Minutes of the Regular Meeting of the Lincoln County Commission held at 8:30 AM on August 20, 2019 in the County Commission Chambers, Lincoln County Courthouse, in Carrizozo, New Mexico.

1. Call to Order

8. Forest, Land & Natural Resources Matters:

a. Smokey Bear Ranger District Cibola National Forest

Jodie Canfield, District Ranger reported low fire danger and no fire restrictions. Ranger Canfield reported a few lightening caused smokes occurred in the Capitans. Ranger Canfield stated there was currently no movement on the fuel reduction and watershed improvement projects funded under new Forest and Watershed Restoration Act. Ranger Canfield stated she attended a presentation by New Mexico State University on one-seed junipers and research on how they spread.

Ranger Canfield stated they celebrated Smokey's 75th Birthday on August 10, 2019. Ranger Canfield stated the District would start their biological assessment for Mexican Spotted Owls with tentative plans to open South Forth Campground in May 2020. Ranger Canfield reported the Eco Servants were installing new trail signs on Cedar Creek and Perk Trails. Ranger Canfield stated plans to conduct an engineering analysis for stream crossing on Cedar Creek

b. Cibola National Forest

Dierdre Tarr, District Manager of the NRCS Mountainair District reported on the Cibola Draft Plan noting the 90 day comment period was set for August 9, 2019 to November 7, 2019. Ms. Tarr stated a meeting was held? with a committee to set up a 501 C-3 for the Counties of Lincoln, Guadalupe, and Torrance in conjunction with the Corona Wind and Western Spirit Projects. Ms. Tarr stated their office was working with the New Mexico State Land Office, New Mexico State Forestry and Pattern Energy to agree upon Best Management Practices for construction areas. Ms. Tarr stated the Claunch-Pinto Soil and Water Conservation District was awarded \$550,000 in funding from NM State Forestry and approximately \$200,000 was contracted for a NM state land project.

c. Extension Services

Melanie Gutierrez, Program Director reported the office hired Melody Gaines full time. Ms. Gutierrez informed the State Fair was a success with the highest number of local animals, a total of 62, eligible for the sale.

Ms. Gutierrez informed of plans next week to partner with the Otero Extension Office to conduct a large animal training. Ms. Gutierrez stated the office would have a booth at the State Fair this year with the theme of "Harvest the Memories".

d. South Central Mountain RC & D

Rick Merrick, Community Forester reported the 2019 Cost Share Program had paid out \$115, 219 with a starting balance of \$225,000. Mr. Merrick informed the Fire Wise program was looking at a five mile draft plan assessment around the Nogal Canyon area.

e. Upper Hondo Soil & Water Conservation District

Ms. Taylor informed a representative from the District was unable to attend.

9:30 A.M.: PUBLIC COMMENT AND OTHER BUSINESS FROM COUNTY OFFICIALS (Items are for discussion only – no action will be taken)

Robert Shepperd, Sheriff recognized Russ Wehnau for responding while off-duty to a call for a man who was injured and bleeding profusely from the leg. Sheriff Shepperd stated Mr. Wehnau responded within minutes to the scene in Carrizozo and applied a fast clotting bandage and tourniquet, actions later credited with saving the life of Neil McCombs. Sheriff Shepperd presented Mr. Wehnau with a lifesaving award.

Nell McCombs stated when lightening started his horse went back and punched a two inch hole into his inner thigh. Mr. McCombs stated he was very grateful to the first responders.

Commissioner Stewart reported he attended a routine teleconference on August 6, 2019 for the Joint Land Use Study Group and the next meeting was scheduled for October, 2019

Commissioner Willard informed he met with some of the Fair Board members to discuss improvements on the fairgrounds.

Commissioner Draper attended the New Mexico Counties Economic Development Committee meeting. Commissioner Draper reported there were interesting presentations concerning workforce, broadband, and tourism. Commissioner Draper stated he had been speaking to Dr. Carsten from ENMU-Ruidoso about the importance of trade schooling.

Commissioner Draper stated he also attended a meeting at the racetrack on preventative measures concerning illegal medical enhancement drugs found at the racetrack this year.

Commissioner Draper stated today he was honored to give the welcoming address for the Treasurer's Affiliate hosted by the Lincoln and Torrance County Treasurers.

Commissioner Draper informed the 2019 Regional Housing Fair was scheduled for September 7, 2019at the Ruidoso Convention Center.

Whitney Whittaker, Clerk informed Candidate filing day for the 2019 Local Election was August 27, 2019 during the hours of 9:00 AM to 5:00 PM.

Walter Hill, Assessor reported his office would schedule protest hearings from September 10, 2019 to September 12, 2019. Mr. Hill reported his office currently has twelve petitions submitted. Mr. Hill stated he was looking at hosting an Assessor's Affiliate meeting in Lincoln County to discuss the hot topic of nightly rentals.

Mr. Hill recognized his Chief Deputy Lee Roy Zamora, and Raymond Monrreal for completing mandatory classwork. Mr. Hill recognized Bonifacio Zamora for attending and passing his final course to become a certified appraiser.

Chair Stone reported he attended the 2019 Lincoln County Fair. Chair Stone stated the number of in-house exhibits were down, and expressed hopes the participation factor becomes better in the upcoming years. Chair Stone further stated the Fairgrounds makes for a good investment with proper improvements implemented.

Chair Stone informed since Suzanne Dennehy, CNP took over practice in Capitan, and the clinic was now open five days a week and there has seen a budget improvement.

f. Land and Natural resource Advisory Committee

Robert Barber, Chair of LANRAC informed the final draft of the Cibola National Forest Draft Land Management Plan was online and the 90 day comment period started August 9, 2019.

Mr. Barber stated the committee submitted comments towards the Community Wildfire Protection Plan concerning the analysis of inventory.

13. 9:30 A.M.: PUBLIC COMMENT AND OTHER BUSINESS FROM COUNTY OFFICIALS (Items are for discussion only – no action will be taken)

Chair Stone informed Dr. Dale Goad, DDS was retiring after 41 years with the Carrizozo Health Center. Chair Stone stated the Carrizozo Health Center planned to celebrate his retirement and had invited all his patients and friends to a celebration on August 14, 2019 at the Carrizozo Women's Club.

9. Approval of 2019 Lincoln County CWPP Agreement

Ms. Taylor informed the 2019 Lincoln County Community Wildfire Protection Plan, provided to Commissioners under separate cover, was prepared by the South Central Mountain Resource, Conservation and Development Council in cooperation with Lincoln County, The Greater Ruidoso Wildland Urban Interface Working Group; ENMRD-NM; State Forestry Division; Smokey Bear Ranger District; the Village of Ruidoso; Village of Capitan; Little Bear Forest Reform Coalition; New Mexico State Land Office; Bureau of Land Management; and the Bureau of Indian Affairs.

Chair Stone questioned if a particular escape route mentioned in the CWP Plan was actually a County maintained road.

There was a general discussion about the limited slash pick up service in the area and its correlation with the protection plan.

Motion: Approve the Lincoln County Community Wildfire Protection Plan with a note the reference to an escape route near Arabela is not an actual County maintained road: Approve, Moved by Commissioner Stewart, Seconded by Commissioner Draper.

There was a lengthy discussion about an alternative escape route through private land.

Vote: Motion carried by unanimous vote (summary: Yes = 5).

Yes: Chair Stone, Commissioner Stewart, Commissioner Allen, Commissioner Draper, Commissioner Willard.

10. Approval of Assessor Request to Purchase Vehicles

Ms. Taylor reminded during the budget process for Fiscal Year 19/20, the Assessor's request for the purchase of new vehicles was not captured. Ms. Taylor stated the final budget approved by the Commission in July did, for the first time, include the Assessors' request to purchase vehicles for \$60,000 budgeted from the Reappraisal Value Property Fund. Ms. Taylor stated however it was not on the Optional County Request Form, so it was not brought to the Commission's attention for specific approval.

Motion: Approve Assessor Hill's request to purchase three vehicles from the Reappraisal Property Valuation Fund and to transfer the replaced vehicles to the Senior Center Operations, **Action**: Approve, **Moved by** Commissioner Stewart, **Seconded by** Commissioner Allen.

Vote: Motion carried by unanimous vote (summary: Yes = 5).

Yes: Chair Stone, Commissioner Stewart, Commissioner Allen, Commissioner Draper, Commissioner Willard.

Approval of FY 19/20 Collective Bargaining Agreement Between the County of Lincoln and the Lincoln County Deputy Sheriffs' Association

Ms. Taylor stated the President of the Deputy Sheriff's Collective Bargaining Unit, Kirk Wilson and Lincoln County agreed to one change in the Section 15 of the Agreement regarding hours of work and overtime. Ms. Taylor stated the agreement had no other changes except the dates of approval and termination date.

Commissioner Stewart informed this agreement contained what was known as an "Evergreen Clause" which allows for the agreement to continue for a defined period if the existing agreement is not renegotiated or properly cancelled within a specified time

Motion: Approve the Collective Bargaining Unit Agreement including the stipulations of the Evergreen Clause should the County approve a raise for all employees, **Action:** Approve, **Moved by** Commissioner Stewart, **Seconded by** Commissioner Allen.

Vote: Motion carried by unanimous vote (summary: Yes = 5).

Yes: Chair Stone, Commissioner Stewart, Commissioner Allen, Commissioner Draper, Commissioner Willard.

12. Approval of Municipal Advisory Agreement with RBC Capital Markets

Ms. Taylor stated the Commission entered into an agreement with Erik Harrigan of RBC Capital Markets in May of 2015 during the early stages of considering financing options for renovating the old hospital or building a replacement. Ms. Taylor stated Mr. Harrigan with RBC Capital Markets has been a critical resource to the County through not only the General Obligation Bond process; but also providing guidance on the Industrial Revenue Bond process for Lincoln County to enter into agreements with wind energy companies.

Motion: Approve RBC Capital Market's agreement to continue to serve as the County's Municipal Advisor, Action: Approve, Moved by Commissioner Stewart, Seconded by Commissioner Allen.

Commissioner Willard questioned the fee schedule proposed in the RCB Capital Market's Agreement as opposed to the agreement with Pattern Energy.

Alan Morel, County Attorney stated the fee schedule listed in the RBC agreement lists fees which RBC could charge but reminded a separate agreement with Pattern Energy would cover the costs.

General Discussion on the terms of the separate agreements with Pattern Energy and RBC Capital Market Agreement.

Commissioner Stewart withdrew his original motion and Commission Allen withdrew her second.

Motion: Table the agreement with RBC Capital Market, Action: Approve, Moved by Commissioner Draper, Seconded by Commissioner Allen.

Vote: Motion carried by unanimous vote (summary: Yes = 5).

Chair Stone recessed the Regular meeting at 10:30 AM and reconvened at 10:39 AM.

 Approval of Lease and Management Agreement with the Lincoln County Fair Association for the Lincoln County Fairgrounds

Ms. Taylor stated the County and the Lincoln County Fair Association have been parties to a Lease and Management Agreement for the Lincoln County Fairgrounds located in Capitan since 1997.

Ms. Taylor stated routinely Section 13 of the Lease and Management Agreement was subject to change if the County Commission determines to modify the sum of the annual payment to the Fair Association for maintaining and operating the Fairgrounds.

Motion: Approve the Lease and Management Agreement between the Lincoln County Fair Association and the County of Lincoln for the Lincoln County Fairgrounds, Action: Approve, Moved by Commissioner Stewart, Seconded by Commissioner Allen.

Vote: Motion carried by unanimous vote (summary: Yes = 5).

15. Manager's Report

1. Hats Off to Road Superintendent Jeff Honeycutt and Director of Planning & Project Management Samantha Mendez for responding for a "Call for Road Projects" by the NMDOT, as part of an overall proposal to address economic development needs related to roads. The Manager provided a list of roads submitted for consideration and a chart of awarded projects. The County was granted \$1,791,225 by the New Mexico Transportation STC, with a match requirement of \$94,275, resulting in the total project cost of \$1,885,500. Total STC funds awarded were \$49,320,405. Thanks also to Wilson & Co, Inc., Engineers & Architects, for assisting the County with this effort.

- 2. County Staff Changes. We are limping along with the recent loss of two key members of the Manager's team. Finance Director Punkin Schlarb retired on August 1st, and Director of Planning & Project Management Samantha Mendez has accepted the position of Community Development Director for the Village of Ruidoso, effective immediately. Both will be sorely missed. The positions will be filled as soon as possible, with the position vacancies already being advertised.
- 3. NM Counties Facility Inspection was conducted by James Chavez of the NMAC Loss Prevention Department on August 1, 2019. The Manager provided a copy of Mr. Chavez's findings. In addition to providing photographs of identified safety hazards Mr. Chavez also noted: (1) The County's Safety Policy was last revised in 2003 and should be reviewed and revised to meet the needs of the County, and to comply with any standards changes; and (2) County employees should be trained on the newly approved Emergency Action Plan. The County is charged with notifying Loss Prevention staff within 30 days of all corrective actions taken on the matter. Joe Kenmore, Emergency Services Director, will take the lead on this process.
- 4. Annual Budget Conference. The Local Government Division Annual Budget Conference is scheduled for November 13 15. This is a critical conference and training which the County's key budget personnel attend every year. It will be especially critical this year, with a new Finance Director on board.
- Department of Human Services 2018 Safety Net Care Pool Annual Report. The Manager provided a copy of the 2018 Safety Net Care Pool (SNCP) Annual Report, providing information on a total state basis, as well as showing LCMC's receipt of \$1,811,488 for calendar year 2018.
- 6. Schedule of FY 2020 Fire Protection Fund Distribution to Lincoln County Fire Departments. The Manager provided a copy of the Public Regulation Commission and State Fire Marshal Division's determined levels of the quarterly distribution dates for the Fire Protection Fund FY 2020. The August 1st total funds allotted to all County fire departments was \$382,153.60or 40% of the total. Three equal payments in the amount of \$191,076.80 are to be made in November, February and May.
- 7. Z-Trans is required to submit annual Letters of Financial Commitment to the Federal Transit Administrator no later than August 23rd: The Manager provided copy of the informational letter from Zia Therapy Center, Operator of Z-Trans, and the template letter for them to send to the Federal Transit Administration. The County's agreement for this service terminates September 30th, and the renewal of the contract will be brought to the Commission for consideration in the September Commission meeting. If the Commission opted to terminate participation in the program, the attached letter sent to the Federal Transit Administration would become null and void.
- 8. Department of Air Force Request for Comments. The Manager provided copy of a letter describing the US Air Force and Headquarters Air Combat Command's proposal to provide Combat Air Forces contract adversary air (ADAIR) support at Holloman Air Force Base, to address shortfalls in combat readiness. The plan is to locate an estimated 12 contractor aircraft at HAFB to perform an estimated 3,200 ADAIR flights. No airspace modifications would be required. Written comments are requested, and are required by September 12th.
- 9. New Mexico Youth Conservation Corps Work Plan. Under the guidance of Stephen Carter, the NM Youth Conservation Corps will: 1) remove noxious weeks along county owned roadways as part of a plan to control noxious weeds in Lincoln County; 2) build sandbags for flooding resulting from wildfires; and 3) assist in emergency services in natural disasters.
- 10. Hope Harbor Transitional Home Arts and Crafts Show is scheduled for September 28 and 29 at Wingfield Park in Ruidoso. They are working hard to gain community support for this and other future fund raising events which are targeted to assist with the construction and operation of Hope Harbor Transitional Home. Organizers have requested permission from the County to place signage for this event in the County rights-of-way of its roads.
- 11. Local Property Schedule Survey 2019 Multi-Line Values Collection. County Assets and Information Clerk, Toni Foligno, conducted the survey and input required annually. This tool is to identify vehicles and buildings, with contents, that the County requires to be insured by NMC Multilline Insurance. This year, it mostly consisted of additions due to the new EMC building, fire stations, communications towers, etc. Next year will add the new hospital. Insurance costs may be increasing.

12. Department Head Updates:

Jeff Honeycutt, Road SuperIntendent informed he was working with the Smokey Bear Ranger District about a possible land swap for a road yard. Mr. Honeycutt stated they will do a traffic analysis on Musketball and Alpine Village roads. Mr. Honeycutt stated his department just hired two new employees.

Samantha Mendez, Planning and Project Management stated she officially started with the Village of Ruidoso yesterday and she had enjoyed working for the County.

Joe Kenmore, Office of Emergency Services Director reported a small fire and a plane crash in Ruidoso, with no fatalities reported. Mr. Kenmore stated they are going to evaluate ISO ratings for fire stations in Arabella, Hondo, and Glencoe.

Renee Montes, Senior Services Director reported the Senior Centers ICIP was due September 20, 2019.

Billie Jo Guevara, Human Resources Director stated the Road Department had two positions available, Sheriff has one dispatcher position available, and Senior Services had one position open for Driver/cook Aide. Ms. Guevara reported the Finance Director position was open until August 26, 2019 and the Planning Director position had a total of 3 applicants.

17. Preliminary Approval of FY 2021-2025 Infrastructure Capital Improvement Plan (ICIP) for Lincoln County Zia Senior Centers

Ms. Taylor informed the Senior Center Infrastructure Capital Improvement Plan (ICIP) is due to Local government Division on September 20, 2019. Ms. Taylor stated the Senior Center Director Renee Montes was required to enter each of the five centers separately with each carrying its own prioritization.

Renee Montes, Senior Center Director presented the capital outlay requests for the senior centers for years 2021 to 2025.

Motion: Approve the preliminary Infrastructure Capital Improvement Plan for Lincoln County Zia Senior Centers, Action: Approve, Moved by Commissioner Stewart, Seconded by Commissioner Allen.

Vote: Motion carried by unanimous vote (summary: Yes = 5).

Yes: Chair Stone, Commissioner Stewart, Commissioner Allen, Commissioner Draper, Commissioner Willard.

Chair Stone Recessed the Regular Meeting at 12:02 PM and reconvened at 1:00 PM.

 1:00 P.M.: Continuance of Public Hearing to consider the Revenue Bond Ordinance for Wind Farm (Mesa Canyons IRB Project) (Motion to continue Public Hearing required)

Motion: Continue the public hearing to consider the Revenue Bond Ordinance indefinitely, Action: Approve, Moved by Commissioner Stewart, Seconded by Commissioner Allen.

20. Replacement Hospital Update

Mike McDonald, Project Manager for Jaynes Corporation stated they are at the peak of construction with 120-130 workers on site. Mr. McDonald stated the exterior wall is progressing nicely and should be sealed up before winter. Mr. McDonald stated the roof was already sealed up.

Mr. McDonald reported on some milestones upcoming next month; completion of the drywall on the first floor; room pressure testing in operating rooms and pharmacy compounding areas; permanent power to the hospital; and install ceiling in the administration area.

Mr. McDonald sated they have worked with the Village of Ruidoso and New Mexico Department of Transportation to incorporate the man hole needed to finish up the sewer lines.

Expenditure Summary

Ms. Taylor stated the Replacement Hospital Expenditure Report, to date, illustrated \$12,360,950 has been spent leaving a line item balance of \$8,220,527. Ms. Taylor stated currently under review was Jaynes' July Pay Application No. 15 in the amount of \$1,592,374, which would reduce the remaining balance to \$6,628,153.

Contingency

Ms. Taylor stated the County Attorney and the Owner's Representative met with Jaynes and Dekker/Perich/Sabatini in Albuquerque on August 6, 2019 to discuss the status of the current change orders; the potential of additional, sizable change orders; and the need for proper review and signatures.

Approval of the Infrastructure Capital Improvement Plan (ICIP) by Resolution 2019-6

Ms. Taylor stated the Lincoln County Infrastructure Capital Improvement Plan is due to Local Government Division on September 6, 2019.

There was a lengthy discussion on projects on the current ICIP and needed additions. Ranking of projects was requested as follows:

- 1. New Hospital construction
- 2. Fairground improvements
- 3. Courthouse flood control
- 4. ADA restrooms in the Lincoln County Courthouse

Motion: Approve preliminary ICIP, Action: Approve, Moved by Commissioner Draper, Seconded by Commissioner Stewart.

18. Approval of Lincoln County 150th Birthday Proclamation

Ms. Taylor presented the Proclamation recognizing and honoring the 150th Birth year of Lincoln County, New Mexico. Ms. Taylor stated this proclamation portrays the rich history built over the past 150 years and prior; which includes both the municipalities and unincorporated areas.

Commissioner Allen and Commission Willard read the Proclamation into the record.

Solid Waste Lien filed on December 16, 2016 for non-payment of solid waste services and potential ad valorem taxes due and owing. The Foreclosure Sale took place on November 15, 2018 @ 10:00 a.m. at the front steps of the 12th Judicial District Courthouse in Carrizozo.

 Rancho Ruidoso Valley Estates Homeowner's Association v. Diane K. Medcalf, Ploneer Bank, FSB, and the County of Lincoln, NM D-1226-CV-2017-00242 Complaint filed by RRVEHA September 12, 2017 for Foreclosure of the Homeowner's Association Assessment Lien. On January 25, 2019, Judge Blankinship entered a Judgment by Default for Foreclosure.

Board of County Commissioners of Lincoln County v. Roger Romero D-1226-CV-2018-00055 Complaint for Foreclosure. Complaint was filed February 20, 2018. Defendant Roger Romero filed an Answer to the Complaint asserting a Counterclaim to be filed in the U.S. District Court on April 2, 2018. A Judicial Inquiry Hearing took place September 4, 2018.

 Roger Romero v. State of New Mexico – D-1226-CV-2018-00113 (Underlying Cases are: Board of County Commissioners of Lincoln County v. Roger Romero, D-1226-CV-2018-00055, and State of N.M. v. Roger Romero M-30-MR-2016-00142)

A Petition for Writ of Habeas Corpus was filed requesting that the Judgment & Sentence entered by Judge Vega in Cause No. M-30-MR-2016-00142 be vacated and set aside.
