Human Rights Commission



On March 22, 2021, Crescent Springs became the 21st Kentucky City to adopt a Fairness Ordinance. The Fairness Ordinance established a three-person Human Rights Commission whose mission is to promote and protect basic

human rights for all people who live and work in our community. Commission members were selected through an application process and approved by City Council: Kristin Tierney, Chair; Hannah Briner, Vice Chair; Jason Abeln, Secretary/Treasurer; Christina Wissman, Alternate. The HRC began their regular meetings in September at the City Building, and will continue their meetings on the second Thursday of the month in 2022.

The HRC will be working closely with the Kentucky Commission on Human Rights and the Northern Kentucky Pride Center to plan community activities and identify opportunities that promote the Fairness Ordinance's policies of inclusivity and anti-discrimination in Crescent Springs. As established by the Ordinance, the HRC also has a role in reviewing complaints filed under the City's Fairness Ordinance. Mayor Justin Hartfiel said, *"The City of Crescent Springs is proud to be committed to diversity, equity, and inclusion for all, and the establishment of this commission as well as the passage of our Fairness Ordinance demonstrate that on a daily basis."*

The Commission is currently seeking community input on ways the City can continue to improve equality and inclusion in Crescent Springs. The HRC encourages anyone that lives or works in Crescent Springs to submit feedback and suggestions for consideration where indicated on the HRC's page on the City's website.

The HRC's page on the City's website provides information on filing a complaint under the Fairness Ordinance in the near future. In the meantime, if anyone feels they have been discriminated against in Crescent Springs, please send a written complaint to Mike Daly, City Administrator.

K9 Memorial

A local Police K9 Memorial has received generous support

from The Richard and Barbara Hoefinghoff Charitible Trust and Fedders Feed in Covington. Villa Hills Mayor Heather Jansen together with her siblings, Rick Hoefinghoff and Schelli Schroder, as trustees have authorized funds from their parents' trust to contribute to the Police K9 Memorial which is located at Highland Pet Cemetery in Fort Mitchell. The trustees have provided funds to pay for future cremation and burial of Northern Kentucky Police K9s. Support from the trust also provided for the monument and burial plots. The inscription on the monument reads: "In memory of the police canine officers who risked their lives and dedicated themselves so that others may be safe. They were the nose and ears of their officers and police departments. May their unfailing dedication be honored by all those who they have served. We are forever grateful." Visitors to Highland Pet Cemetery and the nearby Highland Cemetery hiking trails have admired the memorial which includes an image of Santo, a beloved K9 who worked with now retired DEA officer and K9 handler Miguel Rodriguez. The landscaping around the monument will be donated by Fedders Feed in Covington. Warmest thanks to Mayor Jansen, her siblings, and to Fedders Feed of Covington for their contributions to the memorial.



THE Z21 PROCESS

A new era of planning and zoning in Kenton County launched in Spring 2021 with the unveiling of an ordinance that creates a modern and more user-and businessfriendly zoning code.

The Kenton County Z21 effort updates existing zoning codes that were adopted decades ago with a flexible, streamlined, simpler ordinance that communities can customize to meet their individual needs. The City of Villa Hills and several other cities have embraced the new zoning ordinance and updated their codes.

In August 2021, our work here in Crescent Springs began with the Planning & Development Services of Kenton County (PDS) to tailor and implement the new Z21 Zoning Ordinance for our city. Mayor Justin Hartfiel identified members to sit on the steering committee for the Z21 process. This will be a year or more long commitment with bimonthly meetings with PDS staff, and perhaps more meetings on our own. When completed, the Kenton County Z21 Blueprint Zoning Ordinance will update existing decades-old zoning codes.

Along with more ease of use, standardized code sections, and the ability of communities to customize the code to meet its needs, other benefits include:

 Improved efficiency, flexibility, simplicity and predictability;

- An online platform that can be easily searched and crossreferenced;
- A streamlined approval process;
- Utilizing Link-GIS to ensure existing neighborhoods match the new zoning standards;
- Protecting the unique character of compatible infill development through architectural standards for commercial and residential buildings and infill development incentives;
- Protecting environmental, cultural and historic resources through floodplain hillside development standards, tree preservation requirements, and stream buffers.

PARK SHELTER RESERVATIONS

Reservations are now being accepted for the 2022 season for Shelter #2 and Shelter #3. As a reminder, Shelter #1 is not available to rent, but is for community use on a "first come, first



s e r v e d " basis. Shelter #2 is to the left when you enter the Park from Buttermilk Pike, adjacent to the 9/11 and Kenton County Veteran's Memorial. This shelter is in close proximity to the playground and restrooms, and offers the use of eight picnic tables, four grills and has electric.

Shelter #3 is to the right when you enter the park from Buttermilk Pike. This shelter is ideal for groups who would like a quieter setting, and offers ten picnic tables, four grills and has electric.

The rental fee for either Shelter #2 or Shelter #3 is \$40 for residents and \$80 for non-residents. You can make your reservation through the City website at http://crescent-springs.ky.us/reservepark-shelters/ or you may call the City Building at 859.341.3017.
