CITY REDEVELOPMENT UPDATES

4300 Central Ave Site Redevelopment Plans Moving Forward

In the summer of 2021, Alatus LLC purchased the mostly vacant strip mall located at 4300 Central Ave. Dollar Tree is the last tenant remaining on the location at this time. They are expected to vacate the space at the end of June. Once that happens, Alatus plans to immediately demolish the existing building in preparation for redevelopment.

The preliminary plans for the site include a mix of high-density residential housing, medium density residential housing,

commercial/retail space, and public open space.

The final site plans have not been approved by the City. The City and Alatus plan to introduce more detailed plans in the spring of 2023 and seek feedback from residents.

Alatus and the City would like to have the land-use approval process completed by the end of 2023, with the intent of breaking ground on phase one of the redevelopment project in the spring of 2024.



City Hall, Apartment Complex Mixed-Use Development Updates



Alatus LLC has completed the market-rate apartment project located at the corner of Central and 40th Avenue. Residents began moving into Ratio apartments in October of 2022. The overall development project includes 266 apartments, a 3,500 square foot café space, and new City Hall. The build-out of the new City Hall condo unit started in October of 2022. It's expected to open

in June of 2023. Alatus has not secured a tenant for the café space at this time. The City Hall space will be owned by the City, like a condo, and will take up nearly the entire first floor of the building. The City will likely sell the property where the existing City Hall stands. It's too early to know what might replace the existing City Hall building. Housing Redevelopment Project Behind the Public Safety Building to be Completed This Summer

Reuter Walton development has hired Frana Construction to complete the 62-unit affordable housing development project located behind the City's Public Safety campus. The apartment project broke ground in the summer of 2022, and is expected to open in July of 2023.

The original site plan for the property included a separate development parcel that was intended to be sold to Southern Anoka Community Assistance (SACA) for the relocation of their operations into a new building. Since the original project approvals, SACA has decided not to relocate to the site and have shifted their focus to the acquisition of an existing industrial property located within the City. Currently, there are no backup plans for the development of the site that was expected to sell to SACA.

CHPD SOCIAL WORKER PROGRAM COMPLETES FIRST YEAR

The Columbia Heights Police Department completed its first full year of its embedded co-responder social worker program, in partnership with Canvas Health.

Eileen Crosby started with the department in December of 2021 and Erin Buller joined the team in the summer of 2022. Both are licensed independent clinical social workers. Between the two of them, they are available to answer calls 10 am to 11 pm Monday through Friday. The program has delivered impressive results already. The social workers

served 457 clients in their first year (312 of those were engaged during a co-response with police) for a total of 1,954 client interactions. A major goal of the co-responder program was to reduce the need for police use of force. Out of the 312 co-responder calls, 303 were resolved without the need for use of force, 307 did not lead to the individual going to jail, and 275 did

not require the client to be hospitalized. Instead, 36 clients were referred to medical treatment, 145 individuals were provided with new resources, and 126 were re-engaged with established services.

Over the past year, the number of calls from Columbia Heights to Anoka County Mobile Crisis has increased by 177%. This means more residents know about the crisis line and are using it compared to 2021. An internal survey showed 73% of CHPD officers believed that the embedded

social workers have reduced the number of times force would have been needed on calls. The program is funded through the first quarter of 2024, though the City will explore options for extension.

CHPD Use-of-Force Statistics for 2022

- The CHPD responded to 24,909 calls for service in 2022
- A minimal amount of force was used in 0.34% of these calls, with a total of 85 incidents for the year.
- Open hand techniques were the most common type of force used.
- No injury was reported in 93% of cases where force was used. Of those who reported injuries, minor pain or abrasions were the most common.

The application of deadly force is a measure to be employed in the most extreme circumstances. The CHPD goes beyond the state and federal reporting requirements to monitor use-of-force incidents and ensure compliance with the law and department policy. Full report at chpolice.com.

Curfew Reminder

Columbia Heights City Ordinance sets curfew limits for youth 17 and younger. Curfew for children 15 and under is 10 pm on weekdays and 11 pm Friday and Saturday. Curfew for 16- and 17-year-olds is 11 pm on weekdays and midnight Friday and Saturday. All curfews are enforced through 5 am.

WE NEED FIREFIGHTERS RECRUITMENT OPEN HOUSE IS APRIL 26

The Columbia Heights Fire Department needs more on-call firefighters to join the team. On April 26, 6 pm, the department will hold a recruitment open house for those who wish to learn more about the job responsibilities, check out the equipment, meet firefighters, and ask questions. The Open House will be at the Fire Station, 825 41st Ave NE, Columbia Heights, 6-8 pm. Registration for the event is not required, but it is appreciated. How Much Training Is Required?

On-call firefighters receive hourly pay for training and learn valuable skills they can use in other areas of their lives. Recruit firefighters complete 125 hours of EMT training, 98 hours of Firefighter level 1 training, 50 hours for Firefighter level 2 training, and 48 hours of hazmat training. All training takes about 18 months.

Who's Eligible to Apply?

If you're 18 or older, live within 10 minutes from the fire station, and have a valid driver's license, you're eligible to apply. It's as simple as that.

What Are the Time Requirements?

On-call firefighters are not expected to answer every call. To ensure flexibility, the department requires on-call firefighters to answer roughly 30% of calls.

What Will I Get Out of It?

You get to be there to help someone when they're having the worst day of their life, and will walk away feeling like you've made a difference, all while being a part of a team and gaining valuable, real-world experience. On-call firefighters also get paid. They receive pension benefits if they commit for five years.

What You Put On Your Lawn and Driveway Washes Into Waterways

Water runoff from your driveway and lawn washes directly into the storm water drainage system. Storm drains are generally located along street curbs and siphon above ground water runoff. So anything you put on your lawn, sidewalk, driveway or parking lot, or any waste you don't pick up, will drain into ponds, lakes, streams, and rivers. These pollutants harm wildlife and recreation areas.

Special concerns include phosphorus fertilizers, petroleum products, salt, other chemicals, garbage, and sediments from erosion. Federal and State environmental laws have resulted in more stringent regulations concerning pollution from storm water systems. Local governments may incur large fines if they do not have an active program to reduce storm water pollution.

Storm Water Pollution Prevention Public Information Session Is June 14

The Public Works Department conducts a required public informational session on our SWPPP (Storm Water Pollution Prevention Program) annually. This year it will be held June 14 during the Art and Info Fair in Huset Park, 4-7 pm. The City of Columbia Heights has developed a SWPPP

plan in response to Federal and State regulations concerning the quality of water entering streams, rivers, and lakes from storm water drainage systems. At this event, the public will have the opportunity to ask questions and give input and comments on the SWPPP.

PUBLIC WORKS SPRING REMINDERS

Fire Hydrant Flushing April & May

Fire hydrant flushing takes place in April and early May. Hydrants will be flushed from 7 am to 3 pm. It's necessary to flush all City hydrants to ensure they're in good working condition and to clear sediment. As a result of the flushing you may notice some temporary discoloration of the water. Flush your residential system by running cold water for 10 to 20 minutes. Avoid washing clothes while hydrants are being flushed in your area, as discolored water may stain. Some localized flushing may be necessary throughout the year.

Spring Street Sweeping Begins Soon

The street department will begin street sweeping as soon as weather permits, usually in early April. Areas around lakes and ponds will be swept first to minimize the amount of sediment entering these bodies of water. Sweeping operations will continue until all streets have been swept twice.

Prevent Sewer Backups

Over time, homeowners may experience problems such as collapsed pipes or tree roots growing into service lines that can cause stoppages with their sewer service lines. If your sewer backs up, it may be time to clean or repair the line. Before hiring a contractor, call Public Works at 763-706-3700. They will check the City's mainline condition in the street for a possible blockage. This service is free.

Water Service Leak? Sewer Clog?

Property owners are responsible for the water service and sewer service from the house or structure to the main in the street, including the connection to the City main.

MAKE SURE TO SEPARATE OUT FILM PLASTIC AND STYROFOAM

Please do not dispose of your recyclables in a plastic bag. Plastic bags and other film plastics clog the recycling system and break the machines, requiring time-consuming de-clogs and repairs. Plastic bags and film plastic can be recycled, but they must be brought into the Recycling Center separate from all other recycling. The same applies for Styrofoam. Film plastic and Styrofoam should never go into your recycling cart. These products must be brought to the Recycling Center separate from other single-sort recycling. Tips for Recycling Items Not Picked Up With Curbside Recycling

Plastic Bags and Styrofoam Blocks

The Recycling Center accepts clean plastic bags, plastic films, and white Styrofoam (rigid block type only), clean and free of tape. These items must be brought directly to the Recy-



cling Center at 3801 Madison St NE, Saturdays, 9 am to 1 pm.

Compostable Products

Delivery style pizza boxes, paper egg cartons, paper towels and any other wet or food-soiled paper, organic food products (not including grease, oil, or gum), BPI certified compostable utensils, house plants and flowers, tea bags (remove staple), and non-treated wood items such as chopsticks, popsicle sticks, and tooth picks, can be composted. Yard Waste Collection

Yard Waste collection begins in April after the snow cover melts. Woody tree waste can be brought to the Anoka County site for a fee. Use paper bags. Emerald Ash Borer Alert! Take Action ASAP

The City Forester would like the public to know that the emerald ash borer problem in Columbia Heights is now critical and not going

away. Ash trees are dying in all areas of the City and management decisions need to be made ASAP.

Property owners are responsible for the management of trees on their property and should be aware that all untreated ash trees will die, if they haven't already, and need to be removed. But a bulk discount on EAB treatment for residents is still available through Rainbow Treecare (call 952-922-3810 or visit www.rainbowtreecare. com). Treatment is highly effec-

tive and less expensive than removal, but it must begin before too much damage occurs in order to be effective. This is no longer an

option for most ash trees.

For tree removal, the City recommends seeking multiple bids from at least three licensed professionals. Find a list of local licensed contractors at www.columbiaheightsmn.gov/trees. No City funding is available for removals. As the situation worsens, the City may order removal of dead or diseased trees on private property in the interest of public safety.
