CITY OF COLUMBIA HEIGHTS PARKS & RECREATION TOBACCO-FREE POLICY

Prohibition of Tobacco Product Usage in Youth Activity Areas

In order to protect the health and welfare of our children, the Columbia Heights City Council and the Columbia Heights Park & Recreation Commission unanimously approved a tobacco free park policy.

No person shall use any form of tobacco at or on any City-owned or operated recreational facilities during a youth activity.

Tobacco-Free Facilities

- 1. Youth playgrounds, volleyball courts and beach property to include sand area.
- 2. Ball fields and spectator areas during youth events.
- 3. Picnic shelters, park buildings, BBQ areas.
- 4. Sliding hills and skating rink areas.
- 5. Wading pools and surrounding deck areas.

Policy Enforcement

- 1. Appropriate signs shall be posted in the above areas.
- 2. Youth activity organizations will be encouraged to promote the Tobacco-Free Policy. The City also would like residents to help encourage park users to follow the policy.



Police continue focus on pedestrian safety

The Columbia Heights Police Department has been increasing its focus on pedestrian safety in the city, specifically along Central Avenue. This is partially due to two recent car accidents where walkers were struck while violating pedestrian laws.

As of mid-April, police officers had issued over 200 warnings and several citations to walkers and will continue enforcement activities. While driver behavior is often a factor as well, police want to make sure that citizens are traveling safely through the city. They recommend using crosswalks provided for pedestrian traffic, using the new walk-bridge when crossing Central at 49th Ave, and crossing at intersections with semaphores that indicate when it is safe to walk. "Working together we can make this a safer community by following basic laws, and reduce the number of unnecessary injuries," said Chief Scott Nadeau.

Heritage Tower to be dedicated on May 29

The Columbia Heights Community Heritage Tower and Legacy Garden will be dedicated at a ceremony at 6:30 p.m. on Wednesday, May 29, that will include music by the Silver Lake Symphonic Winds. The new community landmark will be located in the roundabout on Huset Parkway, behind city hall.

The cost of it, approximately \$40,000, will come entirely from donations, which are tax deductible. As of April 26, Mayor Gary Peterson reports that donations have more than surpassed the half-way point and are still coming in. "This community has always been very generous," he said.

Peterson heads up the Columbia Heights Activity Fund, a 501.c.3 nonprofit organization whose mission is to improve the lives of all residents of Columbia Heights. In the wake of the 911 terrorist attacks, the group began a three-phase project of erecting community monuments to provide a sense of safety and unity.

The first landmark was the "Clock Tower of Peace," erected in 2006, and the second, "Police & Fire Tribute," was dedicated at the new Public Safety Building in 2009.

The Heritage Tower, to be erected in late May, will feature four distinct themes of "Diversity," "Recreation," "Education" and "Labor," which are foundations of the community. Residents participated in focus groups to come up with four words for each category. Then through a partnership with Columbia Heights Public Schools, students created artwork around the words. (See related story on page 2).

"It will be a lasting memorial for our citizens to remember the diverse cultures of people who came before them, from all over the world, with the hope of building a community of peace and prosperity for their families and loved ones," said Peterson.

The Heritage Tower will remind people how Heights began and "how far we've come," he added. "We hope it will inspire community pride."

"I love this town," said Peterson, a long-time resident. "Pride is behind this project because I want people to be proud to live in Columbia Heights."

Fridley resident purchases five bricks in tower and legacy garden project

Eddie Fuerstenberg thought about buying named bricks when the clock tower was installed at the corner of 40th and Central in Columbia Heights a few years ago.

"I wanted to do it, but I didn't do it right away and then forgot it," he said.

Then he heard recently about the heritage monument being installed, and "This time I did it," said Fuerstenberg, a retired contractor.

He purchased a total of five commemorative bricks. One is in memory of his sisterin-law who recently died at age 88.

He also bought bricks to honor his grown son and two of his

good friends who are in their 80s. And he purchased one with his own name on it.

"We're getting older," he said. "We won't be around forever."

He's lived in the area since 1969 mostly in the Innsbruck area of Fridley that is located in Columbia Heights School District 13. That's why he has always felt like a resident of Columbia Heights and wants to be a part of the newest community monument.

"It's nice to have a reminder of people, something with their name on it, in a community location," he said.



Students create artwork for Heritage Tower

About 100 students from Columbia Heights Public Schools had the unique opportunity to make a lasting impression on their community.

Mayor Gary Peterson invited them to create the artwork that will be sandblasted onto the four sides of the Heritage Tower to be installed in the Huset park roundabout a few weeks from now.

Students created the artwork to illustrate the four main themes of the monument: Labor, recreation, education and diversity.

Diane Scully, art teacher at Columbia Heights High School, said students took the invitation seriously. "They understand that their artwork will be on permanent display in the community," she said, "and that they can bring their children and even their grandchildren to see it someday."

Scully and other teachers in the district saw how their students could benefit from this "real life" experience of creating public art for a "client."

The project began with a discussion of the community and its history and what has changed over time, she said. Also, Mayor Gary Peterson met with students to discuss the purpose of the monument.

A project like this is an interesting challenge for students. Scully predicts that community residents will be impressed with what the talented artists have produced.

The students have also volunteered at fund-raisers for the Heritage Tower including a fish fry and pancake breakfast and worked alongside firefighters, police officers and other adult volunteers.

"The students' involvement in this community project has resulted in them feeling more a part of this community," said Scully, "and that is a nice benefit."



about their neighborhoods and community. NNO is about working together to realize the common goal of reducing crime, and to gain more information about partnering with police to build safer neighborhoods.



Access to the Fire Department during city business hours is through the main lobby. During evenings and weekends, staff members can be accessed by ringing the night bell outside the Fire Department service door by the overhead garage doors. How to enjoy a recreational fire

Recreational fires are permitted within the city limits of Columbia Heights with a permit. Permits can be obtained in person at the fire department by an adult 18 years and older seven days a week from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. Up to nine free daily permits can be obtained or an annual permit may be purchased for a small fee. New this year, a daily fire permit may be obtained up to one week in advance. Recreational fire rules are listed on the permit and are strictly enforced.

Here are ways to use fireworks safely

The Columbia Heights Fire Department wishes you to be safe in the use of fireworks. It is always important that people be vigilant, responsible and take additional safety precautions when using fireworks as they can be very dangerous and are associated with many injuries.

The following safety guidelines are offered by the Minnesota State Fire Marshal's Office to prevent injuries, fires and nuisance complaints associated with the use of fireworks:



- Enjoy displays put on by professionals who know how to safely handle fireworks.
- Read, understand, and follow the instructions on each device prior to using.
- Keep fireworks away from children.
- Choose a safe place to use fireworks that is far from anything that could be damaged from the normal or abnormal operation of any device.
- Prohibit anyone who acts in an irresponsible manner or who appears to be under the influence of alcohol or other drugs from using fireworks.
- Keep fireworks from getting wet and do not use them even when dried after becoming wet.
- Never ignite fireworks inside another container, such as a bottle or can.
- Use eye protection if using fireworks and never throw fireworks or aim them at another person, animal or building.
- Light one firework device at a time, then move away from the device quickly. Keep clear of any device that has been ignited, but has yet to go off.
- Never relight malfunctioning fireworks. Report any defects to the seller or the Consumer Product Safety Commission.
- Never experiment with fireworks, make your own fireworks, or alter fireworks in any manner (a strong federal prohibition exists for such activity).

Property ownership, big responsibility

With summer well under way there are a lot of things that you can do around the house to keep your property looking good.

"To keep our neighborhoods safe and livable, we need to have owners who take reasonable care to ensure that their properties don't become a nuisance," said Fire Chief Gary Gorman. "A few hours throughout the summer is all it takes to keep your property maintained and in compliance with city code."

Follow these property maintenance tips:

 Keep the entire yard mowed and trimmed. People often forget those quick-to-maintain areas along alleyways and behind garages. Exterior property and premises should be maintained free from diseased, dead and hazardous trees and noxious weeds. Long grass and weed inspections are conducted by the city. Any grass over nine inches should be cut and weeds/scrub growth around foundations of buildings should be removed.

- Clean up any outside storage of articles including, but not limited to, equipment, construction materials, excess soil, garbage, yard waste, recyclables, hazardous waste, items not designed for exterior use, and maintenance equipment.
- Remove tree stumps to four inches below the surface of the ground,

- including root extensions. Stumps that are to be used for other purposes including, but not limited to, art, furniture, and landscaping must be separated from the root system. The remaining stump/roots should be removed as outlined above.
- Stack firewood in rear yards only, and place it in an area that does not promote rodent harborage or the deterioration of adjacent surfaces and does not adversely affect neighboring properties.

Notable events in Columbia Heights history Barn/Garage Fire, 3916 Main Street – August 11, 1965

The Columbia Heights Fire Department was called to a fire at a detached/barn garage at 11:12 a.m. at 3916 Main Street on Aug. 8, 1965. Twelve firefighters used two engines, a rescue vehicle and the chief's car to respond to the fire. Using 1,150 feet of 2½ inch hose as a water supply and 350 feet of 1½ inch hose to attack the fire, the firefighters were able to bring the blaze under control and cleared the scene by 12:44 p.m. The fire destroyed the structure, two automobiles and a boat and also damaged the neighboring property. The report cites the cause of the fire to be children playing with fire.



Sister Cities' members sponsor projects

Fellowship and good food were enjoyed by a dozen members of the Columbia Heights/Lomianki, Poland, Sister Cities International (SCI) group in March at HANGAR 45 (45th Avenue & Central Avenue) which is owned by SCI Member, Todd Estrem, who also is the proprietor of Tasty Pizza. The collections of U.S. Air Force and other military memorabilia make the venue a mini-museum! Special attention is given to Walter Shimshock, the 19-year-old B-17 tail gunner who made the supreme sacrifice in September 1944, during the WWll humanitarian mission dropping supplies to the Poles during the Warsaw Uprising. These Air Force heroes were the catalyst for the formation of Columbia Heights' Sister City relationship with Lomianki.

A large group from Columbia Heights attended PACIM's (Polish American Cultural Institute of Minnesota) Spring Ball in April. The *Bal Karnawalowy* included a gourmet dinner, classical Chopin music, silent auction, entertainment by the popular Dolina Dancers, and the traditional Polonaise Grand March.

The Minnesota State Sister Cities' Conference took place in April with Secretary of State Mark Ritchie on the program. MN State Coordinators Gerald Wenner and Dolores Puente Strand presented a program which included special contributions from Native Americans. As SCI volunteer state coordinators, Wenner and Strand appreciate all the assistance from Columbia Heights' members.

SCI member Dan Schyma coordinated a program at the Columbia Heights Public Library in April that featured genealogist, John Rys. He talked about Polish immigration to the Northeast Minneapolis, Columbia Heights areas and their influential contributions to establish a solid, quality community of hardworking citizens.

Tips for controlling Canada geese

The key to controlling Canada geese populations in the city is to make their preferred environment less attractive. Urban areas with mowed fertilized lawns and open spaces are ideal habitats for geese.

The following tips may help control populations.

- Don't feed the geese Feeding the geese will concentrate populations, reduce effectiveness of other measures, and make them more aggressive to people as they expect to be fed. Hand feeding makes geese more susceptible to diseases and rarely provides proper nutrients they require.
- Manage grass and plants Geese prefer to eat grass, especially young shoots that can be found in abundance on mowed fertilized lawns. Eliminate mowing at least 20 feet from shorelines or plant prairie grasses in these areas, as they are less palatable to geese. Reduce fertilizer use, as geese prefer fertilized grass.
- Vegetative barrier Geese prefer to walk from land to water and because they feel safe in open areas where they can see predators. A tall grass buffer (minimum of 30") will discourage the geese from established feeding areas as they will be unable to physically walk to the area and the high grasses will impair their sightlines.
- Fencing and rock Large rocks (2 feet in diameter or greater) or a fence will also discourage geese from an area. Fences should be at least 30" tall and have no openings larger than 3 feet.

City will be updating storm water pollution prevention plan

In an effort to protect waters, the City of Columbia Heights has a federal National Pollution Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) stormwater permit administered by the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (MPCA). This permit is currently up for reissuance and the City is preparing for additional requirements in the upcoming months. Currently the new permit is scheduled to be signed in the spring/ summer of 2013. Until the reissuance of the new permit, the City will continue to operate under the requirements of the old permit. The permit requires that the City, as the owner of a Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System (MS4), develop and implement a Storm Water Pollution Prevention Plan (SWPPP) to reduce the discharge of pollutants from its storm sewer system to the maximum extent possible. The City's SWPPP is comprised of six minimum control measures, as required under the permit. Invasive pests can spread via firewood

Many invasive pest species live on or in trees, lumber and firewood. Moving untreated firewood can spread pests such as Emerald ash borer which has been found in Minnesota. Quarantines are now in place for counties affected by emerald ash borer to help prevent new infestations within the state. Firewood in quarantined counties – which does not include Anoka County, at this time – cannot be moved without a certificate. The United States Department of Agriculture has issued a parallel federal quarantine for interstate movement of regulated articles. Please report diseased trees

Public and private trees are inspected three times a year during June, July and August for Dutch Elm disease, Oak Wilt, and Emerald Ash Borer.

If you suspect a tree(s) in Columbia Heights may be diseased, please call (763) 706-3700. A tree inspector will examine the tree(s) and mark them with a red "T" for removal if they are diseased. Visit www.MNtrees.org for information on ways to keep trees healthy.

Watering trees keeps them healthy

Providing adequate water is one of the most important things you can do to establish and maintain



tree health. Watering newly planted or transplanted trees regularly for 3-5 years is critical in establishing healthy trees. Yearly rainfall may or may not be adequate for trees; therefore pay particular attention during the summer or periods of drought. Established trees only need to be watered during drought-like conditions. Continue to water until the ground freezes to reduce the amount of winter damage. - The best time to water is in the morning, before 10 a.m., because rising heat during the day tends to evaporate a lot of water.
- A lush green lawn requires 1 to 1½ inches of water per week.
- Avoid watering when windy.
- Lawns that are frequently aerated absorb water better.
- Mulch shrubs and other plants so the soil holds moisture longer.

Each property is offered one free appliance pickup per calendar year. Call Advanced Disposal Services or visit their website for additional appliance collection costs. It is illegal to haul items into the city for disposal.

Anoka County Household Hazardous Waste Facility (763) 323-5730

It is illegal to dispose of hazardous waste in the garbage. This includes such items as aerosol cans that have contents remaining, antifreeze, driveway sealer, gasoline and other fuels, mercury, liquid paint, paint stripper, paint thinner, pesticides, varnish, wood preservatives and other household products that are corrosive, flammable, combustible or poisonous. Take these items to the Anoka County HHW facility located at 3230 101st Ave. NE in Blaine. There is no charge for disposal of these items at the facility. If households recycle more, city could meet goal

Thanks to Columbia Heights residents, 340 tons of materials were recycled from January through March of this year which saved the city's refuse fund over \$18,000 in trash disposal fees. This is notable, although it is 18% less than the goal for the first quarter. Please keep in mind the SCORE (Select Committee on Recycling and the Environment) goal for the city increased for 2013. The latest estimate is that each household in Columbia Heights only needs to recycle an extra 18 pounds in order to meet the year-end goal of 1,792 tons.
