2023 Butler County Veteran of the Year

Greg Robinette was born in Phoenixville, Pennsylvania to a family consisting of a father and uncles who had proudly served in various branches of the armed forces. He grew up in the Philadelphia metro area near Valley Forge and attended Plymouth-White High School. Greg and his wife Angela have been married for 30 years. Together they have three beautiful children, Connor, Mackenzie and Kaeleigh.

After graduating from high school, Greg enlisted in the United States Army in 1981, entering active duty as a private. After basic training, Greg took advanced infantry training followed by airborne training followed by assignment to the Second Ranger Battalion, a move that would influence the balance of his 32-year military career. Greg found life in the Ranger battalion environment to be in his wheelhouse, which eventually



led him to apply himself to qualify and ultimately enter Ranger School where he earned his Ranger tab.

Greg rose in the enlisted ranks, where he held several leadership positions, including Squad Leader and Section Sergeant. At this point, he paused active duty to attend college where he graduated with a ROTC commission, bringing him back to active duty as an officer. Continuing his career, Greg assumed a host of progressive leadership assignments including Platoon Leader, Company Commander, and ending his career as a Battalion Commander.

Greg is a veteran of the Global War on Terror, deploying twice to the Middle East; once to Kuwait (Operation Iraqi Freedom I) and once to Iraq (Operation Iraqi Freedom 8-9).

Greg's military accomplishments include Bronze Star w/Oak Leaf Cluster, Meritorious Service Medal w/Oak Leaf Cluster, Army Commendation Medal w/6 Oak Leaf Clusters, Army Achievement Medal w/7 Oak Leaf Clusters, Good Conduct Medal – 2nd award, Iraqi Campaign Medal w/2 Gold Stars, Global War on Terrorism Expeditionary Medal, Global War on Terrorism Service Medal, Ranger Tab, Expert Infantryman Badge, and Parachutist Badge.

His military education includes the following: Primary Non-Commissioned Officers Course; Basic Non-Commissioned Officers Course; Basic Officers Course; Combined Logistics Officers Course; and the Command and General Staff Course.

Colonel Robinette's service spans 32 years, 23.5 on active duty and 8.5 in the National Guard. After a distinguished service career, Greg retired as a Lieutenant Colonel in 2013.


In 1999, Greg moved his family to Liberty Township, Ohio where he has worked at various companies who have benefited from his applied military skills. He is currently employed with Northrop Grumman supporting the warfighter effort.

Greg joined the Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 7696 in 2013 and has been an exceptionally active member, contributing endless man hours sustaining the success of the post. He has served as Senior Vice Commander for two years and Quartermaster for the past seven years. He is one of two members of the post who operate and service the VFW Post 7696 food trailer, which supports various events throughout Butler County. The money raised from the food trailer sales goes directly back into the post, enabling assistance to veterans in need.

Greg is also a member of the Post Honor Guard, which officiates at events involving military color guard and funeral ceremonies.





Each fiscal year the Department of Veterans Affairs' Office of Policy and Planning publishes the annual Geographic Distribution of VA Expenditures (GDX) Report for the public and all stakeholders. The GDX report provides the estimated dollar expenditures for major VA programs at the state, county, and Congressional District levels. Expenditure data are grouped by the following categories: Compensation and Pension; Education and Vocational Rehabilitation and Employment; Insurance and Indemnities; Construction and Related Costs; General Operating Expenses and Related Costs; Loan Guaranty; and Medical Expenditures. The GDX Report also includes Veteran population estimates at the state, county and Congressional District level and the number of unique patients who used VA health care services.




5 Year Comparison of Butler County Veteran Population

The data from above is an estimate of the veteran population as of May 31, 2024 as produced by the VA Predictive Analytics and Actuary Service. By this model, our veteran population within Butler County continues to decrease as the number of service members from WWII, Korea and Vietnam eras are passing and fewer enlistments have occurred.



5 Year Comparison of Federal Expenditure within Butler County

The chart above shows the total Federal Expenditure in Butler County over a five-year period. The total amount encompasses Compensation & Pension, Educational and Vocational Rehabilitation & Employment Benefits, Insurance Costs, Construction, Medical Research and Medical costs. 2023 showed an increase of over \$16.6 million when compared to the previous year (FY2022).




Compensation & Pension Comparison for Butler County Residents

The Compensation & Pension expenditures include dollars for the following programs: veterans' compensation for service-connected disabilities; dependency and indemnity compensation for service-connected deaths; veterans' pension for non-service connected disabilities; and burial and other benefits to veterans and their survivors. Over \$113.1M was awarded to Butler County Veterans and their Survivors in FY23. This is a 5.12% increase when compared to preceding year (FY2022).



Service Officers Work 2023




The above chart represents the number of phone calls answered during our normal operating hours. A staff of 2 covers the phones daily, with any additional calls rolling to others in the office as the volume of calls demands.




The chart above depicts the total call volume, including those callers who received information through an automated recording before being connected to a staff member. Automated recordings included various options depending on the time of the year and the current marketing campaign such as location, Butler County ID cards, dental program, Silent Watch, etc.




The chart above depicts the average time per phone call each month. Despite the increases in call volume or the complexity of the call, the staff is well composed to deliver consistent and accurate information and scheduling. The benchmark for our office is 2 minutes and 30 seconds per call, with an actual achieved average call time of 2 minutes and 20 seconds.




Our transportation services are depicted above and below, represented as the total number of roundtrips annually (top) and then comparing rides going to a VA facility versus a Community Care Doctor (below). 





During FY2023 we assisted 295 Veterans and eligible family members financially. Above you can see the assistance amount of each overall category. As a whole, the total value equals \$286,788.33 with an average of \$972.16 per application.



The chart above shows the financial applications taken based on Zip Code of the applicant. The data supports applications are more common when the veteran and dependent populations are the highest. Outside of Butler County represents areas where zip codes crossover such as Sharonville and Forest Park or those who recently moved outside Butler County within 90 days as supported by the Ohio Revised Code.



The chart above depicts the number of applications an applicant (associated by the veterans' social security number) has opened with our office. Most applicants are in a very temporary financial hardship situation. With our financial assistance program, applicants generally recover their ability to maintain financial independence for basic living expenses in less than 3 applications. Applications in the ">=15th" level are generally applicants with continued need of assistance due to being unable to work as well as living below the poverty line (e.g. disabled at a young age).



The chart above shows the reason a financial application was denied. It should be noted that with the exception of "Appeal Denied", the reason may not be final. For example, an application that was adjudicated as denied due to "Sufficient Funds" may have been appealed to the Board of Commissioners and been granted. A determination is made at the time of adjudication based on the evidence presented by the applicant and after investigation and recommendation of a Veterans Benefit Coordinator.

2023 AGENCY REPORT

AGENCY OVERVIEW

Our agency continues to grow in each facet of operation. In 2023 a fourth pillar was officially added, Suicide Prevention, in addition to our existing three main areas of Financial Assistance, Transportation, and Service Work. Technology was expanded, and training and outreach continued. Local advertising was used to promote the events and resources as well as reach veterans by many different means throughout the county.

The Butler County Veterans Service Commission continues to adapt with the times and remains a nationwide leader in the delivery of benefits to Veterans, their survivors and family members who are eligible for services.

BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS

2023 brought the re-appointment of Commissioner to Board representing the AMVETS, Mr. Hunter Bruce Jones in January, as well as the passing of Commissioner and Board Secretary Mr. Thomas L. Jeffers, in late September. Over the last year the Board has continued to focus on driving focused change. Belief in the education system for County Veteran Service Officers, which serves as the base foundation for Service Officers and encouraging that all staff step outside of their comfort zone to become better leaders and public servants.

With the rise in outreach events and increase in appointments for the staff, the Board has staffed and attended more public events than ever before, which solidifies their understanding of the life changing work being undertaken by the staff on a daily basis.

SUICIDE PREVENTION

2023 brought the addition of Suicide Prevention as a fourth pillar of the Butler County Veterans Service Commission. In February a committee was established, made up of county agencies, government entities, local businesses, and individuals, encompassing both veterans and non-veterans alike.

By partnering with the County Coroner, the committee quickly looked to access and assess the number of local veteran suicides and ascertain both the location within the county as well as the means. A deep dive was made into how to best quickly and effectively reach those who may be in need of help and develop ways to reach and provide them with a crisis line and local resources. To ensure local veterans are aware of the resources and support available within the area, a Resource Fair was held in October. In addition, S.A.V.E. training was provided to the community, once in February and again in September.

By the end of the year, partnerships were beginning to form across Butler County with the common goal of assisting each other and potentially stopping a crisis one person at a time.

TECHNOLOGY

Technology was improved as Commissioner Meetings were transitioned to the use of Kindles in lieu of paper packets and documents. The agency eliminated multiple databases containing Personal Identifiable Information by consolidating down into a single 21st century database. This change drove processing time down by an estimated 50% and streamlined the client files into one screen. The usage

of Adobe Sign continued to prove instrumental in the efficiency and effectiveness of obtaining signatures in a secure format, especially during the software transition.

A digital signage board is slated to be added to the lobby and used to promote available agency benefits and outreach as well as community programs.

ADVERTISING

The agency goal is to promote the services offered by the agency so veterans are aware of the outreach events and benefits which they may be eligible for. While the advertising budget increased, the commission is finding that the veterans in the area use a large variety of platforms in their daily lives. Digital ads, Over the Top, banner notifications, social media and billboards are some of the means in current usage- by relying heavily on geofencing, the commission ensures they are reaching the veterans in Butler County. Advertising was proven especially effective for the 2023 Silent Watch and Veterans Day Dinner and Ceremony- both were reserved at full capacity well before the day of the events. Mass media advertising campaigns were continued with Cumulus Radio (96 Rock, Fox, and WGRR), iHeart Radio (55KRC and 700WLW) and Spectrum cable.

TRAINING

Commissioners and Service Officers are required to complete annual training in order to maintain their Board appointment and for the Service Officers, to maintain their certifications and accreditations. During 2023, the Commissioners had three scheduled training sessions: Spring Conference, Summer Convention, and Fall Conference; all of which were held in Columbus, Ohio. They were required to complete online training which consisted of the following topics: ethics, discussion of best practices within the Commissions, updates from the Ohio Department of Veterans Services, and other service organizations.

The Service Officer training included: updates from Veterans Benefit Administration (VBA), Veterans Healthcare Administration (VHA), Department of Veterans Affairs, National Cemetery Administration, veteran education updates, discussion on legislation affecting veterans, and updates from national service organizations. In 2023, the service officers attended in-person training in Columbus, Ohio as well as the National Association of County Veterans Service Officers Annual Conference held in Madison, WI. They also completed the online training through the Ohio Department of Veteran Services. Additionally, the service officers completed three webinars sponsored by the National Veterans Legal Services Program (NVLSP) that included "Understanding CRSC and CRDP," "How to Obtain VA Benefits for Disabilities Caused by VA Medical Care," and "Presumptions That Help Veterans." The Executive Director and Assistant Executive Director attended Advanced Appeals and both began training for becoming a Certified Veterans Advocate. The training programs offered by the agency continue to make a valuable difference in the quality of output delivered by the Service Officers.

EMPLOYEE RECOGNITION

The Veterans Service Commission has an active Employee Recognition program. During 2023, three employees were individually recognized for their exemplary service and job performance. The 1st Quarter 2023 Employee of the Quarter was Service Officer Tian Myers and 2nd Quarter 2023 Employee of the Quarter Apt Boykin. During the 3rd Quarter 2023, Veterans Benefit

Coordinator Dan Schofield was recognized and the 4th Quarter 2023 Employee of the Quarter was Receptionist/Scheduler Nika Cooper.

Each of these employees were recognized for selfless acts and answering calls to service well beyond what is expected on a daily basis. These employees continually raise the bar for what the public can expect of our office and we are truly fortunate to have members like this on our team.

OUTREACH

Highlights of 2023 include Butler County Jail Inmate Outreach, supporting Cincinnati VAMC Town Halls, PACT Act, the Annual Silent Watch as well as the Veterans Day event.

Butler County Jail-Inmate Outreach is a program called VETS which averaged about 15 participants a month. The program offers Veterans who are involved in the criminal justice system and who are housed in the Butler County Jail access to the resources that our office provides. The program is currently working to further its roots with a Memorandum of Understanding with the Cincinnati VA Medical Center which would allow medical staff to complete disability benefit questionnaires at the Butler County Jail. This access will allow for a quicker claim process for those who will not immediately have any other opportunity to have the required examination.

The Cincinnati VAMC Town Halls have been supported throughout the year with our Executive Director on the call as the subject matter expert for VA benefits. While these calls are scheduled and managed by the Executive leadership at the Cincinnati VA, the partnership has allowed Veterans, their families, and caretakers the opportunity to receive on the spot factual and reliable benefit information. The peek of the calls was surrounding the PACT ACT in which over 15,000 participated.

The PACT Act is the single largest legislative bill impacting veterans since the inception of the Department of Veterans Affairs. The legislation focuses on presumptive conditions for different regions of military service, outreach to discuss enrollment, toxic screenings and more. August 1, 2023 marked one-year which was important for getting the earliest effective date for a potential claimant.

With the use of advertising, the 2023 Annual Silent Watch and Veterans Day events both grew to current maximum capacity. The volunteers for Silent Watch increased over 45%, from 140 to 204 time slots available, ensuring all spots were full even after additional time slots were added. The Veterans Day event was moved from a brunch and ceremony in 2022 to a dinner and ceremony in 2023. The number in attendance grew from approximately 150 to 320 with an increased focus on the presentation/decor of the event space, a Marine Core Birthday Cake Cutting Ceremony and the addition of a local school show choir.
