2020 Employee of the Year Award Goes to Fire Chief Thompson

Thirty-six years ago, the City Council approved the Employee of the Year Award as a method of rewarding employees seen by their peers and supervisors as deserving of special recognition for their accomplishments and contributions to the City of Columbia Heights. In 2020, Fire Chief Charlie Thompson became the 41th employee to receive the honor.

The year was like no other, but it proved particularly challenging for emergency workers and first-responders. Thompson, in his role as Emergency Manager, assembled the City's COVID-19 Emergency Preparedness Plan to keep the City's employees and residents well informed of the ongoing developments and ever-changing CDC data and recommendations. He and his Public Safety colleagues worked with other City departments to address the local impacts of the unfolding pandemic in a comprehensive and efficient manner while keeping the public educated on proper health and safety protocols. This on top of managing the already demanding dayto-day duties of Fire Chief, a position he filled just months before the pandemic hit.

The coworker who nominated Thompson described him as having incredible foresight. In the early stages of the pandemic, for example, before it was clear how serious things might get, Thompson made sure that Columbia Heights had enough personal protective equipment (PPE) for first-responders and other staff by securing a reserve of PPE gear that helped get the City through the national PPE shortage. Additionally, after Gov. Tim Walz asked residents to make and donate face masks to their local fire departments, Thompson



helped coordinate a face mask collection effort in April that resulted in 368 mask donations. He then arranged delivery of the masks to local congregate care facilities short on PPE.

But 2020 wasn't all hardship. Thompson also contributed to the City by offering up his very own chili recipe, which helped the Columbia Heights' Team CH-ili win first place at the annual Chili Cook-off fund raiser for the Lee Carlson Center for Mental Health and Well-Being.

The Employee of the Year nomination review committee is composed of former Employee of the Year recipients who

are still employed by the City. When a person is selected as Employee of the Year, their name and year of award is engraved on a large plaque

displayed in the Council Chambers. They receive a congratulatory letter, a day off of their choosing (with pay), an article and picture in the City Newsletter, a month-long announcement on the electronic bulletin board outside City Hall, and a featured role in the annual Jamboree parade. On rare occasions, more than one employee is selected in a given year.

On an annual basis, all Columbia Heights employees have the opportunity to nominate themselves or another employee(s) for the award based on three criteria: Public Relations, Consistency of Performance, and Significant Accomplishments.

We congratulate Chief Charlie Thompson for meeting these criteria and being an asset, not just to the Fire Department, but to the community, to our entire workplace, and our lives.

Free Video Streaming Service Offered Through Our Library

The Columbia Heights Public Library has added Kanopy, a video streaming service, to the library's digital offerings.

Kanopy offers Columbia Heights Library cardholders free access to a carefully curated collection of more than 30,000 films. Selections include feature-length films, documentaries, international films, classics, and educational content for all ages. Collections include The Criterion Collection, The Great Courses, PBS films, and many more.

In addition to its collection for adults, the service also includes Kanopy Kids, which features thousands of entertaining and educational videos curated specifically for children, including Scholastic videos, Highlights, PBS kids and Little Pim language learning.

Library patrons can create a Kanopy account with a library card number. Patrons can stream up to 10 videos per month. Once a selection is made, patrons will have full and unlimited access to each title for 72 hours. Kanopy Kids video content is unlimited, and does not count toward streaming credits.

At-Home Wireless Printing Now Available Through the Library

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You can send documents to print from your home computer or mobile device to the library. First, go to www.tinyurl.com/heightsprint and upload your document. Then visit the library to pay for and release your printing from the self-service kiosk. Pricing is 10 cents per page for black-and-white printing, and 50 cents per page for color printing.

You can also print from your smartphone by downloading the SmartALEC for iPhone or SmartALEC for Android app. Mobile printing allows library patrons to work from the comfort of home and visit the library when they are ready to pick up their prints. No need to have a home printer that you use once a year. No need to purchase expensive ink cartridges that may dry out before your next print. You can print invoices, account statements, tax returns, college course packets, tickets or coupons at the library. With a library card, or a temporary guest pass generated by the website, the patron can upload a file to print. That file remains secure in the cloud until they visit the library, pay, and release it. SmartALEC also allows patrons to collect prints from any library in Anoka County.

The Library has numerous other online resources available for you to use for free. All you need is a library card with a PIN. If you don't have a card, you can come by the library during office hours and order one. It's free!

Facade Improvement Grant Program Enters Fourth Year

Eligible business and commercial property owners will again have a chance to receive up to \$5,000 in matching grant aid for exterior storefront improvement in the fourth year of the Facade Improvement Grant Program, a collaborative effort between the Economic Development Authority, the Community Development Department, and the Columbia Heights Police Department.

Any commercial properties located along Central Ave NE, between 37th and 47th Ave NE, and along 39th or 40th Ave NE, are eligible. In an effort to reduce crime and enhance safety in area business districts and along Central Ave, the Columbia Heights Police Department also uses the grant program to provide monitored camera surveillance adjacent to participating businesses.

The City will start taking applications for the 2021 Facade Improvement Grant Program in the spring. Check columbiaheightsmn.gov for updates.

CHPD Implements New Non-Lethal Restraint Technology

The Columbia Heights Police Department added a new, non-lethal crime-fighting tool this year called the BolaWrap. A hand-held remote restraint device, the BolaWrap discharges a Kevlar tether eight feet long that entangles a subject at a range of 10-25 feet. This allows officers to temporarily restrain a subject at a safe distance and potentially reduce the person's ability to struggle, minimizing the need to use higher levels of force. Even though it sounds like a gun shot being fired, the device is less likely to injure



somebody compared to electronic control devices like the Taser. It doesn't incapacitate subjects like other use-of-force options. The BolaWrap is cutting-edge technology, currently only in use at a handful of police agencies throughout Minnesota. The CHPD places minimal

reliance on use-of-force in its priority to protect the dignity and liberty of all persons and places. The application of deadly force is a measure to be employed in only the most extreme circumstances. Because of this, the CHPD continues to research and implement innovative technology to minimize risk and ensure officers are properly equipped to perform their job tasks at a high level. 2020 CHPD Use-of-Force Incidents **Remain Low, Report Is Online**

The Police Department has compiled its annual use-offorce statistics for 2020 and the results are in line with 2019 numbers. The state requires police agencies to report any use of force that results in death or serious bodily injury, as well as the discharge of a firearm toward a subject. The CHPD did not have any incidents that met this criteria in 2020. The department responded to 23,253 calls for service and used force in only 75 incidents. Open hand techniques (escort holds or joint locks) were the most common type of force used. A copy of our summary report is available on the police department website at www. chpolice.com

Search and Rescue **Drones Deployed** at Public Safety

The Columbia Heights Police Department has begun operation on a UAS (Drone) program for Public Safety. The City purchased two drones in 2020 as part of a Public Safety drone program in conjunction with the Fire Department. The Police Department will be operating under the recent legislative changes that outline the use for drones by law enforcement. The drones will be used for search and rescue and emergency response.

100th Anniversary Badge Design

For 2021, the CHPD designed a 100th anniversary badge that combines the styles of the department's original badge with the recognition of this year's City centennial

celebration. Officers had the option to purchase the badge. It's authorized for uniform wear in 2021. The CHPD will also be sharing snapshots from its department history throughout the year to highlight the rich and storied history of the department.

/ FIREFIGHTERS WANTED

The Columbia Heights Fire Department is looking for on-call firefighters to join the team. On April 5, 6 pm, the department will hold a recruitment open house for those who wish to learn more about the job responsibilities. The following are some common questions the department receives about the duties of being a firefighter:

How Much Training Is Required?

On-call firefighters must complete the same amount of training as full-time firefighters. They do receive hourly pay for training, and will learn valuable skills that they can use in other areas of their lives. Recruit firefighters complete 125 hours of EMT training, 98 hours of Firefighter level 1 training, 50 hours for Firefighter level 2 training, and 48 hours of hazmat training. Completing all training takes about 18 months.

What If I'm Not Confident I'm the Right Fit?

"Through fellowship and training, you will obtain the skills necessary to build your confidence," said Fire Chief Charlie Thompson. "If you are ready to serve but still have doubts, we are happy to discuss the role further and assist you in determining if this opportunity is right for you."

Who's Eligible?

If you're 18 or older, live within or near the City borders, and have a valid driver's license, you're eligible to apply. It's as simple as that.

What Are the Time Requirements?

On-call firefighters have day jobs and families to worry about, so they are not expected to answer every call. To ensure flexibility, the department requires on-call firefighters to answer roughly 30% of calls. The number of calls that occur on any given day can vary widely.

What Will I Get Out of It?

"You get to be there to help someone when they're having the worst day of their life," Thompson said. "You will walk away feeling like you've made a difference, all while being a part of a team and gaining valuable experience." On-call firefighters also get paid. They receive pension benefits if they commit for five years.

How Do I Apply?

Applications can be submitted online by visiting www. heightsfire.com and clicking the Firefighter Employment Opportunities link in the navigation menu. Call 763-706-8150 for more information. The department is eager to recruit new firefighters, so please spread the word if you know of anyone who might be interested.

Emerald Ash Borer Update

Now is the time to make a decision about the long term future of your ash tree. Emerald ash borer (EAB) was confirmed in Columbia Heights in 2019 and is currently killing trees in the City. It's only a matter of time before the beetle infects all ash trees in the area. Infested trees quickly become brittle and dangerous as the infection progresses, becoming more difficult and expensive to remove. EAB treatments are available, but are only effective as a preventative or early in the course of infection.

The City continues to actively manage EAB in the pub-

lic forest (street and park trees) with the help of a \$100,000 grant from the MnDNR. As for trees on private property, residents will need to decide quickly about whether to treat and preserve their ash trees or have the trees removed. Property owners are responsible for the care and maintenance of all trees located on their property. "Not making a decision on treating or removing your ash trees is essentially deciding to have them removed," said Liam Genter, Urban Forestry Specialist. "The mortality rates in areas previously hit by EAB are greater than 95 percent."

PUBLIC WORKS SPRING REMINDERS

Fire Hydrant Flushing April & May

Fire hydrant flushing will take place in April and early May. Hydrants will be flushed from 7 am to 3:30 pm. It's necessary to flush all City hydrants to ensure they're in good working condition and to clear sediment. As a result of the flushing you may notice some temporary discoloration of the water. Flush your residential system by running the cold water for 10 to 20 minutes. Avoid washing clothes while hydrants are being flushed in your area, as discolored water may leave stains. Some localized flushing may be necessary throughout the year.

Spring Street Sweeping Begins Soon

The street department will begin street sweeping as soon as weather permits, usually in early April. Areas around lakes and ponds will be swept first to minimize the amount of sediment entering these bodies of water. Sweeping operations will continue until all streets have been swept twice.

Prevent Sewer Backups

Over time, homeowners may experience problems such as collapsed pipes or tree roots growing into service lines that can cause stoppages with their sewer service lines. If your sewer backs up it may be time to clean or repair the line. Before hiring a contractor, call Public Works Utilities at 763-706-3700. They will check the City's mainline condition in the street for a possible blockage. **This service is free.**

Remember, property owners are responsible for the water service and sewer service from the house or structure to the main in the street, including the connection to the City main.

Bags must be brought directly to the Recycling Center at 3801 Madison St NE, Columbia Heights, on Saturdays from 9 am to 1 pm. Large cardboard pieces and household scrap metal items and household batteries can also be brought to the recycling center.

Compostable Products Reminder

Delivery style pizza boxes, paper egg cartons, paper towels, and napkins can be composted along with other organic material. Order a compost cart from the City for \$2.53 per month by emailing publicworks@columbiaheightsmn.gov. Carts can also be used for yard waste. They are emptied year-round and come with an organics kitchen kit and new bag of compost.

Yard Waste Collection

Yard Waste collection begins in April after the snow cover melts. Woody tree waste can be brought to the Anoka County site for a fee. Personal con-

tainers will not be emptied by the hauler. Be sure to bundle the brush, or order a City compost cart. Carts can be ordered anytime by calling 763-706-3706.
