- 1. Public Comment is to allow residents an opportunity to share information or make 36 announcements that benefit the community at large. 37 2. The topic should not be related to an agenda item. If a member of the public wants to 38
 - comment on an agenda item they can do so during the discussion of that item.
 - 3. Comments should be 3 minutes or less.
 - 4. You are required to state your real name and town of residence.
- 5. Sharing comments, announcements and concerns are encouraged rather than asking 42 questions. Public Comment is not a time for discussion. If you have specific questions it 43 is best to call the Town Manager to get a full explanation and accurate information. 44
- 6. If the topic requires much discussion the item will be considered as an agenda item at a 45 future meeting. 46
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Linda Bermudez: The VFW Post has put together an Adult Scavenger Hunt that will take place on 48

October 30, 2021 rain or shine in the Downtown to benefit the Downtown. It is open to the public, it is 49

limited to 100 participants, and all participants must be 21 or over. Worksheets cost \$5.00 and are 50

available at the VFW on Saturday between noon and 3:00pm. There will be a potluck dinner available at 51

the end and the grand prize could be up to \$500. 52

Daniel Strohl: The Farmers Market will be starting their bi-weekly winter schedule on November 6th in 53

the cafeteria of the old Benn High. In addition there will be online ordering and curbside deliveries, and 54

they will be returning to the Deer Park in the summer. November 6th will also be State Representatives 55

Day with our State representatives present. Masks will be required. Ms. Conner thanked Mr. Strohl for 56

the information that the Farmers Market is putting on for our town. 57

5. DECLARATION OF INCLUSION - BENNINGTON ROTARY CLUB 58

Beth Wallace and Mary Rogers, representing the Bennington Rotary Club, presented the 59 following Town of Bennington Declaration of Inclusion for the Town to adopt because "words matter":

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"Town of Bennington Declaration of Inclusion

The Town of Bennington condemns racism and welcomes all persons, regardless of race, color, religion, 62

national origin, sex, gender identity or expression, age, or disability, and wants everyone to feel safe and 63 welcome in our community. 64

As a town, we formally condemn discrimination in all of its forms, commit to fair and equal treatment of 65

everyone in our community and will strive to ensure all our actions, policies and operating procedures 66

reflect this commitment. 67

The Town of Bennington has and will continue to be a place where individuals can live freely and express 68 their opinions." 69

- 70 Board questions/comments:
- 71 Mr. Lee-Clark agreed that "words matter but actions also matter".

72 Ms. Jenkins added that "we need to be able to make this come alive" and, as a Board, we need to make

- 73 recommendations on how to put this into action.
- 74 Ms. Perrin: Thanked the Rotary for coming.

Ms. Conner: We read the Town's Vision Statement at every Board meeting to remind us that we need to do our part to implement this Declaration.

- 77 Public questions/comments:
- 78 Linda Foulsham: Noted the importance of the entire community implementing what has been adopted.

79 Tom Haley moved and Bruce Lee-Clark seconded to adopt the Town of Bennington Declaration 80 of Inclusion as presented. The motion carried unanimously.

81 Ms. Jenkins and Mr. Haley will put together some recommendations on moving forward with the

82 Declaration and bring them back to the Board for discussion in November. The Rotary will be sent a

copy of the Declaration and it will be put on the Town's website.

6. DOWNTOWN FUNDING STRUCTURE - CONTINUED DISCUSSION

85 Gary Corey owns property downtown and recused himself from this agenda item.

86 Topic of Discussion - Should the ~\$.20/\$100 of value paid as the Downtown Improvement District (DID)

tax paid by businesses in the DID or should it become part of the General Fund property tax at
\$8.00/\$100,000 of value?

- This would be similar to what we do for the Bennington Free Library, the McCullough Library, and
 the Bennington Rescue Squad, as well as, the schools.
 - Is supporting the Downtown something that enriches the whole community?
 - The Downtown is/has been revitalized.
- 93 Board and Public questions/comments:

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94 Mr. Carroll: What is the benefit to the Town to add the tax to the General Fund? Mr. McDonough:

95 Philosophically, everyone should support the Downtown. In addition, it says that we're all behind the

96 Downtown to see that it sustains the renewed vitality, provides flexibility to the Better Bennington

97 Corporation (BBC) to be partnered with the Town, we are the chosen Downtown Designated

98 Organization, and not fall short of seeing needs but not be able to meet them.

99 Mr. Carroll: How do the businesses on Northside Drive benefit from this? Mr. McDonough: The BBC

100 Mission Statement gives us the opportunity of having the significance of having a downtown core that is

101 successful. "Northside Drive doesn't need the help that a downtown requires." Ms. Jenkins: If people

102 come to Town because of a beautiful downtown and the Monument, etc., they will potentially stay, eat,

103 etc. outside of the Downtown and "explore the whole town".

- 104 Mr. Carroll: Has not heard complaints from the Downtown merchants about the additional ~\$400 in
- taxes, so why change it? Mr. Peterson: The vitality in the Downtown is good for the whole town and we
- need that vitality to continue. He has recently worked in a town that had no downtown and Bennington
- 107 was headed for that, too.
- 108 Mr. Keane: This is an opportunity for the Town to support the turnaround in the Downtown, as well as,
- the turnaround in the whole Town. He encouraged the Town to see if a DID tax is best practice in
- 110 communities around the country.
- 111 Mr. Lee-Clark: Has requested the BBC Bylaws to see what their "technical, legal relationship" is with the
- DID and what is their relationship to the Town Charter. He would like to see some legal opinion that
- says that the Town can just remove the DID tax and put it onto the whole Town. Mr. Hurd: Did not seek
- a legal opinion, however, we simply are deciding how we can best fund the activities of the contractor
- that we're using in the Downtown. The Charter doesn't need to change, it would just be that the DID tax
- 116 is \$0.00.
- 117 Mr. Lee-Clark: The BBC will be funded, it's just a matter of who will be paying for it. To see a vote to

118 have it remain as the DID tax as a "kick in the teeth to the Downtown is a silly argument and one which I

119 will not accept."

120 Mr. McDonough: Will send the BBC Bylaws to the Select Board.

- 121 Mr. McDonough: The Charter allows the Select Board to develop a DID and impose a tax for the purpose
- of funding the Downtown which was established 30 years ago. "We've outgrown that", so rather than
- expanding the taxing district, we should look at "town wide support and responsibility".
- 124 Ms. Perrin: This is how we're going to fund the BBC with the details of that to be further discussed at
- 125 budget time. Now we're voting on everyone supporting Downtown.
- 126 Mr. Carroll: Appealed to Mr. Spivak to get this out to the public for their comments on it.
- Ms. Conner: Agrees with the philosophical aspect and "we all benefit from our Downtown so we should all support it."
- Ms. Conner: What are the upsides/downsides to the BBC if the funding source changed? Mr.
- 130 McDonough: For 30 years, the BBC has been able to maintain its role of devising ways that the
- 131 Downtown can advance. "There is no autonomy to that because we are in partnership with the Town."
- 132 The requirements to retain the Designated Downtown status is in the State statute. The change in
- funding would make the BBC "more in concert with the Town as to how much more can we do, how
- 134 much more should we do?"
- 135 Mr. Haley: What was the thinking at the time 30 years ago? Mr. Hurd: We needed to find a source to
- fund downtown programs that were specific to the Downtown, which were, at the time, Bennington in
- Bloom, the cast iron furnishings, and the trash barrels. Bennington in Bloom is now also on Northside
- 138 Drive and all of the Downtown furnishings are now part of the General Fund tax. "We're not where we
- 139 were 30 years ago."

140 Mr. Haley: Is having trouble with the timing because "we're already asking people to increase their

141 water bills to build a reserve and we're still in the midst of a pandemic where our economy is literally

142 adjusting before our eyes."

Edie Sawitsky: Everyone benefits from a vital downtown because that will draw people to town and increase property values. It is a "win-win" for the downtown and the entire community.

145 Mr. Spivak: Was a business owner for several years before recently becoming the Communications

146 Coordinator for the Town. Having a downtown organization enables the Town to receive much funding 147 from State and Federal sources. It was frustrating to own a business that was just outside of the District 148 and clarified that it is a fraction of 1¢/\$100 to all of the taxpayers in the Town.

- 162 Mr. Monks and David Forde, Centerline Communications, reported the following on the AT&T 163 Pole Lease:
- 164 > The Pole Lease is for a cellular attachment to a utility pole type structure in the Pleasant Street 165 area parking lot behind Madison's Brewery.
- The property is owned by the Town, the term is for 10 years, and the rent is \$300/month with a
 2% annual escalation.
- 168 > The lease has been reviewed by Town Counsel and deemed appropriate for the Town.

PROCLAMATION PURPLE HEART COMMUNITY

WHEREAS, the people of Bennington, Vermont have great admiration and the utmost gratitude for all the citizens of this community who have selflessly served in the Armed Forces which has been vital in maintaining the freedom and the way of life enjoyed by all; and

WHEREAS, citizens of this community have been killed in action while serving in the Armed Forces and have been posthumously awarded the Purple Heart for their ultimate sacrifice; and

WHEREAS, citizens of this community have been awarded the Purple Heart for being wounded by the enemy while engaged in combat; and

WHEREAS, the Purple Heart is the oldest American military decoration. It was created as The Badge of Military Merit, made of purple cloth in the shape of a heart with the word "Merit" sewn upon it, on August 7, 1782 in Newburgh, New York by General George Washington, then reestablished as the Purple Heart on February 22, 1932 by General Douglas MacArthur; and

WHEREAS, the heritage it represents is sacred to all who recognize the sacrifice made to wear the Purple Heart; and

WHEREAS, August 7th is nationally recognized as Purple Heart Day.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT PROCLAIMED, that we, the Bennington Select Board, hereby recognize August 7th of a given year as Purple Heart Day in Bennington and urge our citizens and organizations to display the American Flag as well as other public expressions of recognition and appreciation of our Purple Heart recipients. We further proclaim Bennington, Vermont a Purple Heart Community, honoring the service and sacrifice of those from our community who were awarded the Purple Heart while serving in our Nation's wars.

Re:	Transportation Alternatives (TA) Grant Application for Ninja Path
Date:	November 2, 2021

This memo is to request the Select Board's approval of a \$200,000 grant application to the VTrans Transportation Alternatives Grant Program for additional funds for the Ninja Path Project. The funds would allow completion of Phase 1 – the essential link that in combination with Morse Road will allow the public to safely walk and bicycle between North Bennington/Bennington College and Bennington. Phase 1 includes all project elements that cannot be done by the Town Highway Department.

Project Background

The Ninja Path combined with the Rail Trail will provide a safe walking and cycling route between Bennington College/North Bennington and downtown Bennington.

In 2016, the Town Highway Department built the first section of the Ninja Path between the Bennington College entrance and Hannaford Plaza.

In 2017, an interim dirt path was cleared from Hannaford Plaza to Morse Road. A temporary timber bridge was constructed across the Furnace Brook. The timber bridge is no longer usable.

In 2016 the project was awarded a \$1.1 million VTrans Bike/Pedestrian Grant in for design and permitting of a paved path from Hannaford Plaza to Harmon Rd., where it will connect to the existing path behind Walmart to Hicks Ave. Significant progress has been made on the project including successful negotiation with the Agency of Natural Resources to allow the path along the Walloomsac and Furnace Brook river corridors, design through Final Plans, and most importantly, acquiring the 11 easements needed for the project.

Increased Project Cost

The total project cost has risen due to increases in material prices and because of design modifications made to satisfy wetland, river corridor, and stormwater regulators. The total estimated project cost is now \$1.94 million.

Phased Project

To break the project into smaller sections that have a realistic chance of grant funding the plan is to build the project in three phases:

• Phase 1: Furnace Brook Bridge, Hannaford Bridge and paved path connection to Morse Rd., and design and permitting of entire path (all phases).

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- Phase 2: Construction of a path between Hannaford Plaza and Furnace Brook
- Phase 3: Construction of a path between Furnace Brook and Harmon Rd.

Recreation:

a. YMCA program planning:

The Bennington Community Center (Rec Center) has a busy pool schedule with lap swimming, water exercise classes, swimming classes and family swim. New exercise equipment will be coming soon to the weight room, and a strength and conditioning room has opened up in the basement. The Y is also running afterschool programs at the Village School in North Bennington and at the Bennington Sports Center (old Catamount School), as well as a "tumbling tots" playground at BSC. At Benn High, there are also 8 popular exercise classes and a walking group meeting every week. The pool, adult fitness, and youth program schedules are updated regularly on the Bennington Recreation center Facebook page.

b. Bennington Outdoor Recreation Collaborative:

The Town of Bennington received a \$10,000 grant from the Vermont Community Foundation to support outdoor recreation with wayfinding signs, photography, graphic design, and print media. Jonah Spivak redesigned the Town's recreation page to highlight more outdoor recreation opportunities and partners. I hired a local photographer to take photos of outdoor recreation sites and people enjoying them during the fall. I'm finalizing the outdoor recreation wayfinding signs with GVH studio.

c. Appalachian Trail Community designation:

The Appalachian Trail Conservancy officially designated Bennington as an Appalachian Trail Community, which puts Bennington on the map for their marketing and promotion to AT hikers. I am on the advisory committee for the Bennington AT Community, and we are working on educational events for Bennington residents, a hiker appreciation day for AT hikers, as well as trail improvements and wayfinding. MAUHS teacher Dylan Wajda has started a Mountain Club outing club for teens and we're planning some activities on the AT this coming spring. The next AT Community meeting will be held via Zoom on November 17 at 6 pm.

e. Recreational Facilities and Animating Infrastructure Grant:

The Town of Bennington received a Recreation Facilities grant from the State of Vermont to add fencing around the green space next to the Morgan Springs water facility at Memorial Park (Rec Center). This is a sizable green space that will be used for youth programming, outdoor exercise classes, and community picnics. The new fencing is installed at the green space and allowed the Y to run a popular youth sports program this fall. Another Animating Infrastructure grant will support art installations along the fence, such as creative benches and gates, working with local artists and designers through the Vermont Arts Exchange. We held a community workshop, "Reimagining the Rec Center Green" and common themes were creating a play zone for kids, more landscaping, a shade structure and incorporating local history and photos into the artwork that is created. the artist recruitment and planning for the art installations. We recruited a local landscape designer to help with landscape planting next spring.

f. Trolley line path:

I am on the advisory committee for the Trolley Line path scoping study that is led by Cat Bryars and Mark Anders of BCRC. This study examines the feasibility of converting the abandoned electric trolley car bed in Southwestern Vermont into a 14-mile shared-use path for pedestrians and cyclists traveling between Bennington and Pownal, VT and Williamstown, MA.

Economic Development Committee:

I'm part of the town committee that has formed to discuss economic development priorities and work with consultants White and Burke.

Vermont Begins Here:

Eight Oh Two Marketing is continuing the digital marketing campaign to promote Bennington. We are running Facebook ads to promote fall and winter travel to Bennington. VBH blog posts for November promoted unique lodging in Bennington.

Local Food Security:

I continue to meet with the Bennington Mellon Advisory (food security) group, as well as the planning group for the Southern Vermont Regional Food Network, which promotes a stronger regional network for sustainable local agriculture.

The downtown market advisory group developed out of the SVRFN and is focused on a downtown market that supports local farms and food producers and supplies fresh produce to downtown Bennington. This advisory group is forming a nonprofit called the Four Corners Community Market and developing a business plan and assessing available downtown space for the food market.

Community Development Block Grants:

The Berkshire Family YMCA, UCS Head Start, and Sunrise Family Resource Center received VCDP grants to support Covid-19 related expenses and HVAC upgrades. The Town also received a VCDP grant for \$500,000 to support the Shire Housing Bennington Family Housing project at 300 Pleasant Street. I am working on paperwork required for each grant agreement and subgrant agreement along with progress reports. Shires Housing submitted a VCDP application for two recovery housing projects and Hale Resources received additional funding for the affordable housing development at 219 Pleasant Street. 219 Pleasant Street will be completed soon and Hale Resources will be planning an open house.

Historic Preservation Grants:

I am working with GVH Studio on a history/recreation/arts and culture panels for a new downtown kiosk funded with an historic preservation (CLG program) grant. The kiosk will be completed and installed by the end of November. I also submitted another historic preservation grant in partnership with Bennington College to put the college campus on the National Register of Historic Places, and we were awarded this \$5,000 grant.

Franklin Lane Improvement Project:

Dan and I have been meeting with MSK Engineering and BCRC to discuss final improvements to Franklin Lane. Scheduling contractors during the busy summer season has been a challenge and it looks like the work will need to start next spring. This project is funded with a \$50,000 Downtown Transportation Fund grant.

Municipal Planning Grant:

Bennington received a VT Department of Housing and Community Development Municipal Planning Grant to develop a re-use plan for the recently closed Energizer battery factory. The MPG award of \$22,000 will be combined with a \$20,000 state Brownfields grant to also do an environmental assessment of the property. BCRC helped the Town to manage the project, and Camoin Associates, Inc. was chosen to complete the reuse study and housing study. The study can be found on the town's website under Special Reports and Documents.

BBC Executive Director Hiring Committee:

I participated as a member of the hiring committee for the Better Bennington Corporation's Executive Director position. The BBC hired Jenny Dewar as their new Executive Director.

Tourism and Marketing Grant:

I submitted a grant application for a state marketing grant for \$20,000 that would support entertainment and marketing for downtown summer events, starting with Mayfest, followed by a weekly music series at the splash pad stage, and ending with a Harvestfest.

In the past month, I have met with the Berkshire Family YMCA management team, the owner of Benn High LLC, Eight Oh Two Marketing, Historic Preservation Commission, Four Corners Community Market, Town Economic Development committee, Better Bennington Corporation, Shires Housing, Vermont Arts Exchange, BCRC, Meals on Wheels, Bennington Museum, Vermont League of Cities and Towns, SVSU, Alliance for Community Transformations, and AT Community Committee.
