The Glendale Police Department constitutes an organization whose existence is justified solely on the basis of service to our community. It is the duty and privilege of each employee not only to protect our citizens from the criminal, but also to protect and defend the rights guaranteed under our structure of government. We must extend a strong determination to protect and support individual rights while at times providing for the security of persons and property in the community. We must enforce the laws of the State of Missouri and the City of Glendale with impartiality, compassion and professionalism.



# Administration of the Glendale Police Department

#### Overview

The Glendale Police Department is a full service law enforcement agency providing quality protection and services to the citizens of Glendale, Missouri, twenty-four hours a day, seven days per week. The department is committed to the principles of Community Policing and to providing high quality public safety service to the nearly 6,000 residents and businesses of Glendale.

In addition to serving the Citizens of Glendale, the department provides support services to the City of Warson Woods, Missouri pursuant to contracts entered into between the cities. These services include radio dispatching services for their Police Department, 911 and telephone operator services, and incarceration facilities.

Chief of Police Richard H. Black, a thirty-seven year veteran of the department, commands the Glendale Police Department. Chief Black's commitment to his fellow residents is to provide quality public safety service to the department's 6,000 employers, the citizens of Glendale. The department is comprised of thirteen (13) sworn, commissioned police officers (12 full time and 1 part time) and fifteen (15) civilian employees (3 full time and 12 part time) who form two divisions. The commissioned officers are assigned to the Patrol Division and are commanded by the Deputy Chief of Police, Captain Gary S. Woepke, also a thirty-seven year veteran of the department. All commissioned officers are certified by the State of Missouri as having received a minimum level of training as mandated by state law to perform their duties. These officers are sworn to uphold the laws of the United States of America, the State of Missouri and the City of Glendale.

The civilian employees are assigned to the Communications Division and are supervised by Communications Supervisor and Court Administrator Pam Copeland, a twenty-four year veteran of the department. The civilian employees are primarily responsible for dispatching services for the police and fire departments. However, their duties are no less important than the police officers with whom they work. Our civilian employees are often the first City of Glendale representatives with whom our citizens come into contact. The civilian employees play a vital role in the day-to-day operation of the department. Their duties include the majority of clerical functions for the department as well as the operation of the Municipal Court, whose functions are further outlined in the "Municipal Court" section of this document.

# Professional Development

#### Overview

The Glendale Police Department is committed to providing its citizens with a highly trained police department. The State of Missouri requires officers to receive a minimum of 48 hours of training during each three-year period. Glendale Police Officers received an amount of training, which greatly exceeded the state requirement. Officers received more than 300 hours of "In-Service" training during 2006, including one (1) hour of mandated "Racial Profiling Training" for each officer. This training helps officers prepare for a variety of situations and circumstances.

In addition to the requirements for police officer training, the State of Missouri now requires a minimum level of training for Police, Fire and EMS Dispatchers. This requirement calls for 40 hours of training for new employees and a minimum of 16 continuing education hours of training for existing employees every two years. Dispatchers received 214.5 hours of training in 2006.

# Firearms Training

A significant component of an officer's continuing education is the exercise of proficiency in the use of firearms. All officers are required to attend an annual refresher qualification course conducted by the Police Academy. During 2006, our officers completed over 44 hours of training at the police academy firing range. The officers fired a total of 1,320 rounds of handgun ammunition and 300 rounds of shotgun ammunition this year. These practice sessions continue to enforce the confidence level of the officers in the handling of their weapons. We are fortunate to have two officers who are Certified Firearms Instructors. Sergeants Randy Carrico and Keith Wandless assist the police academy with in-service training, as well as supervising the department's firearms training.

# Major Case Squad

Our department continued its involvement with the Major Case Squad of Greater St. Louis. Detective Sergeant Randy Carrico is assigned to the Major Case Squad as an Investigator. The purpose of the Major Case Squad is to assist law enforcement agencies in the investigation of homicides and the apprehension of those persons responsible for such heinous offenses. The Major Case Squad requires each investigator to attend an annual 16 hour training session. Through their advanced investigative skills, the Major Case Squad is able to boast a very high clearance rate.





# Safest City Designation

For the fourth year in a row, the City of Glendale is listed at the 37<sup>th</sup> Safest City in America of cities with populations over 5,000 and the Safest City in the State of Missouri.

The web site City-Data.com collected and analyzed data from numerous sources (Crime Data, Demographics, etc.) to compile the "Top 100 Safest Cities" list.

This designation is a testament to the high level of cooperation between our residents and their Police Department.

Congratulations to our residents for helping us to make the City of Glendale the safest place in Missouri to live and work!

# Internet Crimes Against Children Task Force

In 2001, the Glendale Police Department, representing the St. Louis region, obtained a \$45,000 grant from the Department of Justice, Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention. Through this grant, the Glendale Police Department became the lead agency for the Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) Task Force of Greater St. Louis. In March 2002, the ICAC Task Force of Greater St. Louis became a subgroup to the newly formed Regional Computer Crime Education and Enforcement Group of Greater St. Louis, known as RCCEEG (R'Seg). RCCEEG now provides computer crime investigative assistance to all agencies in the St. Louis region. This covers St. Louis City and the counties of St. Louis, St. Charles, Franklin and Jefferson. RCCEEG is similar to the Major Case Squad, in that any agency within our area may request assistance with the investigation of a computer crime.

Sgt. Joe Laramie, the ICAC Task Force Coordinator and RCCEEG Supervisor, attended numerous computer crime related training courses during 2006. He taught Basic Cyber Crime at the St. Louis County and Municipal Police Academy, and conducted computer crime workshops at various training conferences. Sgt. Laramie also presented on the topic of Internet Safety to professional groups, service organizations and schools.

# Traffic Enforcement Activities

A major responsibility of each Glendale Police Officer is the enforcement of the traffic laws of the City of Glendale and the State of Missouri. It is by and through this enforcement, we are able to reduce the loss of life, limb and property due to the careless and/or reckless operation of motor vehicles.

# Grants

The Police Department received several grants from the Division of Highway Safety to reduce the number of accidents in our area. This grant money pays for officers to work overtime hours to reduce the number of traffic violations, which lead to traffic accidents. An audit of our traffic accident reports found that the majority of the accidents in 2006 occurred on City maintained streets on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Fridays and Saturdays between the hours of 12 noon and 6:00 p.m. The City received a grant to fund overtime enforcement for this area.

# Selective Traffic Enforcement

During 2006, our officers responded to numerous citizen requests for speed enforcement. These requests were addressed in a variety of ways, one of which was the Side Street Radar Program. In an attempt to make the motorists more aware of their vehicle speed and surroundings, the officers select specific locations and issue citations or warnings as necessary. The results of our enforcement program in 2006 are as follows:

# Driving While Intoxicated Enforcement

During their patrol duties, our officers issued citations for more than 1,500 hazardous moving violations in 2006. The most serious offense and usually the most difficult to identify is the intoxicated motorist. Nationwide programs have been launched in an effort to identify this potentially deadly driver. As part of our continuing effort to protect the motoring public, our officers attend seminars and classes provided by the police academy and experts in the area of D.W.I. identification.

Another problem area, which has been identified and addressed by the Missouri Department of Revenue and our officers, is the impaired teenage driver. The Abuse and Lose Law, also known as the Zero Tolerance, targets the driver under the age of 21.

In 2006, our officers made 31 arrests for Driving While Intoxicated and Abuse and Lose Violations.

# North Glendale School Partnership

The Police Department is an integral part of the City's partnership with North Glendale School. Through this partnership, the Police Department provides assistance to the staff and students of North Glendale in several ways. Some of the activities in which the Police Department shares a responsibility are providing a School Crossing Guard, Cub Scout Bicycle Rodeo, Fun Fair Security, traffic control for the Halloween and End of School Parades, traffic control for the Annual Turkey Trot Run, judging the Cub Scout Pinewood Derby, and sponsoring the School Safety Patrol Appreciation Party.

### Racial Profiling Law Statistics

As required by Missouri State Statute, every traffic stop conducted by a police officer is documented with various information such as date, time, race, sex, age, etc. of the driver.

### Crime Summary

The City of Glendale continues to experience a relatively low crime rate during 2006. Our major crime concern continues to be the theft of personal items from unlocked vehicles and garages. Citizens can take a more active role in reducing these thefts by remembering to lock their vehicle and garages when unattended. All suspicious activity should be reported to the Police Department immediately. An emerging trend is also the crime of Identity Theft. With the rapid growth of computers and electronic technology, a person's identity can be obtained by credit card receipts, driver's license numbers, "pre-approved" credit card applications, etc.

The following summarizes crimes reported to the Glendale Police Department during 2006:

### Burglary

The crime of Burglary is defined as the unlawful entry of an inhabitable structure for the purpose of committing a crime.

During 2006 one (1) Burglary was reported. Nothing was taken in this burglary as the victim scared him away from the residence.

#### Assault

Eight (8) Assault cases were reported this year. All of these cases were domestic related and resolved with little or no court intervention.

#### Fraud, Forgery, Worthless Documents

There were fifteen (15) reports taken for fraudulent activity. On three (3) of these occasions, suspects attempted to cash stolen or bogus checks at local banks. Arrests and convictions were obtained in nine (9) of the cases. Several insufficient funds checks were written to the City of Glendale for various fees, fines, etc. All checks were made good.

#### Property Damage

Nine (9) cases of Property Damage were reported during 2006, six (6) of which remain as open investigations.

# Identity Theft

Identity Theft is the fastest growing crime in the United States. Over 750,000 Americans were the victims of Identity Theft in 2006. There were six (6) cases of Identity Theft or related crimes in Glendale during 2006. In all these cases, residents were notified by credit card companies or collection agencies that they were allegedly delinquent in paying for purchases fraudulently made over the internet, credit card accounts and cellular phone accounts fraudulently opened in their names, or purchases delivered to their home that were never ordered.

#### Stealing

Stealing remains the crime most often reported to the Police Department. The department took 32 Stealing reports during 2006. Of these 32 reports, there were 2 auto thefts, 4 stolen credit cards, 2 prescription thefts, and 8 license plate tab thefts. The remaining 16 reports consisted of mostly thefts from unlocked vehicles and thefts by deception.

# Emergency Management

In response to the September 11, 2001 incidents and other weather-related disasters, President George W. Bush signed Homeland Security Presidential Directive #5 which directed the Secretary of the Department of Homeland Security to develop and administer a National Incident Management System which would provide a consistent nationwide approach for Federal, State, local, and tribal governments to work together more effectively and efficiently to prepare for, prevent, respond to, and recover from domestic incidents, regardless of cause, size, or complexity;

The collective input and guidance from all Federal, State, local, and tribal homeland security partners has been, and will continue to be, vital to the effective implementation and utilization of a comprehensive NIMS.

In consultation with Mayor Richard Magee, City Administrator Mike Pounds and Fire Chief Larry Zeitzmann, it was deemed necessary and desirable that all City of Glendale departments and personnel coordinate their efforts to effectively and efficiently provide the highest levels of incident management.

This Presidential Directive required Federal departments and agencies to make adoption of the NIMS by State, tribal, and local organizations a condition for Federal preparedness assistance beginning in fiscal year 2005. The goal was to facilitate the most efficient and effective incident management it is critical that Federal, State, local, and tribal organizations utilize standardized terminology, standardized organizational structures, interoperable communications, consolidated action plans, unified command structures, uniform personnel qualification standards, uniform standards for planning, training, and exercising, comprehensive resource management, and designated incident facilities during emergencies or disasters. These standardized procedures for managing personnel, communications, facilities and resources will improve the State's ability to utilize federal funding to enhance local and state agency readiness, maintain first responder safety, and streamline incident management processes.

Our study found the Incident Command System components of NIMS were already an integral part of various incident management activities throughout the State, including current emergency management training programs; and the National Commission on Terrorist Attacks (9-11 Commission) recommended adoption of a standardized Incident Command System.

In October 2005, Mayor Magee, with the approval of the Board of Aldermen, established the National Incident Management System (NIMS) as the City of Glendale's standard for incident management. The NIMS program required all elected officials and city employees to receive certain levels of training according to their respective positions. In the late Winter and early Spring, all employees and elected officials received their

training to prepare them for what would soon be one of the largest disasters to strike the City of Glendale.

Under the direction of Assistant Fire Chief Don Bley, all departments worked together to develop an Emergency Operations Plan for the City of Glendale. In July 2006, the document was presented to the Board of Aldermen for their review.

The ink was barely dry on the document, when on Wednesday, July 19, 2006, at approximately 7:00 PM, a major storm struck the Greater St. Louis area, affecting electrical power supply to the entire region. The City of Glendale was one of the severely affected areas. Most of our residents (98%) were without power for several days, with many neighborhoods remained without power for extended periods – some up to eight days..

On Friday, July 21, 2006, with no estimation on when power would be restored, Mayor Magee and City Administrator Pounds called an emergency meeting of all department heads to address the City's needs. Mayor Magee, after consulting with City Staff, declared the City's first "State of Emergency" and implemented the City's brand new Emergency Operations Plan. Mayor Magee appointed Fire Chief Larry Zeitzmann as the Emergency Management Director and Sergeant Bob Catlett at the City's Public Information Officer. Chief Zeitzmann then appointed Sergeant Catlett and Assistant Fire Chief Don Bley as his Deputy Directors. The brand new Emergency Operations Plan was put into action. The City Hall Conference Room was quickly converted to a makeshift Emergency Operations Center (EOC) with telephone, computer and communications equipment. Chief Zeitzmann, Assistant Fire Chief Bley and Sergeant Catlett worked day and night to operate the EOC during the incident. The Municipal Auditorium was established as a cooling center, with many residents calling City Hall home for several days.

The City Hall complex operated on generator power for over 52 hours. Many neighborhoods were affected by large limbs on power lines, causing major power outages to the area. AmerenUE, the area's electric utility wasn't able to restore power to many area neighborhoods for over eight (8) days. The Police, Fire, Public Works and City Hall employees worked countless hours responding to emergency calls, clearing debris from streets and what seemed to be the endless struggle to clear tree debris from the curbs.

Several days later, word reached the news media about our successes. A news crew from KSDK-TV/Newschannel 5 did a story on how our small town successfully "weathered the storm" and applied the lessons learned in the NIMS training sessions to this "disaster". Chief Zeitzmann and Sergeant Catlett were later asked by the St. Louis County Municipal League to give a presentation on Municipal Emergency Management to their membership.

Just when the City thought everything was under control again, a major winter snow and ice storm struck the area on the evening of November 30, 2006. Mayor Magee quickly

put our Emergency Operations Plan into action and the City once again successfully managed to overcome the disaster.

For their tireless efforts, the City's Public Works Department was awarded "Employees of the Month" for July 2006. Chief Zeitzmann and Sergeant Catlett were awarded the City's Annual Community Service Award at the Employee Holiday Luncheon in December. And for his leadership role, the employees presented Mayor Magee with an Award of Appreciation at the appreciation luncheon.



# Community Involvement

#### Overview

An involved police department and involved community make residents feel more secure, as well as increase the trust between the police and community. This involvement on both parts increases perception of police services and operations. Our citizens expect the highest quality police service from our department. Therefore, we review closely the methods and efficiency used to attain this goal.

The Glendale Police Department provides a host of services available to our residents, which fosters our great partnership. Through the involvement of our citizens, we are able to keep crime statistics at a reduced level and foster a safer community, in which all can feel comfortable to live, work and raise a family.

The Glendale Police Department's list of services and involvement in the community continues to grow as we assess the needs of the community. Several of our officers have so excelled in this area that they have been called upon to assist officers and departments across the state. Sergeant Joe Laramie serves as the Director of the Internet Crimes Against Children Task Force and a Supervisor with the Regional Computer Education and Enforcement Group. Sergeant Bob Catlett has been recognized on local, state and national levels as a Crime Prevention and Community Policing Specialist. He serves on several boards and commissions and is the Executive Director of the Missouri Crime Prevention Association. In this position, he is called upon to provide direction and instruction to officers and communities across the country in the areas of crime prevention and community policing. He has instructed on the local, state and national levels. Police Officer Chris Sarantakis is the department's coordinator in the city's participation in the Missouri Special Olympics Torch Run, which helps raise money for those less fortunate.

The following is a sampling of the many services the Glendale Police Department offers to enhance community involvement.

# Neighborhood Watch

The Neighborhood Watch program is one of the most effective partnerships between a community and its police department. Information provided by residents trained in Neighborhood Watch is used to solve and prevent crime. Citizens involved in Neighborhood Watch take ownership of their neighborhood.

Neighborhood Watch programs target residential burglary, thefts from vehicles, vandalism, auto theft and personal safety. Neighborhood Watch organizes a neighborhood and teaches residents what is and how to report suspicious activity.

## Special Olympics Forch Run

In conjunction with 117 other law enforcement agencies across the state, we participated in the annual Law Enforcement Torch Run for Special Olympics.

The mission of the Torch Run is simple: to raise money to provide year-round sports training and Olympic style competition for children and adults with mental retardation or closely related developmental disabilities. The training provides the opportunity to develop physical fitness, demonstrate courage and experience the joy of being a winner in life. The money raised, over \$ 1,000,000.00, enables the Missouri Special Olympics to serve 22,000 athletes, which is 42% of Missourians with mental retardation at no charge to the athletes or their parents.

Police Officer Chris Sarantakis coordinated our department's efforts, which raised over \$1.000.00 in donations from residents and businesses.

### VARDA

The Voice Activated Radio Dispatched Alarm (VARDA) is a portable alarm system available to Glendale residents, free of charge, on a first-come-first-served basis. The alarm may be used when the resident is out of town for a short period, ideally 5 to 10 days. During this time, no one, including pets, may enter or remain in the home.

Two thermal detection units are strategically placed to monitor the most vulnerable areas of a home. If an intruder crosses the detector's path, a radio message is broadcast over the police radio alerting officers of a burglary in progress, allowing immediate response by the department.

During 2006, the VARDA was placed in 2 homes with successful results.

# Glendale Night Out

Our seventh annual "Glendale Night Out", sponsored by the City of Glendale in cooperation with the National Association of Town Watch, was held on Tuesday, July 25. This event is part of the National Night Out and Neighborhood Watch Programs. The Police, Fire and Public Works Departments displayed and demonstrated their vehicles and equipment for the attendees. This event promotes crime prevention efforts throughout the City, as well as getting to know your neighbors in the community.

One card is passed out each week of the regular baseball season.

# Communications and Municipal Court

# Communications Division An Overview

The most important division of the Glendale Police Department is the Communications Division. It is by and through this division that residents contact us in person or by telephone to report crimes, ask for assistance, report fires, request medical attention, and in some cases, just to talk to someone.

Pam Copeland supervises the Communications Division. The Communications Supervisor is responsible for the direction of two other full time and ten part time Telecommunicators.

The Telecommunicators are responsible for answering seven incoming lines, three 911 lines, six radio channels, prisoner monitoring, and two computers with which they must show proficiency prior to working by themselves. They are also responsible for many clerical duties, such as processing court summonses, traffic tickets, police reports, preparing monthly crime statistics for city, county, state and federal agencies, collecting court payments, parking tickets, etc., and maintaining the Resident Emergency Contact List.

It is important that these employees receive proper recognition for the jobs that they do, as these employees are often the residents' first contact with the City when they need assistance.

# Municipal Court An Overview

The Municipal Court of the City of Glendale is a component of the Municipal Division of the 21st Circuit Court of St. Louis County. The court is presided over by the Honorable Judge Terry Burnet, who is assisted in the execution of his duties by Prosecuting Attorney James E. McDaniel, and Municipal Court Administrator Pam Copeland. In Judge Burnet's absence, or in the event of disqualification, the Honorable Judge Paul Streiff presides over the court.

The Municipal Court Administrator is an employee of the Police Department. The Court Clerk is responsible for the day-to-day operation of the Municipal Court, including all court correspondence, processing of fines and costs assessed to defendants by mail or in person at the Violations Bureau.

The City of Glendale holds court sessions monthly. The monthly court docket, on average, contains approximately 300 municipal court cases ranging in severity from Failure To Confine Dogs and Speeding Violations to more serious offenses such as Driving While Intoxicated, Assault and Stealing. There are two types of cases tried in our Municipal Court: Traffic and Non-Traffic. In 2006, 1,515 cases were submitted to the Municipal Court for disposition. In addition, 793 parking tickets were issued with the primary charge being the violation of the city's No Parking Between 2:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m. ordinance.
