

**MINUTES OF THE
ANCHORAGE CITY COUNCIL
REGULAR MEETING**

**Monday, October 09, 2023
6:00 p.m.**

Council members in attendance were Diane Cook, Matt Delehanty, Patrick McMahan, Karin Tyrer, and Bill Wetherton. Hunter Wilson was absent. Also in attendance were Mayor Neil Ramsey, City Administrative Officer Reneé Major, City Attorney John McGarvey, Assistant City Attorney Richard Edwards, Police Chief Dean Hayes, Public Works Director Gary Burkhead, Forestry Board Chairperson Jan Ruzich, Deputy Treasurer Alison Melton, and Office Manager/Clerk Angie Chick. Mayor Neil Ramsey called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m.

MINUTES

Cook motioned to approve the September 11, 2023 regular meeting minutes. Tyrer seconded the motion, and it passed unanimously.

TREASURER'S REPORT

There were no questions about the treasurer's report.

POLICE REPORT

Chief Hayes announced that the police department received a \$102,500 grant for (90% +/- of) the cost to purchase 25 compliant mobile and portable radios that are compatible with the upgraded, encrypted equipment used by Louisville Metro. Kentucky State Police loaned twelve portable units to the Anchorage department to use until they get the new equipment through the grant.

HISTORIC PRESERVATION COMMISSION

Historic Preservation Chairman Bill Wetherton stated that three applications were approved in September. He also stated that one application for repair and additions to a home that was damaged by spring storms needed to submit revised plans for approval. Mayor Ramsey and Attorney McGarvey stated that there is a provision in City ordinances for emergency repair in the Historic District, and that the owner can repair the structure back to its original state only, but they cannot alter it.

Ordinance Amending Helicopter Landing Site Ordinance – First Reading

Cook conducted the first reading of an ordinance amending Anchorage code of ordinances Chapter 97, Sections §97.06, §97.07, and §97.11 relating to the helicopter weight limit, and making adjustments to the helicopter landing visibility requirements, and maximum number of flight operations per calendar year.

Ordinance Traffic Signs – First Reading

Cook conducted the first reading of an ordinance restricting traffic on north bound Evergreen Road from turning onto Log Cabin Lane and Woodland Road during peak traffic periods and determine the traffic level on Shady Lane to make it a one-way street, and setting a penalty for a violation. The City will review traffic on Glenbrook Road and the effects of these restrictions once the signs are in place and restrictions are being enforced.

Approval to Surplus Police Vehicle: 2013 Ford Taurus

McMahon motioned to declare the 2013 Ford Taurus police vehicle as surplus equipment. Cook seconded the motion, and it passed unanimously.
