

Mayor's Message

Our Future as a Community



- Should we use a portion of Town reserves (\$1.5 Million) to support our current level of services?
 - Many communities are faced with this option in order to continue to provide municipal services. Our neighboring community of Edmonds is currently debating the impact of its financial deficits. Our community does not have the same level of concerns because Woodway's former Councils and mayors have worked hard to preserve our resources for emergencies.
- Do we ask residents to consider a property tax increase up to \$60 per month so that our reserves are retained for the future?
 Woodway has a 50 year history of independence and in my opinion, our healthy reserves are at the core of our

independence. Preserving our community and these reserves has always been my priority.

- Can we maintain affordable fire/EMS services?
 - The decision by Edmonds and neighboring jurisdictions on whether to form a regional fire authority has an impact on Woodway's operating budget because our contract with Edmonds for fire/EMS services accounts for approximately 30% of our budget. There is a possibility that the rate at which we are able to contract for these services could increase dramatically.

In the next few months the Council, Planning Commission, and I will meet in small neighborhood groups to discuss these options. I invite you to join your neighbors and myself as we work on our community's future. The schedule for the neighborhood meetings is on page 2. Please join me.

Public Works News

I was recently contacted by Public Works Director Terry Bryant to examine a couple mysteries in the Woodway Reserve. The explanation for them is too good to not pass along, so here goes.

The first is the concern about the Western red cedars that have several small branches turning rusty brown. Is the tree dying or stressed? No, actually this is the cedar's fall color. The phenomenon is called 'flagging' and is a normal process of shedding foliage as it goes into dormancy for the winter.

The other conundrum was in regards to some big-leaf maples along the north edge of the Woodway Reserve. A few branches were dying and breaking off. There was no pattern to the dieback which ruled out insect or chemical damage or even a root or disease problem. If you looked closer to the point of dieback you would see some mechanical damage. I concluded that the furry critters in the forest were the culprits, most likely the Douglas squirrel (only native squirrel). They often collect twigs and bark for their nests and food stash over the winter.
