

CITY OF OAK PARK VOTING PRECINCTS


THIS MAP

Oak Park City Council

THE CITY OF OAK PARK operates under a council-manager form of government. Council, as the legislative body, is comprised of five members – the mayor, mayor pro tem, and three City Council members. City Council,

as a whole, is empowered by then City Charter to develop citywide policy.

Each council member is elected to a four-year term, with the exception of the mayor, which is a two-year position. Council members are elected by the citizens of Oak Park to represent the entire community; and each member has an equal voice and vote.

The State of Michigan's 1976 Open Meetings Act requires that the public is appropriately notified about and welcome to attend Oak Park City Council meetings.

Government in Action

City Council convenes every first and third Monday of the month beginning at 7 p.m. When a meeting day falls on a holiday, the City Council meeting will be postponed until the following business day. City Council occasionally holds study sessions prior to the regular meeting in order to review issues in-depth. With a few exceptions as allowed by law, all City Council meetings are open to the public. All meeting dates and times are posted at least 72 hours in advance on the City's website and in the lobby of City Hall.

Oak Park has 17 **Boards and Commissions** comprised of resident volunteers approved by City Council.

Each board and commission serves in an advisory capacity to the City Council and City Administrative Staff performing a vital function for the efficient operation of local government.

The City Clerk provides each of the boards and commissions with training on meeting efficiency. Members learn to develop proper agendas and maintain meeting minutes, as well as how to follow bylaws and conduct meetings under the Open Meetings Act, which requires that the public is appropriately notified and invited to attend meetings.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS, or DPW

The Department of Public Works, or DPW, provides City services divided among five divisions: Streets; Water and Sewer System; Parks; and Forestry, Motor Pool; and Facilities Maintenance. The Department's overarching goal is to provide a high quality of life to residents, local businesses and fellow employees by delivering responsive, efficient and effective services.

SNOW EMERGENCIES

- By ordinance, snow emergencies are called by the Director of Public Works when more than four inches of snow falls or other hazardous conditions develop.
- During snow emergencies, parking on public streets is not permitted until City crews have sufficiently plowed.
- Designated emergency parking areas are available.
- City of Oak Park snow emergencies are announced through the City's website, Facebook, Twitter, Comcast OPTV 15, and Community eBlasts (email).
- For City building closures due to weather, also check your local television and radio stations.

TREES AND POWER LINES

- Never attempt to trim trees around power lines or to handle a downed power line yourself.

ANNUAL BEAUTIFICATION AWARDS

The City of Oak Park's Beautification Advisory Commission promotes an annual home improvement campaign in which the commission recognizes homes and businesses in Oak Park for outstanding yards and gardens.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS, or DPW

TRASH COLLECTION

Regular Collection

- All rubbish must be curbside by 7 a.m. on collection day.
- Place trash curbside after noon the day before collection day.
- Use bags or trash cans only, no boxes. Containers must not exceed
 32 gallons each. Trash must be easy to handle.
- About seven bags/cans or bundles (or one cubic yard) allowed per collection.
- Regulation-size, 95-gallon, mini-dumpsters are allowed and can be ordered through the City's Water Department, Library or Department of Public Works.
- Up to three large household items per collection are allowed, but must be separated from trash.
- See the City calendar/website or call DPW for holiday pick-up schedule.
- Items NOT permitted, include automotive parts, tires, waste oil, drums, pallets, gravel, slate, tile, stone, poisons, dead animals, ammunition, explosives, concrete, soil, medicine, drugs, construction or move-out debris, or any item that may harm collection personnel.
- Unused, prescription medications can be disposed of at the Department of Public Safety building located at 13800 Oak Park Blvd, Oak Park, Mich. For more information, call the Department of Public Safety at (248) 691-7520.
- See below for criteria on yard waste, branch and hazardous waste collection.

Yard Waste

- Yard waste and brush are collected weekly at curbside from mid-April through mid-December.
- Yard waste must be in brown paper bags or 32gallon garbage cans marked with a "Yard Waste" sticker.
- "Yard Waste" stickers can be obtained in the Water Department in City Hall or at DPW.
- Bags or cans must not exceed 60 pounds.
- Before mid-April, take yard waste to SOCCRA Center located at 995 Coolidge Rd. in Troy, Mich. For more information, visit http://socrra.org/.

Hazardous Household Waste

- At no charge, residents may take items such as paints, garden chemicals, household cleaners, solvents, insulin syringes, and other materials to the MRF Drop-Off Center at 995 Coolidge Rd. in Troy, Mich.
- No appointment is necessary.

Tree Branch Collection

- Only brush resulting from yard maintenance (organic) is collected.
- Small brush (4" max; or ¼" diameter, or less) must be tied in bundles less than 60 pounds.
- Large brush (8" max; 6" diameter or less) must be stacked on curb with cut-ends together for the chipper.
- Items not permitted include material produced by commercial landscapers or tree trimmers, total tree removal, logs, stumps or roots. Use a private contractor in these instances.

Recyclables

- Recyclables must be placed in approved containers.
- Permitted items include, newspaper, tin, aluminum, glass, plastic containers, and household batteries.
- For a complete list of allowances, contact DPW.
- Recycling bins can be purchased at the Water Dept.

Please contact the Department of Public Works for any of the following: sanitary sewer back-up, special trash collection requests, or any questions about rubbish collection.

CODE ASSISTANCE

Contact Code Assistance to report:

TECHNICAL AND PLANNING, or T&P

Technical and Planning Services, or T&P, consists of the following divisions: Building Inspection Division which includes electrical; mechanical and plumbing; Code Assistance; and Engineering.

Building Inspection and Code Assistance are responsible for:

- all permit issuance; and inspection of all work related to construction projects or structures in the City;
- · enforcement of the zoning ordinance;
- investigation of alleged ordinance and code violations related to City parking lots, signs, nuisances, offensive conditions, blight, garbage and rubbish containment, weeds, rodent control, dog pound, and animal control; and
- certain types of parking offenses.

The Engineering Division oversees all matters related to construction of the physical properties of the City's infrastructure, as well as planning and engineering services for the City.

ANIMAL CONTROL

- Residents can own up to three animals.
- All dogs and cats must be licensed and on a leash (or, in the case of cats, on a harness) while off owner or custodian premises, including public parks. Dogs or cats can also be properly confined in a closed vehicle or a travel receptacle.
- Owner must remove all droppings in public spaces.
- Lost pets are held up to four days in the City pound, located on the Department of Public Works grounds at 10600 Capital St., Oak Park. Hours of operation are Monday thru Friday, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. During summer, hours change to 10:30 a.m. to 7 p.m. A daily charge is due when the pet is picked-up.
- The City does NOT provide animal removal (i.e., raccoons, birds or bats) from properties. Residents will need to secure a private contractor for these occurrences.
- If you are bitten by an animal, contact Animal Control between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. Contact Public Safety at (248) 691-7520 between 5 p.m. and 8 a.m.
- Abandoned vehicles on occupied property. If the abandoned vehicle is not on occupied property, such as the
 public street or vacant property, contact the Technical and Planning Department. If the abandoned vehicle is
 on a public street or vacant property, contact the Department of Public Safety.
- Abandoned houses
- Rentals: Landlords must purchase an annual landlord license to register all their properties with the City. Properties must be inspected by Code Assistance every two years or with occupancy change.
- <u>A ticket issued by Code Assistance</u> constitutes a misdemeanor and requires a court appearance. The court date will be posted on the ticket.

TECHNICAL AND PLANNING, or T&P

BUILDINGS

- <u>Building Permits</u>: Residents and businesses are required to obtain building permits for:
 - Plumbing, mechanical or electrical work
 - Additions and/or alterations to existing structures
 - Any work performed in the public right-of-way
- <u>DIY Home Improvements</u>: Contact the Building Inspector to discuss your options.
- <u>Financial Assistance</u>: Residents who qualify with low-to-moderate income can contact Oakland County's Home Improvement Loan Programs to help fund needed home repairs. For more information, call (248) 858-5401.

ADVANTAGES: One of the benefits of permits is that it involves the services of a professional inspector who approves each phase of the construction process which results in a safe, accurate and complete process.

ENGINEERING

- Contact Engineering to report:
 - Burned out street lights
 - Malfunctioning traffic signals
 - Dangerous sidewalks
 - Water leaks on public property
- Engineering generally notifies residents in advance of major street, sidewalk, water, or sewer projects. To learn more about planned improvements to the City's infrastructure, contact the Engineering Department at (248) 691-7450.
- <u>Water Leaks</u>: Residents are responsible for repairing water leaks on private property.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT AND COMMUNICATIONS

The Community and Economic Development Department works with Oak Park businesses and entrepreneurs to attract and retain a strong business base in the community. CED offers business support, as well as programs designed to enhance quality of life within the community. The City proactively recruits businesses to diversify the employment base. FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS – TECHNICAL AND PLANNING

How do I check property zoning?

 The Planning Division can assist by reviewing the City's official Zoning District Map, which is also on the City's website as Appendix A of the City Code. Additional maps can also be purchased from T&P.

Can I operate a business from my home?

 The City's Zoning Ordinance allows for certain "home occupations" to be conducted at a residence. The Planning Division can assist in determining eligibility.

How do I turn a large property into two parcels?

 The City Assessor reviews and approves all lot splits and combinations. The Planning Division can assist in identifying Zoning Ordinance requirements.

Am I allowed to display a temporary sign or banner?

 The Technical and Planning Division approves all requests for temporary signs and banners. See T&P for an application.

Before I dig holes in my yard to plant trees or install a fence, how do I identify water or sewer line locations?

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS - FINANCE

How is fiscal policy set in Oak Park?

 The City Manager, with City Council approval, sets fiscal policy. The Annual Budget is available for public review in the Oak Park Library, the City Clerk's Office, the Finance Department in City Hall, and online on the City's website at www.OakParkMl.gov.

How can I do business with the City?

 Current contracts up for "bid" are posted on the Michigan Inter-



governmental Trade Network at www.mitn.info.

FINANCE AND ACCOUNTING

The City's Finance and Accounting Department consists of the following public divisions:

Assessing determines the value of all Oak Park properties for taxation on an annual basis. This division collects and provides public access to the following information: taxpayer of record information, principal residence exemption, or PRE, status, physical improvements to the land, lot sizes, property descriptions, sales data, drawings, maps, and businesses located within the City.

Accounting processes the City's accounts receivables, payables, and payroll.

Treasury is responsible for collecting all monies payable to the City, including taxes, permit fees, license fees and program fees.

Water Department facilitates residential and commercial services, which include water, sewage removal, garbage pickup and water system maintenance.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS - ASSESSING

What do the terms "assessed value" and "taxable value" mean?

Assessed Value is generally one-half of the market value of the property, as determined by a two-year sales study. The term "state equalized value" or SEV simply means the Assessed Value as confirmed by the State of Michigan. Taxable Value is the amount on which your property taxes are levied. Taxable Value is capped and can only change by the rate of inflation each year (or 5%, whichever is less), unless a property has had a Transfer of ownership or physical changes to the property in the previous year.

Why are my taxes higher than my neighbor's taxes when our houses seem so similar?

• Taxes are based on taxable value, not assessed value.

What is a "Homestead Exemption?"

This is an exemption from paying 18 mills in school operating tax.
 For eligibility, you must own and occupy the home and have a valid Principal Residence Exemption, or PRE, on file with the Assessor's Office.

What should I do with the Notice of Assessment I receive by mail in March?

Review it. Contact the Assessor with any questions. Maintain the notice in preparation for your tax returns next year.

FINANCE AND ACCOUNTING

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS - TAXES

When are taxes due?

 Summer taxes, also referred to as City taxes, are due between July 1. Winter taxes, also referred to as County taxes, are due on December 1.

How can I pay my tax bill?

 Online payments using a credit card can be made 24 hours-a-day through the City's website at www.OakParkMl.gov. Credit card payments are accepted online and in person. Tax bills may also be paid with cash, check, or money order delivered by mail, inperson at the Treasury counter, or by using the drop box outside City Hall, located at 14000 Oak Park Blvd., Oak Park, Mich.

What if I cannot pay my taxes on time?

- The City of Oak Park will accept payments for summer taxes
 without penalty through August. In September, there will be a
 4% penalty charged to all unpaid summer taxes. Beginning in
 October, an additional penalty of one-half of 1% per month will
 also be assessed, not to exceed 6%.
- Winter taxes paid after February 14th will incur a penalty of 3%.

Will a partial payment be accepted on tax bills?

 Yes. A partial payment option is available.

How can I pay my water bill?

Online payments using a credit card can be made 24 hours-aday on the City's website at www.OakParkMl.gov. Credit card payments are accepted online only. Accounts may also be paid with cash, check or money order delivered by mail, in-person at the Water Department counter, or by using the drop box outside of City Hall located in City Hall at 14000 Oak Park Blvd., Oak Park, Mich. Payments on past due accounts that have been disconnected or issued a blue disconnection notice must be paid in cash or money order.

Can I pay my Detroit water bill through Oak Park?

• No. Only Oak Park water bills can be paid here.

Does the Water Department sell garbage bags, trash containers and recycling bins?

 Yes. Subject to availability, Water Services sells garbage bags, trash containers, and recycling bins. Occasionally, Oak Park purchases regulation-size, 95-gallon trash carts at a discount which are passed on to our residents on a firstcome, first-served basis. Watch for sale announcements in the City's newsletter, the Oak Park Branch. Prices are subject to change, so please call the Water Department at (248) 691-7470 for details.

OFFICE OF THE CITY CLERK

The Office of the City Clerk is the information center of the City. As a professional liaison between the City, its residents and the public, the Clerk's Office provides various services on a daily basis for the community while maintaining neutrality and impartiality. This allows the office to render equal service to all while maintaining the integrity of all elections and public records of the City of Oak Park.

The City Clerk's Office is responsible for providing services for the City Council and the Council-appointed boards and commissions of the City, see page 7. The Office is responsible for coordinating all election activity in the City and issues specialty licenses and permits. Other duties of the Clerk's Office include records management, mail processing, public notice administration, bid openings and Freedom of Information Act, or FOIA, request.



RESIDENTIAL SALE REQUIREMENTS

Permits are required for any residential sale in Oak Park, including garage, estate, moving, basement or yard sales. Residents are limited to two sales per year. Fees vary.

ABSENTEE BALLOTS

Registered Voters in the City of Oak Park can obtain an absentee voter ballot if one or more of the following apply:

- The person is 60 years of age or older
- The individual expects to be absent from the community the entire time the polls are open on Election Day
- The individual is physically unable to attend the polls without the assistance of another
- The person cannot attend the polls due to the religious tenets
- The person has been appointed an election precinct inspector in a precinct other then where they reside and vote
- The individual cannot attend the polls because they are confined to jail awaiting arraignment or trial

The City Clerk maintains a list of permanent absentee voters. Voters on this list will automatically be mailed an application for a ballot for every election. To be added to the list, please send your request in writing to the City Clerk at 14000 Oak Park Blvd., Oak Park, MI 48237.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS-LIBRARY

How do I get a library card?

You are eligible if you either live in Oak Park or are an employee of the City of Oak Park. Bring proof, complete the registration process, sign your card, and you're all set!

Can my child get a library card?

Yes. Children under 18 may apply for a card when they come to the library with a parent or legal guardian that shows proof of eligibility.

How many books may be checked out at one time?

It depends. All books circulate for three weeks at no charge. There is generally no check-out limit on the number of fiction titles.

How do I return items after hours?

An outdoor return chute is available on the south side of the library.

Are there overdue fines?

There is a 15¢ per day late fine for books, CD's and magazines. There is a \$1 pending fee assessed for DVD fines per day.





PUBLIC SAFETY

The Oak Park Public Safety Department has an accomplished history of service to the community since being established in 1954. The Department of Public Safety's mission is to improve the quality of life in Oak Park by working in partnership with all citizens to protect life and property, promote safety, maintain public order, and preserve human rights.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS – PUBLIC SAFETY

How do I report an emergency?

Call 9-1-1 for fire, medical, or police response, or any life or property-threatening emergency.

Where is the Public Safety Center located?

The Oak Park Public Safety Center is located at 13800 Oak Park Blvd., Oak Park, MI 48237. City Hall's and the Public Safety Department's entrances are West of Coolidge, between 9 Mile Road and 10 Mile Road, on the north side of Oak Park Blvd. opposite Oak Park High School. From I-696, use Exit 14, turn south on Coolidge and travel one-half mile to Oak Park Blvd. Business phone: 248-691-7520. Emergency: 9-1-1

What are the Public Safety Center hours?

The Public Safety Center, Uniformed Patrol, is open 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. The Administration, Investigations, Fire Inspection, Records and Property offices are open Mon. – Fri. between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m.

Is there a way to report a crime anonymously?

In most cases, crimes may be reported anonymously. Formal crime reports are not accepted over the phone, however, so victims must appear in person. Names, addresses, and telephone numbers are not required to complete a crime report at the Public Safety Center.

Is there a charge for using paramedic services?

There is a charge if the patient is transported. There may be a nominal fee if medical technicians make a vitals assessment and determine transport is not necessary or if the callers decide to transport the patient themselves.

Who do I contact about having a special event, such as a parade, bike race, 10K run or neighborhood block party? Please contact the City Clerk's office at (248) 691-7544.



PUBLIC SAFETY

What is available at the Public Safety Records Bureau?

Alarm permits, gun permits, bike licenses, fingerprints, personal record clearance, vehicle inspections, parking permits, and applications for carrying a concealed weapon are available through the Public Safety Records Bureau. The Records Bureau is also your source for police reports and crash reports. All requests must be made in writing. The release of information is subject to Michigan Freedom of Information Act guidelines.

Where do I get a gun permit?

Changes in the State of Michigan gun laws now allow a citizen to purchase a handgun directly from a licensed gun dealer (i.e. gun shop). Those wishing to purchase a handgun from a private seller must still obtain a license to purchase a permit if they do not possess a Concealed Pistol License. Government-issued identification and one other form of identification is required at the time of application. There is a \$5 fee upon application, plus a \$5 Notary Public fee per permit.

Where can I get an alarm permit and how much does it cost?

Alarm permits may be obtained from the Public Safety Records Bureau for a one-time \$20 fee. Applications for an alarm permit are also available on the city website at www.OakParkMl.gov.

Can I park a large truck in front of my house? Is there somewhere else I can park it?

City ordinances prohibit the parking of commercial vehicles on the public roadway in residential areas. Restrictions also apply in some instances on private property. Please review the City Ordinance (available online). Parking of commercial vehicles, by permit only, is allowed in the municipal parking lot off of Eleven Mile Rd, between Tulare and Gardens Streets. Please contact the Records Bureau for permit specifics.

Where do I obtain a bicycle license?

Bike licenses are available at the Public Safety Records Bureau for a \$2.00 fee.

Where can I obtain an animal license and how much do they cost?

Animal licenses (dog and cat) are available for purchase at the Public Safety Records Bureau. The application for an animal license is also available on the city web-site (www.OakParkMl.gov). Fees vary depending on whether the animal is spayed/neutered and if a one- or three-year license is being sought (dependent on the rabies vaccination certificate). Applicants will need to present a Rabies Certificate from the vet, along with proof of neutering, if applicable.

Except for licenses for newly acquired animals, most animal owners should purchase their licenses between October 1 and December 31 for the following calendar year in order to avoid a \$10 late fee.
