B. PUBLIC HEARING – TO ADOPT A FINAL PROJECT PLAN FOR WASTEWATER SYSTEM IMPROVEMENTS AND DESIGNATING AN AUTHORIZED PROJECT REPRESENTATIVE

Present during Public Hearing: Wolak, Coenen, Clark, Cooper, Boelke, Shall, Clark, Poulos, Bahorski, Michael Park, Karen Nickols, Howard Smith, and Dennis LeMieux.

MOTION by Cooper, seconded by Ballard, to enter into Public Hearing at 7:17 p.m.

President Wolak stated that the Public Hearing is to discuss the proposed Project Plan for improvements to the Village of Armada Wastewater Treatment Facilities to be financed through a State Revolving Fund loan administered by the DEQ. Treasurer Adair and Sewer Commissioner Steve Clark have been working on this project and President Wolak, Lyle Ballard, and Michael Shall have also attended meetings with the State and Giffels Webster Engineers.

Sewer Commissioner Steve Clark first asked for any public comment, there was none. He stated that the sewer system along with the plant and the lines are all around 30 years old and are in need of repair, updating, or replacement.

Michael Park from Giffels/Webster explained further. He stated that Giffels performed the evaluation of the system and the plant under the S-2 Grant. The S-2 Grant received by the Village funded Giffels/Webster to perform this evaluation, which included videotaping the sewer systems and system analysis of the manholes and to evaluate the treatment plant. All of the finding were compiled and put into a project plan which will be used to apply for an SRF Loan to pay for the projects. Forty manholes and 17 sewer lines are rated 4 – 5, which means they are critical/structurally deficient and eligible projects in the SRF. There are repairs necessary at the Colonial pump station to bring it up to regulatory safety requirements regulatory and safety deficiencies at the plant as well as projects that will need to be done within a 20 year lifespan. All the projects are summarized in the plan as well as recommendations from Giffels/Webster as well as cost estimates that have contingencies on them, for all projects which are cost estimates only, not contractor bid so they could change. Giffels/Webster prepared two cost estimates for the plan. The first estimate is repairing the recommendations for the treatment plant and the Colonial Street pump station as well as repairing the sewer lines and manholes with trenchless technology except for the areas that have to be open cut and if a line includes two areas that need to be repaired. The cost for Alternative One is \$2,175,280.00 and includes all Engineering, Engineering design, construction, construction administration. Alternative two includes the same repairs to the Sewer Plant and the Colonial Street pump station but would replace all of the lines, rather than lining them with the trenchless technology, that have structural deficiencies. The cost for Alterative Two is \$5,086,280.00.

MOTION by Clark, seconded by Coenen, to close the Public Hearing at 7:24 p.m.

President Wolak noted that the Village will accept any written comment on the proposed Project Plan turned in to the Village Office. He opened the floor to the Council for discussion. Trustee Cooper inquired as to whether the Council would make the determination of which alternative to accept or would they make that determination once they get into the plan. Attorney Bahorski stated that the Resolution is a stand-alone Resolution and referred to the first resolution which states that the Village formally adopts said Project Plan and agrees to implement the select alternative number so when the Council adopts the resolution they will need to select the alternative they wish to use. Trustee Coenen asked with the grant, what percentage would the Village be paying. Mike Park responded that the S-2 Grant only paid for this evaluation the Village would need to apply for an SRF loan for the improvements and would only be required to pay back the amount used so since the plan is estimated costs, the bids from contractors could be less and you don't have to pay back what you don't use. Trustee Coenen asked if this would increase the guarterly sewer bills which President Wolak and Clerk Poulos both stated it would. Trustee Shall inquired about the Village incurring all of this cost with no help at all from the State. Trustee Clark asked Karen Nickols if the DEQ has priorities of what projects need to be done first she stated no that it is up to the individual community. Trustee Coenen asked if by accepting Alternative One the Village is meeting the requirements of the DEQ. Trustee Clark stated that the Village will be meeting the requirements with that alternative as it includes the repairs to the sewer plant which needs to be done and his feeling is that Alternative One will not dig up streets and will meet the requirements and the Village has used this type of product and it works well. Trustee Cooper asked what the term of the loan is, Trustee Clark stated it would be a twenty year loan which was confirmed by Karen Nickol. Cooper asked when the payments start and Karen Nickol stated that interest payments begin when the first draw happens and the loan payments begin when the loan is closed out and the interest rate is 2 ½%. Trustee Shall

asked if the Village has an estimated cost increase for the residents yet and the Clerk responded that the projected increase was included in the Public Hearing notice. She read from the notice and explained that the increase is estimated to be .003 per gallon as this was the most accurate way of breaking it down as everyone's water bills are based on usage and are so different and this amount could equate to \$50.00/quarter for an average bill estimated to be \$350.00, but will be completely determined by homeowner usage. Resident and Building/Code Enforcer Dennis LeMiuex asked if this is just for repairing the sewer plant or the system throughout the Village. Clark stated that it is both the plant and the system. LeMieux asked if the Village knows how much piping is being lined/replaced and Trustee Ballard listed several streets that have already had these repairs during street projects and stated that leaves about five to seven streets left to be done. Mike Park stated that there is 27,000 feet of pipe within the Village and in 1992 the Village replaced 6,400 feet of that. Karen Nickol stated that the Plans are good for five years so projects will need to be completed within that time. Bahorski asked Nickol to verify that no matter which plan the Village chooses it doesn't mean that the Village must implement the project plan in total at that amount at one time. Nickol stated that is correct.

The amounts approved did not include training and travel expenses, which the office did not know were necessary. After several phone calls between Becky Henderson and BS&A, it was determined that the upgrades will not be available without the training.

She stated that this copier is comparable to the Township's and can work as a copier, scanner, and fax.


