Mr. Alan Rose, of Rose Paving Company, is donating \$5,800 to the Burr Ridge Police Department for the purpose of purchasing four Taser electronic control devices and one customer lettering package for the new SUV squad (see attached press release).

7. RESOLUTIONS

A. Oppose Reduction of State Collected Revenues due Municipalities

Enclosed please find a Resolution prepared by the Illinois Municipal League opposing the reduction of State collected revenues due municipalities. The very real possibility that the State of Illinois will take some, if not all, of the Village's Local Government Distributive Fund revenues to help balance its own budget will have a catastrophic effect on the Village's budget. The Village FY 11-12 Budget includes \$844,720 in LGDF revenues, which represents 10.8% of the total General Fund revenue budget. Mayor Grasso will update the Board on Monday evening regarding his efforts (see attached letter that was sent to legislators on March 31) and the efforts of both the DuPage Mayors and Managers Conference and the Illinois Municipal League to dissuade Illinois lawmakers from using our LGDF revenues to balance the State's budget.

Staff also recommends launching a public information campaign, urging residents to contact their state legislators in opposition to these proposals. Attached please find PowerPoint slides that will be shown during the Board Meeting, informing residents of what's at stake and how to get involved. Staff has also prepared the attached draft letter that will be sent to our state legislators with a copy of the Resolution, a draft press release and social media announcement that will be sent following

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adoption of the Resolution, a draft of the web pages that will be available for residents to learn more, a flyer that will be made available on the Village's website and at Village facilities, a draft letter for residents to use when contacting their legislators, and an informational packet prepared by the Illinois Municipal League.

<u>It is my recommendation</u>: that the Resolution opposing reduction of State collected revenues due municipalities be adopted and that the Resolution, along with a cover letter, be sent to all of our State Senators and Representatives.

8. CONSIDERATIONS

A. Plan Commission Recommendation – Special Use (201 Bridewell Dr.)

Please find attached a letter from the Plan Commission recommending approval of a request by Design Collaborative on behalf of Eddie Merlot's Restaurant for special use approval to permit a restaurant with limited live entertainment, sales of alcoholic beverages and with extended hours of operation in an existing building and with additions to the existing building. The property is located at 201 Bridewell Drive and is the former Max & Erma's Restaurant.

This being an established restaurant location and building, the Plan Commission did not have any problems with the re-use of the property for another restaurant. The petitioner indicated that the restaurant would only be open for dinner, that live entertainment would be limited to small jazz, blues, or soft rock musicians, and that the restaurant would close at 10 pm during the week and 11 pm on weekends. The Plan Commission encouraged the petitioner to consider lunch time hours and later closing times and recommended the special use with later hours than the petitioner currently intends.

The only concern from the Plan Commission was the proposed resurfacing of the building with stucco. The Plan Commission prefers that the petitioner keep the existing brick where possible and that the addition to the building also be primarily brick, pre-cast stone, or natural stone. As a result, the Plan Commission recommends a special use condition that states that "the building elevations shall be revised to minimize the use of stucco and to minimize the amount of the existing brick that is covered. Primary façade building materials shall be brick, pre-cast stone, or natural stone."

Subsequent to the Plan Commission meeting, the petitioner contacted staff and said they would not have a problem complying with the Plan Commission recommendation. They are preparing a plan which will be available on Monday before the Board meeting. Staff will review the plan once received and be prepared to comment on the plan on Monday.

<u>It is my recommendation</u>: that if the petitioner is able to satisfy the

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recommended conditions relative to the building façade, that the Board directs staff to prepare an Ordinance granting the special use approvals as recommended by the Plan Commission.

B. Contract for 2011 Road Program

The Engineering Division of the Public Works Department has prepared the contract documents and solicited bids for the 2011 Roadway Resurfacing Contract in accordance with IDOT guidelines for projects financed in part with Motor Fuel Tax (MFT) funds.

Scope of Improvements in 2011 Roadway Resurfacing Program

Streets to be resurfaced as part of this year's Road Program include:

- 87th Street between Wedgewood Drive and County Line Road
- 72nd Street between 71st Street and Wolf Road (including reconstruction of speed humps)
- Miscellaneous patching

Results of Road Program Bid Opening

Bids were opened publicly on April 29, 2011. Seven (7) contractors submitted bids for the work, with the following results:

Bituminous asphalt is a petroleum based material, so staff was concerned that the recent volatility of petroleum prices may contribute to rising costs of roadwork this year. Prices for hot-mix asphalt have increased, but not as much as had been anticipated (prices increased from \$62/ton in 2010 to \$72/ton in 2011, a 16% increase). The lowest responsive and responsible bidder is Chicagoland Paving Company, of Lake Zurich, with a bid of \$199,900. The budget for the resurfacing program is \$282K, so the low bid is well under budget. Due to the advancement of the letting schedule and continued competitiveness in the construction industry, staff is pleased that the Village has been presented with favorable pricing again this year.

The 2011 Resurfacing Program has been significantly reduced from previous years, in an effort to acknowledge budgetary limitations, and to provide adequate funds for the local match for the 91st Street LAPP project

and the Madison/Joliet Traffic Signal STP project, both of which are grant-funded projects. The Road Program itself has historically been funded by Motor Fuel Tax (MFT) revenue from the state, and a contribution from the General Fund. This year, the contribution from the general fund has been eliminated in order to assist with balancing the budget.

MFT revenue for this year will be \$332K, which includes \$282K which had been programmed for resurfacing work. Since the low bid is \$199K for the resurfacing project, the Village is presented with the opportunity to perform additional work (patching) at the contract unit prices, or to complete the contract work as bid, and carry over unexpended MFT monies to next fiscal year. Due to the fact that the proposed roadwork has been significantly reduced this year, and in consideration of the need for additional patching throughout town (83rd Street, Madison Street), the Engineering Division recommends taking advantage of the favorable pricing to perform additional resurfacing and preventative maintenance (patching) during this construction season. The Engineering Division is preparing a summary of recommended supplemental work, which will be presented to the Street Policy Committee and Village Board at a later date for consideration.

Contractor Reputability and Completeness of Bid Documents

No errors or omissions were identified in the review of the two (2) lowest responsive and responsible bids. The low-bid contractor, Chicagoland Paving has not worked in Burr Ridge in recent years, but Engineering staff has worked with Chicagoland at other agencies and performance has been acceptable. All IDOT certifications are in order and properly documented for this contractor.

The Engineering Division finds that the lowest responsive and responsible bidder has submitted a complete proposal, that the contractor is reputable and in good standing, and that the Village has received competitive pricing for the 2011 Roadway Resurfacing Program.

It is my recommendation: that the contract for the 2011 Roadway Resurfacing portion of the 2011 Road Program be awarded to Chicagoland Paving Company, of Lake Zurich, in the amount of \$199,900.

C. Video Tape Plan Commission Meetings

\$8,625 has been added to the FY 11-12 Budget to broadcast our Plan Commission meetings on our cable TV channel. The meetings would be shown live and taped to be shown several times during the week. It would also be placed on our website. The work would be done by our current contractor, Steve Stroud, of SOS Media.

Board direction is requested.

E. Plan Commission Recommendation – Special Use (51 Shore Drive)

Please find attached a letter from the Plan Commission recommending approval of a request by George Arnold on behalf of Personalization Mall for special use approval to provide for a fence enclosing an outdoor patio. The property is located at 51 Shore Drive. The existing business manufactures and distributes personalized gifts.

All fences (except dumpster enclosures next to a building) in non-residential districts are subject to special use approval. The subject fence encloses an outdoor patio area intended as a lounge for employees. The Plan Commission's only concerns are related to the maintenance of the fence, enclosure of the patio, and security. The recommended conditions address these concerns and the petitioner agreed with the conditions.

<u>It is my recommendation</u>: that the Board directs staff to prepare an Ordinance granting special use approval as recommended by the Plan Commission.

F. Change Order #12 to Police Facility Contract – Harbour Contractors

Attached please find a Change Order from Harbour Contractors that represents a settlement to their original Change Order #2 relating to undercutting that occurred prior to the construction of the foundation wall. The change order is in the amount of a negotiated figure of \$13,500. (The original request was for \$27,864.)

It is our recommendation: that Change Order #12 be approved

G. Increase in Attorney's Fees - Klein, Thorpe and Jenkins

Attached please find a letter from Village Attorney Terry Barnicle requesting an increase in his attorney's fees as follows:

H. Renew Contract for Village Prosecutor

Enclosed is the proposed legal contract for prosecution services for Village Prosecutor Linda Pieczynski. Ms. Pieczynski has requested a \$5.00 increase in both her per-court-session rate from \$180 to \$185 and her hourly rate from \$130 to \$135. Ms. Pieczynski has not raised her fees to the Village since 2008.

It is our recommendation: that the contract between the Village and Linda Pieczynski for prosecution services for the period of June 1, 2011, through May 31, 2012, be approved.

I. FMLA Leave of Absence – Officer Kevin Glinski

Attached please find a letter from Officer Kevin Glinski requesting an unpaid leave of absence for up to 12 weeks under the Family and Medical Leave Act. Officer Glinski is requesting a leave of absence commencing May 12, 2011, due to the employee's serious medical issue, which qualifies under the FMLA regulations for a leave.

<u>It is our recommendation:</u> that the request for up to 12 weeks of unpaid leave of absence under the Family and Medical Leave Act for Police Officer Kevin Glinski be approved.

J. Request for Hotel/Motel Tax Funds – Flagg Creek Heritage Society

Enclosed is a letter from Alice Latham, President of the Flagg Creek Heritage Society, requesting a contribution toward the continued operation of its museum. \$2,500 has been placed in the Hotel/Motel Tax Fund Budget for this purpose.

It is our recommendation: that the request from the Flagg Creek Heritage Society for a contribution toward its continued operation of its museum in the amount of \$2,500 from the Hotel/Motel Tax Fund be approved.

ORDINANCE AMENDING THE MUNICIPAL CODE OF THE VILLAGE OF BURR RIDGE BY ADDING A NEW CHAPTER 39 THERETO ENTITLED "PROPERTY MAINTENANCE" Community Development Director Doug Pollock explained the Ordinances indicated as agenda items 6A, 6B, and 6C are all related and will be discussed together.

Mr. Pollock stated the purpose of the proposed amendments is related to the Burr Ridge Property Maintenance Code and the regulations for the maintenance of grass and weeds.

Mr. Pollock explained that the property maintenance regulations are currently in the Building Ordinance and that the Ordinances would collectively remove the regulations from the Building Code and transfers it to the Municipal Code, where it logically belongs.

Mr. Pollock added that in addition, two substantive changes would be added to the Property Maintenance Code which includes specification of the following:

- a limit of 10 inches for the height of weeds and grass prior to the Village initiating the mowing of a property;
- a flat fee of \$50 to be charged when the Village has to mow a property, rather than the current practice of charging 10% of the mowing cost.

Trustee Sodikoff clarified that the \$50 mowing fee is in addition to the fee charged to the Village by the landscape contractor for mowing.

Trustee Allen inquired as to how weed violations are reported and in response, Mr. Pollock stated that residents frequently report violators and additionally, a list is maintained of past violators as well as vacant properties and the properties on that list are monitored more frequently.

<u>Motion</u> was made by Trustee Allen and seconded by Trustee Sodikoff to approve the Ordinance amending the Municipal Code of the Village of Burr Ridge by adding a new Chapter 39 thereto entitled "Property Maintenance".

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING INTERGOVERNMENTAL AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE VILLAGE OF HINSDALE AND THE VILLAGE OF BURR RIDGE REGARDING THE CONSTRUCTION OF ADDITIONAL PLATFORM TENNIS COURTS Village

Administrator Steve Stricker stated that the Village of Hinsdale has approved construction of two new platform tennis courts at Kathryn Legge Park allowing for a total of six courts. Mr. Stricker explained that the agreement would memorialize the location of the new courts, landscaping to be provided, a storm water plan and restrictions on the hours of operation.

Mr. Stricker explained that the agreement restricts the hours of operation for the courts as follows:

- the lights must be turned off at 10:00 p.m. on courts 3 and 4 on Tuesday through Thursday;
- on courts 1, 3, and 4, the lights must be off at 10:00 p.m. on Friday through Monday;
- on any days when the lights are not turned off by 10:00 p.m., they must be turned off by 10:30 p.m.

Mr. Stricker added the terms of the agreement extend for five years and the parties agree to meet within 120 days prior to the agreement expiration to discuss its renewal.

Mr. Stricker stated King Bruwaert House and the surrounding neighbors, with the exception of one family, find the agreement acceptable.

Trustee Allen added it was his understanding that the Village of Hinsdale was having difficulty raising the money to fund the project. In response, Mr. Stricker stated some funds have been raised and pledges have been made for the additional amounts.

Trustee Sodikoff stated he feels the agreement is unacceptable and that the tennis courts do not belong where the Village of Hinsdale has placed them. It is his opinion that Hinsdale was

inconsiderate of the residents of Burr Ridge in doing so. Trustee Sodikoff would not vote in favor of the agreement if the surrounding neighbors were not accepting of it.

Trustee Paveza added that many share Trustee Sodikoff's opinion but the options are limited as to what can be done in regard to the courts.

Trustee Allen stated that he has been involved in the process for a year and is not in favor of the courts. He indicated he has talked with the neighboring family who is not in favor of the courts.

Trustee Sodikoff inquired if the neighbor was planning to seek legal action to prevent the construction of the additional courts. In response, Mr. Stricker stated he believed they were not and they had hoped the Village of Burr Ridge would do so. Mr. Stricker added that it is beneficial for the Village of Burr Ridge to have an agreement with the Village of Hinsdale that will require them to restrict hours, add landscaping, and address the storm water problems.

<u>Motion</u> was made by Trustee Allen and seconded by Trustee Grela to adopt the Resolution authorizing the approval of an intergovernmental agreement between the Village of Hinsdale and the Village of Burr Ridge regarding the construction of additional platform tennis courts.

Trustee Sodikoff inquired as to when the agreement would be effective and in response, Mr. Stricker stated it would be effective as soon as the Village of Hinsdale signs it. Mr. Stricker indicated the agreement would be presented at Hinsdale's next Board of Trustees Meeting.

RECOMMENDATION TO APPROVE A POLICY FOR THE IMPLEMENTATION AND UTILIZATION OF SOCIAL MEDIA SITES FOR THE VILLAGE OF BURR RIDGE

Village Administrator Steve Stricker explained that a policy has been prepared that governs social media use by the Village of Burr Ridge and identifies the content of social media postings. Mr. Stricker stated the policy is similar to the Village Spokesman policy that is already in place and the Mayor would approve any new content.

Mr. Stricker stated that the information placed on the social media sites would be items that were previously approved and would primarily be taken from the Village newsletter information.

<u>Motion</u> was made by Trustee Allen and seconded by Trustee Grela to approve the Policy for the Implementation and Utilization of Social Media Sites for the Village of Burr Ridge.

Trustee Grela stated that when the Agreement with the Village of Hinsdale for the platform tennis courts is effective, the Burr Ridge residents adjacent to the courts should be provided with information about how to report violations of the agreement.

Trustee Paveza announced that the State of Illinois Mobile Drivers Facility will be at the Village Hall on Tuesday, May 3rd from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. The Facility will provide renewal of driver's licenses and identification cards up to one year in advance, vision screening, and vehicle renewal stickers. No road tests will be conducted.

Trustee Paveza thanked Trustee Allen and Trustee DeClouette for their years of service on the Board.

Trustee Paveza announced that at the Board Meeting of May 9, 2011, Trustees will be sworn in for their new terms of service; Trustee Ruzak, Trustee Manieri, and Trustee Paveza.

Trustee Allen inquired if Burr Ridge provides for an emergency response system in the event of a tornado. In response, Public Works Director Paul May stated that a county-wide alert system is in place that is effective.

<u>AUDIENCE</u> Dolores Cizek, 6603 Natasha Court, Countryside commented on Hinsdale's lack of consideration for Burr Ridge residents in building the Platform Tennis Courts where they are located.

MINUTES ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE SPECIAL MEETING Tuesday, April 19, 2011 Cooper's Hawk Restaurant Burr Ridge Village Center

CALL TO ORDER

The meeting was called to order at 7:40 p.m. by Chairperson Bob Sodikoff

PRESENT

APPROVAL OF JANUARY 18, 2011 MEETING MINUTES

A **motion** was made by Zach Mottl to approve the minutes of January 18, 2011. The motion was **seconded** by John Manieri and **approved** by a vote of 5-0.

RECEIVE AND FILE DRAFT HOTEL MARKETING COMMITTEE MEETING MINUTES OF FEBRUARY 16, 2011

A **motion** was made by Zach Mottl to receive and file the draft minutes of the February 16, 2011 Hotel Marketing Committee meeting. The motion was **seconded** by John Manieri and **approved** by a vote of 5-0.

RECEIVE AND FILE MARCH 15, 2011 MEETING NOTES (NO QUORUM)

A **motion** was made by Zach Mottl to receive and file the meeting notes of the March 15, 2011 EDC meeting at which there was not quorum. The motion was **seconded** by John Manieri and **approved** by a vote of 5-0.

CONVERSATION WITH BUSINESS LEADERS

Jason Plutz, of Cooper's Hawk Restaurant, stated that he was representing Tim McEnery to update the Committee with what's happening with Cooper's Hawk. He stated that Tim

and his team have developed a great concept and that it has been extremely successful. He stated that the Wine Club is doing very well and is intertwined with the restaurant and everything that goes on in the organization. He stated that, in the Burr Ridge store, an outdoor patio was recently approved for construction and should be open sometime later this summer to provide a summertime atmosphere and more nighttime business. He stated that the patio should accommodate additional seating for 54.

In response to a question from Chairperson Sodikoff regarding other Cooper's Hawk restaurants throughout the Chicago area, Mr. Plutz stated that they currently have five restaurants in Chicago and are looking to open a restaurant in Indianapolis in November, in Brookfield, WI in June, in Naperville in April and in Arlington Heights in September.

In response to a question from Committee member Ed Claffy, Mr. Plutz stated that, although all are somewhat different in terms of the décor, they all will have the same excellent menu and wine choices.

In response to a question from Committee member Zach Mottl regarding the clientele for the Burr Ridge restaurant, Mr. Plutz stated that mostly the patrons are from Hinsdale and Burr Ridge.

Village Administrator Steve Stricker asked what Cooper's Hawk's position would be on adding additional restaurants to the Village Center. In response, Mr. Plutz stated that driving traffic is important and that additional restaurants would only help. However, he did indicate that additional restaurants probably would thin out nights during the week.

Committee member Josephine Goetz asked if Cooper's Hawk would ever consider opening a second restaurant in Burr Ridge, with a different concept. In response, Mr. Plutz said no and that Cooper's Hawk's mainstay is the traditional concept that they had developed.

In response to a question from Committee member Mike Donahue, Mr. Plutz stated that all of the current and future projects are fully financed and that Cooper's Hawk actually has financing for up to 20 restaurants.

In response to a question from Committee member Josephine Goetz regarding the menu, Mr. Plutz stated that they try to keep basic menu items and provide specials on a nightly basis. He also indicated that they try to change up their menu twice a year.

In response to a question from Committee member Mike Donahue regarding what he would like to see the Village do to improve sales for the restaurant, Mr. Plutz stated that he would like to see more visibility and signage, including billboards on the expressway, as well as simply promoting the downtown businesses.

Committee member John Manieri asked if Cooper's Hawk uses the Harris Bank parking lot for their valet service. In response, Mr. Plutz stated that they currently do not, but utilize the parking across the street, as well as the parking garage. Administrator Stricker indicated that the Village Center does have a relationship with Harris Bank and that, once

additional restaurants are open, the Center plans on taking over the valet service and will be using out lots such as the Harris Bank and TCF Bank parking lots.

There being no further discussion, Chairperson Sodikoff thanked Mr. Plutz for attending the meeting.

NEW DEVELOPMENT UPDATE

Administrator Stricker presented the Committee with the New Development Update, prepared by the Community Development Department. He indicated that a new restaurant called Eddie Merlot's would be taking over the former Max & Erma's site and they would be coming before the Plan Commission in May for approval.

Administrator Stricker stated that he heard that a new women's store called Soma may open in the Village Center and that the retail store was owned by the Chico's brand.

Administrator Stricker stated that the Loyola Medical facility is now open and seemed to be doing extremely well.

HOTEL MARKETING COMMITTEE UPDATE

The Administrator indicated that Boost Communication is now the Hotel Marketing Committee's new marketing firm, headed by Phil Yaeger. He indicated that he would present the Hotel Marketing Committee's FY 11-12 Marketing Plan at the next EDC meeting.

DISCUSSION REGARDING FUTURE AGENDA ITEMS

No discussion ensued.

DISCUSSION ON DEVELOPING A PLAN TO ASSIST IN THE BUILD-OUT OF THE VILLAGE CENTER AND THE PROMOTION OF DOWNTOWN BURR RIDGE BUSINESSES

Administrator Stricker explained that, on March 15, Mayor Grasso attended the Economic Development Committee meeting to request that the Committee develop a plan to foster the complete build-out of the Village Center and to promote the entire downtown area, focusing in on the right mix of restaurants, retail and entertainment uses. Administrator Stricker directed the Committee to review his memo of April 12, which included several ideas for generating discussion, including:

- Conducting a stakeholders meeting with the real estate people and bankers involved in the Village Center.
- Developing a "Shop Burr Ridge campaign" to be promoted on our web site and Cable TV access channel.

- Imposing a 1% place of eating tax and using 1/3rd of the revenues to promote Burr Ridge restaurants.
- Determining what, if any, incentives should be provided to attract and maintain key businesses.
- Adding questions to the bi-annual resident survey to gauge residents' use of downtown Burr Ridge and what types of businesses they would like to see.

Committee member Mike Donahue stated that he appreciated the Mayor's comments at the last meeting and the leadership that he exhibited. He stated that he would like to see the EDC get more "strategic" in promoting and attracting businesses to downtown Burr Ridge.

Committee member Josephine Goetz stated that she likes the concert series and wondered if Burr Ridge businesses could have booths to promote their businesses at the concerts. In response, Assistant to the Administrator Lisa Scheiner stated that the Village Green, where the concerts are held, is owned by the Village Center and that, in order to utilize their facility, the Village had to agree to a "no compete" clause, which means we cannot bring in businesses from outside the Village Center. However, Ms. Scheiner explained how the Events Planning Committee is trying to attract residents by making the events more family-friendly and providing food options.

In response to a question from Committee member Mike Donahue regarding events at the County Line Square Shopping Center, Ms. Scheiner stated that the 5-K Run would be centered out of the County Line Square this year and that she and the Events Planning Committee are working with County Line Square to develop a fall event. Committee member Josephine Goetz suggested a "dancing with the stars" motif. In response, Ms. Scheiner stated that this idea was already utilized with certain types of music.

Chairperson Sodikoff stated that he felt that the Economic Development Committee has been telling the Village Center that they need a mix of businesses and entertainment uses. In response, Administrator Stricker suggested that the EDC clearly define what they mean by "entertainment uses." In response, Committee member John Manieri suggested things such as a jazz club, piano bar, martini bar type concept, with a 2:00 a.m. license.

Committee member John Manieri stated that he did not believe it is the Village's position to provide incentives to businesses and that he felt that the Bank of America should be the one doing so.

Committee member Ed Claffy stated that the Village has a major resource in over 400 businesses in Burr Ridge and that somebody needs to inform these businesses of what the Village's downtown has to offer. He suggested that he would go into the offices throughout the Village of Burr Ridge and promote the downtown, as an "ambassador."

Committee member Zach Mottl stated that he felt that better signage was needed to attract people to the Village Center in downtown Burr Ridge and suggested a sign on I-55. In

response, Committee member John Manieri stated that he was opposed to the idea of a large sign on the expressway and felt that it would not do any good.

Committee member Josephine Goetz brought up the idea that Committee member Ron Santo had mentioned last year regarding a high end golf store or a high end men's barber shop.

Committee member John Manieri stated that the best thing the Village Center is currently doing is helping Bob Garber and the County Line Square Shopping Center stay fully occupied, due to the high rents they are charging in the Village Center. He stated that businesses that look at the Village Center eventually go to County Line Square.

Committee member Josephine Goetz suggested a children's playland be added to one of the store fronts.

In response to a question from Committee member John Manieri regarding whether the Village could mandate that the stores stay open certain hours, Assistant to the Administrator Lisa Scheiner stated that the Village could not and that only the Village Center has the ability to set hours. She stated that, in response to questions from the Village Center and businesses regarding starting the concerts earlier so that businesses would be open, the Events Planning Committee could not accommodate the request because it is very difficult for people, especially those with families, to get to the event any earlier than the time already established. In response, Committee member Ed Claffy suggested that the events start even later so that people can shop before the events begin.

Committee member Mike Donahue discussed the idea of providing incentives to attract certain businesses. In response, Chairperson Sodikoff stated that he felt that that was not the job of the Village and that government should not be subsidizing private business. He stated that the role of government should be to provide infrastructure and zoning assistance, which is already in place. Committee member John Manieri agreed.

Committee member John Manieri stated that he felt that rents are way too high in the Village Center and that, maybe, Opus' note has to be called in order for an adjustment to be made. He stated that the high rents are driving potential businesses away from the Village Center.

Trustee candidate Len Ruzak stated that he felt that Burr Ridge is an ideal location for businesses and that he felt that more needs to be done to promote the Village.

After considerable discussion, Administrator Stricker suggested that the EDC work on focusing on areas on which they can agree and reach a consensus, developing a plan around that consensus. He stated that, for the next meeting, he and Assistant to the Administrator Scheiner would try to focus the Committee in on specific issues and vote up or down on those issues.

ADJOURNMENT

There being no further discussion, a motion was made by Mike Donahue to adjourn the meeting. The motion was seconded by Ed Claffy and approved by a vote of 5-0. The meeting was adjourned at 9:50 p.m.

3. PUBLIC HEARINGS

Chairman Trzupek confirmed all those present who plan to speak at the scheduled public hearings.

A. Z-02-2011: 15W308-320 North Frontage Road (Martin) – Garage Variation

Mr. Pollock said that this hearing was continued from March 21, 2011 and that the Plan Commission had asked the petitioner to resolve the outstanding property maintenance violations before the Commission would consider the zoning request. Mr. Pollock said that an inspection was done on April 28, 2011 and on May 2, 2011 and there were still several outstanding violations. In particular, there were trailers and vehicles being stored on the property, there were two abandoned signs on the building, and there was a grill and other equipment stored outside the building.

Mr. Ted Martin, the owner of the property, said that he had resolved all of the violations and did not understand that the outside storage was a violation. He said the signs were not

removed because they hoped to re-use the signs. He said he would remove all of the vehicles from the property and the other equipment being stored outside if necessary.

Chairman Trzupek asked if there was any public comment on the petition. There was none.

Chairman Trzupek clarified that limited outside storage may be allowed but is subject to special use approval. He said that if the petitioner wants outside storage he would have to request special use approval.

Commissioner Franzese said that outside storage has only been allowed when it is integral to the business on the property. Mr. Pollock added that outside storage is usually only allowed when it is accessory to a legal business, limited in scope and area, and not located next to a residential area.

Mr. Pollock said that the Plan Commission indicated at the last meeting that they were willing to consider a temporary use of the property for the powder coating business but only if the petitioner agreed to rezone the property to the T1 District and resolved the existing property maintenance and outside storage violations. He said at this time, the petitioner has not cleaned up the property and the outside storage remains.

The petitioner stated that the trucks and trailers are a big part of the business. Mr. Pollock wondered why they could not be kept inside the building.

In response to Mr. Pollock, Mr. Martin said that the pole barn is used to store equipment for a construction company. Mr. Pollock said that was not a permitted use of the property.

Mr. Martin said that he would like to meet with the Village staff on the property and walk through the property to make sure he does everything the Village requests.

Commissioner Franzese suggested that the petitioner be given one more chance to clean up the property and perhaps amend the petition to request outside storage of vehicles.

Commissioner Stratis clarified that the petitioner said there were no fumes from the powder coating business. The petitioner confirmed and Chairman Trzupek added that at the last meeting the neighbors testified that there were no problems with fumes from the business.

A **MOTION** was made by Commissioner Franzese and **SECONDED** by Commissioner Bolos to continue Z-02-2011 to the June 6, 2011 meeting.

B. Z-05-2011: 51 Shore Drive (Personalization Mall) – Special Use for a Non-Residential Fence

Mr. Pollock described the petition as follows: The petitioner seeks special use approval to construct a solid fence enclosing an outdoor patio area. The outdoor patio is permitted and complies with the Zoning Ordinance. All non-residential fences are subject to special use approval. The subject fence was constructed without a permit and without proper approvals from the Village. The subject fence is a solid wood fence, often referred to as a stockade fence, and is 6 feet in height. It encloses a 15 x 48 foot patio area located in the side yard of the property. Patios are permitted in a side yard with a minimum setback of 10 feet of the side lot line. This patio is more than 10 feet from the side lot line.

Mr. George Arnold, attorney for the petitioner, said he had nothing to add but would answer any questions the Plan Commission may have.

There being no comments or questions from the public, Chairman Trzupek asked for Plan Commission comments or questions.

Commissioner Franzese asked if there was more than one shift for the business and if there was any amplified music in the patio area. Mr. Arnold said that during the busy holiday season, they will run a second shift. He said there would be no amplified music.

Commissioner Bolos asked how the fence was anchored. Commissioner Franzese said he noticed during his site inspection that the fence posts are anchored in concrete. Commissioner Bolos also asked if the fence would be maintained and noted that it needs to be painted or stained. Mr. Arnold said that the petitioner intends to stain or paint the fence.

Commissioner Perri noted that maintenance of the fence is needed. He asked about lighting and security. He said the fenced area is open on one end and could be a security issue by providing a place for someone to hide.

Commissioner Grunsten said the fence is visible and needs to be painted or stained.

Mr. Arnold said the petitioner is willing to paint or stain the fence and would add a light if necessary.

Chairman Trzupek suggested they add a self-locking gate that would only open from the inside.

A **MOTION** was made by Commissioner Franzese and **SECONDED** by Commissioner Stratis to close the hearing for Z-05-2011.

- 3. The fence shall be painted or stained.
- 4. A self-closing gate that is always locked from the outside shall be provided to enclose the patio area.
- 5. If determined necessary by staff, lighting shall be added to the patio area for purposes of improving security.

C. Z-06-2011: 201 Bridewell Drive (Eddie Merlot's); Special Use

Mr. Pollock described the petition as follows: The petitioner is the architect for Platinum Restaurants which owns and operates Eddie Merlot's Restaurants in five other Midwest locations. The petitioner seeks to use the former Max & Erma's Restaurant for an Eddie Merlot's and requests special use approval as per Sections VIII.A.9, VIII.C.2.ll and VII.C.2.x of the Burr Ridge Zoning Ordinance to permit a restaurant with limited live entertainment, sales of alcoholic beverages and with extended hours of operation in an existing building and with additions to the existing building.

Mr. Rich Busfield, Architect for the petitioner, was present. Mr. Busfield described the plans.

There being no comments or questions from the public, Chairman Trzupek asked for Plan Commission comments or questions.

Commissioner Grunsten said she sees no problem with the special use requests and welcomes the new restaurant to Burr Ridge.

Commissioner Stratis asked how many Eddie Merlot's restaurants already exist and he asked about the hours of operation. Mr. Busfield said Burr Ridge would be the sixth and that they are concurrently planning a 7th in Warrenville. He said currently the restaurant is only planned to be open for dinner with no lunch hours.

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Commissioner Perri said he loves the location and the proposed restaurant. He said it will have a positive impact on the community and suggested they may want longer hours because there of the entertainment in the area.

Commissioner Bolos asked if they would want outdoor seating. Mr. Busfield said it is not planned but that they would come back to the Plan Commission if they decided they wanted outdoor seating.

Commissioner Franzese asked about the meaning of limited live entertainment. Mr. Busfield said that generally live entertainment would be limited to weekends and one to three musicians playing light jazz, blues or soft rock.

Commissioner Franzese asked about the building materials. In response, Mr. Busfield said most of the façade would be a cement based stucco with a limited use of synthetic stucco.

Chairman Trzupek said that he was concerned that the face brick on the building was being covered with stucco. He said brick is generally conceived of as a higher quality product than stucco and he would prefer to see the use of brick.

Mr. Busfield said he can ask his client if he would be willing to use brick instead of the stucco.

Commissioner Franzese noted that stucco was prohibited in the adjacent Village Center and instead the buildings are all brick and stone.

Chairman Trzupek asked about the lease, which the Mr. Busfield said was for 15 years. Chairman Trzupek noted that the building will be changed more or less permanently and that brick would be a better façade next to the existing brick buildings in the area.

Commissioner Franzese said that stucco may be acceptable in a limited fashion but that the primary material should be brick.

Chairman Trzupek said that the brick buildings in this area were more relevant to determining the proper design of the building than were other Eddie Merlot's restaurants in other cities.

A MOTION was made by Commissioner Perri and SECONDED by Commissioner Stratis to close the hearing for Z-06-2011.

 - a. The special use shall be limited to Platinum Restaurants doing business as Eddie Merlot's and shall expire at such time that Platinum Restaurants doing business as Eddie Merlot's no longer own and operate the restaurant at 201 Bridewell Drive.
 - b. Live entertainment shall be accessory to the principal use of the building as a restaurant.
- 2. The special use for the extension of the hours of operation shall be limited as follows:
 - a. The restaurant shall close no later than 1 am on Fridays and Saturdays and 12 midnight Sunday through Thursdays; all other business hours shall comply with the Zoning Ordinance.
 - b. The extended hours shall be limited to Platinum Restaurants doing business as Eddie Merlot's and shall expire at such time that Platinum Restaurants doing business as Eddie Merlot's no longer own and operate the restaurant at 201 Bridewell Drive.
 - c. The special use for extended hours shall expire in one year at which time the petitioner may re-petition for a permanent extension of the hours.
- 3. The special use for the site plan approval shall be subject to compliance with the submitted plans including the site plan, landscaping plan, and building elevations except that the building elevations shall be revised to minimize the use of stucco and to minimize the amount of the existing brick that is covered. Primary façade building materials shall be brick, pre-cast stone, or natural stone.

A. S-03-2011: 201 Bridewell Drive (Eddie Merlot's); Sign Variation

Mr. Pollock described this request as follows: The petitioner is the sign contractor for the proposed Eddie Merlot's restaurant in the former Max & Erma's building. This petition seeks approval of a standard sign package that the restaurant uses in its various locations. The sign requests include the following variations from the Sign Ordinance; to allow four wall signs rather than the permitted two wall signs; to allow the combined area of wall signs to exceed 100 square feet (196 square feet proposed); to allow a sign extending above the roof line of the building; and requests conditional sign approval to allow signs with more than three colors.

Mr. Ron Michel of Creative Signs was present on behalf of Eddie Merlot's. He described each of the signs including the lighting of the signs.

There was no one else in attendance to speak on this consideration.

Commissioner Bolos stated that she believes the blade sign is not appropriate for this location.

Chairman Trzupek said he agrees that the blade sign is not appropriate and he thinks that the total sign area is excessive relative to Village code and relative to other restaurants in Burr Ridge. He said that the blade sign is appropriate in Eddie Merlot's downtown locations but does not fit in this location in Burr Ridge.

Commissioner Perri said he likes the blade sign. He said that the Village Center was designed as an urban area and the blade sign complements the Village Center design.

Commissioner Franzese said he thinks the blade sign looks tacked on. He said he likes the marquee sign but with the blade sign it is too much signage in one location.

Chairman Trzupek noted that the canopy/marquee is too small to be truly functional.

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Commissioner Perri asked if the marquee sign and the blade sign could be lowered so it did not extend above the roof line.

The architect for the restaurant, Rich Busfield, responded that he would prefer not to put signage in the marquee windows as the glass was intended to give views into the restaurant.

Commissioner Stratis said that although the location of the building with multiple street frontages justifies some increase in sign area, the proposed 196 square feet is way too much.

Chairman Trzupek asked for a straw poll on the blade sign.

Commissioner Perri said he supports the blade sign and wondered if they could provide a site plan and some perspective drawings to give the Commission an idea of what the blade sign would look like from County Line Road. Mr. Michel said he could do that.

Commissioner Stratis said he is inclined not to support the blade sign. He added that additional sign area of perhaps 120 to 130 square feet may be appropriate but not the proposed 196 square feet.

Commissioner Grunsten said she would like to see more drawings of the signs including the blade sign.

Commissioners Franzese and Bolos both said they would not support the blade sign.

Chairman Trzupek said he does not want a sign that extends above the roof. He also suggested that they consider making the marquee and entryway canopy larger. He suggested and the petitioner agreed that this should be continued to the next meeting.

A MOTION was made by Commissioner Stratis and SECONDED by Commissioner Bolos to continue the hearing for S-03-2011 to June 6, 2011.

RESOLUTION OPPOSING REDUCTION OF STATE COLLECTED REVENUES DUE MUNICIPALITIES -LOCAL GOVERNMENT DISTRIBUTIVE FUND (LGDF)

WHEREAS, all Illinois municipalities provide direct frontline services to their citizens; and

WHEREAS, these services have an immediate and fundamental reality to those citizens who depend on local police and fire protection, water and sewer service, snow removal, roads and traffic safety; and

WHEREAS, local citizens pay income taxes to the State for both the State budget and local municipal budgets and the revenue is collected by the State; and

WHEREAS, since the inception of the State income tax in 1969, municipalities have received, relied upon and provided services with those revenues to their local taxpaying citizens; and

WHEREAS, the fiscal reality is that municipalities have already experienced less income tax revenues from the State; and

WHEREAS, the recent income tax increase provided new revenues all of which went to the State budget - NONE OF THE INCREASE WAS RECEIVED BY CITIES - costing over \$2.7 billion in future lost revenues; and

WHEREAS, the State, through its Legislature and Governor, is contemplating further reductions to municipal revenues; and

WHEREAS, the FY 11-12 Budget for the Village of Burr Ridge includes \$844,720 in Local Government Distributive Fund revenues, which represents 10.8% of the total General Fund revenue budget; and

WHEREAS, one proposal under discussion would take an additional \$300,000,000.00 of State-collected income tax from cities and counties, which would reduce their revenues by \$23.40 per capita, representing approximately \$280,000 in lost revenue to the Village of Burr Ridge; and

WHEREAS, over the last two fiscal years, the Village of Burr Ridge has eliminated 15% of its workforce, instituted hiring and wage freezes, imposed furlough days, cut employee benefits, cut roadway maintenance and construction in half, deferred needed capital projects, deferred replacement of needed equipment and delayed sewer and water main projects; and

WHEREAS, the proposal to cut the local share of the income tax will be a devastating loss of needed revenue for our community and will result in further job cuts and reduction in service.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Mayor and Board of Trustees of the Village of Burr Ridge, DuPage and Cook Counties, Illinois, as follows:

<u>Section 1</u>: That the Village of Burr Ridge cannot preserve basic services with this tremendous loss of income tax revenues.

<u>Section 2</u>: That the Village of Burr Ridge strongly opposes further reduction in state collected revenues and demands that the General Assembly and Governor take NO FURTHER ACTION TO FINANCIALLY RUIN MUNICIPALITIES.

Dear Senator Radogno,

As Mayor of the Village of Burr Ridge, I urge you and your fellow legislators to carefully consider the devastating consequences of eliminating the municipal share of State income tax. Simply stated, this would be catastrophic to local governments, causing an immediate and painful reduction in basic municipal services to residents in Burr Ridge and throughout the State.

Currently, the State income tax represents 11% of the total General Fund revenues in Burr Ridge. Future year budgets show significant deficits due to dwindling sales tax and other revenue sources. Our existing deficits do not even contemplate the elimination of our share of state income tax.

During this economic crisis, the Village of Burr Ridge, like most Illinois municipalities, has "tightened its belt" to live within our means. In the FY 11-12 Budget, we have eliminated one police officer position and will eliminate one full time public works position in favor of two part time positions. Since 2009, the Village of Burr Ridge has eliminated a total of nine full time positions and two part time positions, which represents 15% of its workforce. For the third year in a row, roadway maintenance and construction and tree planting programs have been cut in half. Needed capital projects have been deferred. Equipment reserve funds have not been fully funded for the past four years and we have deferred replacement of needed equipment. The Village's newsletter is no longer mailed to residents' homes, training budgets have been reduced to a bare minimum, national and state conferences have been eliminated, and the list of cuts continues. The elimination of state income tax revenues would result in additional cuts and the elimination of valuable, vital services to our residents.

I am well aware of the fiscal problems that exist in State government. I appreciate how difficult it is to build consensus, prioritize programs and services and make the cuts necessary to balance the budget. However, I feel it is equally important that you, as our Senator in Springfield, recognize that

Illinois municipalities have not been immune to the problems of declining revenues and rising expenditures.

I urge you and your fellow legislators to resist the temptation to take away the municipal share of the State income tax, knowing that to do so would absolutely devastate local government. If you have any questions or doubts about the seriousness of my concerns, please contact me.

As Mayor of the Village of Burr Ridge, I urge you and your fellow legislators to oppose any proposal that would eliminate the municipal portion of the State income tax revenues. These revenues represent a fraction of the state's deficit but to Burr Ridge the loss would be catastrophic.

The Fiscal Year 2011-2012 Budget for the Village of Burr Ridge includes \$844,720 in Local Government Distributive Fund revenues, which represents 10.8% of the total General Fund revenue budget for the Village of Burr Ridge. One proposal under discussion would take an additional \$300,000,000 of State-collected income tax from cities and counties, which would reduce their revenues by \$23.40 per capita; representing approximately \$250,000 in lost revenue to the Village of Burr Ridge. This would mean additional layoffs and reductions in service to our residents.

During this economic crisis the Village of Burr Ridge has exhibited the ability to make the necessary cuts and sound financial decisions with our current revenues. Since 2009, we have eliminated over 15% of our workforce, reduced or eliminated funding to valuable programs.

Already we are suffering from a significant loss of revenues during this recession. We are a non-home rule community with limited ability to raise revenue. Unless we make up the loss by imposing new taxes and fees on our residents and businesses at the local level we will have to forego essential services. I view the taking of our income tax revenues as simply passing the buck and the burden to our residents. Taking money from one strained area for use in another does not fix the problem and neither will raiding our coffers.

It is time for the State of Illinois to follow our lead and learn to live within its means. That municipalities are being asked to "share the pain" and make



additional sacrifices to is very troubling. Our residents cannot and must not, be asked to fix the state's fiscal crisis by sacrificing local government services.

Senator Radogno, I am writing today as a member of the fervent, widespread opposition to any proposal that seeks to eliminate the municipal portion of the income tax revenues. Attached please find a Resolution that was unanimously passed by the Burr Ridge Village Board of Trustees opposing these efforts. I strongly urge you to reconsider your position and take no further action to financially ruin municipalities.

BURR RIDGE VILLAGE BOARD MOUNTS OPPOSITION TO STATE'S EFFORTS TO REDUCE MUNICIPAL TAX REVENUES

BURR RIDGE, Illinois – The Village of Burr Ridge Board of Trustees unanimously passed a Resolution urging the General Assembly and the Governor to oppose any further reductions in state collected revenues, demanding that no further action be taken to "financially ruin municipalities."

An obviously frustrated Mayor Gary Grasso stated, "Because the state has failed to live within its means it is trying to raid Village coffers. This is not the answer."

Policymakers in Springfield are discussing ideas to reduce the massive state budget deficit. Two proposals in particular advocate for reductions in state-collected local government revenues.

The revenue in question is collected in the Local Government Distributive Fund, or LGDF, and it was created in 1969 as part of a compromise agreement. Rather than allowing local governments to collect the tax themselves the state began collecting revenues on their behalf, sending municipalities their portion each month. This is also done with sales tax, motor fuel tax and other tax revenues which are collected by the State's Department of Revenue and funneled to the intended recipients.

"Based on what I'm hearing today, there are several proposals on the table," stated Steve Stricker, Village Administrator. "One proposal would eliminate \$250,000 of the Village's LGD funds, which is roughly equivalent to three patrol officers." He noted that the most alarming proposal he has heard to-date would seek to eliminate all of the Village's LGD funds. "Those funds make up \$844,720, or 10.8%, of our operating budget. It would be catastrophic to Burr Ridge and communities across the State."

Mayor Grasso notes that, although no decisions have been made about what would be cut, he said "Residents would absolutely notice the cuts. The loss of these critical revenues would jeopardize our ability to maintain current service levels." He called the suggestion that municipalities should "share the pain" by Governor Quinn's budget director "ridiculous" arguing, "We've already made significant cuts and eliminated 15% of the Village's work force since 2009. Losing any state-collected local government revenue could affect our ability to fund core Village services like public safety and basic infrastructure maintenance."

The state is faced with a \$13 billion budget deficit. This budget deficit has been allowed to grow over several years while local governments have been reducing their budgets to align spending with lower revenue projections. "The State must do what the rest of us have done" said Grasso. "We have demonstrated the ability to make the necessary cuts and sound financial decisions to live within our means. It is time for the State to follow our lead."

The Village is asking residents join the opposition by contacting their local legislators. The Village of Burr Ridge Board of Trustees unanimously passed a Resolution urging the General Assembly and the Governor to oppose any further reductions in state collected revenues, demanding that no further action be taken to "financially ruin municipalities." An obviously frustrated Mayor Gary Grasso stated, "Because the state has failed to live within its means it is trying to raid Village coffers. This is not the answer.

Policymakers in Springfield are discussing ideas to reduce the massive state budget deficit. Two proposals in particular advocate for reductions in state-collected local government revenues. The revenue in question is collected in the Local Government Distributive Fund, or LGDF, and it was created in 1969 as part of a compromise agreement. Rather than allowing local governments to collect the tax themselves the state began collecting revenues on their behalf, sending municipalities their portion each month. This is also done with sales tax, motor fuel tax and other tax revenues which are collected by the State's Department of Revenue and funneled to the intended recipients.

"Based on what I'm hearing today, there are several proposals on the table," stated Steve Stricker, Village Administrator. "One proposal would eliminate \$250,000 of the Village's LGD funds, which is roughly equivalent to three patrol officers." He noted that the most alarming proposal he has heard to-date would seek to eliminate all of the Village's LGD funds. "Those funds make up \$844,720, or 10.8%, of our operating budget. It would be catastrophic to Burr Ridge and communities across

Mayor Grasso notes that, although no decisions have been made about what would be cut, he said "Residents would absolutely notice the cuts. The loss of these critical revenues would jeopardize our ability to maintain current service levels." He called the suggestion that municipalities should "share the pain" by Governor Quinn's budget director "ridiculous" arguing, "We've already made significant cuts and eliminated 15% of the Village's work force since 2009. Losing any state-collected local government revenue could affect our ability to fund core Village services like public safety and basic infrastructure maintenance?

The state is faced with a \$13 billion budget deficit. This budget deficit has been allowed to grow over several years while local governments have been reducing their budgets to align spending with lower revenue projections. "The State must do what the rest of us have done" said Grasso. "We have demonstrated the ability to make the necessary cuts and sound financial decisions to the cutting our many. It is time for the State to follow our load." decisions to live within our means. It is time for the State to follow our lead.

Background

The Village of Burr Ridge and its residents are being asked by our local legislators to close a substantial State of Illinois budget deficit by targeting municipal income tax revenue.

This funding, collected in the Local Government Distributive Fund (LGDF) as part of a 1969 compromise agreement, rightfully belongs to the Village of Burr Ridge residents to provide valuable local services like police patrols and snow plowing. Rather than allowing local governments to levy and collect the tax themselves, the State of Illinois began collecting it on our behalf, sending us our portion each month.

On April 28, 2011, Governor Quinn also announced a possible delay in those monthly payments to municipalities. The State of Illinois is passing the buck and the burden to Illinois residents. They are not fixing the State's budget problems; they are simply taking money from one strained area for use in another.

Burr Ridge residents have already sacrificed. Since 2009, in response to declining revenue over the last several fiscal years, the Village has laid off over 15% of its work force and reduced or eliminated funding to other valuable programs such as roadway maintenance and delayed needed sewer and water main projects.

How will this affect you?

If these proposals pass, the Village will not be able to preserve basic services. One proposal would eliminate \$250,000, the equivalent of three police officers., while another would eliminate all of the Village's LGD funds. These funds make up \$844,720, or 10.8%, of the Village's operating budget.

The loss would require an additional workforce reduction, reduction in services.

What can you do?

Consider how Burr Ridge has managed tax payer funds - cutting spending and making financially sound decisions to live within our current means without balancing the budget on the backs of our residents. We have not increased property taxes. We have not increased your fees to pad our budget. Now consider the State of Illinois. Who do you believe has done a better job of ensuring that tax payers receive quality services for the taxes the pay?









The state income tax increase results in record high revenues over what has been collected during the past several years.





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

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SPRINGFIELD - Gov. Pat Quinn wants to stop nearly \$100 million in monthly payments to Chicago, the suburbs and other Itlinois towns if lawmakers won't let him borrow billions of dollars to pay overdue bills, according to a confidential memo the Tribune obtained Thursday.

The idea drew immediate blowback from local leaders worried about balancing their own budgets in a sluggish economy

"To me, it sounds like they're holding us hostage," said Tinley Park Mayor Ed Zabrocki, a former Republican legislator.

The proposal, outlined in the memo and quietly distributed to top legislators, represents a pressure tactic by the Democratic governor. He hopes mayors from Zion to Cairo will squeeze their town's lawmakers to





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But the General Assembly's leadership has been highly skeptical of Quinn's other recent plans for big borrowing. They also might not be keen on a plan that would punish communities back home and potentially result in a flood of phone calls and chanting protesters outside their district offices.

At stake is the share of the state income tax that flows to cities and villages. It's doled out every month based on population and currently adds up to a little more than \$1 billion a year.

Quinn wants to turn off the spigot if he can't win approval for borrowing.

Acknowledging the backlash from cities, Quinn budget director David Vaught said mayors and other community leaders should "come help us get the debt restructured, and then you would get paid. That's the message to them. It's not, it's not a hostile message. ... We have a cash crunch here, and we need your help getting out of it."

Chicago would be hit hardest, with the city getting about \$220 million in the last budget year from that pot of money. Mayor-elect Rahm Emanuel already faces a money shortfall that could total \$1 billion in day-to-day expenses and employee pension costs.

Cook County collected about \$7.7 million from the state income tax last budget year. Both Emanuel and new County Board President Toni Preckwinkle declined to comment Thursday through spokeswomen.

The Quinn administration's gamble comes a day after Republican Comptroller Judy Baar Topinka revealed the state would be slightly more than \$8 billion in the red when the budget year ends June 30, pending any new moves by Quinn or legislators. The state this week is just getting around to paying bills dated Nov. 5

Quinn has asked to borrow \$8.75 billion to pay the bills. With lawmakers scrambling to figure out how to put together a pared-down budget before a May 31 deadline, Quinn now is requesting to borrow \$4.5 billion

"What we are saying is \$4.5 billion is the bare minimum ... for the suspension to stop," said Kelly Kraft, Quinn's budget spokeswoman.

Even if Quinn's fellow Democrats went along with the borrowing, which is no sure thing, some Republican votes also would be required for approval. Senate Republican leader Christine Radogno said Thursday that she is "absolutely not" prepared to support the latest borrowing plan.

"It just sounds suspiciously like, "What can we do to threaten another group to get them to pressure the Legislature to borrow more money," without him doing the hard work of making the cuts that we absolutely have to make," said Radogno, of Lemont.

Democratic Sen. Donne Trotter said passage of Quinn's proposal is "not a slam-dunk. That's for certain."

But the veteran budget expert from Chicago also indicated there might be less sympathy in some quarters for cities and towns because school districts are waiting even longer to get paid.

"There are some that believe, 'Let them raise their own taxes," Trotter said.

If lawmakers instead decide to pass legislation allowing Quinn to stop the local payments, the suspension could be retroactive to February and last through year's end.

Suburban leaders say such a move by the state would cripple their budgets. In Tinley Park, the state income tax payments make up about 11 percent of village revenue. Elgin gets \$683,000 a month from that state source. In Naperville, it's a little less than \$1 million a month.

"Obviously we've got very conservative fiscal policies that allow us to weather a short-term storm," Naperville City Manager Doug Krieger said. "However, the solution and the funds would need to come within a couple months before we started to impact local service."

The cut would be especially harsh, suburban officials said, given that the state already is behind in its monthly payments. Zabrocki, set to chair the Metropolitan Mayors Caucus this fall, said his town is owed three or four months' worth despite the major income tax increase approved in January.

New Elgin Mayor Dave Kaptain said he just wants the state to send what it promised.

"I don't like being threatened and I don't work real well under those circumstances," Kaptain said.


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Quinn's borrowing trial balloon falling flat

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SPRINGFIELD-Gov. Quinn's trial balloon to withhold nearly \$1 billion from cities and counties to persuade Republicans to back borrowing for billions of dollars in unpaid bills appears to be a legislative non-starter, key lawmakers said Friday.

"I don't think it's the right way to run a railroad, and I don't think he'll get the traction from this approach they're hopeful he will," House Majority Leader Barbara Flynn Currie (D-Chicago) said. "I just don't see borrowing is something that's on the horizon."

Quinn's budget office Friday released draft legislation the governor is circulating to suspend incometax payments to cities and counties until either December 31 or when lawmakers approve \$4.5 billion in borrowing, whichever is earlier.

The governor's threat is designed to force Republicans, who have been loathe to borrow more money for state government, to change their tune after hearing an outcry from mayors and other local officials in their legislative districts.

The pitch comes after state Comptroller Judy Baar Topinka said earlier this week that Illinois would face an \$8 billion backlog of unpaid bills by the end of this fiscal year, which ends in June.

Kelly Kraft, a spokeswoman for Quinn's budget office, insisted the governor's proposed legislation was not an acknowledgement that his bid to borrow \$8.75 billion earlier this year is off the table but rather an attempt to come up with the necessary money to secure federal matching dollars for vital, state health-care costs.

"We continue to work with members of the General Assembly to come up with solutions to the state's budget challenges, and this is one of . . . myriad . . . options put forth to help stabilize the budget by getting health care bills paid immediately in order to qualify for the enhanced federal match. We do not want to leave hundreds of millions of dollars in enhanced match on the table," Kraft said.

"Our goal is to pay the bills, and we need the General Assembly's support to make this happen," she said.

In 2010, Chicago received \$227 million from the 6 percent cut of state income-tax proceeds that local governments get and that Quinn wants to withhold, while Cook County received \$7.9 million, according to data from the Illinois Department of Revenue.

"It's a very significant threat he's making here. Deciding to hold this back indefinitely or an extended period of time could jeopardize core services in municipalities," said Larry Frang, executive director of the Illinois Municipal League, which opposes the initiative.

"If the governor plays games by holding it back, cities will have fewer police officers, fewer fire fighters, will have problems making payroll in some areas and not have enough salt for the roads in the winter time," Frang said.

Frang said the governor, under current law, has the authority to withhold income-tax transfers to local governments, but Kraft insisted that was not the case and was why Quinn is floating legislation to authorize that.

"We need the General Assembly's approval to do this," Kraft said. "That's why we drafted this option. It's an alternative."

Republicans, whose votes are needed for borrowing, showed little signs of being moved by Quinn's threat.

"Gov. Quinn's threats to local governments' funding to get the borrowing he incessantly pushes is not only ridiculous, it is unfair," said House Minority Leader Tom Cross (R-Oswego) in a statement. "In most cases, local governments have made cuts and are weathering the economic storm, and now the governor wants to renege on the money that is owed to them.

"This is yet another scare tactic from the governor's office," he continued. "We must make our government more efficient and effective by passing a balanced budget and reforms before we constantly lean on massive amounts of borrowing in the open market."

Madigan not ruling out cuts to cities to balance state budget

Democratic House Speaker Michael Madigan said today that he isn't ruling out the possibility of cutting Chicago and other cities' share of income taxes as part of a state budget plan.

The powerful Southwest Side Democrat, appearing at an immigrant rights rally at St. Nicholas Church in his 13th Ward, said he has agreed to work with Gov. Pat Quinn on putting together a budget.

The Tribune disclosed Quinn's office was looking at suspending the nearly \$100 million a month in payments the state makes to cities across Illinois in an effort to pressure reluctant lawmakers to support a borrowing plan to pay some long overdue bills.

"I've committed to Gov. Quinn that I'm going to work with the governor in terms of adopting a balanced budget and so my commitment is to work with the governor," Madigan said.

"In the majority of states across the nation it has happened where local governments have been called upon to sacrifice also," he said. "So it's not out of line to ask local governments to share the sacrifice. So that's why I would say my plan is to work with the governor."

That assessment was delivered a day after Senate President John Cullerton, D-Chicago, **rejected the idea**, saying cash-strapped municipalities would likely be forced to raise local taxes to make up for any lost revenue from Springfield.

Madigan's comments came as hundreds of immigrant rights supporters rallied to ask the House speaker and Senate president to approve legislation that would allow undocumented students to tap private scholarship aid and participate in the state's college savings plans.

Cullerton, a sponsor of the bill, said that "because (the students) are undocumented, the law limits their choices and denies these young, intelligent, hard-working, dedicated and, yes, patriotic residents the basic options of a civilized society."

The rally, organized by the Illinois Coalition for Immigrant and Refugee Rights, also was meant to push passage of legislation that would allow counties to decide whether to participate in a controversial federal deportation program called Secure Communities.

Also on the agenda was expanding the ability of ethnic and racial groups to elect one of their own when new legislative maps are drawn to reflect last year's federal Census. And the group wanted to ensure funding for immigrant services would stay intact.

Madigan said funding for immigrant services "is going to be one of my priorities. That's why I'm here." But when asked if the program was likely to face cuts, Madigan said, "The entire budget's going to be cut."

Dear Mayor and Board of Trustees:

The Plan Commission transmits for your consideration its recommendation to approve a request by Design Collaborative on behalf of Eddie Merlot's Restaurant for special use approval as per Sections VIII.A.9, VIII.C.2.ll and VII.C.2.x of the Burr Ridge Zoning Ordinance to permit a restaurant with limited live entertainment, sales of alcoholic beverages and with extended hours of operation in an existing building and with additions to the existing building. The property is located at 201 Bridewell Drive and is the former Max & Erma's Restaurant.

After due notice, as required by law, the Plan Commission held a public hearing on this matter on May 2, 2011. There were no public comments at the hearing. The petitioner was represented by the architect for the project, Mr. Rich Busfield.

This being an established restaurant location and building, the Plan Commission did not have any problems with the re-use of the property for another restaurant. The only concern from the Plan Commission was the proposed re-surfacing of the building with stucco. The Plan Commission prefers that the petitioner keep the existing brick where possible and that the addition to the building also be primary brick, pre-cast stone, or natural stone. The architect responded that he would review this recommendation with the owner.

After due consideration, the Plan Commission concluded that the various proposed special use requests comply with the standards of the Zoning Ordinance. Accordingly, by a vote of 6 to 0, the Plan Commission *recommends approval* of

Z-06-2011 subject to the following conditions:

- 1. The special use for a restaurant serving alcoholic beverages and including live entertainment shall be subject to the following conditions:
 - a. The special use shall be limited to Platinum Restaurants doing business as Eddie Merlot's and shall expire at such time that Platinum Restaurants doing business as Eddie Merlot's no longer own and operate the restaurant at 201 Bridewell Drive.
 - b. Live entertainment shall be accessory to the principal use of the building as a restaurant.
- 2. The special use for the extension of the hours of operation shall be limited as follows:
 - a. The restaurant shall close no later than 1 am on Fridays and Saturdays and 12 midnight Sunday through Thursdays; all other business hours shall comply with the Zoning Ordinance.
 - b. The extended hours shall be limited to Platinum Restaurants doing business as Eddie Merlot's and shall expire at such time that Platinum Restaurants doing business as Eddie Merlot's no longer own and operate the restaurant at 201 Bridewell Drive.
 - c. The special use for extended hours shall expire in one year at which time the petitioner may re-petition for a permanent extension of the hours.
- 3. The special use for the site plan approval shall be subject to compliance with the submitted site plan, landscaping plan, and building elevations except that the building elevations shall be revised to minimize the use of stucco and to minimize the amount of the existing brick that is covered. Primary façade building materials shall be brick, pre-cast stone, or natural stone.




1. The fence shall comply with the plans submitted including location, area enclosed, height, and materials except as modified herein.



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

WHEREAS, the VILLAGE OF BURR RIDGE is desirous of having its Village Ordinances prosecuted in the Courts of DuPage County, Illinois.

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual undertakings and promises contained herein, the parties hereto agree as follows:

- 1. LINDA S. PIECZYNSKI, Attorney at Law, P.C. (Hereinafter referred to as Linda S. Pieczynski) shall prosecute all violations of the ordinances of the VILLAGE OF BURR RIDGE and shall represent the Village at all regular Court sessions held at the Field Court designated for said Village's cases during the term of this Agreement.
- 2. The VILLAGE OF BURR RIDGE shall pay LINDA S. PIECZYNSKI One Hundred Eighty-Five Dollars (\$185.00) per Court session at which prosecutable local ordinance violations are to be heard for the prosecution of said violation at the designated Field Court. In the event a session exceeds two hours in length, an additional fee shall be due at the rate of One Hundred Thirty-Five (\$135.00) per hour exceeding the original two hours.
- 3. In addition to said fee payment, the VILLAGE OF BURR RIDGE agrees to pay LINDA S. PIECZYNSKI One Hundred Thirty-Five (\$135.00) per hour for any telephone consultation, research or trial preparation done in connection with the prosecution of said Village Ordinance violations, for time spent in the preparation of Court documents or correspondence involving said cases and for any Court appearances by LINDA S. PIECZYNSKI at a Court other than the designated Field Court when she is representing the VILLAGE OF BURR RIDGE in the prosecution of the violations of its ordinances.

- 4. The VILLAGE OF BURR RIDGE agrees to reimburse LINDA S. PIECZYNSKI for any outof-pocket expenses incurred in the prosecution of its ordinance violations (e.g. postage or photocopying).
