Minutes of a Meeting of the Town Board of the Town of Eastchester held on Tuesday, February 6, 2024 at 7:30 p.m., at the Town Hall, 40 Mill Road, Eastchester, New York.

IV. OPPORTUNITY TO ADDRESS THE BOARD ON AGENDA ITEMS

V. APPOINTMENTS

A). POLICE OFFICER

Councilman Marcoccia offered a motion that was seconded by Councilwoman Nicholson to approve the probationary appointment of Bryan Brown of Bronxville, NY to the position of Police Officer. Mr. Brown is currently employed as a Police Officer in the City of Mt. Vernon, NY.

The appointment is contingent upon receipt of final approval from Westchester County Dept. of Personnel of the transfer and his pending successful completion of his medical and background requirements. As provided in the Westchester County Civil Service rules it is necessary for him to serve a probationary period of a minimum of twelve weeks to a maximum of fifty-two weeks.

Supervisor Colavita asked Town Historian Richard Forliano to speak to the credentials of his new protégée Adrian Gjelaj.

Town Historian Richard Forliano expressed that it is an honor for him to be here for this occasion. Mr. Forliano mentioned that he has been working with Adrian Gjelaj for the past five years and that Adrian is on the same level as graduates from the most prestigious colleges and universities in America. Adrian recently graduated from Buffalo, majoring in computer science and history. Mr. Forliano went on to say that he couldn't think of anyone better suited for this role and that Adrian is a testament to the excellence of the Eastchester Schools. Mr. Forliano concluded by mentioning that Adrian will be collaborating with him on many future presentations and that the one currently in the works is about the History of Faith which covers from Anne Hutchinson to the Eastchester Covenant and up until today. Mr. Forliano then called upon Adrian to say a few words.

Adrian Gjelaj expressed his appreciation for this opportunity. He mentioned that history has always been his passion and thanked his parents for cultivating this passion. He also thanked Mr. Forliano for helping him to learn more about local history and about volunteering. He concluded by thanking the Town and by saying that he is honored to be able to help the Town in promoting local history.

Supervisor Colavita thanked Adrian for volunteering for the position and highlighted the deep history of Eastchester. He also thanked Mr. Forliano for all the work that he has done for the Town.

Councilwoman Marcotte thanked Mr. Forliano for his years of service and wished him continued success in working with Adrian. She mentioned that there is no shortage of work to be done by Mr. Forliano and his now new protégé going forward. She thanked Adrian’s parents and teachers for instilling this passion for history in him. She also thanked Adrian for volunteering for this new role.

Councilwoman Marcotte offered a motion that was seconded by Councilman Giacobbe to approve the appointment of Adrian Gjelaj of Eastchester, NY to the position of Associate Town Historian effective immediately.

X. COUNCIL MEMBER REPORTS –

- COUNCILMAN MARCOCCIA

- COUNCILWOMAN NICHOLSON

Councilwoman Nicholson provided information on the Eastchester Care Coalition’s “Crimson Courage” Community Service Scholarship in the name of Glenn Bellitto (past Eastchester Town Board Member). This Scholarship is open to all recent graduates applying to trade school or college who exhibit exemplary dedication to their community. Mr. Bellitto who passed away at the beginning of the COVID pandemic, in April of 2020, will always be remembered for dedicating his life to the service to others. Beginning in his youth raising money for the Muscular Dystrophy Association, his passion for community service only grew stronger. He dedicated his time to a wide range of causes, including the homeless, senior citizens, veterans, the environment, and many more. The scholarship amount is \$5,000 and the criteria is outlined in the application. The winner of the Crimson Courage Community Service Award will be honored at the Annual Candlelight Vigil in the spring. All submissions are due by March 1, 2024. Go to the web-site www.Lovenevergivesup.com for the application.

Councilwoman Nicholson also gave an Eastchester Environmental Committee reminder regarding the Food Scrap Program. A few years ago, a food scraps program was established by the Town for residents. This program involves separating food scraps from your household trash. Information can be found on the Highway Department’s section of the Town’s web-site or by calling (914) 961- 8540.

- COUNCILWOMAN MARCOTTE

Councilwoman Marcotte provided an update on one of the senior programs that was scheduled for January but was cancelled. The Elder Care Senior Citizen and Mediation Seminar has been rescheduled for February 27th at the Community Center. If interested RSVP by contacting Senior Services.

- COUNCILMAN ANTHONY GIACOBBE

Councilman Giacobbe provided a reminder that the Library will be closed Friday, February 8th for construction. He also provided an update from the Parks and Recreation Department that information on their Summer programs will soon be available on the Town’s web-site. He congratulated the Eastchester

High School Varsity Swim Team for winning the New York State Championships. Councilman Giacobbe concluded by mentioning that based on a conversation with his son on the first 100 days of school, he would like to acknowledge the first 100 days of full time School Resource Officers (SROs) in all of the schools. He further mentioned that this has been a tremendous success and that it has been good for both the Students and Police Officers.

- SUPERVISOR COLAVITA

XI. SECOND OPPORTUNITY TO ADDRESS THE BOARD

Preston Flammang (Non-resident from Fleetwood): Mr. Flammang mentioned that he has two daughters that have played in the Tuckahoe Eastchester Bronxville (TEB) Softball League and wanted to understand the issues. He referenced money and time as the factors and also noted capacity. He mentioned that he understands that funding comes from residents' taxes. He went on to say that both of his children go to Chapel School and that the Chapel School provides a lot of support to the community. He hoped that Chapel School's contribution would count. He asked if a grandfather clause could be considered or some other compromise could be agreed.

Supervisor Colavita acknowledged the appreciation of what the Churches do for our community but mentioned that this is a little different. He stated that this was not a sudden decision and that back in 2022, and several times prior to that, the Town advised all of the leagues, no more non-residents. Everyone was given the Fall of 2022, the Spring of 2023, the Summer of 2023, and the Fall of 2023. That was the grandfather period. Unfortunately, the leagues didn't advise the non-residents that the Town was going to enforce this policy.

Mr. Flammang as a follow-up wanted to know what the catalyst was for this recent enforcement and asked if this been enforced in the past. He also referenced a National Rule that your school determined your eligibility. Supervisor Colavita clarified that the Town is not bound by Little League Rules. He went on to say that when he was a coach in Little League, the coach's job was to verify the addresses of every single registrant and any non-resident was not allowed to play. It's about residency not where you go to school. Supervisor Colavita mentioned that the most important thing here is that the leagues should have never admitted non-residents in the first place. He also noted that the Town gets no money from these leagues. Mr. Flammang suggested that charging more money to non-residents and the Town getting access to more fields for the leagues to use would solve these problems. Supervisor Colavita mentioned that the fields are paid for by the taxpayers and that there is also a capacity issue. He also noted that the Town does use Bronxville and Tuckahoe facilities already. The Supervisor suggested that the Hillcrest Little League can be used by residents of Mount Vernon and Yonkers. The Town has also given field space to the Chapel School when needed. He then went on to say that the resident population in the Eastchester, Bronxville, and Tuckahoe schools has exploded and that the Town needs to be able to supply field space to them. Supervisor Colavita told Mr. Flammang that he appreciated his comments and reiterated that this is not easy to do but the Town has to do it.

Jonathan Graves (Non-resident Fleetwood): A parent of a child at St. Joseph's School, Mr. Graves cited Little League Rules that mandate school eligibility. He questioned that how there aren't enough fields as he believes that there are 27 active fields available in Town. He also couldn't understand how the Town could change something like this that has been in place for 15 to 20 years. He went on to say that eliminating 300 players would be giving up close to \$400K in revenues for the leagues. He then highlighted the breach of Little League Rules and mentioned that what the Town is doing sets a bad precedent that might be followed by other towns. Supervisor Colavita highlighted that the Town's policy overrules Little League Rules as these are Town owned fields and that Little League International agrees with the Town's stance. Supervisor Colavita also mentioned that this has nothing to do with what school you attend, this is based on resident vs non-resident. The only exception is with the Bronxville, Eastchester, and Tuckahoe Schools as they required that their non-resident students be eligible in exchange for the Town using their facilities. There are probably 3 to 4 in this category which is unimpactful. Supervisor Colavita suggested that there are other options available to non-residents.

Cristina Battista (Johnson Road, Eastchester): Mentioned that they chose to live in Eastchester even with its higher taxes because of what the Town offered. She was told when they moved to Town that everyone on a team had to be a resident. She went on to say that her son didn't make the travel team and it turned out that 8 out of 12 kids on this team were non-residents. This is upsetting especially when you pay a lot in taxes.

Supervisor Colavita wanted to add that the Town previously had an intermunicipal agreement with Westchester County to take care of and manage Scout Field but this stopped a couple of years ago. The soccer leagues would practice and have games on this field. The Bronxville Youth Lacrosse Association and the Bronxville Youth Softball Association would also practice on this field. This further compounded the issues faced today.

Ray Renee (Channing Place): Wanted to thank the Town for finishing the sidewalk on California Road. It has made things a lot safer for residents. He also wanted to know what is going on in Chester Heights on California Road where the utility company is digging up the road for the third time. He also wanted to know if the Town is going after them for not getting it right the first two times. Supervisor Colavita committed to having them monitored going forward.

Mike Spiciarich (Eastchester Resident): His kids go to Chapel School and wanted to understand the numbers of kids in the leagues that are in these schools vs. the number of kids that are just non-residents. He also asked if Saint Joe's, Chapel and ICS were to donate fields would the Town reconsider its stance. Then he asked about Lake Isle and mentioned that it is also crowded and asked if non-resident have different pricing.

Brendan Schepis (Everett Street): Is a coach at ICS and mentioned that 90% of the kids in their gym are Eastchester residents and that these schools do a lot for the community. He also mentioned that it's a small number of non-residents that are in these schools that are also in the leagues. Supervisor Colavita again reiterated that the Town does appreciate what these Schools/Churches do for the community but that there is a field capacity issue.

Steve Sanzillo (Tuckahoe Resident): He is part of TYA and expressed his interest in grandfathering kids 12 and under or some other kind of compromise. He understands that the leagues are at fault but doesn't want the kids to be the ones that suffer. He also complimented Sally Veltidi, Superintendent of Parks & Recreation, on the great work that she does with the leagues. Supervisor Colavita reiterated that non-residents should have never have been allowed in the leagues in the first place.

Daniel Ventarola (46 Johnson Road Eastchester): He mentioned that he agrees with the Town's stance but thinks that there should be some kind of compromise as it is about the kids.

Steve Rebanco (Bronxville P.O.): Has been coaching for several years in the leagues and stated that he can no longer coach his kids if his 10-year-old and a 6-year-old can no longer play in the leagues. He mentioned that they would have never signed up if they had known this years ago. He would like it if the Town could consider a grandfather clause.

Supervisor Colavita concluded that there are other leagues where someone could coach. He also mentioned that it's not about the churches/schools, it's about non-residency and the field crunch.

XII. ADJOURNMENT

There being no further public business, Supervisor Colavita offered a motion that was seconded by Councilwoman Marcotte to adjourn the meeting.

On the roll call, all voted "AYE." Motion carried.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:55 p.m.
