I ran my campaign on leadership and an optimistic approach emphasizing three basic priorities; Public Safety, Critical Infrastructure, and Businesses and Jobs. Here are some highlights on those topics;

- If you have not noticed the increased "street presence" of your Police Officers, you haven't been looking. Our newly "beefed up" department is making a difference in both visibility and in criminals taken off the streets. When the County jail is completed in 2017 the affect will be even more noticeable. We will soon have an Officer qualified in Commercial Vehicle Enforcement by the State Patrol. Letting over-weight/ illegal truckers know that slipping down Highway 9 and through our town will result in strict enforcement will reduce the potential for accidents and damage to our streets.
- Sedro-Woolley has done a great job in leading the growth that is coming to town. We continue to leverage State and Federal funds to improve arterial streets and traffic flow through and around our City while conserving scarce local funding. This summer will see the State Route 9/Jameson / Rhodes Road round-about project (safer for school busses, students, and pedestrians), Trail/Sidewalk enhancements along State route 20 from Hodgin Road to SR9 (improved safety along SR20 corridor and Cascade Trail), repave of Ferry Street to include sidewalk improvements, and the design phase of Fruitdale Road enhancements and repair.
- Progress continues at the former
  Northern State site as our partners:
  Department of Enterprise Services
  (DES), Port of Skagit, and Skagit County
  work with us to establish mutually
  acceptable terms for future research,

technology, and manufacturing uses. It is a complicated process; the first effort of this kind ever attempted in Washington State. I remain optimistic that together we will clear all the hurdles necessary to realize the potential of a Janicki Bioenergy technology and development center on the

property. This synergistic approach ensures respect for historic aesthetics while bringing jobs and opportunities to our community. Success has the potential to revitalize the City and reinvigorate our historical role as a center of innovation and manufacturing.

Let us not forget the fun side of government; working with our schools, community leaders, service organizations, and citizens to create a better community; doing things the "Woolley Way." Nobody gets more done through volunteerism and cooperation than Sedro-Woolley. It is true historically and it is true today.

- Partnering with our school district and local industry, Sedro-Woolley is the first member of the Washington State STEM (Science, Technology. Mathematics, and Engineering) Network in Skagit County. This is an important and unique opportunity to build futures for our students on a local level. "We believe our best employees can come from the schools in Sedro-Woolley, and the STEM Network provides an incredible opportunity for our youth." (Peter Janicki, Janicki Bioenergy)
- Dedicated parents, coaches, athletic clubs and service organizations in cooperation with the City are working to build and improve facilities at Tesarik, Winnie Houser, and Janicki Fields. These are projects that could not have been completed using only City resources. They provide safe and healthy options which keep our kids occupied and engaged in the fabric of our community. My hat is off to the many, many partners that help keep Sedro-Woolley moving ahead.

### Downtown revitalization key to a successful Sedro-Woolley

THE CITY COUNCIL MET FOR A FULL DAY retreat on March 14th, 2016. This biennial event is intended as the time for councilmembers to articulate their goals and vision for the upcoming two years. Along with the city council and mayor, attendees to the retreat included all seven of the city's department heads and me.

Conversation was wide ranging and began with reports from each department

head. The city's economics and economic health were also addressed in some detail followed by the council's discussion and prioritization of city resources. Much of the conversation from department heads included concern about staffing. During the recession, city departments cut staff and moved to a "do more with less" model. Now that recovery is well underway and demands for services are increasing, departments are stretched as they struggle to meet current demands. Customer service and the provision of excellent municipal services remains our primary goal at city hall and throughout the city's staff.

Councilmembers expressed concern about staffing as it relates to the delivery of services such as safe parks, drivable streets, walkable sidewalks, etc., and moved fairly quickly to a conversation about funding. While taxes and fees are options available to the city council to fund critical services, the council spent most of its time talking about ways to improve the whole economy in Sedro-Woolley thereby growing tax revenue without increasing taxes. Downtown revitalization came out as a priority objective with the belief that growth in and around the city, including commercial growth on SR 20, will be encouraged and supported by a healthy, vibrant and economically diverse central business district.

Stay tuned for more information on downtown revitalization as this becomes a topic of discussion at city council meetings. We will begin with a review of past plans and projects intended to revitalize downtown and move from there to an updated plan that will include downtown property owners, businesses and residents as well as the general public.

### How are we doing?

The City of Sedro-Woolley prides itself on providing excellent customer service which includes reaching out to our residents and businesses with current information on projects and newsworthy events within the City. That's why the mayor and city council have decided to embark on a city magazine that will communicate in a format that we hope our readers find interesting and beneficial. 

id you know, the Sedro-Woolley Public Works
Department includes Engineering design and review,
Public Works Operations (Parks, Facilities, Streets,
Stormwater and Cemetery Divisions), Solid Waste (including Yard
Waste, Recycle and Fleet Operations) and Wastewater (including
the Wastewater Treatment Facility and Collections). The total

number of full time employees is 25, with a part time mechanic and the part time Offender Work Program supervisor. In addition, we employ seasonal workers when the work load increases to assist with summer operations at Streets (1 total), Stormwater (1 total), Parks (4 total with additional 1 part time for flower baskets), Facilities (1 total), Solid Waste (1 total) and at the Wastewater Treatment Facility (1 total). The Offender Work Program, a unique and fiscally effective approach to filling in the City's resource gaps, has been in effect for 6 years. It is typically a consistent workforce used to keep downtown clean, picking up trash, cleaning sidewalks, weeding planters and maintaining the City stormwater ponds. Public Works Operations also oversees the Riverfront Park, Bingham Park and soon to be implemented Memorial Park Caretaker positions, and the Riverfront Park RV host. The total for all full, part time and seasonal positions is 37 employees.

### Public Works 2015 Accomplishment Highlights and 2016 Projects

- Funding secured for the Jameson Arterial Extension to SR9 Project, the SR20/Cascade Trail Phases 1A and 1B Project, and the Ferry Street Overlay Project, to be constructed in 2016. Total value of the work is \$4,388,000.
- Funding secured for the Fruitdale Road Arterial Improvements Project Design Phase at \$300,000.
- · Riverfront Park Playground (completed 2015)
- · Houser Playfields (complete in 2016)
- Babe Ruth Baseball Field Relocation (complete in 2016)
- Memorial Park Caretaker Residence (complete in 2016)
- Partnered with Rotary to upgrade Metcalf Playfields/Tesarik Little League Field including the new restroom facility (complete in 2016)
- Chip sealed 1.5 lane miles of Local Access Streets.
- Maintained the Stormwater Utility System under our NPDES Stormwater Permit. Performed annual maintenance on the system, which includes 1,920 catch basins, 22 flow control or water quality systems, 207,304 lineal feet of gravity and force main pipelines and culverts, 58,835 lineal feet of ditch, two stormwater pump stations, and 24,500 lf of Brickuard Creek.
- In house design and construction of the Greenstreet-Virginia-Dean Sewer and Roadway Project, with a final cost of \$688,185.
- In house design and construction of the John Liner Road Sewer Pump Station Upgrade Project, with a final cost of \$72,919.
- Maintained the Sanitary Sewer Collection System, which includes an annual program of video inspection and cleaning as needed. The system consists of 229,900 lineal feet of collector and transmission pipes ranging from 6" to 36" in diameter, with associated manholes and 11 Sewer Pump Stations.
- Restored drainage on failed systems on F&S Grade Road and from Central to Reed Streets.
- Assumed the Recycling and Yard Waste Programs on the expiration of the Waste Management contract, saving ratepayers from a rate increase planned by the contractor.
- Assumed 159 additional solid waste accounts (Carter Street vicinity).
- Managed ERR Fund equipment replacements and upgrades including police cruisers, fire engine, two solid waste trucks, asphalt pothole patching equipment, and an asphalt compactor, with total purchases of \$1,056,417.

As is evident from the list above, Public Works is working hard to keep our city moving forward. Please follow upcoming public notices on new projects and let us know how we are doing.

### Pedestrian and Bicycle SAFETY MATTERS!

THE CITY OF SEDRO-WOOLLEY HAS RECEIVED **FUNDING** to construct a 10-foot wide concrete shared use path (sidewalk) along the north side of SR 20 between Hodgin Road and the end of the new sidewalk at the SR 9 South intersection. In addition to the

sidewalk construction, the project also includes upsizing the existing storm drain main line from approximately 500-feet west of Trail Road east to SR 9 South. All of the work will be within the SR 20 right of way.

This project will complete a section of the Cascade Trail between Sedro-Woolley and Burlington, and will provide pedestrian and non-motorized access from Hodgin Road to West Ferry Street, the SKAT Transit hub and the downtown area. This improvement will greatly enhance the pedestrian access to the businesses located along the

north side of SR 20 between Ferry Street and Hodgin Road. The new path will connect to the existing shared use path running 1.3 miles on the north side of SR20 from SR9 South to SR 9 North/Township Street. When complete, the path will span 1.9 miles across the core of the city. Future projects will extend the path west to the city limits at Collins Road, and east to the city limits at Fruitdale Road.

The project is expected to take approximately three months to construct with a start date scheduled for early July 2016 and finishing around the end of September 2016. The construction costs are estimated at \$860,000 and funded by the city's Transportation Impact Fee (\$86,000), Skagit County Economic Development funds (\$220,000), and state and federal funding sources (\$555,000).

Sedro-Woolley Public Works is known for getting projects done, which is why the city has been so successful in obtaining funding from state and federal transportation funding agencies. In Woolley we make it happen!



### **JAMESON** ARTERIAL **EXTENSION** TO SR9

STATE ROUTE 9 SOUTH OF STATE ROUTE 20 IN **SEDRO-WOOLLEY** will be getting a much needed makeover this year. This project began back in 2008 with a commitment by White Pass Investments, LLC, owner of the former mill site located east of SR9 at 1215 State Route 9 to donate right of way between Batey Street and SR9 that will allow extension of Jameson Street directly to SR9 and Rhodes Road. This project has been a top ranked project of the city's Transportation Plan since that time. Once complete, this project will provide safety improvements for school bus traffic, pedestrians, and bicyclists and it will open up access to 50 acres of underutilized industrial property, increasing its desirability

for investment and development. The **Jameson Arterial Extension to SR9** Project includes a new roundabout intersection at Jameson Street and SR9, extension of Jameson Street across the mill site from Batey to SR9, and realignment of Rhodes Road to the new intersection. The project will enhance access to Jameson by eliminating the existing dog leg connection from Jameson to SR9 via Batey and West Nelson and the uncontrolled intersection at SR9, providing an attractive east-west arterial alternative to the congested SR20 corridor. The project will provide a safe pedestrian crossing of SR9 for children walking or biking to Sedro-Woolley High School from neighborhoods on Rhodes Road west of SR9. It will also greatly improve access to SR9 and Rhodes Road from Jameson for school buses traveling to and from Sedro-Woolley High School.

The city has hosted two public open house meetings, one on July 8, 2015 and a second on March 2, 2016. The Sedro-Woolley School district has been an active supporter and partner since the beginning of project inception; additionally both Skagit County and WSDOT have provided support for the project.

The estimated project cost is \$3,174,000 including \$462,000 in right of way donations. Skagit County Economic Development funds were used for preliminary design in 2009. The Skagit Council of Governments awarded federal STP funds totaling \$225,000 for the final design phase and \$700,000 for the construction phase of the project. The Transportation Improvement Board (TIB) awarded \$1,725,000 in state gasoline tax funds that provided the final construction funding needed for the project. Total grant funding from TIB and federal transportation funds is \$2,650,000. The city's matching funds for the project total \$56,000. Our partner the Sedro-Woolley School District is contributing \$6,000 for sidewalk improvements near the High School. The project design is complete, and has been advertised for bids to close on March 31, 2016. Construction is scheduled to take place between May and November 2016.

### Great Things Are Happening!

IE RIIII DING PERMIT ACTIVITY IS CONSIDERED AN **ECONOMIC INDICATOR**, then economic recovery and prosperity is apparent in Sedro-Woolley. Building activity increased to pre-recession levels in 2015 and that trend is expected to continue through 2016. The Building Department issued 40 new single-family building permits in 2015 compared to a total

of 23 permits in 2013 and 2014 combined. Local property owners have also have expressed interest in developing mixeduse commercial developments that will provide housing and work space options for the growing technology sector. In 2015 The Planning Department was also busy with major land use projects such as the annexation the former Northern State Campus into City limits along with a handful of residential properties (approximately 230 acres); adoption of a subarea plan and approval of a Planned Action Environmental Impact Statement for the future redevelopment of the Center for

Innovation and Technology (formally known as Northern State); and adoption of six municipal code amendments – all of which were completed to promote the development of a destination mixed use campus accommodating education, research and development, manufacturing, hospitality, commercial uses and future headquarters for Janicki Bioenergy.

In addition to the land-use permitting related to the Center for Innovation and Technology, the Planning Department and Planning Commission have been working on updates to the Sedro-Woolley Comprehensive Plan and Urban Growth Area boundaries. Washington State Growth Management Act (GMA) requires that the cities in Skagit County periodically update their Comprehensive Plans. ### AN EFFECTIVE EMERGENCY RESPONSE BEGINS

**WITH** the action taken in the initial minutes of an emergency which are critical. A call for help to emergency services that provide full and accurate information will help the fire department respond with the appropriate apparatus and number of personnel. National Fire Protection Association, (NFPA) sets professional standards. One of which is NFPA 1710, this standard is regarding response times. First responders need to arrive at the emergency within 4 minutes of the dispatch time 90% of the time. It is the goal of every department to meet these standards and Sedro-Woolley is proud to state that Sedro-Woolley Fire Department meets this response standard within the City of Sedro-Woolley. The 2015 statistics for number and type of calls are shown in in the following page.


Upon scene of any emergency there is a certain expectation of professionalism that

our citizens, staff and NFPA expect. This level of service takes a great dedication of time and training of our firefighter. Our Volunteers firefighters train approximately 60 hours a year. Those hours does not include the initial training of the fire academy or specialty training such as Hazardous Materials Technician or Confine Space Rescue Technician in which several members are certified in. Much of the annual training is with our neighboring fire district, for we respond to several of their calls for them through a contracted agreement or through a county wide mutual aid agreement. Sedro-Woolley Fire Department believes if we work together we should train together.

Finally we would like to thank our citizens for their support, not only financial support through tax dollars but moral support in the numerus letters we have received.

THE 2016 SEDRO-WOOLLEY POLICE DEPARTMENT is a new and improved agency with a lot to offer. Our Department has changed radically in the last two years, the previous Chief, Doug Wood, retired in 2014 and I was appointed to the position. My name is Lin Tucker; I am a 23 year veteran of this Department, coming to Sedro-Woolley

after 7 years in the Navy. With eight new Officers, one new Code Enforcement Officer, one new Receptionist/Records Clerk and a part time Transcriptionist, we are fully staffed at a level that we have never seen in the history of the City.

We have a current commissioned staff of seventeen Officers and three Reserve Officers. This number of people allows us to participate in the County SWAT Team, the Multiple Agency Negotiation Team, the Skagit

Multi-Agency Response Team and several other training positions that give the people of Sedro-Woolley some of the best trained and prepared Police Officers anywhere.

Did you know that seven of us regularly teach classes at Skagit Valley College? Most of these are in the Law Enforcement and Parks Academy, but I teach a Cartooning and Sketching class in the Continuing Education Department.

All of the things that we do, help prepare all of us to better serve the people of Sedro-Woolley. That service includes a Chief that regularly responds to calls and has a hand in the daily policing of the City. We are in a unique position. We aren't a little town anymore, we are a small City. Big enough to have some of the same problems that major cities have, but small enough that you can walk to City Hall and get in to see the Mayor or Police Chief when you need.

I attribute the success of our Department to the support we receive from the citizens, the City Council, the Mayor, the City Supervisor and the City Employees that keep things running.

IN 2014, THE CITY OF SEDRO-WOOLLEY GAINED A VALUABLE RESOURCE when we hired Laura Carr as the Code Enforcement Officer. We were sorely lacking in the area of City Code compliance and several problem properties needed to be addressed. Officer Carr took on the task, bringing a wealth of experience in the areas of Code Enforcement, Animal Control and as a Reserve Police Officer.

Officer Carr works within the Police Department but in conjunction with the **Building and Planning Department to** ensure that problems are solved. We have taken the approach of using whatever City Department is most appropriate to solve City Code problems; Officer Carr is often called on


to lead and organize these City resources. We work with property owners to resolve issues as quickly and easily as possible.

A sizable portion

of Officer Carr's time is devoted to Animal Control. She has a wealth of experience in this area and has developed working relationships with the area Veterinarian clinics and Animal Rescue/ Shelters. She uses these relationships as well as those she's established with local businesses to care for lost and abandoned animals.

Did you know that it doesn't cost anything to get a dog license in the City of Sedro-Woolley? All you have to do is stop by the Police Department and fill out an information card. We have a rather large Kennel area where we temporarily house lost/found animals, until they can be returned to the owners. In 2015, roughly 82% of the animals recovered by Officer Carr were returned to the owner or placed with a new family.

Not all animal recoveries go as planned, in 2015, this clever character took over my car, while we were trying to catch her. The other picture is a recovered lost dog prior to its return to the owner.

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### CONCEALED PISTOL LICENSE

### We Aim To Keep You Safe! BY CHIEF WILLIAM "LIN" TUCKER

IN THIS UNCERTAIN WORLD, a lot of people are getting their Concealed Pistol License. This has prompted me to send out a reminder to those folks who are carrying their con-

Be aware of your surroundings, just because you are carrying a firearm does not guarantee safety. We wear armor at work that will, at least, stop the round in the weapon we carry. Officers are disarmed and killed with their own weapon regularly. Think before introducing a firearm into a potentially volatile situation, it might not be the answer. It may be a better idea to not be where you're at and getting to a safer place.

Do your research and know when it's appropriate to use a firearm to defend yourself. We have the terms Reasonable and Necessary drummed into our heads from the Police Academy on, throughout our entire career. If you look at all of the controversial and/or tragic events involving Police Officers and shootings, there's always a question as to whether that shooting was Reasonable and Necessary.

Think about why you want to carry a firearm and what type of scenario would prompt you to draw your weapon. Then think, "Would it be better for all involved if I was an excellent witness and called 911 or is there an immediate threat to someone's safety and there's no reasonably effective alternative to using force???"

There are a lot of places that offer training and support in Concealed Carry and Firearms Training, check them

out. This is a serious issue and deserves serious consideration.

Firearms are not dangerous; irresponsible people, fools, ignorance, people with no thought for the consequences of their actions and people intent on doing bad things are dangerous. In



other words, humans and their actions can be dangerous.

Safely secure your weapons when they are not on your person. If you have mini-humans at home and think your secret hiding spot is safe, think again. Your kids or grandkids will find anything; don't be the person who let this happen.

#### KNOW THE BASIC FIREARMS SAFETY RULES:

- Treat all firearms as if they were loaded.
- Keep your finger off the trigger until your sights are on target and you're ready to fire.
- Don't point your weapon at anything you are not willing to kill or destroy.
- Be sure of your backstop and what is beyond it.

# Quality of Like

HE CONCEPT IS SIMPLE: IN THE 21ST **CENTURY, STEM** (science, technology, engineering, and math) education opens doors for every student to succeed. Washington State has more STEM jobs than any other state but the state is not creating enough applicants for those living-wage jobs. Currently, there are 25,000 unfilled jobs in Washington due to a lack of qualitied candidates (2013). Eighty percent of those jobs are in high-demand health care and STEM fields, such as computer science and engineering. Washington ranks #1 in the nation in the concentration of STEM jobs. By 2018, we will see a 24% increase in STEM jobs and our students need to be ready for these job opportunities.

To meet this growing need, the Sedro-Woolley School District, in partnership with the City of Sedro-Woolley, applied for and was the recipient of a \$30,000 grant from Washington STEM to create a plan to establish a STEM Network in Sedro-Woolley. This STEM Network will be the first of its kind north of Snohomish County and will create a niche the community can call its own. The initial planning partners and community based organization partners include the City of Sedro-Woolley, Sedro-Woolley School District, Port of Skagit, EDASC (Economic Development Association of Skagit County), Skagit Valley College and Janicki Industries.

Why Sedro-Woolley? Sedro-Woolley has been a leader in world-changing technology for more than a century. With global companies such as the Skagit Corporation, Snelson, and Janicki Industries, Sedro-Woolley is home to the world's leaders in composites and other innovations. And thanks to Janicki Bioenergy's Omni Processor, Sedro-Woolley is also on the leading edge of sanitation technology. The STEM Network planning process coincides

with the redevelopment of the Northern State campus as a Center for Innovation and Technology in the Pacific Northwest. With Janicki Bioenergy expected to be the Center's first tenant, it is anticipated that more than 1,000 STEM jobs could be located at the Center within the next five years!


The Sedro-Woolley School Board of Directors recently updated the district's strategic road map to include a vision of "graduates will apply their knowledge and skills of communication, collaboration, critical thinking and life to become competent, productive, contributing citizens of the 21st Century." This vision aligns perfectly with the STEM Network.

So what does this all mean for students in the district? As I recently stated, "This STEM grant and Network builds on our commitment to

educational excellence and preparing our children for exciting careers in innovation. The STEM Network will facilitate the creation of long-term focus on addressing the needs of the community when it comes to preparing future generations for economic success and will create greater connections between our students and local industry."

The move toward STEM classes was already taking place in the district such as engineering classes



The founding families of the towns that would become both Sedro and Woolley, and eventually Sedro-Woolley, humbly celebrated the area's first 4th of July celebration in 1886 by reading the Declaration of Independence. By the 1890s both towns were booming, and July 4th celebrations more grand... "On that day (July 4th, 1890), in the presence of probably 40 people, a fir flag pole 104 feet was raised, a new flag, presented by Mr. Woolley, soon floated. At Sedro, that same day, pioneers in the older town celebrated the Fourth by trimming a gigantic cedar tree as a flag pole at a height of 226 feet. That accomplished, Old Glory, 40 by 16 feet in size, manufactured by the ladies of the Sedro community, was flung to the breeze amid the acclamations of the patriotic spectators."


In 1948 Loggerodeo got its name and over the years Sedro-Woolley Loggerodeo has become the key event to mark the Fourth of July in Skagit County. In recent years Sedro-Woolley Loggerodeo has been acclaimed by the Washington




