

Project Description

The City of Sedro-Woolley is committed to providing equal access to its public programs, services, facilities, and activities for all citizens including those with disabilities. To achieve this end, the City is developing an ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act) Self-Evaluation and Transition Plan for the public right-of-way, buildings, parks, and City services, programs, and activities in compliance with federal and state law.

To satisfy the requirements set forth by Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, Title II of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (CFR 28 Part 35), and WSDOT Local Agency Guidelines Manual (Chapter 29), this ADA Transition Plan intends to:

• Identify physical and communicative barriers in City of Sedro-Woolley's public facilities that limit the accessibility of its programs, services or activities to individuals with disabilities;

- Describe the methods to be used to make the facilities, programs, services or activities accessible;
- **Provide a schedule** for making necessary modifications to provide better access and achieve compliance; and
- Identify the public officials responsible for implementation of the plan.

Project Schedule

The City of Sedro-Woolley has contracted civil engineering firm Transportation Solutions, Inc., and partnering subconsultants to complete the citywide ADA Transition Plan by March 31, 2021.

Summer 2020

- Project Kick-off
- Review/perform self-assessment of public right of way facilities including curb ramps, sidewalks, and interface of sidewalks with driveways.
- Develop prioritization criteria for public right of way barriers.
- Review/perform self-assessment of city's programmatic policies and practices regarding accessibility of its services, programs, and activities.
- Develop public outreach strategy and content with input from community stakeholders including members of the ADA community.
- Initiate public outreach activities including webpage and online survey.

Fall 2020

- Develop prioritization criteria for public right of way and programmatic barriers.
- Conduct additional public outreach activities and summarize findings.
- Refine removal prioritization criteria based on input from city staff, members of the ADA community, and other stakeholders.
- Prioritize public right of way and programmatic barriers.
- Develop cost estimates for public right of way and programmatic barrier removal.
- Perform self-assessments of City buildings and parks for physical accessibility barriers.

Winter 2021

- Develop prioritization criteria for buildings and parks.
- Refine removal prioritization criteria based on input from city staff, members of the ADA community, and other stakeholders.
- Prioritize building and park barriers.
- Develop cost estimates for building and park barriers.
- Develop short and long-term barrier removal implementation schedule.
- Submit Draft ADA Transition Plan and present to Sedro-Woolley City Council including cost estimates, refined prioritization criteria, barrier removal schedule, and a financing plan.
- Spring 2021 Revise and submit Final ADA Transition Plan based on City Council and public comments.

ADA Advisory Group

The City intends to form an ADA Advisory Group including local citizens who are members of the disability community or who work closely with persons with disabilities to advise City staff throughout the ADA Transition Plan process. At least 51% of the ADA Advisory Group must be made up of individuals living with a disability as defined by the ADA including hearing impairment, intellectual disability, psychiatric disability, mobility impairment and vision impairment.

The intended goals and responsibilities of the ADA Advisory Group include:

- Provide advice, identify accessibility barriers and recommend accessibility improvements to new and existing City programs, services and facilities as it relates to Title II of the ADA.
- Develop relationships with other local organizations serving individuals with disabilities as identified by the ADA.
- Support City public engagement efforts for the ADA Self-Evaluation and Transition Plan process including review of engagement tools and materials for accessibility.
- May be asked to support City staff on ADA Transition Plan implementation and future Plan updates.

The ADA Advisory Group is anticipated to meet virtually on a monthly basis during the ADA Transition Plan project timeline (through March 2021) and may continue on a quarterly basis thereafter. Scheduled meetings are posted <u>here</u>.







Matthew asked if the difference between a curb ramp and a blended transition is that one is sloped and the other is not. Jennifer confirmed yes. Both facilities are going from a pedestrian route through a crossing used by vehicles. If you have a pedestrian user is crossing a roadway, there must be a

detectable warning surface. David added that ramps have a slope to address the difference in height between the sidewalk, curb and gutter. Blended transitions do not have this height difference.

Slide 9 Physical Feature Inventory Map

Eric asked whether a non-compliant Blended Transition is one that does not have a detectable area for an individual. Jennifer confirmed yes, as well as sidewalk upheaval or cracks could also make it noncompliant.

Slide 11 Missing Curb Ramps

Clifford said he believes the City's curb ramp inventory is missing some ramps and sidewalks. He shared that he has created an inventory of curb ramps and sidewalks in Sedro-Woolley. He mentioned curb ramps without tactile pads are present on Highway 9 north of SR-20. Clifford also identified the Mobile Park and Carriage Court has problematic sidewalks and curb ramps. Clifford is working with the University of Washington's Taskar Center on Accessible Technology that he can share via OpenStreet Map. He reported that he has mapped the entire county but does not distinguish between private and public property.

David followed up on Summer Meadows that we are showing yellow dots noting non-compliant ramps. David followed up that Carriage Court off Hwy 20 is a private facility.

Judy mentioned that Summer Meadows is her neighborhood and the curb cuts are perfect for denoting the T-section of the intersection. One is flat and sloping like a driveway, noting one corner, and the other is directly across from the other curb and a small dip.

One of the participants asked what regulation width is for a sidewalk. David confirmed the current sidewalk width standard is minimum of five feet wide, it was four feet previously.

Judy brought up Summer Meadows Ct and a T intersection. Diamond imprints in the concrete of the curb ramps are helpful but David Lee pointed out they are not up to current ADA standards for yellow detectable warning surfaces. Judy mentioned slope is a form of detection.

Matt identified tree roots as a barrier for him on his bicycle, particularly on Ferry Street near the old Heritage Bank (south side of Ferry at Puget Street).

Brenda identified the corners of State and Township have high (vehicular) traffic and there is only one ramp crossing. Matt concurred that this intersection was difficult for him to cross as well.

Brenda identified Bennett Street as having uneven sidewalks that she considers dangerous.

Slide 19 Prioritize Physical Barriers (1)

Matt asked what APS stood for. Jennifer explained it stands for Accessible Pedestrian Signals that have visual and audio/vibro-tactile features for crossing a roadway. Mark mentioned the HAWK signal between Reed St and Puget St on Hwy 20, and Hwy 120 and Ferry St as examples. Matt responded that he loved the signal on Highway 20 and depends on it.

David described the difference between a HAWK signal and an RRFB. The City has a HAWK signal at the crossing of Reed and SR 20 as well as at Ferry and SR 20. The City also has RRFBs on Highway 9 at Cascade Middle School and at Highway 9 and John McGarigle for students at Evergreen. There is also an RRFB at the High School at State and 8th Street. There is also another RRFB east end of McGarigle and Fruitdale at shared use path location.

Judy asked what the City does to ensure that blind children can participate. Jennifer answered that the first recommended person to contact is the ADA Coordinator who can work with Parks staff to accommodate a blind child to the maximum extend feasible.

Mark shared that the City does not currently have a Parks Coordinator and that activities are run by private groups. Mark will give thoughts to this request. He shared the City is working to make its playgrounds ADA accessible. The Parks Supervisor may be a good contact for such a situation.

Jennifer asked for best practices recommendations from Judy and she said that activities vary depending on the City (such as swimming or field games) but what is most important is the attitude the City takes towards providing accommodation and she considers the City's approach to be great. Clif asked when documentation would be available on the website and referenced the Documents section of the project webpage that says it will be available in February 2021. Jennifer confirmed this is the place it will be uploaded.

Virtual Workshop Debrief

- 2 participants not affiliated with Project Team staff or AAG
- Barrier locations provided:
 - o Mobile Park and Carriage Court: problematic sidewalks and curb ramps outside city jurisdiction
 - Highway 9 north of SR-20: curb ramps without tactile pads.
 - Ferry Street near the old Heritage Bank: tree roots on south side of Ferry at Puget Street
 - o State and Township: missing curb ramps and pedestrian crossings
 - Bennett Street: uneven sidewalks
- (MD) asked for definition of tactile pads. (JS) responded they are also known as detectable warning surfaces such as truncated domes.

2020 ADA Barrier Online Surveys

Public Outreach Barrier Locations Map 1 - Barriers Only

• Majority of barriers are south of SR 20 in residential areas in older infrastructure areas

Public Outreach Barrier Locations Map 2 - Barriers and TIP 50 Foot Buffer of City Planned Projects

- (MD) asked for definition and purpose of TIP 50 foot buffer. TIP stands for "Transportation Improvement Projects" where the City has planned projects. (JS) shared the TIP buffer of 50 ft to each side of the center line is intended to capture barriers within the right of way. It helps show barrier locations that are likely to be addressed during planned projects.
- (DL) gave an example of the pavement overlay project on Jameson St between Third St and Township where the City added/replaced/improved thirty-five ramps through that corridor. Portions of poor sidewalk that could present mobility problems still remain, but those are outside the realm of what the City can do with available funding. The City is focusing now on the curb ramp portions and addressing barriers in areas where the improvements affect the travelled way.

Top Priority Barrier Types - Ranked Comparison - see slide 7

- SurveyMonkey statistically more helpful.
- Types of barriers at top of SurveyMonkey rankings were at the bottom of the smaller ArcGIS cohort.
- (JJ) possible explanation? (JS) One explanation could be unfamiliarity with ArcGIS survey platform to rank choices.
- (JS) It safer to look at SurveyMonkey due to larger cohort. Top priority barrier types include:
 - Fixed objects blocking path of travel
 - Overgrown vegetation in the path of travel
 - Sidewalk crack/bumps

Top Priority Barrier Locations - Ranked Comparison - see slide 8

- Types of barriers at top of SurveyMonkey rankings were same as smaller ArcGIS cohort (although different rank within top four):
 - Grocery Stores/Retail Shopping Centers
 - Transit Centers/Stops/Routes
 - Senior Center/Elderly Care Facilities
 - Schools/Libraries
- (JJ) Skagit Transit is trying to improve Sedro-Woolley to Mount Vernon route with fewer intermittent stops; also performing bus shelter upgrades.
- (DL) top priority locations appear to be where people want to go most.
- (MD) and (JJ) agree with SurveyMonkey top four choices.
- (EJ) and (MS) responses are expected

Key Takeaways

- Barriers identified were primarily in area south of SR-20 in residential areas consistent with older infrastructure and lower volumes of traffic.
- Narrative responses identified barriers in proximity to schools more written comments for schools than other top four barrier locations.
 - (EJ) Is school district responsible for access actually on school property? Are any of the identified issues on that property?
 - (JS) Feedback was general for vicinity of schools. City staff would need to research/identify barriers near schools but City would only be able to address those within public right of way. If barrier is on school property, it would be the school's responsibility.
 - (DL) Third St near High School has been improved by the City, but intersections near Mary Purcell do need work and there are ramps that need to be installed or upgraded within the right of way. As you get closer to the buildings themselves, it is the school district's responsibility.
- State and Township intersection barriers identified by respondents on both surveys and virtual workshop (JS) would recommend in the Plan that State and Township be high priority.
 - (MS) walks a paper route with a gentleman and that intersection is one of the hardest to cross as not everyone is looking for the pedestrians and because he cannot see to step down from the curbs. They also have to walk in the street due to lack of sidewalks on State St, dirt trail to route via Dean St and Wicker St. Ferry St also has tripping hazards for this gentleman.
 - (DL) confirmed lack of sidewalk and dirt trail.
 - (MS) Dirt trail is often blocked by vegetation.
 - (MS) A few utility poles block the sidewalk in Dean/Virginia area but it is easier and there is not much traffic even though there are no sidewalks on Dean. She is more concerned about busier roads (State and Wicker).
- (JS) to document these barriers in Public Outreach Findings section of plan and will identify these top priority barrier types and locations in plan to be considered for removal as funding is made available.

 - Evaluated facilities included: City Hall, Fire Station, Community Center, Senior Center, Existing City Library, Sedro-Woolley Museum, Union Cemetery Public Restrooms, and New Library (110 West State)

 - Evaluated facilities included: Bingham Park, Lions Park, Metcalf Park/Tesarik Ball Fields/Skate
 Park, Hammer Heritage Square, Harry Osborne Park & Caboose, Winnie Houser Park/Playfields,
 Memorial Park, Riverfront Park (Bark Park/FEMA Trail/Parking near Baseball fields).
 - Parks not addressed: most are undeveloped or do not have public facing facilities currently
- Evaluations based on Federal Priorities: (1) exterior access, (2) interior access, (3) interior fixtures, and (4) other amenities such as drinking fountains and emergency alarms.

- (MD) requested that data be presented for ArcGIS data in the same format as SurveyMonkey findings for consistency and to confirm all data is present for all ranked items.
- (MD) also did his own calculations to get percentages and is happy to provide to (JS).





Draft Plan Comments

- (JJ) no comments; no issues for figures or tables.
- (MD) happy to see intersection of State/Township will be addressed as a high priority.
- (MD) Building Accessibility: Priority 1 thinks it is most important.
 - (JS) Priority 1 does not necessarily mean it will be the first items covered; cost and planned projects are also factors.
 - (MF) goal is to highlight priorities and stay within budget to make incremental progress at barrier removal.
 - (MF) curb ramp upgrades at State and Township (3 of them) scheduled for 2021 followed by Wicker Rd overlay and Ferry/Puget intersection.
 - (MF) curb ramps to be high priority item to address at building facilities as budget allows.
 - (MF) Facilities Maintenance Plan will utilize existing staff to address some restroom barriers and a proposed increase to maintenance budget is expected in a future budget cycle.
 - (MF) Grant funding would be above amounts listed in City budget and may result in additional barrier removal.
- (MD) Prioritization Matrix (Figure 1/page 22) is confusing.
 - (JS) Options to remove figure? Edit?
 - (MF) Keep figure.
 - o (MD) Add asterisk.
 - (JS) will add asterisk to point out cost is independent of public use/risk; costs are examples only-see following figures for Sedro-Woolley estimated construction costs.
 - (MD) Rapid Rectangular Flashing Beacon (RRFB) cost estimate is 4 times as expensive with audible feature?
 - (JS) Cost should be \$2,500 per each side of crossing.





- (KH) \$2,500 cost is for labor (usually 2/3 of cost) and materials (1/3).
- (MF) will review amounts in Section D.4.1 for curb ramp funding framework after discussion pointed out average of one ramp per year.
 - (JJ) Are projects overlapping?
 - (MF) No, three different categories of funding projects are independent from each other.
- (MF) Plan is to increase funding over time for barrier removal.
 - (MF) for comparison, Bellevue proto-type ADA Transition Plan spans 100 years at \$1 million per year.
- (MD) What makes a playground accessible?
 - o (MF) described some accessible features including accessible routes and soft surfaces.
 - (JS) Federal design standards for outdoor areas include playgrounds; see page 91 of Plan.
 - (MF) Mayor Johnson wants to prioritize an ADA accessible swing for Sedro-Woolley.
- (MD) asked to share Plan with Brenda who participated in public workshop.
 - (JS) Yes, please share with others who may have feedback or want to know of City's efforts and email Mark Freiberger with comments on Plan as soon as possible, even if after 3/18 deadline.
