Minutes of the Regular Meeting of the Lincoln County Commission held at 8:30 AM on December, 17, 2019 in the County Commission Chambers, Lincoln County Courthouse, in Carrizozo, New Mexico.

8. Forest, Land & Natural Resources Matters:

a. Smokey Bear Ranger District

Jodie Canfield, District Ranger for the Smokey Bear Ranger District reported low fire danger and no fire restrictions; but reported the district have been burning piles on Gavilan Ridge this week. Ranger Canfield stated some forestry projects have been cleared to work including a commercial firewood project on Smokey Bear and powerline clearing on the Sacramento.

Ranger Canfield stated the District is looking for approval from the County Commission to enter into an agreement with the County Road Department to develop a contract for the paving work in South Forth Campground. Ranger Canfield stated the Forest Service has \$30,000 to put into the agreement and they are still looking at a mid-May 2020 for opening.

Ranger Canfield informed the work on the 107 re-route will be halted until the spring. Ranger Canfield stated Ski Apache is now open on weekends and will open full time on December 19, 2019.

Chair Stone questioned if the County had an updated MOU with Smokey Bear.

Jeff Honeycutt, Road Superintendent stated the County currently does not have an updated MOU and would need one in order to move forward with any partnership.

b. Extension Services

Melody Gaines, Family and Consumer Science/4H agent for the Extension Services informed they hosted two workshops; NM flavor and NM round up with around 32 kids participating. Ms. Gaines stated the department is working on many projects that include getting ready for State 4H and a record book exchange.

Ms. Gaines stated the department will attend the upcoming conference in Santa Fe in January.

c. South Central Mountain RC & D

Ms. Taylor informed Rick Merrick, Community Forester was unavailable to attend this month.

d. Upper Hondo Soil & Water Conservation District

Ms. Taylor informed Judy Bock, Program Coordinator was unavailable to attend this month but asked if Lincoln County could write a letter of support for the Upper Hondo Application for a weed management grant from New Mexico Energy, Minerals and Natural Resources Department (EMNRD).

e. LANRAC

Robert Barber Chair discussed comments for the Mountainair Ranger Districts Proposed Action on the Corona Fuels Reduction and Forest Restoration plan. Mr. Barber stated the land is in much need of treatment to help support and defend the water supply the committee recommends the Commissions support on the proposed activities with the following two comments.

 With the new Cibola National Forest Management Plan in the final steps of being formalized and released, the desire conditions for the entire project are should promote the principals and strategies outlined in the new management plan; not the old 1996 version. The District should consider using some slash for erosion control/gully stop.

Motion: Approve the recommendation of Robert Barber, LANRAC Chair to support the proposed action including the two comments, Action: Approve, Moved by Commissioner Stewart, Seconded by Commissioner Allen.

 Consideration and Approval to Enter Into CES Contract for Design of Ft. Stanton Road Project – Funded by Local Government Transportation Project Fund.

Ms. Taylor reminded on April 30, 2019 NMDOT Cabinet Secretary issued a Call for Projects to local and tribal governments who are eligible to apply for stated funded grants. Ms. Taylor stated eligible projects included planning, design construction for highways, streets, roadways, crossing, bridges, etc. Ms. Taylor informed for qualified projects, funding was to be available for 75%-95% of the project with the local or tribal government making up the match.

Ms. Taylor stated in May 2019 long term County partner Daniel Aguirre Senior vice President of Wilson and Company Architects made the County aware of the HB 694 initiative, which created the LCTPF. Ms. Taylor stated there was a very short timeframe in which to respond, Wilson and Company worked closely with Road Superintendent Honeycutt and Planning Director at the time Samantha Mendez to gather mapping data, determine the scope of work for each of the four proposed project and prioritize the need to the County.

Ms. Taylor informed on October, 2019 the County received notification that Fort Stanton Road Project had been approved for this funding, and the Commission approved the Grand Agreement and required Resolution.

Ms. Taylor stated the County has received a proposed Task Order for Engineering Design for Fort Stanton Road from Highway 48 to Highway 220. Ms. Taylor informed the funding source for these Engineering Design services in the amount of \$191,965 plus NMGRT, is the LGTPF. Road Superintendent and manager recommend forgoing the RFP process for these Engineering Design Services and utilizing the CES process, which will add 1.25% to the closet of the job.

Commissioner Stewart questioned the total amount awarded.

Jeff Honeycutt, Road Superintendent stated the amount awarded was 1.885 million with the County match.

Commissioner Stewart raised the concern of the number of budget adjustments for this fiscal year. Commissioner Stewart requested with each adjustment, especially one this large, to have a printout with the highlighted amount within the first four pages of the annual budget recap and revenues report.

12. Manager's Report

1. Introduction of Director of Planning & Project Management, Glenda Allen. Thank you and congratulations to Glenda Allen for applying, interviewing for and being offered the important, strategic position of Director of Planning and Project Management for Lincoln County. Ms. Allen brings with her a wealth of experience from analyzing and engineering road and other capital projects, to extensive grant management to many other activities for which she has developed a

strong background. Welcome Glenda Allen!

2. 2020 Census Outreach. During its November 19th meeting, the Commission directed the development of a Third Party Contract for the County's Census Outreach activities that would be acceptable to the State. Mr. Morel worked with the Census Outreach Bureau to modify its proposed form of contract in a manner satisfactory to both State and the County. See Exhibit 1 for fully executed Intergovernmental Grant Agreement; specifically Page 9, Paragraph Q that relieves the County of the obligation to perform the terms and conditions of the Intergovernmental Grant Agreement, should the County assign the responsibility to perform the terms and conditions identified in the Intergovernmental Grant Agreement to a third party.

Craig Westbrook was identified by both the County and the Census Bureau as a qualified third party contractor who would perform these required terms and conditions.

- 3. Exit Interview for FY 18-19 Audit. Kubiak, Melton & Associates ("KMA") conducted an Exit Interview on Tuesday, November 27th. Due to weather concerns, KMA conducted the interview via teleconference. The Audit was attended by Commissioner Stewart, Nita Taylor, Beverly Calaway, Sherri Huddleston, Billie Jo Guevara and Rhonda Edwards. The resulting Audit was 'timely filed with the Office of the State Auditor on Monday, December 2nd. The final Audit Report to the full Commission is anticipated to be scheduled for the February 18th Commission Meeting.
- 4. NACo Action Alert has been issued requesting Counties across the land to support two pieces of legislation related to two important programs that ensure public lands counties can meet their governing missions and provide essential services: Senate Bill 430 would extend the authorization of Secure Rural Schools (SRS) for an additional two years; and Senate Bill 2108, the Small County Payments In Lieu of Taxes (PILT) Parity Act, which would create new monetary and population caps under the PILT program for counties under 5,000 in population.

5. NM Counties – 33 Strong Annual Legislative Conference. NMC is hosting its Annual Legislative Conference from Monday, January 20th through Thursday, January 23rd. See Exhibit 4 for the calendar of events. A number of elected officials and employees also take advantage of key NM EDGE Courses offered at that time. NMC's County Lobbyist Meeting, which I will be

attending, is scheduled for Friday morning, January 24th.

6. DFA Capital Outlay Dashboard is a new online tool that allows the public, local governments and state policymakers to track and analyze local infrastructure projects. Find detailed information on capital appropriations, track project expenditures and issued grant agreements, and download customized data that's important to your entity. The user controls the level of detail viewed in this interactive dashboard. Dashboard can be accessed at www.nmdfa.state.nm.us/dfa-dashboards.aspx, The information can be displayed by total state; individual County (which provides information for each local government or entity in the County receiving Capital Outlay Funding).

7. County Owned Property – Use of Multiple Owner Name / Entity. Assessor and Inventory Assets Clerk have found that County has taken title under 12 different owner names for County-owned property. See Exhibit 7 for a list of the owner names, followed by the total number of properties (in parentheses) for each name. Assessor Hill and Inventory Assets Clerk, Toni Foligno, are seeking information as to whether, for uniformity, all properties should be under one

name.

Brief discussion on contacting Otero and getting joint letter started on the condition on Highway 54 south towards Alamogordo.

Department Head Updates

Joe Kenmore, Office of Emergency Services Director stated NM Highway 54 South and NM 380 are tough roads to travel especially with the big equipment used by the department. Mr. Kenmore stated he attend a communications meeting regarding the megawatts being brought into New Mexico.

Mr. Kenmore stated they received a Hubbard grant in the amount of \$4,000. Mr. Kenmore informed a 3-5 year plan is in place to report the amount of fatalities among firefighters and volunteers and responds to calls.

Renee Montes, Senior Center Program Director informed the department's target budget is right on track. Ms. Montes stated they received 200 boxes from Santa Helpers in which they dispersed to the seniors in the area.

Ms. Montes stated the Ruidoso Middle created Christmas card for the seniors.

9:30 A.M.: PUBLIC COMMENT AND OTHER BUSINESS FROM COUNTY OFFICIALS (Items are for discussion only – no action will be taken)

Commissioner Stewart reported he continues to attend the Joint Land Use Study Group quarterly meetings and the current studies have found no impact to the County of Lincoln.

Commissioner Allen informed she continues to attend the Greentree meetings. Commissioner Allen stated as being a member of the Juvenile Justice board heard an informative presentation by the Juvenile Detention Alternatives. Commissioner Allen stated it was a great program with lots of information.

Commissioner Willard reported he attend The Southeast Regional Transportation Planning Organization (SERTPO) meeting in Roswell yesterday December 16, 2019.

Commissioner Draper stated he attend the Red Cross Training at the Convention Center on December 3, 2019. Commissioner Draper commended Robert Barber on his expertise on the subject.

Commissioner Draper stated he recently watch a video by Tim Parker, NM DOT District 2 on the subject of human trafficking and the amount of children involved.

Beverly Calaway, Treasurer expressed appreciation for the excellent performance of her staff in the collection of property taxes. Ms. Calaway reported a total collection \$ 20 million. Ms. Calaway stated a payment of \$500,000 was distributed to the debt service bond.

Ms. Calaway applauded Sherrie Huddleston, Chief Deputy Treasurer on working on received the \$116,285 from Homeland security for the Little Bear Fire.

Walter Hill, Assessor announced the Aerial Pictometry flyover was 70% complete. Mr. Hill stated they would have an in-office training on the program tomorrow December 18, 2019.

Under Sheriff Wood expressed his concern of the safety of Ski Run road and recommended the County get some engineering ideas. Under Sheriff Wood stated he attend the CYFD open house December 16, 2019.

Kathleen Phillips-Hellman expressed concern that no service was given at Fort Stanton this year.

Jeff Bleau, resident of Lincoln County wanted to applaud Clara Farah with Creative Aging and the Santa Helpers for their hard work with the Christmas boxes.

12. Managers' Report Continued.

Jeff Honeycutt, Road Superintendent informed the department is currently hauling and placing the millings acquired from the State. Mr. Honeycutt reported they have hauled 1500 cubic yards to mile marker 300. Mr. Honeycutt stated they have spent approximately \$80,000 on trucking for hauling these millings.

Billie-Jo Guevara, Human Resources/ Finance Director informed on open positions including an Operator 2 position; two Sheriff's Deputies; and one dispatch position.

Glenda Allen Director of Planning and Project Management stated her office is currently undergoing a review of current plats and surveys maintained by the planning office. Ms. Allen stated she has been working with the Village of Ruidoso regarding short term rentals.

Chair Stone recessed the regular meeting at 10:00 AM and convened the regular meeting at 10:15 AM.

13. Lincoln County Detention Center

a. Lincoln County Detention Center Restricted Housing Quarterly Report As Required by House Bill 364 and Section 33-16-1 through 33-16-7 NMSA 1978 cited as the "Restricted Housing Act"

Ms. Taylor informed New Mexico Counties Attorney Grace Phillips clarified the requirements of the Restrictive Confinement Act. Ms. Taylor stated it requires detention facilities to produce a quarterly report regarding every individual housed in restrictive confinement more than twenty-two (22) hours in a day per the prior three months. Ms. Taylor stated the report must be submitted to the County Commission and a copy emailed to the Legislative Council Service Library.

Ms. Taylor stated the previous Warden, Warden Anderson with LaSalle, was aware of this requirement and did provide a copy to the county and did email the report to the legislative library. Ms. Taylor stated Warden Morales with Correctional Solutions Group, LLC is aware of this requirement and will be compliant.

b. Consideration and Approval to Enter Into CES Contract for Design and Construction of Expansion of Lincoln County Detention Center -- Funded by NM Capital Appropriation Awards

Ms. Taylor informed the County had been granted two New Mexico Capital Appropriations Grants to "plan, design, construct and furnish an expansion to the detention center in Carrizozo in Lincoln County." Ms. Taylor stated the initial grant for \$156,734 was issued in 2014 and reauthorized in 2018. Ms. Taylor informed the reversion date is June 30, 2020. Ms. Taylor stated the County received a second grant this year in the amount of \$50,000.

Ms. Taylor stated the County have been working with SDV Construction for several years in finalizing the design of an expanded Sally Port and separate expansion for armory and munitions.

Carlos Morales, Warden stated the current sally port does not fit daily operations with only one way in and out of the gate. Warden Morales stated the current armory room is housed in the electrical room which poses a safety concern.

Warden Morales stated operations of the Lincoln County Detention Center are going well and have worked hard to fully staff the facility; identify and repair building deficiencies; and to bring their own corporate processes, policies and guidelines to the facility.

There was a general discussion on various improvements needed in the Detention center.

Motion: Authorize the Manager to enter into the CES contract with SDV Construction by using the initial grant of \$156,734 and the grant received this year in the amount of \$50,000. , **Action:** Approve, **Moved by** Commissioner Stewart, **Seconded by** Commissioner Allen.

Attorney Morel recommend approval of Resolution 2019-25; A Resolution relating to the proposed industrial revenue bonds titled Lincoln County. Attorney Morel stated Duran Mesa LLC Project through Pattern energy has made a proposal to the County for acquisition by the County form the Company of a lease-hold interest in land an equipment located in the County which will constitute an authorized project under the Act with up to 1,000 megawatts of generating capacity to be developed in one or more phases.

Attorney Morel stated as required by the Inducement Resolution, the Company must make payment in lieu of taxes (PILT) based on the megawatt nameplate of installed electricity generating capacity of the Project, to be allocated between and among the County, the Corona Public School District and the Carrizozo Municipal School District as agreed upon.

- 1. Rancho Ruidoso Valley Estate Homeowners' Association v. Roy Padilla, et. al. D-1226-CV-2017-00195 Complaint filed by RRVEHA for foreclosure of the Homeowners' Association Assessment Lien. The County is a named Defendant due to the filing of a GSWA lien on March 22, 2006, and a L.C. Solid Waste Lien filed on December 16, 2016 for non-payment of solid waste services and potential ad valorem taxes due and owing. The Foreclosure Sale took place on November 15, 2018 @ 10:00 a.m. at the front steps of the 12th Judicial District Courthouse in Carrizozo.
- Rancho Ruidoso Valley Estates Homeowner's Association v. Diane K. Medcalf, Ploneer Bank, FSB, and the County of Lincoln, NM D-1226-CV-2017-00242 Complaint filed by RRVEHA September 12, 2017 for Foreclosure of the Homeowner's Association Assessment Lien. On January 25, 2019, Judge Blankinship entered a Judgment by Default for Foreclosure.
- 3. Board of County Commissioners of Lincoln County v. Roger Romero D-1226-CV-2018-00055 Complaint for Foreclosure. Complaint was filed February 20, 2018. Defendant Roger Romero filed an Answer to the Complaint asserting a Counterclaim to be filed in the U.S. District Court on April 2, 2018. A Judicial Inquiry Hearing took place September 4, 2018.

4. Roger Romero v. State of New Mexico – D-1226-CV-2018-00113 (Underlying Cases are: Board of County Commissioners of Lincoln County v. Roger Romero, D-1226-CV-2018-00055, and State of N.M. v. Roger Romero M-30-MR-2016-00142) A Petition for Writ of Habeas Corpus was filed requesting that the Judgment & Sentence entered by Judge Vega in Cause No. M-30-MR-2016-00142 be vacated and set aside. George Romero's Answer to Complaint and Counterclaim was filed April 30, 2018 in Cause No. D-1226-CV-2018-00055. Judge Counts is the presiding Judge. On February 26, 2019, an Order Setting Aside Conviction was entered by Judge Counts and, on March 25, 2019, a Notice of Appeal was filed with the N.M. Supreme Court. (NM Supreme Crt. Case No. S-1-SC-37602)

5. Roger Romero, et al vs. Lincoln County, et al – U.S. Dist. Court Cause No. 2:18-cv-01137-JAP-GJF A Complaint for Violation of Civil, Constitutional and Statutory Rights was filed on December 5, 2018. On December 27, 2018. A Guardian Ad Litem has been appointed to represent the Plaintiffs. On September 16, 2019, the case was dismissed and, on October 7, 2019, Plaintiffs filed their Notice of Appeal to the United States Court of Appeals for the Tenth

Circuit.

6. Brack Rains v. Lincoln County D-1226-CV-2018-00179 Complaint for Violation of New Mexico Whistleblower Protection Act filed June 6, 2018. The County was served July 10, 2018. Judge Counts is the presiding Judge. County's Answer to the Complaint and Jury Demand (12 person) was filed August 9, 2018. On September 23, 2019, Plaintiff filed his Amended Complaint and, on September 24, 2019, the case was removed to the U.S. District Court for the District of N.M., Cause No. S-1-2:19-cv-0087-GJF/GBW

7. Kane County, Utah, et al v. The United States, 17-739C and 17-1991C (Consolidated) Class Action Lawsuit to recover PILT underpayments for fiscal years 2015-2017. On August 14, 2018, Lincoln County submitted its Opt-In Notice to participate in the lawsuit. On October 16, 2019, Lincoln County received notice that it would be receiving \$46,011.00 from the Judgment

Fund.

Court Case No. 2:19-cv-00462 — Complaint for Public Nuisance, Violations of Racketeer Influenced and Corrupt Organizations Act (RICO)... filed on May 20, 2019 by Attorneys Robles, Rail & Anaya, P.C., et. al. After receiving no oppositions to the transfer of the case, on June 17, 2019, the case was transferred to the Northern District of Ohio noting that as of December 5, 2017, 1,534 cases have been transferred to Ohio for further proceedings.

10. Baltazar Romo v. Rex Beard, Cause No. D-1226-CV-2019-00144 Complaint for Negligence and Negligence Per Se was filed on May 26, 2019 and served upon Sgt. Rex Beard of the Lincoln County Sheriff's office on June 18, 2019. All Judges in the 12th Judicial District have recused themselves. On September 16, 2019, Judge James M. Hudson was assigned to

preside over the case. There is presently pending a Motion to Dismiss the Complaint.

11. Valerie Herrera v. Anthony Manfredi, Cause No. D-1226-CV-2019-00164 Complaint for Negligence and Negligence Per Se (Battery), and Excessive Force as Brought Under 42 U.S.C. § 1983 was filed on June 16, 2019 by W. Chair Stone recessed the regular meeting at 11:34 AM and reconvened at 12:57 PM.

14. 1:00 P.M.: Public Hearing To Consider An Ordinance Repealing Lincoln County Ordinance Nos. 2016-02 And 2017-07 And Enacting An Ordinance Which Regulates Acceptable And Unacceptable Waste in Lincoln County, Providing For Efficient And Sanitary Collection Of Waste, Providing For Mandatory Disposal And Assessment Of Fees, Proving A Penalty For Violation Of This Ordinance, Repealing Ordinances In Conflict; Proving For The Severability Of Parts Hereof; And Providing An Effective Date by Ordinance 2019-04

Attorney Morel stated the proposed of the Public Hearing was to consider an Ordinance that would repeal two current Ordinances 2016-02 and 2017-07 and combined them into one Ordinance. Attorney Morel pointed out some of the major changes; fees would be separate per County Resolution, deleted reference to ground water or landfill, defined the word owner, and an added appeal process.

Jeff Bleau, resident of Lincoln County was concerned with the Lincoln County Solid Waste Disposal Ordinance. Mr. Bleau questioned why homes with secondary living quarters were now being charged an additional household charge. Mr. Bleau stated Ranches of Sonterra Covenants prohibits leasing or renting of guest quarters. Mr. Bleau stated the fee is unfair, paying an extra fee associated with a casita or quest house.

Commissioner Stewart questioned the environmental gross receipt tax and if it was tied to the loan.

Attorney Morel stated when the County was a part of Greentree, the gross receipt was attached, but was his belief once the loan is paid off the gross receipts would then come back to the County.

Mr. Hill expressed concern with appeal process and having language in the Ordinance that the Assessor regulating the property. Mr. Hill stated every property will be assessed whether a garage or guest home.

Commissioner Allen questioned the appeal process and thought it might read better if it was mentioned in a different section of the Ordinance.

Mr. Hill will work with Attorney Morel to identify properties with secondary living quarters.

Chair Stone adjourned the Public Hearing and reconvened the Regular Meeting at 2:04 PM

15. Replacement Hospital Update

Mike McDonald, Project Manager with Jaynes Corporation stated they finished the first floor, installed imaging equipment, drywall finishing, painting, and mechanical systems startups.

Mr. McDonald announced the site was scheduled for a February 20, 2020 Certificate of Occupancy. Mr. McDonald stated this is a moving document and the date could change. Mr. McDonald stated construction in the pharmacy was not compliant nor did it meet the intent of the Life Safety Code. Mr. McDonald stated they looked into the issue and as it stand right now will not change the date of occupancy.

Mr. McDonald reported some of the major milestones reached in the last month include the generator start up, sidewalk installation, curb and cutter work on the South side area, and finishing drywall. Mr. McDonald informed the second air handler would be started up soon to have sufficient temperature control to get through winter.

Commissioner Willard questioned the sewer issue.

Mr. McDonald stated waiting approval from traffic control as well as a report on the depth and slope of the tie with the Village. Mr. McDonald stated they would recommend starting the construction during phase 2 which is during occupancy. Mr. McDonald stated they can run off the existing sewer system until they can figure out a plan of action.

Owner's Representative Jim Klein, stated without the data from the potholing it's hard to determine a plan of action. Mr. Klein stated they are looking for the minimal slope requirement.

Todd Oberheu, Chief Executive stated the issue with the sewer is the line running down to the river is uphill.

Mr. Oberhue stated Candice Selgado will be taking over the Carrizozo clinic for Rebecca Meunier who is leaving at the beginning of January.

Ms. Taylor stated based on the Contingency Funds spend or committed to date, the remaining balance in the \$1.7 million Fund is \$98,484.06. Ms. Taylor stated Bobby George of Dekker/Perich/Sabatini is requested a change order of the contingency fund in the amount of \$30,000 for remaining projects.
