# 2013 Spring Conference

The annual Wisconsin Association of Historic Preservation Commissions' Spring Conference will be held April 27, 2013 at the Milton House in Milton.

In 1838, Joseph Goodrich filed a claim for the land that was to become the city of Milton. He started construction of the Milton House in 1844. Goodrich designed a hexagonal tower and a long wing that extended from it; creating arguably the first concrete building in the United States. He constructed it with a mixture of sand, lime cement and gravel in a wet mixture, which he poured into wooden forms to create a fireproof material. The Milton House was the source and inspiration for Orson Squire Fowler's The Octagon House: A Home for All, which sparked the octagon fad of the mid-nineteenth century.

Joseph Goodrich, a staunch abolitionist and member of the Seventh Day Baptist Church. Goodrich also constructed a dirt tunnel between the inn and the 1837 log cabin to the rear of the inn. Goodrich secretly harbored runaway slaves in the cellar of the Milton House using the tunnel as the exit and entrance to the cellar.

Here he and his family would provide assistance to them. Goodrich and his family also conducted freedom seekers to other stops as they continued the journey toward the Great Lakes and on to Canada.

The House is owned and operated by the Milton Historical Society. It was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1972 and was granted National Historic Landmark status in 1998. It is also a Recognized Station on the Underground Railroad, by the National Park Service: National Underground Railroad Network to Freedom

### VA "Soldiers Home" Named as National Treasure

The cluster of historic buildings known as the "Soldiers Home" located on the campus of Milwaukee's Clement Zablocki VA Medical Center has been named a National Treasure by the National Trust for Historic Preservation. National Treasures are irreplaceable and threatened places where the National Trust is making a significant investment of resources to protect these places, promote their history and significance and engage local preservationists to help advance the cause of preservation nationally. To help raise awareness of these buildings and the threats they face, and encourage the



public to get involved in the effort to preserve them, the National Trust and its partners are launching a series of new initiatives.

## Sustainability Grant Awarded to Namur Belgian Heritage Foundation

The Door County Community Foundation recently presented a Sustainability Grant to the Namur Belgian Heritage Foundation. The grant is part of an ongoing effort to restore St. Mary of the Snows, a church that was founded in 1860. The St. Mary of the Snows Church has been rechristened as the Belgian Heritage Center. This grant of \$1,500 is being used to help convert the sacristy of the former church into a community kitchen.

St. Mary of the Snows was where Abbot Bernard Pennings first served after arriving in the United States. Pennings would later go on to found St. Norbert College in DePere, Wisconsin.

Changes Made to Milwaukee's Historic Preservation Ordinance

Changes in how Milwaukee buildings are designated as historic, including a provision to allow economic hardship claims to try to avoid preservation work, were unanimously approved in December 2012 by the Common Council.

The city preservation ordinance says buildings designated as historic can't be demolished or have their exteriors

changed without approval from the Historic Preservation Commission. Any denials by the commission can be overturned by a two-thirds council vote. The revised ordinance adds requirements for the commission and its staff to take various actions within specific time frames, and provides more details on appeal procedures.

Also, the ordinance now includes a provision allowing property owners to claim economic hardship to avoid preservation requirements. It contains a specific hardship rule, and requires owners to provide information about the building's value, income and other business aspects.

Other proposed changes include providing city building inspectors with enforcement powers to prevent owners of historic properties from allowing them to deteriorate to the point where

The changes were sponsored by Alderman Bob Bauman, a preservation commission member, and Alderman Terry Witkowski. They called it a compromise, with Bauman saying the economic hardship provision is "a bitter pill" for preservationists because it opens the door for more attempts to avoid preserving historic structures.

The preservation ordinance was part of last year's debate over whether some 19th-century buildings should be demolished to make way for a 200room Marriott hotel near the southwest corner of E. Wisconsin Ave. and N. Milwaukee St.

# Priorities Discussed for Plum and Pilot Islands

The Friends of Plum and Pilot Islands (FOPPI) met with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) in Horicon and via teleconference on December 8, 2012 to discuss setting priorities for the Green Bay National Wildlife Refuge located in northern Door County, Wisconsin. These two groups formed a partnership in 2007 when jurisdiction of Plum and Pilot Islands was transferred from the Coast Guard to USFWS.

Plum Island's historic 1896 life-saving station is in need of attention. A contractor has stabilized the front porch of the building earlier this fall. The restoration of the porch will be finished in the spring of 2013. Money has been set aside to replace the windows in the watchtower of the unique Duluth-style station, the only one remaining on the Great Lakes. It was further decided to restore the interior and exterior of the structure's watch room from the decorative cornices to the tip of its roof. It is hoped this project will continue to draw attention to the importance of preserving the rich maritime history of both Plum and Pilot Islands. A fund-raising effort needs to be directed at the rest of the life-saving station's roof in order to keep the building protected from the elements. 1929 has been selected as the period of interpretation for this building.

Materials have been purchased for the stabilization of the Pilot Island Fog Signal Building. Its roof has completely collapsed. FOPPI will seek to hire a contractor willing to remove the collapsed debris



and construct bracing to support the walls from crumbling, thus buying time until more money can be raised to rebuild the roof.

All of the buildings on Plum and Pilot Islands are listed on the National Register of Historic Places. That means stabilization and restoration work planned must first receive approval from the State Historic Preservation Officer in order to comply with the Secretary of the Interior's standards for the rehabilitation of historic buildings.

FOPPI has submitted a grant application to the Wisconsin Coastal Management Program for an evaluation of the Plum Island boathouse pilings, pier, walkway, and breakwater. An announcement is expected in April of 2013 as to whether or not the application was approved. This is a step toward ensuring the safety of volunteers and other visitors to Plum Island. Public access to this island is expected following the approval of a 15-year management plan currently being reviewed in Washington, D.C.

More work is on tap for Plum Island's trails during the summer of 2013. Another priority is the addition of an outdoor bathroom facility. If you would like to get involved with the Friends group, please visit: www.plumandpilot.org or https://www.facebook.com/ plumandpilot.
