

Winter Taxes:

 Winter tax bills were mailed the first week of December. If you have paid off your home or made changes to your mortgage company, please notify us at 248-557-2600 ext. 248. This ensures your tax bill is mailed to the correct place.

Important Dates and Facts:

- You have until <u>February 14, 2023</u> to pay your 2022 Winter Taxes without penalty at the city office.
- After February 14th, a 3% penalty will be assessed to the taxes, which can be paid at the city office until February 28, 2023.
- On March 1, 2023, all unpaid taxes will be submitted to Oakland County Treasurer. If you have outstanding taxes, please call 248-557-2600 ext. 248, for a revised tax bill.
- Delinquent special assessments will be added to the 2023 Summer Tax bills if not paid by February 28, 2023.
- 2023 Summer Taxes will be sent out the first week of July.

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

If you are receiving an estimated bill please contact the Water Department immediately to schedule an appointment to rewire your property!!

If there is an "E" behind your current read you are receiving an estimated bill.

There are five convenient and easy ways to pay your water bill

- 1. **Direct Payments** using this method, your payment will be taken directly out of an account of your choosing. You will still get a notification every month showing the amount due and the due date when the payment will be removed from the account so there are no surprises!
- 2. Drop Box you can drop your payment in our locked drop box located outside City Hall next to the Police Department.
- Mail Payment you can mail your payment to: City of Lathrup Village, Water Department 27400 Southfield Road Lathrup Village, MI 48076
- 4. Pay the cashier at City Hall.

Water Main Breaks

Water mains usually run under the pavement. Water main breaks can happen for a variety of reasons. Although water main breaks can happen at any time during the year, most are likely to occur during extreme weather conditions. It is most common to see system leaks and main breaks when the weather is frigid, and air temperatures drop. Air temperature at or below freezing causes the ground above a pipe to freeze, increasing external stress on a pipe. Hot, dry weather can also take a toll; ground shifts and increased volume and pressure can also stress water mains.

If you are experiencing brown, rusty water during a water main break or annual maintenance simply turn on the COLD water faucet at the lowest level of your home (nearest the water meter) and let the COLD water run for no more than 10 minutes. This should clean out the residue in your service line and clear the problem. The water is safe to drink but do not wash whites since they will discolor.

Police Body Worn Camera Program

After a year of working with the Federal government through the grant process, from body camera testing and evaluating, drafting policies and procedure writing, to ordering and implementation, it's finally completed.

Each full-time officer will be equipped with their own body camera, with part-time/reserve officers will use the pool cameras. The 30k grant covered a total of 50% of the overall product cost. The Federal government will pay 15k and we'll cover the other 15k.

Safety Tips

Gear Up for Winter Driving

My Car Does What? is a national campaign to help educate drivers about the safety features built into vehicles. Search for your car and find out what safety features are already built in.

Traction control is now standard on most new vehicles. This function helps your vehicle gain traction on snowy, icy or wet surfaces, particularly when accelerating from a stopped or slowed position, or when trying to make it up a slippery hill.

Anti-lock braking system (ABS) helps you steer in emergencies by restoring traction to your tires and is standard on most new vehicles, as well. ABS may vibrate or pulse when engaged. This is normal. Continue to press and hold pressure to the brake pedal.

7 Highly Effective **Portable Heater Safety Habits**

- 1. Keep all sides of the heater at least 3 feet from beds, clothes, curtains, papers, sofas and other items that can catch fire.
- 2. Never run the heater's cord under rugs or carpeting and never power the heater with an extension cord or power strip.
- Make sure the heater is not near water. NEVER touch it if you are wet.
- 4. Place the heater on a stable, level surface, located where it will not be knocked over.
- 5. Never leave the heater operating while unattended or while you are sleeping.
- 6. If the heater's cord or plug is HOT, disconnect the heater and contact an authorized repair person. If any part of the outlet is hot, contact a certified electrician.
- 7. Check <u>SaferProducts.gov</u> to see if your electric heater has been recalled.





What is the Lathrup Village Downtown Development Authority?

The Lathrup Village Downtown Development Authority (LVDDA) was initially established by the City of Lathrup Village City Council in January 1998, and the boundaries were expanded in December 1999. The LVDDA boundaries are all public and private real estate along 11 Mile Road, 12 Mile Road, and Southfield Road including public rights-of-way and alleys. Businesses and properties located within these boundaries are automatically included in the LVDDA and cannot opt-out.

As a separate taxing authority within the city, the LVDDA is primarily funded through tax revenue—levying approximately 2 mils on properties located within the district, as well as capturing the increment in property values from when the district was established. The LVDDA is a separate entity from the city overseen by a Board of Directors which is appointed by the Mayor and affirmed by Council.

Transportation of Southfield Seniors (TOSS)

We are excited to announce an expanded partnership with the City of Southfield to provide transportation for Senior residents and permanently physically challenged persons of any age! The Transportation of Southfield Seniors (TOSS), uses lift-equipped vans to transport senior residents (age 50+) who live in Southfield or Lathrup Village.

TOSS provides transportation to and from medical facilities and offices, including Providence and Beaumont facilities, within the geographical areas bounded by Fourteen Mile on the north, Eight Mile on

the south, Coolidge on the east, and Middlebelt on the west. Appointments may be made any time within two weeks of the trips. Appointments for non-medical rides will be accommodated where available. Priority is given to essential appointments.

A dispatcher is available to take calls Monday through Friday 8:30am – 1:30am. A message may be left, but this does not confirm your ride. You must speak to a dispatcher Call the TOSS Office at (248)796-4658, for more details. The cost \$5 per round trip.

Snow Removal and Ice Control



Property owners are responsible for snow removal and ice control. **Lathrup Village City Ordinance 381-06** requires property owners and occupants to clear snow and ice from sidewalks abutting their property as follows: When snow stops falling during daylight hours, it must be cleared within 12 hours after the snowfall stops.






Managing Nonpoint Source Pollution from Households

Nonpoint source (NPS) pollution is the leading source for water quality degradation in the United States. Nonpoint source pollution is runoff from urban residences, agricultural fields, impervious surfaces, construction activity, and any other over land flow that enters our waterways while accumulating pollutants. Detrimental outcomes such as eutrophication, sedimentation, and contamination can severely affect aquatic and terrestrial habitat in addition to impact drinking water supplies.

- There are several proactive measures a homeowner can take to help reduce the amount of NPS pollutants entering local lakes, streams, and rivers. These preventive measures include:
- Keeping litter, pet waste, and lawn waste out of storm drains.
- Control soil erosion on your property by planting vegetation
- Immediately clean up any oil and grease spills when maintaining your vehicle.
- Apply lawn and garden chemicals sparingly. Alternatives for chemicals and fertilizers include low phosphorous brands.
- Properly dispose of household chemicals, cleaners, paints, and other hazardous chemicals. Do not dump these harmful chemicals down your drain or any storm sewer.

Brine instead of Rock Salt to Protect Water Quality!

Salt keeps our communities safe bv reducing the number of vehicle accidents, well as slip and fall accidents. as Unfortunately, salt doesn't just disappear when all the snow melts; it is washed into our lakes, rivers, and streams and has an almost immediate effect on water quality. As a homeowner, consider reducing salt use by applying brine, not rock salt, before a snowstorm and shoveling frequently to keep snow from accumulating. This is the best way to save your back and your knees!

Brine, a mixture of salt and water, has become a great alternative to traditional rock salt. The transition to using brine for a homeowner has minimal costs. The brine can be pre-mixed in large quantities and stored in your basement or garage. By spraying brine, you have more control over your application, so you don't apply over the same area twice and it won't bounce off the driveway the way rock salt can. Brine starts working much faster than rock salt due to the increased contact area with the snow. The best method is to apply the brine before a snowstorm begins. Not all communities have transitioned to the use of brine on roads because there is а significant startup cost for additional equipment and storage.

What you need:

- 1 1/2 gallons hot water
- 3-4 cups rock or table salt
- Bucket
- Sprayer

Directions:

Combine salt and hot water (which helps dissolve the salt) in bucket until all salt is dissolved completely (so salt chunks don't clog sprayer). Pour mixed brine into sprayer and apply to sidewalk and driveway prior to a snowfall. Each gallon should cover 1,000 square feet of surface (about 200 feet of sidewalk).

SPRING LANDSCAPING TIPS

Storm drains found in our streets and yards empty into our lakes and rivers. While fertilizer is good for our lawn, it's bad for our water. Fertilizer in our lakes and rivers causes algae to grow. What can you do?

- Sweep or blow fertilizer and grass clippings back onto the lawn and not into the street to prevent them from getting into storm drains and ditches.
- Select a lawn service that uses organic fertilizers or offers a slowrelease nitrogen, low or no phosphorus option.
- Don't guess, soil test. A soil test will tell you what, if any, fertilizer is needed in your yard.
- Select an organic or slow-release fertilizer. A slow-release fertilizer is one with at least half of the nitrogen in "water soluble" form.
- Make your lawn cheaper and easier to maintain by mowing high 3 inches is the rule! Tall
 grass promotes root growth and shades out weeds. Let grass clippings fall back on the lawn.
- Keep fertilizer applications at least 20 feet away from the edge of lakes, streams, or storm drains.

Environmentally conscious landscaping practices have the ability to not only make your home beautiful, but also protect the rivers, lakes, and streams within your local watershed. Stormwater from lawns, roofs, and driveways flow through storm drains and end up discharging into the watershed.

- Use rain barrels to collect rainwater for watering gardens to reduce stormwater peak flow runoff.
- Use Earth-Friendly fertilizers which contain a reduced the amount of stormwater pollutants.
- Install a rain garden with native wildflowers to capture stormwater runoff.

Spotted Lanternfly Found in Oakland County

Spotted lanternfly is an invasive plant hopper native to eastern Asia. First found in the United States in 2014 in southeastern Pennsylvania, spotted lanternfly has spread rapidly through the eastern states. Confirmed observations of spotted lanternfly have since been recorded in Connecticut, Delaware, Indiana, Maryland, Massachusetts, New Jersey, New York, North Carolina, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Virginia, West Virginia, and now Michigan.


"MDARD and MDNR are working with the United States Department of Agriculture to define the extent of the infestation," said Mike Philip, MDARD's Pesticide and Plant Pest Management Division Director. "Although we can't pinpoint exactly how it got here, it likely hitchhiked on nursery stock brought in from an infested state and has possibly been here for several months. We are in the assessment stage of response, but it is important to note that typical pest management techniques have not proven effective for eliminating the pest in other states."

Spotted lanternfly moves easily on firewood, tires, campers, vehicles and more. Prevention and early detection are vital to limiting the spread of spotted lanternfly. If you find a spotted lanternfly egg mass, nymph or adult, take one or more photos, make note of the date, time and location of the sighting, and report it online to the DNR's website Eyes in the Field page for spotted lanternfly. Photos are necessary to verify a report and to aid in identification.

Spotted lanternfly prefers to feed on the invasive tree-of-heaven (Ailanthus altissima), but also feeds on a wide range of plants including grapes, and trees such as black walnut, river birch, willow, sumac, and red maple. When feeding, spotted lanternfly produces a sticky liquid, honeydew, that can collect on the ground or surrounding vegetation. This results in the growth of sooty mold, which can discolor and kill plants. What can you do?

- **Check Your Vehicle**: Before leaving a parking lot or work site, inspect vehicles for spotted lanternfly eggs or insects. Check doors, sides, bumpers, wheel wells, grills, and roofs. If found, destroy any eggs or insects you find.
- **Park with Windows Closed**: The spotted lanternfly and its nymphs can enter vehicles unsuspectedly. When parked, make sure to keep windows closed.
- **Remove and Destroy Pests**: Crush nymphs and adult insects. Scrape egg masses into a plastic bag containing hand sanitizer or rubbing alcohol to kill them.
- **Remove Host Trees**: Spotted lanternflies prefer the ailanthus tree, also known as "tree of heaven." Try to remove trees from properties to avoid attracting spotted lanternfly.
- **Report Sightings**: Send in required photos to Eyes in the Field. Photos are necessary to verify a report and to aid in identification.
