The Region

Modoc County is located in the Northeastern corner of California, bordering Nevada and Oregon.

The population density in Modoc County is only two people per square mile.

Congestion and over population are extremely unlikely. Clean air, crystal-streams, and lack of automobile traffic are virtually assured. Wildlife is abundant in Modoc County.




Modoc County was incorporated in 1874.

The name Modoc was named after a native American tribe that formerly ranged in the Northeastern part of California.

The County seat of Modoc is the City of Alturas, which carries the motto, "Where the West Still Lives."





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A large portion of Modoc County is Federal land. Several federal agencies, including the United States Forest Service, Bureau of Land management, national Park Service, Bureau of Indian Affairs, and the United States Fish and Wildlife Service, have employees assigned to the area, and their operations are a significant part of the economy and services in this rural area.

Migration

Early migration routes to and from Modoc County, California for emigrant settlers included:

- California Trail: 1846 to 1869 from western Missouri to northern California
- Applegate Trail: since 1846
 (avoided the Forty Mile
 Desert) by leaving the
 Humboldt River in Nevada
 early at present-day Rye
 Reservoir, Nevada and
 passing through the Black
 Rock Desert to Fandango
 Pass past Goose Lake on to
 the Lost River and eventually
 the Willamette Valley in
 Oregon
- The Lassen Cutoff: 1848
 was established by gold
 rushers from Oregon going to
 Calirornia. It branched off the
 Applegate Trail at Davis
 Creek, went through Devil's
 Garden to the Pit River
 passing east of Mt. Lassen,
 and turning west to Lassen
 Rancho, California, and from
 there to Sacramento.

In some years as much as 1/3 of emigrants mistakenly took the Applegate Trail-Lassen Cutoff, a much longer and more difficult trail than the Truckee or Carson routes.
