## The Badger Bounce Back Plan

- The "Badger Bounce Back" plan outlines criteria for Wisconsin to be able to open its economy in phases and includes steps to make sure workers and businesses are prepared to reopen as soon as it's safe to do so.
- Safer at Home remains in effect. The Badger Bounce Back plan does not modify, alter or supersede the Safer at Home order. However, orders instituting phases of the Badger Bounce Back Plan may be issued prior to the expiration of the Safer at Home order, if appropriate under the criteria stated in the plan.
- To dial down Safer at Home and supercharge the Badger Bounce Back plan, we need to:
  - \* Reduce the number of cases and symptoms reported.
  - \* Increase lab capacity and testing.
  - \* Increase contact tracing.
  - \* Track the spread of COVID-19.
  - \* Increase health care capacity.
  - \* Procure more personal protective equipment.

## **COVID-19 FAQ**

#### Are the symptoms of COVID-19 different in children than adults?

No. The symptoms of COVID-19 are similar in children and adults. However, children with confirmed COVID-19 have generally presented with mild symptoms. Reported symptoms in children include cold-like symptoms, such as fever, runny nose, and cough. Vomiting and diarrhea have also been reported. It's not known yet whether some children may be at higher risk for severe illness, for example, children with underlying medical conditions and special healthcare needs. There is much more to be learned about how the disease impacts children.
