Minutes of the Regular Meeting of the Lincoln County Commission held at 8:30 AM on February 16, 2021 in the County Commission Chambers, Lincoln County Courthouse, in Carrizozo, New Mexico.

Ira Pearson, Manager stated per statute counties may request adjustments to budgets to accommodate changes in financial operations during the fiscal year. Manager Pearson stated Commission approved adjustments must also be submitted to the Department of Finance Administration for approval.

Commissioner Willard questioned the status of the commission approved temporary hires.

Manager Pearson stated only position filled for the County of Lincoln was the cleaning/sanitizing position.

9. Forest, Land & Natural Resources Matters:

a. Smokey Bear Ranger District

Manager Pearson stated the District has not hired a new ranger but stated Karl Honkonen, acting ranger for the Smokey Bear Ranger District provided a News Release about the Forest Service and the Natural Resource Conservation Service had been awarded over half a million dollars through the Joint Chiefs Landscape Restoration Partnership for forest restoration near Sierra Blanca in Otero and Lincoln counties.

b. South Central Mountain RC & D

Robert Barber, Member gave an update on current activities. Mr. Barber stated he attended his first meeting last month, along with newly appointed member Robert Shepperd. Mr. Barber stated Jodie Canfield past Smokey Bear Ranger District Ranger will be appointed next month as a member.

c. Upper Hondo Soil & Water Conservation District

Robert Barber, Board Member gave an update on the Upper Hondo activities. Mr. Barber stated the district is still working with BLM in concern to weed treatments; Mr. Barber stated a lot is on hold due to weather. Mr. Barber stated the district office is moving to a building off Main in Capitan. Mr. Barber stated this will allow the district to expand operations. Mr. Barber stated the district continues to sell seed and weed treatment. Mr. Barber reported on current legislation; SB332 if passed, will directly affect mil levy funding for the water conservation districts by placing a sunset clause.

d. LANRAC

Robert Barber, Chair continues to work on same projects. Mr. Barber stated he reviewed a draft of the first two chapters of the Mexican wolf's environmental statement. Mr. Barber stated public opinion by law was due in May this year. Mr. Barber stated he attended a water dialogue in which the Governor requested a review of the State of New Mexico's 50-year water plan. Mr. Barber stated the Joint Chiefs' Landscape Restoration Partnership enables NRCS and the Forest Service.

to collaborate with agricultural producers and forest landowners to invest in conservation and restoration. Mr. Barber stated the committee will meet next month to this regard.

11. Lincoln County Detention Center Update- Warden Scott Colvin

Scott Colvin, Warden provided an update on status of the facility. Warden Colvin reported the facility was housing 79 prisoners. Warden Colvin reported they have filled all positions in correlation to the RISE grant; with an addition of four (4) new hires.

12. Lincoln County Medical Center Update-Todd Oberheu

Todd Oberheu, Hospital Chief Executive for Lincoln County Medical Center reported Roper Construction will start construction on the parking lot in March with a completion end date of hopefully two months. Mr. Oberheu stated a decrease in positive test related to COVID. Mr. Oberheu provided an update regarding information on COVID-19 vaccines. Oberheu reported the Lincoln County Medical Center had assisted with over approximately 600 vaccines.

13. Local Government Road Fund Projects: CAP/COOP/School Bus Programs-Jeffrey Honeycutt, Road Superintendent

Jeffrey Honeycutt, Road Superintendent informed New Mexico Department of Transportation District Two Engineering Support Division is soliciting applications for the Local Government Road Fund (LGRF) Program for fiscal year 21/22. Mr. Honeycutt stated the purpose of the LGRF Program is to assist local public agencies in "project development, construction, reconstruction, improvement, maintenance, or repair of public highways, streets and public-school parking lots, for the acquisition of rights-of-way therefore, or for materials for the construction or improvement thereof".

Mr. Honeycutt stated Fort Stanton Rd and Eagle Creek Canyon are two roads that he would like to submit for the cap/coop/school bus program. Mr. Honeycutt estimated the chip seal or asphalt for the 2022 CAP/COOP School bus 2 miles would be approximately \$625,000, with a County match of \$156,250.

Authorization to Negotiate for a Dedicated Right of Way/Easement to Expand Gavilan Canyon at the Intersection of Highway 48

Mr. Pearson stated the Board of Commissioners instructed Road Superintendent Honeycutt to incorporate a right-hand turning lane onto Highway 48. Mr. Pearson stated Lincoln County will need to acquire either a dedicated right-of-way or an easement to complete the project as planned.

David Roybal, Project Manager/Engineer for streets, Roads and Traffic/Engineering discussed the Pettigrew's recent analysis of Gavilan Road repair.

Motion: Direct the Manager Pearson, Project Manager for Pettigrew & Associates David Roybal, and Road Superintendent Jeff Honeycutt to continue move forward, Action: Approve, Moved by Commissioner Proctor, Seconded by Commissioner Allen.

9:30 A.M.: PUBLIC COMMENT AND OTHER BUSINESS FROM COUNTY OFFICIALS (Items are for discussion only – no action will be taken)

Commissioner Allen stated she received information regarding Congresswoman Yvette Herrell. Commissioner Allen requested consideration of a Resolution in support of the congresswoman's concerns.

Chair Stewart questioned about supporting an individual over policy.

Commissioner Willard stated he attended a SERPTO meeting with Road Superintend Jeff Honeycutt last week. Commissioner Willard stated Jeff was elected as vice chair to the technical committee and Ron Sena from the Village was elected to the policy committee.

Commissioner Proctor stated he will provide an update to any concerning activities regarding the 50-year water review.

Walter Hill, Assessor reported an update on legislative bills that could affect the county regarding the veteran exemptions. Assessor Hill stated the bills of concern were House Joint Resolutions. Assessor Hill explained Joint Resolutions, are bills that not only get passed by the stated but will also go to the voters in the next general election. Assessor Hill stated if approved will directly affect the evaluations and taxes in the county. Assessor Hill stated he will mail out notice of values soon and reported a large increase in value as well as sales. Assessor Hill stated the notice of vale will reflect a 3% statutory increase county wide.

Beverly Calaway, Treasurer stated 67% of property taxes were collected. Treasurer Calaway requested a board of finance meeting in month of March.

Michael Wood, Sheriff stated New Mexico suffered a great loss with a state police officer this week and Thanked the officer for his service. Sheriff Wood informed road conditions were not favorable and suggested to the public to avoid the roads if possible. Sheriff Wood stated his department was involved with the arrest of 3 serious felony convictions. Sheriff Wood sated his department has recently hired three (3) new deputies and still have two positions outstanding.

Manager Pearson read an email from Steve Kopelman, New Mexico Counties in regards in opposition to HB4.

Cynthia Black, Chair of the Republican Party of Lincoln County. Ms. Black stated Grant County condemned Congresswoman Yvette Herrell publicly. Ms. Black expressed support to a Resolution regarding the issues Congresswoman is dealing with at the federal level. Ms. Black stated in the first few weeks of our time representing New Mexico's Second Congressional District have laid the groundwork to deliver results. Ms. Black stated Congresswoman Herrell is already sponsoring, co-sponsoring, and supporting legislation that will protect jobs, rebuild our local communities, and protect election integrity.

Doris Cherry, resident expressed her support in the commission not supporting an individual by resolution.

15. Manager's Report

1) The Ruidoso Board of Realtors presented an award of \$2000.00 to the 7 VFD's in Lincoln County

The NM State Board of Realtors initiated a state-wide program to raise money for Volunteer Firefighters. Joe Kenmore was on hand to receive the check on behalf of all of the Lincoln County Volunteer Fire Departments. Each department received \$285 to be placed in their Trust account.

2) Rancho De Caballos Subdivision - Offer to Donate land for a Volunteer Fire station

In the regular Commission meeting on January 19, 2021, the Commission directed Alan Morel and myself to look into the feasibility and requirements of Lincoln County accepting donated land for a Volunteer Fire Station near Capitan, NM. Mr. Morel performed extensive research regarding the Rancho De Caballos Subdivision and determined that:

To the best of my knowledge, no bond has been procured or provided to the County. Multiple documents, including the Disclosure Statement, refer to the Developer's commitment to donate one acre of land to be used for the construction of a volunteer fire department. The construction of the facility would have to be approved by the Developer and the County is not guaranteeing that it will be constructed. To my knowledge, this has not occurred. Lastly, I do not believe that a Claim of Exemption can be utilized to create a new Tract within a previously approved Subdivision so, the Developer would be required to utilize one of the 55 Lots or 13 Tracts to accomplish the transfer to the County which I do not believe the Developer would consider.

In consultation with the Capitan Fire Department and the NM State Fire Marshall's Office, Joe Kenmore has recommended that the property owner work with the Village of Capitan to determine the needs and requirements of the Village. A fire station two miles north of Capitan is not recommended for the needs of Lincoln County.

3) Lincoln County K-9 Deputy Body

The Lincoln County Sheriff's K-9 Deputy requires many hours of care by his handler. Most of this care has to be performed "outside" the normal working hours of the K-9's handler. The Department of Labor has set some guidelines for compensating a Police K-9 handler:

The Certain training and "care" of a police dog at home by a canine officer is considered a part of the officer's principal activities.

We consider the term "care" to mean bathing, brushing, exercising, feeding, grooming, related cleaning of the dog's kennel or transport vehicle and similar activities performed by the canine officer at home on workdays as well as on days off duty or during vacation periods.

The K-9's handler will be compensated for 3.5 hours of "Care" per week. The cost of feeding and veterinary care will also be paid through Lincoln County. Some of the associated K-9 costs will be reimbursed through the Federal HIDTA Grant.

4) Solid Waste Department Update

We have started reviewing the individual delinquent accounts. Many of the accounts have not been reviewed in several years. The liens presented to the Commission today are a result of taking the time to research and document each individual delinquent account.

The receiving and receipting process has been adjusted for transparency and accountability. I will provide an update each month to the Commission regarding the Solid Waste Department

6) Meeting and Working with Elected Officials

The Elected Officials, Directors and I have met regularly to discuss procedures, internal policies, proposed changes, and other topics related to a working office environment. Every person / office has been a great help in welcoming me to Lincoln County. I wanted to say – THANK YOU – to each person for helping me transition into this great team!

16. Approval of Resolution 2020-28- a Resolution Opposing House Bill 4 of the First Session of the 55th Legislature; Urging the New Mexico Legislature to Provide More Resources for Behavioral Health Prevention and Treatment, Since Behavioral Health Issues are the Root Cause of Many Civil Rights Claims Against Local Governments; and Recommending Damage Caps on Any New civil Rights Cause of Action as Well as Funding for Any Increased Costs Associated with It.

Attorney Morel reported on a synopsis of original bill. Attorney Morel stated the bill includes a cap on damages of \$2 million per claimant and provides for the recovery of attorney fees. Attorney Morel stated the Tort Claims Act per statute 41-1-1 NMSA 1978 caps damages at just over \$1 million but does not include attorney fees.

Attorney Morel reported on the synopsis of the original bill. Attorney Morel stated House Bill 40 makes it unlawful to operate a private detention facility in New Mexico, bars governmental entities from contracting with private entities to operate a detention facility, repeals laws that previously authorized counties and municipalities to operate jails and authorized NMCD to contract with private entities for the operation of specific correctional facilities, and extensively amends existing law governing contracts and controls of county jails used to house prisoners.

Defendant Roger Romero filed an Answer to the Complaint asserting a Counterclaim to be filed in the U.S. District Court on April 2, 2018. A Judicial Inquiry Hearing took place September 4, 2018. A Disposition Order for Lack of Prosecution was entered on August 25, 2020. An Order Reinstating Case was entered on October 19, 2020.
- 2. Roger Romero v. State of New Mexico D-1226-CV-2018-00113 (Underlying Cases are: Board of County Commissioners of Lincoln County v. Roger Romero, D-1226-CV-2018-00055, and State of N.M. v. Roger Romero M-30-MR-2016-00142) A Petition for Writ of Habeas Corpus was filed requesting that the Judgment & Sentence entered by Judge Vega in Cause No. M-30-MR-2016-00142 be vacated and set aside. George Romero's Answer to Complaint and Counterclaim was filed April 30, 2018 in Cause No. D-1226-CV-2018-00055. Judge Counts is the presiding Judge. On February 26, 2019, an Order Setting Aside Conviction was entered by Judge Counts. On March 25, 2019, a Notice of Appeal was filed with the N.M. Supreme Court, Case No. S-1-SC-37602 On January 8, 2021, the Supreme Court entered its Dispositional Order of Transfer transferring the case to the Court of Appeals for consideration and review. The case is still pending.

Court Cause No. 2:18-cv-01137-JAP-GJF A Complaint for Violation of Civil, Constitutional and Statutory Rights was filed on December 5, 2018. On December 27, 2018. A Guardian Ad Litem has been appointed to represent the Plaintiffs. On September 16, 2019, the case was dismissed and, on October 7, 2019, Plaintiffs filed their Notice of Appeal to the United States Court of Appeals for the Tenth Circuit, Docket No. 19-2165. The case is still pending.
- 4. Romero, et al. v. Stone, et al, Cause No. D-1226-CV-2019-00271 Request for Appointment of Guardian Ad Litem for Plaintiffs and Complaint for Violation of Civil and Constitutional Rights, Negligence, Prima Facie Tort and Wrongful Taking was filed on October 9, 2019 along with a Jury Demand. Lisa B. Riley is the presiding Judge. Lincoln County has yet to be served with the Complaint.

On August 14, 2018, Lincoln County submitted its Opt-In Notice to participate in the lawsuit. On October 16, 2019, Lincoln County received notice that it would be receiving \$46,011.00 from the Judgment Fund.

Lincoln County has entered into an Agreement for joining in the litigation to recover amounts representing unauthorized reductions in violation of New Mexico Statutes. On November 14, 2019, Lincoln County joined in the litigation. The case is still pending.
- Greentree Solid Waste Authority v. Lincoln County, Cause No. D-1226-CV-2014-00095 – Compromise and Settlement Agreement and Release executed on December 17, 2015.
- 9. Richard Ford v. Terry A. Colwell, II, et al, Cause No. D-1226-CV-2020-00104 Complaint for criminal trespass, theft, misappropriation of monies and violations of civil rights was filed by Gary C. Mitchell on May 11, 2020. Lincoln County was served on May 29, 2020. On June 26, 2020, the case was removed to the U.S. District Court and, on July 3, 2020, County Defendants filed their Motion to Dismiss which is still pending.
