The Illiana Derby Dames skating team's home base is here, at the skating rink at Lynwood Sport Center, 2030 Glenwood-Dyer Road. The Derby Dames practice at the rink on Mondays and Wednesdays and host Roller Derby competitions on Sundays.

Today's Roller Derby competitions are on a flat track, not a banked skating track. There are other changes in the current Roller Derby world. Derby Dames team members receive no pay, instead skate to raise money for nonprofit charities. The team also has a mascot, a big panda named Pandamonium (seen in photo). And, members use alter ego names, such as "Slammin' Sly," "Crys Cross" and "Naughty Nelson."

The Roller Derby skaters' goal is to promote women's strength and

self-esteem and to create a sense of camaraderie and teamwork among members while making contributions to help support community needs. Team members range in age from 23 years old to early 50s.

The Derby Dames took on the Chicago Outfit Shakedown team July 9. The event raised money for INFEAT, an organization working for children diagnosed with autism. On August 13 the Derby Dames skated against the South Shore Roller Girls team.

he Firefighters Association appreciates the generosity of Village businesses that made donations to the association's recent fund-raiser.


The Firefighters Association issued a "thank you" for the contributions, which will be used to help pay for Fire Department equipment.

# Building Department has permit information

he Building Department is advising residents to make a seasonal examination of the exterior of their homes to check for

homes to check for peeling paint, roof damage, rotted window frames and leaky gutters.

If structural repairs or other maintenance is needed, residents should contact the Village Building Department for information regarding necessary permits.

Permits are required for most work involving electrical, plumbing and renovation projects. The Village also requires permits for sheds, decks,



fences and both in-ground and above-ground pools.

Village ordinance stipulates that homeowners who hire a contractor must employ one

who is registered with the Village. Registered contractors are licensed and bonded—important elements that help to avoid fraud and protect against unsatisfactory work.

Permit applications are available on the Village website at www.lynwoodil.us. The Building Department phone number is 708-758-6380. Department hours are 8 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Monday-Friday.

# Answers to frequently asked resident questions

## Q. What are the Village Hall business hours?

ANSWER: The Village Hall is open Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday from 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., and on Wednesday from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. Village Hall is closed on the following holidays: New Year's Day, Dr. Martin Luther King Day, Presidents Day, Good Friday, Memorial Day, Fourth of July, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day and the Friday after Thanksgiving, and Christmas Day.

### Q. Does the Village trim trees on parkways?

ANSWER: It is a homeowner's responsibility to trim tree branches that hang over a sidewalk interfering with pedestrians. The Department will remove dead trees on parkways; most of the dead trees are infested by the emerald ash borer insect. Public Works does not have the capability to remove stumps; trees will be cut as close to the ground as possible. The Department has a tree removal list. Please phone Public Works at 708-758-8434 to add a dead tree to the list.

# Q. Will the Village remove a dead animal carcass on public or private property?

ANSWER: If the dead animal is on the street, please call the Public Works Department with the location. A crew will be dispatched to remove it. If the carcass is located on private property, it is a homeowner's responsibility to remove it. Residents may contact the Public Works Department to collect a dead animal if it is bagged or boxed and placed onto the parkway. Residents also

may place the carcass out for regular garbage pickup.

Q. What do I do with branches? ANSWER: Branches trimmed by a homeowner may be placed neatly at the parkway curb for the Village chipper with stub ends facing the opposite of flow of traffic. They should be cut in four-foot to six-foot lengths. The chipper crew works the third week of each month. Branches should be placed out by Monday morning of that week. There is no need to contact the Village for a pickup because the chipper truck will make one pass on each street. Trees trimmed or cut down by a contractor must be removed by that contractor. Please notice: Small twigs should be broken up and placed into biodegradable paper bags for yard waste pickup; it is dangerous for employees to put small twigs through the chipper machine.

### Q. Are there Village parking restrictions?

**ANSWER:** Village parking restrictions include no street parking from 2 to 6 a.m. During snow events, street parking is not allowed after two inches of snowfall.

Q. What do I do if I notice a problem with a streetlight?

ANSWER: Contact the Public Works Department if the light is on an aluminum pole and indicate an address or a location. If the light is on a wood pole, contact ComEd or the Village. Streetlights on wood poles are ComEd's responsibility.

## Mailbox outside Village Hall

or the convenience of residents, a new United States Postal Service mailbox is now located in front of the Lynwood Village Hall, 21460 Lincoln Highway.

The Village Clerk's Office also is working with the Postal Service to provide residents with the service of purchasing books of stamps at the Village Hall. Details on this service are forthcoming.

# Holiday trash collection

Homewood Disposal, the Village's garbage, yard waste and recycling service provider, observes the following six holidays: New Year's Day, Memorial Day, Fourth of July, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day and Christmas Day. During weeks in which one of these holidays falls prior to garbage pickup day, it will delay the collection one day. If the

holiday falls on a Saturday,
Homewood
Disposal will
observe it on the prior Friday. If the holiday falls on a Sunday, the firm observes it on the

following Monday. No other holidays affect garbage service.



Homewood Disposal will not pick up any electronic devices, including televisions, computers, stereos, etc. Residents must take the devices to an electronic recycler. Also, tires will not be collected by Homewood Disposal; they must be taken to a tire store for recycling.

#### **New LED streetlights**

The Village has completed the installation of new LED streetlights, a project that improves the lighting of our streets while saving energy usage and electric costs.

# Water billing schedule



Lynwood
municipal utility/
water bills are
mailed the end
of each month.
Residents should
receive the bills
around the first

of each month. Bill payment is due by the 15th of each month or the following business day. On the day following the bill due date, reminder notices are mailed. Water shutoff for unpaid bill balances occurs the first Thursday of the month. The Village advises residents to make payments prior to the 15th of the month to avoid penalties; a water turn-on fee is charged.

#### **Dog complaints**

The Village is enforcing an ordinance regarding dogs due to numerous complaints that people are walking their dogs without a leash and not cleaning up after pets.

The Lynwood ordinance requires that dogs must be leashed and that owners must have the necessary supplies to pick up after dogs and



must do so. The Village receives complaints that dogs also are allowed off leash to run in parks. Tickets will be issued to pet owners who violate the ordinance requiring dog leashes and pet cleanup. Residents who see violators are asked to contact the Police Department.



# No pollutants in storm drains

torm water is rain, hail or melting snow that drains into a municipal drainage system consisting of catch basins, sewer basins and drainage swales. The Lynwood drainage system collects storm water that eventually flows

into Lake Lynwood, Lincoln Lansing Drainage, North Creek and West Creek

Pollutants entering the drainage system will contaminate these local bodies of water. By keeping our catch basins and drainage swales uncontaminated, we keep the environment of Lynwood clean.

If you see pollutants entering our drainage system or see someone dumping into a storm basin, please phone the Lynwood Public Works Department at 708-758-8434.
