#### **History of the Chelsea Police Patch**

- Original Chelsea Police Patch (first issued on or about 1965) was the standard triangle patch, which was issued in three colors
- Light Blue to match the uniform shirt of the patrol officers and the sergeants



- White to match the uniform shirts of the Lieutenants, Captains and the Chief
- Dark Blue to match the uniform jacket



- In the late 1980's, members of the department wanted to modernize our patch, and with the permission of Chief Frank Sobolewski, Captain Donald Robitaille designed the current shoulder patch. It was adopted and authorized in 1987.
- The new patch continued to be placed only on the left shoulder.
- On or about 1991 or 1992 the uniform standard was changed to both shoulders.






#### CHELSEA POLICE 2019 USE OF FORCE DATA

The **Patrol Division** is the largest division in the Department. It operates year-round, seven days a week, twenty-four hours a day. The function of the Patrol Division is to provide uniformed patrol coverage to all areas of the City. Officers' conduct patrols on foot, bicycle, motorcycle and in motor vehicles They respond to emergencies such as crimes in progress, motor vehicle accidents, injuries, illness and fires. They routinely investigate citizen complaints, arrest offenders, appear in court, provide traffic control and enforcement, and attend community based meetings. The primary goal of the Patrol Division is the prevention of crime and disorder by adhering to the Community Policing Philosophy as adopted by the Department over twenty-three years ago. Under this philosophy, officers are assigned to designated areas of the City, called Sectors and each officer has the responsibility of addressing concerns in their area.

A **permanent walking route** (Route 12) was established for Bellingham Square and the downtown business district on the day shift and first half evening shift. Use of a marked cruiser by the officer is strictly limited.

Day shift Officers have been assigned daily "Impact Patrol" walking beats throughout the city and supplementing the Bellingham Square walking route.





First half and last half officers on the evening shifts have been assigned walking "Impact Patrols" in hot spot areas throughout the city. Sergeants on the Day shift routinely call all available officers to the Bellingham Square area and conduct walking "Power Sweeps" at various times in the downtown business district and neighboring residential streets.

**Bicycle patrols** have been used during the day shift and the first half evening shift. In support of this effort, the department purchased **battery assisted bicycles** that allow officers to respond to calls faster. Officers began increased patrols and walkthroughs of City Hall and the surrounding areas. **Additional two man walking teams** were initiated during the Summer and Fall to provide extra visibility to City Hall, Bellingham Square, Chelsea Square, Bosson Park, and Chestnut Street. .

A K9 officer is regularly stationed in the business district area during the evening. Additionally, they patrol the parks and other hot spots.

The Patrol Division continues coordinating with specialized units within the department such as Traffic, Narcotics & the Gang Unit.

The Chelsea Police Narcotics Unit executed a search warrant during a morning in March which resulted in the arrest of 32 year old for Trafficking in Heroin. The search warrant was the result of an ongoing investigation of drug dealing in Chelsea. A second male present was arrested on non-drug-related charges. They were Arraigned in Chelsea District Court. Police seized approximately 100 grams of Heroin and seized nearly \$2000 in cash in the morning raid.



The Department's Criminal Investigation Division (CID) investigates criminal activity that occurs in the City of Chelsea or has an effect on the City and its citizens. CID works closely with investigators from the State Police, federal agencies and surrounding cities and towns in sharing resources, personnel and information.

We have a dedicated investigator on assignment to the FBI gang taskforce. This partnership allows the investigator investigate and monitor gang incidents in and around the Chelsea area, and provide that information to the taskforce. This taskforce investigates priority offenders that continually cross jurisdictional boundaries and targets those individuals for federal prosecution.

We also have a dedicated investigator on fulltime assignment with the **DEA Task Force**.

The Chelsea **Drug Control Unit** continued the focused enforcement into **narcotics dealings and sex trafficking** in the city with a focus on "street level dealing and prostitution" in the downtown area.



## **Community Services Division**

The Community Service Division is responsible for a number of police and community functions and is comprised of the Court Prosecutor, Traffic Unit, the School Resource Officers, Community Outreach Programs, Internship Program and the All Hazard Plan. Community po-Chelsea emphasizes diligence licing in and respect, to be carried out with the utmost sense of urgency The chain-ofcommand's main goal is to apply community police work consistently, which will create a safer, happier community for all. Protecting and serving the people of Chelsea is an imperative ideal which we strive to carry forward because it is all about building the best community we can, and everyone matters. Chelsea police officers are committed to being mentors, people that reach out to all the members of our community, especially the youth and the new citizens, aiming to guide people in the right direction. CPD is vehemently against the "Us versus Them" mentality; after all, nearly all of us came here from somewhere else. We strive to support all members of our community, regardless of differences in language or culture.

The Chelsea Police Department hired a Community Engagement Specialist (CES) who is now responsible for reaching out and engaging the city's diverse communities to develop, implement and monitor the impact of a variety of strategies, arrangements, systems and procedures. He ensure that Chelsea residents have avenues for input, a stake in their concerns and views about public safety in a way that ultimately increases trust and strengthens community-police relations.

The CES has developed a robust community outreach and engagement plan that involves key community stakeholders and a wide range of diverse Chelsea community partners who represent all areas of the City including those with higher levels of police calls. The Community Engagement Specialist will be instrumental in the implementation of the Hub and Core Programs

The **Hub Team** is an innovative community mobilization model comprised of 25+ participating agencies. This model is based on the reality that traditional approaches to address increases in public safety consistently fall short of intended crime reduction outcomes. The focus of Hub meetings is to identify individuals or families with acutely elevated risk factors which cannot be addressed by a single agency alone. The HUB mobilizes human service agencies toward a targeted and timely response specific to individual and/or family needs.

The Youth Police Dialogue program is a partnership between the Chelsea Police Department and YW Boston. Through this program, youth and police officers participate in activities and conversations together. The goal is to create an opportunity to build positive, trusting relationships between the Cheslea Police Officers and the City's youth. Dialogue Sessions are led by facilitators and involve discussions such as sharing negative experiences, addressing stereotypes, and exploring ways to improve trust between police and the Youth who community. have participated in this program report a greater sense of safety and comfort in talking to police and an increased willingness to report a crime. Officers who have participated in this program report increased an awareness of racial dynamics and an increased effort to interact with outh outside of conflict situations



The **Downtown Task Force** is focused on problem solving in Bellingham Square and the downtown business district. This community policing initiative is comprised of the Community Services Division Commander Captain Batchelor, Chelsea Police Officers, the Community Engagement Specialist, the Chelsea PD crime analyst, court personnel, social service workers and city employees. Together, this group works to address recurring problems in the Chelsea community and develops innovative, collaborative responses to these concerns. This group not only creates space for community partners to build working relationships with one another but also strives to increase access to services for Chelsea citizens who may be struggling with various issues related to mental health and substance use.



Coffee with a Cop is a national initiative supported by the United States Department of Justice, Office of Community Oriented Policing Services.

Christmas Gifts provided to 100 children – For the second consecutive year, the Chelsea Police Department and the Salvation Army partnered to provide Christmas gifts to 100 local children. All the gifts were donated by Chelsea Police Officers and the civilian staff. The gifts were provided to the children at an event hosted by Santa Claus at police head-quarters.



The Police Action Counseling

Team (PACT) is an policemental health partnership which teams a mental health clinician with Chelsea Police officers to provide clinical intervention to children. Officers are trained to identify children (and sometimes other vulnerable persons) at the scenes of police calls where they are victims of or witnesses to violence or other trauma. The goal of PACT interventions is to lessen the impact of traumatic experiences on the health and mental health of these children. Swift interventions aim to facilitate children's active participation in their own well-being, promote resilience and to increase parental knowledge of the symptoms and longer term effects of trauma

Chelsea police officers collaborated with PACT clinicians on 119 cases in 2019 regarding 153 children. Among these cases, 39% had reports of suspected abuse or neglect filed by police. 58% of cases were directly related to domestic violence and 42% had history of domestic violence. 71 referrals were provided to families: 48% for HAVEN services and 17% to mental health services.

## **Professional Standards Division**

The Professional Standards Division is responsible for issuing new and revised Department policies, directives, procedures and ensures that they are compliant with standards of Massachusetts Police Accreditation Program. It is also responsible for maintaining the building and all of its working parts. The goal of the division is to establish an environment effective in management, team-work, empowerment, communications and professional development. Department is committed to providing resources for long-range planning for future needs of the Departmentservices, staffing, facilities, equipment and technology. The division Commander Captain Dunn is also in charge of the **Crime Reporting Analysis Unit.** 

HQ Camera Updates- - Chelsea PD continues to pursue funds through Urban Area Security Initiative and Capital Improvement Plan to upgrade the exterior and interior camera systems at Police Headquarters. The current camera system consists of analog black & white cameras that were installed 1999 and are in need of upgrade. The new system will provide both security and transparency with state of the art cameras at the front desk, booking area, front sidewalk, etc.

The training and recruitment Sergeant works diligently to ensure all officers are trained and certified per department policy. The Sergeant also coordinates new hire recruitment, Police Academy placement, Field Training and assimilation into the Chelsea Police Department. In 2019, the following new Officers were welcomed to Chelsea Police JONATHAN PEREZ, CARLOS VEGA JR., NELSON NAVARRO-SALGUERO and KYLE MEEHAN.



The **traffic and records bureau** supports the residents of Chelsea by fulfilling resident requests for police reports in accordance with state law.

**Crime Analysis Unit** - Chelsea Police Department's **Crime Analyst** is responsible for studying police incidents, the identification of trends and problems and the dissemination of information to local and regional agencies which help Chelsea develop tactics and strategies to solve problems.

#### **New Chelsea PD Marine Patrol Vessel**





Smart911 Technology- Smart911 is a free service that allows citizens across the U.S. to create a safety profile for their household that includes any information they want emergency communications to have in the event of an emergency. Then, when anyone in that household dials 911 from any phone (cells, home, etc.) associated with their safety profile, their profile is immediately displayed to the 911 call taker providing additional information that can be used to facilitate the proper response to the proper location. At a time when seconds count, being able to provide 911 with all details that could impact response the second an emergency call is placed could be the difference between life and death. The CPD with the assistance of the Emergency Communications Department purchased this technology with the State E-911 grant to greatly assist CPD, CFD and EMS in responding to emergency calls for service. Smart 911 was rolled out in a collaborative effort between 911 and CPD. Presentations were given at the community schools, senior center, collaborative and other areas in the community. Presentations were also given in bilingual form through community cable and the Chelsea Record. This program remains in effect.



Shotspotter System - As part of the Urban Area Strategic Initiative (UASI) and in FY' 15, CPD, along with Revere and Everett, received the gunfire alert and analysis system known as the Shotspotter System. The system was financed by the Department of Homeland Security.

When gunfire occurs outdoors, Shotspotter sensors placed at various locations throughout the city and software triangulate and pinpoint the precise location of each round fired within seconds. Detailed incident data is immediately sent to the SST Incident Review Center, which is the secure data processing and alert qualification facility. Immediately, an SST gunfire and acoustic expert further analyzes the data, qualifies the incident and sends a validated alert simultaneously to the 911 Emergency Communications Center and directly to officers in the field via their personal smart phones and cruiser computers. In 2016, the ShotSpotter System was integrated into the city's camera system. When a gunshot is detected, all cameras within half a mile turn in the direction of the gunshots.



The Chelsea Police Relief Association provides death benefits to families of officers. This event takes the place of making phone calls to residents for donations.





SafetyNet Service to protect with residents autism and Alzheimer's disease. The Chelsea Police Department has been trained and cerified on the SafetyNet Service by LoJack. Officers are equipped with search and rescue equipment so they are able to locate anyone who signs up for the program and goes missing. Once caregivers enroll their loved ones in the service, they receive a SafetyNet bracelet, typically worn on the person's wrist or ankle. Information about the client is entered into a secure database to be used during a search and rescue situation. The bracelet emits a constant radio frequency signal and often be tracked even if someone wanders into a shallow body of water, dense wooded area, a concrete structure like a garage, or a building constructed with steel. The receivers used by Chelsea Police can detect the radio frequency signal from the bracelet within a one mile radius. Visit safetynetbylojack.com

#### Officer Mustafa Mirza receives Life Saving Medal.

Officers were dispatched to Central Ave when a call came from a distraught mother stating she needed help for her infant son. Officer Mirza was in the area and called off approx. 30-45 seconds later. Upon arrival, the mother immediately handed Officer Mirza her 1-month-old son who was pale, not breathing, and had foam surrounding his mouth and nasal passage. Officer Mirza, without hesitation, took the baby, flipped him over, sat on the couch, and administered multiple back thrusts. By doing so the nasal passage and airway became free of the foam and the baby began breathing again. The Fire Dept and EMS arrived shortly after at which point Officer Mirza handed the baby over where more medical attention was provided. Chelsea Fire Captain stated that Officer Mirza's actions were crucial in saving the baby. Officer Mirza's actions went above and beyond normal duties. His quick decision making and immediate actions are worthy of the lifesaving award.
