Minutes of the Regular Meeting of the Lincoln County Commission held at 8:30 AM on November 16, 2021, in the County Commission Chambers, Lincoln County Courthouse, in Carrizozo, New Mexico.

Melanie Gutierrez, NMSU Lincoln County Ag/4-H Agent reported the Eastern Fair in October was a success. Ms. Gutierrez stated there were 13 kids that attended and 7 of those made the sale. Ms. Gutierrez stated the 3 of those kids also won state showmanship. Ms. Gutierrez stated on Sunday they had their officer election on County Council. Ms. Gutierrez stated they will attend 2021 NMSU Outreach Conference November 18, 2021. Ms. Gutierrez informed they will have a tin art workshop for the kids and one of the clubs will be participating in in the Ruidoso Village parade of lights December 4, 2021. Ms. Gutierrez stated their big event is coming up is their horse judging contest in Denver for Nationals.

Robert Barber, member provided an update on activities held by the South-Central Mountain RC and D. Mr. Barber stated they are getting back to opening for public services. Mr. Barber stated one of the bigger projects going on is the air curtain burn box; Mr. Barber stated on the 29th will attend meeting to certify people to use operated the burn box.

Upper Hondo Soil & Water Conservation District

Robert Barber member reported actives are on schedule with eh EWP program, and they are just waiting for the funding to arrive.

Land and Natural Resources Advisory Committee-LANRAC

Robert Barber, Chair provided the Meeting minutes of October 12, 2021. Mr. Barber stated he provided comments to the prescribed burn manager certification program.

9:30 A.M.: PUBLIC COMMENT AND OTHER BUSINESS FROM COUNTY OFFICIALS (Items are for discussion only – no action will be taken)

Commissioner Allen informed she attended the Veterans Day assembly. Commissioner Allen stated all the choirs had an opportunity to sing, a slide show was presented and there was a good turn out from former and past veterans in the community. Commissioner Allen stated that maybe the commission should consider writing a letter to congress regarding the Joshua Collins Coalition Against Bigger Trucks.

Commissioner Willard stated he will attend the SERPTO meeting in Roswell.

Commissioner Proctor stated he attend the LANRAC and the upper Hondo meetings. Commissioner Proctor thanked Robert Barber for his comments presented.

Whitney Whittaker, Lincoln County Clerk stated she will bring back redistricting maps next regular meeting in December

Beverly Calaway, Lincoln County Treasurer introduced new employee, Treasurer's Seasonal Clerk, Russell Wehnau. Treasurer Calaway stated the Mr. Wehnau will help with research, return mail on property tax bills. Treasurer Calaway stated Mr. Wehnau is doing a tremendous job.

Treasurer Calaway discussed the Financial Report, stating total cash held as of October 13, 2021, by the Treasurer was \$29,200,750.43. Treasurer Calaway stated this is in comparison to \$22,670,729.49 in October 2020. Treasurer Calaway informed they have collected \$12.5 million and as of October 31, 2021, the Treasurer's office had collected 15.78% of the taxes billed.

Michael Wood, Sheriff provided a status update from the office stating their office handled 330 calls, 23 physical arrests, assisted in 19 vehicle related crashes, and served 15 traffic citations for the month of October.

Robert Barber, citizen and member or Red Cross stated he will be leaving the Red Cross within the next couple weeks. Mr. Barber stated because he wishes to continue to serve Lincoln County during a disaster by a certified response team. Mr. Barber stated it would be beneficial to have a CERT team within the county. Mr. Barber stated although he thought the Red Cross was a vital asset is an assist but believe the CERT team could tackle the event/task quicker for our county.

David Vanderburg, resident gave respect for elected officials, Mr. Vanderburg stated he wished to speak about agenda item 23. Mr. Vanderburg stated he was a military veteran, and he took an oath to defend the constitution. Mr. Vanderburg stated he was extremely concerned about a mask mandate. Mr. Vanderburg stated these forced mandates are unconstitutional. Mr. Vanderburg stated in section 3 in the commissioner handbook to addresses things that need to be brought to a point. Mr. Vanderburg stated nothing makes public confidence in Government more than unethical, dishonest leadership." Mr. Vanderburg spoke to public trust.

Galen Farrington, resident stated was privilege to witness our police force being honored.

Mr. Farrington stated he would like to comment on Item 25. Mr. Farrington stated Roper never revealed his intentioned use for the proposed cement batch. Mr. Farrington commented on Chair Stewart's motion for cement batch and hopes it will be considered a public nuisance.

Karyl Williams resident from Capitan, weighed in on agenda item 23. Ms. Williams stated there have been and are many laws passed and policies implemented by once-trusted members at all levels of our government that exceed Constitutional authorities and violate and erode protections enumerated in our Constitutions. Ms. Williams stated a few would include concentration camps for Japanese Americans, murder, and theft of resources from native Americans, forced abortions, lobotomies, and medical testing on minorities, children, and others incapable of defending themselves. Ms. Williams stated America and New Mexico are following an all too familiar track that the Nazis did to divide its citizens and eliminate the undesirables. Ms. Williams stated Governments routinely side-step their primary purpose of protecting citizen rights and liberties. Ms. Williams stated to ensure compliance in the latest attack on its citizens, our governments have created unfounded fear of a fully treatable pathogen and relentlessly bombard us with irrational and illogical rules and mandates that not only do not mitigate transmission or relieve disease severity, but generally cause harm beyond what the illness would do. Ms. Williams stated mandating the injection of an approved for emergency experimental compound, that has rapidly mounted adverse side effects, as a condition of employment or to access necessary resources is an absolute violation of the Supreme Law of our Land and is an unlawful government overreach. Ms. Williams also stated forced health care or medical mandate, created by elected government and imposed on the People without defined and specified Constitutional authority, are always immoral, illegal, and are enforceable.

Robert Barber, resident stated the County questioned if any consideration be made available for public consumption.

Attorney Morel informed not one megawatt is for state use but rather being transferred out of state.

Mr. Barber spoke to some feedback benefits for the County since energy is a big deal now.

Scott Colvin, Warden stated the Department of Behavioral Health is inspecting the facility, Warden Colvin stated this is necessary for being awarded the funds from the Rise Grant. Warden Colvin stated the Master control is online and linked up to current system. Warden Colvin stated the full body scanner went operational last night and expressed gratitude towards receiving vital equipment

Todd Oberheu, Hospital Chief Executive provided an update on Lincoln County Medical daily operations.

Discussion and Direction of Potential Use of American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) Funds for the Lincoln Mutual Domestic Water Consumers Association

Manager Pearson stated under the American Rescue Plan Act, New Mexico would receive \$2.5 billion dollars for relief and recovery. Manager Pearson stated through ARPA, we have an opportunity to invest in our communities.

There was direction for County Manager to work with Lincoln Mutual Domestic Water Consumers Association along with the County attorney to come up with a letter of support or equal value.

22. Integrated Resource Plan Presentation - Zia Natural Gas Company

Leslie Graham, General Manager of Zia Natural Gas Company provided a presentation on the Integrated Resource Plan.

Approval of Resolution 2021-32 Authorizing Zia Senior Centers Program Director and County Manager to Submit a Proposal for RFP 2002-01 (Provision of Service for Older New Mexicans) and to Sign and Enter into a Four-Year Contract (2022-2026)

Renee Montes, Senior Center Project Director stated the purpose of the request is to solicit sealed proposals for the provision of services for Older New Mexicans. Ms. Montes stated Non- Metro AAA will make funding available from the Federal Title III Older American Act of 1965 and the State of New Mexico House Bill 2 appropriations through annual subrecipient agreement in 32 counties. Ms. Montes asked the Commission for a letter to go along with the proposal.

15. Manager's Report

1) Warden Colvin and I are looking into the legal requirements for record retention. Half of the storage building is filled with boxes of files. Digitization might be an option. I will update the Commissioners as we learn options.

2) LCDC Body Scanner

The body scanner for the Detention Center has been installed and is operational.

3) American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) Update

Many counties are still holding off on spending ARPA money until the Treasury's Final ruling is published. We don't know the time frame for publishing, causing frustration in trying to plan projects. Wilson & Company is still working on the design for the Magado Creek Bridge and drainage plan.

4) Meeting with Senator Heinrich's Field Team

Sheriff Wood and I met with Ashley Beyer, field representative for Senator Heinrich. She asked our major concerns and was very up front on where the Senator stood on certain issues.

- We expressed our concerns regarding the ARPA funds and the Treasury's lack of response to our questions.
- I questioned the listing of the Penasco Chipmunk as endangered
 - The impacts on emergency communications
 - o The tourist related activities will be impacted
- The fires and flooding in Lincoln County were briefly discussed

5) Ruidoso Chamber of Commerce Meeting

On November 3, 2021, I attended the Ruidoso Chamber meeting. Everyone was glad to see Lincoln County representation. A brief County update was given along with updates from Village of Ruidoso and several local businesses. The Chamber asked that we continue to participate in future meetings.

6) Insurance for LCDC

Alan Morel and I had a conference call with David Stanfield, president of CSG. CSG has procured insurance coverage that will lower the yearly premium as well as lower the deductible. CSG will be working on a plan to return the \$250,000 "retainer" that was required by the previous insurance carrier. Commission will be updated as we learn the timeframe for this process.

7) Lincoln Historical Preservation Board

On October 20, 2021. Commissioner Allen and I attended the regular meeting of the Lincoln Historical Preservation Board. There was a discussion regarding food trucks in Lincoln proper. The Board listened on how the local tavern had been "hiding" the food trucks on the weekends. The Board and residents were able to come to an agreement on the parking of food trucks in the historic district.

We have two employees getting ready to retire so that will open two more positions by the end of the calendar year.

This week I will be attending the Human Resources Affiliate Fall Conference at the Inn of the Mountain Gods.

There has been a lot of discussion regarding the vaccine mandates in the workplace. The HR Affiliate is buzzing with the most recent publications and will discuss this more in depth at the Conference this Wednesday and Thursday.

More topics to be discussed at the Conference are PERA Changes and Updates, ERISA Benefit Changes and Updates, and the New Mexico Retiree Health Care Authority (NMRHCA) Changes, Record Keeping, Rule Change, Retirement and Percentage of Insurance Paid Before the age of 65.

COVID-19 In the Workplace- Great news to report that we have not had a positive case in over a month! Just a reminder to all employees to continue wearing your masks, sanitize your workspace, wash your hands and if you feel ill, please stay home. With the colder weather here, common colds, the flu, streptococcal pharyngitis (strep throat) and COVID-19 tend to thrive in this weather, as well as many others. PLEASE take care of yourselves so that it's easier to take care of each other.

Solid Waste Update:

A month and a half into the fourth quarter receipting and the solid waste department has receipted \$206,623.85. This time last year, the department had receipted \$202,717.57 so we are seeing a slight increase.

For the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2021, the department has receipted a total of \$445,567.28.

Last year this time, they receipted \$444,263.29.

In the September regular meeting, the Commission approved for the Lincoln County Solid Waste Department to eliminate billing for private dumpster service. We have not had a definite answer from our current provider as to whether they will continue that service and begin billing. Greentree Solid Waste does provide that service for County residents who wish to continue with their service. As of January 1, 2022, Lincoln County Solid Waste will pick up these receptacles and discontinue billing.

Manager Pearson stated the date was reflected incorrectly as Mr. Vega was awarded the contract for the Misdemeanor Compliance Program (RFP 19-20-001) on October 15, 2019, with a contract term date of October 14, 2023.

 Installation of Telecommunications Tower at 111 Copper Ridge Road, Capitan, NM -Discussion and Direction

Manager Pearson stated he invited Sean Milks, Gravity Pad Towers, LLC to discuss the possibility of installing a telecommunications tower near our OES office. Several cellular carriers would colocate on the tower, providing greater phone coverage along the Highway 48 route.

Attorney Morel informed once built it will have to be approved by Department of Finance Authority.

There was instruction given to proceed with negotiation through the County Manager.

23. Discussion and Possible Direction Regarding the Occupational Safety and Health Administration's (OSHA) Emergency Temporary Standard (ETS) Requiring Businesses with at Least 100 Employees to Mandate That Their Employees Get Vaccinated Against COVID-19 or Wear a Mask and Test for COVID-19 on a Weekly Basis

Attorney Morel informed the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) issued an emergency temporary standard requiring that employers with 100 or more employees must have all their workers vaccinated against COVID-19 no later than Jan. 4, 2022. Attorney Morel further stated the Fifth Circuit court of appeals issued a preliminary injunction blocking enforcement of the emergency temporary standard while challenges to it are heard in the federal court system.

There was no action taken

24. Approval for Award of RFP 21-22-03 Telecommunications Facilities Consultants

Manager Pearson stated the scoring committee met on Tuesday, November 2, 2021, to tabulate the proposals and rank them accordingly. Manager Pearson stated there were two companies that provided proposals to Lincoln County: Center for Municipal Solutions (CMS) and Triadic Enterprises

Motion: Award the contract for Telecommunications Facilities Consultants to CMS,

Roger Romero M-30-MR-2016-00142) A Petition for Writ of Habeas Corpus was filed requesting that the Judgment & Sentence entered by Judge Vega in Cause No. M-30-MR-2016-00142 be vacated and set aside. George Romero's Answer to Complaint and Counterclaim was filed April 30, 2018 in Cause No. D-1226-CV-2018-00055. On February 26, 2019, an Order Setting Aside Conviction was entered by Judge Counts.

After receiving no oppositions to the transfer of the case, on June 17, 2019, the case was transferred to the Northern District of Ohio noting that as of December

- 5, 2017, 1,534 cases have been transferred to Ohio for further proceedings. The case is still pending.
- 5. *City of Albuquerque, et al vs. John Monoforte & N.M. Taxation & Revenue Department, Cause No. D-202-CV-2018-08036 Judge Franchini is the presiding judge. Lincoln County has entered into an Agreement for joining in the litigation to recover amounts representing unauthorized reductions in violation of New Mexico Statutes. On November 14, 2019, Lincoln County joined in the litigation. On October 20, 2021 Lincoln County received its GRT distribution recovery amount due from TRD. Dismissal documents are to be filed within the near future.
- Greentree Solid Waste Authority v. Lincoln County, Cause No. D-1226-CV-2014-00095
 Compromise and Settlement Agreement and Release executed on December 17, 2015.
- 7. Richard Ford v. Terry A. Colwell, II, et al, Cause No. D-1226-CV-2020-00104 Complaint for criminal trespass, theft, misappropriation of monies and violations of civil rights was filed by Gary C. Mitchell on May 11, 2020. Lincoln County was served on May 29, 2020.
