Community Engagement Report: Attached is the April 2022 Social Media and Email report. April further proved that community events are a significant driver of high-performing content and audience engagement. A few notable highlights include a 115% increase in Facebook interactions, 3,000 Twitter Impressions, along with a very successful 65.6% open rate and 5.3% click rate for the April Oak Leaf. This is up about 11% from the beginning digital Oak Leaf in August 2021 – a terrific sign of progress that the community looks for and reads these

newsletters. The annual Oak Leaf (both print and digital) will be mailed to all residents in June, with an additional Budget in Brief section included.

Chamber of Commerce Presentation: On Wednesday, Mayor Grasso and Village Administrator Walter presented a State of the Village to the Willowbrook/Burr Ridge Chamber of Commerce. Special thanks to Trustees Russ Smith, Anita Mital, and Al Paveza as well as a number of staff for their support in attendance at this terrific event. We are always proud to talk about the great progress going on in Burr Ridge!

Yolk Grand Opening: Yolk has opened! The grand opening, which was held on May 3rd, was attended by Mayor Grasso and his wife Janet. Yolk occupies a 4,500 sq. ft. space that seats 175 people inside and 45 people outside and offers a state-of-the-art walk-up coffee bar as well as upscale brunch items. 

I. Highlights

In April, we focused our content to further highlight the Burr Ridge community and to target our key stakeholders. We noticed a large interest in these community forward posts between the Harvester Park Easter festivities, Earth Day and Arbor Day observances. The Village Facebook page alone showed an impressive 115% increase in interactions and a 27% increase in impressions due to this shift in content focus in April.


On Facebook, Burr Ridge residents responded with extreme warmth to the Village's social post notifying the community of the passing of retired officer Angie (Zucchero) Wilhelmi, with 75 comments and 49 shares. Facebook followers also engaged highly to posts of the Arbor Day Cermonial tree planting and the Village's Earth Day post giving a special mention to the Burr Ridge & Pleasant Dale Park Districts. As always, community updates and meeting notices are well received by Village followers and overall, the Burr Ridge Facebook posts resulted in an impressive 19.73K Impressions.

On Twitter, our audience engaged most with the Village's post of Burr Ridge's recognition as a Tree City USA (3.41% Engagement) and Arbor Day recap content (2.15% Engagement). As a whole, the Village Twitter channel reached 1.29K users and had a total of 3K impressions with 1.14K profile visits during the month of April.

April's metrics further enforce that the Village community looks to email and social media as a way to connect, engage and show support for Village strategic goals. We continue to utilize monthly results to bolster our digital strategy in order to provide meaningful content, opportunities and resources to the community.





This edition of the *Statehouse Briefing* highlights bills pending gubernatorial action, an update on lead service line replacement, a local economic recovery grant initiative from the Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity (DCEO), an upcoming *Illinois Municipal Policy Journal* (IMPJ) webinar, a virtual local government workshop being hosted by the Illinois Department of Revenue (IDOR) and the Illinois Municipal League's (IML) request for applications to IML committees.

As an additional resource, the Illinois Municipal League (IML) has released its <u>2022 Legislation of Municipal Interest Approved by Both Chambers report (available via this link)</u>, which details legislation IML tracked during the most recent Spring Legislative Session.

Lead Service Line Replacement Update

<u>Public Act 102-0613</u> created the Lead Service Line Replacement and Notification Act. A provision of this law also created the Lead Service Line Replacement Advisory Board to provide technical assistance to the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency (IEPA) in implementing the Act. <u>As a resource</u>, IML's fact sheet on the law is available via this link.

The Advisory Board includes 10 members who are mayors of the largest municipalities in the state, or their designee, two members who are mayors representing municipalities south of Sangamon County, or their designee, and IML Executive Director Brad Cole, as an IML representative.

On April 29, the Lead Service Line Replacement Advisory Board conducted its first meeting. The next meeting of the Board is scheduled for July 27, 2022. Additional information on the Advisory Board's activities, including agendas and meeting information, will be <u>posted to IEPA's website (available via this link)</u>.

IEPA is in the process of developing administrative rules to implement the Act. These rules, once proposed, must be approved by the Joint Committee on Administrative Rules (JCAR).

Municipalities wishing to submit comments or proposed rules may do so now, by contacting Sanjay Sofat, IEPA Bureau of Water Chief at sanjay.sofat@illinois.gov. IML will monitor the rulemaking process and keep our members informed on the status of any proposed rules.

DCEO Announces Regional Planning to Spur Economic Recovery (RISE) Program

DCEO recently announced a \$3.5 million investment to accelerate local economic recovery initiatives. Through this initiative, DCEO is offering competitive grants to help local governments and economic development organizations create new regional or local plans to promote economic recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic. This program is funded by the federal American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA).

IDOR Hosting Virtual Local Government Workshop

The Local Tax Allocation Division (LTAD) of the Illinois Department of Revenue (IDOR) will be holding its annual Local Government Workshop virtually on June 15 from 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. This year's workshop will focus on correspondence sent by IDOR and how local government officials should respond, reports that LTAD makes available and how local officials can access them and information that is available on IDOR's website to assist local officials. Governor Extends COVID-19 Disaster Proclamation Through May 28

On April 29, Governor JB Pritzker signed a new <u>Gubernatorial Disaster Proclamation (available via this link)</u> extending the statewide disaster declaration through May 28, 2022. Additionally, the Governor signed <u>Executive Order (EO) 2022-12 (available via this link)</u> extending some previous executive orders.

With the signing of a new disaster proclamation, public meetings may continue to be held remotely, in accordance with Public Act 101-0640, as long as certain requirements are met. ML's fact sheet on the requirements for holding remote meetings during a disaster is available via this link.

On April 20, the Governor issued Executive Order 2022-11 (available via this link), which revised Executive Order 2022-06 (available via this link), to align with a recent federal court ruling lifting masking requirements on public transportation issued through the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). Municipalities retain the authority to establish their own mitigations, including masking requirements on public transportation.
