Minutes of the Regular Meeting of the Lincoln County Commission held at 8:30 AM on January 18, 2022, in the County Commission Chambers, Lincoln County Courthouse, in Carrizozo, New Mexico.

9. Forest, Land & Natural Resources Matters:

a. Smokey Bear Ranger District

Manager Pearson stated the Smokey Bear Ranger District intends to provide a letter of support for the ROV route.

b. Lincoln County / NMSU Extension Services

Melody Gaines informed the Horse evaluation team went to the National Western Stock Show and the Western National Roundup in Denver and did very well bringing home the award of Reserve National 4H Horse Judging Champions.

Mr. Barber stated Resolution 2014-02 is in reference to the Sheriff and how they deal with wolfhuman conflicts pertaining to health and safety efforts. Mr. Barber stated as long as it didn't conflict with their rule, they would support it.

Mr. Barber stated there were restrictions on taking wolves on Federal Land, Non-Federal land and when it dealt with excessive kills of elk, deer and other animals. Mr. Barber stated he would be back with further clarification on the benchmark.

Manager Pearson stated they had received an Email from Pansy Moffitt regarding the appointment of the SNMED board member and the alternate. Manager Pearson informed at the January 19, 2021, Regular Commission Meeting, Commissioner Allen was appointed as the SNMED Board Member and Commissioner Crunk was appointed as the alternate, both for two year appointments.

12. 9:30 A.M.: PUBLIC COMMENT AND OTHER BUSINESS FROM COUNTY OFFICIALS (Items are for discussion only – no action will be taken)

Commissioner Allen stated she was still attending the GreenTree Board meetings and had also attended the latest SNMED meeting. Commissioner Allen informed the Legislative Session this year would focus most of the discussions and money on infrastructure improvements. She stated the DOT is also talking about Broadband and working with communities to provide access through their rights-of-way. Commissioner Allen informed Lincoln County recovered very well from the effects of COVID since the County was mostly tourism and tourism didn't seem to suffer as much. Commissioner Allen stated the State had lots of money available for any community that could be designated Colonias.

Commissioner Willard would be attending a SERPTO meeting later in the month.

Commissioner Proctor attended the LANRAC committee meeting and informed they were doing a good job for the County.

Walter Hill, County Assessor informed his office sent out a mailing to property owners who were receiving the special method of valuation for Ag land and livestock. Assessor Hill explained the

Property Tax Division in Santa Fe had implemented a new software program. The Assessors Office has brought into compliance all the forms the State is now requiring.

Beverly Calaway, County Treasurer stated the fund balance was \$13,177,117.20. Treasurer Calaway informed 67.78% of the first half taxes had already been collected.

Michael Wood, County Sheriff shared stats generated from his Agency since the last meeting.

David Vandenberg, County resident spoke in opposition of agenda item #18 and the mandating of vaccines.

Jim Kalveledge, Alto Resident stated in 1998 the Billy the Kid Scenic Byway was established. He explained the Federal Highway Administration Scenic Byway Program had 6 necessary qualities to establish a Scenic Byway. Mr. Kalveledge opposes the cement batch plant as it does not fit within the qualities needed of a Scenic Byway.

Nancy Antilla, Alto resident opposes the concrete batch plant as she has moderate to severe asthma and would have to leave the area if a concrete batch plant was built.

Galin Farrington, Alto resident spoke in opposition to the concrete batch plant and informed about the hearing being held February 9-11, 2022.

Sherry Kohler, Alto resident spoke in opposition to the concrete batch plant voicing her concern for the water usage.

Diorly Steirwalt, Alto resident spoke in opposition to the concrete batch plant. Ms. Steirwalt explained they owned their property and house since 2000 and made it through sickness, fires, floods and insects but would lose their home if the batch plant was built.

Trina Nunnally, County resident submitted a comment in the chat box in opposition to agenda item #18.

Chair Stewart commented he was monitoring pre-filed bills. Chair Stewart attended a Regional Economic Recovery Meeting. Chair Stewart explained they were coordinating a summary plan for goals under the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District Board.

Chair Stewart stated there would be a NMED hearing on the batch plant February 9, 2022 at the Traylor Gym in the Capitan Schools.

13. 10:00 AM: PUBLIC HEARING:

Attorney Morel stated the Ordinance would be effective 30 days after approval.

Chair Stewart requested public comment and having none adjourned the public hearing.

Attorney Morel stated there was a serious need for a code enforcement officer. Attorney Morel informed the Officer would be authorized to go to court and prosecute the cases on behalf of The County. Attorney Morel stated the Enforcement Officer would work under the supervision of the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office however, they would not be fully deputized.

Sheriff Wood stated he supported the decision to create this Ordinance. Sheriff Wood informed it would be a limited Commission in the sense they would be able to present cases on a petty Misdemeanor County Ordinance level only, there would be no arresting authority.

Warden Colvin informed they are pursuing the New Mexico Association of Counties Detention Accreditation Certification and named Lieutenant Amaya as the Accreditation Manager.

Warden Colvin commented on the RISE program close-out meeting with Anita Mesa, Division Chief for the RISE Program at the NM Division of Behavioral Health who rated the program as #1 in the State as far as innovation and inroads and cooperative agreements with the Mescalero Apache Tribe. Warden Colvin informed on the TLC Program (Traditions Language and Culture) to reconnect the Mescalero Prisoners with the important cultural elements of the Mescalero Apache Tribe.

Chair Stewart recessed the regular meeting at 10:26 AM and reconvened the regular meeting at 10:36 AM

16. Lincoln County Medical Center Update - Todd Oberheu

Manager Pearson stated Todd Oberheu was unavailable to attend.

Manager's Report

1) OHV/ROV Update

Francisco Sanchez, District 2 Engineer, is going to present the Lincoln County ROV Route to the NMDOT commission in March. The meeting will be held in Roswell. Francisco advises that Lincoln County solicit letters of support from USFS and the City of Alamogordo.

2) Joint Application filed by Pattern SC Holdings, LLC, et. Al

Joint Application filed by Pattern SC Holdings, LLC, et. al requesting that the PRC Commission enter a Final Order that (a) expands the area for the Joint Applicants' wind turbines comprising the Corona Wind Project beyond that previously approved in NMPRC Case Nos. 17-00221-UT and 18-00065-UT; (b) modifies the proposed route for the 345- kilovolt Corona Wind Project Gen-Tie System approved in NMPRC Case No. 18-00065-UT and reconfigured and expanded in NMPRC Case No. 20-00008-UT; and (c) provides the necessary approval to the extent required by law, for the 180-200-foot right-of-way for the revised Corona Gen-Tie System which is the subject of this Joint Application.

3) Compactor Cameras

Cameras are installed at the Eagle Creek compactor site. The first week we captured two illegal dumpers on camera. As of 1/13/2022, we caught one of the dumpers. This site is our test site. We are looking at different cameras, angles, fencing and proper placement. The plan will be to install fencing and cameras at all compactor sites (maybe some dumpster sites)

4) Prioritizing Projects at the Lincoln County Fairgrounds

A special meeting was held by the Lincoln County Fair Association. Commissioner Willard, Commissioner Proctor and I attended. We discussed the importance of participating in the Master Plan update approved by the BOCC in the December meeting. Wilson & Co. will lead the update and help prioritize projects, soliciting the funds and project management. Overall, the meeting and project plan was well received.

5) Telecommunications Contract & Update on Cell Tower at Copper Ridge

The contract with Center for Municipal Solutions Group has been reviewed by both Lincoln County and CMS. It should be signed this week. We have asked Sean Milks, Gravity Pad, to work with CMS to get started on preliminary paperwork. We want to make sure that the cell tower will work in that area before a contract is signed. Attorney Morel has reviewed other governmental cell tower agreements in preparation in drafting a contract / agreement.

6) Ruidoso Downs Racetrack Indoor Arena - Update

Ethan Linder has informed me that the City of Ruidoso Downs has place the indoor arena on their ICIP list. They are seeking funding directly from the Governor for this project.

- Board of County Commissioners of Lincoln County v. Roger Romero D-1226-CV-2018-00055 Complaint for Foreclosure. Complaint was filed February 20, 2018. Defendant Roger Romero filed an Answer to the Complaint asserting a Counterclaim to be filed in the U.S. District Court on April 2, 2018. A Judicial Inquiry Hearing took place September 4, 2018. The case is still pending.
- 2. Roger Romero v. State of New Mexico D-1226-CV-2018-00113 (Underlying Cases are: Board of County Commissioners of Lincoln County v. Roger Romero, D-1226-CV-2018-00055, and State of N.M. v. Roger Romero M-30-MR-2016-00142) A Petition for Writ of Habeas Corpus was filed requesting that the Judgment & Sentence entered by Judge Vega in Cause No. M-30-MR-2016-00142 be vacated and set aside. George Romero's Answer to Complaint and Counterclaim was filed April 30, 2018 in Cause No. D-1226-CV-2018-00055. On February 26, 2019, an Order Setting Aside Conviction was entered by Judge Counts.

On March 25, 2019, a Notice of Appeal was filed with the N.M. Supreme Court, Case No. S-1-SC-37602 On January 8, 2021, the Supreme Court entered its Dispositional Order of Transfer transferring the case to the Court of Appeals for consideration and review.

On January 28, 2021, a Dispositional Order was entered transferring the case to the NM Court of Appeals for consideration and review. Case No. A-1-CA-39446 The case is still

pending

Romero, et al. v. Stone, et al. Cause No. D-1226-CV-2019-00271 Request for Appointment of Guardian Ad Litem for Plaintiffs and Complaint for Violation of Civil and Constitutional Rights, Negligence, Prima Facie Tort and Wrongful Taking was filed on October 9, 2019 along with a Jury Demand. Lisa B. Riley is the presiding Judge. The case is still pending.

4. Brd. of County Commissioners of Lincoln County v. Amerisourcebergen Drug Corp., et. al – U.S. Dist. Court Case No. 2:19-cv-00462 – Complaint for Public Nuisance, Violations of Racketeer Influenced and Corrupt Organizations Act (RICO)... filed on May 20, 2019 by Attorneys Robles, Rail & Anaya, P.C., et. al. After receiving no oppositions to the transfer of the case, on June 17, 2019, the case was transferred to the Northern District of Ohio noting that as of December 5, 2017, 1,534 cases have been transferred to Ohio for further proceedings. The case is still pending.

 Greentree Solid Waste Authority v. Lincoln County, Cause No. D-1226-CV-2014-00095 – Compromise and Settlement Agreement and Release executed on December 17, 2015.

6. Richard Ford v. Terry A. Colwell, II, et al, Cause No. D-1226-CV-2020-00104 Complaint for criminal trespass, theft, misappropriation of monies and violations of civil rights was filed by Gary C. Mitchell on May 11, 2020. Lincoln County was served on May 29, 2020. On June 26, 2020, the case was removed to the U.S. District Court and, on March 30, 2021, the case was remanded back to the 12th Judicial District Court for further proceedings. A 5 day Jury Trial is scheduled to begin on September 19, 2022.

7. *Jacob Scott v. Lincoln County Board of Commissioners, Brack Rains and Unknown Defendants, Cause No. D-1226-CV-2021-00001 Complaint for Negligence and Negligence Per Se and Deprivation of Constitutional Rights was filed on January 1, 2021. Lincoln County has yet to be served with the Complaint. On December 10, 2021, the case was dismissed for lack of prosecution and the deadline to reinstate the case is January 10, 2022. There were no Motions to Reinstate the Case filed and, this matter is now concluded.
