RE: Transfer of City Owned Land and Lots to the Redevelopment Authority

As you are aware, the approved Project Plan for TID #12 included an estimated \$3.9 million for land acquisition by the RDA from the city together with an additional \$2.3 million in carrying costs for interest on the 3.9 million debt. [Proceeds from the land sales will be realized over a period of time. The \$2.3 million represents the land holding costs until all of the lots and land are sold.]

Over the past several weeks, staff has been working with the city's bond counsel and auditors to devise the necessary documents and agreements to move forward with the Project Plan. The purpose of this memorandum is to outline an upcoming process designed to implement the Project Plan using the RDA.

- 1. RDA to consider acquisition of lands in Lake Park Villas at a meeting likely to be held during the week of September 19.
 - a. RDA to consider if property is blighted in accordance with §66.1333(5), Wis. Stats. Among the statutory definitions of "blighted property" is "property which is predominantly open and which because of obsolete platting, ... or otherwise,... substantially impairs or arrests the sound growth of the community."
 - b. RDA to hold public hearing regarding blight determination proposed during the week of October 10.
 - c. RDA to consider Development Agreement with the City to administer development agreements with Cypress Homes and Realty and The Ponds of Menasha, LLC; to market, sell and develop commercial land within Lake Park Villas; to market, sell and develop residential lots within Lake Park Villas.
- Common Council to consider Development Agreement with RDA as referenced above proposed for October 3rd.
- 3. Common Council to consider authorizing the RDA to acquire land within Lake Park Villas pursuant to §66.1333(5)(c)1g., Wis. Stats., proposed for its October 17th meeting.
- 4. If approved, the land would be transferred to the RDA on October 18, with a simultaneous transfer of the vacant land to Cypress Homes and Realty and the Ponds of Menasha.

Revenue is down for the month mainly in industrial sales because the cost of power was budgeted at \$69.76/MWh and the actual cost was \$63.38/MWh.

There are continued revenue shortfalls in water, and the overall usage for all customers was down 15% compared to budget. Water losses are in line with previous years.

After discussion, the Commission accepted the July Financial and Operations Statement as presented.

Item V. Claims Against The Utility – After discussion, the motion by Comm. Guidote seconded by Comm. Roush was unanimous to issue a formal notice of disallowance for the claim of Kurt Lingnowski, 870 First Street, because there was no negligence on the part of Menasha Utilities, and that he be advised of his statutory rights pursuant to Wis. Stats. 893.80.

Item VI. Purchase Orders over \$10,000.00 issued since the last Commission meeting were presented for informational purposes; both were budgeted items.

Item VII. Unfinished Business, Impact of Act 10 – Comm. President Allwardt stated the analysis included in the packet again this month showed different impacts on both the employer and the employees, and proposals that would keep the employer and employees whole. The memorandum also included a survey of MEUW municipalities on how Act 10 is being implemented as it relates to wage and benefit packages for non-represented employees.

After further discussion, the motion was made by Comm. Merkes to take no action to mitigate the impact of Act 10; Comm. Roush seconded the motion. The motion passed 3-2 with Commissioners Guidote, Merkes and Roush voting yes; Commissioners Allwardt and Fahrbach voted no.

Staff was urged to bring individual disparity, competitive, compression issues to the September 7 or 14 special meeting for budget preparation purposes.

Comm. Fahrbach indicated he would not be available for the September 7 meeting.

Item VIII. New Business, CVMIC Liability Renewal Package – Mrs. Hubertus reviewed the information included in the packet. The City did also renew with CVMIC, and staff's recommendation is to stay with the higher deductible as there have been no claims since 1990.

The motion by Comm. Fahrbach, seconded by Comm. Merkes, was unanimous to approve the two year liability renewal package as outlined in Option 2.

Mike King, Post Crescent, departed at approximately 6:20 pm.

McMahon Engineering Agreements, High Lift Pump Station Modifications & Abandonment of Manitowoc Street Elevated Tank and New Transmission Main connecting Broad Street Main to Washington Street Bridge Main in vicinity of Tayco Street – Jennifer Schaff and Amy Vaclavik reviewed the agreements and timing of the various projects. All of the projects would be eligible for Safe Drinking Water funding except for Paris Street, and will be cause for a rate increase. Co-General Manager Dick Sturm added the rate increase application process has been started.

After discussion, the motion by Comm. Fahrbach, seconded by Comm. Guidote was unanimous on roll call to approve both the agreements for professional services with McMahon Engineers/ Architects.

Ms. Schaff and Ms. Vaclavik departed.

WPPI Annual Meeting – Mr. Dick Sturm added Individual Achievement Awards will be presented to Melanie Krause and Lonnie Pichler at the September 15 Annual Meeting; the deadline to RSVP is September 1.

Item IX. Project Reports, Bondholder Settlement and WPPI Energy Transaction and Telecommunications Update – there was nothing new to report on either item.

Water Projects – Mrs. Hubertus stated the water budget, including proposed rate increase, will be discussed at the regular September meeting in order to meet Safe Drinking Water deadlines.

Item X. Staff Reports, Co-General Manager/Engineering and Operations, Project Engineer – there were no additional questions to the reports presented.

Electric and Water Distribution/Safety Report – Electric and Water Distribution Supervisor Pichler reported on a possible induction lighting project grant for the City.

Telecommunications & Substations- there were no additional questions to the report presented.

Water Plant – Water Plant Supervisor Jerry Sturm stated Lake Winnebago water quality has been good this year and this is helping with the cost of chemicals.

Co-General Manager/Business Operations, Customer and Utility Services, and Energy Services Representative/Key Accounts – there were no additional questions to the reports presented.

Item XI. People from the Gallery to be heard on any items discussed at this Meeting. (five minute time limit for each person)

Tim Jacobson, 732 Paris Street, also commented on the impact of Act 10, and the Water Plant expansion.

Item XII. The motion by Comm. Guidote, seconded by Comm. Roush, was unanimously approved on roll call to adjourn at 7:00 p.m.

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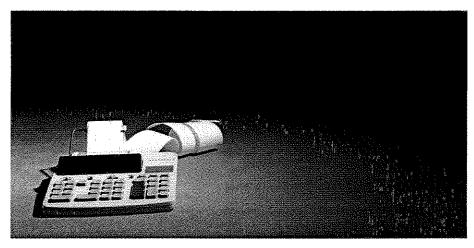
In the dark

The laws of physics are just part of the problem in making retail electric competition work. There's also the matter of market transparency so consumers can make informed choices. But a Pennsylvania political scientist and fan of free markets says the way things are now, consumers are too often kept in the dark.

Penn State professor Matthew Woessner says he was hopeful when Pennsylvania restructured its electric utilities back in the 1990s, but a lack of market transparency has hampered the ability of consumers to look out for their own best interests.

In an op-ed article last month for the Harrisburg Patriot-News, Woessner confessed to a "renewed appreciation for the virtues of regulatory oversight," acquired when his discount electricity provider charged him "more than twice the going rate" on his bill for the month of June.

Woessner blames "lax disclosure require-



ments" for alternative power suppliers that offer variable rates, saying they can "raise electricity prices practically at will." And unlike variable-rate mortgages, which he says tend to change gradually, "Swings in variable-rate utility prices can be sudden and dramatic."

The professor faults state regulators for allowing companies to post prices that bear little relation to the highest prices they have charged in recent months and being less than strict in requiring up-to-date information.

"As it stands now, variable-rate customers are playing a kind of Russian roulette, as they consume electrical power with little or no idea of how the energy will be billed at the end of the month." Woessner wrote.

He maintains the belief that a restructured market with deregulated retail prices can work but "only when electric consumers are provided with clear and consistent information." Woessner listed a number of reasons why those conditions don't exist in Pennsylvania today.

Longtime CFC board member Ceel retires

Customers First! wishes a long and happy retirement for Forrest Ceel, IBEW leader and CFC board member through the entire history of the organization in its present form.

Ceel has worked in the electric and gas utility industry since 1976. He became president of Local 2150 of the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers in 1997, served as its business representative since 1998, and was elected its business manager in 2009. The local is the largest in Wisconsin representing energy and utility workers; its 4,700 members are employed by investor-owned, municipal, cooperative, and contractor energy providers.

In addition to his service as a director

of Customers First!, Ceel has served on the Governor's Task Force on Energy Efficiency & Renewables; participated in a Legislative Council study of utility Public Benefits; represented Local 2150 since 1998 in legislative and regulatory proceedings aimed at improving the state's generation, transmission, and distribution systems; and served on the Governor's Task Force on Global Warming.

His idea of recreation is hiking to and camping at the bottom of the Grand Canyon, something he's done five times, and watching the Packers beat the Bears.

"Forrest's participation in the Customers First! Coalition will be greatly missed," said

CFC Executive Director Matt Bromley. "Utility workers are essential to ensuring safe, reliable,

and affordable electricity for Wisconsin's electric consumers. We look forward to building upon the legacy of collaboration with IBEW that Forrest has so effectively forged."

KEEPING CURRENT

U.S. government support for energy-related programs may plunge as Congress and President Obama follow through on the debt-reduction deal struck last month. Under the Budget Control Act of 2011, the Congressional Budget Office estimates that spending cuts would total at least \$2.1 trillion over the next 10 years. To reach this mark, the Act caps discretionary funding to generate more than \$900 billion in savings and creates a 12-member panel to identify and recommend to the president and Congress an additional \$1.2 trillion in program cuts or tax revenues.

Some of the federally supported programs that could take a hit include energy assistance for low-

income families and incentives for the development of renewable energy. Cuts to these programs could be substantial, especially when compared with the level of funding they received in recent years and from the economic stimulus bill enacted in 2009.

Even before the debt-reduction deal was reached, efforts were underway to scale back the amount of funding for the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP), a federally funded block grant for states to help low-income households pay for home energy costs. In his FY 2012 budget request to Congress, President Obama proposed slashing LIHEAP funding nearly in half from \$5.1 billion to \$2.75 billion. Under the president's budget, the average benefit for Wisconsin recipients would fall from \$455 in 2011 to \$202 in 2012. This amount, though,

may be further reduced if the 12-member deficit-reduction panel recommends deeper cuts to LIHEAP than the president proposed.

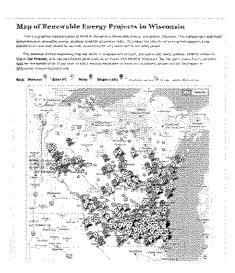
Uncertainty in government support is nothing new to the renewable energy sector. The wind-power industry has often had to ask Congress to extend the production tax credit (PTC—a per-kilowatt-hour tax credit for electricity generated from wind and other qualified resources). Enacted as part of the Energy Policy Act of 1992, the credit has gone through several cycles of expiration and renewal. The PTC is set to expire in 2012 and its fate beyond then could be decided in the debt reduction negotiations. Expect wind energy supporters to point to the positive impact on jobs as justification to renew the tax incentive.

The PTC may survive the debt reduction axe, but other programs are more vulnerable. The 2009 stimulus bill provided \$65 billion for clean energy, including loan guarantees for solar and wind power, funding for state programs to weatherize homes and make them more energy-efficient, research into battery-powered cars and trucks, and systems to capture carbon dioxide from power-plant emissions. By mid-2012, all the money should be spent. And, with the current fiscal mood in Washington, don't hold out much hope for more money to come.

More delays for carbon-capture projects

A series of public hearings early in June was supposed to pave the way for a long-awaited carbon capture and sequestration project in Illinois, but the U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) says it will conduct a second round of hearings next spring before deciding its next moves.

The DOE has committed to underwrite \$1 billion of the \$1.3 billion FutureGen project, in cooperation with an international consortium of coal companies called the FutureGen Alliance.

The Alliance would need to build a pipeline of approximately 30 miles to carry pressurized carbon dioxide from a modified power plant to its chosen underground disposal site near Jacksonville, Illinois. But the DOE's latest word is that a siting decision won't come before the fall of 2012.

The most recent slowdown for Future-Gen—a project that over the past decade has been delayed, cancelled outright at one point, and revived—became known shortly before American Electric Power's (AEP) mid-July decision to bail out of a \$668 million carbon capture plan it launched in 2009.

The Columbus, Ohio-based utility cited high costs in the decision to terminate the experiment at its Mountaineer Plant in West Virginia just after completing its first phase. AEP had been working on that initial phase, to capture and store CO2 emissions from 20 megawatts of generation, since 2003.

The project became operational in 2009 and AEP announced plans to go ahead with the larger, second phase, but according to a report

in *The Columbus Dispatch*, the company concluded that using existing carbon capture systems would consume a third of the plant's electricity output and double the cost of production compared with a plant fired by natural gas.

A DOE grant was expected to finance about half the cost of the cancelled second phase, which aimed at burying about 1.5 million tons of CO2 annually beginning in 2015.

The difficulty of broadly applying the technology on a commercial utility scale was summed up in a remark to *Platts Energy Week* by Joan MacNaughton, a senior executive with global utility equipment manufacturer Alstom.

MacNaughton told a *Platts* interviewer companies and investors won't move ahead with the technology unless it's mandated by governments.

Restructured Texas utilities come up short in the heat

The claims fly back and forth about the restructured Texas electricity market working just fine for consumers or taking them for a ride, depending on who's talking. One thing that's not a matter of opinion: Texas utilities were unable to manage the July heat wave without curtailing service, and rolling blackouts were barely avoided.

The Wall Street Journal reported, "The emergency shines a light on the vulnerabilities of Texas' deregulated market." Among other things, the Journal noted, "State officials have few tools to stimulate construction of new power plants."

In the three-fourths of the state where utilities have been restructured, regulators lack authority to order new generation built. And while generation operators typically schedule maintenance outages for spring or fall, when weather is milder and demand is less, as much as 5,000 megawatts of Texas generation capacity was off-line at times last month.

Another 1,000 megawatts unavailable on August 4 would have forced rolling blackouts, the *Journal* noted.

The Wire hasn't had time to search out data that might indicate a difference in performance between the restructured and non-restructured parts of Texas. It's an intriguing question and we aren't sure what to expect: It was hot everywhere.

But we do know the summer brought a widespread heat wave across the U.S. and peak demand records were falling on a daily and hourly basis for utilities all over the country. We know that happened in Wisconsin, where state policymakers decided early in the previous decade not to restructure our utilities—and where the big heat wave brought no reductions of service except through voluntary conservation programs.

Generation up, coal down, EIA finds

Overall electricity generation in the United States was up slightly—a bit less than 1 percent—in the first quarter of 2011, but the share of total output produced from coal was down, dropping to its lowest first-quarter percentage in more than three decades.

Those findings come from data released this summer by the federal government's Energy Information Administration (EIA). Coal-fired generation during the first quarter accounted for 46 percent of total generation nationwide, down from 49 percent in the same period last year and from 52 percent in the first quarter of 2008.

The gradual move away from coal, observed nationwide, was attributed not to a shift toward alternative energy sources but rather to natural gas, with gas prices having remained stable while the price of coal has climbed steadily for almost two years, the EIA noted.

Even in the Midwest, historically more dependent on coal than any other region, the trend is pronounced. EIA data show coal's share of generation in the region slipping from a percentage in the low 70s four years ago to just below 67 percent in the first quarter of this year.

Generation from natural gas in the Midwest gained two percentage points compared with the first quarter of 2010, the EIA said.

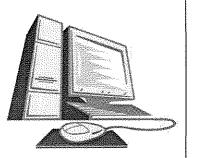

- Proceeding In Rem removes all liens of any mortgage or lien holder, including the ability a municipality to collect deferred special assessments by adding the deferred assessments to future tax bills. Failure of a municipality to pay the taxes and redeem the parcel forecloses their right or lien on the property.

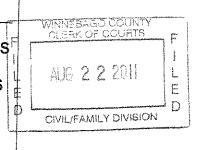

The Parks and Recreation Board has recommended that the seasonal slip rental rate at the Marina be raised from \$37.50 per foot to \$37.75 per foot in 2012. Harbormaster Schabach supports this action and would like to inform current and potential renters of the rates for next year as soon as possible. As you are aware, the NM Sewerage Commission is requesting that the City of Menasha make a decision regarding the financing of our portion of the project before the public hearing on their 2012 budget scheduled on September 27, 2011. We have made efforts to provide as much information as we could to the council as it was forwarded to the city including all commission minutes included within the common council packets. We have also invited commission representatives to two common council meetings, one in June and another in September. The commission also held a meeting for users on June 29th which city staff attended.

Unfortunately, the project continues to be somewhat of a moving target with project costs changing substantially between the June estimates, and the August letter to the communities, as well as between the letter to the communities and the Menasha Common Council presentation in September. While we commend the commission and engineering firm to seek out the best method and lowest cost to users, the changes continue to imply that there is risk of scope creep and project cost changes that may occur as the project continues to be vetted.

Earlier this morning we were informed that the commission took action to separate the sludge storage building from the rest of the project. Their action would include applying for separate funding and accelerating the construction schedule. The intent of this action would be to secure principle forgiveness on part of the loan amount. The project meets DNR standards for this program and could amount to as much as \$370,000 in savings for NMSC users on the project. Deadline for the application including principle forgiveness is Sept 30, 2011.

At the council meeting it was explained that the main change between the estimates in the August letter and that night was the elimination of a methane gas generator. Plans currently are to purchase a generator from operating revenues after collection of plant operation data for one year which will be used to design the correct size equipment. (see email)

Questions regarding the contingency fund and engineering costs breakouts are explained in the attached email. The engineering fees are comparable on a percentage basis to both the Neenah and Menasha drinking water plants, the contingency fund is larger.

The questions regarding risk for changes in project cost remain. The council will need to make a determination of what an acceptable risk is. The attached description from McMahon shows approximately 1/3 of the cost of the project is installation work.

As noted in the presentation bidding the equipment separately from the installation allows the commission to eliminate double mark ups, and select the equipment with the best life cycle costs for the community.

The likelihood of multiple bidders for the installation of the equipment minimizes the risk of excessive installation prices.

Completed design before bidding of installation reduces the likelihood of change orders on installation contracts.

A draft agency agreement regarding payment of the bonds has been completed and included with this memo.

It was noted during both discussions that the impact to the billing of residential customers would not be as high as shown because residential billings include both collection system and treatment system components. We have attached a six year estimation of billing for an average residential customer as well as the estimate of total billing changes for communities.

As of the date of this memo there is no information regarding a guarantee from Sonoco for their portion of the capital, however, the parties have met and discussions are continuing. In anticipation of this the City of Neenah made the following motion in relation to the funding of the project:

"Committee recommends Council approve financing the City of Neenah portion of the Neenah-Menasha Sewerage Plant Upgrade/Improvements Project utilizing Clean Water Fund Loans (CWF) in an amount not to exceed \$13 million dollars contingent on a guarantee from Sonoco for debt service payment and hold harmless guarantee for subsidy payment and if there is a cost increase in the project the City would be given the option to obtain Clean Water Funds to cover the increase"

If the council wishes to make a motion at this time I would recommend using the same language as the Neenah motion changing the maximum amount to \$5.5 million.

Mayor Merkes,

The Neenah-Menasha Sewerage Commission currently uses a methane gas generator in its anaerobic digestion system as a fuel for its boilers (building & digester heating) and for generating electricity under a green power agreement with WPPI.

Plant upgrade planning calls for increasing the capacity of our anaerobic digestion system. Current plans call for NMSC to replace the current boilers and heat exchangers. During this upgrading process and for 1-year after the upgrade is completed NMSC will continue to utilize the gas for heating and running the current methane engine to generate electricity. During the first years operation of the upgraded system NMSC will attempt to locate high strength waste that can be fed to the anaerobic digesters to generate extra gas. At the end of this first year NMSC will have accurate data as to the quantity of excess gas available such that replacement to the existing (and aging) methane engine can be appropriately sized and an accurate payback determined. We feel this staging method is the most prudent approach for NMSC at this time. Attached is the breakdown of the plant upgrade cost estimate in the format you requested.

Randy - just to follow up our conversation this afternoon regarding the Engineering & Contingencies, I'm summarizing our discussion.

The mayor of Menasha is asking how much the engineering will be and how much is contingency. We have not put together a contract for bidding and construction phase services yet. We plan to do so for the Biosolids project and for bidding the Equipment, and present them at the commission meeting on the 27th.

In ballpark terms, the amount of engineering and contingency \$5,163,000 may be split 50/50 between the two. The total for engineering may be approximated between \$2.5 million and 2.8 million, which breaks down into our \$981,000 design fee, plus \$1.519 million to \$1.819 million for bidding and construction phase services.

These services include: bidding pole building, Basic Construction Services for pole building, On-Site Rep for pole building, Start-Up Services for pole building, O&M Manual for pole building, Record Drawings for pole building, CWF assistance for pole building; Equipment bidding, Equipment Basic Construction Services, O&M, Start-Up, and CWF assistance for the Equipment, General Construction Bidding, Basic Construction Services for Construction, On-Site Rep for Construction, Start-Up Services for General Construction, O&M, and CWF assistance for General Construction.

WHEREAS, the NEENAH-MENASHA SEWERAGE COMMISSION (the 'Commission'), a commission created under Section 66.30, Wisconsin Statutes, pursuant to the Neenah-Menasha Sewerage Commission Ordinance-Contract (as amended June 2008), (the 'Contract'), which listed initial signers as the CITY OF NEENAH, CITY OF MENASHA, TOWN OF NEENAH, the former TOWN OF MENASHA SANITARY DISTRICT #1, the former TOWN OF NEENAH SANITARY DISTRICT #1, the former TOWN OF NEENAH SANITARY DISTRICT #12, TOWN OF NEENAH SANITARY DISTRICT #2, TOWN OF HARRISON and TOWN OF HARRISON SANITARY DISTRICT (proper name is Waverly Sanitary District) (the 'Member Communities') operates a Wastewater Treatment Facility (the 'System') as a public utility serving the Member Communities pursuant to the Ordinance-Contract.

WHEREAS, the Town of Menasha Sanitary District No. 4 has been dissolved, and the Town of Menasha has assumed its rights and obligations under the initial Ordinance-Contract and amendments; and

WHEREAS, the Town of Neenah Sanitary District No. 1 territory has been annexed into the City of Neenah which has assumed its rights and obligations under the Ordinance-Contract; and

WHEREAS, the Town of Neenah Sanitary District No. 1-1 territory has been annexed into the City of Neenah which has assumed its rights and obligations under the Ordinance-Contract; and

WHEREAS, the Town of Harrison was always a limited contracting municipality to the original Section 66.30 Ordinance-Contract and as stated in the June 2008 Amendment is only a party for the purpose of granting easements and not a party for any financial responsibility; and

- 1.a. Disbursement Of Bond Proceeds. The Commission shall make requests for disbursement of the proceeds of the Bonds (the 'Bond Proceeds') to the State of Wisconsin CWF program in accordance with the Financial Assistance Agreements and the Bond Resolutions.
- 1.b. Receipt Of Bond Proceeds. The Commission shall accept disbursements of Bond Proceeds from the State of Wisconsin CWF program pursuant to the Financial Assistance Agreements and the Bond Resolutions, shall deposit the Bond Proceeds into the respective Project Funds established by the Member Communities pursuant to the Bond Resolution and shall expend the Bond Proceeds on costs of the Project as more fully described in the Financial Assistance Agreements and the Bond Resolutions.
- 1.c. Administration Of Funds. The Commission shall administer the funds enumerated in the Bond Resolutions in accordance with the provisions of the Bond Resolutions and the Financial Assistance Agreements. The Commission shall administer the Operation and Maintenance Funds and the Surplus Funds established in the Bond Resolutions as single funds and shall maintain separate Debt Service Funds for the Member Communities.
- 1.d. The charges imposed on the Member Communities under the Ordinance Contract will include as a component the total amount of debt service due on the Bonds issued by the Member Communities. The amount of debt service charged to each municipality will be determined on the basis of usage of the Commission facilities in accordance with the general formula for allocation of costs under the Ordinance Contract. The Commission will allocate the amounts received with respect to debt service to the individual Debt Service Funds so the amount on deposit in each Debt Service Fund is sufficient to pay the principal and interest payable on the Member Communities' bonds, respectively.
- 1.e. Payment On The Bonds. The Commission shall make payments of principal and interest on the Bonds to the State Of Wisconsin CWF program from the Debt Service Funds created by the Bond Resolutions in accordance with the repayment schedules provided to the Commission by the Member Communities. Notwithstanding the provision of Section 1.d., above, if the amounts deposited in the Debt Service Funds are not sufficient to pay debt on the Bonds, the Member Communities each will remain responsible for payment of the debt service on the Bonds they issued.

Section 2. Observance Of Financial Assistance Agreements And Bond Resolutions. In performing its obligations under this Agreement, the Commission shall observe and not violate, nor shall it cause the Member Communities to violate or fail to observe, any provisions of the Financial Assistance Agreements or the Bond Resolutions. The Commission shall also operate and manage the project in such a manner so as to observe and not violate, or cause the Member Communities to violate or fail to observe, any provisions of the Financial Assistance Agreements or the Bond Resolutions. Section 3. Allocation Of Revenues To Debt Service Funds. To the extent of the debt service requirements of the Bonds, the Net Revenues of the System allocable to the Member Communities shall be deposited in the Debt Service Funds for the Bonds according to the following proportions: 3.a % to the City Of Neenah Debt Service Fund: 3.b. % to the City Of Menasha Debt Service Fund; % to the Town Of Neenah Sanitary District #2 Debt Service Fund; 3.c. 3.d. % to the Town Of Menasha Debt Service Fund. and % to the Waverly Sanitary District Debt Service Fund; 3.e. Section 4. Definitions. Any capitalized items used in this Agreement, which are not defined herein, shall have the meanings given them in the Bond Resolutions. Section 5. Term Of The Agreement. This Agreement shall bind the parties and shall not terminate until all of the Bonds have either been discharged or defeased, as provided for in the Bond Resolutions. In the event that any portion of this Agreement shall become unenforceable or cease to bind the parties for any reason, the Member Communities shall each perform, with respect to their respective Bonds, any obligations under the Bond Resolutions or Financial Assistance Agreements, which the Commission has become unable to perform. Section 6. Severability Of Provisions. The invalidity of any provision of this Agreement shall not affect the validity of any other provision.

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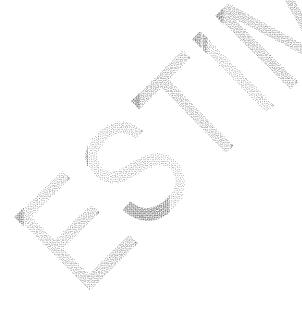
