ILSLEY AT 100 A PLACE TO READ, MEET, LEARN & SHARE

Ilsley by the Numbers 2022

- > 94,000 annual visitors
- > 3,790 library card holders
 - I for every 2 Middlebury residents
- > 122,000 items checked out
 - 107,000 books, a rate of 350 books/day
 - I 5,000 digital items (e-books, audiobooks)
- > 2,800 hours open annually

Ilsley by the Numbers 2022

- > 295 community meetings in the library
 - I 13 meetings in the Community Meeting Room
 - 182 meetings in the Vermont Room
- > 143 library-sponsored children's programs
 - Examples: Storytime, Happy Noon Year, Take-and-Make Craft Bags
- > 199 library-sponsored adult programs
 - Examples: First Wednesday, Youth Media Lab, Community Classic Film Club
- All library programs funded by the Friends of IIsley Public Library

Ilsley's Infrastructure Issues

- > A 30-year-old boiler burning fuel oil heats the building
- The elevator periodically stalls between floors, requiring the Middlebury Fire Department to rescue trapped library users
- > The front steps are deteriorated and present significant accessibility challenges
- > Groundwater is leaking into the basement-level children's room

Ilsley's Infrastructure Issues

- Lack of an air circulation system degrades the health of the building and encourages mold growth during the winter months
- > Staff work areas and library operations are housed in cramped, make-do spaces
- MCTV's third-floor operation lacks a secondary egress
- Some 40% of the building consists of unusable space—hallways, columns, mechanical spaces, etc.
- Library staff cannot monitor use of the library bathrooms located adjacent to the side entrance



The Preliminary Plan

- Developed through extensive discussion and analysis with library staff
- > Builds on several years of focus groups, surveys, and conversations with library patrons and community leaders
- Models best practice in contemporary municipal libraries

ILSLEY AT 100 INVESTING IN MIDDLEBURY'S LIBRARY: A PRELIMINARY PLAN

Highlights of the Preliminary Plan

- > 3,000 additional square feet dedicated to youth services—our children are our future
- > 2,500 additional square feet dedicated to public meeting rooms—providing safe and comfortable meeting spaces to support local groups and our democratic traditions
- Comfortable seating and quiet reading and study areas—encouraging patrons to spend more time in the library

ILSLEY AT 100 NEW SPACES: CONFERENCE ROOM

Conference Room

This is a meeting space for local boards, community groups, professional colleagues, library staff, and others for in-person and hybrid/remote meetings.

It will accommodate 12 people seated around a conference table and should be accessible when the library is closed.

Small groups do not need to take up the Community Meeting Room, which is best utilized by larger groups.


ILSLEY AT 100 NEW SPACES: COMMUNITY LIVING ROOM

Community Living Room

A space dedicated to library programs and community gatherings that would best be served by a comfortable and informal setting.

Examples might include book clubs and receptions or longer meetings, like retreats, that would benefit from comfortable seating and access to a fridge/coffee.

Should accommodate 10 people seated.

ILSLEY AT 100 NEW SPACES: LIBRARY ACTIVITY ROOM

Library Activity Room

Library staff would conduct a variety of programs for youth, teens, and adults in this space. Storytimes would take place here as well as youth programs that involve crafts, physical movement, and singing.

Adult and teen programs that require clean-up and crafts would also take place in this space. Used as maker-space for youth, the Library Activity Room should be large enough to accommodate 16 people seated at tables.

ILSLEY AT 100 NEW SPACES: TEEN ROOM

Teen Room

The Teen Room would hold the teen materials collection and provide a space where teens—approximately ages 13-17—can gather to socialize, do homework, read, use laptops and computers, browse, relax, and work collaboratively.

ILSLEY AT 100 NEW SPACES: PUBLIC RESTROOMS

Public Restrooms

Two multi-stall, single-gender restrooms. Ideally, the Public Restrooms would be accessible after library hours, through the Common Lobby, so that patrons using the Community Meeting Room and Conference Room after hours could use these facilities.

Family Restroom

A single-use restroom with locking door. This restroom would accommodate users needing assistance by others (e.g., parents and children, elderly users) as well as patrons who identify as non-binary.

Lactation Room

A single-use, private space for nursing mothers.

ILSLEY AT 100 EXPANDED SPACES: PRE-K AND KINDERGARTEN AREA

Pre-K and Kindergarten Area

This space would be dedicated to library services for children through age six and their caregivers.

Browsing for this age group requires many face-out titles, as children cannot yet read and tend to choose books based on cover illustrations.

Children and caregivers could work on crafts at a craft table and pick up "take-and-make" bags. Parents could work while keeping an eye on their children. Caregivers and children could snuggle and read books together.

An early learning area would provide space for children to play and engage with a variety of sensory exploration units and activity centers.

ILSLEY AT 100 EXPANDED SPACES: ELEMENTARY AND MIDDLE SCHOOL AREAS

Elementary and Middle School Areas

Separate areas for elementary and middle school students would provide dedicated space where students could browse and select books, rest and read quietly, do homework, and socialize.

Elementary and middle school students start to have more peer-to-peer gathering needs. Space to gather to connect, play games, and chat is important.


ILSLEY AT 100 EXPANDED SPACES: COMMUNITY MEETING ROOM

Community Meeting Room

This space would be used for both library and community events, including lectures, film screenings, camps and activities, public forums, classes that require physical movement, workshops and training, and any other library or community activity that requires a large open area.

Seating configurations can alternate between lecturestyle, conference classroom, and completely open.

The Community Meeting Room can also serve as a space for art and photography exhibits. Monthly Friends of Ilsley Library book sales would take place here and, in emergencies, this room is the library's designated shelter-in-place area.

ILSLEY AT 100 FOUR OPTIONS FOR INVESTING IN OUR PUBLIC LIBRARY

THE NEXT STEP

The IPL 100 Project Team is evaluating these four options:

- I. Fix the outstanding infrastructure issues and bring the library up to code—for example, a new HVAC system, new elevator, and remediation of water leaking into the children's room.
- 2. Fix the outstanding infrastructure issues while investing in a renovation and expansion to meet what the community has identified as its most important needs—for example, multiple community meeting rooms, expanded youth services, modern public restrooms, and new areas for remote work, remote learning, and reading for pleasure.
- 3. Fix the outstanding infrastructure issues of the current building and invest in acquiring and renovating a downtown building to provide the space needed to meet community needs—for example, the Ben Franklin building.
- 4. Build an entirely new library downtown in the lower municipal parking lot and find a new use for the Ilsley Library building.


