

USDA Makes Grants Available to Help People in Rural Washington Repair Their Homes Damaged Fire, Flood, or Severe Storm in 2022

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Residents Living in 20 Washington Counties Are Eligible For Funding

WASHINGTON, March 23, 2023 – U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Rural Development Washington State Director Helen Price Johnson today announced the availability of grants to help people repair their homes that were damaged by flood or fire in 2022. The homes must be located in [presidentially declared disaster areas](#). People living in 20 counties in Washington State are eligible for the funding.

“When a disaster strikes, rural communities pull together to recover and restore the places we call home,” Price Johnson said. “That’s why the Biden-Harris Administration and USDA stand ready to help hundreds of people across rural Washington access the resources they need to rebuild their homes, their communities, and their lives. We do this work because we know that rural America is home to millions of people who make up America’s spirit and character.”

The grants are being made available through supplemental disaster funding under the **Rural Disaster Home Repair Grant Program**. Through this program, people may apply to receive grants of up to \$40,675 directly from USDA to repair their homes.

Funds will be available until expended. They may be used to:

- pay for home repair expenses that were a result of a Presidentially declared disasters in calendar year 2022.
- prepare a site for a manufactured home.
- relocate a manufactured home.

To be eligible:

- applicants must have household incomes that do not exceed the [low-limits](#) based on their household size and county.
- homes must be located in an [eligible rural area](#).
- homes must be located in a Presidentially declared disaster areas 2022.

Residents in the following counties may be eligible for the funding:

Adams, Chelan, Clallam, Clark, Cowlitz, Franklin, Grays Harbor, Island, Jefferson, King, Klickitat, Lewis, Mason, Okanogan, Pacific, Skagit, Skamania, Snohomish, Thurston, and Wahkiakum counties.

Background

The Biden-Harris Administration championed the bill known as the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2023, that made this funding possible. In the coming weeks and months, USDA expects to announce additional funding availability under the bill to help rural people in presidentially declared disaster areas who were impacted by natural disasters in 2022. This additional funding will assist eligible organizations help rural people repair and improve their homes. It will also help rural communities repair water infrastructure and essential community facilities.
