The Meetings of the Board of Selectmen during the year 2008 were held primarily in the Harry B. Butters Chambers, Room 34, Norwood Memorial Municipal Building, on Tuesday evenings, with some meetings being conducted in other locations from time to time as required.

Thomas J. McQuaid and Gerard J. Kelleher were reelected to the Board at the Annual Election which took place on Monday, April 7, 2008. The Board elected Michael J. Lyons, Chairman.

During forty two regular meetings and a number of special or emergency meetings in calendar year 2008, the Board of Selectmen conducted public hearings as mandated by statute or policy. They also held innumerable public meetings and conferences on specific problems and subjects of interest and concern to the community.

During the Year, the Norwood Board of Selectmen, the Chief Elected Officials of the Town, brought forward and oversaw:

The Board met with Director of the MWRA Fred Laskey concerning the need to increase the redundancy of our water supply by bringing a 36" pipe down University Avenue. This is a \$9 million project and construction began in April 2008.

The Board and Town officials spent a great deal of time in the proposed development of Westwood Station. The Town has worked with the developer, CC&F, on a traffic improvement package to attempt to alleviate the negative impact on Norwood. The developer will fund improvements to the Route 1/University Ave. intersection; improvements on the Norwood side of University Avenue; and improvements to other intersections which may be affected by the development. The Board adamantly stated that the I-95 Northbound ramp must be constructed prior to the completion of Phase 1 of Westwood Station. The Town officials are working diligently to that end with the State.

The Board continues to push forward and find better ways to improve the quality of life for its residents.

The Board continues to meet with the State and Massachusetts Highway Department for a firm commitment to improve traffic &

gridlock along Route 1, Dean Street, Neponset Street and Washington Street in South Norwood.

The Board held discussions with the Fields Committee concerning the 2008 Athletic Fields Renovation Master Plan.

Anthony Mastandrea was appointed to serve as Norwood's representative to the MBTA Advisory Board. Bernard S. Cooper was appointed to serve as Norwood's Alternate.

Former Selectman Thomas A. Riolo was appointed as the Board's representative to the Norfolk County Advisory Board.

Superintendent of Public Works, Joseph Welch, and Alternate, Gary Schorer, continued to serve as Designees to the Neponset River Watershed Association.

As this is a very difficult time for all town departments, the Board accelerated budget meetings which began on Saturday, December 1, 2007 for fiscal year 2009. Town Accountant Robert Thornton presented the overview and at first pass there was a \$8.9 million deficit. The Budget Sub-Committee worked very hard to bring a balanced budget to Town Meeting. The state of the economy was foremost in everyone's mind and concern for town finances cast a long shadow. During February and March numerous subcommittee meetings were held in an effort to bring the budget into line. The Board appreciated all the time and effort spent by Management, Department heads and Fin Com in trying to come up with a balanced budget.

Student Government Day was held on Tuesday, April 8th. Students representing the Board were Casey Dziuba, Lisa Marie Ferzoco, Jessica El Bach, Darnel Pierre, and Billy Rydzewski. Selectman Gerard Kelleher has worked over two years in negotiations with NSTAR and the Norwood Light Department to upgrade electrical service. He fought throughout the whole process to make sure the Town got two payments of \$2.05 million for the next two years and \$1.8 million for the next twenty years.

Ernest Boch Jr. appeared before the Board with his yearly donation named in honor of his father and grandfather. The Board reviews and considers each request and this year's recipients include Norwood Historical Society, American Legion Baseball, Morse House Restoration, Morrill Memorial Library, Concerts on the Common, Friends of Norwood Football, Meals on Wheels, Norwood Art Assoc., Norwood Senior Babe Ruth Baseball, Norwood Circle of Hope Foundation, Morrill Library Literacy Lunch, Memorial Hall Restoration fund – the Cannon, Historical Commission, Post Prom Party, Norwood Day, Scavenger Hunt, Friends of Norwood Lacrosse, Norwood Hoop Club, Friends of Norwood Field Hockey, Conservation Commission, Friends of Norwood Softball, Norwood Cultural Council, Norwood Youth Cheerleading, High School Boys Hockey, Friends of Girls' Soccer, and Norwood Diamond Club.

Thomas J. McQuaid as the Board's representative and Chairman of the Committee of 21 has been diligently working on the High School Project and Manager John J. Carroll has been appointed by the Board to serve as the point person for the eligible applicant, which is the Board of Selectmen.

The Committee voted to go with the model school format. The Board voted to officially designate the site of the existing Norwood High School on Nichols Street as the site for the new Norwood High School.

Letters of commendation were awarded to members of the Light Department, Police Department, Fire Department and Public Works Department for performing over and above the call of duty.

The Board recognized Joseph Welch and the employees of the Cemetery Division for the consistently fine job they do maintaining the grounds at Highland Cemetery. Their hard work and efforts made the holidays, especially Memorial Day, even more meaningful.

Because trash is such a big budget item, in October Norwood began a mechanized single stream recycling program. Two rubbish carts were deposited at each household—1 for trash and 1 for recyclables. Residents are encouraged to participate.

A number of Norwood residents, including the Girls Scouts, Cub Scouts and Norwood Circle of Hope, were able to enjoy the beauty of the Walter J. Dempsey Memorial Bandstand. Joyful brides and grooms used the Bandstand as a background for their wedding vows and photographs. Young and old alike were brought together at the Bandstand on Sunday evenings to listen to the music of our Summer Concert Series. On Wednesday evenings Summerfest moved from the lawn of Town Hall to the renovated Walter J. Dempsey Bandstand. Thanks to all the volunteers who worked for several weekends to complete the renovations and thanks to all the donors who contributed the money to complete the renovation.

The Board was very proud to recognize the academic efforts and athletic achievements of the young people in Town for their training, dedication and talent.

Norwood Day was held on Saturday, September 13, 2008. The event is put together by the Town under the sponsorship of Recreation Superintendent Jerry Miller and his committee. They worked all year getting this event together and the weekend activities started with the fireworks, in spite of the rain, on Friday evening. Washington St. is blocked off from Nahatan to Guild St. and there are games, rides, a food court under the sponsorship of Chairman Lyons, and most all groups are represented with a booth on Washington Street.

Another Town activity sponsored by a committee was the Haunted House which was held during the week of Halloween at the Civic Center. The Civic was transformed. Jerry Miller and his committee did an outstanding job of scaring everyone of all ages.

The Town Common was transformed on Dec. 6th for the Annual Circle of Hope Luminary night. Luminaries lined the four sides and pathways of the Common. Music was provided.

As Electric Light Commissioners, the Board has held additional meetings at the Light Department to discuss recommendations of the Future Electrical Power & Gas Supply Needs Committee, Broadband and the expansion of our phone service.

A Committee formed by the Board and chaired by Chairman Lyons is the Alternative Energy Committee to explore alternative and renewable energy ideas.

A considerable number of weeks were spent by the Public Employee Committee, the Manager and the Board coming to an agreement to enter the Commonwealth of Massachusetts Group Insurance Commission's health plan effective July 1, 2009. The Town hopes to save approximately \$1 million.

The Board of Selectmen would like to express our sincere gratitude to the hundreds of citizens who volunteer their time and energy on committees and commissions to make Norwood the great American Town that it is. This involvement is integral to the professional and participatory nature of town government in Norwood. We are also very grateful to the dedicated and effective service rendered by the Town's work force. These employees are dedicated to the ideals of public service. Finally, the Board expresses its sincere appreciation to its department heads, our office personnel and Staff and General Manager for their leadership and hard work.

# AIRPORT COMMISSION

## REPORT OF THE NORWOOD AIRPORT COMMISSION

The Norwood Airport Commission (NAC) is pleased to submit its annual report for calendar year 2008.

A five-member commission, the NAC is appointed by the Board of Selectmen, with individual members serving three- year terms. NAC's responsibilities include overseeing the stewardship, operations and management of Norwood Memorial Airport, which encompasses some 672 acres. Day-to-day management is handled by Airport Manager, Russ Maguire, and his assistant, Mark Raymond.

Norwood Memorial Airport is one of 37 airports within the Commonwealth that provides general aviation (non-military, non-airline) services. These offerings include transportation alternatives for corporate officers and business persons, television and sports personalities, as well as local, state, national and international officials and statesmen. Other airport services include: charter flights; electronic newsgathering for two major Boston news stations (Channel 5 and 25); traffic reporting; pipeline patrol; aerial spraying by the Norfolk County Mosquito Control; personal transport; flight instruction; and cargo services. The State Police Air Wing, though no longer a tenant on the Norwood Airport, still relies on our fueling and maintenance support. And our weather station provides up-to-the-minute meteorological conditions reported throughout the day by both national and regional news stations.

Our facility operates 24 hours a day, seven days a week. This is especially critical for residents throughout the Commonwealth and northeastern United States who depend on emergency medical transports from the Norwood Airport. In particular, our air ambulance and inter-hospital organ donor flights provide time-critical, life-saving access to specialized medical centers in Boston, Providence and New York.

A 2000 economic impact study of the state's 37 public use airports—excluding Logan International and Hanscom Field, Bedford—ranked the Norwood Airport fourth in total economic impact. In Norfolk County alone, the study showed that the Norwood Airport generates about \$49 million in annual economic returns. Norwood Airport users take advantage of our hotels, restaurants and retail outlets. Businesses, from the Fortune 500 class to smaller micro companies, routinely use our facility.

As for diversity of service, in addition to the private, corporate and charter aircrews/passengers who utilize our facility for personal and profession-related transport, a number of aviation companies also call Norwood Memorial Airport home. The following is a list of companies and agencies based here, to include the services they provide:

- *Mass. Aeronautics Commission* Fleet of state aircraft for industry support, inspections, investigations

- *Fresh Air Detailing* Aircraft cleaning
- *Taso's Euro-Café* Airport restaurant
- *Enterprise* Car rentals

In 2008, the airport continued to address some key physical plant needs. Of particular note was the construction of an 8,000 sq. ft. building adjacent to the air traffic control (ATC) tower. By design, the building's first floor now houses the municipal department's snow removal equipment. When completed, the second floor will accommodate offices for airport management and NAC, with additional space for security badging and administration, safety training, archiving and files; as well as a public meeting room. Following 62 years as a town-owned facility, the Norwood Airport finally has its first-ever municipal building, since, up to now, all buildings and hangars on the airport had been privately owned.

In designing the building, significant attention was given to the park area overlooking our facility. As a result, we've increased the useable square footage of our viewing area by re-grading the grounds into a gentler slope. We've also removed much of the rocky sub-surface and replaced it with better loam and seeding. Finally, for the benefit of our patrons, we've installed high intensity lighting to improve safety and security at night. This structure and the surrounding site enhancements, costing \$2 million, were funded by federal and state grants covering more than 97 percent of the total cost. Grant financing would not have been possible without the support of FAA and the Massachusetts Aeronautics Commission.

With a \$200,000 federal grant received in 2007, the Town of Norwood in 2008 was the beneficiary of yet another long overdue airport project: the renovation of our municipal parking lot. Under the direction of the Town's Engineering Department, this project included grading, drainage, re-paving, landscaping and the installation of conduit for security lighting. Congressman Stephen Lynch and his aide, Jim Gordon (a Norwood native), helped to make this grant-financing project a reality.

To address community relations, we've continued to pursue a comprehensive noise education/abatement program—consisting of airfield signage and a flight publication insert for both our based and transient pilots. This remains a high priority program. Not surprisingly, the piloting community has also embraced our efforts, and this is reflected in the overall decrease in noise complaints. Throughout 2008, noise complaints continued on the decline.

In May, Norwood Airport's air traffic control personnel received a regional Facility Excellence Award for exceptional services. According to Airport Manager, Russ Maguire, "Aside from its excellent safety record, our tower is also the unsung hero in the airport's on-going noise abatement program. Moving air traffic to and from this facility, while mitigating the noise and over flights—whenever possible—can be challenging. My hope is that the neighborhoods that abut the Norwood Airport, whether they are in Norwood, Canton or Westwood, will now start to understand

the value of our tower personnel, given the air service demands here.” The award is based on a number of factors such as input from the piloting community, the tower’s operational performance, plus the airport’s total flight operations. In particular, aircrew’s flying into and out of Norwood note the professionalism and friendliness of Norwood’s ATC personnel, regardless of their work load at any given time.

The success of Norwood Memorial Airport is due to many. But we would be remiss if we did not express our gratitude to the Board of Selectmen, the Finance Commission, and Town Meeting representatives, all of whom recognize the great importance of this airport to the regional and national air transportation system, as well as to the economy of Norwood and the Commonwealth. Through the years, we are especially grateful for the support—financial and otherwise—that the Massachusetts Aeronautics Commission and FAA have provided to the airport. We look forward to continuing this productive partnership.

## **2007 ANNUAL REPORT OF THE NORWOOD CABLE COMMUNICATIONS COMMISSION**

The Norwood Cable Communications Commission was established by the Board of Selectmen (the Licensee Authority) to serve as their designee and appointed commission for cable operations in the Town of Norwood.

The function of the Cable Commission is largely defined in the contracts between the cable system providers and the Town of Norwood. The Cable Commission is the body intended to supervise the contracts in Norwood’s interest. The Cable Commission also has the goal of fostering effective local access television broadcasting and programming. The Norwood Board of Selectmen appoints the Cable Commission’s Members to three-year terms.

The Cable Commission Members during 2008 were: Chairman Richard M. Shay, Paul McGee, Joan M. Jacobs, Albert Fiske and Peter Strano. Commission Secretary was Harriet Simons.

The Cable Commission meets monthly at 7:00 p.m. in the Drummey Room at the Norwood Town Hall. The public is invited to attend these meetings.

Three companies are contracted to provide cable service for Norwood: Norwood Light Broadband, Comcast and Verizon.

Norwood is one of a few towns in the Commonwealth that has its own cable corporation. The Norwood Light Department runs Norwood Light Broadband, providing cable services, Internet access and telephone services.

Comcast acquired the very first cable television license granted in Norwood. It also provides Internet access and telephone services.

Verizon originally provided telephone and Internet services in Norwood, but after installing a new fiber optic based network and negotiating a contract with Norwood, began providing cable service in Norwood in 2007. Verizon has met contract requirements so far with ongoing work to provide the remaining free video feeds to public buildings and to expand coverage into neighborhoods where utility access is underground. The Cable Commission has worked with Verizon to see that contract

requirements were met. The largest issue was implementing the requirement to broadcast the Norwood specific local access channels. It was necessary to coordinate activities between Comcast and Verizon to provide Verizon with the local access channel signals to be broadcast over their system.

Although Verizon met contract requirements, reliable broadcast of public access channels over their system began well after cable service was available. The Cable Commission responded to numerous citizen inquiries about availability of the public access channels.

Financial, outage and customer complaint reports required by contract and law to be submitted to the Cable Commission by the service providers have been received and reviewed and all licensees have met their license requirements.

The Cable Commission members stayed informed about changes in service from the providers so that they can answer questions posed by citizens and town government. The Cable Commission is only involved with the video broadcast services of the companies, not with Internet access or telephone services.

It is important to note that although neither the Board of Selectmen nor the Cable Commission has any control over rate changes instituted by the providers or their channel selections, cable subscribers can raise their objections and/or comments to the Mass State Commission and the Federal Communications Commission. For further information contact the Norwood Cable Communications Commission.

Each of the cable companies pays money to the Town of Norwood as required by their contracts. These revenues are provided to the Norwood Public Access Corporation (NPA TV) to be used for local programming. NPA TV is a non-profit corporation formed by the Board of Selectmen in 2003 to provide quality public access, educational and governmental programming over all the town's cable television systems.

Norwood is also unique in having two non-profit cable access companies. In addition to NPA TV, Norwood Cable Television Corp., known as NCTC, although now unfunded, remains operational.

The Cable Commission, in cooperation with NPA TV and Jack Tolman - Norwood Schools TV Director, encourages the continued expansion of locally produced programming. Also, we will continue to inform the cable companies at our monthly meetings of all requests, comments and recommendations offered by the subscribers with the goal of improving the Norwood Cable TV systems for all subscribers.

The Cable Commission thanks the members of the Board of Selectmen, Town Manager John Carroll, the Selectmen's Administrative Assistant Julia Liddy, and all other town officials for their assistance to the Cable Commission members.

## Norwood Public Schools 2008-2009 System-Wide Annual Report

Dear Town Meeting Members:

The Norwood Public Schools is ably led by a seven (7) member School Committee consisting of Mr. Mark P. Joseph, Mr. Richard W. Kief, Mr. Joseph M. Pentowski, Mr. William J. Plasko (Vice Chair), Jr., Ms. Courtney Rau, Mr. Paul Samargedlis (Chair) and Mrs. Eleanor M. Travers.

The 2008-2009 school year resulted in a number of changes in the Central Administration Offices. Dr. Edward P. Quigley, former Superintendent of Schools for six (6) years, was replaced by Mr. John A. Moretti on July 1, 2008. Mrs. Carole Poirier, Assistant to the Superintendent, and Dr. Margaret Dougherty, Assistant Superintendent of Schools, will retire June 30, 2009 and will be replaced by one Deputy Superintendent of Schools. Their successor will be announced shortly. Mr. William Hurley, Business Manager, resigned July 1, 2008 and will be replaced by Mr. Ralph Dumas, Jr., as Director of Finance and Operations. Mr. Dumas will begin on May 11, 2009. Mrs. Helen Wyche, Director of Student Services, announced her retirement on April 1, 2009 following six (6) years of service. The School Committee has yet to appoint her replacement.

At the Building level the following changes took place: Ms. Margi Tessier, Principal, and Mr. Stephen Shinnick, Assistant Principal, of the Coakley Middle School both retired in December, 2008 and were replaced by Mr. Zeffro Gianetti as Principal. Mr. Robert Fitzpatrick, Principal of the Cleveland Elementary School, announced his intent to retire on June 30, 2009 following thirty-six (36) years of exceptional service to the children in Norwood.

The School Committee engaged in a number of significant initiatives, which resulted in the following improvements in the Norwood Public Schools:

- New courses in Forensics, Robotics and Engineering have been added to the curriculum at the Senior High School;
- The addition of 460 hours of English/Language Arts and Mathematics instruction at the Coakley Middle School during the students' three (3) year career at the school;
- The Special Education Department has been reformed to include four (4) new strands to provide continuity of services in Gr. K-12;
- New Literacy materials were purchased for all Elementary teachers;
- Elementary Class Size remains at a desirable level of 23:1;
- Seven (7) Collective Bargaining Agreements were negotiated successfully;
- The School Committee voted to include in the FY10 budget (2.0) FTE Reading Specialists, a (1.0) FTE Math Specialist and (2.0) FTE Team Chairs;
- Data Analysis Teams were formed in each building; and
- Grade Level Meetings were conducted to enhance continuity and consistency in curriculum and instruction.

Having identified a number of new initiatives, the most profound accomplishment of the Norwood School Committee has been the successful debt exclusion for the new Norwood High School. The School Committee cannot sufficiently and adequately express their gratitude to all members of the Norwood community for their sacrifice and dedication to its' next generation of children.

While we have accomplished a great deal this year, many challenges still remain. A search will begin next year with the intent of hiring a permanent Superintendent of Schools. Decisions will be addressed regarding the current Mathematics curriculum in Gr. 6-12. The State mandated testing results (MCAS) will continue to be a focus for improvement.

We are blessed to have dedicated professionals serving on our School Committee who are devoted to serving the children and parents of Norwood. I would like to acknowledge our administrative team, faculty and support staff for their unwavering devotion and dedication to the children of Norwood. Their professionalism is the single greatest factor in the success of the Norwood Public Schools.

The Blue Hills Regional District School Committee is pleased to submit its Annual Report to the residents of the Town of Norwood.

Blue Hills Vocational Technical School continues to provide quality vocational instruction and postgraduate training to ninth through twelfth grade students and residents of the nine district towns of Avon, Braintree, Canton, Dedham, Holbrook, Milton, Norwood, Randolph, and Westwood.

Kevin L. Connolly serves as the Norwood representative. The public is invited to attend Committee meetings which are held on the first and third Tuesday of each month at 7:00 p.m. in Room 207A at the school at 800 Randolph St., Canton. The following members comprised the 2007-08 / 2008-09 District School Committee:

Blue Hills Regional offers a variety of outstanding academic and technical courses at the high school, post-secondary and continuing education levels for district residents and others.

There were some changes in the composition of the Blue Hills District School Committee (see above).

Kevin L. Connolly was re-elected on November 4, 2008 to another four-year term by a district wide vote of 57,660.

Late in 2004, Gov. Mitt Romney announced the inception of the John and Abigail Adams Scholarships, which are given to high school students in recognition of their outstanding MCAS scores. The scholarships entitle the recipients to four years of free tuition at any University of Massachusetts campus or any participating state or community college in Massachusetts. One out of 43 Adams Scholars from the Class of 2009 at Blue Hills Regional, Jessica LaSalvia, was from Norwood. A ceremony was held on Nov. 24, 2008 to honor all of them.

Eighty-four Blue Hills Regional students participated in the SkillsUSA Central District Competition on March 11 at Diman Regional Technical School in Fall River. Sixteen Blue Hills Regional students won medals, two were from Norwood. They were Blake Flavin, gold medal in Nail Care, and Felipe deSouza, bronze medal in Office Computer Applications.

The National Honor Society (NHS) Induction was held on February 13. Twenty-three new members were welcomed. The Norwood inductee was Tyler Ellett of the Class of 2010.

The school held its annual Open House on Wednesday, Nov. 19, 2008. The well-attended event allowed visitors to tour the entire school, see the technical programs, visit academic departments, and

watch demonstrations, and meet teachers, administrators and students.

Eighteen juniors in the Health Occupations Program earned their certified nursing assistant credentials on June 2. The Norwood student honored at the ceremony was Timothy Raftery.

Blue Hills Regional also administers the Practical Nursing Program, a full-time post-graduate program of study offered on a tuition and fee basis. Practical Nursing students are prepared upon graduation to take the NCLEX-PN (National Council Licensure Examination for Practical Nursing) through the State Board of Registration in Nursing. Over the years, essentially all students in this program have been employed upon graduation.

As of October 1, 2008, total enrollment in the high school was 844 students; of those, 55 students were from Norwood.

As part of their training, Blue Hills students offer services relating to their studies, at below market prices, to non-profit agencies and to district residents as noted below:

Students in Cosmetology offer a full range of services for hair, skin and nails by appointment.

Full-course lunches prepared by students are served to the public Tuesday through Friday during the school year in the Blue Hills Regional restaurant, the Chateau de Bleu. Bakery goods are available for purchase, and the facility can also be used for civic group meetings.

The Automotive students complete auto projects for member towns and community residents on a departmental-approved appointment basis.

The Early Education Program includes a preschool program for youngsters who are two years nine months old to kindergarten entrance age. This program is accredited by the National Association for the Education of Young Children.

Each year, Blue Hills Construction Technology students build large-scale additions for homeowners and do town projects. The two most recently completed projects were home additions in Braintree and Westwood.

## POLICE DEPARTMENT'S ANNUAL REPORT FOR CALENDAR YEAR 2008

Attached is the Police Department's Annual Report for calendar year 2008. In summary, the Police Department responded to 26,212 calls for police services, issued 5,830 citations for motor vehicle offenses, investigated 1,161 motor vehicle accidents, filed 3,056 criminal complaints, and made 1,075 arrests. Of the arrests, one of the more serious was the arrest of Kevin Schultz for the murder of Scott Haynes – the last time a murder occurred in Norwood was in 1999 when Martin Guy was arrested for the murder of Christopher Payne. A more in-depth outline of the Police Department's activities during the year is included in the following reports.

Also during the year, four new officers were sworn in on July 29th and are now serving the Town as the Police Department's newest members. The officers are Christopher Padden, Gregory Hayes, Matthew O'Brien, and Joseph Reen.

Another significant event that occurred during the year was the dedication, on September 13th, of a memorial bench in honor of Officer Peter Borroni and four-year-old Adam McGugin. Thanks to the efforts of Nancy McGugin, Adam's mother, the bench has been placed in front of the Police and Fire station. Peter and Adam came together and developed a special bond and relationship while they both were undergoing treatment for Cancer. Unfortunately, the disease that brought them together took both of them from us. The courage, love, and support that each gave the other will be forever remembered by all of us who came to know them.

Along with this report, on behalf of the men and women of the Police Department, I want to express my sincere thanks and appreciation to Town officials, Department Heads, other Town employees, and the people of Norwood for their support and assistance throughout the year in helping the Police Department fulfill its mission of providing for the safety and well-being of all.

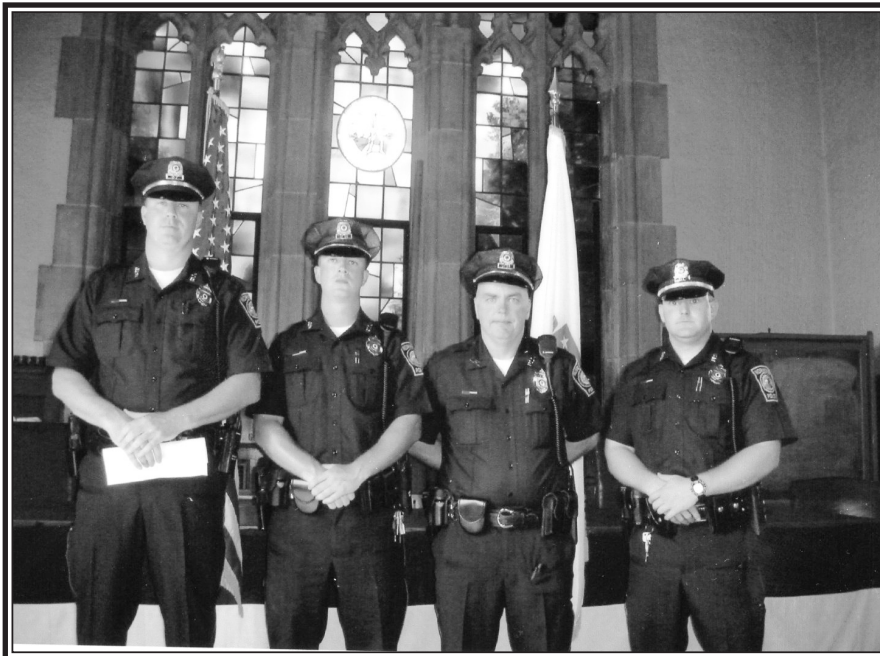

## **2008 ANNUAL REPORT OF THE FIRE - RESCUE - EMS DEPARTMENT**

I hereby submit the Annual Report of the Fire Department for the year 2008. The Firefighters, Officers and Chief of the Department would like to thank the Board of Selectmen, Finance Commission, Town Meeting Members and the Residents of Norwood for their continued support of the Fire Department during 2008. I would also like to express the Fire Department's appreciation of the General Manager's Office and various Town Departments for their assistance and cooperation in completing our mission.

The Town's Emergency Medical Service has matured into one of the best in the region. One of the key reasons for this is the ability of the Department to staff two ambulances full time, one Advanced Life Support and the other Basic Life Support. Our Dispatchers are able to assess the nature of the call and then send the most appropriate unit; this allows us to keep our EMS availability maximized. The Department's Quality Assurance/Quality Improvement Program continues to evolve and the Hospital's Medical Director for all area EMS Systems reports that our EMS documentation consistently attains high marks resulting in better care for our patients. Financially, the EMS Program is a tremendous success for the Town, bringing in almost one million dollars for the Town's General Fund during FY 08.

### **SIGNIFICANT DEPARTMENTAL EVENTS**

2008 was once again a very active year in general for the Department, with several larger fires occurring and many important projects underway. Departmental committees have continued to complete many projects for the betterment of the Department in the areas of Communications, Equipment, Apparatus, Public Education, Media Relations, Record Keeping and Computer Management, Building Maintenance, EMS, Fire Investigation, Dispatch Policies, Emergency Management, Ice/Water Rescue Technology and the Mass Decontamination Unit. The Department continued to be involved with, and assist in, many Community Events throughout Town. Those members assigned these duties are once again commended for their dedication and hard work during the past year to assure we meet the needs of the Department and the citizens we serve.

We regret that there were 13 Civilian injuries and one Civilian death due to fire in Norwood during 2008. Our Fire Prevention Office continues to be directly involved in Public Education and Enforcement of the Commonwealth's General Laws with regard to Fire Safety. We also continue with our local Public Education Program and Public Service Announcements done by our Public Information Officer (PIO).

On Thursday, September 11, 2008 the Norwood Fire Department Color Guard and 16 members of the Department, including Chief Howard, attended the Annual Massachusetts Fallen Firefighters Memorial Ceremony at the State House in Boston. We once again, would also like to thank Mr. Lenny Sansone of Sansone Bus Company for providing transportation to this ceremony.

### **PERSONNEL**

The Department had two Retirements during the past year. One vacancy was allowed to be filled, while the other vacancy was eliminated during the FY09 Budget process, which has led to two positions now being eliminated in the past two budgets. Jeff Campilio was hired during the year; and joined the Department with his

Advanced Life Support Certification as a Paramedic and was able to be assigned on a shift after completing his orientation. Because we were able to hire Jeff as a trained Paramedic, we were able to avoid more than \$20,000 in training expenses to the Town.

This completed the hiring of 16 Paramedics more than a year ahead of schedule and under budget for the Advanced Life Support - Paramedic Program. Also, Firefighter/EMT Gerald Mahoney completed his Paramedic training and was certified as a Paramedic.

On Friday evening, October 3, 2008 at 213 Pleasant Street the Department responded to a house fire involving a two-family home that resulted in the rescue of a twelve year old girl with burns who survived the fire. Firefighter/EMT Michael Carr and Firefighter/Paramedic Michael Downing of Ladder Co# 1 are credited with the rescue of this young girl and they were assisted also by Norwood Police Officers Chris Padden and Joe Reen. Both the Norwood Fire Department and Norwood Police Department recognized these employees for their heroic actions along with the Board of Selectmen. All together 10 people were injured, two with burns, and all were transported from this fire to area hospitals. All Norwood Fire Department, Norwood Police Department and surrounding area Fire Departments that responded to this fire are commended for their actions in handling this difficult fire.

### **EQUIPMENT**

There was no new equipment purchased during 2008 as all requests for equipment replacement were deferred at the Annual Town Meeting in May 2008.

### **PUBLIC SAFETY FACILITY**

Many hours were spent during the year meeting with the Board of Selectmen's Police/Fire Building Committee; Chaired by Selectman William Plasko, Sr., as we continued to work closely to repair a number of identified problems with the facility. At this time, I would like to recognize the members of the Committee, General Manager John Carroll, Chief Bart King and Administrative Assistant to the Chief, Paul Bishop of the Police Department and Deputy Chief Ron Maggio and Master Mechanic/Facility Manager, Mike Waters of the Fire Department, for their many hours of dedication and hard work in correcting these issues. Special thanks to Selectman William Plasko, Sr. for his leadership and dedication once again with this difficult task. I would also like to thank Town Engineer Mark Ryan, Purchasing Agent Cathy Carney and Building Inspector Mark Chubet for their assistance also provided to us during the year.

The following are a list of Repairs made during the year;

- Complete repairs to Shower Facility on Fire Department third floor and the Installation of an additional Shower.
- Completed repairs and upgrades to Facility HVAC System. Final Balancing and Report also completed on System.
- Completed Re-Insulation to all HVAC Ductwork.
- Repairs and Replacement of one of the Facility Boilers. All parts were covered by Warranty and Labor paid by the Town.
- Complete Replacement of Flooring in third floor Hallway, Kitchen and Locker Rooms on Fire Department side of Facility.
- Test Patch and Moisture Test done on Fire Department Apparatus Floor along with two areas having repairs made to determine how best to complete repairs to floor in future.
- All Overhead Doors Replaced on Fire Department side of Facility and additional door Installed in rear of Building on Bay 5.
- A number of Air Conditioning Actuators had to be replaced in the

Facility during the year.

- The Fan Cooling Unit Motor had to be replaced during the year on RTU 6# of the Facility HVAC System.
- We had to replace the Compressor on RTU 2# for the Facility HVAC System also during the year.
- Balancing Dampers had to be added to the HVAC System in the Fire Department Dispatch Area and Captains Office in order to complete Balancing of the Facility's HVAC System.
- Floors/Carpet in both the Fire Department and Police Department Dispatch Centers had to be replaced as well.
- Three Granite Slabs on Apron of Fire Department for the Overhead Doors had to be replaced. This continues to be a problem with more Granite Slabs cracked and we are studying on how best to make these additional repairs.
- Testing was done on the front windows of the Building because of water leaking inside. Also, one window on the side of the Building actually was removed and then repaired and reinstalled to determine the best method of repair and final cost of repairing all windows in the Police/Fire Facility. Funding for this work will be proposed in the upcoming FY 2010 Town Budget for Town Meeting.

I wish to thank all the personnel of the Department for their devotion and dedication to duty. To the Officers and Firefighters of Norwood's surrounding Towns, I convey our gratitude for their professional assistance given through our mutual aid agreements.

# DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS

## 2008 DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS ANNUAL REPORT

I herewith submit the 2008 Annual Report for the Department of Public Works.

The year of 2008 has been another very productive year in the area of construction for our Public Works Department. Efforts have been made to improve our drinking water through our cleaning and lining program, as well as the aggressive removal of lead services. We have continued with our annual resurfacing program and have made many improvements to our ball fields, parks and playgrounds in an effort to address the concerns of our residents.

The Gioioso & Sons, Inc. of Hyde Park was awarded the MWRA contract for the installation of a new 36" water line on University Avenue and Everett Street which will serve as an emergency connection for the Town. Work started in May, with the installation of a tee for the connection between the MWRA main and the Norwood main near Canton Street. In all, over 10,400 linear feet of water main was installed.

The Dewcon, Inc of New Jersey was awarded this years cleaning and lining contract. The following streets have been relined:

Cedar Street	Folan Avenue
Savin Avenue	St. John Avenue
Quincy Avenue	St. Joseph Avenue
Northview Avenue	St. Paul Avenue

All of the above streets have been put back in service. The contract is approximately 70% completed. Beginning in April 2009, Dewcon will begin work on the remainder of Pond Avenue, St. George Avenue and Walkhill Road. A June 2009 completion date is expected.

The Frederickson-Jones Construction Company of Walpole Ma was awarded the second Town lead service contract. Thirty services have been replaced and of this number, 15 were from the house to the main, 11 were on the home owner's side only, and 4 were the street side from the main to the curb stop. Only one service is left to complete the contract.

This company has also been working on improving the drainage system at the Ellis ball field, as well as excavating, grading, loaming and seeding the area for a new athletic field.

The Podgurski Company extended 250 feet of new 8" PVC main on Lenox Street to provide a 6" sewer connection from the Service Master Company that had previously been on a septic system.

Marking, Inc. of Pembroke MA was awarded this year's paint and thermo plastic contract for crosswalks, center lines and fog lines.

Our annual resurfacing contract was awarded to T. L. Edwards Company of Stoughton. All or part of the following streets have been resurfaced or reconstructed:

Garfield Avenue	Dean Street
Pleasant Street	Access Road
Berwick Place	Westover Parkway

This company also made safety changes and repaved the parking lots at the Prescott and Callahan School, as well as the airport parking lot. Sections of sidewalks were installed on Access Road.

The Sealcoating, Inc of Hingham, MA micro-resurfaced the following streets:

Orleans Road	Chatham Road
Pembroke Road	Oakleigh Road
Malvern Road	Yarmouth Road

In all, over 6500 linear feet of micro-resurfacing was completed in the past year.

Heath Consultants Company located 1 service leak and 2 main leaks through their leak detection survey. All were repaired by Town forces.

The Mario Susi & Son Contracting Co. of Dorchester installed granite curbing, repaired concrete sidewalks, rebuilt manholes and catch basins and they also repaired a section of roadway on Pleasant Street as a result of a water break.

Waverly Landscape has continued its contract for mowing and general maintenance of our newly reconstructed school fields. They also assisted our Park Department with the refurbishing of the Balch fields. In addition, Waverly Landscape also activates and winterizes the irrigation systems on our new fields.

Public Works crews were involved in 25 snow and ice related incidents, of this number, 16 were salting and sanding, 8 were plowing operations involving the use of private contractors and 2 were snow removal from the business districts. Crews also cleared snow at school stops and traffic supervisor's stations.

The Public Works parks division has continued doing an excellent job in caring for, and maintaining our parks, commons, and athletic fields. All areas are groomed, mowed and trimmed on a regular schedule. Fertilizing is done in both spring and fall.

Trash and recycling became fully automated in Norwood on October 6, 2008. Waste Management, the town's trash contractor began collecting trash and single stream recycling with their new automated side loader trucks. Single stream recycling consists of putting all recycling into one container. It is meant to make it easier for residents, thereby increasing the recycling rate and saving the town money. The Town's recycling rate went from a dismal 14% to a respectable 25% during the first four months of the program. The overall trash tonnage also dropped during this time. The new program has been well received by the residents and the transition has been relatively smooth.

Parks crews planted 31 new street trees in various locations throughout the community. This crew was also responsible for mulching our commons and pruning of trees along Washington Street and plow routes.

Some of the other duties of this crew is weeding and watering flower beds, putting our flower barrels for the businesses, assisting with Hazardous Waste and Recycle days, the Fourth of July Parade, Norwood Day and the set up and dismantling of props for the Halloween Haunted House.

The Highway Department is responsible for the maintenance of our roadway, signage, street sweeping and litter removal.

The Highway asphalt crew used a total of 1780 tons of bituminous concrete in caring for roadway hazards and service trenches. Over 700 linear feet of sidewalk repair has been completed and 1440 feet of bituminous berm was installed as a part of our 50/50 paid berm program and plow damage repair.

# DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS

The Highway sweeper is dispatched on a daily basis as weather permits. Main roads are our first priority in the spring and a second sweeper is also dispatched due to the heavy amount of sand that was used throughout the winter.

The Highway sign person installed 296 street and traffic control signs due to accidents, vandalism or just signs that needed replacement due to wear. This person also installed Farmer's Market signs, Veteran's dedication plaques and did some line painting and striping of our Municipal parking lots.

Public Works highway crews are responsible for the curbside leaf bag and brush pickup. Leaf bags are picked up on your regular trash day during the months of March, April, May, October and November. It is the responsibility of Waste Management to pick up leaf bags during June through September. Our Materials Recycling Center on Winter Street is open every other Saturday, beginning April 4th through November 28th for the convenience of our residents. Only leaves, brush and grass clippings are allowed.

The Highway crews installed a new guardrail as well as parking signs at the Police and Fire Station. They also installed new benches and flower trees for a dedication.

Some of the other duties of the Highway Division are repairing plow damage, clearing easements, fence repair and assisting other departments as needed. Another area of responsibility is the issuance of ballot boxes and booths for all elections.

The Sewer and Drain Division responded to and cleared obstructions from 183 sewer services, 13 of which were mains. Slow mains are flushed on a weekly basis, Bacterial treatment is used in areas where known grease problems exist.

Sewer and Drain crew's clean culverts as needed, maintain and operate our sewer stations and do a number of mark outs for utility companies, plumbers and private contractors. Other duties of this division are as follows:

The Public Works Water crews are charged with the responsibility of the maintenance and repair of our water system, exercising gate valve replacement, flushing hydrants and maintaining our water storage area.

The water crew replaced 37 water services from the main to the curb stops on roadways scheduled for resurfacing.

This crew replaced 700 feet of old iron pipe of Highland Cemetery. Four leaks were repaired and 5 upright water services were replaced.

The Water division is also called upon for mark outs for utility companies and private contractors.

The crews at Highland Cemetery prepared and conducted 202 interments in the past year. Fifty one foundations were poured, 19 foundations were capped and 47 Veterans' markers were installed. All Veterans greaves were decorated.

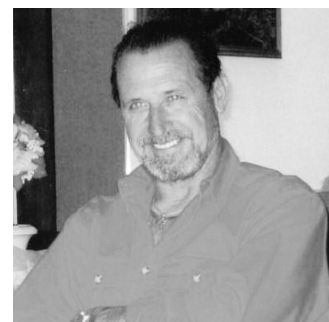
The grounds at Highland Cemetery were groomed throughout the growing season.

## 2008 ANNUAL REPORT OF THE LIGHT DEPARTMENT

I herewith submit my report as Superintendent of the Norwood Municipal Light Department for the year 2008.

Norwood's "All Requirement Contract" for our purchase power needs has had extremely favorable rates to the Norwood Light Department compared to the present cost of power. In 2008 the Light Department paid 4.5 cents per kilowatt-hour (kWh), but the cost will be going up to approximately 10.8 cents per kilowatt-hour in 2009 which is the present wholesale power cost for the utility industry in Massachusetts. These rates are still very competitive with other municipal and private suppliers of electricity in Massachusetts.

The short-term power cost projections are very uncertain but are estimated by some experts to remain in the 10 to 12cent per kWh range. The rise in the price of natural gas continues to be a significant reason for the increase in the cost of energy. The factors that cause this uncertainty are not just the production of the power, but the regulations that are constantly changing throughout the Northeast region

This spring the Board completed negotiations and signed a contract with NSTAR to serve them with 40 MVA of capacity for a period of time based on the needs of our customers. The annual Town Meeting approved bonding of up to \$24 million to accomplish this undertaking and the project is scheduled to be completed by the spring of 2011.

The FEPSNC (Future Electric Power Supply Needs Committee) continues to study different ways to reduce Norwood's risk and try to balance the risk vs. benefits of different scenarios for Power Supply in the future. This Committee also continued to examine alternatives on how to handle rate shock to our retail customers when our present contract ends in 2008. The Committee decided to recommend to the Board of Light Commissioners a rate increase of approximately 12.4% that was subsequently approved by the Board. This rate increase allowed us to continue to set aside money so that we are able to gradually incorporate the increased power costs for the upcoming year after our contract with Northeast Utilities expires. The Board of Light Commissioners authorized the Light Department and the Committee to solicit bids to supply Norwood's power supply needs for the immediate future (2009-2013). As a result of these public bids, the Light Department was able to finalize various purchase power contracts with several different suppliers to serve the town's power requirements for the near future.

The FEPSNC continues to investigate the possibility of adding some generation to our purchase power as well as looking at alternative power solutions. Norwood Light and other potential participants have been meeting with the Taunton Municipal Light Plant regarding Norwood's participation in a Generation Facility in Taunton. In 2008 the Board of Light Commissioners voted to participate in the venture pending final contract terms which will be owned and operated by a Coop of participating public power entities such as Norwood Light. The terms of the agreement are still being negotiated. Additionally, there is also some interest in other municipal generation projects that are under review in Massachusetts.

The First Circuit Court of Appeals remanded the interest portion of the Contract Termination Charge appeal (27 to 30 million dollars) back to FERC.

The Town did not see growth of its peak energy needs. From 2007

to 2008 there was approximately a 4% decrease in kilowatt-hours (kWh) purchased but there was only a .4 % decrease in peak demand.

A recent rate comparison between the Norwood Light Department and NSTAR based on December, 2008 rates shows that Norwood's rates are very advantageous. While usages between customers vary, it is typical to use 500 kWh to represent the average residential customer when performing comparisons. In Norwood the cost for 500 kWh is \$64.21 and in neighboring towns (served by NSTAR, such as Westwood, Canton, Walpole, and Dedham) the cost for 500 kWh is \$106.00. The following table shows the actual rate comparison between NLD and NSTAR at various levels of usage.

The Light Department's Conservation and Load Management Program continues to save money by reducing energy consumption and peak demand through capacitor installations, controlled residential electric water heaters, uncontrolled residential electric water heaters, commercial/industrial lighting retrofits, and residential compact fluorescent bulb giveaways.

The Norwood Light Department offers residents Cable Television, High Speed Internet Access, and Telephone service through its Broadband Division. Norwood is only one of three communities in the Commonwealth to offer this benefit to its residents. All our services are offered at competitive prices. Additionally, residents who subscribe to these services receive the superior customer service associated with the Light Department.

The Broadband division through its fiber optic network also provides telecommunication services to local businesses. Businesses are able to purchase Business Class Internet as well as conventional Cable Television and Telephone services. The Business Class Internet Service offered by Norwood Light Broadband is a service level typically available only in metropolitan communities. Having this level of service available here makes Norwood a much more attractive prospect for Corporations to headquarter in.

Additional channels and Video on Demand Content continue to be added to the line-up. Unlike Dish, FiOS and Comcast, Norwood Light



Broadband is careful not duplicate or overburden the channel line-up with Shopping or Niche programming. Standard Internet speeds continue to increase as the demand grows for high bandwidth applications. Telephone prices remain the lowest in town, saving many residents up to 60% from the rates previously paid to Verizon.

Late in 2007, the Board of Selectmen awarded a third Cable Television Franchise. This new competitor has saturated the town with aggressive marketing tactics and has managed to lure many Broadband customers away with their hyped promises. Regardless of the losses, the Broadband division remains fiscally strong and is committed as ever to provide superior customer service to its customers and to generate revenue for the town. To help assure this commitment is met, residents are strongly encouraged to sign-up with, and to stay with, Norwood Light Broadband.

I offer the following statistical data relative to the operation of the Light Department.

## 2008 ANNUAL REPORT FOR NORWOOD PERMANENT BUILDING COMMITTEE

After much anticipation on the part of Norwood's senior citizens the renovated and expanded Senior Center reopened its doors for business on April 18th of 2008. The facility has been enlarged to about three times its original size or just under 15,000± sq. ft. The 9,700± sq. ft. new addition consists primarily of a multi-function social hall of about 5,500± sq. ft. that is capable of being subdivided in two separate areas where two activities can occur simultaneously. Other new spaces include enlarged toilet facilities, laundry and storage rooms and a fully equipped state of the art kitchen. The original social hall in the existing facility has been renovated into smaller areas that now provide separate spaces for craftwork and an exercise room with a pool table. An informal café area where seniors can meet and chat while enjoying coffee, tea and other manner of light refreshments has also been provided.

In an effort to conserve funds budgeted for the project the P.B.C.C. was able to act as the owner's project manager and completed the work without straying beyond the limits of a very tight budget of \$2,500,000. That funding for the project was provided from three sources to include a \$1,100,000 from a grant provided by the State of Massachusetts, a \$250,000 gift from the Friends of the Council of the Aging, an additional gift from the Friends of the C.O.A of \$50,000 was withdrawn. The balance of funding to complete the project was appropriated by town meeting.

Judging from the numbers of senior citizens that can be seen daily enjoying the many activities offered at the center, including hot lunches, the P.B.C.C. feels that it can report that the overall completed project is a great success.

The new High School project was undertaken to correct pressing issues that would have a negative impact on the existing high school's accreditation. A Committee of 21 members representing a cross section of town meeting members, elected officials and key town administrators was empanelled by town meeting to monitor the project through the design and programming phase. Members of the School Committee, Board of Selectmen and Finance Commission worked in tight support with the Committee of 21 as the design of the new high school went on.

The P.B.C.C., for their part in this great effort, advertised, interviewed and eventually hired R. F. Walsh as owner's project manager, (OPM), and later an architect, Symmes Maini & McKee (SMMA) to plan and design the new facility. During these events a town wide referendum for a debt exclusion for the amount of \$6,000,000 to fund the project was successfully passed by Norwood's voters. The ballot stipulated that expenditures for the project would be controlled by the P.B.C.C. as the awarding authority.

The project has continued to develop right up to the present. Norwood's partner in all of this has been the Massachusetts School Building Authority or M.S.B.A. MSBA has monitored Norwood's efforts to keep the project moving by scheduling numerous meetings and planning reviews while maintaining its watchful eye on the



proposed project budget. Eventually, MSBA offered the Town an opportunity to participate in its pilot venture designated as the "Model School" program. The purpose of the program is to conserve taxpayer's dollars while delivering a quality facility that had been previously designed and successfully built for the Whitman/Hanson school district. A further inducement for the Town to accept the model school offer was the State's promise to increase the percentage of reimbursement which would further lighten the financial burden to Norwood's taxpayers in this struggling economy.

Norwood's participation in the program requires some unavoidable compromises. Chief among these is the need to change architects so late in the design process. A new Architect entered the picture with Norwood's acceptance of the MSBA's "Model School" program. The firm of Architectural Involutions, LLC or Ai3, the originators of the design, has replaced SMMA on the project. Throughout the fall of 2008 Ai3 has been adjusting the Model School's plans and specifications to fit Norwood's specific program needs and otherwise preparing the documents for the bidding process which is scheduled to occur early in 2009.

The P.B.C.C. has judiciously expended payment to the various professional firms who have contributed to the continued success of the programming effort. At this point about two thirds of the original \$6,000,000 amount has been encumbered to cover costs to complete this important work.

### **EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS**

The Board of Health continued to participate in Public Health Emergency Preparedness Region 4B. The region's purpose is to allow for collaboration and sharing of resources and staff during emergency situations. The region continued to develop protocol and policies to respond to local, regional, statewide and national public health emergencies. In order to enhance public health capacity, the region has strengthened the Medical Reserve Corps.

The Medical Reserve Corp (MRC) consists of trained volunteers who could be called to assist in public health emergencies, such as a flu pandemic, a mass casualty or bioterrorism event. Throughout the year, various educational programs and trainings were offered to the volunteers to prepare them for emergencies. As part of a public health response, it may be necessary for MRC members to wear an N95 respirator. The Health Department partnered with Caritas Norwood Hospital to offer fit-testing in order to determine the proper size and style N95 respirator mask volunteers should wear. In an effort to improve communication with the MRC members, a notification system called the Health and Homeland Alert Network (HHAN) was implemented. The HHAN was used to inform MRC members of trainings/exercises and alerts. In response to severe ice storms in December, the HHAN was used to activate the MRC and request emergency assistance with shelter operations in Worcester County.

Norwood was also part of a new regional partnership; the Partnership for Effective Emergency Response (PEER), whose mission is to enhance the capacity of regions in the Greater Boston metropolitan area to respond to health and medical emergencies and disasters. PEER will seek to strengthen regional partnerships through collaborative development of communication protocols and systems, expansion of mutual aid agreements, and training to increase response capacity for an emergency.

The Board of Health is continuously updating and improving current public health emergency plans to ensure the public is protected and informed during emergencies. In addition to attending trainings, the Board of Health works to strengthen the ties with health providers, public safety and regional and State agencies to better prepare ourselves for emergency situations.

### **TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE GRANT (TAG) PROGRAM**

The Norwood Health Department applied for a competitive Technical Assistance Grant (TAG) from the Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection (MassDEP). The Department was awarded \$10,000 to provide expert advice and public education about hazardous waste site cleanup activities at the Former Winslow Tannery Site and former Zimble Drum Site located at 61 Endicott Street. A Licensed Site Professional from Woodard & Curran was hired to review and summarize waste site cleanup activities. A public meeting was held in December to provide information, address community concerns and answer questions related to the site cleanup. Information related to cleanup activities and the public meeting was posted on the town website under the Health Department. An additional public information meeting is scheduled for March, 2009.

### **HEALTH ASSESSMENT SURVEY**

The Norwood Health Department, with support from the Andrew and Ernest J. Boch Memorial Fund, conducted a health assessment survey of town residents. When compared to the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, the rates of heart disease and diabetes were higher

in the Town. The survey found that 29% of Norwood residents had been diagnosed with high cholesterol and 28% had been diagnosed with high blood pressure, both predicting factors for heart disease. Norwood's diabetes rate was 198.8 per 100,000 people compared to the State's diabetes rate of 136.6 per 100,000 people. The Norwood Health Department offered programs to help identify those at risk for heart disease and diabetes. The complete report is available at the Health Department.

## NEPONSET VALLEY COMMUNITY HEALTH COALITION/ ELDER DENTAL CLINIC

The Neponset Valley Community Health Coalition (NVCHC) is a volunteer, non-profit organization that advocates for the maintenance and enhancement of affordable, accessible, quality health care for all residents within the 17 towns served by Caritas Norwood Hospital, particularly the unserved and underserved. The Coalition, in partnership with the Norfolk Adult Day Health Center, has seen great success with the elder dental program. The program puts elders lacking dental insurance in touch with dentists who agree to work at reduced rates. In addition, dental screening clinics are held for seniors to address overall oral health including: oral cancer screening, dental exams, nutrition counseling, and denture cleaning.

## NEEDLE DISPOSAL PROGRAM

The Needle Disposal Program remains a success. This program is a unique opportunity for Norwood residents to dispose of syringes from residential use in an appropriate manner. Sharps containers are sold at the Health Department; \$1 for a quart size and \$3 for a gallon sized container. When filled the containers are returned to the Health Department. The containers are then properly disposed of with a medical waste company.

## HAZARDOUS WASTE/RECYCLING

The Hazardous Waste Collection/Recycling Days had a record 1,029 vehicles drove through both the Spring and Fall collection days. Both events collected recyclable materials that are not accepted in regular trash disposal, such as electronics, scrap metal and tires. During the Spring Hazardous Waste Day, additional hazardous materials were collected such as paint thinners, oil-based paint, and drain cleaner. By bringing hazardous waste to the collection days, residents are helping keep toxic materials out of the landfills and incinerators, properly disposing of these items, keeping toxic chemicals out of the ground, water and air. Most materials are recycled and used as other commercial and industrial products.

A new Mercury Recovery Program was started in 2008. In addition to the two collection days per year held in May and September, residents can now bring their mercury-containing devices to the Health Department during business hours at no cost. Items accepted at the Health Department include thermostats, mercury switches, thermometers, button cell batteries, flow meters, barometers, cooking thermometers and elemental mercury. Also, for every fever thermometer brought in to the Health Department, residents will be provided a free digital thermometer.

The Board of Health sells compost bins at a reduced rate. A total of 76 bins were sold in 2008.

## INSPECTIONAL SERVICES FOOD SAFETY PROGRAM

2008 was the second year of mandatory attendance at the free Food Safety Workshops for food handlers who do not have a certificate in Food Protection Management. The workshops were held in June and November at Memorial Hall in the Town Hall. The goal of the free

workshops is to ensure that all food handlers receive training in basic sanitation and the prevention of spreading disease through food. English was not the primary language for a large percentage of food handlers so interpreters are provided to translate the information. Every food service establishment must have at least one full-time employee who has passed the exam in Food Protection Management. It is imperative that food workers receive training in proper food handling procedures. The Board of Health insists on clean food stores and compliance with the complex food safety codes and regulations. The Health Department conducts frequent inspections and regulates food permit holders. Food inspections continue to focus on the high risk violations which, based on CDC and FDA data, cause almost all of the illnesses and deaths due to food-borne illnesses.

All food service establishments that provide seating are required to have an employee who is certified in anti-choking procedures on duty while any foods are being served. This training must be renewed every three years.

Norwood continued to attract new food enterprises and many are planned for the future.

The Department continued to notify the Fire Department if fire suppression systems in restaurants are overdue for inspection or, if any other fire risks are observed, such as kitchen exhaust ducting not being cleaned regularly for grease removal.

During food inspections, there are many areas of concentration which include safety issues that may cause worker or customer injury, careful examination for any pest issues such as rodents or insects, and chemicals which if not stored properly may contaminate foods. Many vehicles are available to help enforce food codes and regulations. These include fines, hearings, or closures. However, the key element for a safe food environment is education of the people who handle the foods as well as active management participation. The Department conducted 256 inspections and 171 re-inspections in 2008.

## SWIMMING POOL SANITATION

Public, semi-public pools, and whirlpools are regulated by the town. Residential pools are not regulated by the Board of Health. The Department conducted 274 pool inspections in 2008 at the 23 public/semi public pools in Norwood. Several pool closings took place due to faulty chemicals or malfunctioning equipment. Norwood requires lifeguards during pool hours. Normally the lifeguards make the required chemical tests on the pool water. These are done four times a day and logged into an official binder. Each pool must have a Licensed Certified Pool Operator who oversees the lifeguards and reviews the daily logs. In addition to the safety of the swimmers, the lifeguards are reminded that many diseases can be transmitted through pools. For instance, lifeguards must ensure that swimmers take a cleansing shower before entering the pool.

A new Federal Law, The Virginia Graeme Baker Pool & Spa Safety Act, went into effect in December of 2008. This law was enacted to prevent people from being stuck on the drains and drowning or, being severely injured. New drain covers and new equipment capable of automatically shutting off the drain pumps were required. All indoor pools met the deadline of December 19, 2008. The Consumer Product Safety Commission will impose severe civil/criminal penalties for non-compliance.

## RECREATIONAL CAMPS

All camp programs that meet the MDPH regulatory requirements for recreational children's camps were inspected and licensed by the Board of Health. The standards and requirements that must be met include background checks on all staff persons, proof of up-to-date camper and staff immunizations, specific staff-to-camper ratios, and appropriate staff training. On-site inspections were conducted throughout the summer months for 13 indoor and outdoor recreational camps.

## TOBACCO CONTROL

With a grant from the Massachusetts Tobacco Control Program (MTCP), the Health Department was able to conduct tobacco compliance checks at all tobacco retailers in 2008. The purpose of these checks is to ensure tobacco retailers do not sell to under-aged children. According to MTCP, smoking at a younger age can cause more serious health risks. The earlier people smoke, the greater the permanent lung damage. They are also more likely to become addicted. In the past few years there has been an increase in illegal tobacco sales to minors across the Commonwealth. Stopping sales to minors is an important public health mission.

## HOUSING & NUISANCE

The Health Department enforces the 105 CMR 410.00; State Sanitary Code, Chapter 2: Minimum Standards of Fitness for Human Habitation. Inspections are conducted upon request by the occupant and ensure all housing is in a safe and healthy condition. The Department conducted 110 initial inspections as well as follow-up inspections to ensure compliance with the regulation.

## OTHER INSPECTED FACILITIES

The Health Department inspects annually, as well as on a complaint basis, all tanning facilities, hotels and vapor baths and showers in the Town. Inspections make sure the facilities are maintained in a safe and sanitary condition.

## PUBLIC HEALTH NURSING SERVICES

### HEALTH COUNSELING & SCREENINGS

The main focus of the public health nursing program is health promotion and disease prevention. Health counseling and blood pressure clinics were offered at various locations in town several times a month. Evening clinics were held once a month in an effort to reach the working population. Diabetes screening was offered to non-diabetic residents to determine their risk for developing diabetes. Diet and lifestyle changes were discussed and medical referrals made if necessary. Vitamin B12 injections were given to those residents with a need and an order from their physician.

## NURSING PROGRAMS AND SERVICE

Information and assistance regarding communicable diseases, vaccine preventable illnesses, immunizations, physicians and health care providers, dental services, home health care, travel clinics, counseling services, elder services, children's services, other community resources and nursing services were available at the Nursing Office.

The Health Department provided information to the public each month regarding National Health Observances. Bulletin boards and pamphlets were provided at the Health Department and the Morrill Memorial Library. In addition, press releases were sent to local media outlets and information was posted on Norwood Public Access (NPA) to promote public awareness of important health issues.

The Health Department continued to promote and distribute the File of Life folders. The File of Life contains necessary medical data and attaches to the home refrigerator, providing instant access to emergency personnel. The File of Life is advised for all residents, of all ages, with special medical needs or those taking medications.

The Town Hall is equipped with two Automated External Defibrillators (AED); one on the ground level and one on the first floor. New software was installed to update the AEDs to meet the most recent recommendations. The Health Department coordinated a CPR/AED recertification program which was offered to Town Hall, Recreation Department and DPW employees.

The Coalition for a Healthy, Active Norwood was formed in response to the growing obesity epidemic and continues to meet periodically. It is a collaborative effort of the Norwood Health Department, Norwood Recreation Department, Norwood Public Schools, Caritas Norwood Hospital, and Massachusetts Department of Public Health to improve nutrition and increase physical activity among all Norwood residents.

The Health Department continued to sponsor a Helmet Program in an effort to reduce head injuries. This program provided multi-sport and bicycle helmets to Norwood residents of all ages for a reduced cost. All helmets continue to be available for \$5.00 at the Health Department Office.

The Health Department participated in meetings of the Norwood Senior Service Provider Network (NSSPN), which is a partnership among departments and agencies within the town of Norwood who service the senior population in public and private housing.

## IMMUNIZATIONS

The Health Department provides adult immunizations to Norwood residents. Tetanus Diphtheria (Td), Pneumococcal (PPV23), Measles Mumps Rubella (MMR), Hepatitis B, Hepatitis A, and Varicella immunizations were offered every Tuesday afternoon. Adult Tetanus-Diphtheria and Acellular Pertussis (Tdap) vaccine was offered for a reduced price of \$20 to Norwood residents 18 years of age or older.

Immunization clinics for adolescents were held weekly at the Health Department. Tdap, Td, MMR, Varicella and Hepatitis B immunizations were provided to students who were identified as being under immunized, in collaboration with the School Nurses. Resources were provided to families in an effort to maximize access to preventive medical care.

Annual Flu Clinics were held October through December and 1150 flu shots were administered. Two town-wide clinics at the Senior Center, four clinics at Senior Housing facilities, one evening clinic and employee clinics at the Health Department were conducted. Vaccine was provided upon request to any individuals who missed the scheduled flu clinics. Home visits for the administration of flu vaccine were provided for homebound adults upon request.

## VACCINE MANAGEMENT

The Health Department assisted in the implementation of the Vaccine Management Business Improvement Project (VMBIP) by the Massachusetts Department of Public Health. This program constituted a change in the way local physicians obtain vaccines. Influenza vaccine (4800 doses) was obtained from the MDPH for distribution by the Health Department to local physician's offices, nursing homes and Caritas Norwood Hospital. A log was maintained of all vaccines distributed, including lot numbers and expiration dates,

in the event of a vaccine reaction or a recall by the manufacturer. The Health Department communicated all new vaccine information from the DPH to all local physicians' offices.

## SCHOOL HEALTH FAIR

The Health Department participated in Student Health Fair at the Norwood High School. Information was provided to high school students on various health topics including nutrition, hygiene, positive health habit promotion, smoking and other high-risk behavior avoidance.

## COMMUNICABLE DISEASE CONTROL AND INVESTIGATION

Communicable disease investigations were conducted to identify sources of infection and control measures were initiated. The Health Department continued Tuberculosis (TB) prevention activities through screening and Mantoux testing high-risk populations. Tuberculosis cases and Class II tuberculosis exposure cases were monitored for compliance with clinic appointments and medication regimes.

## EMPLOYEE HEALTH

As part of the Employee Health Program, Hepatitis A, Hepatitis B, and Td immunizations were offered to all at-risk emergency personnel. Mantoux (TB testing) was also available to first responders. First aid and adult immunizations were administered as needed to all employees. Blood pressure screenings and health counseling were also available.

## DENTAL CLINIC

The Clinic Dentist examined all children in grades one through six in the Norwood Public Schools and St. Catherine's Parochial School. With parental approval, the children needing dental care

were treated at the Dental Clinic at Town Hall. In the school year 2007-2008, a total of 1,161 children were screened. The treatments included cleaning, plaque control, dental hygiene instruction, fillings and emergency treatments for special needs. The Dental Clinic also offered a sealant program for children in grades one through six. Sealants are a plastic resin that prevents tooth decay when applied to the chewing surface of molars. The clinic saw 241 students for cleanings, 119 children had sealants placed on their erupted permanent molars. At total of 345 teeth were sealed. Twenty-one letters of referral were sent to parents for their children to see Dr. Stone. One patient was actually seen in Dr. Stone's office.

## EYE CLINIC

The Board of Health Eye Clinic was conducted by Dr. Nabeel Khudairi, O.D. at Norwood Opticians. When a student did not pass the routine vision screening conducted by the school nurse a letter of referral to the eye clinic was sent home. The following optometric services and tests were provided: distance and near visual acuity, eye muscle alignment, color vision, depth perception, peripheral vision, pupillary response, extra-ocular muscle motion and spectacle lens refraction for determining eyeglass prescription. Additional eye care testing was available for a reduced fee.

## SCHOOL NURSING SERVICES ST. CATHERINE'S

The School Nurse is responsible for the health and well-being of the students and faculty at St. Catherine's school. The School Nurse provides first aid to students and faculty, performs health screenings and maintains records of immunizations, medical problems and tuberculosis status. Any students with incomplete immunizations are followed up on and referred to their pediatrician or the Health Department's immunization clinic. Health records are obtained from all new entrants and reviewed. The School Nurse is also responsible for keeping up-to-date orders from the student's physicians. Physical examinations are required for students in grades 4 and 7. Those students who do not have access to a private physician may have their physical exam performed by the school physician. Screenings are performed for pediculosis, vision, hearing, weight and height. Emergency card files are kept on all students. Scoliosis screening is performed on students in grades 5-9. This is not a diagnostic service, but a program to identify young people who should have further medial evaluation. The School Nurse also participates in school staff activities and health education meetings.

## 2008 ANNUAL REPORT OF THE DEPARTMENT OF VETERANS' SERVICES

I respectfully submit the report of the Department of Veterans' Services for the year ending December 31, 2008.

Veterans' Benefits will increase as a result of the large number that are unemployed, prolonged illness cases, rising fuel costs, rising hospital and medical costs, along with the customary requests for financial assistance by the veterans' community.

Additionally, returning Norwood Veterans of Operation Enduring Freedom in Afghanistan, and Operation Iraqi Freedom have had a substantial and significant impact in the increase of benefits granted.

For 30 years, the Department of Veterans' Services has taken applications for the fuel assistance program. This program is for the benefit of all Norwood residents who qualify. I am pleased to report that last year this program aided many families in need.

Also, we administrate a Taxi Transfare Program for the elderly and disabled. This program is provided to assist citizens with motor vehicle transportation needs.

The Department also processes parking violations. I serve as the Hearings Officer for parking violations. This office maintains a file of all parking tickets issued by the Police Department. All correspondence, complaints, inquiries and records of payments are handled in this office.

The monetary awards by the Veterans' Administration to veterans and their dependents in the Town of Norwood for fiscal year 2008 exceeded 3.3 million dollars. This amount will increase due to future adjudication of pending claims, and cost of living adjustments. These benefits are for compensation to dependents of veterans who died in the service or of service connected disabilities, disability pensions, disability compensations, burial awards and special equipment for automobiles for veterans with service connected disabilities, vocational rehabilitation training for the disabled, their sons, daughters, wives, or widows, education readjustment training, veterans' insurance and indemnities.

The Department of Veterans' Services composed as it is in two component parts, is operated under Chapter 115 of the General Laws of the Commonwealth as amended by Chapter 584, Acts of 1946, for the purpose of administering Veterans' Benefits and Services. All assistance cases were investigated and payments made in accordance with Chapter 115 of the General Laws, which assures the Town of Norwood seventy-five (75%) percent reimbursement from the Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

The purpose of the Department of Veterans' Services is to assist veterans and/or their dependents in procuring financial assistance, information and benefits to which they are entitled relative to vocational or other educational opportunities. Additionally, G.I. Loans, hospitalization, medical care, compensation, pensions, on-the-job and apprenticeship training, insurance, burial allowance, grave markers, photostats and other benefits granted under existing State and Federal laws.

Every request for assistance under existing regulations is invariably granted. Our primary mission is to give all veterans and their dependents the best service at all times and to administer the laws and regulations affecting them impartially, efficiently and effectively.

There was complete cooperation with the Veterans' Administration and the various local, civic, and veterans' organizations that interest themselves in veterans' affairs and exceptional cooperation extended

this department throughout the year by the State Department of Veterans' Services.

Grateful acknowledgement is made to the Honorable Board of Selectmen, the General Manager and his staff, other Town Departments and all others who have assisted the Director of Veterans' Services in the performance of his duties.

With funding through the Town of Norwood, the South Norfolk County Arc (SNCARC) provides and supports services to citizens of Norwood who are disabled by mental retardation or other developmental disabilities. SNCARC is a private, non-profit membership-based organization founded in 1954 by local parents. For more than half a century SNCARC has been, and continues to be, governed by the family members of the individuals we serve. It is a testament to the good works we perform that the town of Norwood, along with the other eleven towns we serve, continues to provide the vital funding support as it has done for over thirty years.

Our mission is, **"To advocate for and provide supports and services to people disabled by mental retardation and other developmental disabilities and to their families."**

**Supports and services provided by SNCARC to the citizens of Norwood include:**

#### **Family Support and Respite Care:**

SNCARC provides temporary in-home or out-of-home professional care and training for children and adults with mental retardation or other developmental disabilities on a planned or emergency basis. It operates after-school and school vacation week programs for children, provides a wide range of support groups for families and operates a resource center for parents and professionals at our home facility in Westwood.

#### **Family Autism Center:**

The SNCARC Family Autism Center implements high quality programs, services and environments for all persons with an Autism Spectrum Disorder. This program provides individuals with autism, their families and the general community with information and referral services, educational services, parent and sibling support groups and a resource library with Internet access.

#### **Autism and Law Enforcement Education Coalition (ALEC)**

ALEC is a collaboration of the Family Autism Center with the office of Norfolk County District Attorney, William R. Keating and local fire and police precincts. ALEC training helps foster a deeper understanding of ASD among public safety and law enforcement personnel. Training is available for police officers, emergency room personnel and firefighters, using curriculum and videos specific to each group. Presenters are first responders with direct knowledge of ASD through a family member

#### **Social-Recreational Programs:**

SNCARC provides special after-school and evening education classes, sports activities, social clubs and events, and special summer programs for individuals with mental retardation. A principal component of these programs is one-to-one volunteer friendships (citizen advocacy).

#### **Advocacy:**

SNCARC provides specialized education, information and referral services, social support, as well as legal, financial and other consultation support. This program also provides self-advocacy training to individuals and advocacy support to families with members who are disabled by mental retardation or other developmental disabilities.

#### **Clinical Resource Program:**

SNCARC provides behavioral and other psychological counseling and psychiatric services for children and adults with mental retardation and other developmental disabilities and their families.

#### **Residential Management:**

SNCARC provides Residential Management Services for residential homes and apartments housing individuals with mental retardation.

#### **Day Habilitation Program:**

SNCARC provides educational and therapeutic services for adults with severe and multiple developmental disabilities. The program works to help individuals improve their communication skills, physical well being, domestic and self-care skills, community living skills and social skills. This program includes a component for individuals who are elderly and disabled by mental retardation. Its primary objective is to enable these individuals to continue to maintain their functional and social skills and to meaningfully participate in the life of their community.

SNCARC was selected by the Massachusetts Council of Human Services Providers to receive the prestigious 'Peer Provider Award' which this statewide organization presented to us at their annual Convention and Expo held this year on 12/3/08 at the Marriott Copley Place in Boston. Specifically, we were nominated by the staff of Rehabilitation Resources, an agency providing residential services, for the work of our Day Habilitation Program staff. The nomination states, in part, "Seven individuals served by Rehabilitation Resources attend the day habilitation program at SNCARC where they receive exemplary services . . ."

In addition, we were informed that the collaborative way in which our staff work with other agencies in the best interest of the individuals at the program was a primary reason for the nomination. It is a tribute to our entire Day Habilitation staff to be recognized for such important work.

#### **Services supported by SNCARC through its affiliate Lifeworks:**

##### **Vocational Training and Job Placement Programs:**

*Lifeworks Employment Services* provides vocational rehabilitation for mentally retarded persons age 18 and over. These services include vocational evaluation, work adjustment training, sheltered employment, transitional or supported employment and competitive job placement and follow-up support.

##### **Residential Programs:**

*Lifeworks Residential Programs* provides home-like environments and supervision, care and training in independent living skills, functional academics and social skills. These programs include community residences and supervised apartments (both with 24-hour staffing) and cooperative apartments (with staff assistance less than 24 hours per day).

We also have offered many activities that are outside the Civic Center: Ski/Snowboarding Lessons at the Blue Hills, Golf at the Country Club, Earth Day, Town Spring Egg Hunt, Rubber Ducky Race, Tennis Lessons, Tennis League, Football Clinic, Lacrosse Clinic, and Cheerleading.

The Recreation Department always enjoys a very busy and creative summer. Our Playcamp Program is attended by 7-12 year olds and held at both the Coakley Middle School and Father Mac's. This summer, Sarah Ryan (Playcamps) and Kim Farrar (Pools) again provided great leadership for our staff during those hot, sticky summer days. The Tot Lot at Eliot Field continues to be a success (ages 3-6). Both pools, although getting older, held up for the summer and provided great relief for the residents. Our Spray Park also was well attended and provided fun for our younger residents, families, and our Senior Citizens.

Camp Challenge celebrated its 32 years as an inspiration to those children who need a little extra TLC. The staff and volunteers help make a great summer experience for our campers. They enjoy Sports, Crafts, Field Trips, Spray Park and Pool time, and many different games.

The Norwood Stingrays had a banner year with over 100 members participating in the tough Suburban Swim League. Coaches and swimmers alike represented the town in a positive manner.

In its second year, the Haunted House came back and proved to be scarily successful. We had 125 Norwood High students who volunteered to help make this year's Haunted House, to both those who visited and those who volunteered, something they will remember.

Norwood Day, again, proved to be a great day for the Town to celebrate itself. We had 180 booths representing Civic, Youth, Fraternal Groups, local businesses and some from far away who sought to be part of the celebration. This year was said to be the best attended, with an estimated 15,000 people.

The Field Committee continues to work hard to provide Norwood with the best fields available. We completed the Cleveland upper (now the Jean Brown Field), the Coakley upper field, and the Ellis. We have made great strides in coming close to completing our goals. We have also worked closely with the Committee of 21 on the imprint the new school will have on the Town's fields.

The Recreation Department is very pleased to have Melissa Lothrop as our new Program Director. Melissa comes with a great deal of experience and enthusiasm. We are looking forward to a long career with Melissa.

The Recreation Department wishes to thank the other Town Departments: D.P.W., Police, Fire, School, Engineering, Board of Health, Town Planner, the Board of Selectmen, and the General Manager and his staff for their help and support throughout the year.

Lastly, the Recreation Department is very appreciative of the support, ideas, volunteers, and suggestions we receive from our residents. It truly is the residents of Norwood that make your Recreation Department the success it is, and we take pride in the reputation we have been able to maintain throughout our Town, Region, and State.

# PLANNING BOARD

## 2008 ANNUAL REPORT OF THE NORWOOD PLANNING BOARD

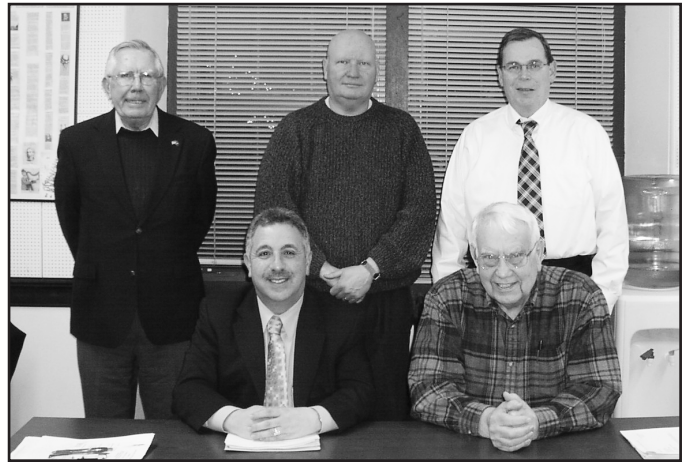
The Norwood Planning Board is pleased to submit a summary of its activities and accomplishments for 2008:

**Subdivision Activity** - The Planning Board administers the Subdivision Control Law, which are the regulations for the laying out and constructing new roadways. During 2008, the Board oversaw the construction of several ongoing subdivisions including Coolidge Estates off Nahatan Street, Talbot Farm Estates off Neponset Street, and Upland Road Industrial Subdivision (formerly Polaroid). The Board also endorsed several Approval Not Required Plans, which are plans not subject to the Subdivision Control Law. These plans allow simple land divisions along approved streets.

**Major Projects** - The Planning Board is also the town's Major Project Special Permit Authority. A Major Project is defined as new construction, addition, or change of use resulting in a net addition of more than 25,000 square feet or 100 or more parking spaces. In 2008, the Planning Board approved two Major Project permit requests: the new 227,500 sf. Norwood High School on Nichols Street and a new 200,000 sf. office building on Lot 4 of the Upland Woods Commerce Park (formerly Polaroid).

**Zoning Bylaws** - The Planning Board hired Attorney Mark Bobrowski to assist the Board with updating the Norwood Zoning Bylaws. The last major overhaul of the Zoning Bylaws was completed in 1991. Work on this important project commenced in November and will continue through June, 2009. Anticipated changes include: major revisions to the Town's Site Plan Approval process; new Design Review standards; and updated use regulations.

**Open Space and Recreation Master Plan** - The Planning Board, through its representatives on the Open Space and Recreation Committee, is playing a major role in updating the Town's Open Space and Recreation Master Plan. A survey has been completed to determine citizens' interests and attitudes on a variety of open space and recreation matters. The final open space and recreation plan must be vetted and approved by the Planning Board as part of the adoption procedure. Work on this important project is ongoing and will be completed by May, 2009.

## NORWOOD PLANNING DEPARTMENT 2008 ANNUAL REPORT

Planning staff are: Steve Costello, Director of Community Planning and Economic Development; Claire Murphy, Administrative Assistant; and Cathy Traietti, CDBG Program Coordinator.

In the spirit of municipal cooperation and the overall betterment of the Town, the Planning Board utilizes its staff, to apply for and administer State grants. In the past ten years, the Planning Department has received millions of dollars in Community Development Block Grants (CDBG) to start much needed community development programs. In 2008, the Norwood Planning Department applied for and received a grant for just under \$1 million to continue the Town's CDBG Programs. The Target Area for program activities is shown in the plan below. With the CDBG funding, the Town will continue three important community development programs; housing rehabilitation, commercial sign and façade improvements, and street and infrastructure repair. A recap of these programs follows

### Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Programs

All CDBG program activities are required by the State to be located within a CDBG Target Area which has been determined by the Town to be those areas most in need for the program funds.

### CDBG HOUSING REHABILITATION PROGRAM

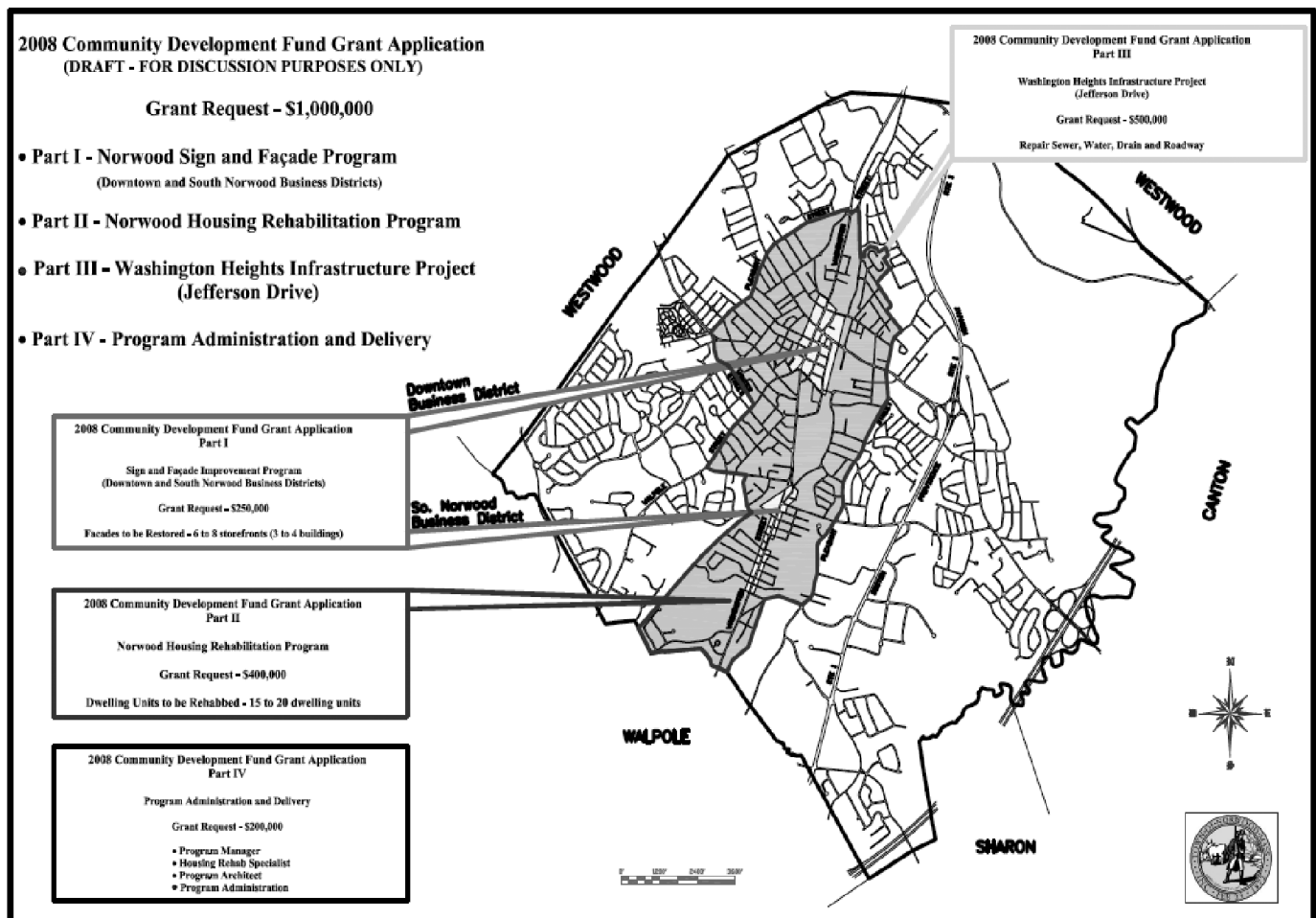
The Housing Rehabilitation Program (HR Program) is designed to improve housing conditions of low and moderate income resident households by eliminating code violations. To date, 17 housing rehab projects have been completed. The Town received funding in 2008 to rehab another 12 homes, Cathy Traietti, CDBG Program Coordinator is the lead contacts for the Housing Rehabilitation Program and can be reached at 781-762-8115 x 209

### CODE RELATED REPAIRS

Eligible repair activities will include, but not be limited to, electrical, heating and plumbing work; structural repairs; roof and siding repairs; insulation and window replacement; lead paint and asbestos removal; and handicap accessibility improvements

### ELIGIBILITY

Preliminary eligibility is defined as an applicant meeting the initial eligibility requirements in order to qualify to begin the housing rehabilitation process. Final eligibility is determined after the total bid package is received and reviewed by the Town Planner's office.

**APPLICANTS:** This program is targeted to owner-occupied single-family/multi-family and investor owned units in the Town's Target Area (see Map). At least 51% of the units in the structure must be occupied by low and moderate income households. A low and moderate income household is defined as households who meet the following income levels.

To date, a total of 13 sign and façade improvement projects (about 40 storefronts) have been completed Downtown Norwood and South Norwood. 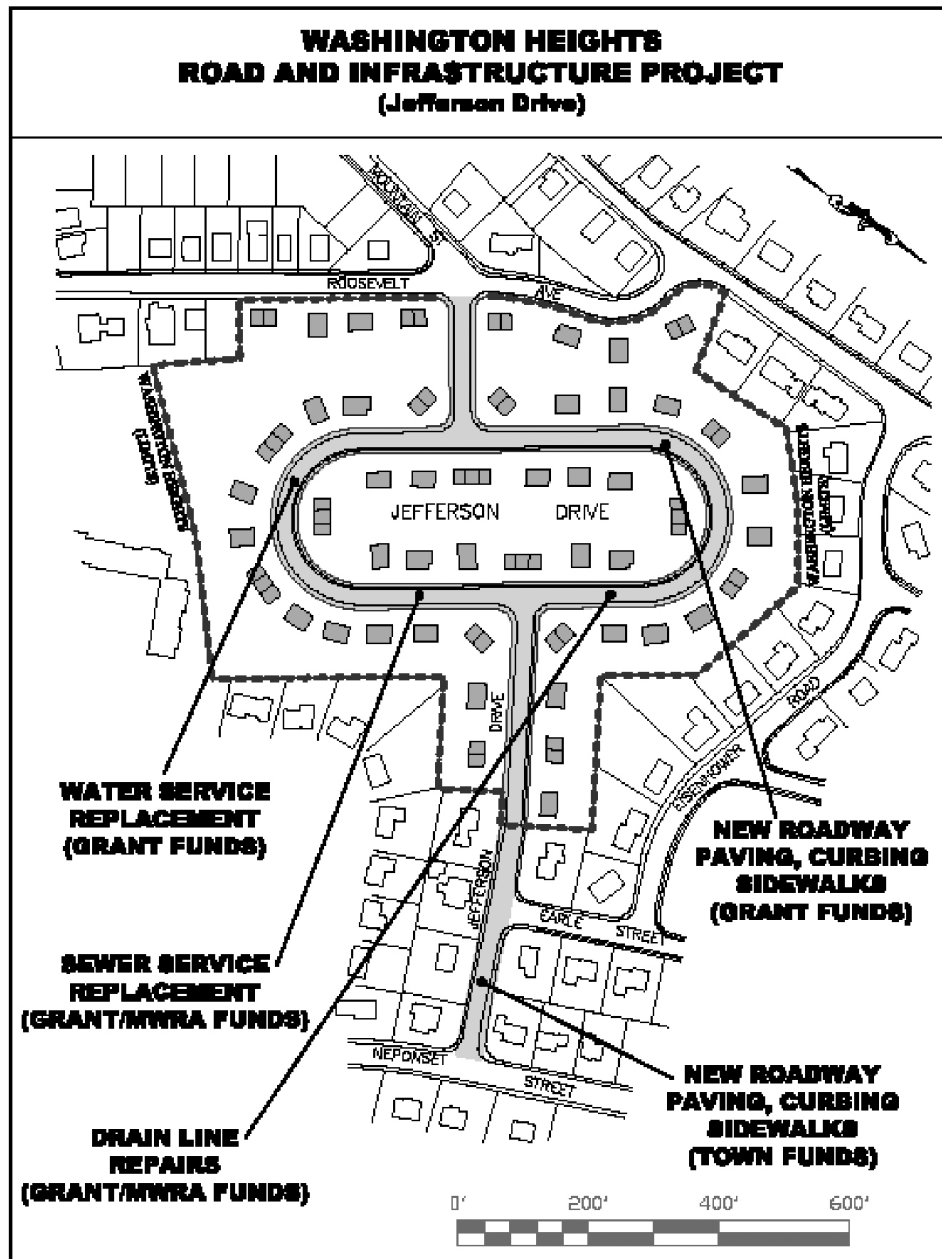

## 2008 ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The purpose of the Conservation Commission is to enforce the Commonwealth's Wetland Protection Act as well as the Town's Wetland by-Law. These laws identify areas subject to protection and include banks, wetlands, marshes, swamps and flats bordering on a body of water. In addition, land under a body of water and land subject to flooding are included as well as a 200-foot riparian zone along each side of a river or perennial stream. Any activity within these areas is subject to regulations as is any activity within a 100-foot buffer zone of the areas protected which would alter either the area under the protection or the buffer zone. The term activity refers to any act, which would remove, fill, dredge or alter.

The Conservation Commission issues Determinations identifying an activity as significant or non-significant. If significant, a Notice of Intent must be filed and work may only proceed under an Order of Conditions issued by the Commission. The Commission conducts site reviews on work in progress as well as at project end. If the work performed is the same as that initially proposed a Certificate of Compliance would be issued. This is an abbreviated description of the Commission's responsibility.

## REPORT OF THE TOWN ENGINEER

The Engineering Department, through the Town Engineer, respectfully submits the annual report for 2008.

The Engineering Department consists of the Town Engineer, an Assistant Town Engineer, a Grade IV Civil Engineer and a part time draftsman. On occasion, a local engineering student on break from studies provides the department with valuable assistance while gaining insight to his future profession. All three department engineer's have Bachelor of Science degrees in civil engineering and are also approved by the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) as Soil Evaluator's. The Town Engineer is registered as a Professional Engineer and Professional Land Surveyor. The Assistant Town Engineer is also registered as a Professional Land Surveyor.

The Engineering Department provides a broad range of services. This department provides technical support to all municipal departments and town boards. The following is a sample of the assistance provided: plan review, cost estimates and inspection services for the Planning Board; plan review and engineering opinions to the Board of Appeals and Conservation Commission; construction design, cost estimate and engineering services to the Department of Public Works; assistance to the Recreation Department on a variety of recreation projects; assisting the Assessor's Office in maintaining up to date tax maps; provide assistance to the General Manager and Board of Selectmen on a variety of municipal projects. This department also has its own individual projects that require performing survey work, traffic surveys and construction project design and supervision. In addition, the department provides engineering assistance to residents, contractors, builders and engineers that visit this office on a daily basis seeking guidance.

During 2008, the Engineering Department was intimately involved in a wide range of projects which proved both challenging and rewarding. It also showcased the talents and capabilities this engineering department provides. Some of the more exciting projects included:

- Annual Road Resurfacing – Designed and provided construction administration and supervision of the annual road resurfacing project. Project involved cold planing existing bituminous concrete and installing a bituminous concrete overlay on the following streets: Pleasant Street – Sunset Ave to Basic Rental at Railroad Tracks (1,100 feet); Dean Street – Route One to Neponset Street (2,200 feet); Coach Lane – Entire Street (1,400 feet); Berwick Place – Entire Street (1,730 feet); Winslow Avenue – Walnut Avenue to Hoyle Street (700 feet); Hoyle Street – Washington Street to Walnut Avenue (510 feet); Access Road – Neponset Street to Airport Gate 1 (1,700 feet); Westover Parkway – House #31 to House #43 (505 feet); Garfield Avenue – Pleasant St to Adams St (1,400 feet); Lyman Place – Adjacent to Civic Center.
- Microsurfacing – Designed and provided construction administration for the pavement maintenance technique known as Microsurfacing. Project involved crack sealing roadway cracks and installing a 3/8" thick polymer based asphalt product on the following streets: Orleans Road – Entire Street (1,440 feet); Chatham Road – Entire Street (1,460 feet); Pembroke Road – Entire Street (500 feet); Norwich Road – Entire Street (525 feet); Oakleigh Road – Entire Street (510 feet); Malvern Road – Entire Street (1,150 feet); Yarmouth Road – Devon Road to Malvern Road (1,100 feet)
- Geographic Information System (GIS) – The Engineering Department continued working on developing the GIS. At this point, the Assessor's Tax Maps, Water System, Drain System and Zoning Map have been converted to electronic format. The system allows the Engineering Department to produce various maps and plans for the Engineering Department and various department and boards. These plans are developed quickly and accurately which provides the ability for informed decisions to be made expeditiously. The GIS is an excellent investment and further support is a wise decision.
- Jefferson Drive Utility Rehabilitation – The Engineering Department designed and is providing construction administration on the replacement of water, sewer and drain services for the Norwood Housing Authority controlled residences on Jefferson Drive. The project commenced in 2008 and is expected to be completed in the Spring of 2009. During the later part of 2009, the area will receive new granite curbing, sidewalks and roadway resurfacing under a contract prepared by the Engineering Department.
- The Engineering Department prepared plans and specifications for the replacement of lead water services within the Town right of way and on private property. Project is the result of a mandate by the EPA to replace the nearly 150 lead water services throughout Norwood. Future contracts to replace remaining balance are anticipated pending funding.
- The Engineering Department provided the Field Study Committee with a revised Field Master Plan. During 2008, the Engineering Department managed the installation and improvements to the rectangular field at the Coakley Middle School. The Engineering Department also managed the complete reconstruction of the ballfields at the Ellis Playground. This work is planned to be completed in the Spring of 2009.
- Pleasant Street and Morse Street Intersection – The Engineering Department is managing a design contract with our traffic consultant, VHB, for the design of traffic signals at Pleasant Street and Morse Street. The project is part of the State's Transportation Improvement Program (TIP). Design is currently at 75% stage with 100% design plans anticipated to be completed during the Spring of 2009. Actual construction is expected to be in 2010 pending State funding.
- University Avenue PWED – During 2006, the Town of Norwood was granted a \$1.5 million Public Works Economic Development grant from the State. The Engineering Department has been working on plans and specifications for the project which is anticipated to commence in 2010.
- Callahan School Parking Lot - The Engineering Department provided surveying, design and construction administration services for the reconstruction of the Callahan School Parking Lot. The design provided improved drop off areas for busses and students as well as a significant increase in the number of parking spaces necessary to accommodate all functions at the Callahan School and adjacent ballfield.
- William Shyne Circle Parking Lot – The Engineering Department provided surveying, design and construction administration services for the reconstruction of the Norwood Housing Authority parking lot at William Shyne Circle off of Fulton Ave. The reconstruction replaced a deteriorated parking area and provided an efficient layout for vehicles with new pavement, granite curbing and landscaped areas.
- Norwood Memorial Airport Parking Lot – The Engineering Department provided surveying, design, construction administration and permitting services for the reconstruction of the municipal parking lot at Norwood Memorial Airport. The reconstruction involved complete pavement replacement, granite curbing, street trees and conduit for future parking lot lighting. The project was funded by a grant obtained by Congressman Lynch as well as funding provided by the Massachusetts Aeronautics Commission.

# FINANCE COMMISSION

- **Vanderbilt Avenue Sewer Pumping Station** – The Engineering Department managed the design of upgrades to the Vanderbilt Avenue Sewer Pumping Station. The project was designed in 2008 and is expected to be constructed in 2009.
- **Street Acceptances** – The Engineering Department prepared Street Acceptance plans and layout documents for Short Street Extension, Cotter Farm Road, Plantation Circle, Alden Drive, Puritan Place and Fairfield Circle. A public hearing for the layout for these streets was held in 2008 with acceptance expected at the May, 2009 Town Meeting.
- **University Avenue Watermain** – The MWRA installed a 36 inch watermain in University Ave from Route One to Canton Street at the Westwood Town Line. The project is the part of the MWRA's master plan to provide a redundant water supply network to their southern system of communities. The Engineering Department provided assistance to the MWRA during design and construction as well as conducted weekly progress meetings.
- **Pedestrian Safety** – The Engineering Department provided recommendations to the Board of Selectmen on a variety of pedestrian safety issues
- **Westwood Station** – The Engineering Department provided recommendations to the Board of Selectmen on potential concerns regarding the construction of the proposed Westwood Station project on University Avenue in Westwood.

The upcoming year 2009 is expected to be equally challenging. The Engineering Department anticipates the following work to be performed: design of the improvements proposed under the University Avenue PWED grant; design and construction of the Jefferson Drive utility and roadway improvement project; reconstruction of the Callahan School ballfield; construction of improvements to the Meadowbrook Sewer underdrain; traffic signal design for the intersection of Pleasant Street and Morse Street; design of the Upland Road and Prospect Street intersection; design and construction of the Annual Street Resurfacing project; continued development of the Geographic Information System; and various street acceptances.

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# NORFOLK COUNTY MOSQUITO CONTROL

## 2008 ANNUAL REPORT

The duties of the Assessors are complex and comply with Massachusetts General Law, Chapter 59.

The primary function of the Board is to assess property at full and fair cash market value for the purpose of taxation. The three main sources of tax revenue are Real Estate, Personal Property and Motor Vehicle Excise. The department is responsible for the update and maintenance of various records, including property ownership records, personal property records, exempt property records and town owned property records, sub-division records and the apportioned street and sewer records. Other duties include the reviewing and maintenance of building permits, new business certificates, motor vehicle excise tax appeals, tax exempt appeals, real estate and personal property tax appeals, Appellate Tax Board. The Board is responsible Real Estate, Personal Property and Motor Vehicle tax commitments.

The Assessors do not determine property taxes. The Town itself determines the level of taxation through Town Meeting actions.

The Fiscal Year 2008 residential and open space tax rate was \$8.13. The commercial, industrial and personal property tax rate was \$16.14.

## 2008 REPORT OF THE NORFOLK COUNTY MOSQUITO CONTROL PROJECT

The operational program of the Project integrates all proven technologies into an Integrated Pest Management (IPM) system of mosquito control and vector management that is rational, environmentally sensitive and cost effective.

**Surveillance:** Surveys, Inspections, and monitoring on support of our program include GIS mapping of breeding areas, larval and adult collections, and fieldwork evaluations leading to better water management. West Nile virus and Eastern Equine Encephalitis have been active in Norfolk County over the past several years which has resulted in an expansion of the surveillance program in collaboration with the Massachusetts Department of Public Health (MDPH), State Laboratory Institute. MDPH has requested that the Norfolk County Mosquito Control Project expand mosquito surveillance across the county for the purpose of detecting viruses in collected mosquitoes as an early warning system for the residents of the county. Considerable manpower has been reallocated to these efforts, which is not reflected in this report.

All mosquito eggs need water to hatch and to sustain larval growth.

**Water Management Activities:** An important component of our IPM approach is the management of shallow, standing, stagnant water, and the maintenance of existing flow systems which if neglected can contribute to mosquito breeding. Site visits, pre and post monitoring, photographic documentation, survey measurements, flagging, accessing assessors information, maintenance of paperwork and electronic forms, communication with and /or meeting on site with residents, town/state/federal officials and maintaining regulatory compliance are all important aspects of this program. In addition to normal drainage system maintenance, Project personnel advise residents on removal of water holding artificial containers on their property for the purpose of eliminating potential West Nile virus mosquito breeding habitat.

**Larval Control:** Treatment of mosquito larvae during aquatic development is the next most effective control effort. These applications were conducted after devoting many man hours to collecting larval data which is used for targeting purposes as well as for determining efficacy of these applications. The products used during these applications were Bti (Bacillus thuringiensis israelensis) and Methoprene.

**Adult Control:** The suppression of flying adult mosquitoes becomes necessary when they are numerous, annoying, and/or threaten public health. These applications are conducted based on residential complaints as well as by analyzing adult mosquito population data collected from light traps. Additional applications may have occurred following identification of mosquito born viruses such as West Nile virus and Eastern Equine Encephalitis. The product used during these applications was Sumithrin.

The Registry of Deeds is the principal office for real property records in Norfolk County. The Registry receives and records hundreds of thousands of documents each year, and is a basic resource for title examiners, mortgage lenders, municipalities, homeowners, and others with a need for land record information. The Registry of Deeds has been a vital component of Norfolk County government since 1793, the year Governor John Hancock signed legislation creating Norfolk County, also known as the County of Presidents - the home or birthplace of John Adams, John Quincy Adams, John F. Kennedy and George H.W. Bush. The Registry operates under the supervision of the elected Register, William P. O'Donnell. In over two hundred years of continuous operation, the Registry has progressed from the days of scribes with quill pens to computers, scanned documents and off-site access. However, in all that time our objectives have remained the same: accuracy, reliability and accessibility for the residents of the twenty eight communities that comprise Norfolk County.

Improved technology and management of records and increased levels of customer service remain areas of major focus for the Registry of Deeds. Initiatives include:

- Free public viewing access for every document including land plans recorded by the Registry since its inception in 1793 via the internet at [www.norfolkdeeds.org](http://www.norfolkdeeds.org). The Registry regularly updates and enhances the site to include recent news, trends, press information, and answers to frequently asked questions.
- An ability for those who such as attorneys, title examiners, realtors, lenders, surveyors and civil engineers who establish an account with the Registry to print documents directly from their offices for \$1.00 per page.
- A continuing technology fund investment in computer hardware in the Registry itself to insure that anyone wanting to access the records can do so.
- The expansion of the internet accessible indexing system back to 1955.
- A full service telephone and walk-in customer service center and the addition of closing rooms and tables to encourage the citizens of Norfolk County to feel comfortable in using their Registry.

Norwood was typical of the other towns in Norfolk County showing decreased real estate activity in 2008 recording a total of 493 deeds, 14.6% fewer than in 2007. As it did in so many other communities, the average price of a Norwood real estate sale (greater than \$1,000 - residential and commercial properties combined) declined in 2008 and at the end of 2008 stood at \$377,048. The total dollar volume of real estate sales in Norwood for 2008 settled at \$100.6 million, a significant decrease from 2007 which saw some larger commercial transactions operate to push that value higher. There were 1058 mortgages recorded in Norwood in 2008 which translates to 23.1% fewer than in 2007. Real estate activity was relatively steady throughout the year with June the busiest month accounting for 10.1% of the town's total recordings.
