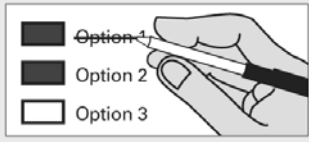
How to vote

Referendum Measure No.88
The legislature passed Initiative Measure No. 1000 concerning affirmative action and remedying discrimination, and voters have filed a sufficient referendum petition on this act. The legislature extended, without a vote of the people, the business and occupation tax for extracting, manufacturing, and selling timber and timber-related products, costing \$21,000,000 in its first ten years, for government spending.

Substitute House Bill 1652
The legislature increased, without a vote of the people, retail sales tax on architectural paint by adding an assessment to the purchase price, costing \$6,000,000 in its first ten years, for government spending.

Engrossed Second Substitute House Bill 1873
The legislature imposed, without a vote of the people, a tax on the sale, use, consumption, handling, possession, and distribution of vapor products costing \$178,000,000 in its first ten years, for government spending.

Engrossed Substitute Senate Bill 5993

Engrossed Substitute Senate Bill 5997

Engrossed Substitute Senate Bill 5998

Engrossed Substitute Senate Bill 6004
