24 25	Bruce Lee-Clark moved and Tom Haley seconded to approve the Consent Agenda as presented. The motion carried with Gary Corey, Jim Carroll, and Sarah Perrin absent.

43 Debbie Matte:

- Seniors were told that they would have double the space at the renovated Benn Hi than
 they currently have. With every update we get less.
- A bathroom had been taken out but has since been put back in.
- There isn't a map of the new layout available until April.
- No one has answered if we would be under the YMCA.
- 49 Parking will be a problem.
- Seniors are the fastest growing demographic so we will be needing more space, not less.
 Shared space is not our space that will be available to us whenever we want it.
- Went to Hale Resources for a copy of their grant agreement to buy the Benn Hi and there was a "no walk-ins" sign on the door. Requested that the Board get her one.
- Feels the Town hasn't been honest and up front with the Seniors.

55 Mr. Monks: We have not made any major changes to the floor plan - no reduction in 56 square footage or removal of a bathroom. Only minor adjustments as required by Historic 57 Preservation. Plans haven't been finalized yet, and when they are, they will be posted to the 58 public for comment. The Bennington County Regional Commission (BCRC) will be doing a 59 parking study but there will be "significantly more parking available to the Seniors than there is 60 currently at the Senior Center". And, the Hale application is their own private application. Since 61 we have not made any final decisions on the Senior Center, we don't have anything to share and 63 Ms. Barsotti: The Hale grant application is for a Community Development Block Grant. 64 These grants are awarded to the Town and sub granted for housing. We have the application -65 actually the pre-application - that can be printed out if you want to see it.

66 Mr. Lee-Clark: What do you mean by finalized? Mr. Monks: That there have been some 67 minor changes to the original plan and it is "finalized for presentation". None of these have 68 changed any square footage, room functionality, or programming as originally planned. 69 Programming for the Seniors is a Select Board decision.

70 Isabel Harper and David Bond:

- Reiterated their concern for storing the LGB oil trains stored in Bennington as they are a
 danger to nearby residents.
- If they derail, the danger is "catastrophic" as it was recently in Ohio. This was a
 controlled burn for 2 days with road access and the entire community was evacuated.
 There is no road access to the ones in Bennington.
- They don't provide any new jobs or tax revenue to the Town.
- We would like the Select Board to take a leading role in addressing this problem.

Ms. Jenkins: Please update us on the requests that the Board had asked of you after the other presentation. They were to 1. Contact other communities and bring back any actions that they have done; 2. Join the Select Board in "bugging" our delegation who still haven't provided the waybill which our Town Counsel has said is the path forward with this. We have also heard that these trains are reinforced so if you could also research that if you haven't already.

- We published a 2nd piece in the Banner that went through these requests. We've
 reached out to several communities and though there is concern, there isn't a lot of
 precedent on community actions.
- Portland, Maine had a port where they were loading oil onto the tankers; the
 community sued on the transportation grounds for the risk to the port and won.
- 88 Mr. Lee-Clark: Please send us the citation on the Maine case. We will.
- Ms. Jenkins: It would be more helpful to us if we had a community that had taken action with an analogous example of our situation and to reach out to our delegation.
- We have reached out to the Vermont Delegation, have sent multiple e-mails, and
 Senator Sanders staffers have not responded. Welch was just getting set up but we'll
 start that again this spring.
- Is Vermont Railway investing in the spur right now? *Mr. Monks: This is a run-around track that replaces the run-around track that used to be closer to Town but became part of our Rail Trail Pathway. We have no control over what Vermont Railway does with their tracks.*

- Our community should send a letter to the Ohio community acknowledging the
 similarities to our situations. Their catastrophe is all over the news and Senator
 Sanders has been very vocal about it.
- We should write the Service Transportation Board. They can change the classification from a spur to a rail yard for storage and this would open it up to more local rules and oversight. *Mr. Monks: The support that Vermont Railway has from the State of Vermont makes it virtually impossible to change the classification from a spur to a rail yard.*
- Senators Campion and Sears are in favor of making a change and recommended that the Select Board or the Federal Delegation do something. *Mr. Monks: Vermont Railway is supported heavily by the State of Vermont. We have tried for 50 years to get the State to help us with the Railway and they have refused saying that the Railway is protected. "That is the reality."*
- If something goes wrong with one of these trains that is the opportune moment to put
 pressure on all of these groups.

113 Ms. Jenkins: Mr. Hurd and Mr. Monks could look into what are the two best pressure 114 points and what do we need as partners to make something happen - perhaps a site visit when 115 they're in the area.

- 116 Nancy White:
- It is unfair to the Seniors to move them to the Benn Hi where they will be exposed to
 more people of all ages instead of being secluded on the 2nd floor as they are now.
 Money is the reason this is being done.
- Who is paying to buy Benn Hi? *Ms. Jenkins: There will be another public meeting in April* 120 with an update on the Benn Hi. All parties were present at the last meeting on Benn Hi -121 the architects, Hale Resources, and the Town - and broke out into separate areas where 122 123 everyone could stay and ask questions after the presentation. Mr. Monks: The Town has a long term lease agreement with the current owner of Benn Hi. We can assign the lease 124 to whomever we want and we can terminate it whenever we want. It is a method of site 125 control of the property. It has been publicly stated twice and is on the website, that the 126 127 "most likely scenario" is that Hale Resources will buy the property. It is unlikely that the 128 Town will own the property.

129 **5. CASELLA CONTRACT EXTENSION**

Mr. Hurd explained that our contract with Casella to operate the Transfer Station and
the Recycling Depot expired on December 31, 2022. The new contract term officially began on
January 1, 2023 and will run through December 31, 2026 and includes new pricing that includes
an annual increase at the rate of inflation which will take effect May 1, 2023.

Bruce Lee-Clark moved and Tom Haley seconded to approve the Amendment to Municipal Waste Management Amended and Restated Agreement between the Town of Bennington and Casella Waste Management, Inc. as presented.

137 Mr. Lee-Clark noted that given the way that waste management has changed and the

138 market for recycling, this makes sense.

139 The motion carried with Gary Corey, Jim Carroll, and Sarah Perrin absent.


WHEREAS, Bennington County Workforce & Education Committee Stakeholders are instrumental in effectively collaborating on resolving workforce challenges one project at a time; and

The Town of Bennington is considering making an application to the State of Vermont for a VCDP Implementation Grant 2023 under the Vermont Community Development Program. A public hearing will be held at 06:00pm on 03/27/2023 at 130 River St 3rd floor Bennington VT 05201 to obtain the views of citizens on community development, to furnish information concerning the amount of funds available and the range of community development activities that may be undertaken under this program, the impact to any historic and archaeological resources that may be affected by the proposed project, and to give affected citizens the opportunity to examine the proposed statement of projected use of these funds.

The proposal is to apply for \$1,000,000 in VCDP funds which will be used to accomplish the following activities: Complete Renovations and upgrades of 650 Main St Bennington VT 05201 (Benn Hi). This building is the former Bennington High School and Middle School that closed in 2004. The building is currently vacant and is recorded on the National Historic Registry through the National Park Service. The building will be converted to a mixed use residential and commercial space.

MANAGER'S REPORT March 27, 2023

ACTION

<u>Recreation Center Fee Schedule for 2024 and beyond</u> We have discussed this many times. The Recreation Fee schedule is a stagnant document. It remains in place until changed and approved by the Select Board. This creates a situation where changes tend to be big jumps to catch up years past and the fees generated lag behind the cost. Working with the Y and the Assistant Manager, I am proposing the attached fee schedule which is based mostly on a 6% percent increase (the rate of inflation for February 2023) and which will increase annually based on the rate of inflation for February of a given year (CPI-U all cities average). New rates will take effect on July 1 of that year.

<u>Action requested</u> Motion to amend the Recreation Center Fee schedule as shown.

<u>Certificate of Highway Mileage</u> Normally presented in early February, this was overlooked this year. I now present the Certificate of Highway mileage for Board approval. It will then be certified by the Clerk and forwarded to the State.

<u>Action requested</u> Circulate for signatures. (Note that there only 6 lines).

INFORMATIONAL

<u>Municipal Planning Grant Award</u> I am pleased to announce that our Planning Grant application has been awarded in the amount of \$21,160.00.

<u>Pool Chlorine System Modifications</u> We monitor the chlorine levels in the Rec Center pool as we are required to do. We have determined over the last several months that modifications are necessary to enhance the chlorine levels which are being exhausted by the heavy use of the pool. Mark Sawyer and Paul Dansereau are proposing to install UV sanitation which will reduce our chlorine dependence and destroy micro-organisms and will breakdown the chloramines (bad chlorine) which causes skin and eye irritation and will reduce the strong presence of chlorine odor when there is a heavy bather load. The electrical consumption is low, drawing only 3 amps of power about the same as a computer and monitor. It will cost \$7,000, and we should see a significant savings in operating cost.

Communications Coordinator Report — March 27, 2023

March: In Like a Lion ...

...and lets hope it leaves like a lamb! The vernal equinox arrived to the scene of deep snow which was the remnants of an impressive nor'easter that hit the community earlier this month. What was equally impressive was the Department of Public Works; their crews worked tirelessly to keep streets open and as safe as possible. Our police chief reported many fewer crashes and issues due to the storm than might be expected due to this excellent work.

Get Involved in Your Local Government

Voting Day resulted in the re-election of Sarah Perrin, and the election of Ed Woods. Participation in the vote was lower than we would like, with about 22% of registered voters participating. How did we do outreach to voters? We had several articles in the Banner, regular posts on social media, and frequent mentions at Select Board meetings. While we clearly must continue to do more, we are in line with other Vermont towns such as Milton that had a 23% turnout. One important result of the vote was the passage of the two water bonds to finish State mandated improvements to our water system which will allow those projects to be done quicker and avoid inevitable cost increases that would have resulted from continuing to address the issue on a piecemeal basis.

Letters of Interest for those who would like to serve on a town board or commission are now being accepted. This is a great way to be directly involved in your Town government! For more information, visit the Town website and look under "Government" and select "Join Town Government."

Community Outreach

We had an impressive turnout for our public meeting on the Y Woods. This collaborative effort, led by our Director of Public Works R.J. Joly and partners from the SW Tech Forestry Program and the Vermont Department of Forests, Parks and Recreation's Bennington County Forester. Thirty to forty members of the public were in attendance to learn about the proposal for creating a forest management plan for the Y Woods and many comments and suggestions were made to inform the creation of a draft management plan. The ability to provide public comment on the Y Woods, and a recording of the presentation is available on the Town website under the "How do I" section; "Provide Input on the Y Woods."

A public ribbon cutting ceremony is planned for the Rail Trail on May 6, Green Up Day. A short ceremony at the entrance of the trail on River Street next to the Firehouse will occur at 10 am. The Town is partnering with the Bike Hub and probably other community organizations to be part of the ceremony. A community clean up of the trail will immediately follow the ceremony, with the town providing garbage bags and pickup of the collected garbage.

I am coordinating with our Buildings and Grounds team to stay on top of final arrangements regarding the new playgrounds at Willow Park. Completion of this work was delayed when staff discovered issues with the curbing and other punch list items that dragged on until winter prevented it from being completed. We are assured that finishing this work is a top priority from our vendor and we are doing everything we can to hold them to it. Once we have a firm completion date we look forward to finally being able to schedule a re-opening celebration for the playgrounds... ideally as soon as possible.

Organizational Outreach

Work has begun for planning for this year's Battle Day celebrations and I'm assisting the Fire Department who has graciously been leading this effort for what will now be 58 years. I'm also helping amplify Fire Department recruitment efforts including assisting with the promotion of the MayDay Open House which is happening on May 13th.

I've also met with the Communications Director of the SVSU, the director of the Turning Point, and the VP of communications for Bennington College as part of my effort to improve communications between these organizations. I'm also part of a team supporting a grant request led by GBCS.

I was honored to be the keynote speaker for the Bennington Museum Board of Trustees retreat in Grafton, VT. The focus of my talk was the role of the museum as a premier regional history museum and it's importance to the community, as well as the upcoming 250th commemorations and how the museum has played a role in past commemorations.

Citizen Outreach and Public Record Requests:

I met with citizens sixteen times over this past month on a variety of issues, ideas, and concerns. There was one public record requests to my office.

250th Anniversary Planning:

The Bennington 250th Anniversary steering committee is meeting again this week with a packed agenda. A full committee meeting will be held in April. I have agreed to serve as the chair of the State level VT 250th Education committee, and I also serve on the VT 250th Commission as a commissioner and as part of the executive committee. I traveled to Virginia (paid by the State) to be one of Vermont's two representatives there for a convening of 24 States 250th planners with over 250 people in attendance. A tremendously valuable conference! I also continue to represent Bennington and Vermont as the facilitator of a regional collaborative of the states of NY, MA, CT, and RI.

Website Development

I continue to work out a few kinks in the new unified town website, but overall the launch has been very successful and I've had a lot of compliments from community members on the new design and usefulness of the site. I welcome suggestions and comments on how we can continue to improve this valuable community resource.

Community Based Learning (CBL) Intern



Report to the Bennington Select Board

March 2023

Chief Paul Doucette and Lieutenant Camillo Grande represented the Town of Bennington at the Leadership Summit held at Bennington College on March 20, 2023. This three-month project was a result of many issues involving the Town of Bennington and State of Vermont. We looked at substance abuse disorders, homelessness, domestic violence, violent assaultive behaviors and ways to build upon the relationships and communication we currently have with our many community partners and stakeholders. This day long Leadership Summit proved to be very successful and open the eyes of many people in our community. We also focused on the MANY positive things occurring in and around Bennington and the State of Vermont.

The Bennington Police Department continues working closely with the members of the Community Policing Advisory Review Board (CPARB). We attended trainings and were able to present the procedures to go along with the new policy related to Quality Control, Internal Investigations and Discipline. The procedures were outlined on how we handle complaints, investigations and compliments.

Two new employees were sworn in as law enforcement officers and attended the Level II Law Enforcement Basic Training Program. They will be assigned to work with Field Training Officers until their attendance at the Level III training at the Vermont Police Academy beginning in August 2023. We look forward to working with them on professional development.

After many years of service, we returned our Humvee to the State of Vermont as part of a state initiative to reduce the use of military equipment by municipal law enforcement agencies. We had great success with the Humvee over the years using it during weather events, special operations and community engaged events.

Spring and summer events are filling our calendars and we look forward to many community events coming our way. We are also planning New Experience Camp and National Night Out. There are several exciting changes to both of these events!!!! Stay tuned for more information.
