

Proposition 1 - EMS & General Operations Levy

The Town's largest source of revenue – property tax – generates approximately \$684,000 annually. Of this amount, \$221,000 is generated by the Emergency Medical Services (EMS) levy, which expires at the end of 2009. State law, enacted following the passage of Initiative 747, limits the growth of the Town's property tax revenue to 1%– approximately \$6,800 annually.

The Town's largest single expense is its fire services contract with the City of Edmonds. This contract is \$361,000 per year and has increased by over 5% annually or \$18,000. This contract, along with inflationary increases in the Town's other expenses, has resulted in an average growth rate in Town expenditures

of approximately 3% per year.

Annually, the deficit between the growth in Town expenditures and Town revenues grows exponentially. Beginning next year, the Town's expenses will exceed its revenues, and the Town's reserves will be depleted within six years.

This levy will replace the Town's expiring EMS levy and raise revenue sufficient to maintain existing Town services. The increase in property tax will depend on a home's assessed value. The levy will increase the property tax on a home with a 2009 assessed value of \$1M by approximately \$500 per year.

Proposition 2 - Bond Measure to Purchase Rosary Heights

Rosary Heights, a 23-acre estate (including 8 acres of tidelands) located along Woodway Park Road, has been owned by the Adrian Dominican Sisters for over 50 years. The Town has had discussions with the Sisters about the future of the property and the Town's desire to see the property preserved. In January, the Sisters decided to sell the property. During a series of neighborhood meetings, the community discussed the possible purchase of Rosary Heights. The property was assessed in 2009 for \$8.7M, The Town Council negotiated a purchase option for \$5.9M, with the purchase contingent on voter approval.

The proposed uses of the property include a Community

Center, Park, Town Hall, and an Environmental Education Center. This 30-year bond measure would fund the purchase plus establish a \$250,000 maintenance fund. The maintenance fund would be supplemented by the proceeds from the sale of the current Town Hall, grants and donations. Operating costs would be supported by rental revenue from functions held onsite.

This bond measure will result in an increase in property tax based upon a home's assessed value. The bond is estimated to increase the property tax on a home with a 2009 assessed value of \$1M by \$540 a year.

Town Council Corner

<u>General Government:</u> Adopted Resolution No. 09-335, adopting an identity theft prevention program pursuant to the Fair and Accurate Credit Transaction Act of 2003. Appointed Tom Whitson to fulfill the remainder of the Bob Schillberg's term. Adopted Ordinance No. 09-504, Submission of a Levy Lid Lift to Voters to Support Emergency Medical Services and Existing Town Operations and submitting it to the voters on August 18, 2009. Adopted Ordinance 09-505, submission of a bond issue to the voters for the purchase of Rosary Heights plus establish a \$250,000 maintenance fund for a total amount of \$6.15 million.

Public Works & Lands: Adopted Ordinance 09-502, amending Chapter 16.12 Tree Preservation.

<u>Land Use & Planning:</u> Approved the proposed Pt. Wells Urban Center Design Guidelines and Standards, which were included in the Town's official testimony to the Snohomish County Planning Commission on April 28. Approved Ordinance No. 09-503, amending WMC 16.10, Environmentally Critical Areas. Approved Ordinance 09-506, amending WMC related to Critical Areas.

<u>Public Safety:</u> Presented a plaque of thanks to Officer Tim Dreyer in recognition of his 20 years of service as a police officer.
