### Butler County Recovery to Work Project

Soon after he took office Ohio Governor John Kasich brought together the Ohio Department of Alcohol and Drug Addiction Services (ODADAS) and the Ohio Rehabilitation Service Commission (ORSC) to offer to clients who are deemed "Most Significantly Disabled" to access vocational services including substance

abuse treatment. The Butler County
Alcohol and Drug Addiction
Services (ADAS) Board took
advantage of the opportunity which leverages
three dollars of federal funding for every
dollar the local Board

contributes.

The Butler County Recovery to Work Project began in the Spring of 2011. To meet the needs of clients the treatment and vocational systems began to collaborate in a new way. Ultimately the goal of the project is to assist clients in obtaining and maintaining employment as part of a complete approach to addiction recovery. Due to long waiting lists in the system access to vocational services was not previously available to substance abuse clients in the way this project has made possible. Employment as an avenue to self-sufficiency enhances clients' selfesteem, self-efficacy and overall sense of hope within their recovery.

As of early 2013 the project is serving 48 clients but the Board hopes to build to an active caseload of 60 individuals. A full time vocational coordinator is part of the project team which also includes Board staff. A positive,

strong working relationship has developed between the Butler County ADAS Board and Ohio Valley Goodwill, the vocational service provider. The Board's treatment providers have demonstrated crucial flexibility in accommodating vocational services as part of the comprehensive needs of the clients involved in the project.

One of the project's first clients completed residential treatment and then entered outpatient treatment. While in outpatient treatment he received a vocational assessment and then job placement. It was crucial that his placement was commensurate with his interests, aptitudes and abilities. This client had transportation issues which the project was able to fund initially and then his employer assisted

with funding for a vehicle so the client had independent transportation. This client continued to develop supports at the employment site and treatment community. Another client from the initial weeks of the project had a history of 42 misdemeanor charges against him. This client also remains employed and in recovery.

These success stories exemplify the ability of systems working closely together to turn around the health and economic status of an individual. The Butler County ADAS Board wishes to thank the staff of the project and will continue to find opportunities to collaborate with other systems to improve outcomes for its clients.




