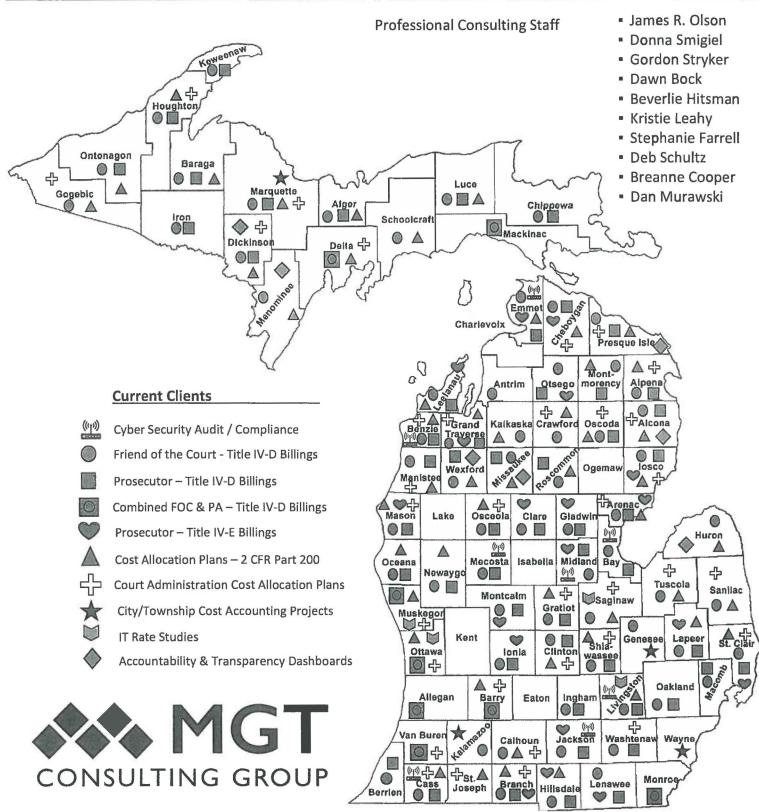

#### 1. Welcome

John Johansen began the meeting at 6:30 p.m. and welcomed the Committee members and guests to the meeting.

#### 3. Review Minutes of July 26, 2017 Meeting

A MOTION WAS MADE BY Tom Lindeman to approve the minutes for the July 26, 2017 meeting of the Greater Greenville Transportation Committee. SUPPORTED BY Duane Putnam. MOTION APPROVED UNANIMOUSLY.

#### 4. Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT) Update

Dennis Kent provided a summary of Michigan's Five Year Transportation Plan. The entire plan is on-line for review. Dennis Kent and Art Green discussed several projects that were done this year and several future projects. One pertinent project they discussed was a "mini" corridor between Greenville West Drive and Luray Street, in the City of Greenville. A comprehensive study is need to determine the best signalization (maybe involving Maplewood Drive) and the number of lanes (since there are as few as three lanes and as many as seven along this portion of the corridor). A pilot program could involve reducing the number of lanes but Federal Highway will need to be informed of potential changes.

The signal at M-57 and Myers Lake Avenue is not operational yet. MDOT is waiting for Consumers Energy to install two poles before the City of Grand Rapids can install the signal (MDOT contracted with the City of Grand Rapids since they perform this

task all of the time). Art Green hopes the signal is operational by the end of October/Middle of November. Note: The day after this meeting Consumers Energy installed the poles.

Art Green also discussed a future project involving a passing relief lane.

There was a lot of discussion about this year's US-131 project and next year's. This year they had two-way traffic on one side of the highway for a portion of the project. Next year's project will involve a movable barrier that will change the lane configuration so that southbound traffic will have two lanes in the morning and northbound will have two lanes in the evening to accommodate morning and evening rush hours. This will also be used during peak weekend times. This will allow for echelon paving to eliminate joints that typically fail. Two miles of next year's project will be a 50 year pavement.

Rodney Roy informed MDOT of four new restaurants planned for M-57 near Youngman Road.

Mark Christensen asked about visibility issues at M-91 and Snows Lake Road. There are 100+ commercial trucks accessing M-91 at the intersection. M. Christensen also commented that it is the end of construction season and most Montcalm County Road Commission projects are finished. Paving is all done and there were a lot of township projects this year. PASER ratings show the roads are improving.

Rick Sprague told the group that Kent County Road Commission's projects are also wrapping up for the construction season. The remaining portion of Lincoln Lake Road will not be upgraded to all season until 2026. There was some discussion about projects on the south side of Kent County.

Dave Bee discussed changes to the Rural Task Force program and mentioned that all of the roads have been rated for Michigan's Transportation Asset Management program. The 2017 Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS) is completed and several communities recently applied to the U.S. Economic Development Administration for grants.

#### 5. Review and Discussion of Goals and Actions

No discussion. The Committee typically overhauls the goals at the January meeting.

#### 6. Member Recruitment

Dave Bee encouraged everyone to provide him with the names and contact information for anybody interested in transportation improvements. He also said he would contact Courtland Township to see who replaced Chuck Porter and to see if we could meet at Courtland Township Hall.

#### 7. Member Round Table

• R. Roy mentioned that the area around Youngman Road could be a bottleneck.

- M. Christensen said the Wise Road Bridge project will occur in 2019. John Johansen commented on the quality of the Sidney Road project.
- Tom Lindeman began a discussion about Backus Road and truck traffic. He would like to see a speed study performed.
- Duane Putnam asked why there is not a left turn signal at Greenville West Drive.
   A. Green stated that the whole "mini" corridor is going to be looked at and that the last time MDOT checked the signal did not meet the warrants for a left turn phase.
   D. Putnam then asked about entrance ramps to highways and wrong-way drivers.
- Gae Wolfe told everybody about the upcoming Greenville Expo, the Grand Rapids Symphony playing at Greenville High School, and a new trailer that Montcalm Community College has to promote jobs related to robots and technology. She also discussed a countywide tourism meeting facilitated by MSU Extension and the current housing crisis.

### a. Administrative Matters

# Financial Statement

Copies of the Financial Statement were distributed. The Statement covers the first month of Fiscal Year 2018 – October 1 through 31, 2017. D. Bee briefly reviewed that Statement, saying that more financial information will be presented at the January 2018 Commission meeting when the auditor provides information about the FY 2017 audit.

We are at the beginning of the new Fiscal Year, so there has not been a lot of activity yet. The Statement does reflect the additional funding from EDA (Economic Development Administration), for which we received final approval after the Fiscal Year budget was adopted. All of our MDOT (Michigan Department of Transportation) grants are on a fiscal year basis, beginning in October 2017. Our EDA grant is on a calendar year, so the Statement reflects that, with most of the annual funds spent at the end of October.

A MOTION WAS MADE BY M. Langworthy to accept and place on file the Financial Statement for the period of October 1, 2017 through October 31, 2017. SUPPORTED BY B. Cowling-Cronk. MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY.

# Report from Nominating Committee

R. Steinke presented the Nominating Committee's report. He said that the three current officers are willing to serve again in 2018. D. Bee said that Dave Hodges, representing Ionia County, has also expressed an interest, and he might be appointed to the Executive Committee by the Chair next year. The Commission will vote for 2018 officers at their meeting January 19, 2018.

# Proposed Meeting Schedule for 2018

The proposed schedule for 2018 meetings was included with the meeting packet. The schedule includes meetings for the Commission, CEDS Committee, and Executive Committee. The schedule also shows the locations for all meetings.

The January Commission meeting will be held January 19th at the MDOT offices in Grand Rapids. The March meeting will be in Ottawa County, the June meeting at a Rail/Trails location in Osceola County, and the September meeting at Montcalm Community College.

# Proposed 2018 Goals

The WMRPC Goals for 2018 were included with the agenda. The Goals include both progress toward 2017 goals as well as the proposed goals for 2018. D. Bee said that we recently revised the goals format. Previously, the goals were very detailed and covered 15 pages. As part of the strategic planning process in June 2016, it was determined that the 15-page version was too overwhelming an amount of information to be useful to people. So the goals were condensed to a more concise list in one and a half pages.

- D. Bee reviewed the list of 2017 Goals with progress toward each goal. Then he reviewed the proposed 2018 Goals.
- J. Schmidt said that the list is more of a vision statement than goals, saying that goals are more detailed and action-oriented. He added that goals should include specific actions and a timetable. If the more detailed version is not included in the goals, it can just be made available to people to read if they are interested. D. Bee said that the 2017 CEDS report (distributed at today's meeting) has more details related to goals. J. Sandy said that before we condensed the goals, they were much too long and unwieldy. J. Schmidt said that goals should be "SMART" Specific, Measurable, Achievable, Results-oriented, and Time-based. J. Johansen said that at the next Commission meeting, we will address this issue in more depth.

A MOTION WAS MADE BY P. Bullock to adopt the 2018 WMRPC Goals. SUPPORTED BY D. Disselkoen. MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY.

### West Michigan Planning Alliance

The Directors of both the WMRPC (Region 8) and the West Michigan Shoreline Regional Development Commission (Region 14) attend each other's Board meetings. The Alliance is a mechanism to maintain ongoing communications. We also occasionally cooperate on specific projects when appropriate.

Erin Kuhn – West Michigan Shoreline Regional Development Commission. She distributed copies of Region 14's most recent newsletter. She talked about ongoing Homeland Security grants, and also about the Governor's 21st Century Infrastructure project. They recently completed their CEDS document – the process removed old projects and replaced them with a new and fresh version. The RPI (Regional Prosperity Initiative) 2018 grant application is due today. D. Bee added that two days ago, we spent the day with people in our office for interviews related to the RPI project.

# b. Staff Updates

D. Bee distributed a Staff Update. The Update includes information in the categories of Economic Development, Transportation Planning, Member Projects/Initiatives, and Other.

D. Bee highlighted a few of the items.

# c. <u>Guest Speaker – Peter Ross Dickow, West Michigan Region Director, U.S. Senator Gary</u> Peters

Mr. Dickow has worked in Senator Peters' office for two years. Prior to that, he was a local news reporter and anchor. He represents the Senator in a 14 county region that includes all of our counties except Osceola. There are seven district offices in Michigan. Mr. Dickow's role is to act as a "conduit" between Washington, D.C., and West Michigan. Rather than political or constituent work, his role is to help the regional office stay in touch with West Michigan. The Senator says that "you don't need a lobbyist, you've got us". They provide help with roadblocks related to issues in the Washington Capitol Hill bubble.

Mr. Dickow said that Senator Peters is a no-nonsense person with a lot of common sense, and is very approachable. He has a lot of education degrees and is smart and hardworking. The committees that he serves on are: Armed Services; Commerce, Science, and Transportation; Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs; and the Joint Economic Committee.

The Senator's top priority is to find ways to support job creation and promote economic development. His goals align with Region 8's goals. What is important is making government work, including finding solutions for regional issues – what are the projects, who are the people, and what are the issues? West Michigan is one of the shining stars. One thing the regional office does is to provide letters of support for grant applications; they have not written a letter for any of our projects. Like Region 8, they are involved with Federal agencies like EDA, the Federal Highway Administration, and others.

The Senator's work is not just with specific Congressional Committees. He is also involved in current and future activities to strengthen Federal assistance to local governments and private companies in the area of cyber security, which is an important problem. Senator Peters past work included serving as both a financial planner for 20 years and a City Commissioner in Oakland County, State Senator, U.S. House Representative, and Lottery Commissioner.

The automotive industry is important. The future will include self-driving vehicles. And Michigan should be the leader in the technology and policy related to driverless cars. He talked about a project for a massive test track for automated vehicles. Future technologies will rely on smart infrastructure. High speed broadband access for rural areas is critical. There is a great disparity, and policy makers should be aware of the need and work towards solutions.

# d. Guest Speaker - Jim Byrum, Michigan Agri-Business Association

Mr. Byrum said that climate change is still an important topic, with record years, and dramatic impacts. The resulting severe weather affects all of our counties, which all have significant agricultural interests. There has been more investment in agri-business and processing. Freight rates have been going up, while crop prices go down, with Michigan the lowest prices in the U.S.

The low prices for corn and soybean processing mean that more farms want to use those crops for feed. One example is pork processing, which has increased from 10,000 to 20,000. Other examples include turkey processing and eggs (from West Michigan). Milk prices are at historic lows, especially compared to production costs. The combined high prices of both milk production and land have led to more cows being bred for beef.

There are big cost efficiencies in size, with larger farms doing better. Corn and soybeans are processed for oil or feed. In the planning world, think about the multiple uses for soybean oil. Agricultural processing is different from food processing. He talked about the milling industry and processed wheat, saying that whole grains are a big deal, and mentioned Lowell and Frankenmuth. Formerly popular grains are returning.

We need to focus on trends that are happening, such as organic and vegetarian foods. Those trends will impact future production and consumption. Broadband is essential. For businesses to locate in an area, they need reliable utility access. DTE and Consumers Energy are in rural Michigan. We also need to be able to handle wastewater issues. Growth from within is the best policy.

- J. Sandy mentioned a recent discussion at the economic developers association related to two ballot initiatives, for medical and recreational marijuana. Mr. Byrum said that they receive many calls related to marijuana. It's an interesting dilemma because it is illegal in Federal statutes. Pesticide companies won't become involved with the product. There seems to be an aggressive trend, with a lot of plans for processing. It is a similar situation to ethanol, where there were many plans in the past that didn't happen. There is also the issue of hemp, which can be used for industrial processing. They can't find a market and it is now the number one cash crop. The challenge is how to skate around the Federal regulations.
- J. Johansen thanked Mr. Byrum and said that people are excited about agricultural opportunities.

### e. Round Table / Regional Issues

Dave Hodges – Ionia County. The County Courthouse is proceeding with its addition, which is looking good, and expected to open by the end of March. An egg production facility needs road upgrades.

Brenda Cowling-Cronk – Ionia County. She talked about business activities in Ionia County, including Cargill.

Roger Elkins – Osceola County. They are looking forward to a visit by the WMRPC in June. The City of Evart is hiring a new DDA / Chamber of Commerce Director.

Ray Steinke - Mecosta County. Everything is good.

Bill Routley - Mecosta County. Yes, everything is going well.

Mark Sweppenheiser – City of Big Rapids. He talked about RRC (Redevelopment Ready Communities) certification. It is a two-year process for the report of findings from the State.

Lynn Anderson – City of Big Rapids. The City has a new Mayor, Tom Hogenson, and will have a new Commissioner to fill his vacant seat.

John Schmidt – City of Big Rapids. Ferris State University's welding program expansion will be completed soon, along with upgrades to Swan Tower, the architecture program, and the upgrade of the North Hall residence.

Lillian VanderVeen – City of Wyoming. The orange barrels are all gone, and the construction is done for the season. The City has a new apartment complex, with 200 units filled. More apartments are in the works. City residents are interested in getting into the egg business.

Morris Langworthy – Osceola County. Merry Christmas!

Dave Jackson – Barry County. He talked about the expansion of the Riverwalk, along with the trail and band shell. Millennials are involved in the community. During the recent elections, ballot initiatives for seniors and schools were not successful. Businesses are dealing with a worker shortage.

Chris Thelen – Consumers Energy. He talked about Consumers Energy activities and projects.

Tom Lindeman – Montcalm County. Foremost Dairy is starting a building for processing. The County is hearing a lot about marijuana. They are working on reconstruction of the transit building in Greenville.

Travis Alden – Barry County. The Brownfield Redevelopment Authority has a potential project in Middleville. There is activity related to a manufacturing link to the schools, to give students exposure to job opportunities. He talked about advanced manufacturing assembly, with training for skilled trades; there can be dual enrollment. He listed manufacturers in the County that are expanding their businesses. They had a focus group with community leaders related to broadband. A continuing issue is MEDC's (Michigan Economic Development Corporation) involvement with rural communities in community development. Rural areas are the ones that need MEDC support the most – a small investment can have a huge impact.

Erin Kuhn – Region 14. She mentioned a mobility study.

Nora Balgoyen-Williams. She has a new position, with ITC, and will no longer be working for the Allegan County Economic Development office. ITC is a large utility company involved with power transmission. She talked about training fund awards for local communities including Allegan County. Employers, particularly small to mid-size companies, benefit from training dollars. The State is focused on providing training opportunities. The 911 system was installed. The Palisades Nuclear plant decided not to shut down before the end of their contract in 2022. The plant closure will have a huge impact on the region, with a significant part of their work force connected to the plant. They will apply for an EDA grant to plan for the plant's closure. They are working on a revised and expanded visitors' guide. She mentioned efforts in the areas of affordable housing and job training, along with issues in the construction industry.

Mike Womack – City of Cedar Springs. He talked about a new fire station, new library and park, and industrial park upgrades plus roads. There are no farms, but marijuana growers are interested in locating in the industrial park. The City decided not to allow chickens at private residences.

Regina Davis - Happy Holidays!

Jim Sandy – Mecosta County. He talked about Wolverine World Wide's battle with the federal government. The Wolverine plant in Big Rapids was sold to another footwear company, which saved 300 to 400 jobs. He mentioned the robotics program in the local schools. He agreed with Travis that there are problems with MEDC's involvement with rural areas. He talked about a project to retrain and retain workers.

John Johansen – Montcalm County. He spent a few days this week in Grand Rapids at a Michigan Farm Bureau meeting. He had lunch with a 35-year old from Ottawa County who described himself as a "first generation dairy farmer". That man has 180 cows and everything is done part-time by himself and one high school student – robotics are used for most of the work. His financial situation is good, and he has plans to expand. There are a lot of changes in agriculture and food processing. Rick Johnson, a former Speaker of the State House, was appointed to work with implementation of the marijuana legislation. There will not be very many licenses issued.

### 7. Unscheduled Business

Copies of the five-year 2017 CEDS report were distributed.

D. Bee mentioned that former Commission member, Ed Berghorst, died recently, at age 86. He had represented Ottawa County on the Commission.

Meeting Called to order by Chairman Brian Waber

Review of the agenda presented, Andrea made a motion to accept, seconded by David, with all in favor.

The Chair asked for public comments, none given.

Reviewed previous meeting minutes and Andrea made a motion to accept them, Tom seconded, all in favor.

Meeting turned over to Kevin who discussed a minor current budget concern and the reason for the concern, a lack of sentenced female felons for classes. A breakdown of the current jail population of 20 females was reviewed, showing only 1 eligible. Dawn reviewed our approved grant application and noted that it was worded so eligibility may work as long as pretrial females were going into a cognitive class, they would be considered eligible. However our substance abuse class would not take females until they were sentenced. This gives us an opportunity to get a jail-based cognitive class started soon.

Chairman Waber discussed the loss of valued board member Terry King who had passed away recently. Kevin introduced the guests; Julie Marion and Kristie Scarffe from MlWorks, Renee Clute, CPS supervisor and Duane Stanton. Each guest gave a little information about themselves and questions were directed to them. Kevin then gave an overview of what the community corrections advisory board does and the programs they oversee and discussed the history of community corrections in Montcalm county. Judge Kreeger made a motion to recommend to the board of commissioners that Kristie Scarffe, Duane Stanton, Renee Clute, and Lori Shearer be approved as new CCAB members, seconded by David, with all voting members in favor.

Grant manger Dawn Karfonta from the Office of Community Alternatives, Dept. of Corrections, brought recent data that she presented showing that Montcalm county had met it's goals for our grant in all areas, and had even finally exceeded our goal for lowering our prison commitment rate. Having previously kept a steady prison commitment rate of about 33% for several years, our current rate is below 26%. She stated that this shows programming in Montcalm county is having a positive impact.

Next meeting date not set but recommended for some time in April. Meeting adjourned 1:15

# History of Community Corrections in Montcalm County

The Michigan Community Corrections act of **1988** (P.A. 511) established a statewide policy to develop and operate corrections programs for adult non-violent offenders who would otherwise be incarcerated. The original intent was to reduce prison commitments by controlling jail populations and offering sentencing alternatives for Judges.

In **1989** Montcalm County established a **Community Corrections Advisory Board** (CCAB) and began to operate community service work crews cleaning up trash and doing manual labor for non-profit agencies in our community. The first work crew supervisors were; Chuck Stull and Tom Barnwell.

In 1991 Kevin Everingham began working for the Montcalm Sheriff Dept. as a work crew supervisor, running the one community corrections program that we had.

In 1992 the county, worried about possible liability issues decided to turn over community corrections management to the non-profit agency, EightCAP. They were the fiscal agent for the grant and employer for program work crew supervisor and data input clerical.

In 1993 Kevin took over all management of programs as the grant coordinator/CCAB manger. Work began to expand programs with new ideas like; Day Reporting and management of local referrals to Residential substance abuse treatment programs.

In 1997, Ionia county merged with Montcalm to form a two-county regional CCAB. The idea was that as a regional CCAB we may have more strength at State Board meetings. We had a grant coordinator, two work crew supervisors and a few part-time crew supervisors and a data entry person. Similar programs were offered in both counties including; Work Crews, Community Service placements, day-reporting, and residential treatment programs.

In 2003 Probation supervisor Ray Henning attended State training with the CCAB manger introducing a new "what works" programming idea; Cognitive Restructuring. We started using COMPAS assessments to determine eligibility of Cognitive program participants and started the first cognitive classes in Montcalm and Ionia counties.

In early 2004 after 7 years as a regional CCAB, Montcalm County initiated a split with Ionia County. The Ionia office was organized under the Ionia Sheriff Dept. Montcalm remained with EightCAP.

In 2005 the State began to reduce funding for Work Crew type programs. A department of corrections grant manager said at a CCAB meeting that we could continue those services but it was unlikely that she would recommend State funding for them.

In 2006, Montcalm CCAB was re-organized under its originator; The Montcalm Sheriff Dept.

By **2012** Montcalm Community Corrections was operating the following programs; A jail-based work Crew, Community Service Placements, Jail based Substance Abuse classes, Job Readiness Classes, Bond release drug testing program, Compas assessments and Cognitive classes.

By the end of fiscal year **2015** our CCAB was forced to eliminate all community service programs At that time, we had Cognitive programs in the jail and outside of the jail, job readiness program, Substance abuse class in the jail and drug testing.

In fiscal **2018**, due to the addition of separate female classes we were awarded our largest grant amount for program services, over \$95,000, not including allotted Residential Service State funds.

The term "drive" shall be synonymous with the terms street, avenue, place, way, lane, or boulevard.

A privately-controlled and maintained driveway servicing 2-4 parcels of land, dwellings, duplexes, or single principal buildings which provide access to a Public or Private Road in which one or all of the parcels, or dwellings are not visible from the road.

### Section 9. Design Requirements for Private Roads and Private Drives

- 5. Any private road or drive which terminates at a dead-end shall have a means for vehicle turnaround by use of a cul-de-sac with a minimum seventy five (75) feet easement radius and fifty (50) foot drive surface radius.
- 10. The private road or drive shall be constructed with such storm water runoff, culverts, and drainage contours as required by the Road Commission and Drain Commissioner to ensure adequate drainage and runoff. In the event that the proposed drainage and storm water management plan does not result in outlet to a County drain, the Building Official may seek review by an engineering consultant to ensure the intent of the published rules of the Drain Commissioner are satisfied.
- 13. All private drives shall comply with the Montcalm County Road Commission standards for residential driveways. All private drives shall comply with all regulations as required by the Montcalm County Address Ordinance, Montcalm County Drain Commission, & DEQ, and any other state and local laws, ordinances, and regulations.

### MONTCALM COUNTY ADDRESS ORDINANCE:

Section 3.05 Private Drives

Private drives, whether pre-existing or created after the adoption of this Ordinance shall be named when two (2) or more addresses served by the private drive exist or are established. If the previous addresses were numbered on the adjoining road they shall be changed to appropriate addresses using the private drive name.

Private drives, whether pre-existing or created after the adoption of this Ordinance shall be named when 2-4 addresses are served and any of the building cannot be seen from the roadway from either direction. If the previous addresses were numbered on the adjoining road they shall be changed to appropriate addresses using the private drive name.

The committee recommends to the full board to hold a public hearing regarding changes to the Montcalm County Private Roads and Drives Ordinance and Montcalm County Address Ordinance.

New Business –The committee received a copy of the proposed changes to the Zoning Ordinance for Richland Township. The correspondence was received today and committee members will review over the next few weeks and email questions or concerns to the chair who will send a letter to Richland Township thanking them for the correspondence.

Public comments were offered. Commissioner Johansen passed out a report from WMRPC that listed Federal Grant issued and the amount each county has received in EDA Grants. Montcalm County has had 10 projects totaling \$7,589,517 in EDA funding with Greenville receiving more grants in dollar value than any other jurisdiction in the State of Michigan. WMRPC has been very valuable resource to Montcalm County.

Ms. Hollinshead indicated she would like to collaborate with the county for involvement with funding dollars the county may have that is earmarked for spay and neutering services. Ms. Hollinshead also informed the committee that Tom Clark, Gratiot County Animal Control Director, has a key to the building to drop of animals after hours if necessary.
