



# Trails

## 12 Moore Street/Highway 20 Shared Use Path

Moore Street (Highway 20) shared use path runs along the north side of SR 20 from Township street westward to Hodgkin Street. This path is also a paved path within the city right-of-way along Moore Street, but separated from the road by a planting strip. This path creates a vital cross-town pedestrian and bicycle corridor that enables alternate forms of transportation to the goods and services located along State Route 20 and in the Central Business District. Future plans include extending this path west along SR20 connecting to the City of Burlington Arboreta Trail.

## 13 Fruitdale/McGarigle Road/State Route 9 Shared Use Path

The Fruitdale / McGarigle Road path system is a paved, off-road path within the city right-of-way along Fruitdale road from State Route 20 to McGarigle Road, then westward parallel to McGarigle Road to State Route 9. The path connects to the Cascade Trail at S.R. 20 and connects to Olmsted Park and the path system within the SWIFT Center campus & Northern State Recreation area. Long term public works plans are to continue the path westward within the John Liner Road right-of-way.

## 14 Swift Center/Northern State Recreation Area Trail

The SWIFT Center, owned by the Port of Skagit County, and NSRA owned by Skagit County Parks has an extensive trail system that is in ongoing development. Several miles of trails are completed, and new trails are always under construction. The trails are made up of crushed gravel surfacing, dirt, and several bridges. The trail system offers wildlife and nature viewing. Olmsted Park located at 1451 N. Fruitdale Rd serves as one of the starting points/trailheads for the trail system. There is a 2nd trailhead for the network of trails located at 25749 Helmick Rd, and a 3rd trailhead located at the Northern State Hospital Historic Cemetery located at 25751 Helmick Rd.

## 15 Cascade Trail Trailhead: 24700 SR 20, SEDRO WOOLLEY

The cascade trail is a county-maintained pathway that begins in Sedro-Woolley city limits and extends 22.5 miles to the east to the Town of Concrete. The trail official trailhead is located at the intersection of State Rt 20 and Fruitdale Rd, but the pathway unofficially extends from Fruitdale Rd west back to Metcalf Street along BNSF railroad right of way where the railroad tracks have been removed. The surface is crushed rock and there is adequate parking for vehicles and horse trailers at Fruitdale Road, SR 20 and Challenger Crossing. The trail is open year-round and Port-a-potties are located at the trailheads. Take time to sit and enjoy the Skagit River from one of the ten benches on the trail. The benches were provided by the Boy Scouts of America "Eagle Scout" program.
