FROM YOUR TREASURER

DELINQUENT TAXES

All unpaid 2022 Summer and Winter Taxes were turned over to the Oakland County Treasurer on March 1, 2023. If you have outstanding taxes, you will need to contact the county treasurer's office at 248-858-0611. Delinquent special assessments will be added to the 2023 summer tax bill if they were not paid by March 10, 2023. The summer tax bills will be mailed the first week of July 2023. For tax-related questions or concerns, please contact 248-557-2600 ext. 248.

CALCULATION INFLATION RATE MULTIPLIER:

On November 15, 2022, the Michigan State Tax Commission issued Bulletin 17 of 2022, which reported the inflation rate of 7.9%, which is used in calculating the property tax Headlee millage rollbacks. However, Proposal A limits the increase in taxable value for each parcel of property to the inflation rate of 5%, or the inflation rate, whichever is less, until the property is sold. Therefore, property owners can expect the 2023 taxable values to increase by 5%, but not to exceed their 2023 state equalized values. Any physical additions to the property, such as new construction, and any physical losses to the property, will also result in taxable value increases or decreases. When a property transfers ownership, the property "uncaps" the year after its transfers, and its taxable value is set at its respective assessed value.

NEED A DOG LICENSE?







The City of Lathrup Village has partnered with Oakland County PAWS program for dog licensing.

Residents of Lathrup Village can obtain a dog license by coming to City Hall or applying online.

- Michigan law requires that all dogs over (4) months old to be licensed.
- Oakland County dog licenses are available to purchase at Lathrup Village City Hall

VACCINATED DATE REQUIREMENT

In order to purchase a three – year dog license, your pet's rabies expiration date must coincide with the date of the dog license.

For example, in the year 2022, a three-year dog license will have a year of 2024 (three years out).

If you plan to purchase a three- year dog license in 2022, then your dog's rabies vaccination expiration date must run through 2024.













A MESSAGE FROM CODE ENFORCEMENT

Sec. 30-41. - Maintenance of ditches and culverts.



Property owners are required to maintain all stormwater ditches and culverts constructed or installed in the area between their property line and the centerline of any street or alley abutting upon their property in a condition free of waste, dirt, plant growth, and other obstructions which block or obstruct the designed flow of stormwater in the ditch or culvert. All ditches and culverts which are so obstructed as to allow unreasonable the accumulation impounding of stormwaters are declared to be public nuisances and are subject to the assessment abatement and special provisions as provided in this Code.

Our storm ditch system is designed so that water on the road flows into the storm ditches on the sides of the road. In turn, these ditches, which are on a slight angle, allow water to flow from one end of a street to the other. At the terminal end, the water enters a storm drain and gains entry into our storm water system. Once in this system, the water eventually flows out to the Rouge River. Unfortunately, a large number of streets in the City have one or more storm ditches that are either blocked or have a non-functional driveway culvert (the tube under the driveway approach that allows water to flow between the storm ditches on each side of a driveway). Blockages occur for many reasons including tree roots, accumulated sediment, debris, culverts that have heaved from seasonal temperature changes, items placed in the storm ditch, etc. In many cases, sediment that accumulates over time levels out a storm ditch so that it no longer has the required angle required for water to efficiently flow to the storm drain at the end of the street.

Mailboxes can take a beating, doing a mailbox checkup will help avoid missing mail delivery, damage to your mail, or difficulty identifying your address.

- Tighten loose hinges on the door
- Take care of rusty or loose parts
- Replace missing or faded house numbers
- Keep upright and maintain

Why Are Visible Address Numbers So Important? (Residential & Commercial Properties)

1. Emergency

If your address numbers are hard to find, it isn't just the inconvenience for anybody trying to locate your property, it could also mean that in the event of an emergency, firefighters, police and paramedics also can't find. Every second counts during an emergency, and precious time can be lost if your homes or businesses don't have clearly marked address numbers.

2. Curb Appeal

Increasing your home's curb appeal makes a great first impression to your visitors. There's a variety of simple, inexpensive curb appeal improvements that you can do including a new set of house numbers. Installing house numbers on your home is an easy and inexpensive way to add a personal touch to your home. But why go through the effort of mounting new address numbers if visitors can't see them?



Tips for Visible Address Numbers

1. Size

The first consideration for visible address numbers is their size. Your address numbers need to be large enough to be easily viewable from the street. If your home or business is set significantly back from the street, buy as large as you can fit without being gaudy. Lathrup Village requires house numbers to be at least 4 inches tall per International Fire & Property Maintenance Codes:



International Fire Code 505.1Address identification.

New and existing buildings shall be provided with *approved* address identification. The address identification shall be legible and placed in a position that is visible from the street or road fronting the property. Address identification characters shall contrast with their background. Address numbers shall be Arabic numbers or alphabetical letters. Numbers shall not be spelled out. Each character shall be not less than 4 inches (102 mm) high with a minimum stroke width of $^{1}/_{2}$ inch (12.7 mm). Where required by the *fire code official*, address identification shall be provided in additional *approved* locations to facilitate emergency response. Where access is by means of a private road and the building cannot be viewed from the *public way*, a monument, pole or other sign or means shall be used to identify the structure. Address identification shall be maintained.

International Property Maintenance Code 304.3 Premises identification.

Buildings shall have approved address numbers placed in a position to be plainly legible and visible from the street or road fronting the property. These numbers shall contrast with their background. Address numbers shall be Arabic numerals or alphabet letters. Numbers shall be not less than 4 inches in height with a minimum stroke width of 0.5 inch.

2. Contrasting Color or Finish

For increased visibility, the color or finish of your address numbers should be in sharp contrast to its background. Create a light and dark contrast between the background and house numbers to make the address numbers jump.

3. Darkness

In addition to the color or finish of address numbers being in sharp contrast to its background, they also should be easy to spot at night. Install your house numbers in an adequately lit area. If installing near the front door, the area is probably already lit. But if installing your address numbers in a different location, such as at a gate or fence, consider illuminating address numbers with light or reflective coatings.

4. Location, Location, Location!

Ideally address numbers should be placed near the front door near a porch light and at or above eye level. If your front door is not easily viewed from the street, consider a second set of address numbers. Perhaps your home is set too far back, or trees or bushes block visibility of your front door from the road. In that case, mount a second set on a post, fence or tree at the driveway entrance so they can clearly be seen from the street. Avoid placing house numbers on a garage. And if you live on a corner ensure the address numbers face the street that matches your address.

5. Font Style

Improve the visibility of your address numbers by choosing the right font style. Thin, script font styles are more difficult to view from the street. Thick, wide, boldface fonts are designed for better visibility.

6. Spacing

In addition to size and font, it's also important to space them for ideal readability. If your house numbers are spaced too closely to each other they could be hard to read. Walk down to the street to view and decide if the numbers are spaced appropriately.

7. Weather-Resistant

Most address numbers come in all-weather finishes sealed with a lacquer or glaze. Nonetheless, since they will be exposed to the outdoor elements, be sure to choose a quality material that is durable and weather-resistant so that your house numbers will look good for years to come.

8. Mailbox

In addition to installing house numbers on front door, consider also adding visible house numbers on your free-standing mailbox and number on both sides so it can be seen by vehicles approaching from either direction.


9. Commercial Properties

In addition to installing address numbers on the front of your building, add visible numbers on each rear door of the property to help differentiate between businesses.




Recycle More of Your Yard Waste

Yard Waste Collection Reminders





Set out before 7am on your collection day.



Curbside collection provided from the first Monday in April through the third Friday in December.





Acceptable containers include trash cans with "yard waste" decals or 30-gallon paper yard waste bags. No plastic bags.





4 ft.

Containers must weigh less than 50 pounds and yard waste must fit in designated container (less than 4 feet in length).



Brush (less than 2 inches in diameter and under 4 feet in length) can also be bundled with twine for collection.



Check with your city about chipping services for tree debris too large for curbside collection.

Water Service Line Material Survey



Please come to City Hall to pick up a magnet and a penny for the test!

For the health and safety of our residents, the City of Lathrup Village is required to determine your water service line material. This aids in identifying if there is possible lead exposure in drinking water which may cause health risks. That is why the City of Lathrup Village is tracking where lead water service lines exist within our community.

We have beautiful historic homes here! We recognize that some homes were built up to 100 years ago. But this also means that our records are not always complete. We are asking our residents to help us to determine if your water service line is lead, copper or galvanized steel.

HOW THE SURVEY WORKS

There is a simple online tool created by the National Public Radio (NPR) that will guide you in determining if your water service line that connects to your water meter is lead, copper, or galvanized steel.

- There are only a couple of steps and all you will needs is a coin and a magnet. To take a picture,
 a cellphone is recommended.
- Go online to Water Service Line Inquiry form at: https://arcg.is/1P5rPe
- Or you can use the QR Code



- Click on the link to the NPR tool at: https://apps.npr.org/find-lead-pipes-in-your-home/en/#intro
- Enter the information requested on the survey, add a picture, and click SUBMIT!

If you have a lead or galvanized water service, the City of Lathrup Village will be required to replace the water line at no cost to our residents.

If you are unable to perform this task, the City will be required to verify your water service material and will need to schedule a time to inspect your water meter.

By using the tool and sharing your information, you will be helping our Department of Public Services and for that we thank you!

Police Body Worn Camera Program

CITY OF LATHRUP VILLAGE ARTICLE II MUNICIPAL CODE (CHAPTER 26) ALARM SYSTEMS – FALSE ALARMS

These are condensed highlights of the Ordinance. The complete Ordinance can be obtained at the Lathrup Village Municipal Office or the Police Department.

The City of Lathrup Village Ordains;

The title of this Ordinance is "Eleventh Amendment to Municipal Code" and its purpose is to add a new Chapter to the Code which will regulate the installation, maintenance, and use of emergency alarm systems. This will help reduce the number of false alarms to which police and fire personnel are called upon to respond, reduce needless annoyances and disturbances to the neighbors, and requires alarm abusers to reimburse the City for a portion of the cost of responding to false alarms.

Article II of the 1991 Municipal Code Ordinance Section 26-60 is hereby amended by the addition of a new Chapter 26 which shall read as follows:

Chapter 26. Alarm Regulations

A. Special Definitions

101 through 107 are the special definitions for this Alarm Ordinance.

B. Alarms – Prohibited & Required Features

- Prohibits any alarms being automatically dialed into the Police or Fire Department.
- Requires automatic shut off on all audible alarms in the City within 15 minutes.

C. Registration Required

- Registration must be obtained within 30 days for systems in existence after the effective date of this Ordinance. No person shall have an alarm system without having a registration.
- Registrations shall be filed with the Police Department on forms furnished by the City.
- With the completion of the registration, a fee of \$20.00 shall be paid to the City.
- The alarm system shall conform to the requirements of the Ordinance.
- Registrations expire after 3 years and are renewable for a \$5.00 fee.
- Requires alarm users to notify Police whenever the information on the registration changes.
- Failure to register an alarm may result in a citation which carries a fine up to \$500 and/or 90 days in jail.

D. Excessive False Alarms

- Requires alarm holder to exercise due care to install and maintain control of the alarm system. Instruct all persons having access to the premises to prevent false alarms from occurring.
- More than three "at fault" false alarms in any 12-consecutive month period deemed to be excessive and declared to be public nuisance and subject to corrective action.
- Alarm holder has the opportunity to submit an explanation for each false alarm.
- Police Chief to determine status of "at fault" false alarms after explanations.
- A \$100.00 fee charged for third and subsequent "at fault" false alarms in a 12-month calendar period.

E. General Provisions

- Police Chief may initiate corrective actions for excessive "at fault" false alarms.
- Decision of Police Chief may be appealed to Business Appeal Board.

2023 CONSTRUCTION INFORMATION

Winter may not be ready to end, but construction activities are getting ready to start! Consumers Energy (CMS) is once again working to upgrade the residential service lines throughout the city. CMS and their contractor, Kaltz Excavating, will be working on the following streets: Red River/Morningside, Goldengate, San Jose Blvd, Glenwood, and Sunnybrook. Effected residents will receive door hangers no less than 24 hours prior to work beginning. Work on Red River/Morningside has already begun, with work on Sunnybrook scheduled to begin on Monday, March 13th. Should residents have any questions or issues with the work being done, please call the number on the door hangers.

Year 3 of the city's infrastructure projects, beginning with street paving, are scheduled to begin April 17th. Paving work will predominately be resurfacing ("mill & fill") and will continue throughout the summer. The final year of the Sidewalk Replacement Program (SRP) is tentatively scheduled to start in May. The goal of this program is to replace aging or degrading squares to create safe conditions, reduce the likelihood of slip-and-fall accidents, and bring all sidewalks into compliance with the city's ordinances. Residents will be getting their SRP cost estimates in the next week and will have the opportunity to either complete the work themselves or have the city perform the work. The construction map identifies all of the infrastructure project work schedule for this year. Staff is working to update the Infrastructure Project page on the city's website with current information at https://www.lathrupvillage.org/businesses/infrastructure.php.



HOME HEATING CREDIT

Applicants Wanted for Home Heating Credit Applications Must Be Submitted by Sept. 30, 2023

Michiganders who need help with their energy bills can now apply for the Home Heating Credit, according to the Michigan Department of Treasury (Treasury).

Low-income, deaf, disabled or blind persons, disabled veterans and senior citizens may qualify for the Home Heating Credit. Applicants are not required to file a Michigan individual income tax return to receive the credit.

"While it may be March, heating season is still in full force as we navigate yet another chilly Michigan spring," said State Treasurer Rachael Eubanks. "This credit can provide assistance on heating bills during our cold seasons, allowing individuals to spend their hard-earned dollars on other necessities. Please don't hesitate to seek out assistance if you think you're eligible."

Forms and instructional materials are available on the internet at *Michigan.gov/IncomeTax* or by calling 517-636-4486. Forms are also available at many libraries, Northern Michigan post offices, and Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS) offices across the state.

All applications for the credit must be received by Sept. 30, 2023.



BILLY DAVIS: BIO

Billy Davis is an inductee of: Rock & Roll Hall of Fame, Doo Wop Hall of Fame, National Rhythm & Blues Hall of Fame 30 Years with Hank Ballard Inspiration and Mentor to Jimi Hendrix Jackie Wilson's Original Lead Guitarist 'It's Your Thing' Guitarist for The Isley Brothers Billy Davis, born in Bentonia, Mississippi, is a trailblazing guitarist who grew up in Detroit, Michigan from the age of thirteen. He has been a professional musician from the age of eighteen. Raised in the 1950's Black Bottom neighborhood of Detroit with strong musical influences, he started his first band at the age of 17, as the headliner for Billy Davis & the Upsetters, which became Berry Gordy's first in-house live band, pre-Motown, long before the 'Funk Brothers'. Davis was so ahead of the times that a song title with "funk" had to be changed to "spunk" to receive airplay. His early use of the wah-wah pedal was outright rejected by his producers and band mates; then, in later years became the signature for many other musicians.

Billy Davis continues to mentor young musicians; he has included young harp player Mighty Michael Mendelson as special guest with his Billy Davis Rhythm Machine Band and is developing the youth's guitar skills. Billy Davis continues to carry the torch in the music industry as he is a treasured music legend in his own time. His memoir, tell-all book Billy Davis: Odyssey of a Music Legend will be available soon.

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
