

And the 2021 Outstanding Citizen Award Winners Are...

Linda Fowler, Adult Category



Volunteerism and community engagement run in the family for Linda Fowler. Six years after her father, James Fowler, was named Columbia Heights' Humanitarian of the Year, Linda received the same honor, now known as the Outstanding Citizen Award, in

2021. James isn't alive today to see his daughter earn the same honor as he did, but he didn't miss the chance to tell her how proud of her he was before he passed away last October, Linda said.

Three years ago, Linda began volunteering regularly at SACA Food Shelf alongside her father, a veteran SACA volunteer.

"He influenced me a lot," Linda said. "I enjoyed that time we had there together."

Linda, 62, continues to donate about eight hours a week to SACA, sorting food in the warehouse. It's been a time of high demand from people in need, Linda said, and the experience has reminded her how lucky she is to not be in such a difficult position herself.

"It breaks my heart to see it," she said. "But volunteering at SACA also saved my sanity, in a way-to get out of the house and help other people."

Linda, a Columbia Heights native who recently retired from Medtronic as a pacemaker analyst and electrical technician, also volunteers her time at First Lutheran Church, gathering supplies for Sunday school teachers, tending to the community garden, and helping out at their farmers market. Last year, to contribute to the pollinator population, she learned how to raise monarch butterflies from eggs, and this summer, she'll be taking a role in the Mayors' Monarch Pledge effort. When she's not volunteering, she makes crafts and donates them.

Despite all the ways she's involved in the community, she said she did not expect to win this award. She was nominated by a fellow SACA volunteer and selected by Mayor Amáda Márquez Simula and 2019's Outstanding Citizen Award winner Cathy Miske. She received the news on a voicemail from the City.

"I had to listen to the voicemail three times before I believed it," Linda said. But perhaps her father wouldn't have been so surprised.

Drake Pham, Youth

Drake Pham got involved in community volunteering with the Loaves and Fishes program, working with Columbia Heights Recreation to distribute food to people in need. Later, he joined the Key Club, a youth volunteer



organization, and was president of the local chapter during his junior year at Columbia Heights High School. Now, at 16, Drake has become the City's very first winner of the Outstanding Citizen Award in the youth category designated for youth ages 14-18.

Among all the events and programs Drake has helped organize over the years, and all the volunteer opportunities he's taken part in, a highlight has been his work with SACA Food Shelf. Drake partnered with SACA to create volunteer opportunities for Key Club members at the start of the COVID pandemic, and he later worked to rally students to pack groceries for homebound seniors at a time when SACA was short on volunteers due to health concerns.

"Without this effort, the food shelf would have been hard pressed to get food out to so many in need during this pandemic," wrote Drake's nominator. "He not only organized it, he also participated."

Drake, who plans to study sports management after graduation, said he got involved in these programs because he's admired the way people in this community look out for each other and protect one another.

"I wanted to be a part of that," he said.

Major Development Update for the Hy-Vee Property on Central

The revitalization of the site located at 4300 Central Ave NE has long been a priority for the City. This year, staff worked with the development company Alatus to negotiate a deal to purchase the 13 acres of property from Hy-Vee to build a mixed-use development project that, if approved, would be the biggest development project in Columbia Heights in 100 years. Alatus extended an opportunity to both Hy-Vee and Ace Hardware to be folded into the project, but it's too soon to say how those conversations will play out. Alatus became interested in the property and its potential after working with the City on the 40th Ave City Hall project. The company sees this as a way to build on the investment it has already made in the City, said Aaron Chirpich, community development director. The City and EDA are looking to establish a tax-increment financing district for the project.

Though subject to change, the initial proposal includes:

- Between 20-60,000 square-feet of retail space anchored by a grocery store on the east side.
- 400-600 market-rate apartments on the east side above the retail space

- A substantial City park/public open space amenity roughly one third of the overall lot, at the center of the development
- Significant upgrades to area infrastructure for storm water and sanitary sewer utilities
- A low density, single family housing development on the west side of the property
- Underground parking
- Environmentally sustainable amenities, such as solar panels, rain gardens, and high efficiency heat/cooling

The City will seek public feedback on the project as plans move forward. The City is particularly interested in public input on the park portion of the project, which will constitute a new City park in an area that otherwise doesn't have one. The project has the potential to grow the City's tax base considerably, Chirpich said, and continue the City's goal of revitalizing Central Ave into a thriving business district. Facade Improvement Grant Program Seeking Applicants



Eligible business and commercial property owners again have a chance to receive up to \$5,000 in matching grant aid for exterior storefront improvement in the fourth year of the Facade Improvement Grant Program, a collaborative effort between the Economic Development Authority, the Community Development Department, and the Columbia Heights Police Department.

40th Ave Development On Schedule



Last fall, the City of Columbia Heights sold the land it owned at Central and 40th to the City's development partner Alatus. Alatus hired Doran Construction to build a mixeduse development project that includes 266 apartments, a café space, and a new City Ave NE, and along 39th or 40th Ave NE, are eligible. In an effort to reduce crime and enhance safety in area business districts and along Central Ave, the Columbia Heights Police Department also uses the grant program to provide camera surveillance systems to participating businesses.

Pet Care Reminders and Ordinance Requirements

Pet ownership is a rewarding experience, but if it's not taken seriously, it can create neighborly tensions and violate City Ordinance. The following are some reminders of the City's rules and expectations for pet ownership:

• *Pick-Up After Your Pets:* We know it's gross to pick up pet waste, but it's even grosser not to. In fact, it's a heath risk to both pets and people, especially children. Pet waste is full of bacteria that can make humans and animals sick. This gets into water runoff untreated and pollutes nearby waterways. On top of that, it's also an

eyesore and absolutely no fun to step in. **Picking up after your pets is the neighborly thing to do!**

• Keep Pets On Leash: City Code requires that pets remain on leash at all times while in parks and other public spaces, unless those spaces are designated off-leash. The nearest off-leash dog park is Columbia Park at 700 St. Anthony Parkway in Minneapolis. Information on purchasing a permit to use this park can be obtained by calling the Minneapolis Park Board at 612-230-6400 or by visiting their website at https://www.minneapolismn.gov/ resident-services/animals-pets/



- **Maintain Proper ID:** Please make sure that up-to-date vaccination and owner information is available on your pet's collar.
- **Be Mindful of Pet Number Caps:** No household or dwelling unit may have more than three dogs or more than three cats, or a combination of more than five animals exceeding six months of age in the family dwelling unit or on the family premises.
- **Nuisance Prevention:** Owners or custodians of any animal in the City must prevent the animal from being a public

nuisance, including habitual or frequent barking or crying to the annoyance of others. The animals must not be allowed to threaten or harass any person not on the property of the owner or custodian of the animal. The animals must not be allowed to defile or destroy any public or private property not belonging to the owner or custodian of the animal. The animals must not be allowed to chase vehicles or run at-large in the City.

Youth Curfew Reminder

Columbia Heights City Ordinance sets summer curfew limits for youth 17 and younger. Curfew for children 15 and under is 10 pm on weekdays and 11 pm Friday and Saturday. Curfew for 16- and 17-year-olds is 11 pm on weekdays and midnight Friday and Saturday. All curfews are enforced through 5 am.

Having a Backyard Fire? Heed the Red Flag Warnings

On days where it's particularly dangerous to have a recreational fire, the National Weather Service will issue a Red Flag Warning. This means conditions are ripe for fires to get out of control and spread.

Strong winds, low humidity, and a recent drought are the major risk factors for recreational fires. Even if you don't see a Red Flag Warning from the NWS, pay attention to the weather conditions and make a common sense judgment before firing up your BBQ or igniting the fire pit. If you choose to have a fire, be sure to have a water source, like a garden hose, nearby. Don't allow the fire to get taller or wider than three feet. Ensure an adult is supervising the fire at all times. Burn only clean, dry firewood. NEVER burn leaves, building materials, yard waste, trash or plastics.

Fire rings must be located a minimum of 25 feet from all structures, such as houses, and garages. Enclosed freestanding fire pits must be at least 15 feet away from all structures. Open flames are never permitted on balconies.

Police and Fire Department officers are authorized to require that a recreational fire be immediately extinguished and discontinued if it is determined that the fire is not in compliance with the above rules, the smoke is offensive to nearby neighbors, or the burning is determined to constitute a hazardous condition.

Get Your Permits

Permits may be obtained from the Fire Department located at 825 41st Ave NE, Columbia Heights between the hours of 8 AM and 4:30 pm, Mon through Fri. Residents are allowed nine (9) FREE Daily Recreational Fire Permits per year or an Annual Recreational Fire Permit can be purchased for \$25. **The permit must be on site while the fire is burning and all rules are to be strictly followed. Thank you for helping to keep our community safe!**

SEVERE WEATHER AWARENESS

Two of the best and simplest precautions people can take to protect themselves from severe weather is to remain vigilant and take warnings seriously. If you're planning outdoor activities, or know you might be away from a safe shelter for a period of time, check the forecast and be as aware as you can regarding potential severe weather threats. Don't plan to be outside if the forecast predicts severe weather. And when you are outside, identify the nearest shelter in case of a sudden weather shift. Finally, if you hear sirens, don't hesitate to get to shelter. A siren is warning you of an imminent threat. You may not have more than a few minutes to reach a safe place.

Treat or Remove Your Ash Trees

The Minnesota Department of Agriculture confirmed an emerald ash borer (EAB) infestation in Columbia Heights in 2019. Residents are encouraged to look at their ash trees for signs of EAB. Checking for EAB, reporting possible infestations, and following quarantines can slow the spread.

Untreated ash trees in Columbia Heights will likely die within the next two to five years. Trees in the early stages of infection can still be saved with proper treatment, but homeowners cannot delay.

As the infestation progresses, ash trees can decline quickly. Dead ash trees become brittle, more expensive to remove, and more likely to lose branches during a storm.

Before It's Too Late!

For the second year, the City has contracted with Rainbow Treecare to treat public ash trees growing along streets and in parks. A citywide bulk discount will be offered through 2022 to Columbia Heights homeowners for trees on private property that are at least 10" in diameter and in good physical condition. Do you know where rainwater flows? If you guessed the storm water drainage system, you are correct. The storm water system is generally located along street curbs and drains above ground-water runoff. This means anything you put on your lawn, sidewalk, driveway or parking lot will end up with the storm water. The storm water system drains this runoff to ponds, lakes, streams, and rivers. Pollutants in this water hurt wildlife and our recreation areas. Special concerns include phosphorus fertilizers, petroleum products, salt, other chemicals, garbage, and sediments from erosion. Federal and State environmental laws have resulted in more stringent regulations concerning pollution from storm water systems. Local governments may incur large fines if they don't have an active program to reduce pollution. The Public Works Department conducts a required public informational session on our SWPPP (Storm Water Pollution Prevention Program) annually.

The City of Columbia Heights has developed a SWPPP plan in response to Federal and State regulations concerning the quality of water entering streams, rivers, and lakes from storm water drainage systems. At this event the public will have the opportunity to give input and comments on the SWPPP.

MAKE SURE TO SEPARATE OUT FILM PLASTIC

Please do not dispose of your recyclables in a plastic bag. Plastic bags and other film plastics clog the recycling system and break the machines. Plastic bags and film plastic can be recycled, but they must be brought into the Recycling Center separate from all other recycling. The same applies for Styrofoam.

Film plastic and Styrofoam should never go into your recycling cart.

Other items that should not be recycled include paper products that have gotten wet or soiled by food (like pizza boxes, which can be composted), most wrapping paper, and paper decorated with glitter.



Plastic Recycling Challenge

The Columbia Heights Recycling Center, located at 3801 Madison St

NE, will be accepting plastic bags and other film plastic for recycling. These products must be brought to the Recycling Center separate from other single-sort recycling (see info above), or to our bin in City Hall. If the City can recycle 500 pounds of film plastic in a six-month period, Trex Inc. will donate a park bench to the City made with recycled film plastic. The City has earned four benches so far thanks to Trex and residents' commitment to better habits!

Robotic Arms Used for Curbside Pickup

Haulers use trucks with mechanical arms to collect trash and recycling. They use these trucks in the alleys, as well. Please place your cart out where the arm can reach it and allow some space between the carts. **Refuse pads are a convenient way to accomplish this and the City will add these, by request and at-cost, to the annual concrete work schedule.
