32 Letter of Support to the Ethiopian Community Development Council (ECDC) for the 33 Town of Bennington to become a resettlement affiliate partner and begin a Reception and 34 Placement program to resettle refugees in Bennington was sent to the Bureau of Population, Refugees, and Migration, U.S. Department of State in Washington, D.C.. ECDC is one of nine 35 36 resettlement agencies in the country. There are currently approximately 30 refugees in the 37 Bennington area which will hopefully increase to 90 individuals by 2025. Also by 2025, 38 Rutland is likely to see 150, Brattleboro 120, and Colchester 350. Families are participating in 39 Town recreational opportunities including summer camps, swimming, and gardening, as well as, public transportation, educational support for children and adults, and connections to 40 41 employment.

42 The motion carried unanimously.

- 2. The topic should not be related to an agenda item. If a member of the public wants tocomment on an agenda item they can do so during the discussion of that item.
- 51 3. Comments should be 3 minutes or less.
- 52 4. You are required to state your real name and town of residence.
- 53 5. Sharing comments, announcements and concerns are encouraged rather than asking
- questions. Public Comment is not a time for discussion. If you have specific questions it is best
- to call the Town Manager to get a full explanation and accurate information.
- 56 6. If the topic requires much discussion the item will be considered as an agenda item at a
- 57 future meeting.

- 59 _____
- 60 Jamie Carey, Sales Manager, Village Garage Distillery: Explained the history of the Village
- 61 Garage Distillery that began in 2018. They are a distillery that serves food and produces
- 62 bourbon, whiskey, and vodka with grains and food that are grown locally. Then the byproducts
- of the distillery go back to the farms to feed the cattle that furnish the meat on the menu to

- 64 complete the circle. There is a 13-seat bar, 60-seat indoor dining, and 50-seat outdoor dining.
- All spirits can be purchased at the distillery with the bourbon and whiskey are available in liquor 65
- stores. Our website is www.villagegarage.com, Instagram is villagegaragedistillery, and our 66
- 67 hours are Thursday, Friday, Saturday 5:00pm-9:00pm and Sunday noon-4:00pm.
- 68 Nancy White: There has been a property on Spring Street that has been an "eye sore" with
- garbage for 5 years. Ms. Jenkins: Town staff will look into it. Mr. Monks: Added that we're 69
- 70 under active litigation with that project and can't enter the property until we get a court order.
- 71 Clark Adams: The ACLU and NAACP are making accusations that our police behavior is
- 72 mistreating the public but he hasn't seen any evidence of that. Do we have documentation that
- our police have been mistreating, racist, or bigoted toward our citizens? Ms. Jenkins: I have 73
- had requests for all of my correspondence with the legislature and every town has a history. 74
- 75 She referred Mr. Adams to the IACP Report and the materials on the Town's webpage on
- 76 community policing. Mr. Adams added that it was said that the Task Force he served on was
- trying to form an investigative body and that is false. He would like to see a more assertive 77
- response in defense of the people of Bennington who are trying to do good. *Ms. Conner:* 78
- 79 Encouraged Mr. Adams to write a Letter to the Editor in response to the article. She and Mr.
- 80 Lee-Clark noted the Board's frustration on this issue.
- Kelly Carroll: Reminded everyone that this Saturday is the Walloomsac River Walk now known 81
- as the Walloomsac Downtown River Walk that will start in People's Park, over Park Street, 82
- down Pleasant, over School, down Main, and over North Street making a loop and recognizing 83
- 84 some businesses. Everyone is welcome.

85 **5. SKATE PARK UPDATE**

86

Geoff Metcalfe, with Keefe & Wesner Architects, PC, did the following presentation:

- 87 Keefe & Wesner Architects, MSK Engineers, and the Skate Park Committee have been working on the Skate Park Project as volunteers so far. 88
- The proposed Skate Park location is to be on the south end of the existing Town parking 89 90 lot on the corners of River Street and Depot Street adjacent to the existing Bennington Station structure. 91
- 92 We can put the majority of our plan in this area without affecting parking and also utilize the flood plain that has limited usefulness. 93
- The concept allocates approximately 13,000 square feet of grassy landscape plus 2,000 94 95 square feet of existing parking lot.
- 96 The majority of the area would be concrete with skating features scattered in a 97 "flowing" style conducive to modern skating styles of continuous lines.
- We would be incorporating some greenspace and trees to soften the landscape, 98 relocate a portion of the existing bike path, and find ways to blend the two. 99

- We also have a 50'x60' building to house an indoor skating bowl for year round skating, a small office, bathroom, and a retail space.
 The insulated and heated building would be metal framed with a metal roof and six
- 103 garage doors that can open in the warmer months to become part of the Park.
- The Skate Park Committee would like at least one staff person to be full time to manage
 the building activities.
- We still need to figure out the hours of operation, do we charge for use or is it open to
 the public, do we charge membership fees, charging for training/coaching the kids, and
 fees for competitions, etc. are all topics of discussion.
- Estimated cost is \$50-\$55/square foot for the Park, itself, or \$750,000, and the building at \$500,000 for a total estimated cost of \$1.25M.
- Some funds have been allocated by the Town and we will be consulting with a
 fundraising professional.
- We are talking with a couple of Skate Park Designers and are asking ~\$5,000 to hire one
 of them to produce a final design in color for review by the Board and to use as
 fundraising material going forward.
- 116 Board questions/comments answered by Mr. Metcalfe:
- 117 Mr. Carroll: You mentioned charging membership fees? *The outdoor Park would be open to the*
- 118 public but that was a conceptual discussion on how to fund a staff person and indoor skating
- 119 *during the winter.* This will be owned by the Town and any membership fees will be set by the
- 120 Select Board.
- 121 Ms. Conner: Is the outdoor Park open all the time or are there hours of operation? *It would be*
- 122 open all the time and there have been discussions on whether to light it or just utilize the
- existing pathway lights. We do want it available throughout the day but don't want to
- 124 *necessarily promote skating at 2:00am.*
- 125 Ms. Conner: Is it fenced off? *Technically it isn't fenced off, however, we will do something to* 126 *maximize safety.*
- 127 Ms. Conner: Will there be insurance on the Park? *Mr. Hurd: If it's operated by the Town there* 128 *will be Liability Insurance.*
- 129 Ms. Jenkins: Is this an all or nothing or is it phased depending on how much money is raised? *It* 130 *can be designed in such a way to phase it if needed.*
- 131 Ms. Jenkins: How will you decide who will be paid the \$5,000 for the design? *It would come*
- down to price and so far much has been donated from friends. As we go forward, there would
- 133 *be a bidding process for the actual build.*

- 134 Mr. Lee-Clark: This is a public/private partnership so does the Town have any requirements?
- Mr. Hurd: The State requires that it must be open to the public and we don't know if there are 135
- 136 any restrictions about the private portion of it.
- 137 Mr. Lee-Clark: Do we require an RFP for the \$5,000? Mr. Monks: We could enforce the Town's
- policy of getting 3 bids at this point or the Board could recognize the work that has already been 138
- done and decide to give the \$5,000 to them to continue on with the project to get the final plan. 139
- 140 Ms. Perrin: Will the design be up to competitive standards? Yes, we want something that will be 141 conducive to a competition site.
- Mr. Hurd: Would like to see the trees donated by NSK to be saved. Will do. 142

143 Bruce Lee-Clark moved and Sarah Perrin seconded for the Select Board to allocate up

to \$5,000 of ARPA Funding to Keefe & Wesner Architects for the Skate Park design work and 144

MANAGER'S REPORT June 27, 2022

ACTION

INFORMATIONAL

<u>Willow Park playgrounds</u> The playgrounds' full design will be unveiled in an event scheduled in July just before the old playground structures are removed. Stay tuned.

<u>Morgan Spring</u> The new delivery location is now ready for use. Fencing and landscaping are nearly completed. Our first truck came in Wednesday June 22. Representatives will be in Town on Thursday June 23 to view the site.

<u>Former CTC 254 Benmont Avenue</u> This burned-out structure remains in limbo for the present time. We are investigating our options for demolition. We have an estimate of \$120,000 to demolish and clean the site. It looks like court action will be required. The former principal in the corporation has been unresponsive.

<u>WWTF BOD sampling</u> Over the last 6 – 12 months, our staff at the WWTF have been concerned about the Biochemical Oxygen Demand (BOD) in our influent and its impact on our effluent. Our current permit limits for the effluent (30 mg/l) have not been violated, but some of the influent loading has been creeping up. The average for the last 6 months was 275 mg/l. Our effluent levels hit a high in May of 23 mg/l. BOD is impacted by organics in the wastewater. High BOD level of discharge from certain businesses is our focus. We will be contacting businesses to sample discharges to see if any of our businesses are currently discharging an extremely high BOD. Those we will sample include dairy manufacturers, distilleries, and breweries. There may be others. Pre-treatment of the waste may be required. We will keep you informed.

Summer Solstice

In true Vermont fashion, we are catapulted from spring to full blown summer in just a few weeks. For the town, it means all kinds of maintenance work and the start of new major projects from our Department of Public Works.

Willow Park Playgrounds:

A presentation of the final design of the new Willow Park playgrounds scheduled for May 19th was cancelled due to illness. The presentation will be rescheduled to correspond with the start of site work and will be a ground breaking event as well. The projet currently remains on track for a late July start. Once begun, the construction will take 3-4 weeks.

FBI/LEEDA Training:

I spend a week in Florida attending an FBI Law Enforcement Executive Development Association (LEEDA) training on Media Relations and Crisis Communications. The weeklong training was immersive, extensive, and extremely valuable. I learned many new skills that will be very useful to me in this position and I've already begun applying what I've learned to my day to day work. I attended the training with our police Chief Paul Doucette and Lt. Cam Grande which was a great opportunity for us to work together. One thing I learned was how incredibly busy our Chief and Lt. are with their duties even when far off in another state. After training, our day was not done; we continued our work into the evenings remotely to stay on top of work.

Citizen Outreach:

Due to being away for a week, I had less citizen outreach than normal, with just six this month. There were no public record requests to my office.

Community Outreach

Another informational meeting was held at the Senior Center. The presentation to the seniors was part of our ongoing effort to include folks and keep them informed as we proceed with the redevelopment of the BenHi building on East Main Street. A survey is being developed for the seniors to solicit additional ideas and feedback.

A.T. Community and Business Outreach

Planning continues for the July 30 "Bennington Trailfest" to be held at the Bennington Community Center (Rec Center) from noon to 3 pm. There will be live music, free food, activities, and informational tables. Free to the public. Several businesses have joined as A.T. Community Business supporters who will be recognized during the event. The BBC is also a supporter of this effort. A trivia contest with prizes, lawn games, and hiker related skill workshops will also be included.

250th Anniversary Planning:

A number of 250th planning efforts happened this past month, notably a first meeting on Regional collaboration at the Bennington Museum with state representatives from VT, NY, MA, and CT in attendance along with representatives from Fort Ticonderoga. A final anniversary event for Remember Baker was a dramatization of the Rescue and Capture of Baker that was held on June 18th at 6:00 pm in East Arlington at the Federated Church. The event was well attended and very successful.

Work continues on creating a 250th committee for Bennington and the surrounding region to allow for the start of planning for specific events and to explore what "big ideas" might be possible for 2025-2027 and to interface with the statewide 250th commission as they begin outreach to the various parts of the state for input. A first meeting of that committee will be held the end of June. I was joined by Phil Holland for a presentation to the Social Studies department at MAUHS which sparked many ideas for how we can

use the 250th anniversary as a vehicle to engage and inspire youth in our schools and to assist teachers with materials that they can use to take advantage of place-based learning. The enthusiasm of our teachers for our local history and their dedication to education is truly inspiring!

Website Update:

A new design and navigational system for a unified town website is nearing completion and awaiting final review. Once finalized, the content from the existing sites will be moved to the new site for beta testing. The police department website will be a part of the unified site, but will continue to have it's own URL

(web address) and identity which has been identified as a best practice for police department websites. New photography has been taken for the site as well. We are on track for a launch of the new site in late August or September.

Organizational Collaboration:
