The City investment balance at year-end was \$5,116,711.46. Approximately 73.42% of these investments relate to the funds: Capital Acquisition Fund, General Fund, Major Road Fund, Local Road Fund and Water/Sewer Fund. These investments were derived from separate purposes as outline below:

- The Capital Acquisition Fund investment is held for current and future capital expenditures.
- The General Fund investments are held for operating expenditures over the next fiscal year.
- The Major and Local Road Funds are held for current and future expenditures.
- The Water/Sewer funds are derived from utility revenue received, property tax revenue received and Grant funds for the payment of bond principal and interest expense.

Most of the funds were invested in Governmental Pooled Funds. The Governmental Pooled Funds invest mostly in US Treasury Notes, and Commercial Paper. Public Act 20 allows the City to invest in the following type of investments.

- US Treasury investments
- Certificates of Deposits
- Commercial Paper
- Governmental investment Pool Funds
- US Agency Obligations

To protect publicly held funds, the restrictions on investments under State law dose not allow municipalities to invest in many types of investments.

The City earned \$57,025.17 on their investment for the Fiscal Year 2018-2019 in comparison to \$45,409.80 on their investment for the Fiscal Year 2017-2018 in comparison to \$26,033.51 on their investment for Fiscal Year 2016-2017 in comparison to \$26,547.26 on their investment for

Fiscal Year 2015-2016 in comparison to \$26,394.33 on their investment for the Fiscal Year 2014-2015 in comparison to \$20,715.50 on investment for the fiscal Year 2013-2014 in comparison to \$7,164.28 on investment for the fiscal Year 2012-2013 in comparison to \$2,009.00 on investment for the Fiscal Year 2011-2012 in comparison to \$4,008.79 on their investment for Fiscal Year 2010-2011, \$5,281.24 on their investment for Fiscal Year 2009-2010. The Table shows the interest earned by account for the period.

As you can see the largest interest earnings are related to the General, Major and Local Road Funds and Water. This year the rates have decreased drastically and are the lowest I have ever seen them. Hopefully the rates will increase again and the economy improves so the Federal Reserve will adjust rates accordingly.

In conclusion, the Treasurers Department believes the investment goals for the year were met as shown below:

- Legal Requirements The City has adhered to the restrictive investment definitions and criteria under Public Act 20.
- Safety of Investments No funds were invested in high risk or speculative investments over the last year. Governmental Pooled Funds were utilized which invest in US Treasury instruments and Commercial Paper.
- Credit Risk The City did not invest in any funds which could lose their Net Asset Value. The Banking institutions utilized to invest these funds met the necessary capital adequacy, Liquidity, Asset Quality and Earnings levels as shown in the Highline Bank Rating reports.
- Diversification: The City has utilized Governmental Pooled Funds and Certificates of Deposits to allow for diversification of investments. In addition, the City invested in different qualified banking institutions to further diversify their investment.
- Liquidity: All funds are liquid.

MASTER SERVICES AGREEMENT FOR THE OPERATION OF DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SERVICES FOR THE CITY OF LATHRUP VILLAGE

This Master Services Agreement (Agreement) is made on July 1, 2019 (Effective Date), by and between Lathrup Services LLC (Service Provider), whose address is 1224 East Windemere, Royal Oak, MI 48073, and City of Lathrup Village, (City), whose address is 27400 Southfield Road, Lathrup Village, MI 48076.

RECITALS

- 1. Service Provider is in the business of public work services.
- 2. The City desires to engage Service Provider, and Service Provider desires to be so engaged, for the provision of services in accordance with the terms and conditions contained in this Agreement.

For valid consideration received, the parties agree as follows:

- 1. *Services*. During the Term (as defined below) of this Agreement, Service Provider shall perform those services set forth on Exhibit A, in accordance with the performance standards set forth on Exhibit B and on the terms and conditions contained in this Agreement (Services).
- 2. *Payment*. The City shall pay Service Provider for the Services provided according to the Schedule of Fees set forth on Exhibit C. On the written agreement of both parties, the Schedule of Fees may be amended from time to time during the Term of this Agreement. The City will pay each invoice submitted to it by Service Provider no later than 30 days from the date the invoice is received.
- 3. Term and Termination. This Agreement shall commence on the Effective Date and shall continue for an initial term of one year (Initial Term). The Initial Term shall be extended for consecutive one-year periods unless either party provides written notice of its intent to terminate this Agreement as provided to the other not less than 60 days before the end of the then-current Term. The Initial Term as the same may be extended shall constitute the "Term." Notwithstanding the foregoing, either party may terminate this Agreement (1) on mutual written agreement of the parties, (2) on the occurrence of any breach of this Agreement that is not cured within 30 days after receipt of written notice of the breach, (3) if either party is declared bankrupt or insolvent or makes an assignment for the benefit of its creditors, or if a receiver is appointed or any proceedings are commenced, voluntarily or involuntarily, by or against either party under any bankruptcy or similar law, or (4) The City may terminate this contract at any time for any reason by giving at least thirty (30) day's notice in writing to the contractor. If this Agreement is terminated, the obligations of Service Provider and the City shall terminate, other than the City's obligation to provide earned and unpaid compensation to Service Provider for Services performed before the termination date.

- 4. *Independent Contractor*. The relationship between the parties is that of independent contracting parties. Nothing contained in this Agreement or the course of conduct between the parties will be considered to form a partnership, employment relationship, or any other relationship except that of independent contractor. In performance of the Services under this Agreement, Service Provider is an independent contractor with the authority to control and direct the performance of the Services.
- 5. Taxes, Benefits, and Expenses. Service Provider is responsible for all expenses connected with the performance of the Services to the City under this Agreement. Service Provider shall be solely responsible to pay all applicable federal, state, and local taxes and to file all related returns and reports in connection with the performance of Services to the City under this Agreement. Service Provider acknowledges that the City has no obligation to and will not withhold taxes of any kind or nature with respect to the Services performed by Service Provider. Service Provider shall indemnify and hold the City harmless to the extent of any obligation of the City to pay any taxes, whether income or otherwise, including any withholding taxes, social security taxes, unemployment taxes, or disability insurance or similar items in connection with any payments made to Service Provider by the City.
- 6. *Insurance*. Service Provider shall purchase and maintain throughout the Term statutory worker's compensation and commercial general liability insurance covering bodily injury, property damage, premises operations, completed operations, and contractual liability, each of which insurance policies shall have limits reasonably satisfactory to City. Service Provider shall also maintain automobile insurance coverage on the vehicle(s) its employees use in the course of the performance of Services to the City under this Agreement. The insurance shall be in the amount, with coverage and from an insurance City satisfactory to City. Service Provider shall maintain coverage without interruption from the Effective Date of this Agreement until the date of termination of this Agreement; *provided*, *however*, the coverage provided under all policies must be issued on an occurrence basis. At the request of the City, the City shall be added as an additional named insured on any insurance policy. Additionally, Service Provider shall furnish the City with a copy of certificates of insurance, which shall contain an obligation of the carrier to notify the City at least 30 days in advance of any cancellation or nonrenewal of the policy.

List of required insurance:

- a. Worker's Compensation Coverage A;
- b. Employer's Liability Coverage B;
- c. Commercial General Liability in the minimum limit of \$1 million;
- d. Automobile Liability in the minimum limit of \$1 million;
- e. Environmental Insurance or Pollution Liability in the minimum amount of \$1 million;
- f. Excess and Umbrella Liability;
- g. Owners & Contractors Protective Liability in the minimum amount of \$1 million.
- 7. *Confidentiality*. Neither party shall use, exploit, or make known to any person or business entity, any information directly or indirectly received by a party or acquired pursuant to the relationship created by this Agreement, including, without limitation, information relating to

business affairs, data, designs, manuals, training materials and documentation, formulas, ideas, inventions, knowledge of manufacturing processes, methods, prices, financial and accounting data, timekeeping data, products and product specifications, systems and technical information (Confidential Information). Notwithstanding the foregoing, the Service Provider and the City shall each be permitted to disclose Confidential Information of the other to its own employees, subcontractors, accountants, attorneys, and other agents and its affiliates or subsidiaries to the extent the disclosure is reasonably necessary for the performance of its duties and obligations or the enjoyment of its rights under this Agreement; *provided, however*, that Service Provider and the City shall be responsible for any violation of the confidentiality obligations set forth in this Agreement by any permitted third parties to which it provides Confidential Information.

- 8. City Provided Fleet Gasoline Cards. The City, at its option, may provide fleet gasoline cards to the Service Provider for the employees who will be working on City jobs. The Service Provider will provide to the City a list of all authorized signers. The Service Provider shall attach the gas receipts to the monthly invoice provided to the City along with a summary of the attached gas receipts. The Service Provider shall reimburse the City for all gas receipts on a monthly basis.
- 9. *Materials*. It is anticipated that materials such as gravel, salt, sand and the like will be used by the Service Provider on City jobs. The City will have the obligation to purchase all such materials. When the materials are delivered to the service yard, the Service Provider shall sign all delivery receipts and submit the signed delivery receipts along with its monthly report.

The Supervisor or designee will review the projected weekly job assignments/work orders with the City Administrator. The Service Provider shall maintain an inventory of such materials within the DPS yard. When it is time to order such materials, the Service Provider shall obtain permission from the City Administrator or designee.

10. *Monthly Invoices*. Service Provider shall provide to the City Administrator a monthly invoice. The monthly invoice shall consist of a listing of all work performed during the last thirty days. The list will include the name of all employees working on each job, a list of equipment for each job, and what materials were used on each job. Payment shall be made as set forth in paragraph 2 which references Exhibit C.

It is specifically understood that any work not on the regular City maintenance list must be pre-approved by the City Administrator or his/her designee.

11. *Files and Records*. Any and all files and records of work performed by the Service Provider shall remain under the ownership of the City. The Service Provider shall maintain a copy of all work records at the DPS Building in appropriately labeled filing cabinets or within a computer program for which the City has been provided all access codes.

- 12. *Subcontractors*. The City and Service Provider shall review a list of proposed subcontractors which the Service Provider may use in the normal course of its duties. The City shall review the use of all subcontractors, except for those that may be called for emergency services. All subcontractors shall invoice the Service Provider who will then include that invoice with its monthly payment request.
- 13. Reasonableness. Service Provider acknowledges and agrees that Service Provider has weighed all the facts, conditions, and circumstances pertaining to this Agreement, has been afforded an opportunity to consult with counsel of its choice concerning this Agreement and its legal effect, and acknowledges that all of the provisions of this Agreement are reasonable. Service Provider shall not contest the validity of any provision of this Agreement and waives any and all rights that Service Provider may have to bring any claim, action, or suit or to raise any defense regarding the validity and reasonableness of this Agreement or any of its provisions.

14. Indemnification.

- (a) Service Provider shall indemnify, defend, and hold the City, its affiliates, and their respective officers, directors, council, members, employees, agents, and other representatives harmless from and against all claims, losses, expenses, liabilities, demands, obligations, or damages of every kind and nature (including, without limitation, reasonable attorney fees and expenses) (Losses), arising out of or related to (i) any act or omission of Service Provider or (ii) any breach of this Agreement by Service Provider.
- (b) The City shall indemnify, defend, and hold Service Provider, its affiliates, and their respective officers, directors, council, members, employees, agents, and other representatives harmless from and against all Losses arising out of or related to (i) any act or omission of the City or (ii) any breach of this Agreement by City.
- 15. Force Majeure. If either party is prevented or delayed in the performance of any of its obligations under this Agreement due to Force Majeure (defined below), that party will provide written notice to the other party specifying the nature and expected duration of the Force Majeure. The performance of the party invoking Force Majeure with respect to any obligation will be excused and the time for performance extended, but only for the period of delay or inability to perform due to Force Majeure. If the total of any period of delay or inability to perform due to Force Majeure asserted by either party during the Term equals or exceeds 30 consecutive days, the other party will have the right, at its option, to either terminate this Agreement by written notice or to continue to excuse the first party's performance for the period of any delay or inability to perform due to Force Majeure. As used in this Agreement, "Force Majeure" shall mean any act of God, fire, casualty, flood, war, strike, lockout, labor trouble, or any other circumstances beyond the reasonable control of the party asserting it that prevents or delays the performance of any of its obligations under this Agreement.

- 16. Assignment. The rights and obligations conferred under this Agreement may not be assigned by either party without the prior written consent of the other party. Any attempted assignment in violation of this Section 13 is null and void.
- 17. *Notices*. Any notice required or permitted to be given under this Agreement must be in writing and may be delivered in person, by registered mail, facsimile, or by overnight courier addressed to the respective party at the address set forth in the introduction of this Agreement or a changed address as may be given by a party to the other by written notice. Any notice will be considered to have been given when personally delivered or five business days after the date of mailing or one business day after the date of forwarding if sent by facsimile or overnight courier.
- 18. *Binding Agreement; Successors*. This Agreement will be binding on, inure to the benefit of, and be enforceable by the successors and assigns of the parties; provided, however, that no assignment of this Agreement will be effective without the express written consent of the other party.
- 19. Governing Law. This Agreement is a contract made under, and shall be governed by and construed in accordance with, the laws of the State of Michigan without giving effect to its choice-of-law principles. The parties agree that any legal or equitable action or proceeding with respect to this Agreement or the transactions contemplated by it shall be brought only in any court sitting in Oakland County of the State of Michigan, and each of the parties submits to and accepts generally and unconditionally the exclusive jurisdiction of those courts with respect to it and its property and irrevocably consents to the service of process in connection with any action or proceeding by personal delivery or by the mailing by registered or certified mail, postage prepaid to its address first set forth above. Nothing in this Agreement shall affect the right of any party to serve process in any other manner permitted by law. Each party irrevocably waives any objection to the laying of venue of any action or proceeding in the above described courts.
- 20. Cost of Enforcement. Each party shall pay all costs and expenses, including reasonable attorney fees, incurred by the other party in enforcing the provisions of this Agreement or in recovering any claims or damages arising from a breach of this Agreement if the other party is successful in its action.
- 21. *Waiver*. The failure of either party to require the performance of any term or obligation of this Agreement, or the waiver by either party of any breach of this Agreement, shall not prevent any subsequent enforcement of any term or obligation or be deemed a waiver of any subsequent breach.
- 22. *Survival*. The provisions of Sections 5, 7, and 14 shall survive the termination of this Agreement or any relationship between the parties for the period set forth in that Section, and if not set forth, indefinitely.

- 23. Severability. If any provision of this Agreement is held to be invalid or unenforceable for any reason, the remaining provisions shall continue to be valid and enforceable. If a court of competent jurisdiction finds that any provision is invalid and unenforceable as written, that provision will be deemed modified in a manner consistent with the intent of the original provision, so as to make it valid and enforceable. This Agreement, and the application of the provision to persons or circumstances other than those with respect to which it would be invalid or unenforceable, shall not be affected.
- 24. *Entire Agreement*. This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement and understanding between the parties and supersedes all other agreements and understandings, both written and oral, of the parties relating to the subject matter of this Agreement.
- 25. Counterparts; Facsimile. This Agreement may be executed in one or more counterparts, each of which shall be deemed to be an original, but all of which together shall constitute one and the same instrument. This Agreement may be executed and delivered by facsimile or electronic transmission, and a facsimile or electronic version of this Agreement or of a signature of a party will be effective as an original.

The parties have executed this Agreement as of the Effective Date.

EXHIBIT B Performance Standards - General

The Service Provider shall supply to the City a list of all employees who will work on any City jobs. The Service Provider shall maintain a minimum of four (4) employees to work on City jobs at all times.

Part-time and seasonal staff will be hired as needed for seasonal services, including grass cutting, leaf pickup, snow removal and salting.

For each and every proposed employee a driver's license and any special driver's license shall be supplied to the City so that they may perform the required police check for driving privileges and for other required police background investigations.

Each of the aforementioned minimum number of workers i.e. four (4) employees, shall be required to work a minimum of thirty hours per week on City jobs.

The Service Provider shall provide a specific list of supervisors who will be responsible for City jobs.

All aforementioned employees must wear a uniform type shirt which identifies them as agents for the City of Lathrup Village and the identification shirts must be worn at all times while they are working on City jobs. This includes supervisors.

The Service Provider shall provide a list of emergency contacts to the City Administrator.

All employees of the Service Provider shall comply with any and all federal and state employment related rules and criteria which are typical for employees working at a department of public services.

EXHIBIT B Performance Standards – Snow Fall Policy

In the event that snow fall accumulations are at three (3) inches the Lathrup Village Police Department will call the DPS Staff member on call.

Priority One

All major arterial streets are salted and plowed. These include:

- Sunset Blvd (Roseland to Southfield Rd)
- Santa Barbara Dr (Eleven Mile Rd to Roseland Blvd)
- Bloomfield Dr (Eleven Mile Rd to Twelve Mile Rd)

- Rainbow Dr (Eleven Mile Rd to Southfield Rd)

Priority Two

When Priority One routes are done, crews shift to Priority Two, which includes

- All major arterial street intersections
- City Hall (during office hours and when the Community Room is booked for events)

Crews salt intersections only where the majority of stopping and turning takes place. This permits "tracking" of salt beyond the intersection.

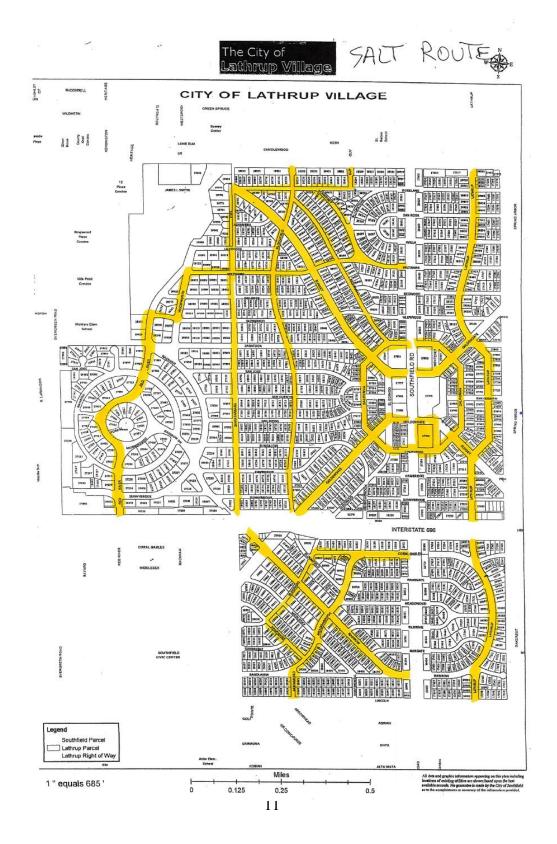
Within a few days after a snow and as soon as is reasonably possible, the streets and intersections are to be as cleared of ice or snow.

Priority Three

All paved Lathrup Village Streets are plowed but not salted.

This typically includes two heavy plow trucks and 1 pick up truck which is primarily tasked with intersections and dead end streets.

The City Council created and appointed an Infrastructure Study Group to study and make recommendations for sidewalks, water, sewer, stormwater and road improvements. Based on the road core samples, the engineer has estimated that the total cost for the upgrade of all of the city local roads and adjacent culvert/ditch system is \$21.3 million.

In order to complete the proposed project in an estimated 7 years, the study group is making a recommendation to fund the project through a bond of \$21.3 M in a series three \$7.1 M issues.

If approved, the estimated millage to be levied in 2020 is 4.4843 mills (\$4.48 per \$1,000 of taxable value) and the estimated simple average annual millage rate required to retire the bonds is 8.3105 mills (\$8.31 per \$1,000 of taxable value). The unlimited tax general obligation bonds, would be payable for a period not to exceed 15 years. It is proposed to place to this question on the November 5, 2019 ballot.

MONDAY, JULY 22, 2019

Infrastructure Committee Road Recommendation:

<u>Goal</u>: To rehabilitate ALL city residential roads within a 6 year period and to improve the function of the storm ditch system. This project would begin in the spring of 2021.

Background: The last comprehensive residential road project in Lathrup Village took place 50 years ago in 1969. Over the last few decades, the effects of Proposal A, the Headlee Amendment, reduced State Shared Revenue and the real estate crash of 2008 have resulted in significantly reduced expenditures on residential road maintenance and upkeep. As a result, the degradation of our road system has accelerated dramatically. Residents are frustrated by the rough nature of the roads, lack of walkability, damage to their cars, poor street appearance, loss of property value, injury, etc.

Further, residents are very frustrated with the non-functional storm ditch system that runs parallel to the streets. Water continuously backs up, forming ditch-long standing pools of water that rise to cover the sidewalks and driveways, attract insects and other animals, degrade concrete sidewalks and driveways, etc. In addition, this issue shortens the life of the road system as water that should properly drain off of the roads does not do so and seeps into the road sub-structure, resulting in damage. This standing water also causes significant and unnecessary inflow and infiltration into our sewer pipes, something we are under DEQ mandate to correct. This forces significant amounts of errant water into the sewer system and ultimately to the sanitary retention tank. If the tank cannot handle this additional storm water, we either incur an illegal sanitary sewer overflow or allow basements to back up with sewage.

Recommendation: The Infrastructure Study Group <u>unanimously</u> recommends that all existing paved roads, depending upon their existing state, be reconstructed, rehabilitated or resurfaced within 6 years. This would also include paving all 1.95 miles of gravel roads currently contained within the city without issuing a special assessment to the residents on those streets. While the committee realizes that there are some in the community who like gravel roads and may resist, the majority of the residents do not. These gravel roads affect all residents, not just those living directly on those streets. Further, this will allow the city to sell its road grader, generating funds that can be used for other purposes. Likewise, it will eliminate the need for resources for quarterly (or more often) grading, freeing up DPW hours to be used for other projects. Current concrete roads requiring full replacement (1.61 miles) will be replaced with an asphalt road surface. Further, due to significant cost saving associated with simultaneous repair, the committee also recommends this project include ditch grading, culvert replacement and culvert cleaning.

Roads will primarily be scheduled for repair based upon their PASER ratings. Early in the project, the focus will be on roads with PASER ratings of 1 through 5. Failed and poor streets (PASER 1 and 2) will be addressed early as these roads are currently in grave condition. Roads with PASER ratings of 3 through 5 will also be addressed earlier in the project, because these roads are typically able to undergo rehabilitation rather than full reconstruction. Rehabilitation, per mile, is about \$600,000 cheaper than reconstruction. These roads would have higher priority as we would want to repair them earlier in the project before their condition worsens and potentially requires more costly reconstruction. Roads with better quality (PASER rating of 6 and above) will be addressed at the end of the project and most likely will receive a simple resurfacing. TheCity Engineer has developed a tentative six-year schedule for this project. However, due to factors such as water main replacements, sewer projects and the fact that roads deteriorate at different rates based upon various factors, the repair schedule for each upcoming fiscal year program may change.

The \$21,311,100 cost of this project would be born via a series of 3 bonds issued for \$7.1 M in 2020, \$7.1M in 2022 and \$7.1M in 2024. A millage of 4.4843 mills in the first year with an annual average of 8.3105 mills over the 15 year bond issuances will be placed on the November 5th ballot. The annual cost to the average Lathrup Village homeowner would be approximately \$300 in the first year with an average of \$557 per year over the life of the bond issuances. The cost per \$100,000 of taxable value would be \$448 per year in the first year with an average of \$831 per year over the life of the bond issuances. The bond issue would be structured, as

required by state law, such that this general obligation debt never exceeds 10% of the city's aggregate State Equalized Value. In fact, the debt has been structured in such a way to leave some cushion should a new general obligation bond be needed to address an emergency need (e.g., a tornado destroys City Hall, the sanitary retention tank collapses, etc). The highest yearly percentage of our allowed general obligation debt is 90%, which occurs in year five of the project when all three bond issues are active and early in their lives.

Because millage funds will be used to repay bond debt, the number of mills levied for this purpose does not apply toward the city's chartered 20 mill maximum, the state law preventing millage levies from exceeding 2% of a city's aggregate taxable values, nor the state law capping the total mills across all levies to 59 mills. A millage to repay a bond issuance is considered to be a separate, unrelated entity relative to these other regulations.

As you are aware, a small portion of westbound 11 Mile Road (westbound from the Southfield border to Southfield Road) will repaired over the next two summers. The cost of the future repaving of the remainder of 11 Mile Road (approximately \$1.15M in 2019 dollars) is not included in this project. Once this project begins, the city will no longer need to use most of its Act 51 road money nor dedicated general fund money (currently 1.3326 mills) for road repaving, as all repaving efforts will be covered in the cost of this project. As such, these two funding sources can be mostly "banked" for future use. By the time this project is completed, enough money should be banked to cover most, if not all, of the future cost of repaving the remainder of 11 Mile Road, as well as the ongoing maintenance suggested below.

The project cost noted above includes the cost for ditch reconditioning (for non-functional ditches), replacement of non-functional driveway culverts and the cleaning of culverts not needing replacement. In addition, money has also been appropriated in this project to clean, but not replace, culverts that have been extended past the driveways by residents. Because both road replacement and ditch maintenance often requires partial driveway approach removal and replacement, along with landscaping repairs, significant savings will be achieved by rehabilitating our road and ditch systems simultaneously. In particular, individual residents will achieve significant savings relative to a separate recommendation for road and ditching programs. Individual homeowners who have placed items in the ditches that are not permitted via city ordinance (e.g., large rocks, boulders, decorative items, etc.) will be responsible for removing these items before any work commences.

Also, the city engineering firm will do their best to coordinate planned water main replacements with this road project. This will also result in significant savings by doing water system work simultaneously and also eliminate the need to remove the sides of newly repaved roads to later replace water main.

Lastly, the committee recommends an ongoing road maintenance program to protect the large investment that the residents would be putting into the road system with this project. More specifically, a crack sealing program should begin 3 to 4 years after the project begins to repair normal cracking that will occur with the new roads. Crack sealing should then occur annually after that. Likewise, the ditch system should be proactively monitored by Code Enforcement officials and/or the City Engineer, with all ditches being assessed at intervals no longer than three years apart. This proactive approach will ensure homeowners, who by ordinance are responsible for the upkeep of their ditch and culvert, are notified of ditch issues on an ongoing basis. This will prevent a future situation like the one we are currently experiencing, where a lack of city observation and enforcement caused significant degradation of function over the long-term. It is recommended that both the future crack sealing program and post-project ditch monitoring schedules be added to the city calendar. This will ensure these tasks are not overlooked or neglected by future administrations.

If this recommendation is approved by the City Council, the Infrastructure Committee will begin developing and conducting an education campaign for residents. This will include town halls, meet-and-greets, door-to-door campaigns and more. Education will focus on the project goals, creating a tentative timeline indicating when each street will be improved, municipal finance, tax allocations, etc. The committee also feels that the primary goal of this campaign will be to educate residents as to why the roads are in the current state (lack of money due to reduced State Shared Revenue, property value loss in 2008, Proposal A, Headlee Amendment, etc.) and how our high taxes are currently allocated (i.e., only about 1/3 of the taxes the city collects is actually kept by the city).

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

- 1. The bond proposal attached hereto as Exhibit A (the "Bond Proposal") shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the City on the Election Date.
- 2. The ballot wording of the Bond Proposal is hereby certified to the City Clerk and the County Clerks for submission to the City's electors on the Election Date. The City Clerk is hereby authorized and directed to file this Resolution and/or complete any such forms, certificates or documents as may be required by the County Clerks to evidence the foregoing certification and/or submission by no later than Tuesday, August 13, 2019.

- 3. The City Clerk and the County Clerk are hereby directed to (a) post and publish notice of last day of registration and notice of election as required by the Michigan Election Law; and (b) have prepared and printed, as provided by the Michigan Election Law, ballots for submitting the bond proposal at the election, which ballots shall contain the proposal appearing herein, or the proposition shall be stated as a proposal on the voting machines, which ballots may include other matters presented to the electorate on the same date.
- 4. The estimated millage rate in the first year and simple average annual millage rate set forth in the Bond Proposal, which have been prepared for the City by Bendzinski & Co., financial advisors to the City, are reasonable estimates of such millage rates based on current assumptions.

 - (b) The maximum principal amount of debt expected to be issued for the Project, including issuance costs, is \$21,300,000.
 - (c) A reimbursement allocation of the capital expenditures described above with the proceeds of the Bonds will occur not later than 18 months after the later of (i) the date on which the expenditure is paid, or (ii) the date the Project is placed in service or abandoned, but in no event more than three (3) years after the original expenditure is paid. A reimbursement allocation is an allocation in writing that evidences the City's use of the proceeds of the Bonds to reimburse the City for a capital expenditure made pursuant to this resolution.
- 6. Miller, Canfield, Paddock and Stone, P.L.C. is hereby confirmed as Bond Counsel to the City in connection with the issuance of the Bonds.
- 7. Bendzinski & Co., Inc. is hereby confirmed as the registered municipal advisor to the City in connection with the issuance of the Bonds.

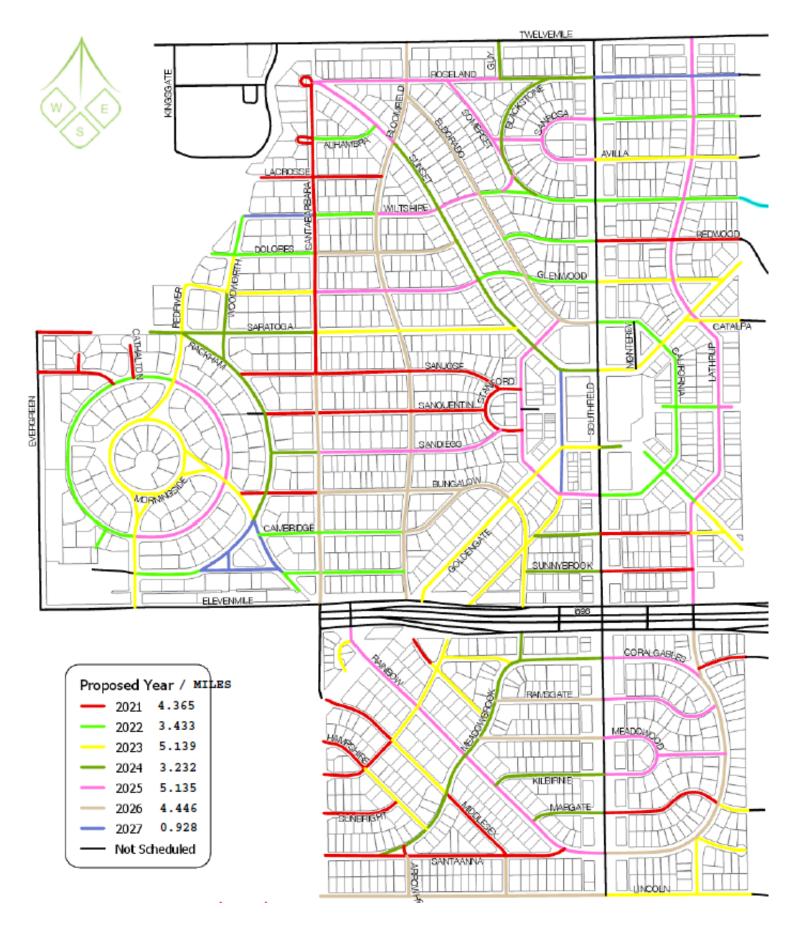

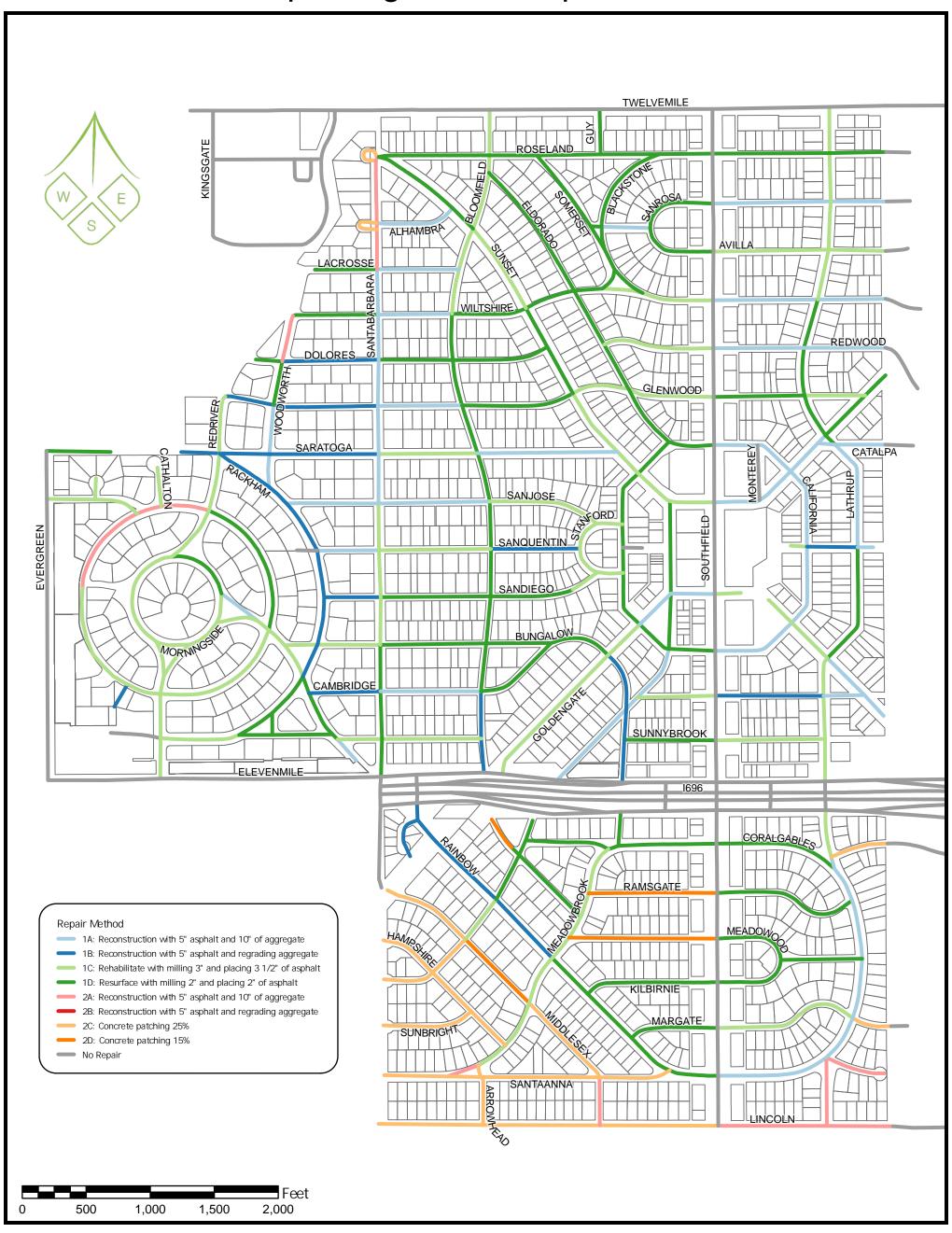

Section 1. Amendment.

Chapter 14 - Buildings and Regulations; Article VI – Property Maintenance Code, shall be amended in its entirety and shall read as follows:

14-151 Code Adoption.

The International Property Maintenance Code, 2018 Edition, as published by the International Code Council, is hereby adopted as the Property Maintenance Code for the City of Lathrup Village, with the insertions and amendments specified in this chapter. A copy of the International Property Maintenance Code, 2018 Edition, is available for inspection at the office of the City Clerk.

The following sections of the International Property Maintenance Code, 2018 Edition, are completed by inserting the following information:

14-153 Amendments.

- (a) The following sections of the International Property Maintenance Code, 2018 Edition, are amended to read as follows:
 - 103.1 General. The City of Lathrup Village Building Official is designated as the code official for purposes of administering and enforcing this Code.
 - 106.3 Prosecution of violation. Any person failing to comply with a notice of violation or order served in accordance with section 107 shall be deemed responsible for a municipal civil infraction, and the violation shall be deemed a strict liability offense. If the notice of violation is not complied with, the code official may institute the appropriate proceeding at law or in equity to restrain, correct, or abate such violation, or to require the removal or termination of the unlawful occupancy of the structure or premises in violation of the provisions of this Code or of the order or direction made pursuant thereto. Any action taken by the authority having jurisdiction on such premises shall be charged against the real estate upon which the violation is located and shall be a lien upon such real estate that may be assessed and collected on the tax rolls in the same manner and with the same interest and penalties as delinquent special assessments.
 - 106.4. Violation penalties. Any person, firm or corporation who shall violate a provision of this Code, or fail to comply therewith, or with any of the requirements thereof, shall be responsible for a municipal civil infraction and be subject to the penalties, including civil fines, costs, damages, expenses and court judgments and orders to enforce or enjoin violations of this Code as provided in Chapter 2 Article VI of the City of Lathrup Village Code of Ordinances. Each day that a violation continues after due notice has been served, in accordance with the terms and provisions hereof, shall be deemed a separate offense. A violation of any of the provisions of this Code is hereby declared to be a public nuisance per se and may be abated by order of any court of competent jurisdiction.
 - 111.2. Membership of the board. As authorized by Section 14 of the Stille-DeRossett-Hale Single State Construction Code Act, Public Act

No. 230 of 1972, the Construction Board of Appeals for the City of Lathrup Village shall serve as the Board of Appeals as provided by Section 111.

(b) Sections 111.2.1, 111.2.2, 111.2.3, 111.2.4 and 111.2.5 of the International Property Maintenance Code, 2018 Edition, are deleted.

Sec. 14-154. - Firewood storage.

- (a) *Definitions*. Firewood means and includes all wood, logs, twigs, branches, stumps, stakes, scrap wood, wooden shingles and similar materials kept or stored outside upon property within the city, which materials are capable of being burned in a fireplace or wood burning stove.
- (b) Storage. Any firewood stored or kept outside upon property within the city shall not be placed or stored within 12 inches of any adjoining property line. Storage shall be permitted only on a secure rack, base or other device that keeps the firewood eight inches above the ground to prevent the infestation of rodents and vermin.
- (c) Locations restricted. Any firewood stored or kept outside upon property within the city shall not be placed or kept in the front yard of a residential home.
- (d) *Penalty*. Any person who shall violate this section shall be deemed to have committed a civil infraction.

Secs. 14-155—14-180. - Reserved.

Section 2. Repealer.

This Ordinance hereby repeals any ordinances in conflict herewith.

Section 3. Savings Clause.

That nothing in this Ordinance hereby adopted be construed to affect any just or legal right or remedy of any character nor shall any just or legal right or remedy of any character be lost, impaired or affected by this Ordinance.

Section 4. Severability.

The various parts, sections, and clauses of this Ordinance are declared to be severable. If any part, sentence, paragraph, section or clause is adjudged unconstitutional or invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, the remainder of the Ordinance shall not be affected.

Section 5. Adoption and Effective Date.

This Ordinance shall be published in the manner required by law and shall become effective ten (10) days after the date of its publication. A copy of the ordinance shall also be made available for public use and inspection in the office of the City Clerk.

CITY OF LATHRUP VILLAGE OAKLAND COUNTY, MICHIGAN

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE CITY OF
LATHRUP VILLAGE CODE OF ORDINANCES AT
CHAPTER 46. MISCELLANEOUS OFFENSES, PROVISIONS, FORFEITURES AND
PENALTIES, BY ADDING ARTICLE XII. PARKS AND RECREATION PROTECTION
AND TO REPEAL EXISTING SECTION 46-31

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LATHRUP VILLAGE ORDAINS:

PART I. TITLE.

This Ordinance shall be known as the "Parks and Recreation Protection Ordinance".

PART II. ORDINANCE AMENDMENT.

That Chapter 46. <u>Miscellaneous Offense Provisions</u>, Forfeitures and Penalties, Article XII. <u>Parks and Recreation Protection</u> of the City of Lathrup Village Code of Ordinances is hereby added to read as follows in its entirety:

ARTICLE XII. - PARKS AND RECREATION PROTECTION

Sec. 46-172. - Definition.

The words "park" and "park area", when used in this article, shall mean any public park, recreation area or recreation facility operated by the department of parks and recreation.

Sec. 46-173. General Rental Policies.

- (a) Park rental is by permit only;
- (b) The rental applicant must remain on site for the duration of the rental period;
- (c) Event organizers must have a printed copy of their rental agreement to display upon request;
- (d) Reservation holders may not transfer a park permit;
- (e) The use of any park is at your own risk, the City does not assume responsibility for injury or any loss, theft or damage to personal items.

Sec. 46-174. - Hours.

- (a) All parks of the city shall be open from 8:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m., unless otherwise posted.
- (b) It shall be unlawful for any person to utilize a park other than during park hours.
- (c) When renting a park setup may not begin before 8:00am, All activities, including cleanup, must be completed by 9:00 pm.

Sec. 46-175. - Protection of structures, plants, earth, waters and wildlife generally.

It shall be unlawful within a park for any person to:

- (a) Mark, deface, disfigure, injure, tamper with or displace or remove any park property or appurtenances whatsoever, either real or personal;
- (b) Misuse or abuse any park restroom, washroom or similar facility to the detriment of its maintenance in a neat and sanitary condition;
- (c) Dig or remove any soil, rock, sand, stones, trees, grass, shrubs or plants or other wood or materials, or make any excavation by tool, equipment, blasting or other means or agency;
- (d) Damage, cut, carve, mark, transplant or remove any plant, or injure the bark, or pick flowers or seed of any tree or plant, or in any other way injure the natural beauty or usefulness of any area;
- (e) Climb, stand or sit upon monuments, planters, trees, fountains, railings, fences or upon any other property not designated or customarily used for such purpose;
- (f) Attach any rope or cable or other contrivance to any tree, fence, railing, bridge, bench, or other structure;
- (g) Throw, discharge, or otherwise place or cause to be placed in the waters of any fountains, ponds, lake, stream or other body of water in or adjacent to any park or any tributary stream, storm sewer, or drain flowing into such water, any substance, matter or thing, liquid or solid, which will or may result in the pollution of such waters;
- (h) Tie or hitch an animal to any tree or plant; or
- (i) Hunt, molest, harm, frighten, kill, trap, pursue, chase, tease, shoot or throw any object at any animal, wildlife, or bird.

Sec. 46-176. - Conduct within parks.

It shall be unlawful within a park for any person to:

- (a) Prevent or interfere with another's lawful use of a park or any park facility;
- (b) Conduct or participate in any form of gambling, lottery or game of chance, except as permitted by state law and approved by the council and department of parks and recreation;
- (c) Consume alcoholic liquor unless authorized by resolution of city council and posted with a notice that such consumption has been authorize;
- (d) Smoke, vape, use an electronic cigarette, use marijuana or any marijuana infused product;
- (e) Play any musical instrument, radio, record, tape player or other device in a manner which interferes with the enjoyment of the park by others or which is disturbing to adjacent residents, music levels must stay under 65 decibels.
- (f) Attach decorations to a pavilion/ picnic shelter or gazebo in any way, loose decorations such as confetti and glitter are also prohibited.
- (g) Erect or maintain any bounce house, inflatable, petting zoo and/or animal ride, except for City sponsored events
- (h) Engage in commercial activity, promote any business or commercial venture, fundraise, or require anyone to pay or make a donation to attend the event.

Sec. 46-177. - Rubbish.

- (a) It shall be unlawful for any person to take into, carry through, or put into any park, any rubbish, refuse, garbage or other waste material;
- (b) It shall be unlawful for any person responsible for the presence of rubbish, refuse, garbage or waste material in any park to fail to deposit such in receptacles so provided within a park or fail to remove such from a park for proper disposal elsewhere. Where receptacles are not provided in a park or are filled to capacity, all such rubbish, refuse, garbage or waste material shall be removed from a park by the person responsible for its presence for proper disposal elsewhere;
- (c) Used charcoal must be disposed of in designated charcoal bins.

Sec. 46-178. - Animals.

- (a) It shall be unlawful for any person to:
 - Take any dog or other pet into any park except when kept on a leash not more than six (6) feet in length and kept under the immediate control of the owner or person having custody of the animal; or
 - 2. Fail to remove any animal excrement deposited in a park by any dog or pet taken into a park by such person.
- (b) This section shall not apply to service animals.

Sec. 46-179. - Operation and parking of vehicles.

It shall be unlawful for any person to do any of the following with a city park:

- (a) Drive any vehicle in excess of fifteen (15) miles per hour;
- (b) Park a vehicle anywhere except in a designated parking area, including setup and cleanup;
- (c) Park a vehicle when the operator or a passenger is not making active use of the park, or allow a vehicle to remain within a park when the operator or passenger has left the park;
- (d) Leave a vehicle standing or parked during hours when the park is closed;
- (e) Park any type of trailer at any time, except for the purpose of conducting official city business;
- (f) Ride a bicycle without reasonable regard to the safety of others;
- (g) Drive any vehicle on any area except the park roads or parking areas designated as open to public travel or such areas as may on occasion be specifically designated by signs as temporary driving areas;
- (h) If any vehicle or trailer is parked or left standing in violation of the rules set forth in this subsection, the city may immediately remove such vehicle or trailer and impound the same, and thereafter process such vehicle or trailer in accordance with applicable provisions of law or ordinance; or
- (i) Subsections (b) through (7g) shall not apply to city personnel engaged in official business.

Sec. 46-180. - Firearms and fireworks.

It shall be unlawful for any person to bring into any park or have in his possession in any park:

- (a) Any firearm as defined in Act No. 189 of the Public Acts of Michigan of 1959 (MCL 8.3t, MSA 2.212(20)), as amended, BB gun, pellet gun, air gun, spring gun, slingshot, bow, or other weapon from which a dangerous projectile may be propelled by explosives, spring, gas or air, except as otherwise expressly authorized by law;
- (b) Any starter pistol or other device from which blank cartridges may be discharged; or
- (c) Any fireworks as defined in the Michigan Fireworks Safety Act, Act 256 of 2011, Section 28.452, as amended.

Sec. 46-181. - Fires.

It shall be unlawful within a park for any person to:

- (a) Kindle, build, maintain or use a fire except in portable picnic stoves or in such places provided for such purposes;
- (b) Operate a deep-fryer;
- (c) Dump any burning or hot ash into any trash receptacle or elsewhere in a park unless the receptacle shall be marked as being a receptacle for such material.

Section 46-182. Penalty and Enforcement

- (a) Any person who shall violate any section within this Article shall be guilty of a municipal civil infraction and responsible for a fine in the amount of \$100 for a first offense, \$200 for a second offense and \$300 for third and subsequent offenses.
- (b) In addition to the police department, the provisions of this section shall be enforced by the director, deputy director and foreman in the department of public works of the city and by the director, deputy director, supervisors and assistant supervisors in the department of parks and recreation of the city.

Sections 46-182 – 46-192 Reserved.

PART III.

REPEALER.

That within Chapter 46 <u>Miscellaneous Offense Provisions</u>, Forfeitures and Penalties, Article II. <u>Offenses Affecting Government Functions</u> Section 46-31 is hereby repealed.

PART IV. SEVERABILITY.

If any section, subsection, clause, phrase, or portion of this article is for any reason held invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, such portion shall be deemed a separate and distinct provision, and such holding shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions.

PART V. SAVINGS.

Notice of Adoption:

All proceedings pending and all rights and liabilities existing, acquired, or incurred at the time this ordinance takes effect are saved and may be consummated according to the law in force where they commenced.

PART VI. EFFECTIVE DATE.

This Ordinance shall be published in the manner required by law and shall become effective ten (10) days after the date of its publication. A copy of the ordinance shall also be made available for public use and inspection in the office of the City Clerk.

AMENDED ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF THE SOUTHEASTERN OAKLAND COUNTY WATER AUTHORITY

(Amended as of ----- 2019)

These Amended Articles of Incorporation are adopted by the constituent municipalities for the purpose of continuing an Authority under the provisions of Act No. 196 of the Michigan Public Acts of 1952.

ARTICLE I

Legal Name

The name of this Authority is "Southeastern Oakland County Water Authority."

ARTICLE II

Constituent Municipalities

The names of the municipalities constituting this Authority are: City of Berkley, Village of Beverly Hills, Village of Bingham Farms, City of Birmingham, City of Clawson, City of Huntington Woods, City of Lathrup Village, City of Pleasant Ridge, City of Royal Oak, City of Southfield and Township of Southfield, all in Oakland County, Michigan, sometimes herein referred to as the "constituent municipalities." The Village of Franklin shall become a constituent municipality upon the exercise of jurisdiction over a water supply system within its boundaries.

ARTICLE III

Purposes of SOCWA

The purposes of SOCWA are all lawful proposes allowed under the Enabling Law and these Articles.

ARTICLE IV

Powers of SOCWA

This Authority shall be a body corporate with power to sue or to be sued in any court of this state. The Authority shall be comprised of the territory lying within the constituent municipalities. No change in municipal jurisdiction over any territory within the Authority shall in any manner affect the Authority or its boundaries. This Authority shall possess all the powers granted by

Page 134 of 163

statute and by these Articles, and all powers necessary to carry out the purpose of its incorporation and those incident thereto. The enumeration of any powers herein shall not be construed as a limitation upon its general powers unless the context shall clearly indicate otherwise. This Authority shall have a corporate seal. The powers granted to SOCWA under the Enabling Law shall be in addition to those granted by any other state statute or these Articles.

ARTICLE V

Dissolution of SOCWA

This Authority shall continue in existence until dissolved by act of the parties or by law. This Authority shall not be dissolved if such dissolution would operate as an impairment of any of its existing contracts.

ARTICLE VI

Fiscal Year

The fiscal year of the Authority shall commence on the first day of July in each year and end on the 30th day of June of the following year.

<u>ARTICLE VII</u>

The Board

The governing body of this Authority shall be a Board of Trustees (sometimes hereinafter referred to as the "Board") which shall be constituted of one (1) representative from each constituent municipality, who shall be appointed by the governing body of such municipality on or before the 15th day of June of each year, and shall serve during the next fiscal year and until their successor is appointed. The members of the Board of Trustees shall serve without compensation but the Board in its discretion may authorize the payment of the actual expenditures of any member, incurred in connection with the business of the Authority.

The Board shall, at its July meeting of each year, place on its Agenda the issue of "organization". At the July organizational meeting, the Board shall select a Chair, a Vice-Chair, and a Secretary, who shall otherwise be existing members of the Board. At such organization meeting, the Board shall also select a Treasurer and a Finance Director, who may or may not be members of the Board. Such officers shall serve until the July organizational meeting of the following year and/or until

their respective successors shall be selected. No person shall serve as Chair, Vice Chair or Secretary after he/she ceases to be a member of the Board.

The governing body of each Constituent municipality shall, at the time of appointing its regular representative on the Board of Trustees also appoint an alternate representative who shall have the right to act in the place of the regular representative in event of the latter's absence from any meeting of the Board of Trustees, but the alternate's authority shall be limited to the business conducted at such meeting. For any other purpose he/she shall not be considered a member of the Board. It shall not be necessary to serve notice of meeting upon such alternates. No appointment to the Board and no selection of an officer of the Board shall be deemed to be invalid because it was not made within or at the time specified in these Articles. Any Board member or any alternate may be removed at any time by action of the governing body of the municipality which he/she represents. Any officer of SOCWA may be removed by action of the Board by a majority vote of the Constituent Members.

ARTICLE VIII

Board Vacancy

In event of a vacancy on the Board, the governing body of the municipality entitled to such representative, shall fill the vacancy for the unexpired term. In event of a vacancy in any office of the Board, such vacancy shall be filled by the Board for the unexpired term. In case of the temporary absence or disability of any officer, the Board may appoint some person to temporarily act in their stead except that, in event of the temporary absence or disability of the Chair, the Vice-Chair shall so act.

ARTICLE IX

Voting Power

The number of votes to which each representative on the Board of Trustees shall from time to time be entitled, be one vote for each 200 million gallons, or a major fraction thereof, of water delivered during the preceding fiscal year by the Authority to the municipality which he/she represents. Under all circumstances, each representative shall have at least one vote.

The representative of any municipality becoming a constituent municipality in the future shall be entitled to one (1) vote until that municipality shall have been a constituent municipality of the Authority for a complete fiscal year, at which time the number of votes shall be determined in accordance with the provisions of this Article.

ARTICLE X

Board Meetings and Voting

All meetings of the Board shall comply with Michigan's Open Meetings Act, MCL 12.261, et. Seq., including all future amendments. Meetings of the Board shall be held monthly, at such times and places as shall be prescribed by resolution of the Board. Special meetings of the Board may be called by the Chair, or any three (3) Constituent Members of the Board, by serving written notice of the time, place and purpose thereof, upon each member of the Board, personally, or by leaving it at his/her office, at least seventy-two (72) hours prior to the time of such meeting, or by depositing the same in a United States Post Office or mail box within the limits of SOCWA, at least seventy-two (72) hours prior to the time of such meeting, enclosed in a sealed envelope properly addressed to him/her at his/her home or office address, with postage fully prepaid thereon. Special meetings of the Board at which all Constituent Members are present shall be deemed to be valid even though no written notice thereof may have been given as above provided. Any Constituent Member of the Board may waive notice of any meeting either before or after the holding thereof. The presence of not less than four members of the Board holding more than fifty per centum of the total voting power of the entire Board, shall be required for a quorum.

The Board shall act by motion, resolution, or ordinance. For the passage of any motion, resolution or ordinance, there shall be required the affirmative vote of not less than four members of the Board possessing more than one-half of the total votes of the entire Board, except where a larger vote is required by these Articles. The Board shall have the right to adopt, from time to time, rules governing the procedure which are not in conflict with the terms of any statute or of these Articles. Board procedures shall be governed by Robert's Rules of Order, as amended from time to time. The Board shall keep minutes of its proceedings, which shall be approved and signed by the Chair

and Secretary. All votes shall be by "Yeas" and "Nays". The journal shall show how each member voted and the total number of votes for and against each motion, resolution or ordinance.

ARTICLE XI

General Manager

The Board of Trustees shall appoint a General Manager. The General Manager shall be the chief administrative officer of the Authority and shall perform all of the purely administrative functions of the Authority, unless otherwise expressly delegated in these Articles. All such functions shall be performed in harmony with the adopted policies and direction of the Board. The General Manager shall serve at the will and direction of the Board.

ARTICLE XII

Board Officers

The Chair of the Board shall be the presiding officer thereof. Except as herein otherwise provided, he/she shall not have any executive or administrative functions. In the absence or disability of the Chair, the Vice-Chair shall perform the duties of the Chair. The Secretary shall be the recording officer of the Board. The Treasurer shall be custodian of the funds of the Authority. The Finance Director shall be the chief accounting officer of the Authority. All monies shall be deposited in a bank or banks, to be designated by the Board, and all checks or other forms of withdrawal therefrom shall be signed by the Treasurer, Chairman or Secretary of the Board and countersigned by the Finance Director or General Manager. The Treasurer, and such other officers and employees as the Board shall determine, shall give to the Authority a bond in an amount as determined by the Board, conditioned upon the faithful performance of the duties of their respective offices. The cost of said bonds shall be paid by the Authority. The officers of the Board shall have such other powers and duties as may be conferred upon them by the Board.

ARTICLE XIII

Property

The Authority may acquire private property for a water supply system by purchase, construction, lease, gift, devise or condemnation, either within or without its corporate limits, and may hold, manage, control, sell, exchange or lease such property. For the purpose of condemnation, the

Authority may proceed under the provisions of Act 149 of the Public Acts of 1911, as now or hereafter amended, or any other appropriate statute.

ARTICLE XIV

Contracts-Members

The Authority and its constituent municipalities shall enter into a contract or contracts for the sale by the Authority and purchase by the municipalities, of water provided that such contracts shall be for a period not exceeding fifty (50) years. The Authority shall continue to furnish water to any constituent municipality for such of its non-resident customers as were described by name or location in the original water supply contract between it and the Authority, and the daily water demand of such non-resident customers shall be included in the daily water demand of the municipality. In other cases, the furnishing of water by a constituent municipality to non-resident customers shall be contingent upon approval of the Board. If such a contract shall specify the charges to be made for such service, then such charges shall be subject to increase by the Authority at any time if necessary, in order to provide funds to meet its obligations.

As of the effective date of these Articles, the current members of the Authority have purchased and paid for the Allocated Capacity values displayed in the table below:

The contract with the City of Huntington Woods shall be exclusive of the properties therein owned by the City of Detroit and designated as the Rackham Municipal Golf Course and the Detroit Zoological Park. There shall be a separate contract between the Authority and the City of Detroit for furnishing water to these Detroit properties.

Should any constituent municipality use water in any one day in excess of its allocated capacity as herein specified during any two 24-hour periods, its allocated capacity shall be increased as of July 1 of the next succeeding fiscal year to an amount corresponding to the average of the two days when the maximum use had occurred, and a demand charge shall then be paid based upon said increased allocation. The Board may enter into agreements with the constituent municipalities to provide for additional allocated capacity prior to the financing and construction of additions or improvements to the Authority system to provide additional water supply.

The demand charge (Ready-To-Serve Charge) shall be calculated by dividing the Net Position (or equivalent) of the Authority in dollars as determined by the Auditors of the Authority at the end of the most recent fiscal year by the then current total Allocated Capacity (in million gallons per day). This demand charge (in \$ per million gallons per day) shall be multiplied by the additional allocated capacity to obtain a Total Increased Demand Charge that shall be paid to the Authority over a twenty-five (25) year period in equal annual amounts.

If the Board approves a new member community, including the Village of Franklin, following the provisions of Article XXIII, the contract for the new member community shall contain a Demand Charge (Ready-to-Serve) charge as calculated above.

ARTICLE XV

Contracts – Non-Members

The Authority may also enter into a contract with any non-constituent city, village or township or with any city water supply district as defined in Section 3 of Act 107 of the Public Acts of 1941, as now amended, or to any similar independently financed and operated water supply system in a prescribed water supply district, for the sale and purchase of water, and may provide for charges greater than those to the constituent municipalities, but the charges thereunder shall be subject to change by the Authority from time to time.

ARTICLE XVI

Contracts – Water Purchase

The Authority shall have the power to contract with any public corporation for the purchase of water by the Authority from such public corporation.

ARTICLE XVII

Bonds

For the purpose of acquiring, improving, enlarging and/or extending a water supply system or systems, this Authority may issue self-liquidating revenue bonds, in accordance with the provisions of Act 94 of the Public Acts of 1933, as now or hereafter amended, or any other act providing for the issuance of such bonds, provided, that no such bonds shall be a general obligation of the Authority but shall be payable solely from revenues of the Authority's water supply system or systems.

ARTICLE XVIII

Board Compensation

The Board shall have the power to secure all necessary services to carry out the functions of the Authority and to fix the compensation therefor: provided, that no officer or employee of any constituent municipality shall receive any compensation from the Authority except by the vote of members of the Board possessing at least two-thirds of the total voting power of the entire Board.

ARTICLE XIX

Annual Audit

The Board shall cause an annual audit to be made of its financial transactions by a certified public accountant and shall furnish a copy thereof to each constituent municipality.

ARTICLE XX

Members Refusing to Contract

If any constituent municipality shall refuse or neglect to enter into a contract for the purchase of water from the Authority, then the Board by the vote of members thereof possessing at least two-thirds (2/3rds) of the total voting power of the entire Board, may expel such municipality as a constituent part of the Authority. The Board may not modify or cancel any contract upon which its revenues are based, if the same would impair the obligation of any bond contract. Any existing contract between a constituent municipality and the Authority shall not be modified unless approved by the vote of not less than 2/3rds of the members of the Board. Contracts with any municipality becoming a constituent member of the Authority in the future shall be approved by not less than 2/3rds of the members of the Board.

ARTICLE XXI

Revenue Shortfall

If for any reason the total income of the Authority during any fiscal year shall not be sufficient to satisfy its obligations accruing during such year, including payments to be made to the Bond and Interest Redemption Fund if revenue bonds are outstanding, then the amount of any deficiency may be prorated among the constituent municipalities, in accordance with the amount of water delivered by the Authority to said respective municipalities during such fiscal year, which amount shall be considered as an additional charge for water.

ARTICLE XXII

Amendment of Articles

These Articles of Incorporation may be amended as provided in said Act 196 of the Public Acts of 1952 as now existing or hereafter amended. All Amendments to these Articles require a positive vote of the legislative body of each Constituent Member and a unanimous vote of the Board.

ARTICLE XXIII

Addition of New Members

Any city, village or township which at any time is not a constituent part of this Authority, may become a part thereof in the manner provided by said Act 196 of the Public Acts of 1952 as now existing or hereafter amended, and shall thereafter be deemed to be both an incorporating and constituent municipality. A municipality may become a Constituent Member of SOCWA by a positive vote of that municipality's legislative body and by and Amendment of these Articles consistent with the procedure set forth in Article XXVI above.

ARTICLE XXIV

Publication of Articles

These Articles shall be published once in a newspaper circulating within the SOCWA Constituent Member communities. One printed copy of such Articles of Incorporation certified as a true copy thereof, with the date and place of publication, shall be filed with each the Secretary of State and the Clerk of the County of Oakland, within thirty (30) days after execution has been completed.

ARTICLE XXV

Effective Date

This Authority shall become effective upon the filing of printed copies of these Articles, as provided in the preceding Article.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF THE

OF THE

SOUTHEASTERN OAKLAND COUNTY WATER AUTHORITY

(Amended as of January 1983)

These Articles of Incorporation are adopted by the incorporating municipalities for the purpose of creating an Authority under the provisions of Act No. 196 of the Michigan Public Acts of 1952.

ARTICLE I

The name of this Authority is "Southeastern Oakland County Water Authority."

ARTICLE II

The names of the municipalities creating this Authority are: City of Royal Oak, City of Birmingham, City of Berkley, City of Huntington Woods, City of Pleasant Ridge, City of Clawson, and Township of Southfield, all in Oakland County, Michigan, sometimes herein referred to as the "constituent municipalities." The municipalities incorporated from the area originally included in Southfield Township, which in addition to the above, are now constituent municipalities are as follows: City of Lathrup Village, City of Southfield, Village of Beverly Hills. The Village of Franklin and the Village of Bingham Farms shall become constituent municipalities upon the exercise of jurisdiction over a water supply system within their respective boundaries.

ARTICLE III

The purpose of this Authority is to acquire, own and operate a water supply system or systems as defined in said Act.

ARTICLE IV

This Authority shall be a body corporate with power to sue or to be sued in any court of this state. The Authority shall be comprised of the territory lying within the incorporating municipalities. No change in municipal jurisdiction over any territory within the Authority shall in any manner affect the Authority or its boundaries. It shall possess all the powers granted by statute and by these Articles, and all powers necessary to carry out the purpose of its incorporation and those incident thereto. The enumeration of any powers herein shall not be construed as a limitation upon its general powers unless the context shall clearly indicate otherwise. It shall have a corporate seal.

ARTICLE V

This Authority shall continue in existence until dissolved by act of the parties or by law: provided, that it shall not be dissolved if such dissolution would operate as an impairment of any of its contracts.

ARTICLE VI

The fiscal year of the Authority shall commence on the first day of July in each year and end on the 30th day of June of the following year.

ARTICLE VII

The governing body of this Authority shall be a Board of Trustees (sometimes hereinafter referred to as the "Board") which shall be constituted of one (1) representative from each constituent municipality, who shall be appointed by the governing body of such municipality on or before the 15th day of June of each year, and shall serve during the next fiscal year and until his successor is appointed. The members of the Board of Trustees shall serve without compensation but the Board in its discretion may authorize the payment of the actual expenditures of any member, incurred in connection with the business of the Authority. The Board shall meet on the second Wednesday in July of each year at 3:00 P.M., at the place of holding the meetings of the Board for the purpose of organization. At such organization meeting the Board shall select a Chairman, a Vice-Chairman, and a Secretary, who shall be members of

the Board. At such organization meeting, the Board shall also select a Treasurer, a Finance Director, and an Assistant Secretary, who may or may not be members of the Board. The positions of Treasurer and Assistant Secretary may be held by the same person; or the positions of Finance Director and Assistant Secretary may be held by the same person, but in that event such person shall not be authorized to act both as Assistant Secretary and Finance Director in signing and countersigning checks. Such officers shall serve until the organization meeting of the following year and/or until their respective successors shall be selected. Providing that no person shall serve as Chairman, Vice-Chairman or Secretary after he ceases to be a member of the Board. Within twenty (20) days after this Authority shall become effective, the governing body of each constituent municipality shall select its representative on the Board to serve for the remainder of the then fiscal year and within thirty (30) days after such effective date the Board members shall meet for the purpose of organizing the Board for the balance of such fiscal year. The time and place of such meeting shall be fixed in writing by members of the Board holding at least fifty-one per centum of the voting power of the entire Board, and notice thereof served upon all members in the manner provided in Article X. The agreement for such meeting may name the temporary chairman thereof. The governing body of each constituent municipality shall at the time of appointing its regular representative on the Board of Trustees also appoint an alternate representative who shall have the right to act in the place of the regular representative in event of the latter's absence from any meeting of the Board of Trustees, but his authority shall be limited to the business conducted at such meeting. For any other purpose he shall not be considered a member of the Board. It shall not be necessary to serve notice of meeting upon such alternates. No appointment to the Board and no selection of an officer of the Board shall be deemed to be invalid because it was not made within or at the time specified in these Articles. Any board member or any alternate may be removed at any time by action of the governing body of the municipality which he represents. Any officer may be removed by action of the Board of Trustees.

ARTICLE VIII

In event of a vacancy on the Board, the governing body of the municipality entitled to such representative, shall fill the vacancy for the unexpired term. In event of a vacancy in any office of the Board, such vacancy shall be filled by the Board for the unexpired term. In case of the temporary absence or disability of any officer, the Board may appoint some person to temporarily act in his stead except that, in event of the temporary absence or disability of the Chairman, the Vice-Chairman shall so act.

ARTICLE IX

When the Authority shall have operated its water supply system for a complete fiscal year, then thereafter each representative on the Board of Trustees shall be entitled to one vote for each 250 million gallons, or a major fraction thereof, of water delivered during the preceding fiscal year by the Authority to the municipality which he represents: Provided, that each such representative shall have at least one vote. For the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1959, each representative on the Board of Trustees shall be entitled to the number of votes hereinafter indicated after the name of the municipality which he represents:

The representative of any municipality becoming a constituent municipality in the future shall be entitled to one (1) vote until that municipality shall have been a constituent municipality of the Authority for a complete fiscal year, at which time the number of votes shall be determined in accordance with the provisions of this Article.

ARTICLE X

Meetings of the Board shall be held at least bi-monthly, at such times and place as shall be prescribed by resolution of the Board. Special meetings of the Board may be called by the Chairman, or any three (3) members thereof, by serving written notice of the time, place and purpose thereof, upon each member of the Board, personally, or by leaving it at his place of residence, at least twenty-four (24) hours prior to the time of such meeting, or by depositing the same in a United States Post Office or mail box within the limits of the Authority, at least seventy-two (72) hours prior to the time of such meeting, enclosed in a sealed envelope properly addressed to him at his home or office address, with postage fully prepaid thereon. Special meetings of the Board at which all members are present shall be deemed to be valid even though no written notice thereof may have been given as above provided. Any member of the Board may waive notice of any meeting either before or after the holding thereof. The presence of not less than four members of the Board holding more than fifty per centum of the total votes of the entire Board, shall be required for a quorum. The Board shall act by motion, resolution, or ordinance. For the passage of any motion, resolution or ordinance, there shall be required the affirmative vote of not less than four members of the Board possessing more than one-half of the total votes of the entire Board, except where a larger vote is required by these Articles. The Board shall have the right to adopt rules governing its procedure which are not in conflict with the terms of any statutes or of these Articles. The Board shall keep a journal of its proceedings, which shall be signed by the Chairman and Secretary. All votes shall be by "Yeas" and "Nays". The journal shall show how each member voted and the total number of votes for and against each motion, resolution or ordinance.

ARTICLE XI

The Board of Trustees shall appoint a General Manager. The General Manager shall be the chief administrative officer of the Authority, and shall perform all of the purely administrative functions of the Authority, unless otherwise delegated in these Articles. All such functions shall be performed in harmony with the adopted policies of the Board.

ARTICLE XII

The Chairman of the Board shall be the presiding officer thereof. Except as herein otherwise provided, he shall not have any executive or administrative functions. In the absence or disability of the Chairman, the Vice-Chairman shall perform the duties of the Chairman. The Secretary shall be the recording officer of the Board. The Treasurer shall be custodian of the funds of the Authority. The Finance Director shall be the chief accounting officer of the Authority. All monies shall be deposited in a bank or banks, to be designated by the Board, and

all checks or other forms of withdrawal therefrom shall be signed by the Treasurer, Chairman or Secretary of the Board and countersigned by the Finance Director or General Manager. The Assistant Secretary shall under all conditions and circumstances be authorized to act in place of the Secretary. Except as in these Articles otherwise provided, the Assistant Secretary shall have custody of the official records of the Authority. The Treasurer, and such other officers and employees as the Board shall determine, shall give to the Authority a bond in an amount as determined by the Board, conditioned upon the faithful performance of the duties of their respective offices. The cost of said bonds shall be paid by the Authority. The officers of the Board shall have such other powers and duties as may be conferred upon them by the Board. Any city, village or township which at any time is not a constituent part of this Authority, may become a part thereof in the manner provided by said Act 196 of the Public Acts of 1952 as now existing or hereafter amended, and shall thereafter be deemed to be both an incorporating and constituent municipality.

ARTICLE XIII

The Authority may acquire private property for a water supply system by purchase, construction, lease, gift, devise or condemnation, either within or without its corporate limits, and may hold, manage, control, sell, exchange or lease such property. For the purpose of condemnation it may proceed under the provisions of Act 149 of the Public Acts of 1911, as now or hereafter amended, or any other appropriate statute.

ARTICLE XIV

The Authority and its several constituent municipalities shall enter into a contract or contracts for the sale by the Authority and purchase by the municipalities, of water: Provided that such contracts shall be for a period not exceeding fifty (50) years. The Authority shall continue to furnish water to any constituent municipality for such of its non-resident customers as were described by name or location in the original water supply contract between it and the Authority, and the daily water demand of such non-resident customers shall be included in the daily water demand of the municipality. In other cases, the furnishing of water by a constituent municipality to non-resident customers shall be contingent upon approval of the Board. If such a contract shall specify the charges to be made for such service, then such charges shall be subject to increase by the Authority at any time if necessary in order to provide funds to meet its obligations. Each such contract shall provide that, in addition to any other charges, the constituent municipality shall pay to the Authority in each fiscal year a demand charge (Ready-To-Serve Charge) of Three Thousand Eighteen Dollars and Eighteen Cents (\$3,018.18) per million gallons of allocated capacity as hereinafter set forth, said allocated capacity being based upon a maximum day's capacity of seventy million gallons; said payments to begin as of July 1, 1956, and to continue for a period of twenty-five (25) years. Each municipality shall pay these demand charges on an annual basis, and in those instances when payments are deferred and made at a date later than this schedule provides, these deferred payments shall bear interest at the rate of three per cent (3%) per annum compounded semi-annually from the due date of the payment to the actual date of said payment. Said allocated capacity and estimated maximum day for each constituent municipality is specified as follows:

The contract with the City of Huntington Woods shall be exclusive of the properties therein owned by the City of Detroit and designated as the Rackham Municipal Golf Course and the Detroit Zoological Park. There shall be a separate contract between the Authority and the City of Detroit for furnishing water to these Detroit properties. Should any constituent municipality use water in any one day in excess of its allocated capacity as herein specified during any two 24-hour periods, its allocated capacity shall be increased as of July 1 of the next succeeding fiscal year to an amount corresponding to the average of the two days when the maximum use had occurred, and the demand charge shall then be paid based upon said increased allocation. The Board may enter into agreements with the constituent municipalities to provide for additional allocated capacity prior to the financing and construction of additions or improvements to the Authority system to provide additional water supply: Provided that such municipalities shall not be required to acquire allocated capacity in excess of the "estimated maximum day" as heretofore listed, except in those cases where the actual usage exceeds this estimate.

The demand charge based upon the allocated capacity, in the total amount of seventy million gallons per day as is herein set forth shall be on the basis of Three Thousand Eighteen Dollars and Eighteen Cents (\$3,018.18) per million gallons per day of allocated capacity to be paid in each year for a period of twenty-five (25) years from and after July 1, 1956. Any payments not made in accordance with the above schedule shall bear interest at the rate of three per cent (3%) per annum compounded semi-annually from said due date as provided for herein to the actual date of said payment. If any allocated capacity, in addition to that provided for to any constituent municipality in the allocation of the seventy million gallons per day as specified herein, is provided by agreement or is required as a result of usage as is herein authorized, an annual demand charge in the amount of Three Thousand Eighteen Dollars and Eighteen Cents (\$3,018.18) per million gallons per day of said additional allocated capacity shall be paid by the constituent municipality and the amount of such increase in demand charge shall be in effect for

a period of twenty-five (25) years from the date of such increase. Such demand charge shall be payable monthly in advance.

ARTICLE XV

The Authority may also enter into a contract with any non-constituent city, village or township or with any city water supply district as defined in Section 3 of Act 107 of the Public Acts of 1941, as now amended, or to any similar independently financed and operated water supply system in a prescribed water supply district, for the sale and purchase of water, and may provide for charges greater than those to the constituent municipalities, but the charges thereunder shall be subject to change by the Authority from time to time.

ARTICLE XVI

The Authority shall have the power to contract with any public corporation for the purchase of water by the Authority from such public corporation.

ARTICLE XVII

For the purpose of acquiring, improving, enlarging and/or extending a water supply system or systems, this Authority may issue self-liquidating revenue bonds, in accordance with the provisions of Act 94 of the Public Acts of 1933, as now or hereafter amended, or any other act providing for the issuance of such bonds, provided, that no such bonds shall be a general obligation of the Authority but shall be payable solely from revenues of the Authority's water supply system or systems.

ARTICLE XVIII

The Board shall have the power to secure all necessary services to carry out the functions of the Authority and to fix the compensation therefor: provided, that no officer or employee of any constituent municipality shall receive any compensation from the Authority except by the vote of members of the Board possessing at least two-thirds of the total voting power of the entire Board.

ARTICLE XIX

The Board shall cause an annual audit to be made of its financial transactions by a certified public accountant, and shall furnish a copy thereof to each constituent municipality.

ARTICLE XX

If any constituent municipality shall refuse or neglect to enter into a contract for the purchase of water from the Authority, then the Board by the vote of members thereof possessing at least two-thirds (2/3rds) of the total voting power of the entire Board, may expel such municipality as a constituent part of the Authority. The Board may not modify or cancel any contract upon which its revenues are based, if the same would impair the obligation of any bond contract. Any existing contract between a constituent municipality and the Authority shall not be modified unless approved by the vote of not less than 2/3rds of the members of the Board. Contracts with any municipality becoming a constituent member of the Authority in the future shall be approved by not less than 2/3rds of the members of the Board.

ARTICLE XXI

If for any reason the total income of the Authority during any fiscal year shall not be sufficient to satisfy its obligations accruing during such year, including payments to be made to the Bond and Interest Redemption Fund if revenue bonds are outstanding, then the amount of any deficiency shall be prorated among the constituent municipalities, in accordance with the amount of water delivered by the Authority to said respective municipalities during such fiscal year, which amount shall be considered as an additional charge for water.

ARTICLE XXII

The legislative body of each city, village or township which is a constituent part of this Authority shall raise by tax or pay from its general or water funds, moneys necessary to pay its portion of the cost of incorporating this Authority and operating the same until such time as its water supply system shall be in operation and producing revenues, and also its portion of any

preliminary capital expenditures. The proportionate share of each municipality shall be determined by applying that percentage which its estimated 1970 Maximum Daily Demand bears to the total estimated 1970 Maximum Daily Demand of all constituent municipalities.

ARTICLE XXIII

These Articles of Incorporation may be amended as provided in said Act 196 of the Public Acts of 1952 as now existing or hereafter amended. Any city, village or township which at any time is not a constituent part of this Authority, may become a part thereof in the manner provided by said Act 196 of the Public Acts of 1952 as now existing or hereafter amended, and shall thereafter be deemed to be both an incorporating and constituent municipality.

ARTICLE XXIV

These Articles shall be published once in "The Daily Tribune", a newspaper circulating within the Authority. One printed copy of such Articles of Incorporation certified as a true copy thereof with the date and place of publication, shall be filed with each the Secretary of State and the Clerk of the County of Oakland, within thirty (30) days after execution has been completed. Edward M. Shafter of the City of Royal Oak, Michigan, is hereby designated as the person to cause these Articles to be published, certified and filed as aforesaid. In event he shall be unable to act or shall neglect to act, then Donald C. Egbert of the City of Birmingham, Michigan, shall act in his stead.

ARTICLE XXV

This Authority shall become effective upon the filing of printed copies of these Articles, as provided in the preceding Article.

These Articles have been adopted by the several incorporating municipalities, as hereinafter set forth in the following endorsements, and in witness whereof the Mayor and Clerk of each city, and the Supervisor and Clerk of the Township of Southfield, have endorsed hereon the statement of such adoption.

By - Laws for the Lathrup Village Parks and Recreation Advisory Committee

ARTICLE I: PURPOSE OF THE ORGANIZATION

The purpose of this organization is:

- A. To advise and make recommendations to the recreation coordinator and/or City Council on recreation and parks matters.
 - B. To seek the development of a broad variety of programs, facilities, and services to meet the needs and demands utilizing the total resources of the community.
 - C. To inform and educate the public about the importance of and need for recreation programs, facilities, and services.
 - D. To strive to involve the citizens in the planning and development of the recreation system and identify local needs.
 - E. To provide a close liaison and coordinate with other agencies to ensure total cooperative community effort to provide the most effective and economical services possible.
 - F. To evaluate the agency's programs, facilities, and services, and relationships periodically to assure that its goals and objectives are being achieved.
 - G. To provide encouragement, support, and work in partnership with the Recreation Coordinator to provide a team approach to agency programs.
 - H. To make recommendation to the staff and /or City Council with respect to programs, policies, fees, and other matters effecting the City parks, recreation center, and any programs existing or contemplated.

ARTICLE II: MEMBERSHIPS

The board shall consist of seven members appointed by the City Council. Members shall serve without pay. Terms of Office shall be seven members, each serving three (3) year terms, and no more than two (2) consecutive terms.

ARTICLE III: OFFICERS

Section 1. At the annual meeting, the members of the Recreation Advisory Committee shall elect from its membership a Chairperson and Vice-Chairperson and a Secretary.

Section 2. The Chairperson shall preside at meetings of the Committee, appoint responsibilities, and perform all duties generally pertaining to the office of Chairperson.

Section 3. The Vice-Chairperson shall perform these duties in the absence of the Chairperson.

Section 4. The staff liaison shall record the minutes of all Advisory Committee meetings.

ARTICLE IV: MEETINGS

Section 1. The annual meeting shall be held in July of each year and the officers elected at the annual meeting shall take office the following month.

Section 2. The Committee shall develop regular meeting dates, on a quarterly basis minimum. Each member shall show their commitment to the Recreation Advisory Committee through attendance.

Section 3. Special meetings may be called by the Chairperson, the Recreation Coordinator, or a majority of members at any time deemed necessary or desirable.

Section 4. A majority of the Recreation Advisory Committee, appointed and serving, shall constitute a quorum, and the affirmative vote of the majority of the those present, shall be necessary for the transaction of any and all business or the passage resolution.

Section 5. The absence for three (3) consecutive meetings of any member of the Committee, without due and acceptable excuse, shall constitute a vacancy on the Committee.

Section 6. Any member(s) finding a conflict of interest with one or more agenda items shall excuse himself/herself, and refrain from discussing and voting on said item(s). Any abstention shall be noted in the minutes.

Section 7. The Secretary shall notify the Chairperson of a members third absence during the year in which it occurs. The Chairperson shall forward a letter to the member addressing the member's absence and attendance record. The transmittal of this letter and the member's response shall occur to its placement as an agenda item at a Recreation Advisory meeting.

ARTICLE V: COMMITTEE RESPONSIBILITIES

Section 1. The Advisory Committee is responsible for advising and making recommendations on all recreation matters.

Section 2. The Committee shall operate under the adopted by - laws as approved by the City Council

Section 3. The Committee shall prepare and recommend for approval, regulations for proper conduct of public recreation facilities for the City of Lathrup Village.

Section 4. The Committee shall advise in the development of programs for all citizens of the City.
