



TOBACCO-FREE POLICY

Prohibition of Tobacco Product Usage in Youth Activity Areas

No person shall use any form of tobacco at or on any City-owned or operated recreational facilities during a youth activity.

Tobacco-Free Facilities

- 1. Youth playgrounds, volleyball courts and beach property to include sand area.
- 2. Ball fields and spectator areas during youth events.
- 3. Picnic shelters, park buildings, BBQ areas.
- 4. Sliding hills and skating rink areas.
- 5. Wading pools and surrounding deck areas.

Policy Enforcement

- 1. Appropriate signs shall be posted in the above areas.
- 2. Youth activity organizations will be encouraged to promote the Tobacco-Free Policy.



New landmark will celebrate Columbia Heights' proud heritage



The center of the Huset Parkway roundabout will be the location of a new community monument.

A new community landmark — the third of a trilogy — will be unveiled at a ceremony in May. It will be called the Columbia Heights Community Heritage Tower and will be located in the roundabout on Huset Parkway, behind city hall.

The memorial will feature four distinct themes of "Diversity," "Recreation," "Education" and "Labor," which are foundations of the community. Residents participated in focus groups to come up with four words for each category. Then through a partnership with Columbia Heights Schools, students will create artwork around the words.

"It will be a lasting memorial for our citizens to remember the diverse cultures of people who came before them, from all over the world, with the hope of building a community of peace and prosperity for their families and loved ones," said Mayor Gary Peterson.

Kiwanis Club keeps city's recycling center going for nearly 30 years

Whether it's a frigid 20 below zero or a sweltering 100 degrees, dedicated members of the Columbia Heights-Fridley Kiwanis Club have run the city's recycling center on Saturdays from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. for the past 29 years.

Curbside pick up of recycling takes place in Columbia Heights but residents also have access to a recycling center through this partnership.

Members of the Kiwanis took on the task in 1983 as a community service project.

"We're a service organization and we're always looking for projects," said Dick Walquist, a retired commercial Realtor, who has been involved in the effort since the beginning. "We decided this was a worthwhile commitment."

The recycling center, located at 38th Place and Madison Street, accepts paper, cardboard, plastic, glass and also scrap metal so it's

Concerned about the value placed on your property? Here are steps to take

The Board of Appeal and Equalization for Columbia Heights will meet at 6 p.m. on April 22, at Columbia Heights City Hall. The purpose of the meeting is to determine whether taxable property in the city has been properly valued and classified by the assessor, and to determine whether corrections need to be made

If you believe the value or classification of your property is incorrect, the first step is to call the Anoka County assessor's office to discuss your concerns. For residential property, contact Mike Brown (763) 323-5492. For commercial property, contact Jim Rouleau (763) 323-5497.

If you are still not satisfied with the valuation or classification after discussing it with your assessor, you may appear before the local Board of Appeal and Equalization. The Board will review the valuation, classification, or both if necessary, and correct if needed.

Generally, an appearance before your local Board of Appeal and Equalization is required by law before an appeal can be taken to the next level which is the County Board of Appeal and Equalization.

a good place for residents and businesses to dispose of gutters, grills, fencing, chairs, shelving, and more. Automobile oil is also accepted from those who change their own.

The Kiwanis Club uses funds from the sale of the recyclables to provide two scholarships each year to graduating seniors at Columbia Heights and Fridley high schools. Any remaining funds go to the high school Key Club, SACA, etc. "We put the money we receive right back into the community," said Walquist.

The city benefits by reducing garbage that goes to the landfill. "The more items that are diverted from the landfill, the fewer tons the city pays for," said Jesse Davies of the city's Public Works Department. "Recycling makes financial sense."

In addition, the weight of recyclables collected at the center is added to the city's residential goal set by Anoka County each year.

Davies praises the Kiwanis members for their dedication to the city's recycling center. "Their volunteering is commendable," he said. "It's what makes this project possible."

Grant used to update recycling center

Columbia Heights received over \$62,000 in grant money from Anoka County to update its Recycling Center. Work

is now complete.

Comments from the public have been very positive, especially regarding



the drive-thru exit and easy access to the oil tank.

The Recycling Drop-off Center is open on Saturdays (except for holiday weekends) from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. for all area residents and businesses. See page 11 for more information.

City achieves 92% of 2012 recycling goal

Preliminary reports indicate that Columbia Heights residents recycled 1,610 tons of materials in 2012, which includes both recyclables picked up curbside and those brought to the city's recycling center. This saved the city's refuse fund over \$86,900 in trash disposal fees.

A typical household in Columbia Heights paid \$2.51 for recycling versus \$15.43 for trash disposal per month in 2012. Twenty percent of the total residential solid waste produced in the city was recycled. Of the remaining solid waste, 67% was delivered to a refuse-to-fuel facility and only 13% was sent to a landfill.

County sets increased recycling goal for city

The Anoka County 2013 recycling goal for City of Columbia Heights is 1,792 tons, a 2% increase from 2012. This can be accomplished if each household fills a packed cart every recycling day (around 18 pounds). Recycling is contracted for collection every-other-week, but residents can swap their current 60-gallon recycling cart for a 90-gallon recycling cart for the same low rate. The contractor will always collect extra

recycling outside of the container if prepared properly by using an old recycling box or paper bags.

There are several financial benefits for recycling besides lessening the impact on the environment. Trash disposal costs have increased 52% since 2009 at approved Anoka County disposal sites. The more recyclables that are put in the recycling bin rather than the trash will lower the overall tons of solid waste, and therefore the total cost of disposal. For example, if the recycling goal of 1,792 tons is discarded with the trash instead, the refuse fund will have to pay an additional \$103,900 in disposal fees. As residents increase their recycling efforts, they may also notice a decrease in trash making it possible to switch to a smaller and less expensive garbage container service.

Recycling reusable material makes more sense than burning or dumping in a landfill.

He heads up the Columbia Heights Activity Fund, a 501.c.3 non-profit organization whose mission is to improve the lives of all residents of Columbia Heights. In the wake of the 911 terrorist attacks, the group began a three-phase project of erecting community monuments to provide a sense of safety and unity.

The first landmark was the "Clock Tower of Peace" erected in 2006 at a spot that "just cried out for something" at 40th and Central, said Peterson. The clock includes a time capsule with messages of peace for the future citizens of Columbia Heights.

In October 2009, the "Police & Fire Tribute" was dedicated at the new Public Safety Building. "This bronze statute is a reminder to our citizens that our law enforcement officers and our fire fighters are protecting our community and they are our friends and neighbors," said Peterson. "Peace and security for our community is and always will be their mission."

All three landmarks have been funded totally by tax-deductible donations. "Our residents are very generous," said Peterson.

Upcoming fundraising events for the new monument will include a fish dinner in February and a pancake breakfast in the spring (see details, at right). Corporate and individual sponsorships are welcomed. A Legacy Garden will be created to complement the Heritage Tower which will allow individuals to purchase bricks engraved with their names or those of loved ones. "I love this town," said Peterson. "Pride is behind this project because I want people to be proud to live in Columbia Heights."

Peterson, a carpenter, built a home in Columbia Heights in 1968 and still lives there. That's where he and wife, Jaci, raised their five children — all graduates of Columbia Heights High School. Peterson served 14 years on the Columbia Heights City Council and now has been mayor for 12 years.

The heritage tower will remind people how Heights began and "how far we've come," he added. "We hope it will inspire community pride."

"I have enjoyed working with people within the police department as well as the community at large to bring criminal cases to a positive end," he said.

Help prevent auto theft

The Columbia Heights Police Department reminds drivers that it is illegal to leave their keys in the ignition when they are not present. Every winter, the desire to warm up chilly cars can lead to a thief driving off with the vehicle. Autostart systems are a way to warm up vehicles without violating the ordinance.

The CHPD has increased efforts to reduce auto theft over the last four years. Issuing citations to owners and drivers has been one of those ways. Data shows auto theft is down in Columbia Heights, going from 77 cars reported stolen in 2008 to 31 in 2012.

Department gives back to community

The year 2012 will go into the books as the one where Columbia Heights Police employees gave back more than ever before, and in a number of different ways. Police and fire employees worked together on an Open House fundraiser in support of the Columbia Heights Athletic Boosters on April 17. Again this year, on the day after National Night Out, officers participated in a softball tournament which raised money for SACA, the local food shelf. Also this past summer, several officers participated in a motorcycle ride to support an injured officer from another agency.

This fall, about half of the department's employees began mentoring youth at Highland Elementary School through the Big Brothers Big Sisters program, and many others have been visiting elementary school classes to talk about bullying as part of the department's youth outreach.

This November, the department enthusiastically took part in "Movember," where participants grow mustaches to raise money for cancer awareness. Nearly \$2,900 was raised through these efforts.

The department also assisted four families at the holidays through its Police Association-sponsored Shop-With-A-Cop program. This was the third year of Shop-With-A-Cop, where police employees assist the selected families by going shopping for clothing, household items, and Christmas gifts for their children.

The employees of the Columbia Heights Police Department are dedicated to making a difference in our community, and are proud to be of service to residents.

Police offer prescription drop off

The Columbia Heights Police Department now offers a drop off for unused prescription drugs. A Prescription Drug Take Back Container is located in the lobby of the Columbia Heights Public Safety Center at 825 41st Avenue.

Prescription drug abuse is the nation's fastest-growing drug problem. While there have been decreases in the use of some illegal street drugs such as cocaine, nearly one-third of people aged 12 and over who have used drugs for the first time began by using a prescription drug non-medically.

"We understand that prescription drug abuse is a concern around the country and in our area so we are proud to offer this proactive approach to assist our residents in disposing of their old and unused medications," said Police Chief Scott Nadeau.

There is no fee for this service. The Columbia Heights Police Department only accepts household prescription pills, capsules, caplets and tablets.

The Columbia Heights Police Department does not accept overthe-counter medications, liquids (including ampoules, vials or IV bags), sharps (needles, lancets or syringes), and fever thermometers, medical supplies (including bandages, medical tape or medical devices). CHPD will not accept prescription drugs from a commercial business.

Residents can drop off unused prescription drugs during regular business hours Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to 4:45 p.m.

Access to the Fire Department during city business hours is through the main lobby. During evenings and weekends, staff members can be accessed by ringing the night bell outside the Fire Department service door by the overhead garage doors. What to do if your carbon monoxide alarm goes off

If the alarm is intermittent, check the battery. If the alarm is constant get the family outside and call 911. This is very important if anyone in your family feels sick. The operator will ask you questions to see if an emergency response (fire department or ambulance) is necessary. If not an emergency:

- open windows
- if possible, shut off fuel-burning equipment and contact your fuel supplier or someone trained to repair heating equipment or chimneys.

Recreational fire permits are available


The fire department would like to remind residents that recreational fires within the city limits of Columbia Heights require a permit. Permits can be obtained in person at the fire department by an adult 18 years and older seven days a week from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m.

Up to nine free daily permits can be obtained or an annual permit may be purchased for a small fee. Daily fire permits may be obtained up to one week in advance from the date of the recreational fire. Recreational fire rules are listed on the permit and are strictly enforced.

Calls reach highest level ever

In 2012, the Columbia Heights Fire Department responded to 2,591 calls, the highest run volume ever. Firefighter/EMTs handled 693 fire related and 1,898 medical related calls.

Eighty-six percent of all calls had a response time from dispatch to arrival of 6 minutes or less. Below is a chart of call volumes for the past 10 years.

After being stuck inside all winter, go outside, enjoy that fresh cool air, and follow some of these outdoor spring-cleaning tips to keep your yard and home looking good and in compliance with the city's Property Maintenance Code.

- Clean up any outside storage of articles including, but not limited to, equipment, construction materials, excess soil, garbage, rubbish, yard waste, recyclables, hazard-ous waste, items not designed for exterior use, and maintenance equipment.
- Remove tree stumps to four inches below the surface of the ground, including root extensions. Stumps that are to be used for other purposes including, but not limited to, art, furniture, and landscaping shall be separated from the root system. The remaining stump/roots should be removed as outlined above.
- Stack firewood in rear yards only in an area that does not promote rodent harborage or the deterioration of adjacent surfaces and does not adversely affect adjoining premises.
- Remove diseased, dead and hazardous trees, noxious weeds, and trim long grass. any grass over nine inches should be cut and weeds/scrub growth around foundations of buildings, along the alley and along fence lines should be removed. Inspections take place. In 2010 the fire department wrote up 1,337 violations for long grass alone.

A few hours in the spring and throughout the summer is all it takes to keep your property looking great and in compliance with city code.

"To keep our neighborhoods safe and livable, we need to have owners who take reason-

able care to ensure that their properties don't become a nuisance. It's common sense for most of us to comply with the rules without being reminded," says Fire Chief Gary Gorman. "But, unfortunately, there are a few who simply don't care or don't come close to meeting the minimum standards set by the city and that is why we have the code."


Young artists and authors will be featured in Sister Cities' showcase April 10

Notable events in Columbia Heights history

Root Equipment Fire - St. Patrick's Day, March 17, 2010

A fire was reported at 9:34 p.m. at a vacant property located at 3930 University Avenue. A general alarm was sounded for the department and crews arrived on the scene in minutes. The building was well known for containing many chemicals and other hazards. The first arriving officer reported flames through the roof and a defensive strategy was chosen.

An aerial device and several large diameter hand lines were deployed to protect surrounding properties and extinguish the fire. Crews worked through the night to extinguish the blaze.

With extensive damage to the property, the cause and exact origin of the fire could not be determined.

Be aware of water treatment sales scam

In response to continuing reports of deceptive and aggressive sales tactics by some sellers of home water treatment equipment, the Minnesota Department of Health (MDH) has updated and reissued a press release advising homeowners to beware of false claims, deceptive sales pitches and scare tactics being used by some companies to sell expensive and unnecessary water treatment systems.

Recently Richfield police issued an alert after residents reported having green bottles left on their doorstep with a request for a water sample. After providing a sample, a homeowner received a visit from a salesman with an aggressive sales pitch for a treatment system costing more than \$6,000 and had difficulty getting the salesman to leave. Officials in Falcon Heights alerted residents after complaints of water testing kits and personal information requests being left at people's doors. Several cities have complained about a website containing misleading information about municipal water suppliers and what tests are performed on drinking water. The website has been used to try to sell treatment systems to homeowners.

In the press release the MDH outlined some of the sales tactics used by some companies, explained the standards that are used for testing public water systems, stated that residents can be confident in the safety of their water unless told otherwise by their utility provider, and made recommendations for those considering the purchase of a home system.



Law requires proper disposal of electronics

Electronic products containing a cathode ray tube (such as TVs and computer monitors) are considered hazardous and cannot be placed in the trash, according to Minnesota law. Other electronic items with circuit boards also contain hazardous components. Please do not place these items with the trash as the garbage hauler cannot take them. If the items are placed with the trash, they will be tagged and code enforcement authorities will begin abatement procedures.

There are several options to properly dispose of electronics. The refuse contractor has a separate service to collect and dispose of electronics. Call Advanced Disposal Services (763) 225-8705 for pick-up and disposal fees. To avoid pick-up charges there are several drop-off locations in the area, although a disposal fee is normally charged. The Anoka County Recyclopedia (mailed to all properties in 2012) contains a list of facilities that accept electronics. For an updated list of drop-off locations, visit the Anoka County Integrated Waste Management website at www. AnokaCounty.us/electronics.

Cleaning your sewer lines

If your home is having the sewer service lines cleaned, including root removal, by a sewer cleaning and/or root removal service, it is very important to notify the City in advance, as well as the day of the sanitary sewer cleaning/ root removal so that the City main lines may be checked. Please call Public Works at 763-706-3700 prior to and on the day that any work is being performed.



Spring street sweeping begins in April

Street sweeping will begin in Columbia Heights as soon as weather permits, usually in early April. Areas around lakes and ponds will be swept first to mini-

mize the amount of sediment entering these bodies of water. Sweeping operations will continue until all streets have been swept twice and then on an as-needed basis until fall.

Schedule set for hydrant flushing throughout city this spring

The fire hydrant flushing program will take place from April 15 through May 6 from 7 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.

It is necessary to flush all fire hydrants in the city for several reasons:

- To ensure that hydrants are in good working condition.
- To flush out sediment and rust deposits that accumulate in the water system.
- To evaluate water pressure and flow throughout the city.

The hydrant flushing schedule is:

- North of 45th Ave., East of Central Ave. April 15, 16, 17, 18
- South of 45th Ave., East of Central Ave. April 19, 22, 23, 24
- North of 45th Ave., West of Central Ave.- April 25, 26, 29, 30
- South of 45th Ave., West of Central Ave.- May 1, 2, 3, 6

You may notice some temporary discoloration of the water while hydrant flushing is being done in your area. The discoloration is caused by iron particles that have been dislodged from the water mains.

Avoid washing clothes while hydrants are being flushed in your area, as discolored water may leave stains on clothes. If your water is discolored, flush your residential system by running the cold water (perhaps water your lawn or trees) for 10 to 20 minutes.

NOTE: Additional localized hydrant flushing may be necessary throughout the spring, summer and fall to maintain and/or improve water quality.
