

#### Id Schools Given New Life As Modern Homes





THREE R'S STILL HAVE THEIR PLACE in this modern living room, but not like they used to. Ann Boyer, eleven, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Elton Boyer, "hones up" on studies in what used to be Bausman School classroom.



EX-BAUSMAN SCHOOL, one of latest made into a home, now is residence of Mr. and Mrs. Elton Boyer. They bought building in 1949 and converted it. At top right is dining room. Original windows have been kept throughout house. Outside walls were not changed.

THE LITTLE RED SCHOOLHOUSE ain't what it used to be. In fact, sometimes it isn't even recognizable as such. Nowadays it isn't uncommon to see a new home in Lancaster County that looks like it might have been a school at one time. And on closer examination, that often proves to be the case. Since 1911, about 205 one and two-room schools in the county have been sold to the highest bidder, and officials estimate that about 85 per cent have been or will be converted into homes. Even more will be given new roles when the Manheim Central School District completes its new buildings and sells the dozens of one and two-room schools in Penn and Rapho Townships. Some of the modern style little red schoolhouses are no longer recogn able as places of learning; others haven't changed much on the outside.

#### IT ALL BEGAN IN 1843

- School construction bids came in at \$556 & 33—1/2 cents per building
- In 1854, the class schedule was from 8 to noon and 1pm to 4pm. Plus every other Saturday morning for seven months out of the year.
- Only three holidays: December 25, December 26, and January 1.
- Teacher salary was \$30 per month.
- The merger occurred in the very early 1970s.
- Today, the LT portion of SDoL's budget is roughly \$60.5 MM annually. Our students comprise 24.1% of the total student population. (stats courtesy of Matt Przywara)




SECOND LOCK SCHOOL







#### "BURROWES" GROUND-BREAKING IN 1953


