





Article 2 - Budget

Fiscal Year 2019 Budget (July 1, 2018 – June 30, 2019)

Total Budget **\$10,574,426**Raised by Taxes **\$7,331,905**





Major Budget Drivers

Budget Driver	Increase
Wages & Benefits	\$189,790
Capital Improvements	\$57,484

Budget Impact Offsets

Increase in Grand List -- 1.4% -- approximately \$99,000 to offset expense

Reductions in Property & Casualty Insurance Premiums – more than \$36,000 reduction in expense achieved through competitive bidding

Reduction in Police Canine Program Expense – start-up expenses of \$24,560 incurred in FY18 are not needed in FY19.

Increased Funding for Infrastructure Improvements

Funding for capital improvements increased by \$57,484

Continued focus on addressing aging infrastructure and deferred maintenance in a systematic way by inventorying infrastructure and facility needs and prioritizing projects based on available funding.

Increased Funding for Infrastructure Improvements

In addition to a large slate of ongoing projects, major projects planned for the coming year include:

Charles Avenue from the school stop sign north toward Water Street. The project includes stormwater & curbing improvements, road recycling & paving, streetlighting, and water main & sewer main replacement (funded by the water & sewer funds)

Increased Funding for Infrastructure Improvements

Shard Villa Road – river bank stabilization of 210 feet, road surface recycling and paving of 2,720 feet

Seymour Street/Pulp Mill Bridge Road Sidewalk Project, in cooperation with the Vermont Agency of Transportation, the Addison County Regional Planning Commission and the Town of Weybridge

Reconstruction of the Basketball Courts in Harold Curtis Park, in partnership with the East Middlebury Fire District

Infrastructure Improvements Upcoming Projects

Looking ahead, the Selectboard is working on two major projects, which we anticipate bringing to voters for bond votes in November 2018:

- Water System Improvements
- East Middlebury Village Flood Resiliency Project

While this is our fourth year proposing a budget requiring a level or minimally-increased tax rate, keep in mind that increases in the following expenses:

- Health Insurance
- Vehicle & Heating Fuel
- Mandates, including the Clean-up of Lake Champlain

and uncertainty on the future of state and federal funding, will put significant upward pressure on budgets in FY19 and beyond.

Article 3 Vehicles & Equipment

Authorize the Selectboard to borrow up to \$122,400 to purchase a police cruiser, a street sweeper, a skid steer and an asphalt hot box.

One Police Cruiser



- The Police Department replaces cruisers on a rotating schedule of two cruisers one year, one cruiser the next.
- Cycles-out one of the older, high maintenance cars for a trade-in against the purchase of the new car.
- Estimated cost of replacing one cruiser is \$28,000

Street Sweeper



- Replaces and upgrades Town's 1999 mechanical street sweeper with a vacuum sweeper
- Pending successful grant application Town's matching share is \$56,000 or 25 % of the estimated purchase price of the street sweeper



Skid Steer

- Replaces 2000 John Deere tractor/loader and provides additional functionality
- Purchase and use split between Highway, Parks & Recreation, Water and Wastewater Departments
- General Fund Share is \$24,000 or 40% of the estimated \$60,000 purchase price



Asphalt Hot Box

- Provides ability to permanently repair potholes and water main repair cuts with hot patch asphalt in the winter, eliminating need to return in spring
- Purchase and use split between Highway, Water and Wastewater Departments
- Highway/General Fund share is \$14,400 or 60% of the estimated \$24,000 purchase price

Article 4 Tax Due Dates

Shall the Town vote to collect taxes on real property for fiscal year 2018/2019 in three equal installments due in the Treasurer's Office on the 15th day of August 2018, the 15th day of November 2018 and the 15th day of March 2019?

Shall the Town vote, pursuant to 24 VSA § 2804(a), to authorize the Selectboard to apply \$57,484 in surplus funds from the Cross Street Bridge Fund to offset increased spending for Capital Improvements in the FY19 General Fund Budget?

- Annual receipts from Middlebury College's yearly contribution and the local option tax, which are dedicated and reserved for the debt service and maintenance requirements, are projected to exceed anticipated expenses by approximately \$300,000 or more per year
- Cross Street Bridge Reserve Fund has a surplus of \$1.3M

- Selectboard decided to ask voters to use \$57,484 of the surplus to offset increased capital improvement spending.
- If the concept of tapping the Cross Street Bridge Fund for capital improvements is well received and approved by voters, the Board intends to propose the use of the Cross Street Bridge Fund for capital improvements in future years as well.

Using surplus Cross Street Bridge Funds to offset increased spending for capital improvements will reduce the increase in the tax rate:
